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Order of the Thistle — Edinburgh International Magic Festival — Voting in the referendum — HOLI ONE Colour Festival — Dads Rock

Today HM the Queen will be in Edinburgh to lead all the Knights of the Garter in a procession from the Signet Library to St Giles Cathedral and into the Thistle Chapel there. According to the British Monarchy website the format is this:-

The Knights of the Order of the Thistle gather in the Signet Library dressed in their green velvet mantle, hat and collar to await the arrival of The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh.

In Parliament Square the Guard of Honour found by The Queen's Body Guard for Scotland (Royal Company of Archers) with the Colours of the Royal Company, is accompanied by the Band of the Royal Regiment of Scotland.

Upon the arrival of The Queen and The Duke of Edinburgh in Parliament Square, the Chancellor of the Thistle, the Dean of the Thistle and the Secretary of the Thistle conduct Her Majesty and His Royal Highness to the Signet Library to join the procession into the Chapel of the Order of the Thistle. The Queen installs the new Knights and then the procession forms once again and proceeds to the Cathedral where the remaining part of the Service takes place.

In the chapel you can see the heraldic emblems of each individual Knight or Lady of the order, but you will have to wait till after the service taking place there this morning before getting in to the cathedral.

The oldest of the Knights of the Thistle in terms of appointment is the Duke of Edinburgh, followed by the Duke of Rothesay and the third is the Earl of Elgin who is the chief of the Clan Bruce. He had a very busy week last week including the reenactment of the Battle of Bannockburn and the Service of Magnanimity at Dunfermline Abbey on Friday. Although he will be wearing the regalia of the Order of which he is a member today, when The Edinburgh Reporter saw him at the weekend he was sporting the most gloriously devilish socks of yellow and red stripes which are of course his heraldic colours.

Hibs' season ticket prices to remain the same



Hibs CEO Leeann Dempster has told fans that the season ticket prices for the forthcoming campaign will remain the same despite the club's relegation.

On a statement published on the Hibernian FC website, Ms Dempster said: "Season Tickets have been a cause of some concern to me since my arrival. The Club has sold around 5400 Season Tickets to date — with the vast majority of those being bought before the Club suffered relegation at the end of last season.

"Since then, only a few hundred have been bought. That means thousands of fans bought in the expectation of Premiership football this season, only to be faced with their Club competing in the Championship.

"It also means that sales have all but dried up, and are running well behind the same point in time last year, when we had sold 7600, or the previous year when 6900 had been sold.

"There has been a lot of discussion and debate amongst supporters about the cost of Season Tickets, given the league, and what might or should be done. Needless to say, I have also received a lot of feedback — through my meetings, through telephone calls, through general discussion on forums, and, most of all, through email.

"I have been genuinely encouraged that through all of this, the overwhelming tone has been encouraging and positive. If I had to summarise, the message that has been relayed to me is that the Club should keep the Season Ticket money if it is used to sustain the budget available to Alan Stubbs to build a squad capable of winning us promotion.

"The whole issue has caused me real concern. A small number of supporters — I would say around 5% — have been in touch seeking a refund, with the figure of £50 the most quoted. Simple arithmetic shows that if this was to happen and if the majority of supporters decided to take it up, it would equate to having to take about a £1/4 million out of the budget available to the Head Coach, at a time when we need to be investing to fight our way out of the most competitive Championship ever. We know that our opponents will be seeking to match or out spend us.

"This presents a risk I really don't want to take. To maximise our chances of heading straight back up, I have decided that the best course of action is to leave prices as they are. If we are to compete with our rivals in this league, every ticket and every penny spent become crucial. It follows though that the kind of loyalty I have witnessed should not go unrewarded. For that reason, I have asked that Working Together looks at how we can reward those buying Season Tickets to support the Club through this difficulty with greater added value, and when would be most appropriate for this.

"I met with Working Together representatives, and a number of views were expressed. Some initially felt that a reduction in price was needed, but all understood the desire to give Alan the best possible chance to build a squad. All of those present were keen that I communicate honestly with supporters about the decision, the reason for it, and our desire to create added value as a reward. Those present also stressed that the Club should reintroduce the payment plan, and we are going to do this to help supporters finance the purchase of a Season Ticket, with the Club again meeting the interest costs.

