Council to reopen York Place

on Friday morning



York Place to open to traffic following tram works

The council has announced that finishing touches are being made to tram works on York Place and the street will be open to traffic on Friday 6 September, four months ahead of the revised programme. Buses will return on Sunday 8 September 2013.

The completion of the track and road works means that the vast majority of tram infrastructure is now in place between Princes Street and east end of York Place.

Underground cables will be pulled through already installed ducts under the street during a series of overnight shifts and work on the tram stop will continue. These planned works will be localised but may occasionally impact on traffic flows until the beginning of the tram's testing and commissioning phase.

This stage when traffic returns to York Place follows the full reopening of Princes Street at the end of 2012 and St Andrew Square in April 2013.

Transport Convener Lesley Hinds said:- "The city centre has come a long way in twelve months with Princes Street opening, St Andrew Square fully accessible, overhead wires installed throughout the city centre and York Place reopened.

"Our target remains to have a service up and running by summer next year but we'll bring this date forward if we can. However, there is still some construction work to be completed and, following that, a major programme of testing, commissioning and driver training.

"We are now in final stages of the tram project construction

phase and while this is a relief, it's also an opportunity for our city. We want to develop a new approach where transport options are fully integrated – a system that will benefit residents and visitors whilst ensuring that Edinburgh is well positioned in the eyes of potential investors who can create jobs for residents.”

Transport Minister Keith Brown said:

“I am pleased to see progress on the project and the opening of the east end of Edinburgh for residents and businesses. This is a significant milestone with Haymarket and the West End also set to re-open during the autumn of this year.

“Once the construction works are complete the emphasis will quickly move to ensuring that the appropriate tests, checks and driver training are run as quickly and effectively as possible so that businesses, residents and visitors can really start to plan ahead with confidence.

“Since the new governance arrangements were put in place, Transport Scotland has played a key role in supporting the Council and Contractor in getting the project back on track. We remain committed to ensuring that there are no further delays, that any opportunity to increase progress is exploited, and that costs are contained within the revised target.”

The early September reopening has come four months earlier than originally scheduled in the revised work programme. Colin Smith, Senior Responsible Officer for the Tram Project, said: “We welcome the co-operative approach from the contractor to hand back parts of the works ahead of the revised schedule for the benefit of the city. This really demonstrates the ongoing excellent working relationship between the Council and the contractor.”

York Place will be open for use to all traffic via three new traffic signal controlled junctions with North St Andrew Street, Elder Street and Broughton Street. Buses will return to their previous routes and access to and from the bus station will be available from the east and the west via the

Elder Street junction.

Access to the multi-storey car parking for St James Centre/John Lewis and surrounding businesses will also be available from York Place via Elder Street. □ The tram track sections on York Place are for tram use only and these areas will not be available for general traffic use.

Work continues in the city's West End area from Shandwick Place to Haymarket with roads expected to open over the coming weeks with overall completion of the West End construction works in Autumn 2013.

The project remains in line with the revised budget (£776m) approved by the Council in September 2011, with work either ahead of schedule or in line with the revised timescale reported in December 2011. Current remedial works at the West End are nearing completion and will not impact upon the financial position or the project timeframe.

The Council will publish an updated Client target programme towards the end of September. Last month the Council set out plans to create a new organisation, Transport for Edinburgh, to integrate transport services in the Capital. Transport for Edinburgh will be set up initially to integrate the tram and bus services, with Lothian Buses and Edinburgh Trams confirmed as the operators.

Five things you need to know

Forth Road Bridge is 49 today – York Place reopening this weekend – Police close Operation Assure after Festival ends – Stockfest – Assault on the Royal Mile

Queensferry Ambition are the people behind the Business Improvement District in South Queensferry, and they were among those hosting an event earlier today to mark the 49 years since the Forth Road Bridge was opened by Her Majesty the Queen on a rather foggy September day in 1964. But more than that they were able to explain at their launch event today about some of the events which will take place next September to mark the half century since the bridge was opened to traffic. The Festival will last from 4 September 2014 to 9 September 2014 and the full list of events include a Biker Rally, a boat flotilla, local band Bwani Bridgestock playing in concert, trips up the bridge towers, a 50th birthday firework display and a torchlight procession which will allow those over 16 to walk across the bridge and back, while raising money for charity.

