Hibernian 2-6 Rangers



Hibs' season started with a comprehensive 6-2 home defeat to fellow Championship contenders Rangers at Easter Road this afternoon. To make matters worse, Dominique Malonga and Jordon Forster were both forced to go off with injuries.

The big talking point amongst the Hibs' fans was the omission of Scott Allan who had to settle for a place on the bench. The news was greeted by the 'glass half empty' brigade as confirmation that he will be playing his football in Glasgow this season, whilst the optimists in the crowd believe that Head Coach Alan Stubbs is saving his star player for the league campaign.

Once again, supporters hoping to see a new face were disappointed as only keeper Antonio Reguero, who was listed as a substitute was not at Easter Road last season.

Rangers fielded four ex Hearts' players in their line-up, Danny Wilson, Jason Holt, Lee Wallace and David Templeton. Former Hibs midfielder Dean Shiels and striker Kenny Miller started on the bench.

Hibs started brightly and should have taken an early lead when Lewis Stevenson set up Malonga but the striker's first time effort flew well over.

The home side however took a deserved lead in the 12th minute when Sam Stanton picked up the ball on the half way line then drove forward before firing an unstoppable left foot shot into the corner of the net.

Holt then went close for the visitors but at this stage Hibs were dominating possession.

Just before the break however, Rangers struck twice. The first came from a superb free kick from the impressive James Tavernier after a dubious award from Willie Collum then just on half time Martyn Waghorn added a second from close range after a cut back from Holt.

Waghorn made it 3-1 within a minute of the restart with a fine effort from an acute angle after latching onto a long clearance.

Defender Forster was then forced to go off with a hamstring injury and was replaced by Scott Allan who received a standing ovation from both sets of fans.

Jason Cummings pulled one back from the penalty spot in the 59^{th} minute after Wilson brought down the youngster inside the area but Hibs hopes of a comeback were dashed within seconds when Andy Halliday curled a left footed strike from 25 yards

into the top corner of Oxley's net.

Rangers made it 5-2 in the 76th minute after Miller tapped the ball home from close range following a Nicky Clark cross from the right wing.

Lewis Allan went close moments later then Gray had the ball in the net from a Stevenson cross but his effort was ruled offside.

Miller grabbed his second and Rangers sixth in the 81st minute, tapping in from close range after a fine Barrie McKay cross.

Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2015 — Alchemy of the Piano

Following his sell out run in 2014 with Anatomy of the Piano, virtuoso maverick pianist and raconteur Will Pickvance returns to Summerhall with a brand new show for adults for the 2015 Fringe.

For this new show he takes us deeper into the magic to be found in a piano and shares the spells it has cast on him via music and charmingly intelligent humour.

Pickvance takes his audiences on a stream of musical consciousness. A vocabulary of Bach fugues, Victorian parlour songs, jazz standards, pop classics and more are surrendered to a pair of hands that are as capricious as their owner. Defying all limitations of style and genre Will simply expresses his infectious joy and love of music in his playing and chat.

Alchemy of the Piano looks at and attempts to demonstrate how the magic of music happens. It starts and ends with a single note, but what happens in between, nobody, including Will himself, knows until the moment's gone. Where does this one-off piano mix come from? What sets it up? Chance. Perhaps the rhythm of footsteps in the corridor, or the crescendo of the boiling kettle? Maybe the man in the corner with the barking-mad dog inspires a melodic change in direction, before the squeaky piano pedal offers a place of refuge.

A piano virtuoso and staunch advocate for the instrument Will is a firm believer that music making is something that everyone can get involved in. In a varied career as a professional musician Will Pickvance has been musical director for pantomimes starring various soap stars, been resident pianist Andrew Carnegie's Scottish Castle and found himself in Leo Sayer's backing band. He has jammed with The Eagles and directed the music for Ashley Judd's wedding and Robbie Williams' surprise birthday party (at which he accompanied Williams in an impromptu rendition of the million selling Angels).

Three men given life sentences for Restalrig murder





Three men have been given life sentences for the murder of a man in Edinburgh last year.

James Watson (27), Paul Watson (29) and Gary Sim (32) appeared

before the High Court in Edinburgh today (Fri) in connection with the death of Thomas Lamb.

Mr Lamb was found on Restalrig Circus on September 20 having been attacked and beaten.

All three initially denied killing Mr Lamb but detectives from Police Scotland's Major Investigation Team carried out significant enquiry before arresting and charging them with his murder.

They were found guilty following a three-week trial and will serve a minimum of 20 years in prison.

