#### Missing man — Edinburgh man last seen in Aberdeen

▼ Police in Edinburgh are appealing for information to help trace a man reported missing from the Capital.

Douglas McNaught from Saughton Mains Terrace was last seen in his Ford Focus car within the Newmachar Road area of Aberdeen at around 4.30am this morning.

The 66-year-old had not informed family or friends of his intentions to travel to the region and has not been spotted

since this time.

In addition, he has not returned to his home address and concern is now growing for his welfare.

Anyone who can assist in tracing Douglas is asked to come forward.

He is described as white, 5ft 7ins tall with a slim build, short grey hair, brown eyes and has missing teeth in his mouth. It is not known what he was wearing, but he often uses spectacles and has a nude cartoon figure tattooed on his left arm.

Inspector Bob Innes said: "We want to establish Douglas's whereabouts as soon as possible and ensure he is alright.

"He has access to his vehicle and can travel freely around the country, so anyone who believes they have seen him within Edinburgh, Aberdeen, or any other area is asked to contact police immediately.

"In addition, I would request that Douglas get in touch with us to let us know he is safe and well.

## St John's Hospital - Inspection team calls for

#### action

The Health Environment Inspectorate is responsible for reducing risk to patients through a regime of inspecting hospitals for any infection risk. They focus on ensuring that the care facility is safe and clean and then they publish the results of their inspections.

Most recently they have inspected St John's Hospital in Livingston without notice in August. They first visited on 20 and 21 August but due to concerns over the cleanliness of the A & E department they returned the following week.

The team found six trolley beds in the A & E department all of which were contaminated, some with body fluids, and mattresses were found to be stained. But in the resuscitation room there was blood on the lamps, on the walls, under worktop surfaces and on the sharps bin. This matter was raised immediately with the most senior nursing staff and the senior management at NHS Lothian. By the time of their second visit the inspectors were more satisfied with the level of cleaning, although there was still dust on high shelves and on patient equipment trolleys in the X-ray room.

They have concluded that the hospital needs to address matters relating to cleanliness, the way that staff are dressed and ensuring that their staff know how to clean up blood using chlorine and detergent.

The report mentions that one member of staff had long untied hair, another was wearing a ring with a stone, one had long painted finger nails and a fourth was wearing inappropriate shoes.

During their visit the inspection team interviewed only nine patients but also handed out 71 questionnaires to patients. A previous visit to the hospital in January 2012 also required action in four areas and two recommendations to the Health

Board.

Speaking of the report, Susan Brimelow, HEI Chief Inspector, said "Overall, our inspection found evidence that St John's Hospital is complying with the majority of infection prevention and control standards to protect patients, staff and visitors from acquiring an infection.

"The hospital environment was clean, and we observed good staff compliance with sharps management and hand hygiene practices. However, we did identify areas where improvements are needed.

"We noted mixed compliance with national dress code policy among staff and found a poor standard of cleanliness in the accident and emergency department. As a result, we escalated our concerns to senior management and requested that immediate action be taken.

"We re-visited the accident and emergency department on 27 August and found the standard of patient equipment cleanliness had significant improved. This inspection resulted in four requirements and three recommendations which NHS Lothian must address as a matter of priority. We will follow-up on these concerns at future inspections."

The HEI will follow up on progress being made in light of their recommendations with four months from the date of the initial inspection.

# West Lothian local racks up 40,000 miles cycling to work

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Environmental charity employee, Mike Batley (54) has pedalled the equivalent of 1.6 times around the world in his daily 33 mile round trip cycle to work.

The West Lothian man has travelled by bicycle from his home town in Pumpherston to his workplace at the Central Scotland Green Network Trust (CSGNT) in Shotts, North Lanarkshire for over 15 years.

Mike started using his trusty two wheels intermittently in 1998 whilst working at CSGNT, formerly operating as Central Scotland Forest Trust. He has since racked up over 40,000 miles on his bike over the years, opting for the healthy commuting alternative to public transport or car, an average of three times per week.

Active forms of travel such as walking and cycling help to improve quality of life and quality of place, bringing multiple benefits to people and the environment.

