Renewed appeal to trace missing man

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Police are continuing their appeal to help trace James Farmer, aged 51, who was last seen in the Grassmarket area of the city around 10.30am on Thursday 22nd January.

James still has family in the Kirkcaldy area and has also been known to travel to Stirling, Aberdeen and other parts of the UK on the bus.

James is described as male, white, around 5ft 7 inches tall, average build with a fair complexion and salt-and-pepper coloured hair.

He was wearing a black 'Everlast' jacket and sports trousers with a white stripe down the leg, and a hat with distinctive markings, as seen in the above images.

Police Inspector Nic Page said: "We are keen to establish that James is safe and well and we would ask anyone who can assist us in tracing him to come forward.

"Similarly we would appeal for James to get in touch with the police or friends and family so that we can establish that he is safe and well."

Police Operation Quarterlight update

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In the last week officers in Edinburgh have arrested five men and one woman for various offences related to motor vehicles crimes. Of those arrested a 22-year-old man has been remanded in custody on multiple charges.

Operation Quarterlight is a Police Scotland initiative aimed at tackling motor vehicle crime in hotspot areas. Since the start of the initiative in January 2015, local officers involved in the operation have made 24 arrests and solved 68 crimes related to motor vehicle offences.

Additionally in the last week there has been 15 stop searches in hotspot areas and 41 bail curfew checks completed on some of Edinburgh's most prolific offenders.

Police have also charged a 41-year-old woman with the theft of a pedal cycle. This had previously been advertised as for sale on a website. Officers are currently in the process of recovering the bike.

PS Tom Mallinson, who runs the Quarterlight team, said: "We have solved almost seventy crimes since Quarterlight began and well over half of these relate to vehicle crime. We are quite clear with offenders — we will continue to investigate all crimes linked to vehicles across the city.

"Many of these individuals will be involved in assaults, hate crimes, vandalisms and serious driving offences while in the commission of motor vehicle offences and our team has prioritised access to forensic services, CCTV and national vehicle crime experts to combat the challenge of autocrime." Chief Superintendent Mark Williams, who oversees Operation Quarterlight locally, pressed home the point about car security and improving results. He said: "We have seen a week on week increase in detection rates, as well as a driving down of car crime as the message gets out.

"We have increased preventative night time patrols in hot spot areas and officers have conducted over a hundred searches resulting in numerous arrests.

"We still want car owners to be careful – secure their vehicles, park in well-lit and overlooked spots and ensure valuable items are removed or at least not on show in their vehicles."

Witness appeal following serious assault on Gilmerton Road

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Police are appealing for witnesses following a serious assault that took place on Saturday morning.

The assault is believed to have occurred between 6am and 7am on Gilmerton Road, near to Glenallan Drive, when a 29 year old man was assaulted by two men.

One of the two suspects has been described as male, white, aged 20 - 25 years, 5ft 10in tall, with a lean to medium build, ginger hair, local accent and wearing a navy blue cotton bottoms and a light blue Adidas hooded top.

Police are now appealing for anyone who was in the area at the time to contact police on 101.

Sergeant Robbie Wallace said: "This serious assault left the victim with three fractured ribs and so we are appealing for anyone in Gilmerton Road between 6am and 7am to get in touch with police."

Fyvie made his senior debut as a 16 year-old, becoming the youngest player ever to play for Aberdeen and actually won the man of the match award. He also became the youngest player to score a senior goal for the Dons when he netted against Hearts on 27 January 2010.

After a couple of serious injuries, Fyvie moved to Wigan Athletic for an undisclosed fee, believed to have been in the region of £500,000.

He has also spent two periods on loan to Yeovil Town and Shrewsbury Town.

The Scotland under-21 internationalist says he is excited about starting the next chapter of his career with the Easter Road club.

Last night he told the club website: "I'm really pleased to sign for Hibs — as soon as I heard about the opportunity it excited me.

