"The incident was reported to police today (Monday, March 9) at around 3.40am. A police cordon is still in place around the address, however the road has now reopened.

"The death is still being treated as unexplained and enquiries are ongoing at this time."

It is thought that 730 flags were raised this morning by 53 Commonwealth countries. In Edinburgh, the flag-raising was also be an opportunity for the City of Edinburgh Council to celebrate the start of Legacy Week which runs till the end of the week.

At 10 o'clock this morning the Lord Lieutenant of the City of Edinburgh who is the Queen's representative in the city raised the Commonwealth Flag above the City Chambers. The Rt Hon Donald Wilson who is also the Lord Provost was ably assisted by children from the Royal Mile Primary School.

He first of all read out the message from Her Majesty the Queen before processing outside with the children. Then after a photo call he went up on to the balcony above the archway into the quadrangle to raise the flag in the breeze. It was not the best of weather but the short ceremony drew a small crowd of onlookers.

Almost eight months since thousands of people took to the streets of Edinburgh to cheer on the <u>Queen's Baton Relay</u>, Scotland is reflecting on the excitement and impact of the Commonwealth Games during <u>Legacy Week</u> (9-15 March).

French national assaulted and robbed in New Town

Police are appealing for witnesses following the assault and robbery of a 24 year old man in Edinburgh's New Town

The victim, a French national, had arrived in Edinburgh from France on Saturday evening and was walking from the City Centre to the New Town to find accommodation for his stay.

At around 8pm, as he approached the corner of Broughton Market and Dublin Street, he was grabbed from behind by two suspects who presented a knife and demanded he hand over money. They took his laptop, mobile phone and wallet and made off in the direction of Broughton Market.

The first suspect is described as white, late 30s, 5ft 9in tall, broad build, dark brown hair, clean-shaven, Scottish accent and wearing a zipped up hooded top.

The second suspect is described as white, late 30s, 5ft 9in tall, slim build, slight beard, and wearing a black cap or woolly hat, blue jeans and a black cotton coat with two diagonally angled pockets at the lower front of the jacket.

Detective Constable Iain Wallace said: "The victim had only just arrived in the city when he was assaulted and robbed, although thankfully he wasn't injured. We are appealing for anyone who was in the area of Broughton Market or Dublin Street at around 8pm on Saturday evening to get in touch with police. We know that a car drove past at the time of the incident as it caused the two males to run off."

Witness appeal following assault and robbery in Lochend



Police are appealing for witnesses following an assault and robbery which happened in the Lochend area of Edinburgh, in the early hours of Sunday morning.

The incident happened around 4am, when the 43 year old victim was walking on Lochend Road near to Burns Street. He was approached by a group of around six males, and without provocation was punched to the face by one of these youths.

When the victim fell to the ground he was assaulted by others in the group and his satchel was taken from him. The suspects then made off in a north direction on Lochend Road.

The first suspect, who initially punched the victim, is described as white, aged 17 to 18 years old, 5ft 2in tall, stocky build, short dark hair, and wearing a white coloured

zip up track suit top and jeans.

The other suspects are described as white and aged between 17 and 18 years old.

Detective Constable Alison Wyllie said: "The victim was taken to hospital to be treated for his injuries during an assault which was completely unprovoked. We are looking to trace this group of males who were in the Lochend Road area at around 4am on Sunday morning. Anyone who heard or saw anything suspicious is urged to contact Police Scotland on 101 or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

Witness appeal following serious assault in Cowgate

Police are appealing for witnesses after a man was seriously assaulted in the Cowgate in the early hours of Sunday morning.

The incident happened around 2.30am when a 33 year old man was walking on the Cowgate at the junction with Candlemaker Row. He was struck from behind and then assaulted by a group of between six to twelve men. The victim received a fractured arm and facial injuries and was conveyed to Edinburgh Royal Infirmary to be treated.

A number of witnesses have identified this group of men as being in their late 20's, most of whom were wearing tweed jackets or suits, shirts, ties and brogues. They then headed up Victoria Street, where they were lost to sight.

Detective Sergeant Neil Spowart said: "This appears to have

been an unprovoked assault which left the victim needing hospital treatment. We are appealing for anyone who was in the area of the Cowgate around 2.30am on Sunday morning, and who saw this altercation take place. The group of suspects have been described as wearing distinctive tweed jackets, and so we hope this description will assist in jogging people's memories, particularly if they have information on which pub or bar they were in beforehand."

