Queen Margaret University lecturer releases new film

Filmmaker releases stunning time lapse in celebration of Scotland's incredible summer

An award-winning filmmaker has just released a captivating time lapse/stop motion film which celebrates the beauty of south east Scotland.

Walid Salhab, media practice lecturer at Queen Margaret University, Edinburgh came to the attention of an international audience when his stunning time lapse/stop motion film of Scotland's capital 'Kinetic Edinburgh II' achieved over three million hits on You Tube.

Walid now wants his latest film 'Kinetic East' to be a celebration of the wonderful summer which the Scots had been longing for.

The film highlights some of Scotland's hidden treasures such as the expanse of Ravensheugh Beach in East Lothian and the waterfall at Cramond, as well as some of the better known tourist spots like the harbour at Dunbar and Aberlady Nature Reserve.

The film, which took three months to complete, was mainly shot during the days and nights of May, June and July.

Walid said: "I am lucky enough to live in such a beautiful part of Scotland, and I really wanted to capture some of the amazing evenings and sunsets which we enjoyed this summer. Part of the filming process took me to unspoiled locations, some of which I experienced for the first time. My favourite has to be Ravensheugh Beach near Tyinghame and also the viewing point at Gullane, East Lothian where I was able to

capture a glimpse of Muirfield in the lead up to the golf Open Champions.

He continued: "The great thing about this summer was the opportunity to see such incredible sunsets at our beaches. You can visit the beach ever night and have a different visual experience — the sunsets were totally different every time."

Walid's Kinetic films use a style of filming which combines the use of time lapse and the physical movement of the camera to create the illusion of motion. Kinetic East involves Walid manually moving the camera on a tripod — shot by shot. No tracks or sliders were used. The film is pieced together from thousands of high resolution photographs (23 million pixels each). One sunset scene could involve the use of approximately 600 individual images.

Walid concluded: "Kinetic East only shows a fraction of the beauty of Scotland's east coast. I really hope that people enjoy seeing all of these different areas and that it encourages them to seek out some of these wonderful locations."

At the moment, Walid is applying his filming technique to Scotland's largest arts and regeneration project — The Helix in Falkirk. A major part of this work is capturing the construction of 'The Kelpies', two 30 metre high steel-plated sculptures of horses' heads, weighing over 600 tonnes. The final sculptures will tower above the Forth & Clyde Canal, forming a dramatic gateway at the eastern entrance to Helix Park.

Five things you need to know today

The council's petitions committee is one of those which is filmed, which is unfortunate if you are Councillor Jeremy Balfour who was caught on camera playing Solitaire during the discussion about banning cycling on the pavements during last week's meeting.

The Edinburgh Evening News revealed this story with an excerpt from the video which we have for you here:-

The Edinburgh Reporter asked Councillor Balfour what he had to say. He said: "I can only apology for doing this. It was wrong and will not happen again."

Jeremy Balfour is the former Conservative Group leader but stepped down from that position to take up a role as Convenor of the Governance, Risk and Best Value Committee. That committee is responsible for the development of draft corporate debt and anti-fraud policies at the council along with improvements in the key financial systems used to run it. Councillor Balfour studied law and then theology before becoming a councillor in 2005.

The petition being discussed at the time of his apparent inattention was the possibility of a ban on pavement cycling by someone over the age of 12. The petitioner Alison Adamson Ross spoke at the meeting, but it is clear from the webcast record of the meeting that Councillor Balfour did not make any spoken contribution, despite the fact that his Ward of Murrayfield neighbours the area of Haymarket which is where

the petitioner has her kilt business.

Mrs Adamson Ross raised the matter of cycling on pavements in the light of discussions held during the tram works with local businesses in the Haymarket area, and the dangers which this poses to pedestrians. She related the story of one blind lady who had stopped for a rest at a bus stop and who was then given a scare by a passing cyclist.

The petitioner pointed out that the local authority is responsible for traffic and for pedestrians and cyclists within their area, but admitted that The Scottish Government would also have a role in this if a change in the law was needed.

Mrs Adamson Ross said:-"From my understanding it is the council who are responsible for the pavements. Without doubt health and safety is an issue that we deal with in our everyday lives but walking along a pavement in complete safety is a basic requirement and we should not need legislation to make this a reality."

She then mentioned that in May 2011 she had discovered that the council investigated the possibility of allowing cyclists to use the pavements in a shared use initiative, and that 5% of the council's transport budget is devoted to cycling which is almost £1m.

"In one half hour period 10 cyclists were photographed on the pavement on Clifton Terrace at Haymarket. My customers come from all over the world and I am appalled at the reaction from the visitors to this city. It is an embarrassment. The signs are not working; polite signs do not work."

The petitioner explained that in England the police have the authority of issuing fixed penalty notices to cyclists who ride on the pavements or who go through red lights and she suggested that environmental wardens could be enlisted to help enforce this.

A council official explained the difference between an adopted and unadopted roads. An adopted road is one which the council maintain. In terms of legislation there are definitions of footpath or footways, and it is illegal for people to cycle on these. Enforcement of this does not sit with the council as the legal power to enforce sits with Police Scotland.

Cycling is allowed on what is known as the Core Path Network as defined by the Land Reform Act, and includes areas such as The Meadows and Portobello Promenade.

Councillor Edie asked when Haymarket is likely to reopen, and he enquired about the existing powers to enforce and the number of people caught in this way. The answers were initially inconclusive, but it is obvious that the situation at Haymarket will depend on completion of the tramworks.

<u>In Leith</u> the police did try to enforce the guidance on no cycling on the pavements on Leith Walk in May 2012, although we do not have any statistics on how successful that was. The Police Scotland representative at the Petitions Committee said that there is an Edinburgh-wide initiative planned for the end of the month, just ahead of the autumn and the darker nights.

Councillor Jim Orr who leads on cycling matters for the council, responded to the petitioner that Shandwick Place should be free of works by October which ought to help matters, but he recognised the problem arising from cyclists using the pavements. He said:-"We have an education and marketing campaign as to where the cycle path network is and we work in partnership with the police who stop cyclists without lights for example. We then provide them with a light, and use a light touch approach rather than enforcement. If we had well-designed roads then the cyclists would use these, and so the more we can improve the roads intelligently for cyclists, the fewer will use pavements. We are doing a lot but we do not condone cycling on pavements at any time."

The committee decided that the petition would be referred to the Transport and Environment Committee to request that they highlight the matters discussed in their action plans. They will also ask Neighbourhood safety groups and Neighbourhood Partnerships to take action at a local level.



Often they can be heard beeping during meetings, so it appears that some councillors have yet to discover how to turn the sound down, but it appears that generally the move has been an organisational success as well as a financial one.