Cycling to work helps to reduce traffic congestion and improve air quality as well as offering economic benefit. Mike has avoided contributing  $14,245\,\mathrm{kg}$  of harmful  $\mathrm{CO^2}$  emissions to the environment and has saved himself nearly £7,000 on car running costs.

By choosing to cycle to work, people can also benefit from increased daily physical activity, leading to improved health and well-being and helping to tackle the obesity epidemic facing Scotland today. Mike has burnt around 3.7million calories, equating to 9,344 hours in the gym, by pedalling his way to work each day.

Speaking of his lengthy commute, Mike said: "Cycling to work is one of the simplest ways people can keep fit and healthy. My daily cycle gives me a great work-out and really kick-starts my day both physically and mentally. It's also an environmentally friendly mode of transport and has saved me a lot of money in petrol over the years as well."

Simon Rennie, Chief Executive of CSGNT, said: "Mike is an excellent example of why choosing a healthy form of travel such as cycling can reap benefits physically, economically and environmentally, and it's great to see how the statistics rack up over the years.

"We hope to see more people in central Scotland taking this healthier mode of transport in the future and are investing resources on the ground to look after existing paths and create new routes in order to encourage active travel across the region."

CSGNT aims to improve the social, physical, cultural and environmental health and well-being of central Scotland, as well as assisting the area to meet the challenge of climate change.

## Lockhart jailed for murder of wife and son

A man who killed his wife and young son has been sentenced at Edinburgh High Court today (16 October.)

Garry Lockhart, 33, was sentenced to life with a minimum of 25 years after being found guilty of killing Janet Lockhart, 29, and their two year old son, Michael, at their home in South Chesters Lane, Bonnyrigg, in the early hours of 28<sup>th</sup> December 2013.

Detective Chief Inspector Scott Cunningham from the Major Investigation Team said:

"I acknowledge the sentence of Garry Lockhart but my thoughts are first and foremost with Janet and Michael's family, who have been devastated by his incomprehensible actions.

"No sentence can alleviate their pain and I would like to pay tribute to them for their immense dignity and strength throughout the investigation and trial. "I also want to praise and thank all the police officers, police staff, partner agencies and the local community for their professionalism and support throughout these traumatic and difficult circumstances."

#### Polite request

There is a <u>petition</u> to seek help from the UK Prime Minister David Cameron in the case of 70 year-old Mohammed Asghar from Edinburgh who is being held in prison in Pakistan. Mr Asghar is said to be mentally ill but he has been convicted of blasphemy and sentenced to death.

The family plan to go to Downing Street on Friday to deliver

the petition which currently has almost 70,000 signatures.

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Scotland's number one paid for tourist attraction, Edinburgh Castle has had a record breaking summer for visitors.

The castle, which is Scotland's number one paid for visitor attraction, welcomed 767,566 visitors through its famous gates between June and September, a 3% increase on the previous record, which was in 2013.

The castle is one of several Historic Scotland sites which enjoyed record breaking visitor numbers over the summer period. Other key performers included sites in Orkney, with Skara Brae and Bishop's and Earl's Palaces both recording rises of 11% respectively. Meanwhile heritage attractions such as Stirling Castle — the former home of Mary, Queen of Scots and Urquhart Castle also recorded record breaking numbers, welcoming 256,035 and 220,025 visitors each.

In total, 2,141,082 people visited a Historic Scotland site between June and September 2014, a 4% increase on the previous record.

Cabinet Secretary for Culture and External Affairs Fiona Hyslop said;

"These are fantastic figures which showcase the continued appeal of Scotland's historic attractions to visitors from both home and abroad.

"2014 was a memorable summer for Scotland — with an influx of visitors to events such as the Commonwealth Games and the Ryder Cup as well as a whole host of Homecoming related events taking place up and down the country.

"Our heritage sites played a key role within this and continue to be a constant and hugely important asset at the heart of our tourism and cultural make-up." Stephen Duncan, Director of Commercial and Tourism for Historic Scotland said;

"It has been a very strong summer season for visitors to our sites.

"Whilst the majority of the growth in visitor numbers has been experienced at our three biggest sites — Edinburgh Castle, Stirling Castle and Urquhart Castle, it is fantastic to see that growth emulated across many parts of the estate.

