Hibs' midfielder Scott Allan is determined to put together another string of results with a view to climbing the table and overtaking Queen of the South and Rangers in the Championship.

"I was delighted that we got the three points against Alloa after last week's defeat and that we got back to winning ways.

"Obviously it was great to get a good result and a clean sheet in front of our own fans. I'm getting fitter and getting back to playing the way that I used to play. That's been the main thing for me. I missed out on a pre-season, so it has taken longer than expected. But I'm starting to feel like myself again."

### Man jailed for 12 years for crimes against women

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Kevin Storey has today been jailed at the High Court in Edinburgh for a number of crimes against women.

Storey was sentenced to spend 12-years in prison after being convicted in November for the offences, which took place over a 20-year period.

The 48-year-old was a serving police officer when many of these offences were committed, however, he is no longer employed by Police Scotland.

Police Scotland has reiterated its commitment to identifying domestic abusers and bringing them to justice.

Chief Superintendent Gill Imery, Commander of the Lothians and Scottish Borders Division of Police Scotland, where Storey served as a Sergeant, said: "The perpetration of these sort of crimes can never be tolerated and it is of even greater shock and disappointment when the offender is a police officer.

"Kevin Storey's complete contempt and disregard for his victims shows him to be a callous individual whose actions have fallen significantly short of the high standards of professional behaviour we expect as an organisation.

"There is no place for domestic abuse and associated offences within our communities and we will continue to use all resources at our disposal to identify those responsible and bring them to justice.

"The public within the Lothians and Scottish Borders Division, and throughout Scotland can rest assured that we will continue to treat all reports of domestic abuse with the utmost seriousness and conduct a through investigation into the matter, regardless of how challenging or sensitive the issue may be."

Detective Chief Inspector Sam McCluskey, of the Domestic Abuse Task Force, once again paid tribute to the courage of the women who came forward and reported Storey's crimes.

She said: "Over the course of two decades Kevin Storey systematically targeted and abused various women and from the onset of our investigation, in addition to bringing them justice, their safety and wellbeing was at the heart of our approach

"We utilised various resources and specialist investigators throughout this enquiry to uncover the extent of Storey's crimes and ensure that we managed to secure all available evidence to enable us to report his offending.

"Each of his victims has shown great strength in coming forward to report the offences and had it not been for their courage, we may not have been able to fully comprehend the level of violence Storey was capable of.

"Today's sentence should send a very clear message that whoever you are, domestic abuse is simply not acceptable and will not be tolerated. Whenever crimes of this nature are reported to us, Police Scotland and the Domestic Abuse Task Force will endeavour to bring perpetrators to justice using every means possible."

# Police launch domestic abuse campaign



Police have today launched their annual campaign to tackle domestic abuse during the festive season.

As part of Police Scotland's national commitment to tackling domestic abuse, officers within the Capital will run a nine-day initiative aimed at targeting perpetrators and supporting victims.

Between 15th and 24th December police will carry out proactive bail checks on individuals currently on release for domestic abuse offences to ensure they are adhering to the terms of their bail. Anyone found to be in breach of these conditions will be arrested immediately.

In addition, officers from the Domestic Abuse Investigation Unit will issue a letter to a number of people within the city who are currently subject to a live warrant for domestic abuse.

Those who receive a letter will be advised to make contact with police immediately to resolve their warrants or face further police action.

A 'day of action' will then be undertaken on Wednesday 17th December to identify and arrest anyone who fails to settle the terms of their warrant.

Edinburgh Division's Facebook page and the seven Twitter pages across the city will be used throughout the campaign to provide updates on police action, results and to raise

awareness about the issue of domestic abuse.

Daily posts on social media will contain information about the partner agencies that work with Police Scotland in Edinburgh and will start on Monday 15th December until the 24th December.

Superintendent Liz McAinsh said: "We are committed to tackling domestic abuse and are dedicating more officers to this issue over the festive period.

"We see a rise in reported incidents at this time, many that are fuelled by too much alcohol, so in addition to carrying out enforcement activity we are working with social work and health colleagues to ensure appropriate assistance is provided to partners and families.

"Our message is that we will not tolerate domestic abuse or violence in any form and will continue to lock up those responsible and bring them to justice. I would ask people to help by reporting concerns they see and hear to us."

Councillor Ricky Henderson, Convener of Health, Social Care and Housing, said: "There are a shocking 5,500 reported cases of domestic abuse in Edinburgh each year, but we know that the real figure is likely to be significantly higher, once you add in all the incidences which go un-reported.

"Nobody should have to suffer domestic abuse at any time of year. We want to reach out to those affected by domestic abuse, or anyone who has concerns about others who are suffering.

"I would urge people to drink sensibly over the festive season and to consider how their behaviour affects their loved ones. We will continue to work closely with Police Scotland and other partner organisations to protect vulnerable families and individuals."

The Chairman of Edinburgh Direct Aid has written to The Edinburgh Reporter asking for some urgent help.

