Planning for Royal Edinburgh Hospital — Field of Light opens today in St Andrew Square — Mammoths of the Ice Age — John Byrne talk at Edinburgh College of Art — Manipulate Festival

A planning application was lodged last October for the Royal Edinburgh Hospital which closes for comments until this Friday 7 February 2014. These are revised plans but the local community council reports that not much has changed.

The Field of Light is opening this evening in St Andrew Square. We will be there to capture the first glimpse of the spectacle which will last until 27 April 2014.

9,500 lighted glass spheres will rise from the ground on slender stems to create a natural and otherworldly effect

through the volume of spheres, the glow of the lights and gentle shapes. The piece has been conceived to create an immersive experience, inviting people to wander through St Andrew Square along the existing pathways and view the space in a new way.

The Field of Light, created specifically for St Andrew Square, is the first time the piece has been exhibited within an urban landscape and the exhibition will be his Scottish debut.

Rugby (Scotland) by John Preece

Four representative matches were played over the weekend with one draw, and three defeats on the score card. First up, the Scotland 'A' side were playing the England Saxons at Scotstoun and the Scots were looking for their third win in a row against the English. It wasn't to be, but in spite of being behind at half time 10-6 — courtesy of a penalty and a converted penalty try to two penalties — the Scots came back with a try of their own following another English penalty, to take the score to 13-13. Another penalty from England, took the visitors into the lead, but a late on goal from Scotland meant the match finished all-square, 16-16.

It wasn't such good news for the U20 side, which endured a battering from both the weather and a strong Irish team. 20-0 down at half time, the Scots leaked another 14 points before they landed a solitary try of their own with seconds left on the clock to make it a 34-7 victory to Ireland.

Not so good news for the women either as they were hammered into submission by another strong Irish side. 32-0 down at half time, the Scots never stood a chance. However, good play in the second half from the Scots saw Ireland 'only' able to score 27 points, scoring four tries in the first 13 minutes. However the rest of the half was dominated by the never-say-die Scots, but the old failing of not being able to cross the line, meant that they stayed rooted on zero, while Ireland managed to score another, late, try against the run of play to finish the 59-0 winners.

Even worse news for the Senior side was their 28-6 defeat to

Ireland's 'big boys'. Scotland had the first chance for points but Laidlaw saw his kick hit the post, which wasn't a problem for Sexton as he put Ireland into an early lead. Laidlaw drew the sides level with a successful kick, but seconds later Ireland were ahead again with another Sexton kick. Scotland dominated both territory and possession in the first half, but it was Ireland who were to score the first try. Both teams had almost scored tries earlier in the game, but close isn't quite the same as crossing the line. Quick recycle from a penalty line out in the left corner saw the passed ball outrun the Scots' defence to give Trimble an easy gallop over in the other corner. Sexton missed the kick and Ireland went in 11-3 ahead.

The second half Irish team either put some sort of sedative in Scotland's tea or fielded another five players for the second half as they went on to totally dominate the match. Laidlaw did score first with another penalty, but two tries allied to Sexton's boot saw the Irish safely over the line 28-6

In spite of predictions to the contrary, the weather didn't wipe out this weekend's programme, so the spectators and players enjoyed a full calendar of fixtures.

In the Premiership, Currie scored their fifth win of the season with a 16-7 defeat of Glasgow Hawks in Glasgow, while Edinburgh Accies lost 30-13 away to Gala. Their near neighbours, Heriots survived a wee scare in Aberdeen as the narrowly defeated Aberdeen Grammar 21-17.

In the League table, Heriots are third with 52 points and Accies are fifth with 30. While, in the relegation zone, Currie now have a clear four point advantage over Aberdeen at the bottom with 25 points. With the first four clubs breaking free — 16 point gap between fourth and fifth — and heading for British and Irish Cup qualification, the rest of the table

looks very close — five points cover fifth to ninth — with any of the six teams in danger of relegation if results don't pan out to their satisfaction.

In the National League, the top of the table clash at Myreside went the way of Boroughmuir, who beat Watsonians 13-6 at Myreside (full match report elsewhere). Stewarts-Melville, on the other hand had to settle for a 10-10 draw away to Dundee.

This leave Boroughmuir a further three points clear — 'Sonians gained a bonus point — with 64 points to second placed Watsonians 53. But, Stew-Mel's two points at Dundee means they close the gap to a single point with 52 points for third place.