"It was also felt important to stress that while our prices are higher than the vast majority of clubs in the Championship, they are in line (or less than) our biggest rivals. Our best seats cost £405, while the best seats at Tynecastle cost £450 and at Rangers £495. Both of these clubs do, in fairness, offer a limited number of lower priced seats in less popular parts of their stadia.

"I realise that this decision will not meet with universal approval. I would rather we were not in this position. However, I have to do what I think is best for the Club in terms of giving us every chance of a successful outcome to the season. At the end of the day, that would be something that every supporters would celebrate.

"It is my intention to bring more young supporters and community groups to Easter Road this season, I am exploring a route that will see dedicated community and school seats for nearly every game and not just a few hundred, I want to get the number to at least one thousand. To do so we will need the support of Working Together, Kicks for Kids and the Community Foundation as well as the bigger community at large.

"There should and will be more support this season for those who run supporter buses. This means that the club will start to contribute to costs for selected games, we will also help to fund raise and generally try and make it easier for supporters to travel by helping those who run buses as much as we can.

"We have also, at the request of Working Together and from the support in general, started to look at implementing a long awaited loyalty scheme. The first discussions around how this might work will happen this week and I'll report back on the timescale involved and if we have the technical ability, at the moment, to implement.

"I have also been asked to consider bringing back a new interest free payment plan — I am pleased to say that I have instructed a new trial of this offer — for this season to assess and monitor the need for this type of scheme and hopefully any uplift in sales.

"These tickets will be available to buy from Monday 7 July for both regular Season Tickets and also for those who purchase Hospitality Season Tickets. We will publicise ways to buy from that date.

"I have said that I want to listen and that moving forward the club understands the needs to change — everyone associated with the club accepts this and is looking forward to the future. I'll continue to meet with the Working Together representatives and from these meetings I am certain you'll see further improvements.

"Finally, if you haven't purchased a season ticket yet, or you are considering doing so then I'd urge you to get one.

"It's time for us all to re-engage, listen and work towards what every supporter ultimately wants — a successful club both on and off the field."

Hibs face Rangers in Petrofac Training Cup

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Hibs will face Rangers at Ibrox in the first round of the Petrofac Training Cup, whilst Hearts welcome Annan Athletic to Tynecastle and Spartans take on Morton in Greenock.

The draw was made at Easter Road yesterday with the teams split into two sections, north and south.

New Hibs Head Coach Alan Stubbs told the club website: "I'm really excited about the draw.

"Facing Rangers at Ibrox will be a massive game and a great early test for us at the start of the season."

The first round ties are due to be played on 26 July, but Rangers' match against Hibs will be rearranged due to the Commonwealth Games being held in Glasgow.

Numbers crunched at the end of the 68th Edinburgh International Film Festival



More than 46,000 tickets were sold for the films shown at this year's 68th Edinburgh International Film Festival which finished last weekend representing a four per cent increase on last year.

The Festival sold tickets for its venues across the city, which included the EIFF's home at Filmhouse, its venue partner at Cineworld Fountain Park, and at Festival Theatre Edinburgh, Traverse Theatre, Dominion Cinema, Odeon Lothian Road, Cameo,

Royal Lyceum Theatre and Belmont Filmhouse in Aberdeen.

Ken Hay, CEO Edinburgh International Film Festival, commented: "We are delighted to see that audiences have again supported the Festival this year despite football fever and the glorious June sunshine! An increase in our admissions is a testament to the strength and depth of the programme."

This year, the Festival also collaborated with <u>This is Edinburgh</u> and <u>Essential Edinburgh</u> on Film in the City; a series of outdoor screenings and events across the city. Over 12,000 people enjoyed the delights of "dance along" screenings of musical favourites such as GREASE and STRICTLY BALLROOM in the Grassmarket and JAWS, HOW TO TRAIN YOUR DRAGON and JUNO amongst the cinematic gems in St Andrew Square. Festival Square also hosted a series of movie inspired workshops, Q&A's and animation sessions.