Soon there will be bridges spanning the Firth of Forth built in each of three consecutive centuries. The Forth Road Bridge was the longest span bridge in Europe at the time it was built, built from Scottish steel, built for 25 ton lorries which now weigh 40 tons. Now the latest, the Queensferry Crossing will be built from steel which comes from China. Changed days.

***Following the early re-opening of
York Place and in preparation for***

the introduction of tram, some of our services are changing their routes in the city centre from Sunday 8 September.

- Services 10, [11](#), 12 & [16](#) heading east will run via Princes Street, Frederick Street and George Street to St Andrew Square and then via York Place to Leith Walk. Heading west these services will all continue using their current route from Leith Walk via York Place, St Andrew Square and South St. David Street to Princes Street. ***This means that passengers heading east beyond Frederick Street will alight on George Street while westbound passengers will board on Princes Street.***
- Service [41](#) heading south will run via Princes Street, Frederick Street, George Street and Hanover Street to The Mound. Heading north, buses will run via The Mound and Hanover Street to George Street (buses will continue along George Street until the West End has re-opened). Buses will no longer serve Waverley Bridge.
- Service [42](#) heading south will run via Frederick Street, George Street and Hanover Street to The Mound. Heading north, buses will run via The Mound, Hanover Street and George Street to Frederick Street. Early morning, late evening and Sunday buses will continue from Hanover Street via George Street to and from St Andrew Square. Buses will no longer serve Waverley Bridge.
- Service [67](#) will run from St Andrew Square via George Street and Hanover Street to The Mound in both directions. Buses will no longer serve Waverley Bridge.
- AIRLINK will have a revised drop-off stop in George Street instead of Princes Street. There is NO CHANGE to the departure point on Waverley Bridge or pick-up location at the West End.

Police Scotland has praised the local and visiting public within the Capital following a successful operation to keep people safe during the Festival.

On Thursday 1st August, officers in Edinburgh launched Operation Assure, which saw high-visibility police patrols undertaken across the city throughout the month.

Police engaged with Festival-goers, local residents and business premises and offered a range of crime prevention advice and personal safety messages, as well as promoting the non-emergency 101 number.

To reach as many of the Capital's communities as possible, officers also carried out online engagement via Twitter using the hashtag #FestivalPolicing.

Around 50 tweets were issued from the @EdinburghPolice account over August to provide the public with helpful information and guidance on keeping themselves and their belongings safe while out and about in the city.

These tweets also helped visitors and locals stay informed about major events ongoing in Edinburgh, such as the Scottish Defence League and Unite Against Fascism demonstrations at the Scottish Parliament and the end of Festival fireworks display in Princess Street Gardens

Since Operation Assure was launched Police Scotland have gained over 80 new followers to the @EdinburghPolice account and local officers are keen to continue their engagement with the public via social media.

Throughout the Festival, police conducted over 350 stop and searches with over 100 resulting in the recovery of drugs, weapons and stolen property.

The high-visibility patrols throughout Edinburgh's busiest

areas also led to over 50 people being issued with Fixed Penalty Notices for various antisocial behaviour offences.

In addition over 40 people were charged in connection with a number of crimes including robbery, shoplifting and assault.

Officers have now thanked the public for their assistance and support during this busy month and look forward to another successful Festival next year.

Chief Superintendent Mark Williams, Divisional Commander for the City of Edinburgh said: "This was the first Festival to be policed by Police Scotland. However, officers in Edinburgh have a wealth of experience in dealing with the numerous and varied events, which regularly take place within the Capital.

"Operation Assure was launched as part of our commitment to keeping people safe and throughout August our officers provided a visible and engaging presence across the city.

"As a result of this engagement, we were able to respond to and investigate a number of reported offences, many of which have resulted in arrests, Fiscal reports or the issuing of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

"The Festival attracts hundreds of thousands of people each year and I am delighted that the vast majority have enjoyed their summer in a responsible and considerate manner, with only a relatively small number coming to police attention.