With only three scheduled league matches left in the season for most teams — a few have some 'weather affected' games in hand — the relegation zone in the Premiership is hard to predict, although Aberdeen seem to have lost their way a little. But, at the top of the National League, it is looking like Boroughmuir are rank favourites — as they have been from the start of the season — to go up, while Watsonians and Stewarts-Melville are in a closely fought chase for runner's up spot. So it looks possible that there could be five Edinburgh teams in the Premiership next season if the games go to plan, but there should be at least four — Heriots, Edinburgh Academy, Boroughmuir and one or two from Currie/Watsonians/Stewarts-Melville.

Inverness Caledonian Thistle 2 Heart of Midlothian 2

Hearts had an all too brief respite from their travails of league business with a League Cup semi-final against Inverness Caledonian Thistle at Easter Road on Sunday. It was a re-match of the same stage of the competition a year and a week ago. Sadly, the outcome was different; whereas in 2013, Hearts were the victors after a penalty shoot-out, this year it was the Highlanders, who were reduced to nine men, who emerged victorious after another penalty shoot-out.

Hearts had re-arranged their midweek SPFL fixture against St. Mirren in order than Ryan Stevenson could complete his two match suspension following a red card at Perth a couple of weeks ago. Ironically, with Hearts winning the two games in which the former Ayr United man was missing, Stevenson didn't start the semi-final, taking his place on the substitutes bench alongside Hearts new on-loan signing from West Ham, Paul McCallum.

Hearts boss Gary Locke began the game with the same side that defeated St. Mirren on Wednesday but they were almost behind after just three minutes when a mistake by skipper Danny Wilson allowed Caley Thistle's McKay to set up Draper but his effort went over the bar.

John Hughes' men looked the livelier of the sides in the early stages but Hearts eventually pulled themselves into the game. Sam Nicholson's pace and trickery was causing the Jags defence problems and his effort from 20 yards produced a decent save from Brill in the Caley Thistle goal. Dale Carrick then headed over when he really ought to have found the target as play raged from end to end. The best chance of a goalless first half, however, fell to Caley Thistle's McKay on the stroke of half-time. The striker got ahead of his Hearts namesake Brad before firing in a shot which Hearts keeper Jamie MacDonald did brilliantly to save.

As happened in last year's semi-final, Inverness took the lead early in the second half. From 20 yards out Tansey fired in blistering shot which whistled past MacDonald to put the Highlanders a goal up.

This seemed to ignite Hearts and Callum Paterson produced a superb save from Brill before Caley Thistle were reduced to ten men when Warren was shown a second yellow card of the afternoon when he fouled Sam Nicholson. From the free-kick, Ryan Stevenson rolled the ball to Jamie Hamill whose shot took a deflection before nestling in the net to level the scores at 1-1. The Hearts fans celebrated and they were ecstatic two minutes later when Hamill scored again, this time with a magnificent 20 yard free-kick.

Jamie MacDonald then produced a wonder save from Meekings but this was the Caley Thistle defender's last involvement before being sent off for a late challenge on Scott Robinson. Hearts were 2-1 up against nine men as the regulation 90 minutes drew to a close and a third cup final appearance in less than two years seemed on the cards. However, calamity struck when shoddy defending from Hearts allowed substitute Ross to squeeze the ball past MacDonald in the final minute to take the tie to extra time.

Caley Thistle defended resolutely during the extra half an hour and Hearts, despite their numerical advantage, just could not break them down. Newcomer Paul McCallum, on as a substitute, had the best chance at the end but couldn't direct his header on target.

So the tie was decided by a penalty shoot-out. After Shinnie missed his kick for Thistle, Paul McCallum had the opportunity to make an immediate name for himself — but he also missed his spot kick. Danny Wilson and Dale Carrick scored for Hearts but Jamie Hamill, so often hero from the penalty spot missed his kick. Caley Thistle converted their remaining penalties and so progressed to the League Cup Final with Aberdeen on 16 March.

It was a bitterly disappointing end to the game for the Hearts supporters in the crowd of 12,762. Their team's failure to see out a game against opponents who had just nine players was quite frankly an embarrassment and some fans weren't slow in making their feelings known as the Maroon Army trudged out of Easter Road.

Afterwards, Gary Locke struggled to contain his anguish. "We only have ourselves to blame. It was a great opportunity to get to a final. Defending in the last minute, we had chances to get rid of the ball before we did. But there's nothing we can do about it now."