"In terms of trends, we have continued to build upon last year's strong travel trade business; meanwhile we have also experienced an increase in visitors from the rest of the UK, particularly England, as well as French and German visitors.

"We are also seeing a strong return from products which allow visitors the opportunity to visit multiple sites such as our explorer passes, which have grown 16% year on year, whilst our extensive events programme continues to bring history to life."

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The Big Draw takes place at Central Library on 31 October 2014 and will take its inspiration from the Moromasa Scroll which was gifted to the library in the 1940s by a relative of Henry Dyer, a Scottish engineer who played a prominent role in the industrialisation of Japan.

The library blog Tales of One City explains how it will work: "We'll be using recycled material from old magazines and gluing them onto an extended roll of paper. Old-school cutting and pasting!

"Age, talent and experience is no barrier when it comes to The Big Draw. Everyone can join in and take part in creating something big.

"Pop in any time between 11.00 am and 4.30 pm to make your

contribution, and look out for pictures of the finished masterpiece right here not long after."

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This weekend, 65 student entrepreneurs from undergrads to PhD students who attend the University of Edinburgh, will be building a business from scratch, having signed up to participate in the 3DS (3 Day Startup) challenge, one the country's most innovative student entrepreneurship events.

The students, from all different disciplines, will be spending the weekend brainstorming ideas, conducting market validation, creating business models, building prototypes, then finally and most importantly, pitching to investors and successful entrepreneurs.

The event is being organised by LAUNCH.ed, Edinburgh Research and Innovation's enterprise initiative at the University, which has supported more than 250 students to form a business. Over the last two years alone, LAUNCH.ed has helped form 60 student-led companies and many of these students have gone on to raise funding from VCs, Scottish Enterprise and awards schemes, where they have raised over £1.75 million in start-up capital.

The weekend starts this Friday when the student entrepreneurs arrive with their ideas to start a new technology business. They can bring pre-built technology or simply have an idea for a start-up company. These technologies and start-ups are usually at early stages, where technical feasibility and business models are unproven.

In the first few hours, participants discuss and evaluate their business ideas in smaller groups, with business mentors on hand to provide insight and experience. This year's 3DS will have eight mentors, including technology developers, start-up entrepreneurs, angel investors, designers and solicitors. The students then vote on which ideas will become

the focus of the weekend and decide which projects they want to work on.

Saturday and Sunday are action packed, revealing the microcosm of start-up life, engaging potential customers on the streets and over the phones to better understand the problem their venture addresses with the highs of completing prototypes and the lows of discovering better-positioned competitors.

The ideas that have survived this far are revealed in a series of pitches and prototype demos on Sunday night to a panel of venture capitalists, angel investors and accomplished entrepreneurs.

The feedback is constructive and extensive; panellists ask tough questions, identify strengths and weaknesses, and give candid advice for the road ahead.

For Fern Sinclair, a 3DS participant in 2013, which was the first to be run in the UK, said the event gave her a change of perspective:

"I am a scientist so my biggest challenge was thinking from a business perspective. However, I learnt that no matter how unique an idea is, it is useless in the business world if nobody wants to buy it."

Since her 3DS experience Fern has gone on to great success. After coming second in the 2014 Edinburgh BioQuarter Innovation Competition, Fern was a category winner at the 2014 Scottish Institute for Enterprise (SIE) Fresh Ideas Competition and was one of the winners of SIE's 2014 Young Innovators Challenge.

'We live not by the jingling of our coins, but by the fullness of our harvests.'

The great Scottish biologist **Patrick Geddes** (1854-1932) described the world as a vast leaf colony, both growing on and

forming a leafy soil. It is, he said, 'by leaves we live.'

Mandala is a Sanskrit word meaning both 'circle' and 'centre';

mandala shapes may be seen all around us in the natural world

— in tree rings, flower heads, spiders' webs, shells,

snowflakes.

They represent the universe — the visible world outside us (the circle) and the invisible one deep within us (the centre.) Both **Buddhism** and **Hinduism** use mandalas as spiritual tools and aids to meditation. They traditionally consist of colourful geometric patterns and symbols organised around a unifying centre; Buddhist monks have to undertake long training before they can create a mandala, which they often make from sand — this can then be brushed away as a representation of the impermanence of life.