The Lord Provost Donald Wilson wrote on his blog last week how much he was looking forward to the event:-"This ancient tradition was performed from 1579 until 1718, when the Provost, Bailies and members of Council gathered at the Provost's house before setting out to inspect the Marches of the Common Land. Whilst the format is no longer the same as it was, this is still an important and colourful event in Edinburgh's calendar and I am proud to be playing a role in honouring those who sought to protect the integrity of Edinburgh's Common Land, in this the 500th anniversary year since the Battle of Flodden.

This year, Ride Captain Stuart Nicoll will carry a replica of the 'Blue Blanket' Banner, which is the affectionate name for the 'Standard of the Crafts with the Burgh' of Edinburgh. Legend has it that the blanket (hand embroidered by Queen Margaret) was presented to the craftsmen of Edinburgh by King James III after they rescued him from imprisonment in Edinburgh Castle."

Earlier today the battle was commemorated at St Giles on the High Street.



Edinburgh Pharmacy Robbery Attempt — Couple Jailed



A couple, who held customers and employees at an Edinburgh pharmacy against their will, have been jailed.

Russell Irvine and Helen Paterson were sentenced to six and five-years in prison respectively at the High Court in Aberdeen today (Monday). They will also spend a further five years on licence following their release.

The pair walked into the premises on the evening of Wednesday 15th May and produced a knife before attempting to rob the shop, while refusing to let anyone leave.

Police responded to the area and eventually forced entry into the pharmacy, using an electronic incapacitating device to subdue 32-year-old Irvine in the process.

Paterson, 33, was taken to hospital after falling ill during the incident. She was later released and was subsequently charged along with Irvine before both pled guilty to the offences in August.

Chief Inspector Bob Paris said: "Russell Irvine and Helen Paterson subjected the staff and patrons within the pharmacy to a terrifying ordeal, which lasted a number of hours before police could bring a safe conclusion to the incident,

"Whatever the motives for their actions were, the distress and fear they caused their victims was inexcusable and the sentences handed to them today are a reflection of how seriously police and Crown Office view incidents like this. "I sincerely hope all of those who were detained by Irvine and Paterson within the pharmacy can now put the matter firmly behind them."

24 Hour Police Initiative Targets Offences Relating To Seat Belts



People who put their lives at risk by failing to do the straightforward task of securing their seatbelt will find themselves the focus of a 24-hour Police Scotland initiative on Wednesday (Sep 11)

Police officers across the country will be involved in the day of action aimed at Keeping People Safe on Scotland's roads by targeting offences related to the use of seat belts and child restraints.

The initiative is part of Police Scotland's year-round commitment to reducing the number of casualties on our roads and supports a wider pan-European seat belt campaign.

Seatbelts save lives. Indeed, it is estimated that one in three people killed as a result of their vehicle being involved in a collision were not wearing a seat belt and that half of those people could have been saved if they had worn one.

Since April 1 this year, Police Scotland has detected more than 18,000 people who were not wearing a seatbelt or who failed to properly restrain a child in a vehicle. Inspector Grant Edward, Head of Road Policing Unit in Tayside Division, said: "It's disappointing that there are still high numbers of people who choose to take unacceptable risks and endanger their lives by not wearing a seat belt.

"It's easy to get the impression that you are travelling safely when you are sitting comfortably inside a moving vehicle. That's an illusion that is instantly shattered if for whatever reason the vehicle stops sharply and you are not wearing a seatbelt.

"You will be left in no doubt as to how absolutely independent from the vehicle you really are as you continue to travel at around the speed the vehicle was travelling before it came to a halt. You will come to a sudden stop but only as a result of impacting with what is in front of you — be it the steering wheel, the dashboard or the windscreen.

"The consequences could be fatal and certainly far more serious than if you were wearing a seatbelt."

According to Road Safety Scotland:

'Your risk of a fatal injury is reduced by 50% when you wear a seatbelt. They are described as 'the single most effective feature in the car to fulfil this role.'

'All other safety features in cars, such as airbags, are only designed to work when the occupant is wearing a seatbelt.'

'£100 is the cost of the conditional offer fixed penalty ticket you will be issued if you are caught not wearing your seatbelt. A driver is also responsible for children aged less than 14 years who are not properly restrained.'

Inspector Edward added: "It could not be clearer — seat belts save lives. Wearing one in a crash will reduce the risk of a fatal injury by 50%. Wear a seat belt and ensure all passengers and children carried in the vehicle are properly

Recruitment campaign to find 500 volunteers for Children's Panel

Scots urged to be the missing piece in a child's life in new recruitment campaign

A man whose teenage life was changed for the better thanks to the Children's Panel has backed the annual drive for new recruits.

Alex Horne was just 13 and living in foster care when he went before the panel requesting a move to residential care closer to his home in Aberdeen. Alex, now 20, was moved within weeks and believes the decisions made by the Children's Panel that day helped give him a more stable, happier childhood.

As the search for the 500 people needed to help neglected, troubled and abused children living in Scotland gets underway, Alex spoke out to show the huge impact that volunteer panel members can have on the lives of children and young people.

Scotland has a new single national Children's Panel, made up of 2,500 volunteer panel members who regularly attend hearings to address the needs and behaviour of children and young people who face serious problems in their lives.

To ensure the system offers the best support, new volunteers are needed every year. This year's month-long recruitment drive, led by Children's Hearings Scotland (CHS), aims to attract people from all walks of life to this unique role.

Speaking at the launch and explaining how a panel member can provide the missing piece in a young person's life, Alex said:

"I'd been in the care system most of my life, but at 13 I was moved into foster care which I found difficult. In the space of three months I was in four different foster placements, living far from home and I found it really difficult to bond with my carers and live in different settings.

"I just wanted to be moved to residential care near where I lived in Aberdeen.

"I'd been in front of numerous panels, but the panel that day changed my care experience for the better. I went in thinking I would have to stay in foster care and nothing would change, but the panel members were nice. They listened and acted on it and soon after I was moved to a residential school in Aberdeen which made a huge difference to my quality of life.

"The panel is important to kids in care. They don't choose their lives but they have to live with the decisions made around it. That's why it's really important to get the right people on the panel, they simply make a big difference."

Alex now works as a Campaign and Training Assistant with Who Cares? Scotland, using his experiences to help deliver training on corporate parenting.

Bernadette Monaghan, National Convener, Children's Hearings Scotland, said:-"The Children's Hearings System has the best interests of Scotland's children and young people at heart. We're appealing to those who want to help improve the lives of vulnerable children and young people to consider becoming a panel member.

"Having served on the Children's Panel for nine years, I know from experience the valuable role the 2,500 volunteers play in helping children at risk out of dark places. It's a unique role, and a unique system which ensures children in need or at risk are heard, respected, valued, cared for and, above all, protected.

"Although it can be complex and challenging, being involved can be hugely rewarding, as Alex's story illustrates. Applicants need to be 18 or over and no qualifications are needed as full training is given and panel members are supported throughout the process to help them prepare for the role.