Police concern for missing Edinburgh man

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for information to help trace a man reported missing in the Capital.

Alistair Porteous was last seen leaving his home in The

Steils, Greenbank at around 2pm on Wednesday 29th January.

The 56-year-old has not been since then and enquiries are underway to establish his whereabouts.

Police in Fort William have since recovered Mr Porteous' Saab car after finding it parked at the head of Glen Nevis on Saturday morning.

Local officer, mountain rescue teams and the RAF have since been deployed to search the mountain and locate Mr Porteous. However, so far, he is yet to be traced.

Anyone with information that can assist Police Scotland with their investigation is asked to come forward.

Mr Porteous is described as white and is believed to have been wearing black waterproof trousers and jacket, a blue woolly hat and carrying a black and grey rucksack.

A Police Scotland spokesman said: "We believe Mr Porteous may have taken an unscheduled trip to Fort William to walk the mountain trail at Glen Nevis.

"He is an avid and competent hill walker. However, he did not tell family or friends where he was going and has yet to be traced.

"As such, we are growing increasingly concerned for his welfare.

"Anyone with information that can help us trace Mr Porteous is asked to contact Police immediately."

Council meeting this week — Usher Hall Centenary — Waverley Care — Edinburgh Bookshop events — Trade Waste Pilots

When the council meets this week it will be the first of two meetings involving all 58 councillors in February.

The first meeting will have a normal kind of agenda covering business of all kinds, but the second on February will concentrate only on setting the council's budget for the next year. The draft budget was published in October and the public

were asked for their views until the end of last year. The council have restrictions on what they can spend their budget on, but they must make cumulative savings of around £95.2m by the year 2017-18.

This has been recognised from early on in this administration when they set out the need for savings in a report to the Finance and Budget Committee dated 15 November 2012.

So far they have raised over £250 out of their £800 target.

The council has decided to test out new arrangements to collect trade waste from businesses on Leith Walk at certain times from next month onwards. This will mean that waste

should not be stored on pavements and that pedestrians should have an easier time of negotiating their way down the street.

The number of large industrial sized bins has increased over recent years and the council now believes that by getting rid of these bins they will be improving the appearance of the city's streets for residents and tourists alike.

A further two pilot schemes will be trialled in Rose Street and the High Street where bins have also increased to the point where the council feels it is time to take action.

The whole point is that trade waste will now be collected twice daily and so businesses will no longer need large bins and should use bags or collapsible bins instead. Recycling of dry rubbish will also be accommodated as well as residual waste which goes to landfill. The more that businesses recycle the more they will save on collection costs.

The main problem which the council faces will be in relation to glass waste. Anyone who lives near a pub will know of the nuisance this can cause, but again there will be a twice daily collection meaning that smaller amounts are collected each time, hopefully creating less noise.

Businesses will be made much more responsible for disposal of their trade waste, in an effort to copy schemes in Manchester and Westminster where streets have been significantly improved.

Rugby - Watsonians v Boroughmuir

Boroughmuir take the points in a lacklustre encounter at Myreside.



The day started badly with the revelation that the programme named, but didn't number, the players and faded away after that with a fairly dreary match, played under fairly dreary skies.

Boroughmuir started the better of the two teams with some attacking rugby from the off, forcing Watsonians into kicking downfield on a couple of occasions. Their persistence was rewarded after about nine minutes of play when they were awarded a penalty inside their opponents half. However, the kick from the No. 10, David Reekie, bounced off the crossbar and back into play where one of the 'Muir players collected the ball and appeared to touch down for the try. Unfortunately the referee had spotted a knock on and the scrum was awarded to 'Sonians, allowing them to clear their lines.

This point also signalled a sea-change in the flow of the match and it was the home side that played the better for the rest of the half. They were awarded a penalty after another five minutes of play, which Mike Ker knocked over to put them 3-0 ahead. The game then see-sawed back and forth, but territorial advantage always lay with the home side. A few probing runs into the opponents 22 came to naught, however, but the visitors were struggling to even cross the half way line.

Another penalty a few minutes from half time put 'Sonians 6-0 to the good, before disaster struck, Running the ball back to

'Muir territory, a quick recycle had the ball with Ker. His quick pass infield then failed to find its target as 'Muir's 13, Alex Cox intercepted and ran half the length of the pitch to score the only try of the match under the posts. Reekie couldn't — and didn't — miss the conversion and so the visitors were 7-6 ahead, which remained the score at the break.

