EIFF 2015: Narcopolis (Justin Trefgarne, 2014)

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In 2024, a copper walks the streets of London fighting crime following the legalisation of all types of recreational drugs. But, when he is removed from a case in which he tries to identify an unclaimed corpse, he begins a quick and unstable descent into a conspiracy that rules the city.

To be referred to as a poor man's Jason Statham would be one hell of a disappointing comment for an actor to hear. Unfortunately, Elliot Cowan leads Narcopolis with a Statham style performance and little dramatic effect. His breathy, painfully emphasised dialogue is poorly written, which doesn't really help either. For writer/director Justin Trefgarne, this is a broad vision in terms of plot, but he's done very little with it. What could have been a simple, smart vision of drug filled dystopia winds up being a modern day, overlong episode of The Bill with eye-piercing body incinerator guns. Oh, and apparently in 2044 we're still using the headsets you could buy for your PC for £12.99 in Gamestation in 2002. You read that right.

Taking a quick look at Narcopolis' iMDB page, we can see that it has been sitting in stasis for close to a year. Why? Because there's next to no passion in its creation. A guddled crime sci fi, it races through its plot with such a lack of clarity its impossible to engage with. Mix in some rather crass dialogue and far fetched scenarios and you are given an embarrassingly awkward mix of Blade Runner and Drive; without any sort of emphatic pay off.

On paper, Narcopolis sounds like it could have the enjoyment factor cranked up to 100 whilst all of the artsy important

stuff came a very distant second. In reality, it's totally different. A cheap, boring sci-fi; Narcopolis will leave you with the worst emotive reaction of all: indifference.

EIFF 2015: Scottish Mussel (Talulah Riley, 2015)

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You know you're in for a real treat when the starting notes of The Proclaimers' 500 Miles pipe through the speakers. An apparent obligatory hallmark to Scottish cinema it seems to have been abused as of late; as if a film set in Scotland can't get by without it. It plays a key part in a jolly, totally un-Scottish scene in actress Talulah Riley's directorial debut. The work of an English director doing her best to depict Scotland, it falls victim to a sack load of cliches that are near impossible to forgive.

Unemployed and smoking weed daily, Ritchie is a down and out lad living in Glasgow, searching for a big job opportunity.When he comes across a group of thugs stealing pearls from protected mussels in the Scottish Highlands, he enlists some help from friends to make this his new venture. But in amongst the hysteria, he meets a woman whose passion for the wildlife may force him to change his mind.

Over the tinkling, folksy notes of Paolo Nutini, we descend into the depths of a Scottish river, then to the top of a Govan highrise, followed by a school playground, via a pub and then into the Highlands of the same great country – all in around twenty minutes. The fact that you are thrown straight into this undeveloped story makes it twice as difficult to understand. Usually, this happens through a script being convoluted and poorly edited; but it seems as though there was little to work with in the first place. Riley's character development lays bare the rather flimsy structure of her script. It's clumsy which, when paired with the edited footage, looks and feels hollow and cheap.

You can almost imagine the scriptural meeting that may or may not have occured during the fruition of Scottish Mussel. A checklist of every possible stereotype: slang, garments and painfully stupid people. In actual fact, it's hard to find somebody intelligible here amongst the apparent idiocy. Martin Compston does a standard job here, almost ommiting himself from the complete mess thats going on. Joe Thomas, of The Inbetweeners fame, does a trip around the country trying on every accent possible. Even Talulah Riley, in charge of both script and direction as well as being Ritchie's object of affection, has written herself a two dimensional character. It's the same for near enough everybody, including a camp surprise cameo from Russell Kane, but there is one saving grace amongst it all. Paul Brannigan, whose mainstream work has been solid thus far, is cast as the idiot of the friend group. Delivering his lines with deadpan brilliance, he's the godsend here. His uncomfortably coherent Scots accent makes for most of the laughs.

Scottish Mussel is a feeble directorial effort from first timer Talulah Riley. Suffering from a collection of stupefied characters and an unrealistic, painfully stereotyped view of Scotland and its people, it is highly likely that this will be nobody's glass of Irn-Bru.

The Edinburgh Reporter chats to Ian Andrews

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Ian Andrews is a master cooper who learned his trade working in the whisky trade, making barrels for King George and then VAT 69 when they had a distillery in South Queensferry.