"For the first time ever, we were able to engage with the Festival public via social media and the tweets we issued during August seem to have been well received and undoubtedly played some role in the increase in followers to our @EdinburghPolice account.

"I would like to thank the public for their co-operation and support for Operation Assure throughout this month and I look forward to another successful Festival next year."

Stockfest, a weeklong festival celebrating Stockbridge, Edinburgh and the surrounding community, will return in 2013 for its 2nd festival.

Stockfest2012 was the brainchild of Stockbridge Traders (Tannis Dodd, Herbies' of Edinburgh; Rhona Johnston, Kiss the Fish and JoJo Hernandez, Lilies & Dreams) and local resident Jane Ali-Knight. Following the success of previous one day festivals in the area it was decided to spread events over a week and further involve local traders, community groups, schools and residents. Aiming to increase footfall during the week and increase business to the area after the summer and festival period, Tannis Dodd states 'Stockfest 2012 was a huge success, events were well attended and the community got involved in over 50 different events during the week. The highlight for me was the Upcycling and Flea Market event. This was immensely popular and reinforced peoples love for vintage products and, in times of austerity, the desire to resue and recycle clothes and other personal items. This year we are delighted to be hosting it in our local bowling club!'

Times have been tough for independent businesses and the local community over the last few years with contentious planning projects and the loss of local community spaces to redevelopment. The festival aims to boost morale, celebrate the successes and increase the profile of Stockbridge as a place to shop, dine and live and a destination to visit. Most of the events have again come from within the local community and the 2013 programme will not disappoint. Highlights include Guided Walks through the area, taster sessions in Yoga, Bollywood dancing and Puppy Training, Book and Poetry readings at Stockbridge Library, the Masai Warriors performing in a local venue and live music. Stockfest organised events return including an opening Community Ceilidh on Saturday 21st September, Stock Up – an Upcycling and Vintage Flea Market and

a Closing Party curated by JoJo Hernandez, Lilies & Dreams.

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses following an assault that happened on the Royal Mile yesterday evening (Tuesday 3rd September).

The incident happened outside John Knox House around 5pm yesterday, when the victim, an 80-year-old Canadian man, was singing gospel hymns to a small crowd.

A woman was observed coming from a kilt shop across road, before she approached the victim and a disturbance broke out. This resulted in the victim falling over and hitting his head on the ground.

A passerby called for an ambulance and the victim was taken to the ERI, where he was treated for his injuries.

The woman is described as mixed race, late 40s, 5ft 8in, large build, and with shoulder length dark hair.

Detective Constable James Philp said: "We know that a small crowd had been watching him sing, so we are appealing for any witnesses to this incident to come forward."

Heart(s) in Leith



It is often said that marriage is an institution. It is often said I should be in one but that's another story. Last year was a difficult one for me as my marriage of 30 years came to an end. Of course, I'm not the only person to go through a

painful separation after a long marriage so I won't dwell on the gory details except to say my family and friends were shocked by the news. The consensus seemed to be that of all the people they knew who were married, my marriage was the one they didn't expect to fall apart. C'est la vie and all that. However, their shock at the demise of my marriage was replicated shortly afterwards when they discovered I was heading to Leith...

Since 1990, I had lived in Dalkeith, the heart of Midlothian. Yes, I must tell you, dear reader, I am a lifelong Hearts supporter as the numerous lines on my face and greying, if rapidly diminishing, hairline will tell you. So having digested the news that my marriage was over, those close to me thought it was a 'double whammy' when news broke that I was going to live in 'enemy territory'.

Hearts supporters of my acquaintance thought the break-up of my marriage had had an adverse effect on my mental health. 'You're moving to where?' they asked, with consistently high degrees of incredulity. 'Don't you know that's the dark side of town? You'll be perilously close to Hibernian FC, who hate Jam Tarts and hate Dundee (I don't think many Hibeers do hate Dundee, it's just that it conveniently rhymes with FC) Can't you move to Gorgie?

The truth is that, initially, I did move to Gorgie for six months. A stone's throw away from that well-known drinking establishment popular with people of the maroon persuasion, The Athletic Arms, known locally as The Diggers. However, in July last year I moved in with the new love of my life – who lives just off Great Junction Street. And, I have to say to my family, friends and fellow Hearts supporters – I love living in Leith. As a 'Leith Jambos' banner at last year's William Hill Scottish Cup Final declared, I suspect I'm not the only Hearts fan declaring those sentiments.