If anything, the second half was less exciting than the first, with Watsonians clearly unable to match their first half performance. Barely able to get out of their end of the pitch for the majority of the half, they went further behind from two penalties, a successful one from Reekie and another later in the half from Craig Marshall.

As darkness was beginning to descend, the match brightened up considerably as someone, somewhere found a shilling for the meter — ask your parents — and the lights went on. But, it took until five minutes from the end of the match — which coincided with the heavens opening — before Watsonians were able to put in a meaningful attack. It almost paid off as they penetrated to inside the 'Muir five metre line, but a fumble gave the visitors a chance to clear from the scrum and the match ended 13-6 to Boroughmuir a few seconds later.

The cold, swirling wind, heavy pitch and frequent showers did nothing the help this top of the table clash turn into the spectacle it could have been. However, neither team looked like scoring a barrow load of tries and, if it hadn't been for a fortunate interception — suspiciously like offside — then there may not have been any scored at all. This all leaves the top of the table 'as was' with Boroughmuir a further three

points ahead of Watsonians and Stewarts-Melville close behind in third. The 'quality' of the match was highlighted when Boroughmuir's videographer commented that the most exciting thing he'd shot all day was the rainbow in the first half!

Gus Poyet says SPFL will benefit Duncan Watmore

Hibs beat off competition from EIGHT Football League clubs to sign Duncan Watmore from Sunderland as manager Gus Poyet believes that the chance to play in front of big crowds in Scotland will help the 19 year old to develop his potential.

Watmore made a big impression for Sunderland Under-21s since arriving from non-league Altrincham during the summer, and was handed his first-team debut in the FA Cup third round victory over Carlisle.

Hibs' manager Terry Butcher who used to manager Sunderland, made a personal check on Watmore in the Under-21s' 1-1 draw with Stoke City last month, and opted to make a move for the winger.

Poyet believes the chance to play in front of big crowds in the SPL will be more beneficial to Watmore than plying his trade in Leagues One or Two.

Poyet told the Shields Gazette: "It's a great opportunity for Duncan Watmore to go to Hibernian. He's impressed me because of where he's come from, and where he's playing. To have an

opportunity to go to Hibernian is massive, and we couldn't let it pass. We couldn't really promise any opportunities for sure here in the first-team.

"There were a few clubs in England who wanted him, and they were easy options because we could have recalled him. But after talking to Terry, (Butcher) I think it was a unique opportunity for him — to go from where he was one year ago to play proper football.

"There's pressure and exposure up there with the television. Even in one game against Celtic it's going to be amazing."

Hearts advice to supporters attending semi-final



Hearts have issued a statement reminding supporters that any damage caused to Easter Road at tomorrow's League Cup Semifinal, including applying stickers to any parts of the ground, will be charged to Hearts and that is an expense that the club simply cannot afford.

In addition, flares, fireworks or any type of pyrotechnics cannot be taken into Easter Road or its surrounding areas and police will be on hand to carry out searches.

The statement on the club's website reads:

"Supporters intending to attend the Scottish League Cup semifinal match between Hearts and Inverness CT at Easter Road on February 2 should read the following important information.

"Heart of Midlothian Football Club would like to remind its supporters to enjoy the cup match in a peaceful manner. The club is proud of the way its supporters have behaved at Easter Road in recent times and would like to encourage fans to continue to uphold the good name of Heart of Midlothian Football Club.

"The club is confident its fans will display their usual passionate support for the team on the pitch whilst behaving before, during and after the match.

"Buses carrying supporters should park on London Road. Supporters are encouraged to make their way to the game in a civilised manner and respect their surroundings.

"Supporters are asked to allow sufficient travel time for the 12:15pm kick off. Turnstiles will open from 11:15am and supporters are asked to be in the Stadium 30 minutes before Kick-off.

"A new automated access system at Easter Road, allowing supporters to self-scan their tickets on entering the stadium, is in operation.

"Supporters are asked to insert the short barcoded end of their match ticket into the reader with the barcode facing up. If someone is entering into the stadium directly in front of you please wait until they are fully inside the stadium before scanning your ticket. Once you have successfully scanned your ticket a green light will then be displayed on the screen of the reader and the turnstile will release automatically. You should then push the turnstile to gain admission.

"Safety Stewards will be on hand externally to assist supporters on the use of the system and in addition Stewards

are located internally to check ticket price classification of the person entering the Stadium via a traffic light system at the turnstiles.