"It won't just change a child's life, it'll change yours too."

Edinburgh Rugby got their RaboDirect PRO12 campaign under way this weekend with a tough 34-23 defeat to Munster at Mungrave Park. Home side, Munster wasted no time in getting on the score sheet in the season opener. After some expansive, attacking play, combined with some flustered and at times sloppy Edinburgh defence, the Irish side found themselves three tries to the good and 22-6 up at half time.

During the break fears of a whitewash began to creep into the hearts of the traveling Edinburgh fans, though these were soon quelled. Scotland International Nick De Luca gave the Black and Red Army something to cheer about early in the second half, scoring a scintillating try from 25 metres, evading 3 tacklers before touching down under the posts.

Despite conceding a further two tries, the Gunners were a much different outfit in the second half, and made it much more difficult for Munster to close the game out.

They added intensity to their defence and attack, and for long phases looked composed yet threatening.

Winger Lee Jones gave Edinburgh fans more grounds for encouragement, as he crossed with a fine finish towards the end of the match, but even with Harry Leonard's successful touchline conversion, the capital side fell just shy of earning a losing bonus point.

Speaking after the game, head coach Alan Solomons pulled positives from the defeat. "I think that we showed tremendous character in the second half. The problem we had in the first-half, which put us on the back foot, is that we allowed them to generate momentum.

"That made it very difficult for us to get width on our defence and that is something we're going to work very, very hard on."

Bearing in mind that Edinburgh's new defensive coach Omar Mouneimne has only been with the club for a week, and with many key players still to return from injury, Solomons encouragingly stressed, "I have absolutely no doubt that, given time; we will sort out that problem.

"Cutting down our errors, especially on restarts, and stopping momentum will make an enormous difference, however the biggest thing to take away from the game is the character they have shown."

Round three of the RBS leagues saw the teams settling in to their new coaches, players and opponents with one close, and several not close at all, results to report.

First up is the RBS Premiership where Currie, Edinburgh Accies and Heriots reside. And it was Heriots who took the only local win with an 18-13 win at Stirling County. International Football

Gordon Strachan's Scotland lost 2-0 to a strong Belgium side at Hampden on Friday night in the World Cup 2014 qualifying campaign.

Steven Defour and Kevin Mirallas were on target as the visitors moved one step closer to a place at next summer's finals in Brazil.

The result leaves the Scots at the bottom of the group after Macedonia, Scotland's opponents on Tuesday night, picked up all three points against Wales.

Former Hibs' players Leigh Griffiths, Scott Brown and Steven Whittaker started the game, while former Hearts' defender Lee Wallace was an unused substitute.

Scotland Under 21s went down to a 4-0 European qualifying defeat by the Netherlands. The side contained Hearts stars Jason Holt and Jordan McGhee who became the fourth youngest player ever to represent Scotland at this level, started the match, while Callum Paterson was a second-half substitute.

Elsewhere, injury prevented Hibs' full-back Ryan McGivern facing Cristiano Ronaldo as Portugal beat Northern Ireland 4-2, but former Hearts' favourite Ryan McGowan featured for Australia in their 6-0 defeat to Brazil.

Some good news for Hearts as the red card issued to Jamie Hamill for handball against Inverness Caledonian Thistle last Saturday was quashed leaving him free to play against Celtic next week at Tynecastle.

The Scottish Football Association's judicial panel overturned the dismissal by referee John Beaton who ordered Hamill off nine minutes from the end of Hearts' 2-0 defeat insisting he had deliberately used a hand to block a shot at goal from Billy McKay, but television footage clearly showed the ball hitting the Hamill on the head.

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Meanwhile the Foundation of Hearts have revealed that 98% of direct debit pledges by fans so far have been successful.

FoH chairman Ian Murray MP said: "We extend a huge thanks to supporters. The fact that the first month of direct debits has gone so well, is wonderful news, as it gives us as great platform to push on. There are, of course, many more months and years of direct debits, but to have finally got the process underway is terrific.

"To have a 98% success rate on direct debits is virtually unheard of, and it is again a sign of the unwavering loyalty of the Hearts support."

The Foundation has also announced it is launching a "SuperDraw" for supporters who have successfully had a direct debit drawn down, to win a series of prizes.

Edinburgh Castle has bumper year

Edinburgh Castle reports best summer on record

Historic Scotland has reported a bumper summer of visitor numbers to its sites in Edinburgh and the Lothians.

From June — August 2013, the organisation, which is Scotland's biggest operator of visitor attractions, reported 686,900 visitors to ticketed sites in the area, an increase of 25.1% on the same period last year.

Records were broken at flagship site Edinburgh Castle — up 26% on 2012 for the period June — August. August alone saw 229,940 visitors go through the doors of the castle, an increase of 35.8%, more than any single month ever recorded.

Other record breakers included Linlithgow Palace — the birthplace of Mary, Queen of Scots, which welcomed over 37,548 visitors. Tantallon Castle also performed particularly well, welcoming 17,678 visitors during the summer period, an increase of 17%.

Cabinet Secretary for Culture and External Affairs, Fiona Hyslop said:-"These figures illustrate the important role that heritage plays for modern day Scotland.

"The benefits are many — in terms of highlighting our diverse culture both at home and abroad — but also in terms of supporting and driving economic growth.

"All of the income generated is invested back into our rich historic environment in order to continue to provide worldclass attractions for Scots and overseas visitors alike.

"As the custodians of Scotland's rich heritage, it is important that we continue to engage with both Scots and visitors from around the world as we look forward to Scotland welcoming the world in 2014."

Throughout the summer period, a number of trends were evident across Historic Scotland's portfolio of properties. This included a very strong performance by the travel trade sector, which saw income up 41% year-on-year. In July alone, Edinburgh Castle saw an increase of 69% in travel trade visits on the previous year.

In terms of visitor origin, there were increases in visitors coming from the emerging tourism markets of China and Russia, whilst Scots saw the biggest increase in visits to attractions out with the big three of Edinburgh, Stirling and Urquhart castles.

Membership also continued to attract domestic visitors, at an all-time high, up 7% on the same period last year.

Stephen Duncan, Director of Commercial and Tourism for Historic Scotland said:-"Last year saw a flattening out of visitors due to a combination of severe weather and displacement of the travel trade.

"We had always expected 2013 to see a return to previous levels, but the summer performance has surpassed all expectations.

"We've broken a number of records including the highest ever

visitor numbers for July and August on record for Edinburgh Castle.

"It's particularly encouraging to see patterns at Edinburgh, Scotland's number one paid for tourism attraction, replicated at many of our other properties across our estate who enjoyed record breaking summers and substantial increases in visitors.

"As an organisation we are continuing to evolve our offering to visitors — be that through our retail, e-commerce and membership products, or investing in areas such as our award winning events programme to make history an accessible, fun and enjoyable part of people's lives."