"I was keen to head back up to Scotland and Hibs are a club going in the right direction, so everything about this move made sense. "My first goal will be to earn a place in the starting line-up and then I want to help Hibs to achieve promotion.

"I can't wait to get started here at Hibs and I've been really impressed with the manager's vision for the future."

Head Coach Alan Stubbs welcomed the news of Fyvie's arrival and believes his latest signing will excite the club's supporters.

Stubbs said: "We're absolutely delighted to be able to add Fraser to the squad – he is a young player with tremendous quality and potential.

"It's a great opportunity for Fraser and we're delighted to give him an opportunity to be a part of what we're trying to achieve here at Hibernian."His arrival underlines our ambitions to kick on; it strengthens our squad and adds extra competition for places which will enable us to finish the season as strong as possible.

"Overall I'm delighted with the business we've managed to complete during the January transfer window and Fraser's arrival is another signing that I believe will excite our fans."

Leaving the club is striker Paul Heffernan who was released from his contract by mutual consent.

The 33-year-old scored five goals in 35 appearances - recording four starts during the 2014/15 season.

Everybody associated with the club would like to thank 'Heff' for his contribution and wish him all the best as he embarks on the next chapter of his career with Dundee.

New Festival Director announces 2015 classical music programme

■ Today the news that the classical music fans in the city have been waiting for — the new Festival Director unveils his choice for the 2015 Edinburgh International Festival. In truth there will be a further announcement next month when the whole programme is announced, but there will be plenty for the music critics and the public to digest here.

The great names in classical music are set to flock to Edinburgh this summer in a programme of 49 concerts and recitals over the course of three weeks. Long established Festival favourites including Iván Fischer, Sir John Eliot Gardiner, Sir Andrew Davis, William Christie, Valery Gergiev and Donald Runnicles all return in 2015, joined by Gianandrea Noseda, Robin Ticciati and Vasily Petrenko on the podium.

2015 marks the first Festival appearances of major international soloists Yuja Wang, Anne-Sophie Mutter, Rudolf Buchbinder, Colin Currie and Lang Lang.

The Usher Hall has been at the heart of the Festival from the beginning and has always remained the crucial continuum within the broad programme of music, theatre, dance and opera that has grown around its foundations.

Festival 2015 fills the Usher Hall with great music starting with the BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra performing Brahms in the Opening Concert with Donald Runnicles and the Edinburgh Festival Chorus, and concluding with the ground shaking The Rite of Spring performed by the London Symphony Orchestra and Valery Gergiev on Sunday 30 August.

In between a packed programme of international and UK artists includes Michael Tilson Thomas conducting the San Francisco Symphony with the ground-breaking St. Lawrence String Quartet making its first Edinburgh appearance, the Oslo Philharmonic Orchestra makes a welcome return under the direction of Vasily Petrenko, Sir John Eliot Gardiner's Orchestre Révolutionnaire et Romantique, and the Budapest Festival Orchestra conducted by the superb Iván Fischer.

The Edinburgh Festival Chorus, the Festival's only performing element, celebrates its 50th anniversary in 2015. Acclaimed by critics, audiences, orchestras and conductors, the Chorus will demonstrate why it has been called one of the best in the world with performances of some of the biggest and greatest choral music ever written: Mozart's Requiem, Beethoven's Missa solemnis and Berlioz's epic Grande messe des morts. Stories of love, money, morals, magic, bears, ballerinas and fiery tempers are brought to life for audiences in strong and dramatic story-telling through Strauss's Ein Heldenleben, Stravinsky's The Rake's Progress and Petrushka, Berlioz's Lélio, Sibelius's Kullervo and Gilbert and Sullivan's H.M.S. Pinafore all performed in concert at the Usher Hall.

Celebrated Austrian pianist Rudolf Buchbinder, who has been performing and revisiting Beethoven's Piano Sonatas since the 1970s, brings his remarkable technique and provocative insights to one of the greatest bodies of music ever written. In 9 concerts, you can hear Buchbinder play all 32 of Beethoven's piano sonatas, around 10 hours of incredible music.