It's only when you move to the city from the suburbs that you appreciate the advantages of living in town. I actually lived

in Mayfield, a suburb of Dalkeith and a sad example of suburban decay. There is little of any interest in Mayfield aside from a couple of pubs and bookmakers. It's a 15-minute bus journey from Dalkeith which itself has little to offer aside from more pubs and bookmakers – and cafes. You have another 30-45 minutes bus journey from Dalkeith before you sample the cultural delights of Auld Reekie (clearly, I'm excluding Gilmerton from this...)

Leith, however, is different. It's an exciting, vibrant community rightly proud of its history and still hankering after the days when it was an independent borough and Edinburgh only began at Pilrig Street. There's a character about Leith that shouts out from the pavements of Leith Walk as you head down from the city. Famous names adorn the streetlamps proclaiming (do you see what I did there?) their love for the place.

The Kirkgate Shopping Arcade may have been a consequence of an ill-thought 1960s architectural dream but there is a character about it that marks it out from other similar shopping arcades. Something, which the people of Leith might say, perhaps has its faults – but it's theirs.

Constitution Street, The Shore and Commercial Street are laden with history and tales of a bygone age when Leith was a major port. A history should never be forgotten and will never be forgotten. Fine organisations such as the Leith Historical Society – to which I have attended several events – will ensure this is the case.

The numerous Polish, Chinese and Mediterranean supermarkets along Leith Walk illustrate the diverse nature of the area. On my way to work every morning, I cross Great Junction Bridge and take inspiration from the Water of Leith below; the tranquillity of the cycle path and walkway running alongside is a haven from the hustle and bustle of everyday life. I close my eyes and imagine the great steam trains of yesteryear trundling under the bridge and the steam wafting to the street

above.

I haven't forgotten Mayfield in Dalkeith as my daughter and my three wonderful grandchildren live there and I see them every weekend. And being a season ticket holder at Tynecastle, my trips to Gorgie are still as frequent (despite the traumas of the last few months) However, despite being here for little over a year, I now look forward to coming home to Leith. I never thought someone who has been a Hearts fan for 45 years would say that – but, believe me I mean it. My heart is now firmly resident here.

Even if this means I will still have to go to Gorgie to see a victorious football team in an open-top bus....

Forth Road Bridge 49 years old today



The Forth Road Bridge is 49 years young and counting – and the stage is set for the first Forth Bridges Festival which will celebrate not just the 50th birthday, but also three centuries of world-class bridge engineering on the Forth. A key event in the Homecoming Scotland 2014 calendar, the ten-day festival will take place from 4 – 13 September 2014 across both North and South Queensferry.

Organised in partnership by the Forth Estuary Transport

Authority and Queensferry Ambition, the confirmed programme highlights include a boat flotilla on the Forth; a torch light procession over the Bridge; the Forth Bridge House Party, including a Birthday Parade; and Scotland Welcomes the World to Lunch.

Together, the Forth Road Bridge and the adjacent Forth Bridge are icons of Scotland and present a powerful visual image that is recognised the world over. The Festival is designed to appeal to residents and visitors alike, bringing a mix of Scottish pride and important economic benefits from tourism, in what is set to be a momentous year for Scotland.

There was an official launch event this morning in South Queensferry when the proceedings started with parachutists flying in to land in the Forth.

Tony Martin, Vice-Convener of the Forth Estuary Transport Authority, said: "Since 1964, the Bridge has made a real difference to the lives of Scottish people. It is a genuine success story, carrying over twice the weight and volume of traffic that it was originally designed for, and providing a valuable transport link used by 25 million vehicles a year. It's fantastic to take the opportunity to celebrate this golden milestone with a real party atmosphere that everyone can take part in."



A unique facet of the 50th birthday will be the Tower Top Trips, giving members of the public a rare opportunity to apply for one of 2014 strictly limited tickets to ascend one of the Forth Road Bridge towers. Details on the release of tickets for this breathtaking experience will be announced later this month.

