#### Playbase put it all online

Leith-based charity, Playbase Training, specialists in early years childcare courses introduce an online learning platform and new free app to help students gain qualifications and help with digital skills.

Chair, Freda O'Byrne, said: "Two years ago we decided that we needed to explain to others what we did in a clearer way. We also knew we needed to respond to the changes in the digital world by improving our own skills and finding ways to help our students improve theirs."

Freda continued: "A report by the Royal Edinburgh Society told us that one in five adults in Scotland do not have basic digital skills. We felt that, if we could help our students improve their digital skills and awareness *at the same time* as they were attending our courses then we would be truly helping them on the path to further education, training or employment, to accessing services, to finding out about jobs, to becoming fully digital citizens."

Since 1999 the charity has provided local training to parents,

carers and those with an interest in working in childcare and recently received Enterprise Ready Funding to embrace digital technology for online learning. The new digital platform will be available to existing students immediately and new students can also apply to study purely online extending the charity's reach beyond Edinburgh. The Playbase 3 Course is newly accredited and offers students a better chance to access further learning opportunities and enter a career in childcare.

Many of the current students have not studied since school, are new to Edinburgh and do not have the confidence or digital skills to enter further education. With the guidance of experienced tutors, the students will be supported in online learning and the website will allow students to access coursework, upload assignments and engage with other students and tutors to improve the learning process.

Development Manager, Maria Sherrington, said: "Courses are open to everyone with an interest in young children. We are excited by the diversity in our classrooms. A typical class of 12 students regularly has as many as nine nationalities. We actively encourage different communities to share their culturally diverse experiences and approaches to parenting and working with young children as part of the learning process. We believe this support can also be provided online as students have the opportunity to engage with others in chat rooms and form an online community. Many people are used to communicating by email or on Facebook so it's just a progression to online learning."

Freda added: "And we asked ourselves how could we be playful at the same time? How could we create something that was helpful to people and might make them use a digital resource more frequently? Something that would help build their confidence around using a smartphone or the web? So just in time for the summer holidays we are piloting an app called 'What will we do today?'; an app that suggests a quality play activity that parents, grandparents and carers could use to explore different activities that would help them to help their children learn through play."

Playbase Training engaged with members of the Creative

Exchange in Leith consisting of Starbit (web developers) Cathy Tingle (copywriter) Designers on the Run (graphic designers) and Ann Robb (marketing consultant) to develop all the elements of the re-launch. The team were briefed to focus on the 'user' designing a brand and website that looks and feels intuitive, uncomplicated and easy to use for people new to the digital world. Designers On the Run, proposed the idea of Froebel Gifts as imagery for the new logo.

Friedrich Froebel (1782 – 1852), the German educationalist, is best known as the originator of the 'kindergarten system' and the Froebel Gifts are educational materials developed for his original Kindergarten. Perhaps the world's most intricately conceived playthings, these materials appear deceptively simple, but represent a sophisticated approach to child development. The Gifts are arguably the first educational toys.

# EIFF 2015: Every Secret Thing (Amy Berg, 2015)

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Amy Berg is known as the uncensored, strong willed documentary filmmaker who's willing to show the world how warped and unaware it truly is. She's made magic in the past, whether that's the exceptional West of Memphis, Deliver Us From Evil or her striking work on the Hollywood child molestation exposé An Open Secret, she is yet to let her audience down. Which leads us to ask, what went wrong with her fictional debut?

It has been almost a decade since two ten year old girls were charged with the kidnapping and murder of a baby in their sleepy, American hometown. Years later, after the pair are released from a young offenders correctional facility, another child has gone missing. With the two now wandering the streets of the town, a detective must decide if cracking the case is as simple as pointing the finger at who is easiest to blame.

It's impossible not to note the comparisons between Every Secret Thing and near enough every high profile child abduction case in UK history. The novel on which the film is based is most likely inspired by the case of James Bulger. Which leads us to think: can we forget this blip in Amy Berg's career, and see her do a documentary series on these absorbing crimes instead?

Nicole Holofcener, the director and writer of the slick, middle aged rom com Enough Said has penned Every Secret Thing's screenplay. A totally incongruous choice perhaps, and one that has unfortunately little pay off. A plethora of static, awkward dialogue litters the film; making it at times a sort of implausible crime story to follow.

The two seemingly 'reformed' criminals are played by Dakota Fanning and Danielle Macdonald, who do a solid job of doing their rather cliched characters justice. Unfortunately, this will ultimately remain a forgettable addition to Fanning's impressive repertoire. Diane Lane tries her best to work with what she's given but seems to cave by the conclusion, delivering some cringe worthy, unconvincing lines.

Amy Berg has done her utmost to make Every Secret Thing as intense and shocking as her documentary work, but a lack of serious tension and a spatter of shaky dialogue leaves the audience indifferent; this is perhaps Berg's biggest disappointment.

### Edinburgh MSP says Malleny 3G pitches will have to be locked

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Gordon MacDonald MSP has written for us about the difficulties facing the new sports pitches recently unveiled in Balerno. A lot of hard work went into providing these pitches for the area, and it seems that their open door policy is now in danger.