Lewis Stevenson's verdict on Hibs' Scottish Cup form

Hibs' longest serving player Lewis Stevenson admits he was dreading the start of this season after last year's relegation nightmare, but things are looking up for the Easter Road side who currently sit in second place in the Championship with a cup semi-final against Falkirk to look forward to.

Stevenson, who has been at Hibs for ten years is no stranger to the National Stadium, both as a winner in the CIS Cup Final in 2007 as well as recent semi-finals against Aberdeen and Falkirk, but also on the losing side against Hearts, Celtic and Dunfermline.

Yesterday the 'veteran' left back was rightly named man of the match after scoring one goal and making two in the quarter final against Berwick Rangers.

Speaking afterwards, the modest Fifer said: "We got so low last season and I almost came into this one worried and dreading it, but the manager has lifted the place and I've probably enjoyed this season more than any other."

"It is crazy that a club such as Hibs has not won it for so long, but I would love to be part of the team that actually does win it. It would be nice not to hear about it at the start of the first round every time we play in the Scottish Cup.

"The gaffer is still making us focus on the league, but the further you get in the cup, it is hard to take your mind off it. It is a horrible feeling to lose a final when you have put so much effort in. I have played in two. In 2007, we also lost to Dunfermline in a semi-final replay and that was a hard one to take. After winning the League Cup, I think we were expected to put up a fight in the Scottish.

"I would love to be part of a successful team here. It is one of the biggest clubs in Scotland and should be in the top league, fighting for cups every season.

"I think on our day we can match any team — even the Premiership ones still in the cup."

Alan Stubbs' verdict on Hibs'

Scottish Cup win over Berwick Rangers

Hibs' Head Coach Alan Stubbs is convinced that the club's Scottish Cup hoodoo will eventually come to an end and with a game against fellow Championship side Falkirk in the semifinals the fans are convinced that this could be the year.

Speaking after yesterday's comfortable win over Berwick Rangers, a content Stubbs said: "Someone's going to do it, whether it's me, the next manager or the one after that but while we're still in the competition you can keep bringing it up... but you never know, it might be me.

"Even though we weren't on our A game I thought we were very professional. The goals in the first half settled us down and as long as we didn't do anything silly or lose concentration, we always looked like we would score and add to our tally. Berwick deserve a lot of credit; they can hold their heads high. Coming here was always going to be a big ask for them.

"There is the romance of the cup and while they were still in it there was an opportunity to cause a shock, but we were determined that wasn't going to be us today.

Stubbs won the cup as a Celtic player under Martin O'Neil was delighted with some of Hibs' play and particularly the form of unsung hero Lewis Stevenson who helped create two goals and scored another.

He continued: "There was a quality about the first two goals, a real understanding of interchanging and quick one-touch play. Maybe the last person you'd have thought would have been on the end of the second one would have been Lewis Stevenson but that's what he's added to his game. He has a belief and is

playing more in the middle to final third and chipping in with a few goals.

"He's very much Mr Shy-Guy and you can see that from his celebrations as he doesn't really know what to do with them. But you saw in the players' reactions to the goal that he's a very popular guy in the dressing-room.

"By reaching the semis the players have given themselves an opportunity and I honestly feel it's one they'll grab hold of,"

The Falkirk tie is a repeat of the famous 2013 semi-final which Hibs won after extra time after going in at half time 3-0 down. The game will be played on either Saturday 18^{th} April or Sunday 19^{th} April.

The other semi-final will be between either Celtic or Dundee United and Inverness Caledonian Thistle or Raith Rovers.

Fountainbridge Library is 75! A library has stood on the Dundee Street site since 1897 — the first neighbourhood library was funded from the estate of philanthropist **Thomas**

Nelson, but by the 1930s the building needed to be replaced. JAW Grant was appointed to be architect of the new library, sculptor Charles D'Orville Pilkington Jackson commissioned to provide the carving to surmount the main doorway; Jackson's original plans included ornate carvings of a fountain and a bridge, so he was understandably dismayed when he learned of a planned change of name to 'Dundee Street Library' - luckily the plan was dropped, and despite delays caused by the war, the new library was opened in 1940. The High School of Glasgow took home the freestyle award with their rendition of Slàn Leat.