He carried on working on his own after the distillery closed, and it seems that he cannot yet lay down his tools for good. His latest commission is to make a new Crow's Nest for SS Discovery in Dundee and we went to meet him to see how that was going. The Edinburgh Reporter NEWS from Phyllis Stephen on Vimeo.

He bought the original port pipe from a cooperage in Alloa which he then 'knocked down' to get it into his car. It meant that he then had to rebuild it, cutting out the bottom and completed the refurbishment with a seat and footrests inside where a sailor would have sat keeping lookout when the ship was at sea.

The port pipe he used was ideal as it is tall and thin, and would provide shelter for the sailor.

Ian has also made about 400 items for the Victory which is in Portsmouth such as gunpowder barrels.

The crow's nest will be taken to Dundee next week and will be clamped onto the mast with heavy brackets.

Ian told us that there are possibly only 140 coopers left in the whole of Scotland, whereas there were 140 in one shop in Edinburgh at one time. Although it is a trade which is diminishing, it is far from gone, particularly in a shed in South Queensferry.

RRS Discovery was the last traditional wooden three-masted ship to be built in Britain and went off to the Antarctic as a Royal Research Ship. Robert Falcon Scott and Ernest Shackleton sailed aboard the Discovery on their first successful journey to the Antarctic and is now a visitor attraction in Dundee.

Farid El Alagui confident of

Two men charged with 'significant number' of break ins to commercial vehicles

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Two men have been arrested and charged for a significant number of break-ins to commercial vehicles across Edinburgh and Midlothian.

Between June 22 and June 25, Police Scotland received 13 separate reports of power tool thefts from work vans parked in the south and east of the Capital as well as in Loanhead and Danderhall.

Each incident was thoroughly investigated by officers and as a result of these enquiries a 20-year-old and 18-year-old, both of whom are from Edinburgh, were detained last night (Thursday, June 25) and subsequently charged. Officers also recovered a number of power tools worth around £5000.

The suspects are due to appear before Edinburgh Sheriff Court today (Fri).

Chief Inspector Kenny Simpson, who is the Local Area Commander for Midlothian, said: "Following a robust investigation into a number of break-ins and thefts from commercial vehicles throughout Edinburgh and Midlothian we have now arrested two men and recovered around £5000 worth of power tools.

"I want to take this opportunity to recognise the tremendous police work in tracing both men and to thank the members of the public who played such an important role in this investigation.

"Vehicle crime has huge impact on communities across the country and one of our main priorities is preventing such criminality as well as tracing those responsible as quickly as possible.

"The public can continue to help with our efforts to reduce vehicle crime by taking simple measures to protect their vehicles such as removing high-value items from sight, ensuring doors are locked and parking in well-lit areas.

"Anyone who wants to report criminality in their area can do so by contacting the 101 number or speak to any officer."

Police appeal for public's help to trace missing woman

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Police are appealing for information to help trace a 34-yearold woman reported missing from the Restalrig area.

Emma Shaw was last seen on Lochend Avenue in the early hours of Thursday 25th June.

Officers are now growing increasingly concerned for Emma's welfare and are asking anyone who can help with their enquiries to get in touch.

Emma is described as white Scottish, 5ft 5inches tall, with a stocky build. She has red/brown long curly hair with a fringe and usually wears a blouse or jumper. She was last seen carrying a multi-coloured cream handbag with her.

Inspector Graeme Dignan of Gayfield said: "We're asking anyone who thinks they may have seen Emma, or who has information which can help us establish her whereabouts, to come forward.

"Also, if Emma hears this appeal I would urge her to contact us or her family and let us know that she is safe and well."

Anyone with information is asked to contact Police Scotland as soon as possible on 101.

Two charged after heroin recovered from Muirhouse property

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Two people have been arrested and charged under the Misuse of Drugs Act after police in Edinburgh recovered a qunatity of Class A drugs in the North of the city.

Officers carried out a search of a property in Muirhouse View yesterday (Thursday) and £500 of heroin was recovered from inside.

A 53-year-old man and a 21-year-old woman are scheduled to appear at Edinburgh Sheriff Court today.

Detective Inspector Stuart Harkness from the Gayfield

Proactive Unit said: "Police Scotland maintains its commitment to tackling serious and organised crime and removing offenders from our communities.

"Whenever we receive information relating to drug crime or associated criminal activity, we will carry out a thorough investigation into the report.

Campaigners having a party to save 1-6 Canonmills Bridge!