"Supporters are reminded that any damage caused at the stadium, including applying stickers to any parts of the ground, will be charged to Hearts and that is an expense that the club simply cannot afford. In addition, Supporters cannot bring flares, fireworks or any type of pyrotechnics into Easter Road or its surrounding areas.

"Police officers may carry out searches outside Easter Road in an attempt to prevent supporters carrying flares, fireworks, pyrotechnics, alcohol or any other kind of contraband from entering the stadium.

"Anyone caught in possession of any prohibited item can expect to be arrested at the time or as a result of a post match investigation. As well as a criminal conviction, supporters may find themselves banned from attending football matches throughout the country."

Tim Clancy and Rowan Vine leave Hibs by mutual consent



Hibs have announced that Irish defender Tim Clancy and English striker Rowan Vine have both left the club by mutual consent.

29 year old Clancy was signed by fellow countryman Pat Fenlon from Motherwell during the summer of 2012 and made a scoring debut against East Fife in a friendly with a stunning free

kick.

His first competitive game came in a 3-0 defeat to Dundee United at Tannadice but injuries hampered his career at Easter Road.

In total Clancy played 21 times for Hibs, scoring one competitive goal against Celtic in a 2-2 draw at Parkhead.

His last game was a 0-0 draw with Aberdeen on 22 April 2013.

31 year old Vine joined the club from St Johnstone in the summer and made his debut against Malmo in Sweden.

In total, he played 14 times in the Hibs jersey without finding the net.

Vine has since joined former Hibs striker Garry O'Connor at Morton.

A statement on the club website reads: "Hibernian would like to thank Tim Clancy and Rowan Vine for the contributions they all made to the Club and we would like to wish them every success in the future."

Leigh Griffiths signs 4 year deal with Celtic



Leigh Griffiths has joined Celtic on a four year deal after passing a medical last night with the champions.

The former Hibs' striker travelled north yesterday after Wolverhampton Wanderers accepted Celtic's third bid.

Griffiths could make his debut against St Mirren on Sunday depending on international clearance although his first start is more likely to come against Aberdeen at Parkhead in next week's William Hill Scottish Cup.

After signing, Griffiths told the club website: "I'm just delighted it's finally done now. It's been a long day and I just can't wait to get started tomorrow in training. It was in the middle of December that I first found out there was interest and as soon as the window opened I was just praying for it to be done. It has gone to the last day but it's finally done now, and I'm delighted. The chance to come to Celtic is once-in-a-lifetime opportunity and you have to grab it with both hands. You can't turn it down."

"I am coming to the biggest club in Scotland to win things, hopefully play in the Champions League and just get better as a player. The gaffer has been very supportive to me in the press so far and he knows what I can do," he said. "That's why he has brought me to the squad and hopefully I can add goals and help the team win trophies.

"The first time I spoke to Neil was this morning at the training ground and he was very easy to talk to — he said what he wanted from me and I told him what I would bring to the team. He's happy that he has brought me in and I can't wait to get going.

"We have good strikers here, but the manager sees me as a good player and hopefully I can force my way into the team and stay there.

"I have only played a handful of games for Scotland and I don't think I have done myself any justice so far," he said. "But there is no bigger place to play than in the Champions League and hopefully in six months time I will be doing that."

Griffiths started his professional career with Livingston where he scored 24 goals in 43 starts before moving to Dundee.

He kept up his scoring record with an impressive 29 goals in 49 starts.

After moving to Wolves, the Edinburgh born striker was sent out on loan to his boyhood favourites Hibs where he helped the club reach consecutive Scottish Cup finals, scoring 39 goals in 72 starts.

In the summer he returned to the midlands and this season has scored 13 goals in 21 starts.

Hibs announce three new loan deals

Hibs have announced three new loan signings: Notts County striker Danny Haynes, Sunderland winger Duncan Watmore and Arsenal defender Daniel Boateng. The trio will join the club on loan until the end of the season. All loan moves are subject to international clearance.

Throughout the transfer window, Terry Butcher has insisted that he wanted to bring in new faces to freshen up the squad, but likened the process to the domino world championship where one move could spark a series of others.

He also maintained that any moved would be in the last few days, and the Hibs' boss has been true to his word.

Former England under-19 internationalist Haynes, 26, is a quick forward, who can operate on either wing or through the middle and arrives at Easter Road with a wealth of English Championship experience.