The full programme for Edinburgh International Festival 2015 will be unveiled on Wednesday 18 March, and all tickets to Festival 2015 go on sale on Saturday 28 March.

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Launching his first classical music programme for the Edinburgh International Festival, Director Fergus Linehan said: 'The flame which lit Edinburgh's reputation as the world's festival city was the international standard of concert programming and the unique qualities of the Usher Hall.'

'Launching the classical music concerts ahead of the full programme, allows us to shine a light on the scale of work and quality of artistry these musicians will bring to Edinburgh this year.'

'Over the past 68 years relationships have been forged between artists and festivalgoers that have proved lasting and profound. Audiences have flocked year after year to artists such as Claudio Abaddo and Charles Mackerras and in return have been rewarded with complex and far reaching musical experiences. I want to continue to develop deep and rewarding relationships with musicians such as Ivan Fischer and Andrew Davies while exploring artists new to the Festival who have so much to give our audiences.

'In sharing the classical music season for Festival 2015 I am sharing the first step in a line of programming that will evolve over the next five years. In 2015 we are proud to be presenting a programme built around artists who love and understand the Festival and those we feel have a unique contribution to make to Edinburgh's musical history.'

Leonie Bell, Director of Arts and Engagement at Creative Scotland, said:

'Edinburgh International Festival is exciting, inspiring, challenging and an important part of our cultural lives. The festival creates a buzz of excitement across the city and is an important international platform for the arts. The benefits that it brings to Edinburgh, Scotland and the UK has been well documented, but just as important, is the excitement and the spark that this particular Festival creates. We are delighted to support the Festival as it announces its classical music programme and look forward to further announcements, as the full festival programme is unveiled over the coming months.'

Councillor Steve Cardownie, Edinburgh's Festivals and Events Champion at City of Edinburgh Council, said: 'The Usher Hall has an international reputation for its outstanding acoustics and the venue has staged concerts with some of the biggest names in music for a century.

Amateurs Showcase: treats to come at King's Theatre

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If you enjoy musicals, operetta or just great singing, make sure you snap up your tickets for some fantastic new productions coming to The King's Theatre. At a thoroughly enjoyable preview last week, an enthusiastic audience was given a taste of four shows, all of them well worth seeing.

In his introduction to the evening, the theatre's CEO Duncan Hendry said "These fabulous local companies are at the heart of what we do at Festival and King's'" — so much so that the first thing Mr Hendry did on taking up his post was to meet with all of them to find out what he could do for them. Compere Alan Borthwick joined Edinburgh Gilbert & Sullivan Society fifty years ago, and is 'the only (barely) living person who's directed all four of the groups here tonight' and he alleges he's enjoyed every minute of it. ×

First on stage was The Bohemians Lyric Company with their new production of *Sister Act* – the Scottish amateur premiere performance of the show made famous by Whoopi Goldberg.

The first snippet – the arrival of Miss Van Cartier at St × Katherine's Convent - was well played between Deloris (Niloo-Far Khan – who has this brash yet resourceful character 'T') down to а and Mother Superior (a suitably affronted Dorothy Johnstone), and although the choir did on occasion slightly drown out the leads, this will undoubtedly be ironed out before the show opens. Saviour Sisters followed, with some excellent and witty solos from various nuns, and an especially impressive contribution from Monsignor O'Hara (played for the preview by Andrew Hilson, though Iain Fraser will take the part in the production itself). The performance ended with the Finale which was both exuberant and exciting. The Bohemians have been away from King's for five years; with Sister Act they will surely be making a triumphant return this February.





The Southern Light Opera Company and The Bohemians were once bitter rivals; any performer wishing to act for both had to have very special permission. Those days are of course long gone, and this year the Southern Light will be bringing its production of *Oliver* to King's in March, with a cast of over two hundred people.