Brian Gruber of Roomwise talks to The Edinburgh Reporter



Who are you, and where did you come from?

Brian Gruber, Managing Director of Roomwise Ltd. I'm

originally from a small rural town outside of Chicago called Barrington, IL.

I came over to Edinburgh to do an MBA in International Business and after graduating, decided Scotland was the best place to pursue this idea for a new approach to free time planning & travel accommodation.

What is the business book you recommend that everyone should read?

Flow: The Psychology of Optimal Experience by Mihaly Csikszentmihalyi.

This book explores the dimensions of happiness, presents research which counter-intuitively suggests people are happier at work, and outlines a compelling theory for why people aren't happier in their free time.

It serves as a useful tool for any manager looking to understand/improve employee satisfaction, but more importantly — for my team's purposes — this book really pinpoints the pervasive problem we're trying to solve with Roomwise, which is encapsulated by Csikszentmihalyi pretty well in the following quote:- "One of the most ironic paradoxes of our time is this great availability of leisure time that somehow fails to be translated into enjoyment."

What do you think are your business strengths and weaknesses?

Success in business requires a certain measure of cynicism that I've had to cultivate. But in general, I count the fact that this doesn't come naturally to me as one of my strengths: I believe it's important to imagine new things, and save the cynicism for planning around specific hurdles.

What was the defining moment on your career path that has got you where you are now?

Taking a break from my career was what ultimately got me

interested in the unpredictable, shifting value of free time. I spent a long time travelling through numerous countries, and found — like everyone does — that simply being somewhere was not enough to infuse the experience with lasting meaning. As Csikszentmihalyi points out, happiness occurs when skill meets challenge.

And this doesn't have to involve massive amounts of either one (why do you think people enjoy knitting in front of the television... it adds a dimension of skill meeting challenge, and becomes a tangible achievement). Anything that challenges us to engage with unfamiliar territory (or that demonstrates back to us our increasing skill within now familiar territory) makes us happier. People experience this every day at work (hopefully!) but for some reason don't bother to apply the same concepts to their free time.

In other words, most people don't pursue very much in their free time at all. This approach may seem relaxing at first — but for most people it becomes a form of mild depression. Even having an interesting conversation with an intelligent person can be conceptualized as skill meeting challenge, and yet millions of hours are spent every day intentionally avoiding these tiny challenges. With Roomwise we're trying to get people engaging with the world around them more by presenting to them everything they could be doing instead of doing nothing... and in this way, we plan to make our users happier!

How do you spend your spare time?

Finding things to do and properties through which to do them on Roomwise!

For example, I recently visited one of our clients and stayed in the top floor of their listed manor and we took horses for a swim in the North Sea. Riding a horse as he charged into the water and then finally lifted his hooves to swim was absolutely incredible; definitely a challenge, and definitely a more valuable experience than what I might have done: watch TV online all weekend and nap on the couch.

Do you think you achieve a good work/life balance?

Hard to say; I like working, so the meaning of "good" becomes somewhat obscured. But I do make time to try new things and visit as many festivals/events as I possibly can.

What makes Edinburgh the best location for you to live and/or work?

I think Edinburgh is an uncommonly active city. The city's dedication to promoting free personal enrichment opportunities is unlike any other city I've ever lived in, followed somewhat distantly by Austin, TX. It is really a perfect place from which to set out on various adventures, every weekend!

What is your special area of Edinburgh, or special place in Edinburgh and why?

No need to deviate from what will surely be the most common answer you receive: The Meadows. On a hot, sunny day, there is nothing quite like sitting in the grass, seeing the entire city gathered together in grateful relief for the heat. At least a few days every summer are like this, and they are my favourite days of the year.

What would you consider the pinnacle of your career?

Probably getting <u>Roomwise</u> launched and getting our first satisfied customers.

Which networking groups in Edinburgh have you found particularly useful?

The tech meet-ups at Skyscanner's offices are great.

Who are your business heroes?

I'm really inspired by people who are able to manage creative

projects on a massive scale and get 100s of people aligned around a vision — people who then go on to collectively produce something absolutely amazing. Jim Henson comes to mind.

What are your business goals for the next year?

We want to become the online destination for free-time planning in the UK. We want to provide higher occupancy rates for every property owner on our platform. We want our users to lead more memorable, enriching lives.

Describe your typical day for us.

Essentially, the focus of all my days is evangelising to property owners and event coordinators about the free services we want to provide for them.

Best job advice you ever received?

Build a functioning path to reliable revenue as quickly as possible. Then constantly improve.

Your plan of attack for the next 12 months?

We're going to build a network of new demand for accommodation providers by increasing the amount of domestic travel in Scotland through free distribution of event information & property promotion. Essentially, owners can have their B&B, country estate, or private residence added to our 100s of promotional pages for free and we take care of the rest. I'm particularly eager to explain to event coordinators how Roomwise can help them increase their event attendance.

12 months from now I'd like to be partnered with every event in Scotland — from the big ones like the Fringe, to the small ones like the Killin Scarecrow Competition I visited recently — so that every weekend our users have 100+ ideas for things they could attend, and all our event partners have higher attendance rates.

Rugby — Watsonians v Biggar

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Round 3 of the RBS National League saw another Borders team, Biggar, make the trip up to Edinburgh to play Watsonians at Myreside. It was to be a trip they may now wish they had cancelled.

The match started with a few moments of kicking the ball back and forward, but it soon settled to a handling game, with the first couple of scrums showing that the new rules appeared to suit Biggar, as the visitors pushed the home side all over the place. It was to be Watsonians who were first on the scoreboard, however. A cross field kick from Ben Di Rollo was picked up by 'Sonians No. 6, Neil Irvine-Hess, who powered through the attempted tackle to score the opener. Di Rollo missed the kick, but Watsonians were 5-0 ahead. A missed penalty from Di Rollo was followed up with a dropped ball by Ally Ledingham who had a clear run in to the try line.

It didn't take the home side long to take advantage of their possession, as another line-break saw Ewan Miller handed the ball off the deck to stroll in for a try under the posts. Di Rollo put the kick over and it was 12-0 to Watsonians. Despite their dominance of open play, a knock on from the restart saw the Watsonians scrum absolutely blown apart by Biggar and from this they got the ball down the left to allow No. 11 Craig Parker to break through for Biggar's opening score. With the kick missed the score was now 12-5 to Watsonians.

Biggar's 'opening score' was to prove their closing score as the home side went on the rampage, scoring tries at will — Aitken(2), Smith and Ross — and dropping a few on the way — to finish the first half 43-5 ahead.

