The University of Edinburgh has become the first higher academic institute in the world outside Scandinavia to be approved as hosts for AIMday® — a collaborative knowledge exchange initiative which began life at Uppsala University in Sweden — giving companies access to academic specialists capable of identifying solutions to specific issues they are facing.

Organised by Edinburgh Research and Innovation, the commercialisation arm of the University of Edinburgh, AIMday's objective is to give academics valuable insights into what kind of issues companies are having difficulties with and how these might relate to their own research. By working collaboratively on real life industry challenges, fresh understanding and perspectives can be brought to company strategic objectives.

Registration is now open for the inaugural event which takes place on 18th June at the University of Edinburgh's Kings Buildings Campus where the focus will spotlight Modelling and Simulation.

The use of Modelling and Simulation is becoming increasingly important across all industries due to the need to reduce costs, minimise waste, etc. Modelling is a tool used when a system is too complex, too costly or too vast to measure.

Equally, Simulation technology has long been included in the body of knowledge of engineering management. Modelling and Simulation has already helped to reduce costs and increased the quality of products and systems.

AIMday Modelling and Simulation will help to identify ways of examining and testing various scenarios by translating a myriad of business problems which academic scientists can relate to, therefore pinpointing where improvements can be made using M&S techniques.

Ian Sharp, Commercial Relations Manager at Edinburgh Research and Innovation (ERI), University of Edinburgh commented:"Businesses can often face what they might perceive as insurmountable challenges to get a product or service to the next stage of its evolution. AIMday, with its focus of Modelling and Simulation, will be ideally suited for many businesses hoping to seek an academic partner with the pedigree to work through a range of options for testing and experimenting with potential improvements.

"Through our science and engineering disciplines, we cover a broad range of current modelling and simulation research including product life cycle modelling and designing model organisms for biological tests and access to a range of simulation software for physics and engineering applications.

"We're thrilled the University of Edinburgh has been chosen as the first outside the Nordic countries to host an AIMday and we're hoping for a good level of engagement from the Scottish industrial and business communities."

AIMday has its origins within the Ångström Materials Academy at Uppsala University, which arranged its first Materials Day in 2008.

The success was immediate. Industrial companies got expert feedback on issues of importance to them and the academic scientists gained valuable insights into the types of issues that are important to industry. In addition, ideas for further research were generated and various forms of collaborations started.

Since its inception, the AIMday concept has been extended to other disciplinary areas, like life science, humanities and social sciences where the concept has continued to flourish.

The news broke last night that convicted murderer Theresa Riggi had apparently taken her own life in a secure prison in Nottinghamshire.

The Culture & Sport Committee will approve the addition of a new inscription at Makars' Court when they meet this morning.

The latest addition proposed is a quotation from Elizabeth Melville, Lady Culross who lived in the 16th and 17th centuries. Here is what the report recommends:-

The Council of the Saltire Society now recommends that a further application be approved, to commemorate Elizabeth Melville, Lady Culross (c1578-c1640)

Elizabeth Melville, Lady Culross, was the first Scotswoman to see her work in print. Her mini-epic "Ane Godlie Dreame", was first printed in 1603; it was a best-seller, reissued at least twelve times up to 1737. A daughter of the well-known courtier, diplomat and memoirist Sir James Melville of Halhill (d.1617), Elizabeth also left a very substantial body of manuscript verse, which is only now beginning to be explored by admiring critics. The melodies to which five of her poems were designed to be sung are known, while other poems reflect her major involvement in the struggle to defend religious freedom against the policies of James VI and his son Charles I, which led to the National Covenant of 1638. Thanks to the extent of her work which has survived, she is undoubtedly Scotland's most significant early modern woman writer.

The proposed inscription, and source of the quotation, are as follows:

Elizabeth Melville, Lady Culross (c.1578-c.1640)

Though tyrants threat, though Lyons rage and rore Defy them all, and feare not to win out.

(from "Ane Godlie Dream" (1604 edition), lines 386-87

A stone inscribed in memory of John Muir will be unveiled later this spring.

Theresa Riggi found dead at Rampton Secure Hospital

A mother who stabbed her three children to death in their Edinburgh home has been found dead at Rampton Secure Hospital in Nottinghamshire.

Theresa Riggi, 49 killed her eight-year-old twins Augustino and Gianluca and five-year-old daughter Cecilia at a flat in Edinburgh's Slateford Road in August 2010.

She was originally charged with murder but the Crown accepted a plea of culpable homicide due to diminished responsibility.

At the trial, Lord Bracadale said that the killings were a "devastating family tragedy" and sentenced the American to 16 years imprisonment.

The trial heard that Riggi suffered from narcissistic, paranoid and hysterical personality disorders.

After a number of alleged attacks she was moved to Rampton from the all-female Cornton Vale Prison, near Stirling.