I attended the opening of the new 3G pitches at Malleny Park a couple of weeks ago with the Minister for Sport Jamie Hepburn MSP and Councillor Bill Henderson.

These new 3G pitches at Malleny Park, Balerno which are now being used for both football and rugby were funded in part by the Scottish Government's Cashback for Pitches programme that provided £200,000 towards the cost.

The intention was that they would be available for use during school hours for Balerno High School and local primary schools. Currie RFC and Currie Star FC would have the use of the facility at night and weekends with some community access at weekends and during the holidays.







However since their opening there have been a number of incidents that threatens that "open door policy". There have been a number of verbal confrontations between coaches and groups of youths who refuse to leave when they are asked so that training can take place. Parents have also faced verbal abuse from some of the youngsters and there are now allegations of an assault on Friday 12 June resulting in police and paramedics having to attend.

Each morning the 3G pitches are covered in litter and there have been concerns about burn marks from dropped cigarettes. Both Currie RFC and Currie Star FC are having to spend more time making the pitches playable than coaching the youngsters.

The result is that in order to protect this investment for the community, it is actively being considered that the gates should be locked at all times and only those booked to play will gain access. The fence will also be altered, at considerable expense, to prevent access by climbing over. It

is unfortunate that the actions of a minority are spoiling the opportunity that the wider community should be enjoying.

More school leavers than ever in Edinburgh are moving into work, education, or training, thanks to the strong partnership that has developed between the public and private sectors through the <u>Edinburgh Guarantee</u>.

[tweet\_box design="default"]Figures published by the Scottish Government show that the success rate of school leavers in Edinburgh achieving and sustaining a positive destination are at the highest rate ever.[/tweet\_box]

The figure is up 10 per cent since the Edinburgh Guarantee began four years ago and is now at 93.1 per cent. The Capital is now the best performing city in Scotland and is 12th out of all local authority areas, which puts us well above the national average.

The statistics show that more school leavers in Edinburgh are getting into jobs compared to September 2013 with over one in four of school leavers in employment at the snapshot taken in March. Just over 40% are getting into and sustaining places in Higher Education while over a quarter of school leavers opt for Further Education.

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The Royal High School Preservation Trust (RHSPT) is to host the first public exhibition of its plans to move St Mary's Music School into the iconic Thomas Hamilton buildings on Carlton Hill.

The exhibition, which takes place at Canongate Kirk on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> June, will set out how the RHSPT will fund the conservation of the former Royal High School and how it will adapt the buildings to give the music school the greater performance and teaching space it desperately needs to fulfill its ambitions as an internationally recognised centre for young musical talent.

The exhibition will also stray from the conventional format for such consultation events, by including performances from students at the music school.

William Gray Muir, Chairman of the RHSPT said:

"Backed by philanthropic funds, we are in a unique position to bring new life to the Old Royal High School by restoring it to its original purpose. We want to see St Mary's Music School move to the site where it can enjoy a new, inspiring and internationally prestigious home. With the extra space it needs to expand and which the High School could provide, it can also open its doors to greater numbers of talented Scottish children.

"What makes the project particularly exciting is the chance to create three significant new performance spaces of unrivalled character within the city. This will bring together the schools exceptional pupils, musicians of international standing and an audience drawn from the citizens of Edinburgh and beyond."

He added:

"I would encourage local residents to come to the exhibition on 18<sup>th</sup> June. Students from the music school will be performing in the impressive surroundings of Canongate Kirk and we will have a number of people available to discuss the history of both schools and the opportunities our plans present."

Ken Taylor, Headteacher for St Mary's Music School, added:

"This is an incredibly exciting prospect for the School. We have been growing steadily to the point where we are bursting at the seams and need to increase our performance and teaching space. The opportunity to move into the former Royal High School Buildings not only allows us to fulfill our ambitions to expand, but will also serve to give Scotland's only independent music school a greater and more prestigious international standing."

The RHSPT Public Exhibition takes place on Thursday 18<sup>th</sup> June, between 5pm and 8pm, at the Canongate Kirk, 153 Canongate, Edinburgh, Midlothian EH8 8BN.

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As the 2015 Royal Highland Show gets underway, Edinburgh Airport is calling on passengers planning on flying this weekend to be prepared and allow extra time to get to the airport.

With the busy summer schedule now underway and almost 160,000 passengers expected to travel through over the next four days, Edinburgh Airport is working closely with Show partners to ensure airport operations continue unaffected.

Around 180,000 people are expected to visit the showground between today until Sunday, meaning roads around the airport will be much busier than usual. Traffic management is already underway with signage up to guide show-goers safely to the Royal Highland Centre.

Adding to potential travel disruption are ongoing roadworks at the Gogar roundabout. In addition to this, railway works on the Winchburgh Tunnel could mean more people choose to drive to the Show. Those travelling to the airport over the next four days are advised to check local travel bulletins before leaving and allow extra time.