Locals are rallying round this weekend to ensure that the demolition of 1-6 Canonmills Bridge, currently leased by local produce champions EARTHY, is stopped.

Led by local resident Jan Anderson and Architectural/urban designer and lecturer, Ross McEwan, the current campaign has gathered quite a response from the community who say they feel that they have been left in the dark over plans for the 18th century bridge in Inverleith Conservation Area.

They say that if the demolition goes ahead and the four-storey new build is put in its place, it will overshadow the area, block the views of the waters and wildlife and destroy the iconic skyline for residents and tourists to the area alike.

The campaigners feel that the traditional single-storey building at 1 - 6 Canonmills Bridge has found a place in the

hearts of locals and visitors to the area, serving as an attractive and popular hub for social life around a busy junction.

In just two weeks the online petition gained nearly 2500 signatures with cries of disbelief about the plans. The momentum is set to continue with a weekend of partying and petitioning to raise awareness this weekend on 27 & 28 June on the bridge.

Jan told us why this is so important: "We want to ensure that this time everyone is aware of the plans for the area as to date it certainly hasn't been made clear to the wider public what is happening with this beautiful historic, conservation area. We need people to know that it's not too late and we can still stop the demolition by writing to the planning subcommittee, the local councillors and spreading the word. "

The campaigners say that the demolition application is due to appear on the Edinburgh Council Planning sub-committee agenda on either 27 July or 12 August and the locals are geared up to spend the coming weeks ensuring that Edinburgh council realise that this proposal is seen as a 'bridge too far'.

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Letter from Scotland

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A landlubber's journey to the isles

Being a city boy, I don't often think of my fellow Scots on the 94 inhabited islands around our coast. And when I do think of the isles, it's a romantic vision of blue seas, high mountains and picturesque harbours. Then there's Caledonian MacBrayne, the red-funnelled ferry boats that take you "over the sea to Skye" and 21 other islands. I mention this because, as I write, negotiations are taking place to try to avert a strike of ferry crews this weekend, the first weekend of the holiday season. Already there's been a work-to-rule and some disruption to services.

The dispute highlights a whole host of issues for me. The immediate one is the tendering for a new eight-year government contract to run the western isles ferry services from next year. An open competition is required under European trading laws and state-owned Calmac (for short) faces a rival bid from the private international services company Serco which has already won the contract for the northern isles. The RMT union, which represents half of Calmac's 14,000 strong workforce, is demanding a guarantee from the Scottish government that pay, conditions and pensions will be protected under the new contract.

It's not easy to see how this can be done, since these are some of the few areas for manoeuvre Calmac and Serco have as they prepare their bid. The 29 ferry boats and harbour facilities are owned by a separate state company and the routes and timetables and fares are fixed by the government. It's all part of the complication of being in a single European market.

On the face of it, the single market sounds like a good idea. Companies should be able to bid for contracts – public and private – on an equal footing across Europe. But does that mean that low-paid workers should have their wages and conditions cut to the lowest common denominator to achieve this ? Or should public "lifeline" services be exempt from the usual competition laws ?

And other questions crowd in upon me as I stand on the deck of my imaginary ferry boat waiting for it to take me to the magic isles. Do we owe a special duty to the 103,700 people who live on our islands to provide them with a link to the mainland ? Should we be encouraging tourists to go to the islands? Is the Gaelic culture of the Western Isles worth supporting ? My own answer to all three questions is "Yes" but I'm not sure everyone agrees with me — whatever they might say.

The newspapers this week carry pages of densely typed names of students who have successfully completed their university degrees. It's a lovely and quaint tradition, honouring the effort that young people have put into "being educated". This week too is the end of the school term and the end of the parliamentary term at Holyrood. At First Minister's question time, all the talk was about childcare during the holidays and the change of many college courses from part-time to full-time.

MSPs also signed off the bill ending automatic early release from prison and another introducing a licencing system for air-guns. The Scottish Government published its long-awaited estimates of the tax revenues we can expect from the North Sea oil and gas fields over the next four years. They are down fourfold from the estimates a year ago and range from £2.1bn to £10.8bn depending on the assumptions made. The government also published its controversial land reform bill which would give ministers the power to order the sale of land if the owner was deemed to standing in the way of "development." The bill will also encourage community ownership of land and will end the rates exemption for shooting estates. The Conservatives have dubbed it a "rural land-grab" by the SNP.