After originally making his name at Ipswich Town — where he won the 2005 FA Youth Cup alongside Hibernian captain Liam Craig — Haynes has experienced spells with Millwall (loan), Bristol City, Barnsley and Charlton Athletic before joining Notts County in the summer.

Butcher believes Haynes will provide extra width and pace to Hibernian's attack and says he is delighted to have finalised the loan deal.

Butcher told Hibernian TV: "Danny is an extremely quick forward, who can play anywhere up front. I've followed his career since he made the breakthrough at my old club, Ipswich Town and he has scored goals wherever he has played.

"He will add extra experience, pace and quality to our forward line and we're pleased to be able to bring Danny to Hibernian."

Butcher watched Watmore in action for Sunderland's under-21 side against Stoke City earlier on in the month and believes the inclusion of 19-year-old will add an extra attacking option to the team.

He added: "Duncan is a quick, direct winger with a good work-rate. He is a young player, who has impressed me with his intelligence on the pitch, eye for goal and quality deliveries into the box.

"Duncan has already made his first team debut at Sunderland and he is highly-rated by the coaching staff there; we're pleased to be able to add him to the squad."

Formerly with English non-league side Altrincham, Watmore

joined Sunderland in the summer and made his first team bow at the beginning of January in an FA Cup tie against Carlisle United.

Right-back Boateng, 21, has progressed up through the youth ranks at Arsenal and has previously been on loan at both Swindon Town and Oxford United. Boateng will join up with the Hibernian squad on Monday.

West Lothian man jailed for domestic abuse



A man who subjected his victims to a sustained period of domestic abuse and physical violence was jailed at the High Court in Glasgow today.

James Alexander Boyd was sentenced to spend six and a half years in prison for six incidents of violence against women in West Lothian.

The 28-year-old had previously been convicted earlier this month for the attacks, which took place over ten years following an investigation by the Domestic Abuse Task Force based in Bathgate.

Detective Inspector Helen Pasquale from the DATF said: "When Police Scotland was launched one of the key priorities was to tackle domestic abuse by identifying offenders like James Boyd and bring them to justice.

"The Domestic Abuse Task Force conducted thorough enquiries during what was a complex and sensitive investigation, which required the assistance and co-operation of his victims.

"I would like to thank those women today for the courage they have shown in helping ensure Boyd will spend a considerable period of time behind bars.

"His sentence today reflects the commitment of the DATF, Police Scotland and the Crown Office in removing violent domestic offenders from our communities.

"I would like to reassure the public that we treat all reports of domestic abuse with the utmost seriousness and professionalism and would urge victims of these offences to report their abuse to police."

Looking ahead to the Scottish Grand National this spring



It may be a while away yet but canny horse racing punters are already sizing up the likely odds for the <u>Scottish Grand National</u>, which will be held at Ayr on 11 and 12 April 2014. We may have a few meets before then but let's forget the January weather and take a look forward to the biggest race of the season.

All about Ayr

The home of the Scottish Grand National is, of course, <u>Ayr</u> and we're looking forward to the highlight of our National Hunt racing calendar. But before we got into that, how much do you know about Ayr?

It's the premier racecourse in Scotland and was officially opened in 1907. However, fascinatingly, racing in Ayr can be traced way back to the 1500s. No wonder it still causes such a buzz. It may have fewer entrants than the Aintree Grand National but it's no less hard won an honour.

The course is four miles and 110 yards long with 27 fences between the starting point and the victory point. Typically there are around 25 entrants and this year it looks like there should be around that number, although it's early days yet.

History of the Scottish Grand National

When all the Aintree excitement has died down the eyes of the racing world turn to Ayr. But how much do you know about our very own Grand National? Originally the course was at Houston, Renfrewshire for a short time before moving in 1858 to Bogside, near Irvine. It was then a race of around three miles and wasn't known as the Scottish Grand National until 1880.

Although several winners have also won at Aintree, none in the same year apart from the aforementioned Red Rum. Horses who have won the double but in different years include Music Hall who won the Aintree race in 1922 and much more recently Earth Summit.

The Coral Scottish Grand National 2014

Although odds aren't available as yet, soon enough you'll be able to search for the best odds at bookmakers.co.uk and work out who you think is likely to be following in Red Rum's footsteps and winning this year's race.