For those travelling from the city centre, the airport is encouraging the use of the tram and for those coming from the west, the Citylink Air service runs every 30 minutes between Buchannan Street in Glasgow and Edinburgh Airport.

David Wilson, Chief Operating Officer at Edinburgh Airport, said: "The Royal Highland Show is always a hugely popular event and we work closely with organisers, RHASS and external partners to ensure the event and our airport operations continue as normal.

"With an event of this size, roads around the airport will be busier and this will have an impact on travel time to and from the airport. We're asking passengers to be prepared for a longer journey and allow extra time to travel.

"It's important that we maintain safe operations at the airport and we'll be in regular contact with Police Scotland and colleagues at the Royal Highland Centre throughout the event. We'll also be posting frequent updates on Twitter using
#RHStravel."

Being prepared for security is also important to remember. All passengers flying should ensure liquids, gels and pastes are 100ml or less and presented in a clear plastic re-sealable bag. ### EIFF 2015: The Legend of Barney Thomson (Robert Carlyle, 2015)

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With an illustrious screen acting career that has spanned the best part of 25 years, it's bizarre to think that it has taken until now for Robert Carlyle to grab the reins of a film as the director. His first film since his last Edinburgh appearance with California Solo, there's something brilliantly personal and devoted about The Legend of Barney Thomson – a Glasgow-set dark dramedy in which Carlyle comes into his own both in front of and behind the lens.

Another day in the east end of Glasgow. A barber arrives at work with clients reluctant to see him. After years in the business, this has become all that he has. Uninspired and aggravated by day-to-day life, he finds himself fired and, by accident, with a pair of scissors through the chest of the man who delivered the bad news. A brutal, unfortunate accident? Yes. Call the police? Absolutely not. With a potential motive behind his accidental actions, the man must cover up his tracks and avoid being embroiled in a serial killing mystery that's overcoming the city.

The film takes place in an indeterminable time period in Glasgow. Fuzzy, analogue radios blare Kasabian's latest. Dating ads in browning newspapers reference Brad and Angelina. There's a sort of comely, dateless feel to Carlyle's otherwise dark Scotland. Brilliantly accomplished, there are signs of a fresh director toying with cinematic techniques and relishing in the outcome; a piece of work he must be undeniably proud of.

His directorial work goes hand in hand with the lead role he has taken on. A barber with a nervous disposition, Carlyle's performance remains as controlled as his directorial hand; suitably cautious and flat out erratic when it's called for. Once we bypass the ropey opening monologue, we find ourselves suitably in the head of Barney Thomson; by turns hopeless and obscure.

Carlyle has squeezed in a shining, supporting cast from across the country. Martin Compston, the Scot actor known best for Sweet Sixteen gives it his all; even if he's not given a whole lot to work with. Ray Winstone plays the detective assigned to the case to solve the unraveling murders. He does so with a tough as nails, ballsy attitude. It's nothing new to him, of course, but he's doing a fine job, overcoming the one or two incongruous sexist jokes delivered by his character. They're some of very few gags that don't quite gel with the otherwise slick, Scottish humour.

There's no way of discussing the film without highlighting the bloody genius work of Emma Thompson. The actress known better for her sharp witted, well-to-do characters embodies Barney's foulmouthed trainwreck of a mother pretty much impeccably. Adorned in faux fur and decorating her faced with lurid pink lipstick, we first meet her at the dog tracks; betting her money away and spending her winnings on a fish supper. As she shovels the contents of the paper packet into her mouth, it's difficult to see the original woman underneath. Her brilliant sense of humour pokes through her crooked, smoke-stained teeth; paired with a flash of near enough every Scottish person's grandmother that makes her an absolute delight to watch. It may sound hard to believe, but looking back upon this illustrious actress' career, this oddball piece of work may just be considered a worthy highlight.

When it delves into sordid subject matter, the film becomes a mix of dark comedy and family drama. There are moments of genuine sadness that can be seen beneath the running gags; but poor taste never manages to be the defining factor. Instead, it balances its topsy-turvy tone to the end, avoiding depressing, emotional gravitas.

It may be a film about a deeply depressed, unintentionally murderous hairdresser, but its hard to disagree with the fact that this feels like the cinematic calling card Glasgow has been hoping for. Brimming with black comedy and featuring an excellent, oddball performance from Emma Thompson, this is one of the strongest Edinburgh openers we've seen in years.

# Police ask for help in tracing two girls

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Police Scotland are appealing for the public's help in tracing two girls who went missing from Glasgow yesterday.

They are continuing their enquiries and appealing for the assistance of the public in an effort to find the girls aged 14 and 16 years, who went missing from Springburn Park at around 1600 hours yesterday.

Lilly McLaughlin-Clear, aged 14 years, is from Castle Douglas, but is currently staying at a unit at Stobhill Hospital. She is described as white, slim build, 5ft 4" in height with shoulder-length brown curly hair. She was wearing a blue hooded top, black leggings and silver trainers.

Nicole Crossley, aged 16 years, is from Gartcosh but is also currently staying at a unit at Stobhill Hospital. She is described as white, medium build, 5ft 4" in height with long auburn hair. She was wearing a blue hooded top and blue jeans.