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This week at the Botanics Therese Muskus, artist Karen Shewan and her husband Mel have created a mandala from autumn leaves, berries, fruits, dried flowers, seed heads and pine cones — the abundant and colourful plant material that nature offers as the seasons change. Therese, Karen and Mel worked hard all day in Monday's dreich weather; despite the rain, they were the first people into the gardens in the morning and the last to leave in the evening. Their efforts have certainly paid off — the mandala is stunning, with an outer circle of bark and leaves enclosing a star, each point of which is filled with meticulous arrangements of red, yellow, green, blue, orange and pink fruits, vegetables and flowers. They hope that people will spend a few moments reflecting on and enjoying the beauty of the colours, shapes and patterns, saying; 'In our troubled and over-exploited world the mandala is a symbol to remind us of our dependence on the earth's trees and plants, and the need to protect them.'

Also on display is a cloak that Therese (who runs a croft and holiday homes at **Laikenbuie** in Morayshire) has

embroidered with a mandala, and photographs of one that she, Karen and Mel made on **Nairn beach** from the things they found there. Children and adults are invited to have a go at creating their own mini-mandala; materials are provided.

The mandala will remain in place at least until the end of this week and is free to visit; it can be found alongside the outer path that runs parallel to Inverleith Terrace — it's easy to spot, but you can also ask staff in Reception for directions.

# Assault and robbery in South Edinburgh

# Letter to the Editor — Resources for children with additional needs now stretched too far

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We have received a letter from Ann Maxwell the founder of the Muir Maxwell Trust, an Edinburgh charity which aims to "provide practical support to children and their families coping with severe epilepsy and to increase awareness and understanding of epilepsy and help remove the stigma associated with the condition".

Dear Sir,

Due to a recent definitional change, nearly 20% of all pupils in Scotland are now assessed as having an "additional support need" (ASN) by the Scottish Government. Once only encompassing those with a significant support need, a range of pupils, from those with minor behavioural issues all the way to those with complex disabilities, must now be given additional support from their schools.

This has diluted resources to the point that many severely learning disabled children and young people — those the Muir Maxwell Trust works with on a daily basis and the very group most in need of assistance — are in danger of simply being left behind.

The Scottish Government had a chance to rectify this situation with its most recent Draft Budget. Sadly, officials have

ignored this burgeoning problem and promised no additional funds to help local authorities cope.

As schools buckle under the strain, the severely learning disabled are not necessarily getting the level of help they require to flourish.

The Scottish Government needs to step in and act immediately to end this state of affairs. We must give Scotland's severely learning disabled children and young people the proper level of support they so desperately need.

The hospital has 70 inpatient beds divided into two wards. The ground floor ward is used for patients who need more complex surgery. The first floor ward is used for day care and short-stay treatments. Patients' bedrooms are single occupancy with en-suite facilities. A two-bedded high dependency unit (HDU) is also available for patients who need a higher level of care. The hospital is part of Spire Healthcare Ltd, the UK-

wide independent healthcare group. Healthcare services provided include a range of medical and surgical services including treatments for cancer.

Healthcare Improvement Scotland was established in April 2011. Part of the HIS role is to undertake inspections of independent healthcare services across Scotland. Our inspectors check that independent healthcare services are complying with necessary standards and regulations. They do this by carrying out assessments and inspections. These inspections may be announced or unannounced.

Based on the findings of this inspection, this service has been awarded good or very good grades under various headings including quality of information, quality of care and support, quality of environment, quality of staffing and quality of management and leadership.

Speaking of the report, Susan Brimelow, Chief Inspector, said: "This inspection has identified areas where Spire Murrayfield Hospital is performing well. We found comprehensive systems in place to support staff training and a management team that were committed to improving quality and providing a high quality service to patients.

"Patients also spoke highly of the quality of care they had received. However, improvements must be made to the record-keeping for patients' own medication, theatre counts and equipment checks. Patients should also be provided with more opportunities to provide feedback on the service, for example in relation to the quality of the information the service provides. This inspection resulted in one requirement and nine recommendations."