As the Scottish Grand National is held a week after the

English Grand National, it's often a fact that horses who could have competed are out of the running, but it still remains the highlight of our local calendar, and along with the Gold Cup at Sandown, forms the traditional ending to the steeple chasing season. Red Rum's double victory in 1974 of the Aintree Grand National and the Scottish Grand National within a week remains unique — maybe it can be beaten this year?

Council to continue its scrutiny of statutory repairs

Members of the Council's Governance, Risk and Best Value Committee (GRBV) have reaffirmed their commitment to subjecting the former Statutory Repairs Service to full and proper scrutiny.

The service was suspended and subsequently replaced in April 2013 but there remain a number of issues relating to outstanding works and billing that the council is bringing to a close.

In parallel with this, and the development of the new Shared Repairs service, regular reports are being brought to the GRBV committee for detailed consideration. A specific report on 'minimising future risks' was heard in private on 10 October.

The committee was established in November 2012 and given a strengthened and wider remit in relation to both financial and operational scrutiny than its predecessor, the Audit Committee.

In line with Audit Scotland guidance, it is chaired by a
 member of the opposition, Councillor Jeremy Balfour.

He said: "The role of the GRBV committee is crucial, particularly now as the council seeks to develop its new repairs service.

"I will be ensuring that the services — both past and present — continue to be the subject of clear and robust scrutiny by this committee and, further, to the right level of independent oversight and audit.

"We owe it to the people of Edinburgh, and in particular to those let down so badly by the previous service, to ensure that lessons are learned and acted upon. Only then can we begin to regain their trust."

In the quad at Old College there is a magnificent light installation of Chinese warrior lanterns to mark the Chinese New Year. We went to visit after dark and took some photos to show them to you. We recommend a visit!

The lanterns are inspired by the army of terracotta soldiers, discovered in 1974 when the tomb of the 3rd Century BC First Chinese Emperor Qin Shi Huang was unearthed in the Xi'an province of China.

The figures were found in an underground vault of 12,000 square meters and comprised of more than 8,000 terracotta sculptures depicting warriors and horses arranged in battle formation. It is thought that they were created to defend the emperor's immortal soul.

Chinese artist Xia Nan who first created this colourful display for the Olympic Games in Beijing has used traditional Chinese lantern designs to re-imagine this awe-inspiring historic discovery. The figures are up to 2.5m tall and will be on show from 4.00pm till 9.00pm until 7 February 2014.

Edinburgh East MP raises death row plight of Mohammad Asghar



There was an exchange between Edinburgh East MP Sheila Gilmore and the Prime Minister at Westminster yesterday during which the Edinburgh East MP called for the UK Government to intervene in the case of an Edinburgh man sentenced to death in Pakistan.

Ms Gilmore said:-"Mohammad Asghar, who lived in the UK for 40 years and has family in my constituency, has recently been convicted of blasphemy and sentenced to death in Pakistan. Mr Asghar was diagnosed with paranoid schizophrenia in 2010 and was treated in Edinburgh, but the judges refused to take that into account. I wrote to the Foreign Secretary yesterday, but can the Prime Minister now assure me that he and his Ministers are doing everything they can to support this man and see him returned to the UK, where he can get the treatment he needs?"

The Prime Minister assured her that he and the UK Government always oppose the death penalty and view the matter very seriously.

Amnesty International have called upon Pakistan to immediately and unconditionally release Mr Asghar who has been sentenced to death under the country's blasphemy laws after writing

letters to various officials claiming he was a prophet. Mr Asghar's family have said that he is suffering from a mental illness.

"Mohammad Asghar is now facing the gallows simply for writing a series of letters. He does not deserve punishment. No one should be charged on the basis of this sort of conduct," said Polly Truscott, Amnesty International's Deputy Asia Pacific Director.

Fire crews help rescue man after ladder fall in Trinity

The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service Operations Control Edinburgh received a call this morning from the Scottish Ambulance Service informing of an incident involving a 21 year old male trapped within a basement of a mid-terraced property in Clark Road, Edinburgh.

The casualty had fallen approximately 9ft onto a concrete floor following the collapse of a makeshift internal wooden ladder. He had suspected head and arm injuries.

Crews from Tollcross, McDonald Road, Newcraighall, Liberton and Dalkeith attended to assist Paramedics. Operating in a confined environment crews and partner agencies worked hard to stabilise and remove the casualty.

The man was then taken to Edinburgh Royal Infirmary for treatment to his injuries.

Scottish Fire and Service recommends that every time you use a ladder you should do a pre-use check beforehand to make sure that it is safe for use.