Elsewhere, bands from Tobermory, Edinburgh, Inverclyde, Lochalsh and Elgin all took home awards, with judges and organisers praising the young pipers and drummers on the level of talent and professionalism they displayed in their performances.

Schools from across Scotland — and even a few from England — travelled to Edinburgh to take part in the Scottish Schools Pipe Band Championships.

Pupils competed at this year's competition at Broughton High School and Fettes College in categories tailored to their skill set, such as juvenile, novice juvenile, debut, junior and quartets.

However, it was the innovative freestyle category — where musicians can perform a tune of their choice alongside other musical disciplines — that sparked the most interest with event organisers having to cap the number of entries because of unprecedented demand.

The High School of Glasgow took home the freestyle award with their rendition of Slàn Leat.

Elsewhere, bands from Tobermory, Edinburgh, Inverclyde, Lochalsh and Elgin all took home awards, with judges and organisers praising the young pipers and drummers on the level of talent and professionalism they displayed in their performances.

The committee behind The Championships hope that the success of this year's competition will encourage more Scottish schools to include piping and drumming tuition on the school curriculum.

David Johnston, Convener for the competition, said: "Today's

competition proved to be an enormous success and it was great to see so many schools from across the country taking part.

"The whole point of this competition is to showcase the versatility of the pipes and drums and the talent of Scotland's younger generation when playing our national instrument, and that certainly came through in today's competition.

"Whether bands were competing in the freestyle or any other category, it was clear that the level of skill has greatly increased since we kicked off our first competition two years ago.

"For many schools, this was their first time competing in this fantastic competition and we truly hope that they enjoyed the experience and buzzing atmosphere of the event."













After a full day of performances, Chair of Creative Scotland, Richard Findlay, presented winners with their trophies.

David said: "We are very proud of all of those who competed in the competition this year.

"I think it is fair to say that this year has been the toughest year yet for our judges as bands really raised the bar on the quality of their performances. We are already eagerly waiting to see what bands will come up with next year.

"We would like to thank all those who competed in this year's competition and we hope to see continued high numbers again for next year, as well as the return of old and new faces to the event."

Hibs will face Falkirk in the semi-final of this year's William Hill Scottish Cup after a comfortable 4-0 win over Berwick Rangers at Easter Road this afternoon.

Head Coach Alan Stubbs made two changes to the starting XI that beat Alloa Athletic last weekend, bringing back Liam Fontaine to replace the cup-tied Keith Watson and Jason Cummings in place of Franck Dja Djedje,

Borderer Liam Craig who used to watch Berwick Rangers as a youngster had to settle for a place on the bench alongside Danny Handling and Jordon Forster, both of whom played for the 'English' side on loan earlier in their careers.

David Gray captained the side in place of Craig.

Berwick who are managed by ex-Hearts' midfielder Colin Cameron, fielded Lee Currie and David Gold who were previously on Hibs' books as youngsters.

Hibs started brightly and Dominique Malonga almost opened the scoring in the fourth minute but his strike was deflected wide.

The Edinburgh side then dominated possession and eventually took the lead in the 25th minute when Fontaine found Lewis Stevenson on the left wing. Hibs' longest serving player then sent a magnificent through ball into the path of Cummings who calmly slid the ball past William Bald into the net.

Two minutes later Stevenson took possession of the ball on the

wing before cutting inside. After beating two Berwick defenders he played a superb one-two with Malonga before smashing a shot into the corner of the net to double Hibs advantage.

Just after the break, a Gray header from Scott Allan's corner struck the post as Hibs looked to wrap things up.

In the 62nd minute Sam Stanton replaced Allan and Stubbs' decision was vindicated two minutes later when Stevenson found Dylan McGeouch on the left wing. The on-loan Celtic star calmly slipped the ball to Malonga whose shot was saved by Bald but he could only divert the ball into the path of Stanton who side footed it into the empty net.

With eight minutes remaining, Hibs added a fourth. Cummings did well to find Sam Stanton on the edge of the box and the youngster slid the ball into the path of substitute Craig whose shot looked to be heading for the top corner before Bald produced a wonder save to divert the ball over the bar. Referee Bobby Madden initially awarded a goal kick but changed his mind after consulting his assistant.