Detective Chief Inspector Keith Hardie of Police Scotland's Major Investigation Team, said: "The murder of Thomas Lamb was a senseless and brutal attack.

"All three of the men had tried to deny killing Mr Lamb but thanks to the hard work of the officers involved in this investigation we were able to provide overwhelming evidence of their guilt.

"Throughout this investigation Mr Lamb's family have shown tremendous courage and my thoughts are with them today."

Family tribute to Dorothea Logan

Ninety-five-year-old Dorothea Logan from Edinburgh was a passenger in an Audi A6 which was in collision with a VW Polo on the A7 one mile north of Stow on the afternoon of Tuesday 14 July. She passed away at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary the following day. \square

Public safety advice ahead of Hibs v Rangers cup tie

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Police will have a policing operation present this weekend to keep the public safe during the first round of the Petrofac Training Cup between Hibernian and Rangers.

Thousands of spectators are expected to attend at Easter Road Stadium tomorrow for the game, which kicks off at 12.30pm, and a significant police presence will be in place to identify anyone in possession of alcohol, fireworks or flares.

Anti-social drinking in the surrounding streets will also not be tolerated and officers will be enforcing the Edinburgh bylaw in this regard.

In addition, police will be assisting stewards to carry out searches outside the ground to prevent illegal or prohibited items being smuggled in, including explosive or combustible materials.

Fans from both sides are urged to ensure their behaviour during the match does not put themselves or others in danger.

Chief Inspector Bob Paris said: "This is a significant fixture for both clubs and we want all supporters to enjoy the day.

"Police will be patrolling around the stadium with a focus on stopping anti-social street drinking and fans will be subject to searches as a condition of entry to the ground. Drinking on board a supporters bus to and from the match is also an offence and officers will be checking all coaches coming to the match.

"Police Scotland is committed to keeping people safe and while the behaviour of the vast majority of Hibs and Rangers fans is exemplary, the reckless conduct of a small minority could place others in danger.

"Anyone found to be in possession of these items, or any other objects that are not permitted within the stadium, will be refused entry and may face further police action."

Man charged with series of housebreakings in capital



A man has been arrested and charged in connection with a series of housebreakings in Edinburgh.

As part of the ongoing Operation RAC, local officers had been investigating three break-ins, which occurred at addresses on Upper Grove Place, Caledonian Crescent and Caledonian Place.

A further three attempted housebreakings all reported on Orwell Place were also investigated as part of this effort.

Various items of property were stolen and officers had been pursuing a number of lines of enquiry.

As a result, a 33-year-old man was arrested and appeared before Edinburgh Sheriff Court yesterday in connection with these incidents and possession of drugs.

Superintendent Gary Ritchie said: "Housebreaking has a tremendous impact on the victims and remains a policing priority.

"To reflect our commitment to tackling housebreaking and associated offences, Operation RAC officers continue to identify those responsible for housebreaking and ensure they are brought to justice.

"Thanks to the hard work of police officers we were able to trace this individual, who has been remanded in custody by the court whilst his case continues, and successfully recover around £700 worth of stolen property."

Livingston teenager's quick response recognised by Fire Service



A Livingston boy's quick response to hearing a smoke alarm has been recognised by the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) and The Society for the Protection of Life from Fire.

Stuart Watson found the fire at a house in Plover Brae while collecting for Cancer Research near his home in the town's Ladywell area in May 2014. No-one was home but three dogs were inside as smoke filled the property.

Then aged 13 years old, he immediately raised the alarm by telling a neighbour, leading to a quick 999 call and firefighters arriving in time to save the pet Yorkshire Terriers and prevent flames, smoke and heat sweeping through the home.

Station Manager Martyn Brandrick, the commanding officer at Livingston, said: "Stuart's quick thinking that day meant three family pets were saved and the fire was confined to the kitchen."

He added: "While our crews were at the scene the owner's daughter returned because her dad had remembered leaving a pot on the cooker."

"She was very concerned for the pets' welfare", he continued. "It's not hard to imagine that if Stuart hadn't raised the alarm then she may have considered trying to reach the dogs, which would obviously have put her at

risk.

"It shows why fire detection is vital for every home and why people need to act quickly whenever they hear a smoke alarm activate."

Following the incident SFRS crews welcomed Stuart, along with his twin brother Kevin, younger brother Dylan and sister Jamie-Lee to Livingston Fire Station.

The siblings donned full firefighter kit and were given a crash course in how to operate a high pressure jet as well as a close-up look around a state-ofthe-art appliance.