Winning films this year included the world premiere of Joanna Coates's HIDE AND SEEK, which picked up The Michael Powell Award for Best British Feature Film. The Award for Best Film in the International Competition was presented to Midi Z's ICE POISON and The Audience Award went to TONY BENN: WILL & TESTAMENT, which also received its world premiere at the Festival.

North Edinburgh spearheads the sustainable food movement

Edible Edinburgh moved into North Edinburgh today when a nutritious meal was on the menu for the launch of Edinburgh's sustainable food plan at North Edinburgh Arts community café today.

What is Edible Edinburgh?

An initiative which aims to inspire andmotivate everyone across Edinburgh to work together in developing new approaches to food, making positive choices that are healthier and tastier and whichbring social, economic and environmental benefits to the whole community

Local growers, food groups and volunteers rustled up a feast to celebrate the unveiling of the <u>Edible Edinburgh Sustainable</u> <u>Food City Plan</u> at a special cook and taste session at Muirhouse Community Shop.

The six-year plan is based on feedback from the public and outlines six distinct themes which need to be addressed in order to achieve its vision of Edinburgh as a sustainable food city. These are: Health and wellbeing, Land use, Environment, Buying food, Economy and Cultural change.

You may recall last year when there was a huge <u>Feed the 5000</u> event in <u>Bristo Square</u> which is part of the project.

Robert Pearson Chair of Tenants and Residents in Muirhouse sent us these lovely photos of the event earlier today.

A series of actions have been set out within each theme in order to work towards key outcomes, including more fresh and healthy food eaten, fewer people living in food poverty, the protection of our natural environment and a thriving local food economy.

Efforts will be coordinated by Edible Edinburgh, a crosssector steering group from the public, private and third sectors, including City of Edinburgh Council and NHS Lothian. City of Edinburgh Council's Environment Convener, Councillor Lesley Hinds, who is Chair of the Edible Edinburgh steering

group, welcomed the launch of the plan.

She said: - "We are proud to be launching this plan in collaboration with our partners, who have worked with the public to ensure our vision and targets are realistic and relevant for achieving a sustainable food city for all.

"Food is central for everyone in Edinburgh, and there are a great many groups who work tirelessly towards a greener, fairer and healthier city. By building on their efforts we are determined to expand this enthusiasm to residents across the capital."

Dr Margaret Douglas, consultant in public health medicine with NHS Lothian, added: "Edible Edinburgh's vision is of 'a city where good food is available for all.' Healthy affordable food is essential for good health but for too many this is not yet a reality. Projects like Pilton Community Gardeners are showing the way by involving local people in growing healthy food and improving the local environment.

"We need change at many levels if the causes of diet-related ill health are to be tackled. Partnerships like Edible Edinburgh can help coordinate public, private, voluntary and community sector action to push for a fairer food city."

Iain Stewart, Chief Executive of Edinburgh Community Food, said: "Community food groups play a vital role in addressing inequalities by getting local people involved in making good food available locally.

"At Edinburgh Community Food we support this effort by providing food and health promotion sessions and supplying food projects throughout the city with a range of healthy affordable food products."

Art exhibition explores memory loss

In this the European Year of the Brain, a new exhibition exploring memory loss forms part of the launch programme of Gayfield Creative Spaces in Edinburgh.

Fragments marks artist Carol Sinclair's return to studio ceramics with newly commissioned works exploring the importance of memory and its role in defining who we are.

Her delicate and fragile compositions use drifting fragments of translucent white porcelain to express the complexity of our personal connections, and seek to balance what is present with the random absences that are created by time.

These new art pieces sit within Gayfield's Making Well exhibition space: a place of reflection complemented by a film of the artist's hands at work, a digital book of the exhibition and a reading area for visitors.

Gayfield's Creative Director Dr John Ennis said," I hope our Fragments exhibition provides a focus for further discussion about the role of art and design in the realms of health and well- being. Scotland leads the way in creating health technologies which involve artists and designers at an early stage. We hope to encourage future conversations in this increasingly important area."

Queen Margaret University

confers honorary degrees at Usher Hall ceremony

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Former BBC international affairs journalist, Kate Adie, joined influential theatre director, Eugenio Barba at the ceremony where they both received an honorary degree from Queen Margaret University, yesterday at the Usher Hall.