Council urges tenants to take action on rent arrears

×

RENT ISSUES - DON'T BURY YOUR HEAD IN THE SAND

Council tenants in Edinburgh falling behind with their rent were today urged not to bury their heads in the sand and ignore the consequences of not paying their rent.

Rent arrears for Council housing in Edinburgh have historically been low compared to other local authorities but the number of tenants getting into difficulties with their rent has been on the increase over the last 12 months. While there are a range of services in place to help tenants get back on track there are concerns that many tenants are failing to respond to offers of help and assistance when they get into arrears.

Help and advice is available from Council housing staff, who can help tenants to draw up payment plans for to repay the rent due, apply for Housing Benefit and future housing options if tenants are looking to move home. There is also an income maximisation service that helps ensure that tenants are getting all the financial help available to them and they can

also be referred on to other specialist advice agencies to deal with wider debt or support issues.

Over the next few weeks radio adverts and posters urging tenants not to ignore rent arrears problems will be aimed at those in arrears.

Councillor Cammy Day, Housing Convener, said: "We want to support tenants so that they can stay in their homes and understand that some households may face difficulties from time to time. But it's important that tenants don't bury their heads in the sand and ignore the help and support available to them and ultimately risk losing their home as a result.

"We have a responsibility to ensure people pay their rent but also get the help they need. Tenants are facing increased financial pressure as a result of benefit reforms, sanctions and suspensions. Household energy bills are placing further pressure on tenants. Increasing rent arrears means less investment in making homes more energy efficient and cheaper to heat."

Warriston tenant Lynn Derighetti, who has received advice from the Council about rent issues, was very impressed with the service. She said: "I haven't been keeping in great health and had to stop work, and had to apply for housing benefit. The north office were so helpful and took time out to go through application forms for discretionary payments, and getting the money back has helped a lot, as it eased some of the pressure.

"I would encourage anyone who is worried about rent payments to contact their local office, as they have helped me so much. I get the same person every time I phone. The first thing that you do is panic, and if it hadn't have been for the contact I've had, I would have worried myself sick. The staff are there to help you sort things out and to advise you."

Betty Stevenson, Convener of the Edinburgh Tenant's Federation, added: "Edinburgh Tenants Federation welcomes the

opportunity to be part of the Council's Rent Communication Strategy launch. It's very important that tenants get in touch with the Council if they are experiencing any problems with rent arrears."

Centre on the Wednesday 12th March 10am - 12 noon + 1:30pm - 2:30pm coinciding with No Smoking Day.

They will be sharing what they have learnt about the effects of smoking and passing on information to help smokers who would like to quit.

Pupils will be explaining about the history of Tobacco, components of a Cigarette/addiction, health and the environment, financial choices/political Legislation/Government and convincing other people NOT to smoke including Peer Pressure and Peer Bonding.

The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service have a vested interest in helping to promote No Smoking Day and encouraging people to give up smoking.

West Lothian Local Area Liaison Officer Stuart Watson said: "Most people know the long term damage smoking can do to their health and why it makes sense to give up. What a lot of people don't know is that more fires in which people are killed are as a result of carelessness with smoking materials than any other single cause.

"It only takes a moment of carelessness to cause a fire that could cost someone their home, their possessions, or even their life.

"It is vital that smokers make sure they have fully extinguished cigarettes and matches immediately after use and, once lit, they should never be left unattended.

"Having a working smoke alarm gives that vital early warning should a fire start. We provide free home fire safety visits and fit smoke alarms where required.

"If you plan to give up smoking on 12th March we wish you every success".

Volunteers across 95 beaches and 45 canals in the UK will this year join forces with the aim of clearing more than last year's massive haul of 30 tonnes of litter — the equivalent weight of two double decker buses. Most of the litter collected will be common waste items such as fishing nets, ropes and bottles tops. However last year M&S beach and canal cleaners found an array of unusual items including a bath,

coffee maker, HM Prison Service toothbrush and a Freeview box.

Aikido Returns to Nicolson Square

Edinburgh Aikido, the club specialising in the promotion and teaching of the Japanese martial art, has returned the Epworth

Halls, Nicolson Square, which is owned by The City of Edinburgh Methodist Church, after the church completed its two million-pound renovation of its buildings last month. Aikido is a physical discipline and martial art that stresses the redirecting of an attacker's force to create a throw or pin them down. These concepts may also be extended as a philosophy.

For Scott Reed, who is the instructor at Edinburgh Aikido, it is satisfying return to where he first learned the martial art in Edinburgh. Scott is now an aikido expert — a 4th Dan Black Belt. He attended aikido classes at Nicolson Square from 2000-2004 while he was a student at Edinburgh University studying Astrophysics. He quickly moved on to be an instructor after studying aikido full-time in Paris.