The last time Oliver was staged at King's was in 2002, so there is a great demand to see it once again. This preview began with the Artful Dodger and Oliver singing *Consider Yourself*. I always find it hard to avoid comparing any version of *Oliver* to Carol Reed's 1968 film, but in this case the two leads need have no worries – they both have outstanding voices and stage presence, their enunciation being crystal clear.

Alex Morrison's Oliver has the perfect cut glass tones of the boy from a very different place, and these contrast well with the cockney banter of Michael Denvir's Artful Dodger. In *I'd Do Anything* Nancy, ably played by Lori Flannigan, and the Dodger both performed well, again engaging the audience beautifully.

Fagin's costume was stunning with its oriental cap, long green coat and fur-trimmed sleeves; Charlie Munro cut a suitably ambiguous presence in the scene, full of jollity with the boys but with a clear threat of something rather less pleasant below the surface. The pathos of Oliver's solo Where is Love? again demonstrated this actor's clear young voice; Nancy's return to sing As Long As He Needs Me was equally successful, conveying her resigned devotion to Bill Sykes.

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Gilbert and Sullivan are second only to Shakespeare in the number of times they are performed in the UK: it is said that there is always a performance of *The Mikado* on somewhere in the world.

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This year The Edinburgh Gilbert and Sullivan Society is bringing *The Pirates of Penzance* to King's; although this production won't open until the end of March it's already highly polished, with a lively and well-rehearsed chorus and confident renditions of *Oh better far to live or die…I am a Pirate King* from Scott Thomson and *I am the very model of a modern Major-General* from Ian Lawson. Mabel's *Poor Wandering One* was especially entertaining; Gillian Robertson has certainly mastered the art of the 'warble'.

The evening concluded with a fantastic set of numbers from Showcase 25. Showcase are a group of over 100 singers open to anyone over 16 who passes the audition — it must be a tough one, because all of the performers in this preview were outstanding.

Two solos from the first singer to take centre stage *Because I'm Happy* and *Get Lucky* were each full of energy and fun; this tenor has an electric stage presence and could have an audience up and dancing in no time. The mood swiftly changed as another performer came forward to sing *Stars*, Javert's song from *Les Miserables*; despite the sudden change of tempo, this singer's powerful bass voice gave a truly moving performance, bringing out all of the emotion in the lyrics.

A stunning conclusion to the evening was provided by the final soloist, singing *This is the moment, This is the time* — in an hour of excellent singing, this terrific voice still stood out as it filled the theatre with its strong, well-modulated tones. This wonderful singer was ably backed by a chorus that, perhaps inspired by their lead, also seemed to perform particularly well in this number.

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Showcase was started in 1995 by John Wright and Bobby Harvey specifically to raise money for charity using the musical skills and talents of some of the best non-professional performers in the Edinburgh area. Since then they have donated almost a quarter of a million pounds to Macmillan Cancer Support, an average of £10,000 per year. This is the group's first visit to the King's Theatre; they will be on stage on 29th and 30th May 2015.

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Later this morning Fergus Linehan the new Director of the Edinburgh International Festival will announce some of the programme for this year's festival.

Watch out in our <u>Culture</u> section later around 10.30 to see what is coming up this year.

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Recycling rates are continuing to rise thanks to a new service being rolled out across Edinburgh the council says.

The scheme, which means kerbside recycling change for more than 140,000 households, was launched in September and is being introduced in phases throughout the year.

According to the latest figures, updated collections have resulted in an increase of more than 100% in recycling rates on average for the households involved.

Changes, which include expanded capacity for recycling and a simplified collections process, have also seen the amount of waste sent to landfill reduced, with homes in the first phase

experiencing a 34% drop and those in the second phase sending on average 23% less to landfill.

The third phase of the roll-out, affecting approximately 20,000 properties, is due to begin in March. A full list of the streets involved is available <u>on the Council website</u>.

Environment Convener, Councillor Lesley Hinds, said: "The roll-out of Edinburgh's new kerbside recycling service is now in full swing and the latest statistics show just what an impact it's having on residents' attitudes to recycling.

