MP calls on the UK government to support green energy

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Following the collapse of Pelamis, a renewable company in his constituency, local MP Mark Lazarowicz has used the opportunity of a speech made earlier today in Westminster to demand that the UK Government takes steps to really support the development of renewable power.

Mark Lazarowicz called for the Government to show consistency and vision to support renewable energy technologies such as offshore wind or marine power, both of which are currently lacking in its approach to the renewables industry.

After the debate Mark commented:

"I am concerned at a lack of consistency and vision from the Government in its approach to green energy: it has the potential to create skilled jobs for the future, not least here in Edinburgh.

"Support for less established technologies like offshore wind and marine energy in the early stages is vital but they are forced to compete for limited funding.

"The Government must show the vision to make their potential a reality otherwise these industries will go elsewhere and jobs with them."

Pelamis Marine Power based in Edinburgh recently went into administration as funding to develop its technology at commercial scale failed to materialise.

Mark was speaking in a debate on the Government's Contracts

for Difference — the new form of public funding for renewable technologies which is replacing the Renewables Obligation or ROC.

The MP explained that the funding is limited and divided between established technologies like onshore wind and solar and less established ones such as offshore wind and marine power with more of that budget likely to go to offshore wind.

Under Contracts for Difference companies are guaranteed a price — known as the strike price for the energy they generate. If the market price falls below that the Government will top up the difference and if it is higher then the energy companies must pay the difference to the Government.

Hibs sign Ivory Coast striker Franck Dja Djédjé

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Hibs today announced the arrival of former Ivory Coast under-23 striker Franck Dja Djédjé, who joins the club after agreeing an 18-month contract; subject to international clearance.

The 28-year-old forward moves to Easter Road following spells with leading clubs in France, the Ukraine, Norway and Belarus where he played for Paris St Germain, Grenoble, Strasbourg, Nice and Dinamo Minsk among others.

Dja Djédjé, who represented the Ivory Coast at the 2008 Olympics, told Hibs TV: "This is a brilliant club and I'm very excited about playing for Hibernian in Scotland.

"I've heard so many good things about Hibernian and everything seems right about this move, so I cannot wait for it all to begin."

Before signing, he sought the advice of his close friend, Sol Bamba, who recorded 80 appearances for Hibernian.

He added: "Sol is a close friend of mine and he told me all about Hibernian, Edinburgh and Scottish football.

"He told me that I should take this opportunity because I would enjoy playing here.

"My objective is to help the club to achieve promotion this year by scoring goals and helping the team."

Dja Djédjé, who will simply have Djédjé on the back of his shirt, will wear squad number 29 and will be available to play in Saturday's home match against Falkirk (10 January, kick off 3pm).

Head Coach Alan Stubbs says he is delighted that Djédjé is now on board and believes the Ivorian will add extra quality to the squad.

Stubbs said: "We're really excited that we've managed to get Franck on board — he will give us another dimension in attack.

"Franck is an intelligent player, who has got good movement, he is quick and he scores goals.

"We're delighted that we've managed to sign him and we welcome him into the squad."

Dja Djédjé's arrival follows the loan signing of Martin Boyle as Head Coach Stubbs aims to strengthen the first team squad for the second half of the Scottish Championship season.

Police appeal to trace missing teenagers



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Police in are appealing for information to help trace two 14-year-old girls who have been missing since Hogmanay.

Shanice Henry was last seen in the Moredun area of the city around 10.10am on Wednesday 31st December as she walked to the local shops.

Paris Rankin was seen in the Gracemount area around 12pm on the same day and was heading towards Princes Street.

Neither of these girls has been seen since and it is believed both had intended to attend the Hogmanay Street Party.

Both are known to frequent the city centre as well as the Wester Hailes and Gilmerton areas. Anyone who believes they have seen them since the 31st December is asked to come forward.

Shanice is described as white 5 ft 4ins tall with a slight build, long brown with light blonde hair extensions and is usually tied up, light blue eyes. She was last seen wearing a dark green parka style jacket with leather rim and fur hood, black leggings.