Malcolm Brown, Chair of Queensferry Ambition, added: "Queensferry Ambition is delighted to be at the very heart of next year's Forth Bridges Festival and to support a number of key events during the ten day programme. The Festival really does have something for everyone – business; the wider community and of course for the thousands of visitors who will help make this a really special time.

"The programme of events makes full use of our surroundings both on land and water and will help ensure a real feelgood factor for the area. I am particularly excited about 'Scotland Welcomes the World to Lunch', when we will attempt to set a new Guinness World Record for the largest sit-down outdoor lunch. Scottish hospitality at its very best!"

Welcoming the Festival, Mike Cantlay, Chairman of VisitScotland, said: "The Forth Bridges Festival is one of the signature events of Homecoming 2014 and is going to be truly spectacular. Hibs clarify changes in

backroom staff



At the recent meeting between Hibernian Chairman Rod Petrie and a number of invited representatives from various supporters groups, an issue was raised regarding the changes in back-room staff at the club, and in particular the reasons behind the departure of Liam O'Brien in the summer.

In response, a statement was published on the official website highlighting the changes which have taken place.

The appointment of Jimmy Nicholl as Assistant Manager was announced on 15 June 2013, two days before the playing squad was due to return for pre-season training. About a week before that, it was clear to Pat Fenlon from discussions with First Team Coach Liam O'Brien that Liam would not be returning to the Club for family reasons.

Dave Henderson was recruited as Football Development Manager in October 2012, and reports directly to the Manager on talent identification and development. Dave's details have been on the Official Club website since 2012.

The Club recruited former player Alan Maybury to the new post of Development Coach in July this year. Alan has also been registered as a professional football player, so that he may play in SPFL U20 and East of Scotland matches to coach Hibs' young players through matches on the pitch. He therefore works closely with James McDonough, Head of Youth Coaching and with the first team backroom staff.

Scott Thomson (Goalkeeper Coach) extended his contract with the Club towards the end of last Season to complete the line-up of Football Department coaches.

The Medical Team provide support services to the professional

football players within the Football Department (U20 and first team) and also oversee the provision of services within the Football Academy.

Senior Physiotherapist Sarah Watt left in December 2012 to provide physiotherapy to elite athletes focused on the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games and Head Physiotherapist Calum Rea left at the end of last Season to take up a post within private healthcare.

Accordingly, a new physiotherapy team has been at the Club since the start of pre-season. David Henderson is Head Physiotherapist. He joined the club from Newcastle United and has 20 years' experience of first team football physiotherapy. Kitty Forrest was also as full time Senior Physiotherapist having worked for the Club in a part time capacity for nearly four years.

The two Club doctors continue to serve the Club which always has two Club doctors present at home match days. The Club also hires in the services of a fitness and performance coach (including injury prevention and recovery from injury); a masseur and a podiatrist on a consultancy basis amongst other services.

There have been no substantive changes in the Football Academy for a number of years. Bill Hendry is Head of Youth Development and James McDonaugh is the Head of Academy Coaching. The Football Academy is responsible for all youth football up to and including the squad of young professional players at U20 level.

The Manager has a keen interest in youth football and provides advice and recommendations to the Football Academy staff. An example of that is the recruitment of two players with 1996 birthdays, Cody Mulhall and Gareth McCaffrey, over the summer.

The Club's Football Academy is an Elite Academy within the Scottish FA Club Academy Scotland system developed by the

Scottish FA Performance Director Mark Wotte. The Club expects to consolidate its position as a Level Four Academy this Season and progress to Level Five in Season 2014-15 as Academy coaching staff obtain their continuous professional development awards on Scottish FA courses. The Club has one of the leading Elite Football Academies in Scotland.

There are many other staff both paid and volunteers who work within the Football Academy and the Football Department.

The club expressed their gratitude to the staff who have left and wish them every success in their new careers.