Scott says, "It's great that the club is back at the venue where we trained for so many years." Of the new classes he says, "The first class in any evening is an all-levels one where we cover most of the techniques of aikido. Later on Mondays, we have the weapons class. Aikido incorporates the study of some classic Japanese weapons, mainly the sword and staff. But don't worry — there's also a dedicated beginners class as well."

Scott is Head of Engineering at an Edinburgh-based robotics firm but is committed to the teaching of aikido in his spare time, passing on his own martial art skills.

Edinburgh Aikido club is running a special free 'Come and Try' and demo session on Wednesday 12 March at 7.30pm to mark the start of its new classes at Nicolson Square.

An official opening celebration for the Methodist Church's newly-refurbished buildings at Nicolson Square will take place later in the year.

Schools celebrate Chinese language and culture at St George's

St George's School for Girls recently jointly hosted, with the City of Edinburgh Confucius Hub, the first collaborative event celebrating the learning of Chinese Language and Culture among the City of Edinburgh Schools.

Approximately fifty school children of S2-S6 age attended the event from local authority and private schools. The contributing schools were Firhill, St Thomas of Aquin's, Tynecastle, Royal High, Leith Academy, Craigmount, Fettes College and St George's.

With the teaching of Chinese firmly embedded in the curriculum of participating schools the event provided an opportunity to share ideas and resources to stimulate the learning and teaching of Chinese language and culture. A series of practical workshops run by Chinese teachers was staged throughout the afternoon with pupils taking part in informal Mandarin sessions, Tai Chi, and the Chinese Tea Ceremony. Students were also introduced to Chinese Calligraphy, Chinese Etiquette, and Chinese Music.

'There is a real enthusiasm for this initiative and I am delighted that by joining forces with Leith Academy's Confucius Hub we were able to spread the net and have a good cross section of Edinburgh schools attending,' says Anne

Everest, head of St George's. 'In order to be successful, today's students need to be learning in a global context. St George's International Education programme takes a variety of forms through which we seek to broaden students' cultural awareness, develop their linguistic proficiency and promote greater self-awareness and independence in order that our girls can take their place in the world as global citizens. This sort of event helps to develop our students' ability to work collaboratively and deepens cultural awareness; and, from the student's point of view, learning thus becomes more meaningful.'

St George's has had a Confucius Classroom since 2008 and all S1 girls have a block of Chinese as part of their carousel of Languages. Chinese is a subject option right through to Advanced Higher level.

The school is recognised with an International School Award for its international perspective and for its outstanding achievement in developing international activities with schools worldwide. This global outlook seeks to benefit the whole school community.

The next collaborative event between St George's and the City of Edinburgh Confucius Classrooms will be 'The next step on the Mandarin journey' on 20 June 2014, aimed at pupils who are thinking about taking Chinese on to further education.

Two women sought after pensioner robbed in Whitburn

David Murphy chats to the Edinburgh Reporter



Last week former Hibs' favourite David Murphy formally

announced his premature retirement from the beautiful game due to injury. The sad news sparked hundreds of messages of support on social media sites on both sides of the border and David kindly chatted to the Edinburgh Reporter about his time in the capital.

The popular defender said: "I had three and a half fantastic years with Hibs and still watch their games on TV when they are on, and follow their results every week. I actually watched the last derby and was delighted to see Hibs win 2-1 with a late penalty.

"I have many friends in Edinburgh and still visit the city when I get the chance. I have driven past the new East Stand which looks great but I have not seen it from the inside yet although I am hoping to get up and take in a game.

"We had a great team and I honestly think we could have challenged for the league if we had been able to stay together even for one more season, but it was not to be. We were a young and vibrant team that played an exciting brand of football which was started by Tony Mowbray and continued by John Collins and the CIS Cup was one of the main highlights of my career."

The highlight of David's time at Hibs was obviously the CIS Cup win in 2007 and he remembers the cup run well. He continued: "We seemed to have a momentum, beating Hearts at Easter Road in the quarter final then St Johnstone in the semi. I remember that game well as there was a fantastic Hibs' support on three sides of Tynecastle. The game went into extra time and we got a free-kick which I took and thankfully went in although to be honest I thought their keeper should have saved it.

"That of course led to the final against Kilmarnock and over 35,000 Hibs fans took over Hampden. I can honestly say that the support that day was up there with the best I have ever

seen and it helped to inspire us to produce a great performance.

"I was lucky enough to play a part in the opening goal as I took the corner and bug Jonah (Rob Jones) got his noggin onto it and the ball flew into the net. The rest is history and the scenes at the end were unbelievable. That was one of the proudest days of my career.

"The shirt I wore that day is hanging on my mother's wall alongside my Birmingham one from the Wembley final where we beat Arsenal. She also has both medals.