Paris is described as white, 5ft 2ins tall with a thin build, dark blonde hair tied in a bun, and was last seen wearing a black top, black and white leggings, green parka jacket and Nike trainers. She was also carrying a white furry bag.

Inspector Jonny Elliot said: "Both Shanice and Paris are very confident young women who know the Edinburgh area well and are happy to travel independently throughout the city.

"Nevertheless, it has been almost one week since they were last seen and we are eager to establish their whereabouts as soon as possible to ensure they are safe and well.

"We believe the girls may be together and would urge anyone who sees them or who has information that can assist us in locating them to contact police immediately.

"In addition I would ask Shanice and Paris to make contact with family, friends, or with ourselves to let us know they are alright."

#StrongerNorth takes actionin West Pilton Park



You may have heard of the #strongernorth initiative in North Edinburgh. It is a joint initiative among all organisations and citizens in the area to the a new approach to crime and community safety.

All information about community or police action to minimise anti-social behaviour is shared on social media using the #strongernorth hashtag.

Now West Pilton Park has been spruced up by a team of unpaid workers as part of the anti-crime campaign.

The campaign involves partners such as Police Scotland, and is a targeted effort to deal with crime and to make the community a safer and more pleasant place to be.

The park has been tidied up by the Community Payback Order team, with overgrown weeds and trees trimmed to make it a more attractive resource for people to use and for them to feel safer while they do so.

Councillor Day said: "I'm really pleased with the work carried out to the park by the Community Payback team — it shows how simple things like clearing overgrown, unkempt areas can make places feel safer and less intimidating.

"This is a continuation of all the good work being carried out as part of #StrongerNorth and follows the recent community clean-ups, which led to several tonnes of rubbish being removed.

"There is a real sense of community amongst the people living in the area and the goal of #StrongerNorth is to capture that feeling and to take actions like these that deal with the problems people have raised with us."

Inspector David Happs said: "#StrongerNorth is a key local priority for Police Scotland. We are fully supportive of the work undertaken by the Community Payback Team and we applaud efforts by Edinburgh Council to improve community safety in the Forth area.

"We are also pleased to see this enhancement to the local environment and believe it to be a key part of the Stronger North initiative. By clearing away this undergrowth, it will make the area significantly safer and it will hinder the disposal of stolen vehicles."

Three convicted of serious

organised crimes

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Three men pled guilty to drugs and counterfeit cash offences when they appeared at the High Court in Edinburgh earlier today.

A Police Scotland operation to tackle serious organised crime in Edinburgh uncovered crimes committed by Jason Forbes, Edmond Reid and Darren Handren who admitted being concerned in the supply of Class A and B drugs as well as counterfeit money.

Between October 2012 and May 2013 officers from the Organised Crime Counter Terrorism Unit carried out surveillance activity within the Inch and Niddrie areas of the city as part of Operation Harvester.

As a result, almost £10,000 in forged notes was seized from an address in Niddrie Marischal Crescent in January before one kilo of cannabis and 576 grams of diamorphine were recovered during a search of a property in Cumnor Crescent in May.

Reid and Handren were detained during the raid at Cumnor Crescent and were subsequently charged, while Forbes was arrested in September during follow up enquiries under Operation Harvester.

All three will be sentenced on 30th January 2015.

Detective Chief Inspector Colin Boyle said: "All of these men were responsible for the distribution of harmful drugs and counterfeit money into our communities and as part of Operation Harvester the OCCTU conducted a detailed investigation into their activities and movements over several months.

"The operation culminated in the recovery of large quantities

of drugs and cash and the subsequent arrest of these men who now face lengthy prison sentences for offences associated with organised crime.

"Forbes, Reid and Handren believed that the Inch and Niddrie areas were safe places for them to continue their illegal activity without reprise. However, thanks to vital information from the public, we have once again been able to demonstrate that there is no safe hiding place for criminals within Edinburgh.