I am writing to let you know that we are once again collecting warm winter clothes, especially padded jackets and waterproof boots, for the Syrian refugees in Arsal in the Lebanon. They are facing a second winter in camps at an altitude of over 5000 feet in appalling conditions: in August the Lebanese army fought a battle there to repel militants from Isis and Al Nusrah. In the fallout many tents were burned, there were upwards of 30 deaths amongst the refugees, and many more lost such possessions as they had had. We plan to send off a full shipping container of aid as soon as possible.

EDA volunteers Maggie and Denis are just back from Lebanon where they went to try to source goods locally for immediate delivery to the families most in need. With the help of Dar Al Fatwa, the main Lebanese Aid agency, they were able to buy nearly 1000 warm winter jackets, and 1000 pairs of lined

waterproof boots at very favourable rates. Delivering them was a problem because whenever fighting flares between the Lebanese army and the militants, or when there are dreadful events like the beheading of Lebanese soldiers, the army imposes tight security and closes the approaches to Arsal. Nevertheless. during a few days of relative calm the EDA volunteers were able to deliver the boots and jackets into Arsal and personally check and initiate arrangements for distribution. (It helped that British army engineers have recently built a line of fortified observation posts to help protect nearby villages: often when soldiers manning the checkpoints realise that they were Brits, smiles broke out, and they were waved through — its nice to be popular for a change!)

The container-load of goods from Edinburgh will follow-on as soon as possible.

For those who live nearby, our warehouse at 16a West Harbour Rd, EH5 1PN will be open for donations of clothes etc., Wednesdays and Saturdays from 11:00 am to 3:00 pm. We will get the container away as soon as we can — if you can bring anything in, or collect anything during the coming week, we would be doubly grateful

The team at Save Stockbridge say they are taking this action so that local people can be made aware of the current situation and participate in what they describe as 'an open deliberation'.

Swimming in lane seven for the final Renwick set off quickly but was playing catch up with Belgian swimmer, Emmanuel Vanluchene, until the final 25m when he made his move. The problem for Renwick was that Calum Jarvis (Bath)

also made a move and the race was really on.

In fact nothing could separate Renwick and Jarvis and both touched home in 1:44.19 to share the honours. Vanluchene settled for bronze in 1:44.36.

Speaking after the race Renwick was happy with the way he had performed and said,

"I thought that was a solid swim. It comes at the end of a three-day meet and I was also competing in the States last week so I was beginning to feel tired at the end.

"My move to Stirling has been really positive for my swimming. I'm really addressing some weaknesses I had in training and I'm in with a great group of guys."

#### **Professional Rugby**

#### Nelson Mandela Bay Sevens

Despite two resilient performances today and reaching the Plate semi-finals, Scotland 7s were unable to record a victory on day two at the Nelson Mandela Bay 7s. The team did however, climb up another position, to eighth in the circuit standings. On day two, of the third leg of the World Series, Scotland lost out to Argentina in a very close match that was decided in extra-time. Argentina capitalised on Scotland's errors and won 24-19. This was then followed by a defeat to USA, which ended, 26-19.

Head Coach, Calum MacRae, said: "We spoke as a group about backing up the performances from Dubai and qualifying for the Cup again. That has been achieved and sees us move into the top eight, on the circuit. "We have areas to improve on and will continue to work hard between now and Wellington. The experiences our rookie players, such as Nyle [Godsmark], Damien [Hoyland] and Gavin [Lowe], gained the past two weeks have been invaluable".

"We were down to nine players today, which meant everyone who was fit had to roll up their sleeves. I'm proud of the heart they all showed. A lot of the tries we scored were top drawer. We moved defences around, until we unlocked them and we put into practice what we've been working on in training. This is something the guys can take confidence from looking forward to Wellington."

It was a heartbreaking result for the Scots in the quarter-final, as they looked to qualify for their fourth ever Cup semi-final in a HSBC Sevens World Series tournament. The Scots were leading with five minutes to go, 19-12 following tries from James Johnstone, in the first-half and then from Colin Gregor and Damien Hoyland in the second period. However, their opponents capitalised on mistakes and levelled the match as the clock counted down, through Santiago Ordero. The conversion here was imperative and Javier Rojas Alvarez struck it with ease. Things looked up as Scotland opted to take the extra-time restart and won the kick, but a series of forced errors saw Francisco Merello make a break and score the sudden-death try.

Against USA, Scotland took an early lead through Hoyland, who has taken to the short-game very well over the past two weekends, in Dubai and South Africa. This was highlighted by the Edinburgh Rugby winger's finishing ability. He scored four tries in PE. However, their opponents bounced back and went in at the break, 12-5 up, following tries from former Glasgow Warrior, Carlin Isles and Madison Hughes. At the beginning of the second-half Scotland levelled the scores with Johnstone crossing the whitewash, but unfortunately USA turned the contest up a gear and a further two tries followed from Isles and Martin Iosefo, enough to seal the win. Gregor managed to score a third Scotland try in the last play of the game, but it was too little too late. Gregor converted two of the three tries against USA.

Before his injury, Forster was part of a back 3 system along with Paul Hanlon and Liam Fontaine however since then the eam have resorted to a more traditional back 4.

Last season Forster was used at right back by Terry Butcher and ironically that position may be available again after David Gray limped off with a groin injury yesterday.