"As the changes are implemented across the city, I have been impressed by the willingness of people to play their part, not in the least thanks to the work of our recycling advisors to help the public to adapt.

"Having said that, there is always room for improvement, and we will continue to work with communities to raise awareness of the importance of recycling, helping them to adjust to their new bin collections."

New grey bins will begin being delivered to phase three homes at the beginning of March. On the householders' start date, their existing green wheelie bin will be emptied of general waste for the last time before being use for recycling. Blue boxes will still to be used for glass as well as small electrical items and food and garden recycling will continue as normal.

It is hoped increasing space and capacity for mixed recycling will support the Council's pledge to recycle 70% of the city's waste by 2025.

As well as providing environmental benefits, increasing recycling rates can save the Council millions of pounds of taxpayers' money spent on landfill costs.

Edinburgh firm fined for breach of licence conditions

▲ At the end of last week an Edinburgh firm was fined £4,000 in total at Edinburgh Sheriff Court after pleading guilty to breaching Waste Management Licence conditions relating to dust and waste storage at Eldin Industrial Estate in Midlothian. The company, Caledonian Industrial Limited, then trading as Caleco Waste, pled guilty to failing to carry out water spraying of stockpiles containing dry, crushed and screened waste materials in order to prevent particulate emissions to air, and also having stockpiles of waste exceeding three metres in height.

Both these incidents were breaches of a Waste Management Licence held by the company. The matter was investigated by the Scottish Environment Protection Agency (SEPA) and reported to the Procurator Fiscal. Since the site first obtained a Waste Management Licence in 2000 SEPA has received numerous complaints from members of the public relating to operations on site.

SEPA explained that it engaged with the company since the Waste Management Licence was issued in order to secure compliance, and this included taking appropriate enforcement action as required. SEPA also modified the Waste Management Licence, to insert more prescriptive conditions relating to the control of dust and litter from the site, in an attempt to reduce the environmental impact from operations at the site and tackle perceived management failures.

A change in company management at the end of 2011 reduced the number of dust complaints in relation to the site, however concerns remained in relation to management of the site.

Simone O'Dowd, SEPA's investigating officer, said:

"Despite several lengthy attempts, using our enforcement tools, to bring the company into compliance Caledonian Industrial Limited has continued to disregard the conditions of the Waste Management Licence.

"The site is located in close proximity to a number of residential properties as well as other commercial units within the industrial estate."

Recipes for you – Eggs are Excellent

Contributed by Stephanie Scott ANutr – Food and Health Development Worker The term 'superfood' has been consistently mentioned in the media over the past year and as we have talked about in previous articles, expensive and popular foods such as goji berries, chai seeds and wheatgrass are really unnecessary to get the nutrients you need in your diet. There are much cheaper whole food alternatives which are just as nutritious such as sardines, oats, pulses and eggs. Eggs are often overlooked or forgotten about but are one of the best sources of protein (fitness fans take note!) and are perfect for quick meals which are both tasty and healthy.

So what makes eggs so fantastic?

Eggs are a nutrient dense food that contains a rich source of high quality protein. High protein foods contribute to satiety and this is why eggs make a perfect breakfast — they will help to keep you fuller for longer and reduce the need to reach for a mid-morning snack. Both the yolk and the white of an egg contains many nutrients so make sure you are eating whole eggs rather than just egg whites to ensure you are getting the full range of protein, vitamins and minerals. Eggs are high in selenium — a mineral which helps to prevent the body from oxidative damage. Eggs are also a particularly good source of fat soluble vitamins A, D, E and K as well as being a good source of vitamins B2, B6 and B12.

Eggs are not only great for breakfasts — their versatility makes them a quick, cheap and healthy food for any meal. Boiled, poached or scrambled eggs with wholemeal toast, grilled tomatoes, spinach and avocado are tasty and filling breakfast options while vegetable omelettes or egg muffins served with salad make a healthy, satisfying lunch. Our vegetarian frittata recipe (see below) makes a quick and nutritious dinner served with some green vegetables and can be eaten hot or cold, making it a perfect leftover lunch to take to work the next day. Hard boiled eggs also make a great snack option.