Inspector Craig Walker from Maryhill Police Office said today:

"The girls were out in Springburn Park when they made off from staff around 4pm. Both are known to visit Sprinburn and Glasgow city centre and enquiries are ongoing in those areas to try and trace both girls.

"Officers have been able to establish that the girls stayed at a youth hostel in Edinburgh city centre last night and then withdrew money from a cash machine in Princes Street at 1000 hours today.

"We are continuing to work with our colleagues in Edinburgh to see if they are still in the area however it is also possible that they have travelled elsewhere and so I would urge everyone to keep an eye out and let us know immediately if they think they may have seen Lilly or Nicole.

"I would urge anyone who has any information on their whereabouts to contact Police Scotland on 101."

## EIFF 2015: Fidelio, l'odyssée d'Alice (Lucie Borleteau, 2014)

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Every single shot of Fidelio, l'odyssée d'Alice seems to be bathed in the inky blue waters that surround it. A film set almost entirely at sea in a grinding mechanical ship that provides the vast majority of the soundscape, you would be surprised at just how gentle and fluid this supposed love story really is. Alice lives a life incongruous to what her family may have expected. She makes a living working aboard a merchant navy freighter as an engineer to the gigantic vessel. With her lover left at home, Alice embarks on a fluid relationship while aboard with the opposite sex that seems to entice more people than it revolts.

Ariane Labed assumes the role of the titular character, carrying a somewhat heavy, emphatic story on her more than capable shoulders. For the vast majority of the films run time, she is the only woman present; counteracted by a collection of men each pleasant, tough or downright sordid. As a character, Alice takes on each of these characteristics.

What's most refreshing about Borleteau's characters is that there is a significant lack of hierarchy between them. Roles within the ship? Yes, but when it comes to conversations between them there's a friendship or resentment that comes down to their personality traits rather than their positions. This could have easily became a film at which a woman falls to her knees at the sight of an unattainable man of power whom she desires, but it manages to be somewhat smarter. If it's possible, Fidelio is a film about sexual liberation rather than promiscuity; the rights we have to use our body as we so choose and to be nobody's property but our own.

It does almost drag a little, pointing its toes towards a conclusion then retracting them for the last twenty minutes. The interim is strong though, making this slight delay a lot less aggravating.

### EIFF 2015: The Closer We Get (Karen Guthrie, 2015)

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Isn't it peculiar that in 2015 we can still be overcome by the complexity of family? Something that everyone has been a part of but, through the aimless guidance that life provides, can twist into something that shapes the way we live and feel. Documentary filmmakers are often blessed with uncensored access into some of the most protected, rarely discussed places in the world, but Karen Guthrie has not had to travel far to find her subject. Her latest work made her delve deeper into the emotions and peculiar events that involve those closest to her.

Filmmaker Karen Guthrie finds herself and her family caring for the woman who used to care for her . Looking back upon the timeline of the life her mother and father spent together, she picks up on the bizarre events that drew the two apart and brought them back together again.

Guthrie's undeniable blatancy when it comes to the story of her family's past is perhaps the films most refreshing feature. The lyricism of their story stems from genuine experience rather than applied imagination. It's undoubtedly a strange one, involving affairs and offspring that cross continents. She looks closely at the woman left behind following the couple's divorce, both fifteen years ago when it first occurred, and now, as her mother lives near bed bound following a stroke that debilitated her health.

Her mother's sharp tongued, sassy attitude remains beneath the fading facade, as we compare it with Guthrie's previous work and home videos that show her with much more liveliness. Most of her comments are directed towards Ian, her ex husband who in the wake of her illness, moved back into the family home and began to care for her. He's almost the hero and antihero of the family story here; although the focus lies mostly on his dissatisfaction from the acts of his children. It's almost like a sort of family pilgrimage; as they simultaneously travel back to the town they hail from to care for their mother.

The camerawork and use of yellowing, archive footage make this family tale a gorgeous one to witness. Her words and captured moments so profoundly emotional you feel as though you've known them for years. Almost effortlessly, Karen Guthrie has painted a family portrait with such deft intimacy that its impossible to focus your vision elsewhere.

### EIFF 2015: The Stanford Prison Experiment (Kyle Patrick Alvarez, 2015)

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It is said that the best thrillers do more than leave your heart in your throat. They provoke strong reactions and ask questions that rarely have answers. The power of The Stanford Prison Experiment, the latest work by Kyle Patrick Alvarez, is that it messes with moral implications; questioning the line that can be drawn through science and the point at which it is acceptable to cross it.

In an effort to test the limits of the position of power, a Stanford psychology professor creates a study comprised of a makeshift prison, assigning the roles of prisoners and guards to students putting themselves forward as subjects. As the experiment goes on and the subjects assume their roles a little too deeply, the lines blur between the study and the justifiable actions of those in charge.