Speaking to Hibs TV's Cliff Pike during the half-time show of the Alloa broadcast, Forster said: "I'm happy to say that I'm now back in training and I'm feeling good and strong.

"The manager may want me to play a couple of under-20 games in

order to get peroperly back up to speed.

"We'll have to wait and see, but I've spoken with the fitness and medical team and hopefully I'll get some gametime with the under-20s.

"Hopefully if there are no hiccups and I'll be back with the first team as soon as possible."

### Robbery at Livingston betting shop



Police in West Lothian are appealing for witnesses to a betting shop robbery in Livingston last night.

The incident took place at Ladbrokes in Carmondean, about 9.20pm, when a four-figure sum of money was stolen.

A member of staff and two customers were in the shop when a man entered and threatened the employee with a weapon while demanding money.

He then ran from the shop in an unknown direction.

The suspect is described as white, approximately 5 feet 8 inches tall, medium build and wearing gloves, black trainers and baggy light grey jogging bottoms.

He was also wearing a light blue 'puffa style' hooded jacket, which had distinctive diamond pattern stitching, with the hood worn up.

Inquiries are being carried out in the area and officers are working to source any available CCTV footage from nearby premises.

Detective Constable Debbie Trotter, who is leading the investigation, said: "We are keen to speak to anyone who may have been in the area at the time, or saw the suspect.

"Thankfully, nobody was hurt during the robbery, however the member of staff has been badly shaken by the incident, as this was a frightening experience for them.

"There are a number of routes the thief could have taken after leaving the betting shop , and so I am appealing to members of the public for any information they may have as to who might have been responsible."

### Top 5 films of 2014 — a personal selection



Having moved back into Edinburgh from the wilds of the countryside in February, I've seen more films in past ten months than I'd managed in the previous ten years. The lovely **Cameo Cinema** is now on my doorstep, the **Filmhouse** is not far away, and I recently discovered the fabulously comfortable seats at the **Odeon** in Lothian Road. Although I have enjoyed

just about everything I've seen, certain films stand out.

Here then is my very personal top five for 2014:

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### 5 Chef

Carl's life goes into meltdown when a famous food blogger pans his cooking — cooking which he himself abhors, but has been made to produce by his restaurateur boss (**Dustin Hoffman**). Carl is played by **Jon Favreau**, also the film's producer and director.

Overworked, frustrated and fed up, he loses his temper in spectacular fashion — first on Twitter and then in the flesh — and, in the 21st century way of things, his performance goes viral; soon patience is not the only thing he's lacking. Out of work and out of luck, he's persuaded by his glamorous exwife to do up an old food truck, and take off on a road trip across the US, accompanied by his tech-savvy son and a former colleague, bringing Cuban street food to the masses. *Chef* may be a bit predictable, but it's a great feelgood film with some hilarious scenes and a few edge-of-the-seat moments (chefs do use a lot of knives…). And be warned: it'll make you very hungry.

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**4 20 Feet From Stardom** (yes, this was made in 2013 but I only saw it this year..and that's good enough for me).

I've always thought it would be cool to be a backing singer; all that harmonising and synchronised swaying, none of the grief. 20 Feet From Stardom didn't disabuse me of this notion, even though some of the early singers interviewed in this excellent film documentary have had little credit for

significant contributions to major hits. The soundtrack is of course fabulous, and the interviews with, and archive footage of, David Bowie, Bruce Springsteen, Mick Jagger and co are fascinating — but the real stars are the singers, most of them black women who have toiled away in the background for years, helping the mega-famous on their routes to stardom. Clayton, Darlene Love, Patti Austin - they're all here, all those women you've heard a million times but never actually heard of, though one whose name may be more familiar is Lisa Fischer, backing singer for the Stones and now a highly respected artist in her own right — a phenomenal voice, a much nicer woman than many who've made it to the very top. This film is a mixture of celebration and commiseration, but you'll still come out singing — and maybe wishing that you were there, twenty feet from the spotlight, twenty miles from fame.



### 3 Pride

Pride has deservedly just been named best film at the British Independent Film Awards, with Imelda Staunton winning Best Actress and Andrew Scott Best Actor for their roles. It's about the 1984 miners' strike and the struggle for gay rights — two campaigns which at first have little in common, until gay activist Mark Ashton (Ben Schenetzer) sees the parallels in their situations and decides to rally support for a pit village in the Dulais valley. The ensuing friendship (and in one case the antagonism) between the two communities is a joy to watch, the more so because every character is so well developed and every actor excels. Few are without doubts, all have fears for the future — the Londoners, centering on Gay's The Word bookshop, face threats not only from Section 28 but also the advent of AIDS; the miners' families are fighting for their identity as much as for their jobs — their own form of

pride. Those of my advanced age can remember these events as if they were yesterday, but for younger people they are history — this film is an education for them, and a wonderfully entertaining story for us all (don't miss **Dominic West** strutting his disco stuff at the miners' fundraising dance). *Pride* is based on a true story.