Stanton sent the resultant corner into the six yard box and Fontaine headed the ball into the net to complete the scoring.

The draw was made after the Dundee United v Celtic game at Tannadice which ended in a 1-1 draw. The winners of that game will face either Inverness Caledonian Thistle or Raith Rovers whose game was postponed yesterday and will take place on Tuesday.

Hibs v Falkirk is a repeat of the 2013 semi-final which ended in a 4-3 win for Hibs who fought back from being 3-0 down at half time.

'Sonians come back from the brink to take the win

If only the possession and territory stats from the first half had been consulted then the observer would have been expecting a veritable cricket score from Stewarts-Melville, but — as someone famous once (should have) said — there are lies, damned lies and the result at the final whistle!

The first half of Stew-Mel's final — and extremely windy — home match of the league was played almost completely in Watsonians half. Indeed, a large part was played in their 22, with the home side dominating almost the whole of the gameplay — lineouts and scrums included — and only some desperate defence, coupled with the odd handling error, kept the home side at bay.

Just as the match was entering the second quarter, Stew-Mel's ever present winger, Matt Morrell, broke clear and almost made it through, but the opposing 10, Andrew Chalmers just managed to haul him down. The quickly recycled ball then found its way out to the opposing wing, Angus Rennie, who went over in the corner. With Brian Walls (above) on to replace the, seemingly

'Sonians still had to endure a continuation of the first half Stew-Mel dominance for a period as the Inverleith side continued to push for a score.

The first chance came less than 10 minutes in with a penalty award in front of the posts. This seemed to galvanise his team into action and they continued to pressurise the opposition in tier own half. A few minutes after Walls' goal, Watsonians were on the attack again. A clearing kick was fielded by Northcott and a long pass from the full back, stretched the defence a touch, allowing a break to develop. The ball was swiftly through the hands and out to the wing where it found one of the Millers — the Watsonians' team sheet, once again, was nowhere near what the program said — and the No 6 ran in for his try. Walls then managed to convert in the wind and the score was now, much closer, 12-10.

All to play for then. In a reverse of the first half situation, it was Watsonians who dominated the final 10, or so minutes of play. And, eventually, they forced a penalty in the 22 with about five minutes left. Once again, Walls stepped up for the kick, and his compensation for the wind just held out as the ball squeezed past the left hand upright for the point and to put the visitors in the lead for the first time at 13-12.

Stew-Mel made a gallant attempt to resurrect their game, but had to settle for a long range penalty from McCashin just on full time. However, his kick went nowhere near and Walls booted the ball into the stand to end a real nail biter of a match, 13-12 to Watsonians.

With just a couple of rounds left, plus the odd re-scheduled match, Stew-Mel are in second place in the League with 71 points — Selkirk having secured the title — with two away matches still to play. Watsonians lie in fourth place, nine points in arrears, but have three home matches coming up, so it's not all done and dusted just yet. Watch this space!

Interview with Rhodes

Three EPs into his already promising music career, David Rhodes is renowned for his idyllic songs with a mesmerising atmospheric edge. Rhodes has already toured with some huge names in current pop music, boasting support slots with the likes of Sam Smith, London Grammar and Rufus Wainwright. The singer-songwriter has been on a whirlwind creative journey recently, with two EPs released in the last year and a new single, 'Turning Back Around', out on April 5.

What's the feedback been like for the new single?

It's been lovely so far. It was an anxious moment when I put it online because it's the first little sample of what to expect from the album.

The new single sounds a little bit more upbeat, what can we expect from the new album?

Yeah, it's slightly more energetic. I had written the song ages ago and it was a slower acoustic song. Then one evening at the studio James Kenosha and I started jamming around the chords with an up tempo beat and we decided to go with it. There are a few more up tempo songs on the album. I want it to be very dynamic.

What influenced you during the creation of the upcoming record, musically and lyrically?

This whole last 18 months has been quite crazy and the highs and lows have inspired a lot of the songs. Having been particularly anxious about the whole singing thing it's been a bit of a roller coaster emotionally. I've been listening to a

lot the music that first fuelled my passion like LOVE, Talk Talk and Television — all the old bands. I like space and light so being in a huge open coastal location to record the album has been really important to the soundscapes. I like to imagine it being quite cinematic I'm the end.