"Whenever we receive intelligence from our communities relating to ongoing criminal activity we will investigate thoroughly and anyone found to be involved will be brought to justice.

New student housing planned on Leith Walk



Planning approval has been given for a proposal to deliver new student accommodation on a derelict site at Haddington Place in Edinburgh's New Town.

The £23m scheme, to be built by developer S Harrison, will provide 226 new student flats and 11,500 sq ft of retail and leisure space on the 0.5acre site at 34b — 40 Haddington Place on Leith Walk.

The developer claims that the project will create around 100 construction and associated jobs over the next 18 months and up to 35 permanent jobs when completed.

The disused site was acquired by the Yorkshire-based developer early in 2014. It was formerly part of Edinburgh's original Botanic Gardens and until recently housed the Botanic Cottage which is currently being reconstructed at the Royal Botanic Gardens.

S Harrison's mixed use scheme is designed to fit in with the existing architecture and will see 226 new student units constructed across five storeys above ground floor space which has been approved for retail, café and restaurant use. The design is stepped down towards the neighbouring Category B listed McDonald Road library building.

Harrison has been advised by Edinburgh-based Turley planning consultants during the planning process and has worked with East Kilbride architects ICA on the design.

Edinburgh solicitors Brodies have provided legal advice.

With archaeological investigations already well advanced, S Harrison expects to appoint a main contractor later this month. Groundwork will start on site in March 2015 and the scheme will be completed by September 2016.

During 2014 S Harrison used its strong financial position and cash reserves to acquire a number of new sites including the Haddington Place site and several in Yorkshire. The awardwinning developer, which has previously partnered with Edinburgh based Buccleuch Property on a major £35m civic scheme in York, is currently seeking other opportunities to invest in Scotland.

Commenting on the Haddington Place project, S Harrison Developments Ltd director David Clancy said:

"We have strengthened our delivery team in 2014 and are exploring a range of opportunities in Scotland covering a variety of sectors — hotels, leisure, student accommodation, retail and residential.

"This mixed use scheme in Edinburgh, on a challenging site within a sensitive area, is the kind of opportunity which plays to our strengths in design, planning and public engagement and which sees us deliver returns on sites which others may overlook."

Robi Lambie is the owner of Cairngorm Coffee Co in Frederick Street where they serve the most divine coffee and 'world famous' cheese sandwiches....

Who are you, and where did you come from?

I'm Robi, and I have laid my hat in a fairly scattered variety of places over the past few years, but come from the Highlands.

What is the business book you recommend that everyone should read?

Several of the books I've read are fairly specific to the area of business that Cairngorm Coffee Co. is related to. One in particular 'Wake Up & Smell The Profits' was an interesting read, however there are so many aspects of it that are painstakingly obvious and I was always advised when starting this project just to get stuck in and start learning. I feel that to a certain extent there is a lot of benefit of doing this and certain things can't be taught with words.

I did enjoy the ruthless, natural entrepreneurship in Duncan Bannatyne's 'Anyone Can Do It', and I'm currently reading 'The Virgin Way: How to Listen, Learn, Laugh and Lead' by Richard Branson which I'm hoping will give me some balance on having fun at work.

How do you spend your spare time?

I'm a big fan of going to the cinema, and enjoy attending concerts. Whenever I get time to take a break and go away I find myself led towards coffee shops to pick up ideas and try other great coffees.

What is your special area of Edinburgh, or special place in Edinburgh and why?

I love Stockbridge having lived in and around there a couple of times in the past. It's just a brilliant small community, and in some aspects probably reminds me of some of the High Streets of several small Highland towns I've grown up in. 

Volunteers required for Edinburgh College's home learning scheme

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Edinburgh College is looking for volunteers to teach English in people's homes, as part of a scheme to support people who cannot get to a classroom.

Edinburgh College's Home Learning Scheme opens up public life for refugees, immigrants and asylum seekers by giving them a better grasp of the English language and UK culture. Volunteers give weekly lessons over a period of nine months to students who cannot get to community-based classes for reasons such as health, childcare or working hours.