Joined by their mum Clair and her husband Stephen, they returned to the station on Wednesday (22 July) as Stuart received a letter of commendation from The Society for the Protection of Life from Fire.

Station Manager Brandrick welcomed them back and said he was delighted to present the commendation on behalf of the society.

He explained: "We know the public have a vital role in protecting our communities from fire and this is a clear example of an active citizen taking responsibility for the safety of others.

"Many people hear an alarm from a nearby house and assume it's nothing but waiting to find out if it does stop could have tragic consequences.

"If a fire happens every second counts and a quick 999 call buys vital time for our crews. That often means they can put a fire out before it causes devastating damage to property.

"It can also mean the difference between life and death as when someone is trapped a quick response gives firefighters the chance to reach them in time."

SFRS crews throughout the country routinely provide free home fire safety and firefighters want people to consider if they or someone they know could benefit from the popular service.

Many people are unaware of fire hazards within their homes and the short

visits from crews allow them to recognise the dangers and take simple steps to keep themselves and their property safe.

The visits, which take around 20 minutes, are conducted by local crews and are always arranged for a time convenient for the householder. Where smoke alarms are found to be needed the firefighters even provide and install them free of charge.

Anyone can request a free home fire safety visit by calling the freephone number 0800 0731 999, by texting 'FIRE' to 80800 or via the SFRS website at www.firescotland.gov.uk.

Every level of a home should have a working smoke alarms and householders are advised to consider fitting a heat alarm within the kitchen to provide early warning without being activated by the small amounts of smoke produced from cooking.

Scott Allan not for sale says Alan Stubbs



Hibs' Head Coach Alan Stubbs has told the fans that midfielder Scott Allan is not for sale.

Speculation has been rife over the last 24 hours with media outlets suggesting that the Glaswegian has asked for a move but the Easter Road boss insists that he wants to build a team that the supporters can be proud of and that Allan is a vital part of his plans.

Speaking to Hibernian TV, Stubbs said: "We have had an offer

"We said all along that we wanted to build a team that the fans are proud of on the pitch and in all my time in football, you don't sell your best players. I think the fans deserve that and I think they respect that and its important that they keep buying into what we do.

"Scott Allan is a vital member of my team. He is going to be a big part in something that we want to achieve this season and that is promotion and as far as I am concerned, that is it.

"Our first competitive game is on Saturday (against Rangers) and it is a great game to start. It will be competitive but it's another game in our build up to our first league game.

"We have had a couple of friendly games for fitness but Saturday is real and we will treat it with all the respect it deserves. It is a cup competition and we are at home. It's a big game and one we are all looking forward to.

"We have progressed in the last year and I firmly believe that. we are in a better position than we were at this time last year.

Inside Out's Ronnie del Carmen: the Pixar storyteller that will make grown men cry



The first time Pixar's Ronnie del Carmen made himself known to us was in the waiting lounge of Edinburgh's APEX Hotel in search of a restroom. "Hey guys," he grins, "I won't be a minute!" He is at the helm of one of the decades most widely acclaimed films, and yet still felt it necessary to let us know he'd be quick on his bathroom break.

Inside Out's Ronnie del Carmen has a sort of welcoming warmth that you may not have expected. Of course, the highly hailed group of imaginative people at Pixar should be, like their films, grinning from ear to ear, but when you consider the incessant press tour that has arrived on his doorstep almost unannounced, it's a miracle del Carmen has even made it here at all.

The studio's latest output, Inside Out is a thoughtful piece of work both literally and figuratively. Set inside the mind of an 11 year old girl named Riley, it looks at the emotions that run around our heads keeping everything running like clockwork. On screen, it exudes the sort of uncomplicated ease we have come to expect from the Pixar roster. With standing ovations and cheers in the Grand Théâtre following its lauded Cannes debut and a position as the States' highest grossing opener for an original film, what was it that kept the company coming back to the quieter grounds of the Edinburgh International Film Festival?

"It's wonderful here, for one thing, isn't it?" He reaches out his arms as if there was no need to ask such a silly question. "It's fantastic. It's a hub for stories, and the studio is devoted to storytelling. A lot of people assume it's just an animation studio, but the hardest thing that we work on is our stories.".

Such passion came at no surprise. Thirteen years ago, del Carmen first stepped into the Pixar offices as the Story Supervisor on the wonderful Finding Nemo, and since then has had a hand in creating nearly every other notable output of the company to date. He had the same role during the production of Pixar's most weepy affair, the balloon-fuelled flyaway beauty that was Up.