Eggs are also cheap to buy and when stored correctly have a

relatively long shelf life. As a high risk, protein food similar to meat products it's important to practice good hygiene when handling and storing eggs. Care should be taken when dealing with raw eggs: make sure to always wash your hands after handling them. It's important that eggs are stored appropriately to minimise the risk of food poisoning. While eggs in supermarkets are stored at room temperature this is a controlled environment i.e. it's cool and dry. At home you should store eggs in the fridge as the temperature and moisture levels in a kitchen fluctuate greatly when cooking.

Is there a limit on the number of eggs you should eat each day?

In the UK, there is no limit on the number of eggs people can consume each week — they are a great, affordable food that are high in nutrients and are perfect for the whole family. In the past, many viewed eggs as a villain, limiting their egg intake or eating only egg whites as they believed eggs raised their cholesterol. This myth has been debunked by many studies which have looked at egg consumption. While it is true that eggs contain dietary cholesterol, this cholesterol has only a very small, insignificant impact on blood cholesterol. To reduce cholesterol levels it is recommended that intakes of processed foods such as pies, sausages and baked products — which all contain high saturated fat levels — are reduced, rather than eggs.

BOILED EGGS

Boiled eggs are great served soft with wholemeal toast in the morning for breakfast while hard boiled eggs make a perfect snack. Here is our guide on how to boil a perfect egg.

Soft boiled eggs:

1. Lower the egg into a pan of gently boiling water using a slotted spoon. 2. For a medium egg allow 3 minutes or for a large egg allow 4 minutes. 3. Take the eggs off the heat and place in egg cup. 4. Remove top of egg with a knife and serve with wholemeal toast. Hard boiled eggs: 1. Lower the egg into a pan of cold water using a slotted spoon and bring to the boil. 2. Once the water is boiling gently, set a timer for 10 minutes. 3. Once cooked, plunge the egg into cold water for a minute. This will prevent the egg from over cooking. SCRAMBLED EGGS (serves 1) Scrambled eggs make a perfect breakfast. Serve with grilled tomatoes and avocado for a quick and nutrient packed breakfast that will keep you going until lunchtime! 1. Crack two eggs into a jug and add a splash of milk. 2. Lightly whisk until the ingredients are combined. 3. Heat a small non-stick pan, add the egg mixture and stir gently with a wooden spoon every minute or so until the eggs start to softly set. 4. Remove from the heat and leave for a minute as the eggs will continue to cook. 5. Serve. Submitted by Stephanie Scott ANutr

This afternoon the council's regulatory committee will meet to discuss fees charged by the council for public events and the moving of taxi stances at Haymarket. The fees are charged to meet the expense of the council's community safety team in inspecting venues and granting licenses.

Licensing fees usually attract a lot of public attention particularly when community groups or charities are asked to pay what might be considered high fees. The list of fees has been revised in an effort to alleviate the burden on such bodies and that list will be approved today.

All of the charges will be considered in light of impending budget decisions next week, but it is important to realise that fees are ring fenced in the same way as other parts of the council's budget. This means that any reductions in fees will have to be balanced by other charges increasing.

Fees for Houses in Multiple Occupancy and taxis have been increased in this financial year for the first time in almost five years. Other fees have risen at around 3% for the past three years but this is still not enough to cover all of the

council costs in this area, particularly the costs of any complaints procedures.

The council has already achieved savings of £160,000 and there will be further cost savings by issuing licenses online, but there is still an immediate deficit.

The council wants to raise its fees by around 2.5% for 2015-16 but aims to cut the cost of providing some licences by offering one permit for three years rather than having annual renewals to process. Other one day licences will be converted to seven day permissions, again in an effort to reduce the administration costs.