The Home Learning Scheme is run by the college's English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) department, which provides English lessons at all levels within the college and out in the community.

One of the longest-serving volunteers at the college is Ruth Macnamara, who has been working as a home tutor since 1979. In that time she has tutored 30 people from around the world, from Pakistan, Turkey, Thailand, Hong Kong, Bosnia, Portugal, Vietnam and Israel.

Ruth's current student is a young mother from Pakistan, Naima, who had some English skills when she came to Scotland but was unprepared for dealing with the Scottish accent. They have worked together for three years and Naima has subsequently passed her driving theory test and the English language test necessary to apply for citizenship. Lessons have included a baking session and a field trip to Waverly Station, John Lewis and Jenners.

Ruth said: "Over the years the tutor scheme has given me a great deal of pleasure and I can think of few other opportunities to help people in such a direct fashion. The scheme benefits the students, the tutors and the whole community in a wide range of ways. I have met many lovely people, learned a lot about places I have never visited and eaten a fantastic selection of dishes. I would urge anyone with a little time to spare to give it a go — it is often the most rewarding thing I do in a day.

"I recently bumped into a former student, a Thai lady, who was excited to tell me that she now has her own business. When she arrived in Scotland, she had almost no English and she was full of praise for the ESOL scheme and the opportunities it gave her."

Naima said how much she is enjoying her lessons: "I feel much more confident talking to my children's teachers and going to

the doctor. I can explain what the problems are. I am very happy that I can now apply for UK citizenship. There are no English classes in my area so home lessons with Ruth are very important to me."

Jean Howat, the Home Learning coordinator and ESOL lecturer at the college, said: "Learning English with the Home Learning Scheme not only helps our students become more involved in the community and reduces their possible isolation but may also help them to move on to ESOL classes, to employment or to vocational courses.

"The volunteer ESOL tutor role would suit those who have an interest in language and good communication skills. Teaching experience is not essential but can be useful, and it is certainly a good way of gaining teaching experience."

Volunteers are fully trained by the college's ESOL staff. They receive initial training and follow-up training days, and ongoing support throughout the scheme from a qualified lecturer. Training includes practical teaching tips, advice on intercultural communication and awareness of cultural sensitivities and the feelings of an adult student. Volunteers also gain ESOL teaching experience and will be given references after six months of successful tutoring. This initial training can be completed in 20 hours followed by weekly lessons for around nine months, or 33 lessons.

The Scottish Government has promised £2m of funding to make available an extra 250 places for people to start teacher training next year has been announced.

The planned increase of 150 primary and 100 secondary teaching places will bring the total teaching university intake to around 3,230 for 2015/16, a rise for the fourth year in a row.

This breaks down as:

- 1,170 post-graduate primary places, up 150 since last year
- 710 undergraduate primary places
- 1,165 secondary places, up 100 since last year
- 185 undergraduate secondary places

It follows a further increase, of almost 8,000, in primary school pupils this year and the lowest teacher claimant count rate in the UK.

Education Secretary Angela Constance said:

"This Government has been successful at addressing teacher unemployment and stabilising teacher numbers over the last few years.

"As we look to the future, we are providing extra funds for a further planned increase in available places in initial teacher training for the fourth year in a row. The additional £2 million investment to support a further 250 teacher training places next year comes against a backdrop of a 10 per cent fall in our budget since the current UK Government took office.

"We want our schools to have the right number of teachers with the right skills to ensure our young people continue to benefit from Scotland's world-class education system.

"Our priority is to maintain teacher numbers in line with pupil intake. In the coming year we will also work with universities to address issues attracting student teachers for hard to recruit and priority subjects such as maths, physics and languages."

Rugby — Watsonians v Marr, BT National League, Div. 1

Watsonians crush Marr's hopes in postponed match



Despite fielding a side which bore virtually no relationship to that in the programme — or their website — Watsonians put in a towering performance against Marr at the weekend, running in seven tries to Marr's two to take an emphatic win in the BT National League's first division, the match — starting in daylight and finishing under floods — having been postponed from before Christmas due to a frozen pitch.