At the helm of an impressive young ensemble are two actors delivering some career defining work. Michael Anganaro plays Christopher Archer, who assumes the role of a prison guard with relentless conviction. He's at the head of most of the brutality in the prison environment; relishing in his own power. The majority of it is directed towards Daniel, known as Prisoner '8612', who acts as a ringleader for organised anarchy in the situation. Overcome by breathless psychosis, he's played impeccably by Ezra Miller, an actor finally getting the profound, emotional scope he deserves.

When we veer from the confines of the makeshift prison, we find ourselves in the position of the experiment's leaders. Professor Philip Zimbardo loses himself in the experiment's uncontrollable power and affecting nature. He too sees them as the wrongdoers they are meant to only represent. When this meets the egotistical attitudes of the assigned prison guards, near insanity ensues.

It seldom lets your stomach settle, pinning you against a wall and forcing you into compliance in sync with the prisoners. It's only when the prisoners themselves are not present that the film goes awry. Overdramatised conversations about the prisoner's fate and boundaries are accompanied by soaring stereotypical scores. They're only dotted throughout, but with these cut and the film fifteen minutes shorter, we would have a masterclass in the American thriller on our hands.

But we can forgive this mishap for the near perfection that surrounds it. An antagonising vision of strained ethical boundaries, The Stanford Prison Experiment holds the audience in a dumbfounded grip. Treacherous, profound; you will not forget this anytime soon.

It's very rare to go to a restaurant these days and not feel there was something that could have been better, perhaps because we all eat out much more these days, and watch too many cookery shows... They say 'At the Sun Inn you'll get the warmest of welcomes, friendly service and an atmosphere with real character' and its true! Our food was absolutely faultless and so tasty, the service professional but friendly and the atmosphere first class. Best of all the food is great quality and so reasonable, especially compared with many city centre restaurants. Safe to say we loved it!

The Sun Inn is a beautiful old coaching inn that lies close to the banks of the River Esk in five acres of beautiful wooded grounds is just outside Edinburgh near Dalkeith, and just below a railway bridge arch. It is owned by the same people who have the Potting Shed in town. The Sun Inn is a real family business. Head Chef Ian Minto, is an award-winning cook with a passion for quality and fresh produce. Craig, his son, is the expert 'nose' behind the Inn's exceptional and very reasonable wine list. While mother and daughter-in-law, Bernadette and Jay, bring their inspiration to the décor and front of house arrangements.

We went on a Saturday evening for dinner and were surprised by how busy it already was by 7pm. It's a lovely country pub with a big restaurant area, open fires, outdoor beer garden and bar. The atmosphere was very friendly and the pub is clearly a favourite with the locals and those in the know! Everyone was chatting away between tables and the staff were so friendly. We were greater by the manager, who took us to our table and explained the menu.

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They have a big menu with something to please everyone from fish and chips and other pub classics through to Oysters and borders lamb cutlets, all locally sourced. They also have many options for gluten free and other allergies with the chefs very happy to create for you. The specials menu also included a number of dishes (see the pictures attached!) and some great offers too including an Early bird with 3 courses for just £14 and on the first Wednesday of every month a three course meal with a glass of prosecco just £25 – definitely a good plan for the next ladies night out!

So what did we eat you ask?!

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Duck tasting plate

The boy fancied the Moules Marinere (Mussels in white wine and cream sauce) and I went for the Duck Plate which was pressed duck leg, duck liver pate, smoked duck breast and quince jelly, both priced at £7 or £13 for the mussels as a main. I have to say that the mussels were amazing and according to my dining partner the best he has ever had, embarrassingly I had to restrain him from drinking all the juice from the pan! The duck was equally good with the different textures and flavours working well together.

Personally I thought my main course was the star of the show 'Pan seared Monkfish, wrapped in pancetta with clams, chorizo and broad bean salad' one of the more expensive meals priced at f17 however there are many options ranging up from just f10 a main course up to a huge rib eye steak with hand cut chips and peppercorn sauce at f22. The fish was cooked well, the meaty flavour of the chorizo complemented it perfectly and I even liked the broad beans. My dining partner opted for the Border's Lamb Cutlets with braised hogget, dauphinoise potatoes, feta and asparagus (f17) which disappeared impressively speedily too. By this point we were both stuffed and probably should have shared a pudding as the portions are very generous portions, however we are both fatties and didn't. Seared Monkfish with Chorizo

The Sun Inn have a good old dessert selection too and also do a soufflé of the day for all you soufflé fiends. On the day we went the soufflé was raspberry and served with a white chocolate ice cream (£7) – it was a huge fluffy delight, as was my Vanilla Crème Brulee (£5) which was served in a big flat dish more like a crema catalana which means you get more burnt sugar crunch!

As you may have guessed we loved our trip out to the Sun Inn and are already planning to head back for their Sunday roast after a walk around the beautiful Dalkeith Country Park.

"When we sold 12,500 season tickets last season, we were absolutely thrilled. To have sold 13,000, so far, this season…well, what can I say? We made extra seats available to allow for the possibility of extra demand and the supporters, as ever, are backing us all the way.

"There are still seats left, of course, but they are going quickly. The best seats remaining now are for our hospitality reserved areas and I have absolutely no doubt that they will go equally quickly, now that the hospitality season packages have been announced.