The campaign, developed by Edinburgh UNESCO City of Literature Trust, aims not only to celebrate the 200th anniversary of the publication of Waverley, but also to mark the 10th anniversary of Edinburgh's designation as the world's first UNESCO City of Literature.

As part of this campaign, 25,000 copies of a free book — Great Scott! — will be given away in the station. Telling the story of Scott's incredible life, the pocket-book includes a

timeline, quotes and musings and gives tips on things to see, read and do relating to Scott. The book and campaign celebrate the life and work of one of the world's most famous writers who was a major celebrity in his time and continues to influence writers today including bestselling Game of Thrones author George R. R. Martin.

Ali Bowden, Director of the Edinburgh UNESCO City of Literature Trust said: "As a City of Literature we want to see books, words and ideas celebrated as widely as possible and Waverley station with its association to Scott and the anniversary is an ideal place. Most people know about Scott — the world's tallest monument to a writer is the Scott Monument on Princes Street — but they might not know his books and we hope this campaign helps people discover the man and his words."

The Great Scott! Celebrating Sir Walter Scott book is only available in Waverley Station in October and November while stocks last, as well as online in audio form and as an ebook at cityofliterature.com/waverley. The pocket book is also available in a large print and Braille version. The campaign will be supported by social media activity on #waverley200. The Scottish International Storytelling Festival is supporting the campaign with a strong Scott-theme in its Once Upon a Place programme which runs from Friday 24th October to Sunday 2nd November 2014 and there is a special free display of Scott's work, featuring the original manuscript of Waverley, taking place at the National Library of Scotland on George IV Bridge in Edinburgh and running until the 16th November.

■ Juliet Donnachie, Network Rail's station manager for Waverley, said: "As the only station in the world named after a novel, I like to think that Waverley Station retains a bit of romance not always associated with modern railways. Sir Walter Scott was the most prominent Scot of his time and it's appropriate that the main railway station in Scotland's capital continues to acknowledge his influence. Waverley

Station is steeped in history — it has been the stage for millions of stories since the Victorian era and I think Sir Walter would like that. We're very happy to be able to support this celebration of his work."

The Great Scott! campaign manager, Dr Douglas McNaughton, said: "By inserting fictional characters into actual events, Scott invented the historical novel and influenced every writer who followed him, including Charles Dickens, Jules Verne and, by his own admission, George R. R. Martin, author of the phenomenally popular Game of Thrones series. Waverley isn't a boring, dusty old story — it's essentially an action movie. The naïve young hero is brought up by relatives, goes on a perilous journey and is caught up in the politics of an impossibly strange and exotic landscape. That's basically the plot of Star Wars! And Scott wrote Waverley as a novel covering historical events in living memory. The 1745 Jacobite rebellion was exactly as recent for Scott's readers as the Second World War is to us now."

Commenting in response to the news, Councillor Richard Lewis, Culture and Sport Convener for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "As the world's first UNESCO City of Literature, Scotland's Capital city is a genuine hub for all things to do with literature. This celebration to mark one of the city's best-known writers can only go to reinforce that status further.

"Waverley station sits just a stone's throw from the Scott Monument, which is the world's largest monument dedicated to a writer. Just a few streets away in the New Town is Edinburgh's Assembly Rooms which is where, in 1827, Scott decided to reveal his identity as the 'The Great Unknown' author of the Waverley Novels. Homages to Sir Walter can be found throughout Edinburgh. In the Old Town you can learn about his life and works at the city's Writers Museum, where visitors can see the printing press on which the Waverley Novels were produced,

and a first edition of the Waverley novel. Just along the Royal Mile you will also find the Heart of Midlothian set in stone, so called after Scott's novel of the same name.

"Arriving into Edinburgh's Waverley Station is a special welcome for any visitor, with its enviable location right in the heart of the city, and I'm sure the installation of Scott's quotes will provide a great starting point for exploring Scott's legacy in the city, and will even serve to cheer up the weariest of commuters as they travel to and from the Capital."

## Witness appeal following Craigentinny bank robbery



Police are appealing for witnesses following an armed robbery at a Branch of RBS in Craigentinny.

Detective Inspector Alan O'Brien said: "This robbery was a traumatic experience for the staff working in the branch, although thankfully no one was hurt.