The second half continued where the first finished. About the only time Biggar saw the ball was deep in their own half due a variety of errors, and subsequent scrums, from Watsonians or from lineout ball. Scrum half, Ramsey Young opened the taps after a minute and it just continued from there. The match was held up briefly by what looked like a serious injury to Biggar's Charles Cochrane, but he eventually managed to move off under his own steam. Once play had restarted, further tries from Steele, Ledingham, Hart and Ross, backed up by kicks from Di Rollo and sub, Mike Ker served to underline Watsonians total dominance of the match. A few tries went abegging with a variety of errors, but those would have probably just changed the restart times rather than affected the score too much. Biggar did come up with their own attacking sequence in the final few minutes, but the match was really done-and-dusted at half time, never mind minute 75.

The final tally for Watsonians was 74 points to 5 in a comprehensive demolishment of a Biggar side who looked quite good for all of 10 minutes. Head coach Marcus Di Rollo has reached into his box of tricks and not only has he persuaded Allan Jacobsen to turn out in the front row, but former Scotland and Lions forward, Jason White, has joined the backroom staff to lend his experience and expertise to the Myreside outfit. So far, in addition to this match, Watsonians have put 44 points past Peebles and 51 against Selkirk, but it's early days, and nobody at Myreside is getting the silver polish out just yet.

Five things you need to know today

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Lazarowicz raises energy bills at Westminster — Green MSP wants better childcare system — Blackadder painting to be auctioned next week — Big Book Bash — Balerno Village Screen flashmobbed!

Edinburgh MP Mark Lazarowicz has raised in Parliament the way that low energy users could be hit by the simplification of tariffs promised by the Government.

Ofgem has said that bills should simply consist of a standing charge (which can be zero) and a price per unit but people who use less energy could actually be faced with higher bills than before.

Mark said:-"I and many other MPs have been calling on the Government to take action to cut energy bills and its answer was to simplify tariffs but that could actually mean that some customers actually face higher bills.

"That's because people who use less energy, often because of the cost, could face a disproportionately high standing charge even before they have started in place of their old two-tier tariff.

"Government figures show that households have cut their use in reaction to soaring bills over recent years but I was contacted by one constituent who found that, if he spent less than £27 on gas and £12 on electricity a month, with the new standing charge introduced by his energy supplier he would actually see his overall bill rise by 50-60%."

"This will especially affect people in debt and a quarter of people in a new poll said that they had had to put up with unacceptably cold temperatures this year because they struggled to afford bills: at this stage simplification doesn't look as if it will offer them much comfort."

In its review of the energy market, Ofgem initially proposed a standard standing charge so that energy companies would compete only on the unit price but after representations from the 'Big Six' companies, it dropped the idea.

It has said that companies remain free to set a zero standing charge but varying standing charges will mean that comparison will not be as simple as expected either.

Sheila Gilmore MP for Edinburgh East spoke in the debate on Energy Prices and Profits during the week and said:-"People are also finding it increasingly difficult to find out how to get their home better insulated and how to find out what sort of help is available. While it is absolutely right that energy companies should be expected to contribute to all that, whether the systems that are put in place actually work is another matter. Often the local authority is best placed to know where the problems are in their areas—where the types of housing are that need the most help. That is not just because councils are landlords. They know about all the other properties in the private rented sector where the problems are at their worst and where the difficulties lie. In my constituency, where a large proportion of the properties

are tenements and flats, people face difficult issues about how to improve insulation."



Alison Johnstone, Green MSP for Lothian and a member of Holyrood's economy committee, challenged the First Minister to do more to help women play a full part in economic recovery.

Alison highlighted the fact that the UK Government's welfare reforms have a significant impact on women, including for many the loss of financial independence. Alison pointed towards childcare and apprenticeships as key areas for the Scottish Government to tackle.

Alison said:-"Investing in a transformative, affordable

childcare system would provide hundreds of jobs and would enable thousands of women to pursue work and education, boosting economic recovery. I pointed out to the First Minister that the most popular modern apprenticeships are severely gender segregated and that while the number of women apprentices may have increased women are still doing the poorly paid jobs.

"I'm glad the First Minister accepted my point that sectors such as construction remain male-dominated and I will continue to press for women to be given the chance to play a full and fair part in Scotland's economic recovery."



The 2013 Edinburgh Festivals (or at least those that take place in the summer months) are now firmly over. We are of course now heading straight towards Hallowe'en and Christmas. In the meantime Councillor Steve Cardownie, the Festivals Champion has been looking back:-

"The Virgin Money Fireworks Concert brought the 67th Edinburgh International Festival to a spectacular close on Sunday night.

Once again, we find ourselves reflecting on Edinburgh's biggest and best summer festival season yet. And that isn't a throw-away comment; the numbers speak for themselves.

Over 2,200 artists from 36 nations, almost 800 of them from Scotland, performed in the International Festival with ticket sales up 17,000, or 11%, to 158,500. The Fringe, meanwhile, came to an end after 45,464 performances of 2,871 shows, making it the largest ever arts festival in the world. Just shy of two million tickets were issued for shows and events in 273 venues.

The Book Festival celebrated its 30th anniversary with a hike of almost 6% in ticket sales to around 225,000, while the Tattoo sold out for the fifteenth year in a row. And lest we

forget the Mela — despite the windy weather affecting Sunday's programme, Saturday was their most successful ever with 13,000 people attending.


Ella Simpson, Resilient Scotland Ltd, Chair said:- " We

Southsiders : Portraits of a Community begins today

What links Ian Rankin's favourite record shop, Preston Street Primary School's lollipop lady and a disability activist who won't allow anything to come between her and a good book?

They all feature in **Southsiders:** Portraits of a Community an artistic project by photographer Peter Dibdin launching today at 2:00pm in the University of Edinburgh's Inspace Gallery, Crichton Street. Nine of the 32 photographic portraits which make up the project will be exhibited outdoors in The Causey

(West Crosscauseway) until 5 October. The project is one of the first in the UK to receive a Heritage Lottery Fund All Our Stories grant to help people explore, share and celebrate their local heritage.

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Thirty-eight Southsiders are pictured in locations of special significance to them and their stories are recorded in sound. The portraits, sound clips and transcripts of the fascinating and often surprising stories behind the images can be found at www.edinburghsouthsiders.co.uk and in the free special edition publication which also launches today. The artwork on the pavement has been designed and installed by renowned artist Tom Barnett as a special commission for the project to signpost all the portraits in the space.

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Disability activist Caroline Barr has lived in the Southside for 18 years. She began campaigning for dips in the kerbs that were stopping her getting where she wanted to go, notably Newington Library. She invited local Councillor Steve Burgess to come with her to the library — and persuaded him to sit in her mobility buggy while she, as she puts it, "hobbled along."

"He came off the road pretty shaken up and a bit traumatised," she remembers. As a result, the kerbs at the library have been altered. "I think that photographs have a lot to offer because it's not until people actually visually see the issue that the penny drops."

Portraits of Caroline and 37 other people representing the Southside community, their stories and memories of the area feature in this photographic and sound project which

celebrates the sense of belonging and discusses perceptions of Southsider identity.