The capital's history will be shown off from a whole new angle with an exhibition set to open this weekend. If you read our articles about <u>Caltongate</u> yesterday you will have seen the lovely photos that RCAHMS allows us to use from their collections.

Historic Edinburgh from Above will encapsulate the capital's

changing cityscape throughout the early 20th century with a series of stunning photographs.

Designed especially for display at the Museum of Edinburgh by the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Scotland (RCAHMS), the free-to-enter exhibition consists of aero-photographic images from the body's archives and will open on 1st February.

×

Visitors to the museum will be able to zoom in on the dramatic shots, which capture some of the key industrial and social changes to have taken place in Edinburgh, and are accompanied by fascinating facts about the capital's past.

Amongst the collection are an aerial shot of 1930s Leith, at the time a bustling centre for industry, an image portraying the construction of the iconic Jenners Furniture Depository from above and the west end of Princes Street in 1927, complete with horse-drawn vehicles and trams.

The exhibition, which will run until 26th April, is a local offshoot of RCAHMS' major UK-wide project Britain from Above, a partnership with the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historical Monuments of Wales and English Heritage to present the Aerofilms collection of aerial photographs from 1919-1953. Last year, current-day Edinburgh was similarly caught from above when it played host to Britain from the Air, an outdoor street gallery of more than 100 aerial photographs of the British landscape, brought to the city by the Royal Geographical Society in collaboration with street gallery pioneers, Wecommunic8.

Councillor Richard Lewis, Culture Convener for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "Edinburgh's rich heritage is part of its appeal and is appreciated by residents and visitors the world over, and this exhibition offers a new perspective on the city's fascinating history.

"We are delighted with the gallery created for us by the Royal Commission, which showcases some of the amazing architecture, landscapes and thriving industry of our past. Historic Edinburgh from Above is a welcome addition to our busy calendar of sporting and cultural events marking the exciting year ahead."

Lesley Ferguson, Head of Collections, RCAHMS said: "We are delighted to be exhibiting these wonderful images taken by

Aerofilms in the Museum of Edinburgh. The 'bird's eye' view provides a tantalising glimpse into this historic city and some of the changes that transformed Edinburgh in the twentieth century.

"The exhibition represents just a small number of the photographs taken by Aerofilms and we hope that visitors will be inspired to discover more online at the project website britainfromabove.org.uk."

Later this year, the Museum of Edinburgh will also host a Sporting Edinburgh exhibition to coincide with the Commonwealth Games and Scars on the City, commemorating the start of WW1.

Yellow Moon at the Bedlam Theatre



The Edinburgh University Theatre Company (EUTC) staged David Greig's 'Yellow Moon: the Ballad of Leila and Lee' last night at the <u>Bedlam Theatre</u> but there is still time to see what is dubbed 'a modern day Bonnie and Clyde story' tonight at 7:30pm at the same venue.

The story follows two protagonists on their journey across Northern Scotland as they try to escape from their sorrowful reality and into a world that allows them to feel more 'real'. Set in present day Scotland, it explores various complex issues such as self-harm, abandonment and neglect whilst maintaining a beautiful narrative and wonderful characterisations. The cast include Macleod Stephen, Casey Enochs, Caitlin Mclean and Nathan Trotter.

The Edinburgh Reporter spoke to Director **Julia Carstairs** about her experience of working on the production:

How have you found directing Yellow Moon?

I have absolutely loved directing Yellow Moon, but because of the nature of the script it has been quite the challenge! It is up to the director to interpret the text in a way that is entertaining and most successful. For example there is no cast list and much of the script is written in prose/verse, so decisions have to be made with regards to the narration. But it has been so enjoyable because I have a wonderful cast and a great technical team — they are a great support system.

How does this compare to any of the other shows you have

directed?

Most of the productions I have directed in the past have been musicals so it is entirely different to work with such an open script. A lot happens in the space of 62 pages and the play flows continuously without an interval so the audience have to stay interested. The words are so important, and there aren't any tricky dance numbers I have to choreograph so that's a bonus!

What has been the most challenging thing about putting this play together?

I think the casting was pretty difficult because the cast have to gel so well together and there cannot be a weak link, but luckily the talent within Bedlam is immense! So I have landed great actors and a superb team. But I would say that the blocking was quite a challenge and there is one scene which is set in during a muirburning so I had to decide how to make that look most effective. But the process has been entirely enjoyable and hopefully everyone will enjoy the show.