"We are appealing for anyone who witnessed this robbery, or recognises the description of the suspect, to contact police immediately. The suspect and the money are likely to have been contaminated with red dye, so if anyone who comes across anything suspicious, they should also contact police on 101 or Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

The Prime Minister David Cameron is scheduled to be questioned today, just a day after the UK Parliament reconvenes after Conference recess, before a Select Committee at Westminster about UK governance in light of the Scottish Referendum. (NOTE — this has now been postponed till November in light of the debate at Westminster today on the Scottish Referendum)

The Scottish Independence Referendum may have resulted in a No vote but the three leaders of the main political parties gave their undertaking to enter into a reform process to allow Scotland more devolved powers. Some critics said shortly after the result of the vote was known that the Prime Minister had given this undertaking without discussing anything with the Cabinet, so this might be an interesting start to the new session of the UK parliament.

Rt Hon Sir Alan Beith MP, the Chair of the Liaison Committee, said:

"Whatever the result of the Scottish Referendum, significant constitutional changes are in prospect and the Liaison Committee intends to question the Prime Minister in depth about his ideas for change and their implications for the various parts of the United Kingdom."

Meanwhile William Hague on moving towards 'English votes for English laws' has been warned against partisan games according to The Guardian.

### Edinburgh Airport enjoys busiest summer ever

over four million passengers travelled through Edinburgh Airport in the four months between June and September — meaning 2014 was the busiest summer ever for the airport.

A total of 4,151,479 people travelled through Edinburgh Airport between the beginning of June and the end of September, with 987,674 passengers last month alone. This figure is a 2.9% increase on the same period in 2013 and follows two consecutive 'million months' in July and August.

The airport says that unprecedented development in long-haul services to the USA, Canada and the Middle East has driven this growth.

A total of 563,312 international passengers passed through the terminal last month, an increase of 6.3% on 2013. Domestic passenger numbers dropped slightly by 1.4% to 424,362 following the end of the easyJet service to London Southend.

Gordon Dewar, Chief Executive of Edinburgh Airport, said: "Summer 2014 has been very successful for us and seeing over four million passengers in as many months is a great achievement. Our teams have been working extremely hard and have delivered some amazing results to help give our passengers the very best experience.

"It's also been a tremendous summer for Scotland and we should credit the amazing events of the past few months for helping us achieve such high passenger figures. The Ryder Cup saw huge numbers of visitors to Scotland and we had one of our busiest departure days ever on the 29th of September with all transatlantic flights and connections from Edinburgh full.

"September was a great month for us with a significant increase in the number of international passenger travel. This has been down to new long-haul routes to Chicago, Philadelphia and Doha, which weren't in operation last year, and an increased frequency to Toronto with Air Canada Rouge.

"We've also seen strong performances from easyJet across its

entire European network and Ryanair services to Dublin."

Ecomony convener, Councillor Frank Ross, said: "These are tremendous passenger figures for Edinburgh Airport, reporting their busiest summer on record.

"Edinburgh is a top destination every summer as the August festivals get underway, but this year the city has also acted as the gateway to sport in Scotland with thousands attending the Commonwealth Games and the Ryder Cup. These events, while situated outside the city limits, have no doubt acted as a boost.

"With Edinburgh's trams now transporting tens of thousands of passengers to and from the Airport every week — and the new extension coming on well — this is an exciting time for the Airport, and for Edinburgh. We know that increased activity in terms of passenger numbers translates into economic benefits for the City and beyond, as well as creating new and better jobs for the local and wider economy."

## World's End murder trial opens at Livingston

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The trial of a man accused of murdering two teenagers 37 years ago in Edinburgh started today at the High Court in Livingston.

Angus Sinclair is accused of raping and murdering Christine Eadie, 17, and Helen Scott, also 17, on October 15 and 16, 1977.

The pair were found dead after a night out at the World's End pub in the Royal Mile.

Ms Eadie's body was found in Gosford Bay whilst Ms Scott's body was discovered in a field near Haddington.

Sinclair is alleged to have killed the teenagers while acting along with his brother-in-law Gordon Hamilton, who is now dead.

Judge Lord Matthews said the trial is expected to last two to three weeks.