"I left Hibs for Birmingham the following season but it was nice to leave with so many memories. In fact had I still been fit, I would have loved to have returned to Easter Road to play for the club that really kick started my career.

"Unfortunately that wasn't to be and I have known for a few months that my injury wasn't going to allow me to continue playing but now I just have to get over the disappointment.

"I have business interests outside football, but I still believe that I have much to offer the game."

David made his Hibs' debut on 7th August 2004 against Kilmarnock at Easter Road in a back four that included Steven Whittaker, Gary Caldwell and Colin Murdoch.

He quickly became a favourite of the Easter Road faithful with his skilful touch and ability to kill a ball arriving from any angle, coupled with his attacking runs down the left wing. He was also a stout defender and few wingers ever managed to get the better of him.

In all, David played 134 times for Hibs, scoring eight goals including a memorable free kick in the CIS League Cup semifinal at Tynecastle to send Hibs on their way to Hampden. He also scored against both halves of the Old Firm in Glasgow and

played in two 3-0 wins at Ibrox, setting up Ivan Sproule for the first goal of his memorable hat-trick.

In the CIS Cup Final, it was David's inch perfect cross to the edge of the six yard box that allowed Rob Jones to score the opening goal sparking amazing scenes at the National Stadium.

On 17 January 2008, former Hibs' boss Alex McLeish parted with £1.5m to take David to Birmingham City where he won a League Cup winners medal in the Blues' famous win over Arsenal at Wembley.

Witness appeal following Broomhall robbery

Police are appealing for witnesses following a robbery in the west of the city over the weekend.

"In addition, anyone who recognises the description of the suspects and can help us to trace them is also asked to get in touch."

On 5 March 2014, the Presiding Officer oversaw the arrival of the latest feature in the Scottish Parliament gardens — two beehives — to help support the honey bee population. The beehives will be home to Scottish honey bees which will arrive later in the year.

The council meet this week and in advance of that the Council Leader, Andrew Burns has issued his monthly leader's report. In it he emphasises the council's plea to those in rent arrears to get in touch with the council to discuss their problems.

The Council can help and does have some funding available, particularly for those adversely affected by the recent welfare reforms. As long as people are making arrangements to pay their rent, we can help.

The last thing we want is for people to lose their homes but, at the same time, we rely on rental income to invest in providing cheap-to-heat, modern and comfortable homes fit for the 21st Century.

If you know of someone who is in arrears with their rent, please encourage them to contact us to get help. They can email rentfirst@edinburgh.gov.uk or phone 0800 028 2786."

The council have a policy of non-eviction for rent arrears if the difficulties relate to the 'bedroom tax' but only if the tenant is in active conversation with the council.

Contract for new Sick Kids awarded

A major milestone has been reached with the plans to develop a new landmark clinical facility in Edinburgh.

Integrated Health Solutions Lothian have been chosen as the preferred bidder to design, build and maintain the new Royal Hospital for Sick Children and Department of Clinical Neurosciences at the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh site.

The project will mean that services from the Royal Hospital for Sick Children, the Department of Clinical Neurosciences, currently based at the Western General Hospital, and the Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service from the Royal Edinburgh Hospital are brought together in a high quality, modern facility.

As part of the procurement process a legal standstill period is currently being observed and, following this period, Integrated Health Solutions Lothian will then work with NHS Lothian to finalise the details for the new building.

Construction work is expected to start in autumn 2014, with the hospital becoming operational in the summer of 2017.



Susan Goldsmith, Director of Finance, NHS Lothian said: "The selection of a preferred bidder follows an extensive and thorough evaluation process.

"This announcement marks a major milestone in what is an extremely exciting project for the people of Lothian and

beyond.

"The development will prove significant in shaping the future of care by bringing children's, maternity and adult services together on the same site.

"It will build on the existing centre of excellence, creating a major trauma centre and providing opportunities for sharing experience, expertise and research."

The project is the first acute hospital facility to be procured under the Scottish Government's Non Profit Distributing (NPD) model and the NHS Lothian team have been working closely with Scottish Futures Trust and the Scottish Government to prepare for the procurement process.

The Cabinet Secretary for Health and Wellbeing, Alex Neil MSP said: "I am delighted to see the positive progress being made in the delivery of this dedicated new children's hospital and national centre of excellence for clinical neurosciences.

"NHS Lothian has worked hard to get the project to this important stage and I look forward to hearing how they work with Integrated Health Solutions Lothian to commence construction later this year."

Peter Reekie, director of finance and member of the Project Steering Board, Scottish Futures Trust, said:- "It's fantastic to reach this milestone on such a significant hospital project. Robust project preparation and the strength of the NHS Lothian project team, combined with SFT's simplified NPD programme approach had led to a highly efficient and competitive procurement.

"I look forward to working with the team and preferred bidder to deliver construction activity later this year, which will be welcome news to many local businesses."