You've released three EPs and this will be your first album, was there any added pressure because it's a full album you'll be releasing?

Yes! Lots. I guess it's just because this is like a document of where I've got to so far and it's everlasting. I feel it needs to really represent and in a way define me as an artist and because I'm solo it's a complete blank canvas and I need to be really careful about how it all comes across. I'm feeling really good about it though and excited for everyone to hear it now.

You played Big Weekend and Glastonbury last year, what plans do you have for this summer?

Last summer feels like a dream now. Hopefully I'll be doing all of those lovely festivals again, I've announced Barn on the Farm and a few across Europe which is going to be a lot of fun.

What can we expect from the tour?

You can expect a band. I've got a really lovely band with me for this one, we've been experimenting with how to approach recreating the sound I have in the studio on the live stage. There's a lot of energy but still little moments of calm. I think I've found a really nice balance and I'm looking forward to everyone hearing it.

The Edinburgh Reporter in conversation with Quiet as a Mouse

Quiet as a Mouse are the latest exciting band from Edinburgh and are almost changing the way indie is defined. Their anthemic-cum-fragile sound draws comparisons to Editors, Nirvana and The Smiths, and the band has received significant praise from BBC 6 Music, Vic Galloway from BBC Radio Scotland, The Herald and others.

The band played a massive headlining preview show to their upcoming EP at the end of February at Electric Circus. The four-piece attracted quite a crowd to a usually busy Friday night Electric Circus, and it was all quite well received as the band a mixture of new and old material.

Their newest EP will be released on 13th April, the follow-up to their debut EP, *British Flag*. The new EP is a more subdued release, with no forceful guitar parts and using the lyrics and rhythmic backdrop to do the talking.

Alex Moran said: "We wanted follow up the debut EP towards the end of last year after a nice bit of press. There was a bit of lightbulb click and we were then looking forward to the next year. It was six months of planning, and it's been an idea around since November-time."

Behind all the songwriting in Quiet as a Mouse is the frontman Alex Moran. Their technique for writing songs is what works best for them. "I'll write on my own," said Alex. "What I

bring to the band is chord structures or arrangements, then do the chords on acoustic or electric and works with the guys to improve structure."

Quiet as a Mouse have always recorded in Glasgow, a city that has a noticeably more riveting music scene. Alex feels that working in Glasgow helps with the creativeness and subtleties of the recording. "I've never properly recorded in Edinburgh," said Alex. "I've always recorded in Glasgow, that was the first studio experience. We worked with Liam Watson, who worked on *Elephant* by The White Stripes, on the previous EP, who is into more 50s and 60s music which makes it more acid than garage. He's quite quick in the studio with more layering."

The upcoming EP is the biggest focus for Quiet as a Mouse with three shows announced to promote the release, playing a free show at The Stillery in London on April $14^{\rm th}$, Broadcast in Glasgow on April $23^{\rm rd}$, and another homecoming show in Edinburgh at Wee Red Bar on May $2^{\rm nd}$.

Additional focus is on signing to a record label, which Alex claims is a very difficult thing to do with the current stature of the music industry. "It's good to get decent feedback, no more than that at the moment and just doing what we're doing," said Alex. "We just need to see what happens and how it develops."

"It would be nice to work with a good label — I'd like that as a fan of music," said Alex. However it is nice to do it yourself, you get a lot of creative control. Knowing that you and the guys and people you work with, when you achieve things you hold your heads together. But if we get lucky enough and the right options then we might consider it."

Edinburgh is best in tourism poll

Today is International Women's Day, a global day celebrating the economic, political and social achievements of women past, present and future. Each year has a theme and for 2015 it's 'Make It Happen'.

In Edinburgh we have some pretty impressive and successful women, including Professors Vicki Stone and Mercedes Maroto-Valer who were honoured with Fellowship of the Royal Society of Edinburgh (RSE) earlier this week. To date, Professors Stone and Maroto-Valer along with Professor Raffaella Ocone, a Fellow since 2006, are the only women at Heriot-Watt to have received this prestigious honour.