Where there is an application made for any licences involving keeping animals, then the person seeking the licence will now be asked to pay any veterinary bills.

Public Entertainment Licences are the most expensive in terms of staff time and the use of safety teams, so this area has been streamlined. From now on the council will set more fee categories for large scale events of more than 10,000 people.

Although the Fringe Society has made suggestions to the council for a different fee structure the council has already decided it cannot accept this as it would reduce income by over half and is not viable.

The Council has undertaken some customer research before proposing these changes and is confident that they will be able to balance the income and expenditure in this area.

For some categories these changes will mean that their licence fees increase by 100%. For a window cleaner in the last financial year the annual fee was only £50 whereas it will be £100 in the coming year. This cost can be mitigated by applying for a three year permit but will nevertheless be an increase that some will no doubt complain about. The fees proposed will become part of the Fees and Charges documentation which will be considered within the Budget next week.

As well as money the committee will also discuss taxis and particularly those at Haymarket. The council proposed moving the stance there to Haymarket Terrace with a new stance for seven taxis. The bus stop will be moved to a position outside the Tune Hotel.

Public urged to discuss organ donation with family

Even if you have already joined the NHS Organ Donor Register you are encouraged to talk to your nearest and dearest about your wishes on organ donation.

NHS Lothian now boasts the highest percentage of sign-ups in the country, with almost half the community registering their wish to be an organ donor.

However, although many think joining the NHS Organ Donor Register is enough, sharing organ donation wishes remains fundamental to relatives honouring a loved one's choices in the event of their death.

The call comes as research shows that almost half of people in Scotland haven't discussed their organ donation wishes with their family, and one in ten of those who are on the NHS Organ Donor Register haven't spoken to loved ones about their decision.

Since 2010/11, the family authorisation rate for organ donation — when a family member agrees that donation can proceed — has gone up to 61.6 per cent, but if the rate was to further increase to 80 per cent, then around 90 more lives could be saved each year.

With around 550 people in Scotland currently waiting on a life-saving organ, the Organ Donation Scotland campaign is

highlighting how the seven words, 'I'd like to be an organ donor' can save up to seven lives.

Professor Stephen Wigmore, Clinical Director of Transplantation, NHS Lothian, said: "It is important to discuss this topic, as the more people that are on the Organ Donor Register, the better chance we have of saving lives.

"People should talk about their wishes for organ donation with their families. Having this conversation could help the many people who are waiting to receive an organ."

Minister for Public Health, Maureen Watt, said: "Scotland has made huge progress in organ donation and transplantation, and it's fantastic that 41 per cent of Scots have expressed their wish to donate their organs by joining the NHS Organ Donor Register. The message we want to get across is that it's vital people talk about their organ donation wishes with friends and family, even if they have joined the Register, so these wishes can be honoured.

"Your family are twice as likely to agree to donation if they know it's what you would have wanted and we know that in the last five years, almost two thirds of those who donated their organs weren't on the Register. With many Scots currently waiting on a transplant, making time for a 'wee chat' could ultimately save lives."

Transplant recipient Gill Hollis, from Edinburgh, has backed the campaign to get Scotland talking about organ donation.

Gill, 49, received a lung transplant in 2004 after living with a progressive lung disease for more than 15 years. By the time she was listed for transplant, every single breath was a struggle.

Gill said: "I wouldn't be here without the NHS Organ Donor Register and the young woman who made the selfless decision to sign up. I also owe my life to her family, who made the brave decision to allow her to become a donor in what must have been their most difficult hour. So I would urge everyone to chat over with their family their wishes should the unthinkable happen."

The album, predominantly written on the Isle of Mull and recorded in Edinburgh, launches in the UK on 16 February 2015. The beer will be available in Scotland as part of a limited edition batch to coincide with the launch. The band and brewer are very excited to be working together to celebrate the launch of the new album and the band's return to music after five years away.