Hopes from the 'Sonians side of things were decidedly downbeat when the team, with more than a few first team regulars missing in action, was announced and the first 15 minutes of play tended to support the gloom.

Marr were well in control and had two early penalty awards — one of which was missed — to take a 3-0 lead. Just before the 15 minute mark, however, Watsonians gained possession in their own half and together with some neat handling and offloading, built an overlap which allowed winger, Ben Robbins to outflank the defence and score under the posts. With the kick seen over from No. 10, Chad Northcott, the home side were 7-3 ahead.

Unfortunately, as is the way, Marr struck back almost immediately with another penalty from Rory McGee to bring them to within a point at 7-6.

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But within a couple of minutes, Watsonians had extended their lead again with a fine try. Gaining possession of the ball deep in his own half, centre, Andrew Chalmers sprinted, dummied and side-stepped his way through the Marr defence to touch down on the left of the posts. Northcott missed the kick so the score was now 12-6.

Marr then got back on the horse and took the game to Watsonians. They pushed the Myreside men back and pinned them inside their 22. They did cross the line, but the referee deemed the ball held up, so awarded a scrum. The next couple of minutes saw the Marr scrum on top, with the home side losing a man to the bin. Eventually the ref tired of the collapsing scrums and warded the visitors a penalty try under the posts. McGee knocked the kick over and Marr were back in the lead 13-12.

And then it all fell to pieces for the men from Troon. A few minutes from half time, Marr were turned over from a ruck and Watsonians quickly moved

into the offensive. Again the ball was shifted along line, with Northcott taking the ball well into the Marr half. Then that man Chalmers — Man-of-the-Match — popped up on the outside for the final pass down the right to score his second. Northcott was successful with the boot this time and the teams went into the break at 19-13.

The second half saw the floodgates open as scores rained in on Marr from all angles. The first was after less than a minute of play when full back, Montgomery fought off a couple of tackles to score his contribution. Next score was a penalty from Chalmers (27-13), then a try from No. 20 Barry (plus Chalmer's kick, 34-13), another Chalmers penalty (37-13), No. 2, Jake Kerr — very nice dummy and side-step from a front row — (42-13) and yet another Chalmers kick — how did he get man of the match....? — (45-13). Then there was a slight blip in proceedings as Marr got their act together for a few minutes and scored a nice try on the right through No. 14, Scott Bickerstaff (45-18).

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Watsonians final try was down the right from Mr. Barry — The Watsonians website was no more help with the team — with his second for that impressive 50-18 final score.

Marr, in the second half were not the team they were in the first and were turned over on many occasions and lost the ball on others, but this shouldn't take anything away from, what was suggested to be, a second string Watsonians' side who performed very well.

Fire closes Thistle Street this afternoon

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Part of Thistle Street between Hanover Street and Frederick Street was closed for most of this afternoon following discovery of a fire in a restaurant there.

Earlier today firefighters were called to the restaurant El Cartel in Thistle Street which had just opened again recently after renovation where a fire was reported.

Group Commander of Scottish Fire and Rescue Service, Tom McGrath told The Edinburgh Reporter: "The kitchen is on the ground floor of the property and crews carried out a really quick job of bringing the fire under control under extreme conditions. It was very hot and smoky. They managed by their quick actions to prevent the fire from spreading to other adjacent properties."

















The fire was already extinguished when The Edinburgh Reporter arrived on the scene. Fire Investigation had arrived and they were just about to have a look for the likely cause of the fire. There is nothing to suggest at this time that this is a suspicious fire so the fire investigation officers are examining the interior for the cause of an accidental fire. Fire crews had already brought some debris out on to the street.

There were no casualties involved in the fire and all persons in the building have been accounted for.

Group Commander Tom McGrath confirmed that they are now in conversation with the occupier of the shop as well as the owner of the building.

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Alan Stubbs proud of team's

performance in Edinburgh derby

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Hibs' Head Coach Alan Stubbs was proud of his players' performance in yesterday's Edinburgh derby at Tynecastle.