Peter Dibdin said: "What these photographs do offer is my sincere interpretation, a slice of my own community, and an essence of what it is to be part of this amazing pocket of Edinburgh. Rather than choosing to display the images in a gallery against a white wall, the portraits here are framed by the Southside itself, so the buildings become part of the exhibition."

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"We are delighted to be involved in such a project," says David Wood, Chair of The Causey Development Trust. "Southsiders: Portrait of a Community is a great way to generate discussion about who the Southsiders are and to increase interest and pride in this lively and distinct part of Edinburgh. We hope that the experience of this project will encourage others to see the potential of The Causey as a place for people and events and to come to us with ideas for their own heritage projects."

The Causey Development Trust (CDT) was awarded funding for the Southsiders: Portrait of a Community project by the Heritage Lottery Fund's All Our Stories programme, Foundation Scotland, The Cray Trust and the City of Edinburgh Council Business Partnerships Project. Support has also been generously provided by McRobb Display, Leslie Deans & Co, Sharman and Co, Laurence Smith & Son, the Living Memory Association, 56 North Bar & Restaurant and Greenmantle Pub. www.edinburghsouthsiders.co.uk

CDT was set up in 2007 as The West Crosscauseway Association and renamed in 2011. It was formed to temporarily transform The Causey, originally an historic meeting place but

now an uninspiring traffic island, into a tropical island for the SIX CITIES' Design Festival. Following that success CDT has continued to promote learning and enjoyment for individuals resident or employed in the area and to pursue a permanent transformation of The Causey into a vibrant place for people and events. It is a grassroots initiative led by a steering group of local people. www.thecausey.org The last time we heard about The Causey they were hosting a light night in 2011 on the traffic island which is where the photograph above was taken.

The Colony of Artists open their doors this weekend

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The Colony of Artists is on this weekend. Today and tomorrow you can go along to the Abbeyhill Colonies between 1 and 5 pm to see the varied collection of work on display in the artisan community there.

More than 30 artists in 20 venues open their homes, to show painting, drawing, photography, mixed media, music and much more. This group of artists and creatives are loosely centred around the Abbeyhill colonies in Edinburgh, and practice in a wide range of different fields.

The Abbeyhill colonies, close to the top of Easter Road, were built by railway workers in the late 19th Century after a working hours dispute saw them locked out of their building site. During the three month dispute in 1861, local tradesmen formed The Edinburgh Co-operative Building Company and by 1911

built over 2,000 houses on 11 sites in the city.

That sense of community was reignited in 2005, when the inaugural Colony Of Artists exhibition brought the artists of the area together for the first ever event of its kind in Edinburgh.

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The Colony of Artists show work from their own homes, which allows visitors to experience the pieces in a very personal setting. The event has grown year by year and now attracts people from all over Edinburgh and beyond.

With handcrafted jewellery, printmaking, landscape oil paintings, photography, botanical watercolours, animation, music, and lots more at this year's Colony of Artists exhibition, the event promises to be as exciting as ever.

Building on the success of previous exhibitions, the event this year has expanded to include an array of local businesses, including bars The Regent and The Mash Tun. As ever, the local school, Abbeyhill Primary, will be taking part, as they display artwork from the pupils and a choir performance on each of the two days.

Returning this year is Aileen Paterson, creator of Maisie of Morningside, and local Colonies resident. She will be exhibiting original Maisie of Morningside artwork along with a daily reading at 2.30.

Refreshments are served at the tea tent where all proceeds are donated to Oxfam.

Zero hours contracts outlawed at Edinburgh University

NUS Scotland welcomes agreement to end zero-hour contracts at University of Edinburgh

Commenting on the agreement reached today by the University of Edinburgh and University and College Union (UCU), which means that zero-hour contracts will be phased out for staff, including post-graduate students, NUS Scotland President Gordon Maloney said:-"We welcome the agreement by UCU and the University of Edinburgh to phase out the use of zero-hour contracts. These arrangement are bad for staff and bad for students. Many casual employees at Scottish universities are postgraduate students who often have no way of knowing how many hours they will have from month to month, and therefore if they'll be able to support their studies. Flexibility in the workplace is important, particularly for students, but there should never be a trade-off between flexibility and security or rights at work"

"Zero-hour contracts affect undergraduate students as well, as staff with little job security could negatively affect teaching quality. If the quality at Scottish universities is to remain high, we need to see teaching remain valued, and staff on contracts that allow them to focus on students' needs. We now need guarantees that no jobs will be lost through this transition and that teaching quality will be protected.

"The University of Edinburgh is showing that you don't need zero hours contracts to run a university. We now need to see every other university follow Edinburgh's lead and end the use of these contracts. By offering more secure contracts, universities can allow staff to not only gain job security but maintain high standards of quality."

Police investigating two men missing from Midlothian and Edinburgh

In two separate cases the Police in Edinburgh are searching for men who have gone missing recently.

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Dominik Piekut was last seen on Wednesday 28 August 2013 at around 10:00pm, when he finished his shift working at a hotel on Drumsheugh Gardens.

Since then the 32-year-old Polish national has not been seen or heard from and concern is growing for his wellbeing.

He was reported missing when he failed to turn up for his shifts at work over the next couple of days from his last sighting, which is considered to be out of character for him.

Dominik is described as white, 5ft 8in, slim build, short black hair, and with blue eyes.

A Police Scotland spokesman said: - "Dominik has not been seen since the 28 August, and his family and friends, here and in Poland, are getting increasingly worried about him.

"If anyone recognises the description or knows Dominik's whereabouts then they are urged to get in touch with Police."

The other case involves a man missing from his home in

Midlothian, and two photos have been released.

Ronald Pryde has not made contact with friends or family since boarding a Number 33 LRT bus outside the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh on Monday 2nd September.

CCTV footage has since been released of the 73-year-old onboard the bus and other passengers were urged to come forward if they remembered seeing him, or could help confirm his movements thereafter.

Further enquiries have now revealed that Mr Pryde alighted around 1.30pm on Lauder Road, Dalkeith, near to Waterfall Walk and anyone who believes they have spotted him since this time is asked to contact police immediately.

Midlothian residents are asked to continue to check their gardens and outbuildings and report any sighting of Mr Pryde to their local policing team.

Mr Pryde is described as white, 5ft 11ins tall, short brown greying hair with slim build and a predominant hunch when walking. He was last seen wearing black trousers, black shoes, light grey polo shirt, blue waist length jacket with grey collar.

Inspector Michelle Ritchie said: "We now know that Mr Pryde returned to Midlothian following his bus journey from the hospital and are keen to hear from members of the public who remember seeing him in or around Lauder Road on Monday 2nd September 2013.

"His loved ones are very concerned for his welfare, having not seen or heard from him since Monday and we want to trace him as soon as possible.

"Anyone with information that can assist with our enquiries is asked to come forward."