With almost no human touch, Pixar makes you empathise and shed tears for something that we've never encountered face to face: emotions. The delightfully annoying Bing-Bong, Riley's imaginary friend serves as a reminder of the passage of time existing even when you're still a child. It's heart wrenching; moving even the coldest of hearts. If you take a quick glance

around the cinema, you will find that people of all ages will be shedding tears, something that del Carmen said was more integral than intentional. "One of the things me and Pete (Docter, his fellow director) had talked about was that if we were going to make a story about emotions that we better make it emotional. Usually we talk about challenging circumstances. We make entertaining movies. We know how to laugh and feel joy but one of the things we're really not good at as human beings is having to deal with difficult feelings; complicated ones. We try not to show it, we try not to give in to it. When you're facing a movie, you're empathising with the story — the tears run." With the same exuberant passion he discussed Edinburgh with, Ronnie was now talking about something on the opposite end of the emotional spectrum. "I've experienced that as an audience member," he confessed, "but you don't want to talk about that to other people, or you try not to. It's easier to be in the dark, facing a movie and empathising with these characters. Hopefully [with Inside Out], you can talk about it afterwards with other people! As a society, we find [sadness] to be a sign of weakness, but it isn't because we all go through it. It's sort of liberating to say that."

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All of this old fashioned hearsay that made Inside Out a popular affair has translated into a fizzing box office record. But for Ronnie, the dollar signs that sit next to his film mean nothing, it's the people behind those numbers that matter. "When a movie reaches an audience, and that story and those characters get that praise it's thrilling," he said, "I don't even count the numbers, I just read people's reactions!"

Pixar have this wonderful habit of putting together a cast that is sort of incongruous to the massive box office takings that inevitably follow. While this remains the company norm, Inside Out acts as a slight intermission to the rule. With a cast that includes the SNL alumni Amy Poehler and Bill Hader as well as The Office's ever endearing Phyllis Smith, there are a few major Hollywood names behind the voices of the characters. Poehler had unwittingly stepped into the shoes of the lead character Joy before she had even been asked to play her. In the early stages of the film's production, del Carmen and Docter would be discussing how Amy would read the lines for a role she hadn't even been asked about yet! Ronnie vividly remembers the moment she signed the dotted line, reenacting the clenched fists in the air yelling "Yes!" as he heard the good news; with Poehler, they were lucky. "The first time [Amy] read the script, she started taking notes on Joy and performed Joy much more than we had imagined. She turned the character and her own personality into Joy, and so there's no question that Amy herself is like [her]. She's very inclusive, very positive, she wants to make sure that everyone does well."

In the past, Pixar has injected a huge amount of imagination into real life situations. Worlds in which fish, insects and even Cars can talk. But while these films had the limits of the creator's imagination, Inside Out, realistically, had no starting point at all. With a creative process of near five years, there must have been some brick walls that were difficult to climb. "They were all hard to overcome," he concurs, "because you were telling the story of a place that nobody has ever actually been to." He almost summarises Inside Out's impressive complexity in one fell swoop. "There are no rules we can understand. So, if you're telling a story about an old man who wants to fill his house with thousands of balloons, you have things in place: gravity, what the house is made of. You can kind of see what they all do and so this is easily understandable when people watch it." Ronnie lightly slammed his hands to the table, perhaps reminiscing on those formerly unsurpassed barriers Pixar battled with. "We don't have any common ground when we say, what is an emotion? What is the mind world like? So we have to make sure that everything we create feels somewhat understandable and that those systems don't contradict each other. That itself is a five year journey, to make sure that everything we put in place doesn't become confusing."

That's probably the reason behind how deft, moving and impressive Inside Out really is. This is a film with no limitations: implausibility wasn't ever a factor. In the past, reality has always kept the company grounded, yet their results have always been surreal. Now, their latest work acts as their first creation of a whole new universe, with no solid reference points. In a way, Inside Out is Pixar really coming out to play.