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2 We Are The Best! (Vi ar Bast!) (another one made in 2013, but which only arrived at the Cameo this year)

Two schoolgirl rebels (Mira Barkhammar and Mira Grosin) in 1980's Stockholm decide to start a band. You may think you know the end already — they become famous, are feted as the new Spice Girls, and meet their handsome princes — tah-dah! Except they don't. Discovering that a classmate (Liv LeMoyne) one they would normally discount as a religious geek — is a brilliant guitar player, they rope her in and rehearse their ear-splitting racket in one another's houses, each of which presents a different picture of modern family life. Gauche, bolshi and occasionally vulnerable, the girls fall out, have fun, deal with their wayward middle-aged parents and fight their own corners at school, eventually going on a road trip with their brilliantly dreadful guidance teacher to the final of a youth band competition. I loved this film; it's a funny, moving and ultimately very satisfying celebration of difference. The Princess Diaries it is not.

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### 1 From Scotland With Love

I'm not usually a fan of films with no words; at the age of 5 I disappointed my parents by being bored to tears by Fantasia

(which, like most adults, they thought brilliant) and I have to admit that Koyaanisgatsi sent me to sleep — but From Scotland With Love is a masterpiece. It's a documentary made up entirely of film clips from the Scottish Screen Archive and the National Library of Scotland, with a soundtrack by King Creosote (Kenny Anderson), and it moves from the early 1900s the First World War, the Glasgow rent strikes and the heyday of the Clyde shipyards - right through to the 1960s, with family days at the seaside and dancing at the Barrowlands. In between there are children trying on gas masks, fishing boats sailing out of northern harbours, Highlanders cutting peat, women working in factories — and abandoned farmhouses, empty crofts, and men emigrating to Canada. Sadness, tragedy — but also lots and lots of fun; this is a film about ordinary Scottish people living their busy, wonderful lives. It's the best film I've seen this year; it may be the best film I'll see this decade.

So those are my choices — do share yours; whether they are art house films, romcoms or animations, we want to know! And if you're looking for a present for an Edinburgh-based friend, my suggestion is to buy them a membership of one of the independent cinemas. They'll get cheaper tickets, invitations to free and special screenings, plus the warm glow of knowing that they're supporting the local arts scene. Much better than socks and much better for you than sweeties....

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# Alan Stubbs' reaction to Alloa victory

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Hibs' Head Coach Alan Stubbs was delighted with the patience shown by his players durng yesterday's 2-0 home win over Alloa Athletic at Easter Road.

The win keeps Hibs in the play off places, two points ahead of Falkirk and three behind Queen of the South who beat Rangers on Friday night.

After the game Stubbs told Hibs' TV: "Patience is always the key — I've been told that a lot of times.

"From the first whistle to the end I thought we controlled the game, it was always going to be about when we created opportunities we make the game as comfortable as possible.

"Scoring the first always helps and I said to the lads at half time that it was very difficult to break down 4-5-1.

"No matter if you're playing at the top of the Premiership or the bottom of the Football League; it doesn't make any difference because it's a difficult system to break down.

"I thought we were patient and when we got the opportunities we took two of them and that's the most important thing.

"We've been criticised for not winning games that we've controlled earlier on in the season and I think today we've controlled the game and won it also, so I'm very happy.

"It's was important to bounce back from the result last weekend and we all knew that, I said last week as soon as we finished that I wasn't happy with what happened.

"But one run finished and another one starts this week hopefully and they've done the first part of what I asked them to.

"Hopefully this is the catalyst to address our home form — we haven't played badly at home we just haven't gotten the results that we should have gotten.

"There's a big difference between the two I'd be more worried if we weren't playing well and drew, but I felt in a lot of our home games we've controlled them but we've just not seen it across the line."

First Minister's auction raises money for charity

First Minister Nicola Sturgeon will tomorrow hold talks with Prime Minister David Cameron aimed at delivering new powers to the Scottish Parliament to give 16 and 17 year-olds the right to vote in Scottish Parliament elections.

The First Minister will be in London to attend a meeting of

the Joint Ministerial Committee (JMC) before holding bilateral talks with the Prime Minister in Downing Street.

It is hoped that the one to one discussions with the Prime Minister will help secure agreement on transferring the necessary powers to ensure that 16 and 17 year-olds can vote in the May 2016 Holyrood election.

It follows the successful addition of the age group to the electoral roll for the independence referendum — and the extension of the franchise for parliamentary elections is now widely supported on a cross-party basis.

Commenting ahead of the talks with the Prime Minister, the First Minister said:

"Giving 16 and 17 year-olds the vote for the independence referendum is widely seen as having been a huge success, which added to the unprecedented democratic engagement of the campaign and the massive turnout.

"We want to make sure those same young adults now have the chance to vote in the next Scottish Parliament election, and have their say on how the country should be run.

"But to do that we need agreement from Westminster — and that's why tomorrow's talks with the Prime Minister are so important.

"I will make it clear to David Cameron that we need to see swift action to make sure the powers are transferred in time to allow 16 and 17 year-olds to have a vote in the next Holyrood election.

"Any delay by Westminster in taking forward the necessary steps could see them deprived of a vote — but I am very confident that will not happen and that myself and the Prime Minister will reach a deal."