Katie Adie was awarded an honorary doctorate in recognition of her contribution to news reporting and our understanding of world events. The former BBC international affairs journalist was joined by Eugenio Barba, a theatre practitioner who has significantly influenced practice and critical thinking within the art form. Eugenio is director of Odin Teatret, a theatre company which he founded in 1964, and founder of the International School of Theatre Anthropology, both of which are based in Denmark. Both honorary graduates were acknowledged for the relevance of their work to society at large, reflecting the university's own commitment to enhancing lives in the communities it serves.

The University was delighted to award **Kate Adie**, one of the UK highest profile journalists, with a Degree of Doctors of Letters at the graduation ceremony held in Edinburgh's Usher Hall. Dressed in flak jacket, helmet and holding a microphone whilst crouching on front-lines, Kate Adie became an iconic figure associated with breaking news from some of the world's most dangerous conflict zones. She is particularly well known for her reporting of significant international events including the student uprising in China when she received a gun-shot wound to her elbow whilst reporting events in Tiananmen Square. She has also reported on turbulence and conflicts across the world such as in Northern Ireland, the Lockerbie bombing in 1988, the first Gulf War, the genocide in Rwanda in 1994, the 1997 uprising in Albania and the civil war in Sierra Leone in 2000.

Kate hung up her flak jacket and helmet in 2003 to become a freelance journalist. Since then she has written five books, been a regular presenter on BBC Radio 4's 'From Our Own Correspondent', and won numerous awards including three Royal Television Society awards, the Richard Dimbleby Award from BAFTA in 1990, the Broadcasting Press Guild's Award for Outstanding Contribution to Broadcasting, and an OBE in 1993.

As a leader in education for allied health professionals and the only provider of audiology education in Scotland, Queen Margaret University (QMU) was particularly keen to honour Kate given her work with the charity Hearing Link. Kate is a patron of Hearing Link which supports people with hearing impairment and deafness.

The University, which has areas of expertise in creativity and culture, also bestowed a Degree of Doctor of Letters on **Eugenio Barba**, an influential theatre practitioner, researcher and theorist who has enjoyed a 50 year career in the arts. Eugenio Barba has directed 76 productions, mostly with his theatre company Odin Teatret. The honorary degree recognises his influence on how we see and understand theatre and on the way drama is taught in universities and colleges.

Born in Italy in 1936, but emigrating to Norway in 1954, Eugenio began his working life as a welder and a sailor, whilst studying for a degree in French, Norwegian Literature and History of Religions at Oslo University. He went to Poland to learn directing at the State Theatre School in Warsaw, but left one year later to work with Jerzy Grotowski, a leading contemporary experimental theatre director. Eugenio also spent time in India studying Kathakali, a dance-theatre art form, which uses hand gestures, expressions and rhythmic dancing instead of dialogue and which was unknown in the west at that time.

Since 1974, Eugenio Barba and Odin Teatret have developed a unique style of working — one which trains actors who help communities discover their cultural voice, creating social interaction and breaking down barriers. Eugenio has also written over 20 books, contributes to academic publications and education, and has won numerous awards.

Professor Alan Gilloran, Deputy Principal of Queen Margaret University, presented the orations for both Eugenio Barba and Kate Adie. He said: "Among contemporary artists who have made a mark on the history of theatre, Eugenio Barba is the only one who has worked in such innovative ways across all fields of theatre, ranging from artistic creation to theoretical reflection, and to the use of theatre in a social context as a trans-cultural tool to activate relations between different social and ethnic groups. Eugenio Barba's influence reaches across all our performing arts programmes, and for that reason, all of our graduating drama and performance students and graduates owe a debt of gratitude to him."

Professor Gilloran continued: "Kate Adie's inspirational and gutsy style of reporting has shed light on some of the world's most significant events and has touched the lives of millions of people, both in the UK and around the globe. She also has expertise in areas of speech and communication which are aligned with the work carried out by Queen Margaret University's speech researchers — the impact of vocal quality,

accent and non-verbal communication in conveying information in different contexts."