Let's not forget the Scottish Labour Party in all this radical talk. The two leadership contenders, Kezia Dugdale and Ken Mackintosh, have been exploring their differences. This week they clashed over council tax — Kezia wants to continue the freeze, Ken wants to end it. And on "the Glasgow question", Kezia thinks the route to the recovery of Labour fortunes begins in winning back Glasgow, Ken thinks the party should move its headquarters and its emphasis to Edinburgh.

Finally, a hand-written copy of one of Robert Burns' little known poems has come to light. It was found in a 19th century scrapbook and was sold at auction this week for £7,500. "The Humble Petition of Bruar Water to the Noble Duke of Atholl " has been hailed as evidence that Burns' was a pioneering environmentalist. In it the river Bruar calls on the Duke to plant trees along its banks, trees which can still be seen by House of Bruar, a well-known watering hole and shopping centre on the A9.

"Would then my noble master please

To grant my highest wishes,

He'll shade my banks wi' tow'ring trees,

And bonnie spreading bushes.

Delighted doubly then, my lord,

You'll wander by my banks,

And listen mony a grateful bird

Return you tuneful thanks."

Hibs' first team squad start pre-season training

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Hibernian's first team squad returned for the start of preseason training yesterday

Head of Sports Science Craig Flannigan engineered the club's pre-season programme — specifically tailored to ensure the team hits the ground running when the Ladbrokes Championship campaign starts against Dumbarton in August.

During the opening session, groups of players were thoroughly tested and their individual fitness was analysed and assessed, both at theTraining Centre and using state-of-the-art technology labs at Queen Margaret University, in order to gauge their physical condition.

The tests included: Muscle imaging laboratory where players had their muscle thickness of Rectus Femoris, Vastus Lateralis, and Vastus Intermedius and muscle architecture (pennation angle) of Vastus Lateralis measured for both legs; Neuromuscular assessment research laboratory Peak Force, rate of force development, relaxation rate and electromechanical delay was measured for quadriceps and hamstrings muscles of both legs.

Motion Analysis laboratory: Unilateral balance and leg stiffness of both limbs were assessed, in response to walking

and hopping tasks, via three-dimensional kinematic (video analysis) and independent kinetic (via force plates) analysis.

One of these steps is to abolish the tax on air passengers completely. Ben Thomson, the retiring Chair of the organisation, says that the abolition of the tax would be of great benefit to the country and would improve the international reach of Scotland's businesses. Edinburgh Airport has always maintained that the abolition of the duty would result in economic improvement for Scotland, and that even by reducing it by half could have a benefit of around £200m.

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EIFF 2015: Tu dors Nicole (Stéphane Lafleur, 2014)

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It's been ages since Nicole had the house to herself. Now, with her parents away on vacation she's decided to spend the summer lazing around aimlessly with her best friend. Things couldn't be better, until she realises her brother's band have taken up the family front room as their new recording space. With the clash of drums in her head, a monotonous job and a ten year old kid destined to grab her heart, summer may not turn out exactly as she had hoped.

Nicole's summer is set off on a positive note with the arrival of a credit card; something she is totally oblivious to the consequences of. This lack of understanding sets off a chain reaction of unfortunate events in her life that make up most of Tu dors Nicole's moments of comic relief. There's some superb performances, too. Julianne Côté plays the titular role with a brilliant natural effort and her supporting cast help create the almost insular and bemused world she lives in.

There is no denying that the characters and deep black and white style of Tu dors Nicole will draw comparisons to Baumbach's Frances Ha. For the first few moments, this is almost undeniable, but as it sets off on its own thematic path things gain clarity and start to detach themselves from the Baumbach styling that is glaringly obvious. Lafleur adds her own stamp on things. A notable favourite? Martin – a ten year old kid Nicole used to babysit who, after his voice drops, assumes he has a chance with the girl over twice his age. His exaggerated, Barry White baritone and charming vocabulary ("The heart has no age!") makes every one of his appearances a highlight in already breezy film.

Bitter, simple and visually lustrous, Tu dors Nicole is a wry, halcyon summer haze.

EIFF 2015: Chicken (Joe Stephenson, 2015)

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For a debut film, there is a seriously impressive understanding of its characters that helps keep Chicken firmly on its feet. The directorial debut of young Joe Stephenson, it offers a striking look at how broken Britain really is; following the lives of a disjointed family living on the edge of society.