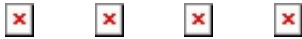

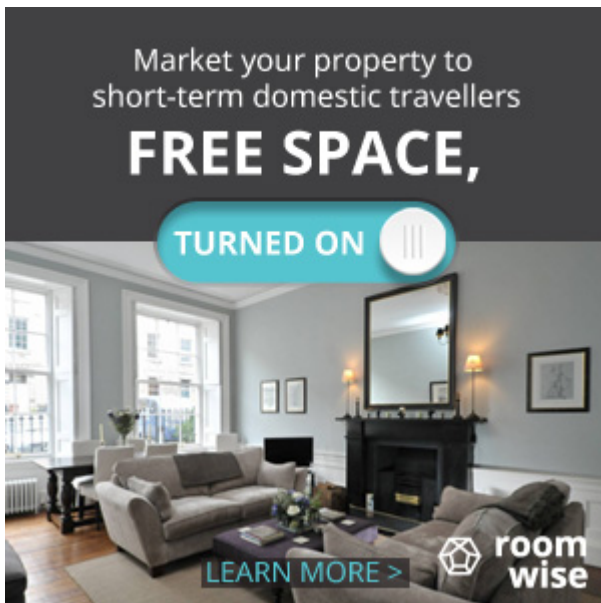

 **Parliament resumes – Edinburgh MP lodges Early Day Motion – Assault & Robbery – Campaigners against domestic abuse to hold rally calling for MSP’s resignation – Cricket at the Grange –**

Holyrood returns today after the summer recess, with little more than a year to go before the referendum on independence.

Business will take place in various committees this morning but this afternoon when the whole chamber convenes at 2:00pm there will be a time devoted to a motion of condolence for David McLetchie a serving MSP and former leader of the Scottish Conservatives who died last month.

Following the tributes from MSPs across all political parties the First Minister will then lay down plans for the parliamentary session from 2013 to 2014 and these will be debated tomorrow afternoon. You can watch this live on [Parliament TV.](#)

Among the written questions asked by MSPs there are a couple from Alison Johnstone about the amounts spent on cycling in the past couple of years.

Edinburgh's Liberal Democrat MP, Mike Crockart, has tabled an Early Day Motion (EDM) at Westminster calling for disgraced MSP Bill Walker to resign his seat immediately. The EDM which MPs are able to add their support to comes after Willie Rennie MSP, Liberal Democrat Leader, tabled a motion in the Scottish Parliament calling on Mr Walker to vacate his seat.

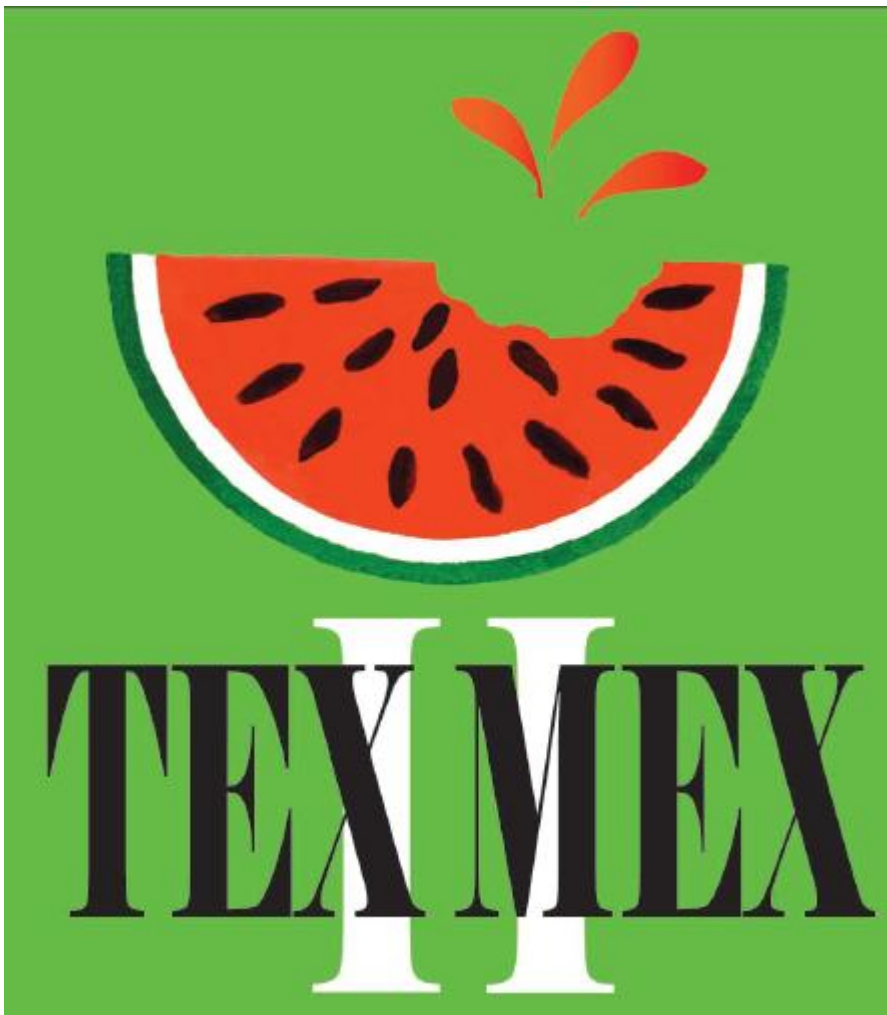
Last week Mr Crockart wrote an open letter to the SNP MSP for Edinburgh Western urging him to back calls for the disgraced MSP Bill Walker to resign his seat immediately.