The First Minister added that the issue of votes for 16 and 17

year-olds was an important marker of Westminster's commitment on the delivery of powers to Scotland as recommended by the report of the Smith Commission.

### She said:

"This issue is a key early test of Westminster's commitment to delivering the additional powers for Scotland proposed by the Smith Commission.

"While those powers are not nearly as extensive as we would have wished, we do welcome them and now need to see them delivered as quickly as possible.

"There can be no reason for delaying the transfer of powers given the wide cross-party support they carry. And if we are successful in agreeing quick delivery of votes for 16 and 17 year-olds in Holyrood elections, it will show how these things can be done swiftly and effectively."

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The new Scottish Labour leader is Jim Murphy MP. Lothians MSP Kezia Dugdale has become Deputy Leader and presumably she will take First Minister's Questions on behalf of the Labour Party until Jim Murphy gets elected to Holyrood?

The other Edinburgh candidate Sarah Boyack was gracious in her defeat.

She warmly congratulated Jim Murphy as the New Scottish Labour Leader. She said outside the Emirates Arena:

"Jim has the hardest task of any our past leaders in reshaping our party from its very core to be fit for purpose. Nicola Sturgeon must be stopped in her tracks in her attempt to wipe us out, because Scotland needs a strong Labour Party with its feet firmly on the ground to re engage and build support with voters. Jim has my total support in doing that, and I will continue to serve the party 100%.

"I am obviously disappointed at not winning. As the contest progressed, I realised that my support would be squeezed. I have no regrets in standing however, and have enjoyed my part in creating a vibrant and constructive debate amongst members and setting out my vision for Scotland. My aim was to bring my experience and substantial policy ideas to the party.

"That is what I have done with my '100 ideas document' and my wider contribution. The positive feedback I have had has been uplifting."

Andrew Burns Campaign Manager said on behalf of her campaign team:

"We've been incredibly proud of the consistently positive and policy-led campaign that Sarah has undertaken. There is no question that she has raised the quality of the debate in this leadership process, and we look forward to Sarah continuing to play an important role in Scottish Labour Party policy implementation.

We're extremely grateful to all those who encouraged Sarah to enter this contest, and to those who supported her throughout — it would undoubtedly have been a lesser process without her presence."

### Review — Aladdin at The King's Theatre

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Year after year, a trio of talented actors holds the King's Theatre pantomime together. **Allan Stewart** as Widow Twankey, **Andy Gray** as Wishy Washy and **Grant Stott** as Abanazar the Wizard are the lifeblood of this show. *Aladdin* tells the story of Abanazar's attempts to steal the Magic Lamp while Aladdin tries to marry the Princess Jasmine against the wishes of her father, The Emperor of China. So far so normal, but with this trio you never quite know what to expect.

There's a tremendous sense of fun on stage and a feeling that the three main actors are truly comfortable with each other and the audience. The best scenes are the ones with only these three on stage — look out for the "one short-sleeved shirt short" sequence, and the "fur coat" scene. There are plenty of nods to Edinburgh and the jokes come thick and fast, ranging from the obvious to the more subtle:

"Get down off your high horse."

"You don't get down off a horse, you get down off a duck!"

"It's dark and dank and smelly!"

"You didn't tell me we were going to Musselburgh!"

However, there are disadvantages to hinging the whole show on the camaraderie of Stewart, Gray and Stott, as the other actors on stage can appear at times to be slightly left out. The plot is thin at best. Many of the characters lack motivation for their actions: why does Jasmine love Aladdin, a boy she has just met? Who is the Slave of the Ring and why is she enslaved? The character of the Emperor feels surplus to

the plot, muddying the lines between baddy and goody. The addition of the ring as a get-out clause takes away from the importance of the Lamp. There's very little sense of peril and the final dénouement, a sword fight between Aladdin and Abanazar, lacks authority. **Greg Barrowman** and **Miriam Ewell-Sutton** are good value as Aladdin and Jasmine, but their storyline feels like an afterthought.

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The sets are, however, spectacular. Credit must go to **Hugo Durrant** and **The Twins FX** for the huge cobra and genie puppets (the Genie being a poignant reminder of Robin Williams' creation, and credited simply "as himself"). Whilst the finale of Act 1 felt a bit skittish with its nod to Wicked (now showing at the Playhouse) Widow Twankey actually flew into the audience — flew! — on a remarkable magic carpet. A high moment for the show was the addition of the children of the **Edinburgh Dance Academy** with the Ensemble. The dancing in this show is certainly one of the strong points, and the children displayed talent, excellent discipline- in one scene they hold a pose for almost ten minutes — and genuine enthusiasm, which was delightful to see.

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It's a frothy, fun night out and sure to entertain the kids. The sets, special effects, acting, dancing and jokes are impressive as always. Adults in the audience might find themselves slightly disappointed, especially if they've visited this panto in previous years, by the failure to deliver sufficient plot or emotional punch, but it's panto, and these three panto pros have been at it for some time.

# KICC Active Lothian expand in Edinburgh

Exciting opportunities for people with health conditions to take part in exercise classes

New classes will start in January and February in various parts of Edinburgh specially designed to enable people with health conditions to improve their health and wellbeing. As with all the KICC Active classes they will be taught by local specialist tutors with experience working with people with various health conditions.