The Balmoral opens dedicated whisky bar

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The Balmoral has opened another bar. But not just any bar; this is a dedicated whisky bar with barmen who have been professionally coached in their knowledge of the amber nectar, and who can engage with you about the whisky of your choice. They are elegantly attired in kilts from Kinloch Anderson and they know how to mix a cocktail or two, if a straightforward nip is too much for you.

The hotel responded to a guest who asked for help in finding a good whisky bar by sending him out of the hotel, and it occurred to them that what they believe is the most iconic building in Edinburgh should be able to offer Scotland's iconic product in house. Thus, Scotch was born.

At the opening last night, The Edinburgh Reporter (not normally a whisky drinker) was introduced to a whisky cocktail called a Mashtun, which had journalist Roddy Martine and whisky expert Charles MacLean, both oohing and aaahing over it. It was a delicate mix of a 10 year-old Benromach along with cranberry juice, apple juice, gomme and grapefruit bitters served over ice and garnished with a twist of lemon. Very delicious!

Whisky expert, Charlie MacLean, has given support and advice to Rocco Forte Hotels on the set up of their new whisky bar. (You will remember him from the film, The Angel's Share)

He said:-"This week the Scotch Whisky Association announced figures for Scotch whisky sales which are up 19% on the same period last year. Diageo and Pernod Ricard have committed over £1bn on the production of Scotch in Scotland and all of this shows that the whisky industry is important.

"Wherever we go in the world as ambassadors for Scotch we always find exceptional bars to drink whisky in — with knowledgable bar staff and a huge range of whiskies. Sadly there are none of these in Scotland and this has been an embarrassment. The establishment of Scotch will now give us somewhere to entertain whisky connoisseurs or whisky journalists from abroad of the same standard as those whisky bars I have visited elsewhere.

"Drink whisky with Coca Cola if you wish, but there are two basic elements in the *appreciation* of whisky:- one is glassware and the second is water. In the trade we always use water to taste whisky. We never use ice as that closes down the aroma. I was sceptical of the Uisge Source waters which are being provided here at Scotch, but I have now had my eyes opened during our tasting here today, and I think that the decision to partner with these waters is a unique selling point for this new bar."

The Uisge Source waters are from exclusive private springs in three main regions of Scotland, Speyside, Islay and the Highlands, close to the leading distilleries. They are designed to complement the whisky's original character.

The bar has been formed in what was a little used room to the right of the front door and furnished with comfortable golden and chocolate velvet armchairs, neutral tweed sofas and amber coloured walls all designed by Rocco Forte Hotels Deputy

Chairman, Olga Polizzi, to create a Highland feel.

A wall with over 400 whiskies on display from Scotland's traditional whisky regions including Speyside, Islay, Campbeltown, the Islands, the Highlands and the Lowlands in a variety of blends, malts and vintages dating back to 1940 completes the interior of what might well become a favoured venue for a wee dram after a long day. Five things you need to know today



Man dies following fire - Resuscitation Rapid Response Unit - Constitution Street works - Sunshine on Leith premiere - Sex offender convicted

Fire Services were called to a house fire at Viewcraig Gardens, Edinburgh on Wednesday evening.

Appliances from Tollcross, McDonald Road, Marionville and Liberton fire stations attended shortly before 5 o'clock on 4 September. Four firefighters in breathing apparatus entered the 3^{rd} floor flat, using two water hoses to attack the fire.

The fire was put out shortly after 5.15pm, after which crews

stayed at the premises to dampen down the fire.

A 37-year old man was rescued from the house and given CPR by firefighters until the arrival of the Scottish Ambulance Service. He was taken to Edinburgh Royal Infirmary, but sadly he was pronounced dead.

The Scottish Fire and Rescue Service and Police Scotland continue to investigate the cause of the fire.***



A small team of Scottish Ambulance Service staff in Edinburgh are part of a pioneering project with the Resuscitation Research Group at the University of Edinburgh, led by Dr Gareth Clegg, that has significantly increased survivability rates for out of hospital cardiac arrests (OHCA) in the city.

Working in partnership with emergency medical consultants in the Resuscitation Research Group, based at Edinburgh Royal Infirmary, the Service created a specially trained team of paramedics targeted to cardiac calls.

The project started in April 2011 and the rate of Return of

Spontaneous Circulation (ROSC) for cardiac arrest patients in Lothian is now 23.5%, against a national figure of 17.5%. ROSC is the clinical measure of survivability for OHCA and the target for Scotland, based on World Heath Organisation standards, is 12%-20%.

Now called the Resuscitation Rapid Response Unit (3RU) the team collect and audit data from defibrillators for review, analysis and training and undertake ongoing master classes with consultants and a resuscitation officer to continuously improve resuscitation. A small device is also used to measure CPR as it is administered to patients and the data recovered forms part of the learning programme. Called QCPR, the device also prompts changes in technique during resuscitation, if required.

The 3RU project was developed from an earlier cardiac research project called Topcat, in which Dr Richard Lyon worked closely with paramedics in Edinburgh to measure core temperature and the effects of cooling.

The 3RU project was recognised as world leading when Dr Lyon's presentation on the initiative beat off competition from 400 other abstracts to win the top prize at the European Resuscitation Council Congress at the end of last year. The project was supported by research funding of around £90,000 from Chest Heart & Stroke Scotland.

The average response time in Scotland for a cardiac related 999 call is currently six minutes and last year ambulance crews saved the lives of 523 patients in cardiac arrest.

Health Secretary Alex Neil said:-"We know that the sooner people get treatment after a heart attack can mean the difference between life and death. This ground-breaking project is a great example of our NHS and leading academics working together to lead the way and the results from this pilot are already demonstrating that the scheme has real

potential to save many more lives.

"For many people our ambulance service is the beating heart of our NHS — providing vital services to people when they need it most.

"It was such a pleasure to meet some of the patients who have benefitted from this project. I am grateful they have taken the time to share their story and I am extremely pleased that they have gone on to make such a good recovery."

David Garbutt, Chairman, Scottish Ambulance Service, said:"Out of hospital cardiac arrest remains one of the leading causes of mortality across Europe and the original research project with Dr Lyon identified the potential benefits of developing a specially trained resuscitation team to target cardiac calls.

"Ambulance staff play a pivotal role in determining the outcome of OHCA and the focus on continuously developing and improving resuscitation techniques is saving more lives.

"This is a world leading initiative and we are currently developing plans for appropriate models to roll out the learning and practice across the country."

Over 500 of the QCPR devices will be used for learning by ambulance crews and volunteer first responders across the country.

Works started earlier this week on the improvement of the junction of Bernard Street and Baltic Street with Constitution Street. The work is taking place as part of the wider Leith Programme.