The Principal of Queen Margaret University, Professor Petra Wend, paid tribute to both Kate Adie and Eugenio Barba. She concluded: "It is entirely appropriate that the University honours both these highly influential professionals — Kate Adie for her work with the media, across societies affected by conflict and in support of people with hearing loss, and Eugenio Barba for his ground-breaking development of contemporary theatre and his ability to create performance which unites communities. Both Kate's and Eugenio's achievements in their specialist areas reflect the relevance of the university's work and its aim of serving communities and improving quality of life."

Honorary degrees for Nobel laureates

Nobel-winning scientists honoured at graduation ceremony

Celebrated Nobel laureates Professors Peter Higgs and Francois Englert received honorary degrees at a ceremony in Edinburgh last weekend.

Professor Higgs, of the University of Edinburgh, and Professor Englert, of Université Libre de Bruxelles, were awarded doctorates in science from one another's institutions, at a graduation ceremony in the University of Edinburgh's McEwan Hall.

Professors Higgs and Englert won the Nobel Prize for Physics in 2013 for independently discovering a mechanism that enables elementary particles to acquire mass.

The new subatomic particle predicted by the mechanism, the Brout-Englert-Higgs boson, was confirmed to exist in 2012 following ground-breaking experiments at the European Organization for Nuclear Research (CERN) near Geneva.

At the event, Professor Sir Tom Kibble from Imperial College London, who also developed the theory of the mechanism, received a Royal Medal from the Royal Society of Edinburgh.

Professor Rolf-Dieter Heuer, Director-General of CERN, was awarded an honorary degree from the University of Edinburgh.

At the ceremony, Professor Higgs was also awarded the Freedom of the City of Edinburgh by the Lord Provost, the Rt Hon Donald Wilson.

Professor Tom Insel, Director of the National Institute of Mental Health in Bethesda, received an Honorary Doctor of Science from the University of Edinburgh.

John Byrne selling 'cheap' at Bourne Fine Art

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John Byrne is everywhere. Go to the Scottish National Portrait Gallery and you will see the exhibition of his work featuring portraits of his children and self-portraits too.

An exhibition of new works by Byrne opens at Bourne Fine Art on 5 July 2014. As part of the Edinburgh Art Festival, the exhibition will run until 30 August.

One of these works illustrated here is Binky which the artist is going to offer for sale from Friday 4 July 2014 at 10.00am. BUT there is a catch. This is one of six pieces which have been priced lower than other works on sale. To buy the art you have to be under 25, and before you all rush off to form a queue, you may have to prove your age with appropriate ID.

The gallery tell us that the exhibition takes its title from the picture of the same name and pursues largely nocturnal themes: moonlit woods occasionally populated with a lone hunter; the streets of 1950s Paisley; the self examining artist, alone and wreathed in cigarette smoke. The moonlit woods and the hunter are a counterbalance to Underwood Lane, where the pernicious teddy boys are the aggressors: the hunters are as likely to be the hunted. The huntsman has made appearances in John's work in the past but this "sporting" element has been upended. Where once the hunter was an alpha male, brimming with menace, here nature has turned on him. In some pictures, such as *The Huntsman and the Snowy Owl*, creatures spectate with a subtly comic effect. Either that, or the menace is coming from within, from the subconscious.

John Byrne's art poses dynamic puzzles: his pictures invite the viewer to look for narrative or verbal interpretation, but they refuse to be conclusive — even the artist won't be drawn on what they mean. As Jean Cocteau once put it, "An artist cannot speak about his art any more than a plant can discuss horticulture". When Byrne describes his work, he doesn't explain it; rather, it leads him to tell personal anecdotes, or even to express surprise — mirroring the viewers own puzzlement — about what a character is doing, or why an object is present. He doesn't analyse the process, either of painting or of making meaning. Fellow Paisley alumni, sculptor Sandy Stoddart, says that to think too hard is not the business of art or creativity; instead, the image should appear formed in the mind's eye — which is as far as Byrne is ever likely to describe how a composition or subject has come to him.