A current KICC Active participant, Jennifer, told us of her experience attending one of the classes. "There was fear of being different, of not being able to do it." she said, but "when I heard about KICC Active classes I was eager to take part".

Jennifer has been attending a weekly KICC Active Pilates class for over four months and has found it has made a big difference to how she feels "overall my health is better, I have more energy and I feel more equipped to manage." Her strength and flexibility have improved and she tells us "I rarely miss a class because it's so important to how I feel."

People with conditions such as MS, Parkinson's, osteoporosis, COPD, anxiety, depression and many others, including those with reduced mobility and wheelchair users, already attend classes in Edinburgh and the Lothians.

Classes offered include yoga and Pilates, forms of exercise designed to restore balance in the body. Not only do they improve physical strength, flexibility and posture, practicing yoga or Pilates frequently also has a positive impact on mental well-being. They are gentle forms of exercise which can be done seated in a chair.

Pilates starts at the Portobello Community Centre on Adelphi Grove on January 28th and will be on every Wednesday, lead by Penny Johnstone, a nurse who has been teaching Pilates for over 4 years. Yoga starts in Newington at St Columba's Hall on Upper Gray Street on February 2nd and will be on Mondays at 1.30pm taught by Laura Wilson, a specialist yoga teacher. Don't worry if you miss the first class, everyone gets their first class for free so come along and give it a try.

"Everybody associated with the club would like to express our deepest condolences to his family and friends during this difficult time.

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Edinburgh's oldest public library has reported a leap in visitor numbers following a refurbishment of its children's and music collections, says a report going to the City of Edinburgh Council's Culture and Sport Committee next week.

The new children's library, which was relocated from its old home on 9 George IV Bridge in May, has been transformed to feature a special 'under 5s' room with artwork by renowned children's illustrator Catherine Rayner. The space has recorded a 188 per cent increase in visitors (22,178 visits) with lending of children's books up by 45 per cent (10,543 loans) on the previous year.

The children's library now has a dedicated arts and crafts area and parent friendly access including nappy changing facilities. Since the refurbishment five months ago, 16 per cent more children and their carers have been attending events at the library (1,473 visits), including the library's popular new Lego club.

The report shows that the new music library is also proving a hit with visitors. Launched as a hub for musicians, students and fans alike, the dedicated space for engaging with music has seen a 36 per cent increase in lending (10,543) and a 26 per cent increase in visitors (11,442). The music library's new streaming service, from Naxos, provides access to a back catalogue of over one million classical and jazz tracks and has already received over 2,100 downloads.

The new facilities have been specially designed to be accessible to all, and for the first time in 40 years allow all of the Central Library facilities to be housed in the same building. The sustainable designs means that the installation of new lighting in some parts of the building saves the library 40 per cent in electricity bills without sacrificing light output compared to the previous lighting installation.

Councillor Richard Lewis said: "The new children's and music

collections have really transformed the Central Library and it is great that the new and enhanced facilities are being so well received by visitors.

"As someone who has worked as a musician and conductor, I'm excited that the music library space is being used more and more and I urge students and those keen to explore music in their own way to pay a visit to the library and experience the facilities.

"The refurbished library offers a unique space for relaxing, reading, and so much more and I think Edinburgh residents have been quick to recognise that."

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Network Rail has appointed Arup to take forward the design of a visitor centre and bridge walk for one of Scotland's most recognisable landmarks, The Forth Bridge.

The six-figure contract, which will develop detailed designs for a North Queensferry based visitor centre and lift and a South Queensferry based facility for bridge walkers, will see build-ready designs delivered by the middle of next year prior to a submission being made to local authorities for planning consideration.

Arup, an international engineering and design consultancy with an office in South Queensferry, will be supported by two local firms. WT Architecture, a South Queensferry based firm which developed early design concepts, will provide architectural advice and local knowledge. The Paul Hogarth Company, a landscaping firm also based in South Queensferry, will help develop the hard and soft landscaping plans for both locations.

David Dickson, Route Managing Director, Network Rail said:

"This is a significant investment in our vision for a groundbreaking new tourist attraction for Scotland. It demonstrates our commitment to further developing our visitor proposals during the Forth Bridge's 125th anniversary year.

"The quality of submissions we received from our procurement process were of an exceptionally high standard, as you would expect with a landmark of such importance and prominence. Arup's bid stood out for a number of reasons, not least due to the involvement of local firms which will help form a strong core for the design team."

John Campbell, Arup's Rail Business Leader in Scotland said:

"Arup are delighted to be awarded this prestigious contract and look forward to collaborating with Network Rail to successfully deliver a scheme in keeping with this iconic engineering structure."

The contract will include designs for North Queensferry where proposals envisage visitors arriving via a landscaped shore side walk to a unique visitor centre building created under the northern Fife Tower. The visitor centre will offer education and exhibition facilities alongside catering, Forth Bridge themed retail and function options. The centre will be connected by a step-free ramp to two panoramic elevators on the eastern side of the bridge. The elevators will provide access to a viewing platform located dramatically at the top of the bridge, 110m above sea level.