"I really cannot thank our supporters enough for their loyalty; but I also want to reassure them. I know they are all desperate to hear about new signings for next season but I urge them to be patient. I assure you we are all working really hard to negotiate a number of new contracts, some of which are very complex.

"We are totally focused on bringing in the calibre of player that Craig and Robbie believe we need to ensure our continued success on the field. Our supporters deserve the best we can afford and we are doing everything in our power to deliver on that."

## Car sharing might help commuters bypass rail disruption

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With regard to the 44-day disruptions hitting the Edinburgh-Glasgow rail line due to maintenance work the UK's largest car sharing site Liftshare.com might be able to help.

They have been in touch to tell us how it works:

Liftshare has 430,000+ members, and enables drivers to offer a lift to anywhere in the UK to whoever needs transport. All it costs is a split of the petrol money, so it's the same as giving your friend a fiver to cover a lift from Edinburgh to a gig at the SECC – for example. We find that whenever rail ticket prices rise or train strikes occur, we get many new members who are fed up of being let down by trains.

Car sharing is also far cheaper than rail, so it is a great alternative to trains during these strikes between Edinburgh and Glasgow. For example, a single ticket from Edinburgh to Glasgow costs commuters £12.50 on The Trainline.com, while the same trip is offered on Liftshare for as low as £4.70. You can also try out our Offer a Lift tool to see just how much you could save by car sharing. I invite you to give it a quick try at <u>https://liftshare.com/uk/offer</u>

The Liftshare community is currently offering 101 lifts to Glasgow and 45 to Edinburgh, and we also just struck an official partnership with the Festival Fringe to encourage cheaper travel to the capital this August while getting more people travelling together to reduce the amount of cars on the city's roads. This should go some way to reducing CO2 pollution and gridlock around the event.

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New buses were shown off at the airport yesterday which will now take passengers between Waverley Bridge and Edinburgh Airport on the 100 route.

Holiday-makers flying via Edinburgh Airport will be able to benefit from a new fleet of buses that are being put into service in time for the busy summer season.

The 12 new Airlink vehicles which will be in service from 1 July have been designed to compliment the modern feel of the tram service and with reduced maintenance costs will lower air quality emissions. In addition to Edinburgh Airport's significant expansion, The Queensferry Crossing is set to open next year and the new Edinburgh Gateway station, which will link passengers from the Fife line and North East Scotland to the airport, scheduled for completion in 2016.

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## Edinburgh International Book Festival 2015: Around the World – with Two Goats

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'What unites us', says Janet Smyth, 'is our stories.'

Janet, Edinburgh International Book Festival Children and Education Programme Director, is speaking at the launch of the 2015 programme, and what a programme it is. As ever there are famous names a plenty – from Paul Merton to Celia Imrie, Ian Rankin, Rev Richard Coles and Mark Rylance – but this year the festival's main theme is 'Around the World' – Scotland as an outward-looking nation. The work of authors and poets from as far afield as **Iceland** and **Nigeria** will feature alongside those of different cultures within Scotland itself; the festival will aim to create an environment that welcomes speakers of each and every one of the **140 languages** we can now hear without leaving the country. The art of translation will also be considered; in the **Talking Translation** thread, acclaimed translator **Daniel Hahn** will chair sessions on writers as diverse as **Georges Simenon, Christine De Luca, Elif Shafak** and **Juana Adcock**.



As we look out, so we need to look in: **mental health**, or **Staying Well**, is another of this year's EIBF themes, and a very topical one too. In what promises to be a fascinating


hour, **Professor Andrew Scull** looks at the historical clashes between **Reason and Unreason**, reflecting on the ways in which different times and places have responded to 'madness'. Just what does that term mean? And why do some societies see it as a challenge? Other sessions look at **psychosomatic illness**, **teenage stress** and **dementia**, whilst several writers – including **Matt Haig**, John Burnside, Paul Merton and Debi Gliori – talk about their own experiences of mental illness.



REASONS TO STAY ALIVE Matt Haig



Sometimes we just want to escape from all of life's many woes and enjoy a good revel in other people's (fictional) misfortunes; crime writing, from the cosy to the very *noir* indeed, is as popular as ever, and the 2015 festival offers at least twenty versions of it – so whether you prefer toughcops-with-issues or salt-of-the-earth detectives with cups of tea, there's plenty here for you. Sticking to its international promise, the programme includes thrillers set in Scandinavia, the Netherlands, Portugal, Italy, China, and that most impenetrable of all places – Aberdeen.



From Liz Lochhead to Beowulf, poetry is alive and well in the EIBF programme. From poets in translation to poets in the kitchen (Sean Borodale wrote Human Work: A Poet's Cookbook 'live' among the pots and pans), Charlotte Square will be alive with sound of verse, whilst children can learn how to be a rhyming word wizard with Elli Woodward (Woozy the Wizard: A Broom to Go Zoom) and dance and sing along with Steve Smallman's 'bonkers rhyming story' Hippobottymus.