The Easter Road side took the lead midway through the first half when Jason Cummings (pictured)latched onto a superb pass from Scott Allan but Hearts fought back and equalised just before the break with a stunning strike from Jamie Walker.

Hibs almost grabbed a winner near the end when Callum Booth, who replaced the injured David Gray at half time, picked out new on-loan signing Martin Boyle at the near post but his effort was blocked by the Hearts defence.

With Queen of the South beating Livington, Hibs remain in third position on goal difference, three points in front of next week's opponents Falkirk.

Hearts now look certain to win the league, sitting 13 points ahead of second place Rangers who beat Dumbarton 3-1 at Ibrox.

After the game, Stubbs told Hibs' TV: "I thought the players were great — I was proud of the performance.

"You only have to look at the ovation the players received from our fans; we came to Tynecastle — which is an intimidating place — and played confidently throughout.

"Hopefully we are giving the fans a team they can be proud of.

"I said before the game to the players that I would hate to see us come to Tynecastle and just try to nick a point.

"We wanted to come here and have a good go at them. The

confidence is sky high at this moment in time.

"I thought we completely bossed it in the first half, but then their player scores a great goal to bring them back into the game.

"Even in the second half, they came into the game a touch, but I still felt we were the better team.

"We were a real threat when we attacked and we were inches away from adding a second."

Rugby - Visser says more is needed in attack despite 1872 Cup triumph

Edinburgh secured the 1872 Cup for the first time in six years with a 20-8 victory over Glasgow Warriors at BT Murrayfield on Friday.

Finn Russell opened the scoring for Glasgow before Sam Hildalgo-Clyne put Edinburgh in front with two kicks from the tee. Two tries from winger Tim Visser helped the hosts move further ahead and Edinburgh led comfortably at the break, 20-3. Glasgow fought back in the second period through an opportunistic try from Niko Matawalu, but Edinburgh held on in the dying minutes to secure a famous win.

Despite scoring a brace of tries in first half, Visser emphasised the need for a stronger Edinburgh attack, in order to create more scoring opportunities, something the Scottish internationalist believes has been lacking for some time.

"I think this is obviously a derby that has been hugely emotional over the years, one that I've never been able to win. In my six years here, it's the first time I've been able to win, so that's memorable", said Visser. "A lot of my tries [in the past] have simply been finishing off what other people have created, and I don't think we're creating enough. That's something we need to improve on as a team."

"We've been hugely defensively focused, something we've been very poor at in the past. Now we're very good at defending but we need to develop our attacking game I think", he added.

Team-mate Matt Scott (pictured above) echoed Visser's sentiments post-match, and while bemoaning the lack of attacking threat from both sides, the centre was happy to test his own game through a new partnership with Kiwi Phil Burleigh.

"He's the type of player I'd like to play with, he's a good distributer and he's a smart player as well so I look forward to getting a string of games together with him. I defend at 13 so it's good for the development of my game as it's a tougher position to defend; you've got more decisions to make with decoy runners and speedy guys. I'm learning a lot and could seamlessly go back to 12."

With the morale-boosting victory, Edinburgh have moved up one spot to joint seventh in the Guinness PRO12. Both Visser and Scott as well as head coach Alan Solomons know that to achieve automatic qualification for next season's European Champions Cup, a top six finishing position is essential.

"We have a tough job ahead of us, we've always said our aim is to try and make the top six. We've got a massive game next weekend, Connacht are playing really well, unbeaten at the Sportsground", said Solomons.

Visser concurred with his coach, stating that Connacht are now a force to be reckoned with.

"They are not the team they used to be anymore so there are no easy games anymore in this League. It's going to be a tough game but we can take this momentum forward to that I think."

For Scott, the message was simple enough: "In the context of our season, getting into the top six, it's a game we must win."

Edinburgh face Galway side Connacht next Friday at the Sportsground, kick-off 19:35 GMT.