Cast out by their dysfunctional family structure, two brothers live on the skirts of the English countryside sharing a caravan home and very little else. Polly is a job drifter, doing anything he can to make himself money. Fifteen year old Richard, an outcast with learning disabilities, explores the world around him, counting a loyal chicken named Fiona as a close friend. But when their life of solitude from the bustling outside world is interrupted by their new neighbours, the bond between the brothers is frayed even further.

I first heard about Chicken when doing my research for an interview with its editor, Charlie Lyne a few months ago. He

commented that although his involvement was fairly limited that he was comfortable singing the praises of Scott Chambers. Chambers delivers an awe-inspiring performance as Richard; interpreting mental disability with a frank and uncompromising eye. He really shines when Yasmin Paige comes into the picture. The muse of Richard Ayoade's directorial visions, she takes pride of place as a brilliant actress in a film that, till her performance, needed a little refinement and clarity. Her chemistry with Chambers as the young boy's best friend is touching and believable; her boisterous attitude paired with the Richard's lack thereof. It makes for gorgeous viewing.

At the start, Chicken has a wispy nature that makes emotional investment pretty difficult. We're presented with a sweet, endearing young boy suffering from a mental illness and his older brother who doesn't care too much for him. It's the kind of family structure that we're used to seeing in Jacqueline Wilson CBBC adaptations and, at times, it does feel a little like this. But what perhaps makes Chicken so impressive is that it lures you in under this comely nature and uses it to trap you in a twist that's so, well, twisted that it holds you in its grip til the closing scene.

Chicken's slightly childish sensibility soon gives way to an endearing, affecting emotional drama with a killer twist and shining central performances.

Hearts today made their third major signing of the summer when Spanish striker Juanma Delgado confirmed the recent rumours that he would signing for the Gorgie club by signing a three year deal for the Ladbrokes Premiership newcomers. EIFF 2015: Dope (Rick Famuyiwa, 2015)

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Ahh, the teen comedy. An over-saturated movie genre with every one trying its hardest to become the best. You often find that term 'teen cult classic' thrown around a little frivolously. In actual fact, we seldom see something that deserves that prestigious title. Perhaps 2007's *Superbad* was the last one to reach these heady heights, and even then it took a shed-load of strong reviews and a huge teen following for it to reach this success. Thus, the strong praise that Dope has received from its extensive festival run has become so precious. A passionate, finely crafted escapade set in the Los Angeles suburbs, it takes a place associated with crime-fueled drug gangs and injects a huge amount of character into the people that walk its streets.

For Michael, day to day life in Inglewood, California (known affectionately as The Bottoms) consists of getting shining grades, dressing like his eighties hip-hop heroes and avoiding getting his Jordan's stolen by the school bullies. But as his interview for Harvard University comes closer, he crosses paths with Dom, a local dope dealer who embroils him in a cat and mouse chase across the city involving a serious amount of gear.

The leading trio of Dope manage to be both the source of its exuberance and rare, sweet somber moments. Shameik Moore takes the helm of this non-stop movie and operates it with such enjoyment and control that its surprising to hear this is his first feature, never mind lead role. Similarly, young Kiersey Clemons shines as the friend group's feminine component. Her position as the group's headstrong gay figure manages to counteract the perception of the other women as simply alluring eye candy. However, it's difficult to criticise this fully. These women serve some purpose as plot influences, indicating that Famuyiwa has a grasp of both filmmaking ethics and the hormone driven, teenage boy's mind.

The man who feels like an influence to the film's content itself is A\$AP Rocky. The rapper does some damn good work as the leader of a local gang dealing the eponymous drug. His hip-hop bred swagger works so intrinsically with his character that there's very little to differentiate the man and his role. It's hard to fault Dope's visceral brilliance too. Blood orange sunsets and almost entirely achromatic nightclub scenes are gifted with a journey of hip-hop music through the ages. It's damn good looking and a lot of fun.

Its fleshy sensuality drives you deep into the head of its protagonist. Serving as the distractions to Malcolm's main goal (getting rid of near enough \$100k worth of cocaine), it's a significant part of a fast paced, fizzing world that these teenagers survive in. Most teen comedies try and serve their purpose by focusing on its sexy subtext, whilst admirably Dope sits somewhere in between. Add in the film's slightly dissonant closing monologue tackling race issues with an indelibly strong hand, and we have the kind of teen comedy that throws itself leaps and bounds ahead of a lot of its predecessors.

Slick, well dressed and surprisingly evocative for a teen comedy, Dope has DNA that almost certainly points to a future cult classic.