Nevertheless, threaded through his work is an extensive iconography that has developed over 50 years and which reveals a coherent thematic development. It may not reveal analytical meaning, but there is an insight into the artist's inner workings amounting, in some cases, to a kind of pictorial autobiography. His pictures of 1950s Ferguslie Park - Feegie, as it is known locally - capture what was once a new invention, the "teenager", as this strange new being emerged in the artist's own youth: both the physical environment and his internal landscape. In his so-called "Underwood Lane" series, the Teddy Boys who loiter — some idle, others with intent — are reminiscences of his own past. Dead End takes its title from the film showing at the Astoria cinema, featured in the picture and known locally as the 'Bug Hut'. A 1937 crime drama featuring Humphrey Bogart sets the opulent lives of the rich against what were then the slums of east-side Manhattan. It follows the Dead End Kids, a petty gang of street urchins on a path to a life of crime. The parallels aren't hard to see. Byrne's incredibly complex masterpiece of Paisley nightlife seethes with activity. All

the action — bar the man roaring on top of the roof of a Riley — takes place in alleys, dark corners and roof tops, peopled like vermin. Graffiti proliferates and shadows are cast, long and spindly. John is equally revered as screen writer and artist and the presentation of the Underwood Lane pictures reference filmic and theatrical worlds, their backdrops lit like stage-sets.

Driven less by narcissism than the problem of the elusive self, Byrne has produced many self-portraits over the years and has long continued to examine his own physiognomy. Using the vernacular of our time, the super-sized Big Selfie shows the artist staring out through red rimmed, sleep-deprived eyes. Smoke envelops him. There is physical truth and sometimes caricature in his self portraits, but what he sees looking back at him we, the viewer, are never given to understand.

Nor perhaps is the artist. The face has become mask-like by dint of our familiarity with his finely-cultivated hirsute visage, crooked nose and hooded eyes. But this intimacy only serves to distract us from what is really staring back.

This exhibition coincides with a major retrospective, Sitting Ducks, at the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, Edinburgh. It concentrates on Byrnes portraits of his family, of celebrities, or of actors and performers in character. They are individuals and types we identify with or those who, through the media and TV, have come into our homes and with whom we make a misplaced connection. By contrast, Dead End is a result of the artist's introspection, producing something personal to Byrne: a vision of the outsider, at once Everyman and his own self.

Byrne's biography reflects his diverse talents, as well as being an accomplished fine artist and a designer of theatre sets and album covers, he is one of the most notable playwrights of his generation. 'The Slab Boys' (1978) won him

the Evening Standard's most promising playwright award. In 1983 there was a New York production of 'The Slab Boys' with Sean Penn, Val Kilmer and Kevin Bacon. Three years later, Byrne wrote the immensely successful, six-time BAFTA award-winning television series 'Tutti Frutti' starring Robbie Coltrane, Emma Thompson and Richard Wilson. This was followed by countless other plays and films to the present day.

How can rising house prices in Scotland affect your credit?

- Make too many applications and this could be a red flag to lenders and make you appear desperate.
- Make late payments on your mortgage and you could damage your credit rating and jeopardise your chances of being approved for credit in the future.

- Even after your mortgage has been paid off and the account closed, any negative behaviour such as late payments or court decrees will stay on file for a further 6 years.

Not only will lenders offer a wide range of products to you, but you will also get access to the products with the lowest interest rates. This time Harry has photographed a lovely image of Her Majesty the Queen looking very relaxed and far from the formal look that is so often featured in our newspapers or on the news.

The Queen is pictured in her private study at Buckingham Palace where she holds private audiences with UK Prime Ministers. Since this portrait was commissioned by the Scottish National Portrait Gallery and supported by the Friends of the National Galleries of Scotland she is photographed wearing a gold and diamond thistle brooch.

The Edinburgh Reporter was delighted to have the opportunity of speaking with him ("call me Harry") after everyone else had left.

He said: "It is natural. I try to get people to be what they think they are not, what I think they are. Too many portraits are of what the photographers think the people look like. I have photographed the Queen hundreds of times, but we don't know each other. It was a private sitting room.

"You have got to take into account that she is 89. She is an attractive woman and it was a big honour."

Harry Benson's portrait of the Queen on view at the Scottish National Portrait Gallery



It is an exciting day at The Scottish National Portrait Gallery today. The gallery commissioned the renowned Scottish photographer Harry Benson CBE to create a new portrait of Her Majesty The Queen, and it's ready now.