Jason Cummings had opened the scoring for Hibs midway through the first half but Jamie Walker produced a stunning strike to equalise just before the break. Both team had chances in the second half but the game finished all square.

Hibs' Head Coach Alan Stubbs kept faith with the same starting XI that hammered Rangers 4-0 last Saturday, with new on-loan signing Martin Boyle on the bench alongside Dylan McGeouch who returned to the squad following a period on the sidelines due to injury.

A bad mistake by Hearts' defender Alim Ozturk, who scored a 35 yard screamer in the last Edinburgh Derby allowed Cummings a clean shot on goal but Neil Alexander did well to save his effort.

Hibs dominated possession in the early stages without causing too many problems as the over fussy referee seemed to penalise every challenge.

Hibs eventually took a deserved lead midway through the first half when Scott Allan's inch perfect cross was met by Cummings who calmly slotted the ball home despite the attention of Ozturk.

The youngster was then booked for his celebration in front of the Gorgie Road end.

The teenager who had been on Hearts' books as a youngster almost added a second with a header from a Lewis Sevenson cross but his effort flew inches past the post with Alexander helpless.

Hearts equalised shortly before the break when Walker cut in from the left before sending a powerful drive past Mark Oxley into the corner of the net.

Callum Booth replaced David Gray at half time and Hearts started the second half strongly.

Callum Paterson and Sam Ncholson both went close from headers but it was Hibs who ended the game looking the team more

likely to score,

With five minutes remaining Booth's low cross was met by Boyle but a superb last ditch tackle from Ozturk prevented the striker from writing his name in the history books and the ball was cleared.

The result leaves Hibs 19 points behind Hearts in the title race.

Rugby — Edinburgh v Glasgow, Guinness PRO12 and 1872 Cup

12 point margin secures narrow 1872 Cup win for Edinburgh



Trailing by 10 points going into Friday night's second leg of the 1872 Cup series, Edinburgh looked to be facing an uphill struggle against the current Guinness PRO12 second placed side, Glasgow Warriors.

A fairly scrappy first leg in Glasgow resulted in a 16-6 victory for the home side, the match only really coming to life with a try for the Warriors from Josh Strauss. Initiated by Sean Lamont steamrolling over Tom Brown on the wing, Strauss was on hand to receive the final pass which put the lock over for the only try of the match. Two penalties from Edinburgh and three penalties and the conversion for Glasgow completed the scoreline, which would carry over — for the purposes of the Cup match-up alone — to BT Murrayfield.

Edinburgh flew out of the blocks from the start and were close to the opening score when Dougie Fife broke through the defence only to be pulled up a couple of metres out. A few minutes later, Fife was lucky to escape a yellow from referee, Nigel Owens. Chasing a clearing kick from Greg Tonks — who, incidentally, had a nightmare of a match by his standards — he 'omitted' to take off to challenge Alex Dunbar and ran straight through the centre while he was in the air. Somehow, Owens decided it was a fair challenge and he stayed on the pitch.

However, a short time after that incident, Finn Russell opened the scoring for Glasgow with a penalty following an Edinburgh scrum infringement. 3-0 to the visitors. On the 14 minute mark, Edinburgh gathered the ball from their own penalty lineout and set up a maul. The forwards rolled and rumbled up to within a metre or so of the line but Glasgow turned them over and cleared the ball upfield. Returning the ball into the Glasgow half, the home side then won a penalty of their own, which Sam Hidalgo-Clyne scored to draw the sides level at 3-3. He then followed this up around 10 minutes later to take the lead for Edinburgh, 6-3.

With Glasgow definitely on the back foot and playing well below par, another Edinburgh foray ended with Tim Visser scoring the first of his two tries on the night. Edinburgh secured the ball from a fairly poor clearance kick from scrum- half, Niko Matawalu, and attacked down the left side. With the defence pulled over, a couple of quick passes found Visser off his wing, in the centre, and he had a clear run in to touch down on the right. Hidalgo-Clyne slotted home the conversion and Edinburgh found themselves 10 points clear and level on aggregate with

Following the restart, Glasgow managed to establish themselves just outside the Edinburgh 22, but couldn't find a way through the defence and were going from side to side trying to establish a gap. Unfortunately, for them, a wide pass from Finn Russell was intercepted by Visser and with nobody in front of him, the Dutch flyer galloped the length of the pitch to dive in under the posts. Hidalgo-Clyne followed this up with the conversion and it was 20-3 to the home side with six minutes of the half remaining.