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It bursts onto the screen with the plethora of human emotions condensed into Joy, Sadness, Anger, Fear and Disgust. Scientific studies show that there are more than 70, which questions how del Carmen and Docter whittled them down to just five. In the laborious process, several made appearances but didn't quite make the cut. "We had the idea of having an outer ring of characters that would be waiting in the wings, sorta poking their heads through saying "Hey, I'd be useful!". One of them was schadenfreude (pleasure from the misfortune of others) and another was ennui (eternally bored and dissatisfied). But it wasn't relevant to the story! It made people ask more questions." He delved into more of these forgotten emotions, "We used to have Hope, always ringing her hands hoping for the best things to happen or for the bad things to go. She became terribly limited, we realised we couldn't write her dialogue without using 'I hope', so she was gone! Then we had Surprise, who was always surprised by things." Out of nowhere, del Carmen slipped into the cast out character's personality, mouth agape with his head in his hands like the Edvard Munch painting, "but she became a one gag character. That's all it was: trial and error. Our stock and trade at Pixar consists of 'Let's try it!' Why? Because we

don't know if it's not gonna work. And if it doesn't work, we can throw it away!"

Later, Ronnie mused over which emotion sits at the control panel in his head. "There's two that would definitely qualify. The character I can most relate to is Joy. Being a parent I always want my children to be happy." And the other? "The most native emotion in my head would be sadness. At the studio, I look after all the scenes that are about making people cry. I'm a professional sad maker." That single statement defines everything that's great about Ronnie del Carmen and his coworkers. In an industry brimming with hyperactive, saccharine sweet kids movies, Pixar deliver a refreshing dose of emotive reality — not depressingly tragic nor overly complicated, but something that's simply a necessity.

Where to eat and drink — Civerino's Italian Street Food & Pizza Bar

Civerino's is located just off the Royal Mile near the Tron Kirk in Hunter Square. The restaurant serves a fanatastic selection of family recipes handed down through Michel's family, featuring Italian street food and of course pizza either whole or by the slice. In contrast to some of the overpriced Royal Mile tourist restaurants offering, as a general rule, fairly low quality food, Civerinos is the real deal and very competitively priced.

The beautiful glass door way opens into a minimalist style canteen with long tables and an open kitchen with tantalising aromas. The staff are super welcoming giving a real easy going family feel to the place. The owner Michel is often sat at the bar and came to talk to us about his plans

for the restaurant, the food and his plans for the upcoming Festival season.

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Civerinos Entrance

It is easy to see why the food at Civerino's food is so good when you meet Michel. His enthusiasm and passion for Italian food and the business is inspiring and infectious! He is so excited by the fresh produce, especially after a recent trip with the kitchen team to source new products and try out new ideas resulting in some fabulous new gorgonzola croquettes, Italian salamis and porcini mushroom sauce which are just a few of the tasty new treats. He certainly loves his food and takes pride in his family's heritage. Civerino's is an expression of this passion — great food from the heart; timeless, classic recipes using exceptional fresh ingredients that would last forever.

A long term Edinburgh resident and foodie Michel loves eating at many of the local establishments and is very complimentary about many of his neighbours including fellow street food success <u>Ting Thai Caravan</u> where he loves to go for his dinner and Ninja buns, who are now providing the food at Paradise Palms.

With the restaurant's first festival season approaching fast they are keen to ensure they still manage to save some space for their regular followers and will be keeping a table at the back for bookings from those who have booked before. They will also be open late so you can head over after your shift or show too. Seating outside should help them to catch the eye of the passing traffic as will their new Gelato bike set to appear very soon!

On to the food — having tried the fabulous pizzas on a different occasion we decided to try out the rest of the <u>menu</u>. Mix and match home made pasta varieties and sauces featuring

pig cheek carbonara and slow cooked beef ragu are sure to be crowd pleasers, and there are some really exciting antipasti dishes if you can draw your gaze away from the pizza menu that is.

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Steak Tagliata

We decided on the parsley and chilli calamari, beef meatballs in mushroom sugo, Steak tagliata with wild rocket salad and Zuccini fritti. The food is served on sharing style boards with individual paper plates, so you can get stuck in and help your self in unpretentious communal dining style.

We were very impressed with all of our dishes, light crispy battered zucchini was really tasty, well-cooked steak with roast tomatoes and rocket was the stuff of dreams believe me, and of course crispy calamari with aioli was just about perfect, but the rich tasty porcini sauce with the meatballs was a stand out winner at our table. We were dipping everything in it!

The wine and beers are all really well priced and they also have a frozen cocktail featuring popular Italian favourites including Negroni and Aperol Spritz. Desserts are also pretty awesome — we were recommended to try the Tiramisu but didn't have space after our feast so it will have to be saved for our next visit.

I am so pleased to have discovered this exciting gem of a restaurant right in the centre of all the festival action and can't wait to go back for more.

Especially well-positioned for late night pizza and great music on until the early hours throughout the summer of Edinburgh's festivals.