The works will involve:

Providing new, signalled pedestrian crossing facilities

on the sides where there is currently no provision for pedestrians, to make it easier and safer to cross the road on any side of the junction

- Improving the quality of the pavements with Caithness stone paving flags, to tie in with the new paving used in Constitution Street
- Replacing the two crossing islands on Bernard Street with a single, larger pedestrian island that will make it safer and easier to cross, and taking away unnecessary guard rail
- Closing Assembly Street to motor vehicles at the junction, to allow for a proper, signalled pedestrian crossing across Baltic Street. Cyclists will still be able to access Assembly Street here.
- Assembly Street will become two way for traffic and new parking restrictions will apply at the area where the road is closed, to assist vehicles to turn. Access to Assembly Street will be maintained from the east end of Baltic Street at Salamander Street.

Work is expected to be complete by late November 2013. Constitution Street will have to be temporarily closed to through traffic during certain stages of the road works to allow construction of the new layout and diversion routes will be clearly signed during these periods.

Because these roads are busy, there may be congestion during the construction period throughout the surrounding area.

Normal site working hours will be from 7am to 5pm on Mondays to Fridays and work may occasionally be carried out on Saturdays between 8am to 5pm. Overnight or Sunday working will only take place in exceptional circumstances and should this be necessary nearby residents will be notified in advance.

BUS SERVICE

During the works the Lothian Buses service 16 heading towards the city centre will operate via the Shore and Henderson Street. The northbound service 16 to Ocean Terminal is unaffected and will remain on Constitution Street.

A sex offender who abused two children in Midlothian over three decades was convicted yesterday.

At the High Court in Edinburgh on Thursday afternoon John McCallum, (53), was found guilty of a series of serious sexual offences committed from the late 1970s to the early 1990s.

His victims were young children when the abuse began, and suffered at his hands throughout their childhood and teenage years.

In a joint statement, Tracy and Rachel Steadwood (both 40), who are twin sisters, said:-"It has taken a lot of years and bravery to come forward and tell police about what happened, but we did so, and justice has done us proud.

"I would encourage any victims of abuse who have not reported

their ordeal to the police to come forward. We did, and we finally have justice."


Detective Chief Inspector Kenny Gray, from Police Scotland, said: "I would like to pay tribute to Tracy and Rachel, who have shown tremendous bravery to waive their right to anonymity and encourage other victims of abuse to come forward to police.

"Police Scotland is committed to keeping people safe, and we will carry out a thorough and robust investigation whenever we receive a report of sexual abuse, regardless of how long ago it happened.

"Likewise we will always act on any information we receive about anyone who is at risk of abuse.

"I would appeal to anyone who has suffered abuse in the past, who has not reported the matter, to get in touch with Police Scotland on 101, or make a report through a third party organisation such as Rape Crisis Scotland, or Women's Aid.

"Anyone in such a position should be reassured that any reports will be dealt with sensitively, and care and support will be provided."

The Foundation of Hearts has announced that the first month of direct debits has been successful.

As of at 5:00pm last night, the success rate on payments was 98%, compared to a standard industry average of 94% for other

Five things you need to know today

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Council seek views on carers — Petitions Committee — Forth Bridges Festival 2014 — Save the Swifts project — Edinburgh Drawing School exhibition coming to an end

Edinburgh residents who provide unpaid care to family, friends and neighbours are being urged to have their say on how public and voluntary organisations can provide them with better support.

The City of Edinburgh Council has launched a <u>consultation</u> on its draft Joint Carers' Strategy, developed in partnership with NHS Lothian, the voluntary sector and carers themselves.

Estimates of the numbers of carers in Edinburgh are around 47,000 based on the Scottish Household Survey 2007/08, with potentially up to 5,000 of these being young carers. Without their input, the estimated cost of replacement care in Edinburgh is valued at £771m a year (Carers UK, 2011).

The Joint Carers' Strategy, and consultation, covers six priorities:

- identifying carers helping people who care for others realise they can get support
- information and advice carer training, advice, help with finances and benefits
- health and wellbeing emotional, social and practical support to improve health
- short breaks and respite giving carers a break from caring
- young adult carers supporting the transition to adulthood for carers
- personalising support for carers support that meets the individual needs of carers

The Council offers a range of support to carers, including a pilot scheme to provide a one-off Carer Support Payment of £250, which was recently highlighted as an example of best practice by the Scottish Government. The payment was made available unpaid carers, adult and young carers who met the criteria, allowing them to spend some time on themselves to improve their health and wellbeing.

Another successful scheme has been the Carer's Emergency Card, which was launched in November 2012. These cards are designed to inform emergency services that the holder is a carer and that someone depends on them. It also provides the names of people who can be contacted in case of an emergency. To date 258 carer's cards have been registered and these will continue to be promoted.

Both schemes received positive feedback in a newly published carers' survey, designed to evaluate these and other initiatives. The Carer Support Payment proved to be particularly popular, with 738 payments made to adult and young carers. 84% of people in receipt of the fund said that it provided them with the support as they intended and 30% chose to spend the money on respite or a short break.

Councillor Norman Work, the Council's Carers Champion,

said: "Our vision for carers is that those who want to can continue as valued and equal partners in providing care, while being able to live healthy and fulfilling lives themselves. With young carers, it's essential that they are helped to be relieved of any inappropriate roles so they can have a quality life of their own.

"The recent feedback we received from carers about the Council's support initiatives has been very encouraging. We have committed additional funding of £500,000 over the next year, so we will use their input to build on these successes and improve services for the future.


"With an ageing population, and increasing health needs, it's more important than ever before that we and our partner organisations work together with carers to support them as much as we can."



Council asked to ban cycling

on pavements



The Petitions Committee has one valid petition to look at later today which is to ban cycling on city centre pavements by cyclists over 12 years old.

There are only 64 signatures at this point in support of the petition which states:-

We request that tough measures are taken to prevent cyclists from cycling on pavements within the busy City Centre pavements, especially in the Tram Construction works areas, where metal fencing further restricts pavement width. There are many cyclists weaving through the pavements, where people with prams, buggies, wheelchairs and disabled scooters are trying to pass. People with walking difficulties, loss of hearing or sight are further placed in danger as they are less likely to be aware of a bicycle coming along a pavement from behind. Young children are also placed in danger, as are dog walkers. It is particularly bad around the Haymarket Station area where there is the additional danger towards holiday makers / tourists arriving with bulky and heavy cases, totally unaware that cyclists are sharing the pavement. It creates a very bad first impression of the City, especially alongside the construction works for the trams.

It is suggested that Fines should be imposed on those flouting a ban in the same way that fines are imposed on motorists. Younger children, especially on bicycles with stabilisers or tricyles cannot be expected to join traffic on roads, hence requesting the ban on cyclists over the age of 12.

The petition needs 500 signatures before it can be considered

by the committee.

The other petition which is currently being considered by the council is for the introduction of a dedicated bus service to Dumbiedykes. This has moved from being a petition to the Transport Committee which is exploring all options with Lothian Buses.