Brewer Barney commented:

"When the band approached me to collaborate on a beer I invited them down to the brewery to have a taste of some beers and throw around some ideas. We're not new to artistic collaborations having worked with John Byrne, Ryoko Tamura & Will Pickvance — so it was great to have the whole band's input and come up with something that reflects the ideas behind Everything Ever Written"

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Musselburgh Racecourse is optimistic that its £152,000 showpiece John Smith's Scottish Cheltenham Trials meeting will

go ahead later today Sunday 1 February.

The East Lothian course will hold a precautionary 8am inspection but with a forecast of bright clear weather on Sunday with temperatures of +4 degrees, boss Bill Farnsworth is hopeful racing won't fall to the weather which has hit a number of other meetings across the UK.

He said: "Based on today's forecast of +4 degrees which is expected to be repeated tomorrow, I am hopeful that we will be racing as planned. "Tomorrow is due to be bright and clear and if we get the goahead it should be a beautiful day to watch some of the country's leading jumps horses as they prepare for Cheltenham."

The eight card meeting features two Listed races, including two £25,000 races, backed up with four £20,000 features. Gates open at 11am and the first race is off at 1pm.

Much has been written in the printed and on-line media this week about how Hearts would react to their first league defeat of the season following Falkirk's 3-2 victory at Tynecastle last Saturday. Would there be an adverse reaction to this setback? Would doubts be placed in the minds of the players? Would their confidence now turn to nerves? These questions were answered in emphatic fashion in Clackmannanshire on Saturday evening when Robbie Neilson's men returned to winning ways by coasting to a 4-1 victory over Alloa Athletic.

Neilson had said during the week he would have made changes to the Hearts team for this game regardless of the result in Gorgie last week. Sure enough, Jordan McGhee, Sam Nicholson and Genero Zeefuik had to be content with places on the substitute's bench while their replacements Alim Ozturk, Miguel Pallardo and James Keatings took to the field on a cold, windy winter's evening.

As is customary, Hearts began on the offensive from the kick off. James Keatings had the game's first chance after just two minutes but he hit the side netting. Three minutes later, however, Hearts went ahead with a spectacular goal. Miguel Pallardo fired in a screamer from 25 yards which gave Alloa keeper McDowall not an earthly. As against Falkirk last week, Hearts had made the perfect start.

Jamie Walker then almost made it two when he was set up by Osman Sow but the youngster's effort only found the side netting. It was a miss Hearts almost regretted when former Jambo Stephen Simmons hit the post as play swung to the other end of the field. However, with just 11 minutes played, Hearts were 2-0 up thanks to a quite brilliant solo goal from James Keatings. The hard-working forward showed great skill by dancing past the Alloa defence before firing in a low shot to double the visitors' lead. It was a superb effort, one of the goals of the season.

It was all Hearts now and Osman Sow fired in an effort which was well saved by McDowall. Then Keatings fired in another effort which rattled the crossbar as Hearts threatened to go on the rampage. The only minor gripe for the Maroon Army was that their heroes were only two goals ahead at the interval. Half-time Alloa Athletic 0 Hearts 2

Hearts were still dominant in the second half. Therefore, it was something of a shock to the system when the Wasps pulled a goal back on the hour mark. As against Falkirk last week, the Hearts defence looked none too clever when Spence resisted a less than convincing challenge from Pallardo to head home. Hearts discomfort, however, only lasted five minutes. Simmons gave the ball away to Jamie Walker and the youngster thrust into the Alloa penalty box before firing the ball past McDowall. 3-1 to Hearts and the fire in the Alloa bellies had been doused.

Walker almost scored again after fine work from Eckersley but this time McDowall palmed the ball clear.

Hearts ended the game in fine style and scored a fourth goal in stoppage time when Callum Paterson headed home substitute Billy King's corner.

So Hearts answered their critics in style with a fine, dominant performance to stretch their lead over Rangers at the top of the SPFL Championship to 16 points. Two games now follow against bottom side Livingston. After the disappointment of last week, Hearts fans are delighted to see Robbie Neilson's side back to their best.