Two minutes into the second half and it looked like the 'real' Glasgow had turned up. Forcing the play into Edinburgh's 22, a line out won the ball for the visitors and the unpredictable — at all points of the scale — Matawalu kicked the ball through the pile of forwards and chased after it. Seeing the ball late, Edinburgh's Jack Cuthbert lost his footing and Matawalu beat the full back to the ball for the try. Russell missed the conversion so the score now stood at 20-8.

And, with more than 35 minutes still to play, that was the final score. Both sides had chances — Glasgow in the try department and Edinburgh with a couple of missed penalties — but overall the second half was a bit of a damp squib. The home side probably had the better of it, but with a few seconds to go they nearly threw the Cup away. Choosing to play safe with a short penalty kick to touch in their own half — and the lineout had been on fire all game, so what could possibly go wrong?! — Edinburgh then lost the ball to Glasgow who saw a chance to pull a few points back. However, it wasn't to be and the hosts saw the ball off the field to win both the match and the 1872 Cup, 20-8 and 26-24 respectively.

Edinburgh remain in eighth in the Guinness PRO12, level on 24 points with Scarlets, but the loss meant that Glasgow failed to top the table and remain in second to the Ospreys with 39 points to their 40.

The Scottish Parliament : a year in numbers

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The Scottish Parliament has now been in existence for 15 years. To mark the end of its fifteenth year Holyrood has announced the significant numbers of shortbread and scones served up to visitors to its cafe over the last twelve months:

These are the statistics that made up the Parliament over the past twelve months:

- This year included the introduction of 14 Bills, with 19 receiving Royal Assent, including the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act, Marriage and Civil Partnership (Scotland) Act, Disabled Persons' Parking Badges (Scotland) Act and Historic Environment Scotland Act.
- The Great Tapestry of Scotland proved a huge draw, with visitor numbers showing a 10,000 increase in the months of June, July and August, compared to 2013. In total more than 85,000 visitors flocked to see the Tapestry in the summer of 2014.
- The Great Tapestry of Scotland was also a hit at the Parliament's shop with 2,280 Great Tapestry books and 2,940 postcards flying off the shelves.

- The Scottish Parliament hosted 18 major events, including The Queen's Baton Relay (the main photo shows the Presiding Officer welcoming Lynne McNicoll of Edinburgh charity It's Good 2 Give along with Gavin Hastings into the main chamber), The Festival of Politics 2014 and the St Andrew's Day Debate. The year was rounded off in traditional style with the Parliament's annual Christmas Carol Service.
- The Parliament welcomed 449 school sessions to Holyrood, with 14,552 pupils taking part in a wide range of activities, including learning more about how the Parliament works and meeting MSPs.
- Parliament education staff travelled the length and breadth

of Scotland, delivering 518 sessions in schools to 12,814 pupils.

- Parliament Days were held in February, November and December this year, with Dumbarton, Fort William and Levenmouth taking centre stage. Parliamentary Committees invited the public to attend held external meetings, scrutinising the work of Government and the Presiding Officer discovered more about the towns, visiting a range of inspiring local groups, people and projects.
- The Parliament's switchboard took nearly 41,331 telephone calls, our Public Information and Publications team answered more than 5,625 enquiries and produced 136,785 leaflets requested or picked up at Holyrood.
- And finally, in the Scottish Parliament's public café, visitors enjoyed more than 23,837 cups of coffee and 15,143 cups of tea. More than 8,500 sandwiches were sold, 3,405 bowls of soup and of course more than 4,166 scones and 8,209 pieces of shortbread.

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