The photograph was unveiled today, Tuesday 1 July 2014, and it depicts Her Majesty in the private study at Buckingham Palace where she holds her weekly audience with her prime ministers: Her Majesty wears a gold and diamond brooch featuring thistles, Scotland's national emblem.

- Born in Glasgow, Harry Benson moved early in his career to the competitive world of Fleet Street newspapers, working first for the Daily Sketch and the Daily Express. He then took photographs for LIFE Magazine and Vanity Fair. His reputation was secured 50 years ago when he created a seminal series of photographs of The Beatles on their first international tour. He has photographed every American president since Eisenhower and has created some truly iconic images, including the famous photograph of the Reagans dancing at the White House. A hugely successful retrospective of his work was held at the Scottish National Portrait Gallery in 2006.
- Mr Benson commented on the commission:- "To have been asked by the Scottish National Portrait Gallery to photograph Her Majesty The Queen for an official portrait is truly a highlight of my career. I first photographed Her Majesty in Scotland opening a coal mine in 1957, and thereafter visiting towns in Lanarkshire, Glasgow, Edinburgh, and the Western Highlands, and later in London at the opening of Parliament ... It was always an honour and a privilege, but the most memorable was when I had the opportunity to take an official portrait in Buckingham Palace for the Scottish National Portrait Gallery. I was given the opportunity of selecting the colour and dress that The Queen would wear for the portrait. My teachers at the Eastwood School in Glasgow would be amazed!"

Christopher Baker, Director of the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, added "We are delighted with this new portrait, which is the first the Scottish National Portrait Gallery has commissioned of The Queen. It is also an especially fitting way of marking a key moment in Harry Benson's distinguished

career, as 2014 is the 50th anniversary of his great portraits of The Beatles, which established his reputation as one of the finest modern photographers. Harry Benson's portrait of Her Majesty is a respectful and thoughtful work, which will, I am confident, prove extremely popular."

This commission has been supported by the Friends of the National Galleries of Scotland.

Sandy Jardine Memorial Race on Friday at Meggetland

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The City of Edinburgh Running Festival will hold a new race in memory of the former Hearts, Rangers and Scotland player Sandy Jardine.

As well as being a superb footballer Sandy was also a very good sprinter who made a number of appearances on the circuit back in the seventies.

He sadly passed away earlier this year and CERF with Sandy's wife Shona's permission decided to hold a race as a tribute to him.

Several of his friends have sponsored the scratch 300m Sandy Jardine Memorial Race, and Hibs, Hearts and Rangers have all been approached and will be represented on the night along with a number of local football and rugby clubs.

Competitors will be running in their club colours the winner will take away a first prize of £250 along with the Sandy

Jardine Memorial Trophy.

The event kicks off at 6-15pm on Friday night at Meggetland with the Memorial Race expected to take place around 9.25pm.

Second car recovered in Hamilton & Inches investigation



Police Scotland officers in Edinburgh are issuing a fresh appeal for witnesses to come forward after another car linked to the Hamilton & Inches robbery was recovered in the north of the city.

Extensive enquiries are ongoing into the high-value armed robbery that took place on Friday 6th June, when three men dressed in dark clothing entered the jewellery store at around 11.40am and threatened staff with various bladed weapons.

The trio smashed a number of display cabinets before making off with over £1 million worth of goods, including a £325,000 diamond Chatila necklace and eight Patek Phillipe watches ranging from £22,000 to £66,000.

All of the suspects were then seen entering a white BMW car, which was recovered a short time later in Gloucester Lane.

Police Scotland can today reveal that it has been established the men then abandoned the BMW before getting into a dark blue Honda CRV that was seen heading towards Stockbridge. The Honda, a late 2007 model, would have contained at least four people and it is thought to have travelled north along Gloucester Street on to Kerr Street, then through the main Stockbridge thoroughfare towards Raeburn Place.

It was recovered abandoned in a car park at East Pilton Farm Rigg in Edinburgh, and it is believed that the vehicle may have been dumped there after the robbery.

Detective Inspector Carol Craig is urging any members of the public who may have seen the vehicle in Edinburgh on Friday 6th June to get in touch with Police Scotland immediately.