The South Queensferry design brief envisages a visitor reception centre from which guided bridge walks for groups of up to 15 people begin. The walking route will pass along the south approach viaduct on a pre-existing walkway underneath the track, followed by a climb to the top of the southern Queensferry Tower using a walkway within the top cantilever.

Design services will include safety and security features, transport solutions and pedestrian access improvements. A separate element of work is being progressed at present to develop options for traffic management for both facilities.

Mike Cantlay, Chairman of VisitScotland, said:

"Next year, we will celebrate the 125th birthday of the Forth Bridge — a Scottish icon that is recognised around the globe. A new visitor centre, which would give people a unique opportunity to get up close to this stunning landmark, would be an exciting addition to this country's wonderful array of world-class visitor attractions and has the potential to be a huge boost for tourism."

Network Rail has also begun the process of seeking a partner

organisation to help manage and operate the Forth Bridge Experience on its behalf. A Pre-Qualification Questionnaire (PQQ) has been posted on the project website for interested parties: www.forthbridgeexperience.com

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The cold weather introduces some danger and the council would like to warn those of you who are out and about to be careful especially near water. This is the advice they give:

Emergency Action (as recommended by the Royal Life Saving Society UK)

NEVER VENTURE ONTO FROZEN RESERVOIRS, NO MATTER HOW SAFE IT LOOKS

#### If you see someone fall through the ice

Shout for assistance and call the emergency services using 999.

Do not walk or crawl onto the ice to attempt a rescue.

Shout to the casualty to keep still.

Try and reach them from the bank using a rope, pole, tree branch, clothing tied together or anything else, which extends your reach.

When reaching from the bank lie down to avoid being pulled onto the ice.

If you can reach them slide something that floats, like a rescue buoy.

If the casualty is too far away, do not attempt to rescue them. Wait for the emergency services while calming and reassuring them.

### After the casualty has been removed from the ice:

Make sure the ambulance is on its way.

Lay them flat, check breathing and pulse and begin resuscitation if necessary.

Prevent them from getting colder by putting them in a sleeping bag or covering them including their head, with blankets or spare clothing.

Get them under shelter out of the cold.

Do not remove any clothing until the casualty is in a warm place.

Do not rub their skin, apply hot water or give an alcoholic drink.

Keep them wrapped up so that they warm up gradually.

### If you fall through the ice:

Keep calm and call for help.

If no help is available spread your arms across the surface of the ice.

If the ice is strong enough kick your legs and slide onto the ice.

Lie flat and pull yourself to the shore.

If the ice is very thin, break it infront of you and make your way to the shore.

If you cannot climb out, wait for help keeping as still as possible.

Once you are safe, go to hospital immediately for a check up.

## Man pleads guilty to indecent assaults in Livingston



A man who indecently assaulted two women in Livingston in April and May this year, has pled guilty.

Mariusz Cieslar (26) today pled guilty to assault with intent to rape at the High Court in Glasgow. He was remanded in custody and will be sentenced in January.

Cieslar attacked a 21 year old woman in her garden in the early hours of 8th April, and then indecently assaulted a 27-year-old woman in her bedroom in the early hours on 7<sup>th</sup> May. A major police investigation was launched into the two incidents and extensive enquiry was carried out by police in West Lothian. Officers released an e-fit of the suspect and an image of distinctive Adidas Adipure trainers which were

believed to be linked to one of the scenes. Mariusz Cieslar was identified as a suspect and apprehended when he returned from abroad.

Detective Superintendent Pat Campbell said: "These two assaults were extremely distressing for the two women involved but I would like to commend them for their bravery in coming forward. I would also like to thank the public and the media for their help following our appeals. It was this information that greatly assisted us in bringing Mariusz Cieslar to justice."


"A Nutcracker production, for most ballet companies, is a very important part of the repertoire. It is normally the most performed work and needs to be something that will last for generations. Peter's production had done that, but it needed to be rested so that it could be rediscovered again and brought back with a fresh perspective. It's no accident that I've chosen a Darrell work to put at the very heart of our repertoire."











Peter Darrell's magical world of *The Nutcracker* has been re-

imagined for today's audiences by Olivier Award winning designer Lez Brotherston, adding sumptuous layers of plush Victoriana and traditional festive fare to the original 1973 production.

"This production will be as close to Peter's original as possible — the point of bringing the production back is to see his beautiful, intricate choreography," adds Hampson. "In terms of design, I asked Lez to take inspiration from the original designs, so although they are different there will still be a sense of the original production.

"The essence of this being a family production is the key element — and we've looked to gently incorporate some new ideas for a new audience. We've been working closely with the Peter Darrell Trust to ensure that our new production has the Peter's intentions at its heart."

"The brief of the piece was unusual in that it existed before. It's Peter's production and it still feels like that — as it should do," says Designer Lez Brotherston.

"Peter's original designer was Philip Prowse and that feels quite meaningful to me personally. Philip's work was of great inspiration to me when I was at art school — he tutored me on my final-year designs and his influences have stayed with me.