There will be a meeting of the full council this Thursday, the first since the 2015/16 budget was set. One of the questions put before the meeting is from Conservative Councillor Jeremy Balfour who asks how much money is spent each year on tea and biscuits at various levels of the council. Certainly there is

a lovely silver tea and coffee service which the Council Leader uses in his room at meetings, but in the members dining room where councillors have coffee and eat their lunch the coffee and tea served is from a self-service machine.

Other than that the council is being asked to explain why its Local Development Plan has not yet been approved. The former plan which contains information about green belts and general planning principles for all areas of the city expired at the end of February, so the city is currently without a plan.

And the Green Group wants the city to adopt the same stance as other institutions in the city in turning its back on investments in any companies which are based on fossil fuels. They quote a <u>study</u> by Impax Asset Management which suggests that investment funds based on fossil fuels may not perform as well as those which exclude those investments.

More than 400 young pipers and drummers will be marching into Edinburgh today to compete in the world's largest school pipe band competition.

Aimed at encouraging schools to include pipes and drums musical tuition on the school curriculum, The Scottish Schools Pipe Band Championship will include bands who travel from the four corners of Scotland to compete.

Armed with a range of categories suited to each competitors skill set, this year's competition will also see more entrants than ever go for gold in the unique 'freestyle' category.

The freestyle category encourages bands to perform with other instrumentalists with schools performing everything from traditional music to a take on modern pop songs.

The prizes are to be presented at 16.15pm by the Chair of Creative Scotland, Richard Findlay.

Edinburgh scored 90% in the 'Big Cities' section of the survey conducted by Which? and received five stars for three out of four categories recognising the city's quality credentials for 'cultural sights and tourist attractions', 'food and drink' and 'ease of getting around'.

More than 4,400 Which? members took part in the survey to rate cities in the UK which they had stayed in for leisure purposes during the previous year.

Each city's score was based on overall satisfaction and how likely members were to recommend a destination to a friend, and only cities which had been visited by at least 30 members were included.

York and Liverpool scored a total of 89 per cent, just one per cent short of the Scottish capital's 90 per cent.

Edinburgh was considered to be in the 'big city' category as its population was over 200,000. Scottish cities also included were Aberdeen and Glasgow which scored 62% and 88% respectively and other UK cities included York, Cardiff, Newcastle upon Tyne, Belfast and Nottingham.

Manuela Calchini, Regional Director of VisitScotland, said she

was delighted by Edinburgh's position in the survey, because Which? prides itself on putting the consumer at the core of all of its activity;

"Edinburgh has topped the Which? survey once again cementing its position as a world class destination that offers great history and heritage, culture, shopping and ease of access. In Scotland's year of food and drink it's also excellent that consumers are enjoying the quality of fresh, local produce available in the city and their voting this with five stars is testament to visitors' recognition of this".

Last night Tudur Jones said: "I have been advised by the knee specialist that it is in my best interests to retire from football due to a knee injury

"I would like to go on record to thank Falkirk FC, in particular [director] Ronnie Bateman, [manager] Peter Houston and club physio Kris Robertson for all of their help during this time and I wish them the very best as they chase a playoff spot and Scottish Cup success."

Several of his ex teammates including Chris Hogg, Danny Handling, Alex Harris and Rowan Vine have expressed their condolences on twitter.



Police Operation Quarterlight update

A 17-year-old man has been arrested and charged following a number of moped thefts in North Edinburgh.

He is due to appear in court at a later date.

After responding to a report of a break-in to a Volkswagen Passat in Telford Road on Monday 2nd March, a 22-year-old man was detained nearby and was subsequently charged.

Superintendent Matt Richards said: "We recognise that housebreaking and vehicle thefts are major concerns for many communities within Edinburgh and Operation Quarterlight will continue to target those responsible.

"Every day, we are bringing thieves to justice and returning stolen goods and vehicles to their rightful owners.

"We will not rest on our recent successes but will actively pursue others believed to be involved in crimes of this nature.

"As part of our involvement in Stronger North, we will continue to work alongside our partners at City of Edinburgh Council and the public in North Edinburgh to tackle acquisitive crime and remove offenders from our communities."

Man arrested in connection with Frederick Street robbery

"As part of our enquiries we also recovered a quantity of drugs and firearms, and a second male has been arrested for these offences.

"I would also add that police are still attempting to trace the Rolex watches that were stolen from the jewellers and I would ask anyone who can provide information on their whereabouts to call police immediately on 101."