"The response we have had from members of the public to this very serious incident has been terrific so far," said Detective Inspector Craig, who has been leading the investigation into the armed robbery.

"But those responsible have still to be identified and we hope that the recovery of the dark blue Honda CRV could prove crucial. We are appealing for anyone who may have seen the vehicle being driven in Stockbridge around the time of the robbery or being dumped at East Pilton Farm Rigg to come forward."

An inventory of all the stolen items continues to be undertaken but it has emerged that over £800,000 worth of jewellery was taken from the window displays alone.

The items included Chatila earrings worth £95,000 and diamond rings ranging from £3,525 to £61,000, while the most expensive piece of jewellery stolen from the window was a diamond Chatila necklace costing £325,000.

Detective Inspector Craig added: "This was clearly a very high-value robbery and the items involved very precious pieces of jewellery. It was also a frightening experience for the staff at the shop and we are working hard to establish exactly what happened."

Missing woman found safe and well



Police Scotland has confirmed that missing woman Kirsty Heggie has been found safe and well.

Kirsty, who is 23-years-old and from the Leith area, had last been seen near Holyrood Palace on Sunday morning.

She has now been located in Gullane in East Lothian and officers would like to thank the public for their considerable assistance.



Five things you need to know today

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MP launches irresponsible parking bill — QMU Honorary degrees — Edinburgh International Magic Festival — Yoga Mix — CHAS fundraising

Edinburgh North and Leith Labour MP, Mark Lazarowicz, is launching a new Private Members' Bill this week in the UK Parliament to resolve the deadlock which has delayed new legislation in the Scottish Parliament to ban irresponsible parking that can be a major headache for people like wheelchair users, the visually impaired and parents with children in pushchairs.

The Bill would end uncertainty as to whether the Scottish Parliament has the power to legislate on this issue after a Bill to introduce a Scotland-wide ban was delayed due to conflicting legal advice.

Mark said:-"This Bill would ensure that the Scottish

Government has the power to make a real difference to our streets by tackling irresponsible parking that can block pavements, kerbs and crossings and choke the flow of traffic.

"It can be dangerous where for instance it pushes people into the road to get past or impedes a wheelchair user from crossing a street because someone had thoughtlessly blocked a dropped kerb.

"A Bill in the Scottish Parliament has had its progress delayed because of conflicting legal advice as to whether the power to legislate to tackle irresponsible parking is still reserved or not.

"I want to cut through that with this Bill which would specifically devolve this power once and for all to make a practical difference to the streets in our towns and cities in Scotland."

Sandra White MSP has proposed a Bill to introduce a Scotland-wide ban on irresponsible parking. The Bill has support from a wide range of organisations such as Guide Dogs Scotland and Capability Scotland and has cross-party support in the Scotlish Parliament.

Mark was one of 20 MPs who won the right to introduce a Private Members' Bill in the draw for Bills which recently took place. He will introduce the Responsible Parking (Scotland) Bill on Wednesday.

The Bill has already won the support of MPs from other parties and Mark's move has also been welcomed by Sandra White MSP.

Mark said:-"Although the fact that there are controversial Private Members' Bills ahead of mine in the queue this year will make it a challenge to get mine through, the fact that my Bill has all party support will I believe give it a reasonable chance of making progress."

Eugenio will be awarded a Degree of Doctors of Letters.

Both honorary graduates will be acknowledged for the relevance of their work to society at large, reflecting the university's own commitment.

Witness appeal following East Craigs robbery



Police are appealing for witnesses following an assault and robbery in the East Craigs area of the city, which took place around 10.45pm yesterday (Sunday)

A 43-year-old woman was walking home when a male approached as she reached the vennel leading between houses at the east end of Mearenside.

At this time the victim was punched to the back of the neck before being robbed of her handbag.

The male then made off towards Bughtlin Park and the woman contacted police.

Enquiries are now ongoing to trace the suspect and anyone who can assist in tracing him is asked to come forward.

"We have a very detailed description of the suspect and would be keen to hear from anyone who can help us identify him.

"In addition, anyone who remembers seeing any suspicious activity in East Craigs area on Sunday evening is also asked to contact police immediately."