"It's still in set in the 1870s and has that sumptuous rich Victoriana feeling — and there are bustles and tutus of course, but some of the costumes have been adapted to better show off the dancers' line and the choreography.

"Those who have seen the production before will remember Darrell's famous Land of Sweeties — that's still there although my sweeties are slightly different, and there's a version of the Land of Snow too. My interpretation of the house is also a little different and maybe there'll be something special about the toys that the children receive as Christmas presents — you'll have to come along to see."

Darrell's enchanting production has claimed a special place in the hearts of audiences across Scotland for generations. It sparked the ballet careers of many young dancers who performed the roles of Clara and her brothers — including Scottish Ballet Principal Dancer Christopher Harrison who has seen his own dream come true and will be this time performing the star role of The Prince some twenty years later.

Once again Scottish Ballet will welcome a very special cast of young, local dancers to the ranks of the company's professionals for this inspiring production in which Clara, the littlest ballerina, is the one that visits the many magical worlds and saves the brave Nutcracker Prince.

## 84 year-old woman robbed in Kirkgate



Police are appealing for information after an elderly woman was robbed around 9.30am this morning when an 84 year old woman was walking in the Kirkgate towards the steps at the rear of Linksview House. She was approached from behind by two men, one of whom grabbed her purple Radley handbag, causing the victim to fall to the ground. The suspects ran up the steps towards Linksview House and were lost to sight.

# Transport for Edinburgh ends year on a high



Bus passengers up from 115.4 million to 118.4 million

Tram passenger number estimated to hit 3 million by end of year

Six million more public transport passenger journeys with Transport for Edinburgh

Transport for Edinburgh says that passengers have flocked in their millions to use buses and trams since the launch of the integrated transport group, Transport for Edinburgh, one year ago.

The group reports that bus patronage is three million up on 2013 and the new Edinburgh Trams service has already attracted nearly three million passengers. This means six million additional passenger journeys over 2013.



Transport for Edinburgh Chief Executive Ian Craig said:

"The first year of Transport for Edinburgh has been quite remarkable. We're seeing fantastic results which are the sum of all the efforts put in from right at the outset by people at Edinburgh Trams, Lothian Buses, the City of Edinburgh Council and by all of our partners.

"We've had to invest and be bold to get here but I make no apology for leading that — we're in new territory. Establishing a new company and brand isn't easy but our investment is paying off and what we're seeing as a result is six million more people using public transport in 2014 over 2013.

"This is a huge shift which is of great benefit to Edinburgh's environment and its economy. Transport for Edinburgh is the future and it benefits from the very best with Lothian Buses and Edinburgh Trams. I'm delighted to be leading it."

Edinburgh Trams successfully tested and launched in partnership with The City of Edinburgh Council and contractors. The service, led by Director and General Manager Tom Norris, is currently running ahead of forecast patronage with operational reliability very strong for a new service.

The Lothian Buses network has been successfully recast to accommodate and integrate with tram leading to significant passenger growth.

Other Group innovations included the launch of CitySmart, the integration of tram to the Ridacard system, the successful roll out of the TFE app, free wifi across the services and hugely successful campaigns to promote Day, Day/Night & Family range. This was delivered with a ticket price freeze across virtually all services.

In terms of vehicles, £15m was invested in 65 new low emission and ultra-low emission buses that will significantly impact on improving the City's air quality and lower carbon emissions. These vehicles are specifically targeted at high pollution zones.

# Police release CCTV images following serious assault in Easter Road

He is described as being white, Scottish, around 6ft 3, heavy/muscular build, short shaved dark hair, clean shaven and at the time he was wearing a dark grey zip up hooded top and dark workman style bottoms. Police believe that he may be known as "Ross" or "Bambi."

## Further appeal for missing woman from Stirling

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Police in Forth Valley Division have brought in specialist support in their effort to trace a 49-year-old woman who has been missing from her home in Stirling for more than a fortnight.

Christine Henley was last seen by her family around 4pm on the afternoon of Wednesday, November 26, 2014, and has not been in contact with them since, which her family believe is out of character. On occasions Christine would not be in touch for a few days but never for this length of time.

The police investigation has continued and everyone involved in the enquiry is particularly concerned for her welfare and well-being as she has not accessed any money, nor used her mobile phone in the last fortnight. Christine has not been in contact with any friends or relatives either and this is entirely out of character.

Detective Chief Inspector Jim Smith, of Police Scotland's Forth Valley Criminal Investigation Department, has taken over management of the investigation, working alongside the Local Area Commander. The investigation is still being considered a missing person enquiry.

He said: "At this time, we have no evidence that Christine has come to any harm, however we are now very concerned or her. We have brought in specialist resources to assist with the investigation and searches. Our priority at this time is to trace Christine and establish her wellbeing. Christine has friends and family in the Stirling and Alness area, and I would appeal to anyone from these areas, who have any information, no matter how small or insignificant, to share

that with my officers "

When Christine was last seen, she was wearing a navy blue jacket, black leggings and long black boots. She is described as white, 5ft 6" tall with shoulder length blonde hair.

Anyone who has seen her in the last two weeks, or knows where she is, is asked to call Police Scotland on 101 or can provide the information anonymously through Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.