I used to think I was pretty good at reading to my children until one of their friends told me only her Mummy could do a proper Anne Shirley, and one of my own explained that she'd really rather read Harry Potter to herself, despite my excellent rendition of Professor Umbridge... The authors coming to the **Baillie Gifford Children's Programme** will, I am sure, do a much better job; they include Nick Sharratt, Cressida Cowell, Frank Cottrell Boyce, Jacqueline Wilson and the inestimably wonderful Patrick Ness; Patrick delivered a cracking Siobhan Dowd Memorial Lecture last year - in 2015 Matt Haig will take up the baton in what promises to be an equally inspiring session. Again the festival's Around the World theme is highlighted, with writers from Finland to France, Australia and Poland. Meanwhile, for those fed up with sitting still, willow artist David Powell invites everyone to help him make a sculpture from Alice in Wonderland, and Gorgie City Farm introduces Moonlight and Shadow. No they're not aristocratic racehorses - they're pigmy goats, and just as entitled to their dreams as you are.








Of course there's lots, lots more going on at this year's EIBF. Art, music, nature, history, science, biography, politics (yes, Alex Salmond and Gordon Brown are both here, though, perhaps sensibly, not in the same tent... plus Lesley Riddoch, Polly Toynbee, Alan Johnson, James Naughtie and Nicola Sturgeon herself – though don't start hassling the poor woman, she's here to talk crime with Val McDermid, not EU quotas with you lot).

(though the less high profile events are very worthy of your attention too; one of my favourite sessions last year was <u>Books That Win</u>, a fascinating discussion about the value – or otherwise – of awards for YA fiction, and one of the reasons I liked it so much was that the speakers – **William Sutcliffe, Theresa Breslin** and **Moira Young** – had such interesting ideas). The full programme is available online and the paper version is widely available throughout the city in libraries, bookshops and many other venues.

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And just because I want to, here is my personal **Top Five** from this year's programme – see you in Charlotte Square, and let's hope it's sunny:




Jesse Jackson: A Formidable Activist. The Reverend Jesse worked for Martin Luther King in the 1960s, and in his later career specialised in high-profile international diplomacy, negotiating with Fidel Castro, Saddam Hussein and Slobodan Milosevic. # Grassmarket Furniture - Furnit

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'I need three things to make this work' says **Tommy Steel**, 'pews, guys and commissions'.

Tommy is the manager of **Grassmarket Furniture**, one of the social enterprises within the **Grassmarket Community Project**. He's too modest to mention the fourth essential ingredient: Tommy himself, who runs the workshop with exceptional skill, enthusiasm and commitment. Grassmarket Furniture doesn't just transform old wood; it transforms lives.



Today the Grassmarket Community Project is a thriving centre, housing not only the woodwork shop but also a state-of-the-art conference hall, cafe and tartan textiles group. The Project runs all sorts of classes and groups for its members — from **cookery** to **art, IT, photography** and **sewing**. Although GCP works primarily with vulnerable adults — people with extra support needs or health issues, ex-offenders, the homeless — anyone can join, and can then sign up for classes. The GCP has come a long way from its origins as a soup kitchen; only a few years ago the old building was run down and poorly maintained, offering those in need a meal but not much else. Today the building is full of light, life and hope — there's masses going on, people are in and out all day; there is a real sense of joy about the place. Tommy tells me how this came about.









Originally a joiner, Tommy decided he fancied a career change

and moved into the care sector. He loved the work, moved up the ladder and became involved with the Edinburgh Cyrenians. Meanwhile, the Rector of **Greyfriars Kirk** (to whom the building belongs) was hatching a little plan; the pews were being removed from his and many other churches - people wanted to make the buildings multi-purpose, to install seating that could be moved around - what if a project could be set up to recycle those pews into new furniture? And even better, what if that project could be of benefit to GCP's members? The Rector didn't have to look far to find the perfect man for the job; Tommy's been running it ever since, and says its the best job he's ever had. He started Grassmarket Furniture in a portakabin in the Greyfriars Kirkyard, asking members from the art class that GCP was by then running if they fancied trying a bit of woodwork. The sessions grew and grew, and in the meantime funding was found to redevelop the old Kirkhouse; **Gareth Hoskins Architects** designed the award-winning building you see today, slotting this stunning contemporary structure into the tight space available.

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The atrium and hall are double-height, and on the upper floor smaller rooms, including the wood shop, are set around the hall, which had to be suitable not only for GCP events but as a high quality letting venue to provide an income stream to the project. Grassmarket Furniture now inhabits a very smart workshop, kept in shipshape condition by Tommy and his team.









On Fridays, Tommy runs a 'beginners' group' for people who've not worked with wood before. Many people have been referred to him by other agencies, but some simply get in touch; anyone who shows commitment is welcomed. By the end of just one day, each person will have made something – a clock, a pen, a tealight holder; it's so important, says Tommy, to let them see they can achieve something, to be able to say 'Well done' to people who've never heard that before. Today a new member is just finishing his piece. 'What kind of wood is that?' asks Tommy 'Douglas fir' comes the quick reply – this from someone who's been in the workshop less than six hours; Tommy keeps them on their toes.





Once members are a little more confident, they can move on to the Tuesday and Thursday sessions; soon they are making tables, chairs and all manner of beautiful pieces, and also mentoring new beginners on Fridays - another confidenceboosting exercise. Tommy also teaches poker-work or pyrography - the art of decorating wood with burn marks - and if that sounds simple, just wait till you see some of the results. At present the group is making the awards for the Edinburgh International Film Festival, to be presented at the Filmhouse on 26th June (a ceremony that the whole group will attend); yes, the trophies that may be taken home by some of the most famous filmmakers in the world are being created right here at GCP, and having seen them I can tell you they will be cherished. There's also a small exhibition of GCP members' pyrographic art work at the Filmhouse throughout the Film Festival.









Sometimes even Tommy is surprised by people's talents; one girl who'd been sleeping on the streets produced a stunning picture, freehand, on her first day at the project – she's now running her own furniture business, exporting her work to California and Israel, and has just had her first mortgage approved. Another member who had not worked for years and could hardly speak for shyness now has a full-time job and has just been promoted.

Tommy works hard to create a 'normal' atmosphere, one that makes people want to come in to work – there's lots of banter, but no swearing or bad behaviour, and people are expected to turn up on time and do a good day's labour. He expects the trainees to take the standards of the workshop out into their everyday lives; he shows them respect, and by goodness do they respect him. The structure and order of the workshop give members something they may never have experienced before; a reason to get up in the morning and, as Tommy says, 'to start enjoying life'. Members play an important part in team meetings too — there is no 'them and us' at GCP, and the whole group has been to tea at **Holyrood House** and, at the invitation of **Baron Wilson of Tillyorn**, visited the **Palace of Westminster**.

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Tommy is a not only a genius at sourcing pews, which he travels up and down the country to collect; he's also brilliant at selling the very same wood back to the people who gave it to him. Many congregations are only too pleased to commission Grassmarket Furniture to make pieces from the pews – beautiful lecterns and altar tables for the churches themselves, and personal items for individuals. The circular seats around the trees in the Grassmarket were made here, as were the display cabinets in Greyfriars' Kirk. There's never any shortage of work – in fact, there's a waiting list.

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When the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland was refurbished, Tommy was in there rescuing the balustrades they've now been made into limited edition Assembly Lamps, each one coming with a certificate of authentication and the history of the members who worked on it. All 55 have been snapped up, many by past Moderators; at £100 each it's what Tommy calls 'a good bit of business'. And business is important to Tommy, because Grassmarket Furniture is totally **self-funding**, and he likes it that way. Not being dependent on short-term grants, he can decide how long each members stays with the group - some may need three months, others six months, some three years or more, but Tommy keeps them for as long as it takes. His goal is to build up people's skills and their self-confidence, to help them move out into the world, 'I take each one on a journey, and I decide when he or she is ready to move on'.







The wood workshop even contributes to other GCP projects; there are seven herb beds out in the beautifully kept kirkyard, the produce from which is used to make lip balms and soaps in herbal crafts classes every Wednesday. Sawdust from the woodwork is used in compost for the herb beds (it can't be used for pet bedding as it may contain other debris); everything is recycled. The kirkyard is of course worth a visit in itself; JK Rowling is said to have found inspiration for her characters' names among the headstones of the departed, and Harry Potter tours pass through daily, especially as they can also get a good look at the alleged model for Hogwarts, George Heriot's School.





Back in the Centre, the cafe is serving up coffees, cakes and delicious healthy meals (all made on site by a team of professionals and GCP members). Tartan versions of **Greyfriars Bobby** are on sale, although most of the tartan is used for commissions, with the group's work travelling as far as the USA and Shanghai. The recent **Greyfriars Tartan Design Competition** attracted entries from across the world. Tommy, of course, has his own Greyfriars tartan kilt and waistcoat, though I don't think he wears them to sand down the pews.

It's almost 4pm now and the woodworkers are getting ready to go home. When everything's been tidied up, Tommy says goodnight to each one of the group individually, asking them about their plans for the weekend, telling them he'll see them next week; for him that's what it's about, treating people with respect. Most of us enjoy that privilege every day; some GCP members have never experienced it before in their lives.

The average cost of keeping someone in care is, says Tommy, £24,500 per annum, and most will stay dependent on some sort of care all their lives, a total cost of at least £1.25 million per person. Tommy is saving that money with each person whose life he turns around, but for him it's not about the money;

'We don't choose the families we are born into. These are

people who have been abused, who end up lost in the world. I'll work with them for as long as it takes to give them independence and a reason to get up in the morning. I love my job.'

With Edina Hibs based in Edinburgh, the Community Club will also have a base at HTC for East Lothian players who wish to play in Hibernian colours. All teams will benefit from the expertise of Hibernian coaches.

Eddie Lamb, Chairman of Edina Hibs, said: "We are delighted at this merger with Hibernian, a major Scottish Club with whom Edina has enjoyed a life-long association. Our youngsters will now gain from input from one of the very best community and youth coaching set-ups in the country.