Commenting Mr Crockart said:-“Domestic abuse of any kind should not be tolerated and to allow Mr Walker to continue as a Member of the Scottish Parliament sends the wrong message about the gravity of his convictions. I felt it was appropriate to table an Early Day Motion which allows MPs to back the calls for Mr Walker to resign.

“Domestic violence and domestic abuse is a very serious issue and allowing an individual who has been convicted of 23 counts of assault to continue to sit at Holyrood is completely unacceptable.”

Mr Crockart added that he was ‘very disappointed’ that the local MSP has still not added his name to the motion saying:-
“Over half of the Members of the Scottish Parliament have backed the motion; I am very disappointed that our local representative is not one of them.”

Edinburgh Police are investigating an assault and robbery that took place in Drylaw yesterday afternoon.

The incident happened around 3.30pm at an address in Wester Drylaw Place. The victim, who is in his 50s, was alone in his house when he heard a knock at the door. On answering, he was forced back inside by three men, who robbed him of around £170 and a laptop computer. The attack left the victim with minor injuries.

Following this two of the suspects were seen running up a footpath leading to Wester Drylaw Drive.

The three suspects are all described as being white, 5ft 10ins tall, 20-to-23 years old, and wearing cotton hoodies, one grey, one black and the other an unknown colour.

Detective Inspector Stuart Harkness said:- "This was a frightening experience for the victim and we are keen to hear from anybody who has any information or recognises the description of the suspects."

NUS Scotland, Scottish Women's Aid and Zero Tolerance call for action by Scottish Parliament to remove Bill Walker from Parliament

NUS Scotland Women's Campaign, Scottish Women's Aid and Zero Tolerance will call on Bill Walker MSP to resign at a demonstration outside the Scottish Parliament at 1pm today.

Organisers of the rally will also call on the Scottish Parliament to take action to remove Walker should he not immediately step down.

This joint call by Scotland's leading campaigning organisations against domestic abuse comes as the Parliament returns from its summer recess and just days after Walker, who was convicted by a Scottish Court of 23 domestic abuse charges against three former wives and a step daughter, was quoted in press reports as stating he would not vacate his seat.

The organisers of the rally back the motion by Scottish Liberal Democrat leader Willie Rennie, which has been signed by over half of MSPs in the Scottish Parliament: "The Parliament believes that Bill Walker MSP should vacate his seat in the parliament immediately".

NUS Scotland Women's Campaign, Scottish Women's Aid and Zero Tolerance have asked members of the Scottish public young and old who oppose domestic abuse to join them in sending a clear message to Bill Walker that it is never acceptable to abuse women, and to the Parliament that it must act to remove Walker should he not step down immediately.

Stacey Devine, NUS Scotland Women's Officer, said:

"It's disgraceful that Bill Walker refuses to let the people of Dunfermline replace him with a representative that hasn't been convicted of domestic abuse. The man has no shame, and needs to resign now.

"It's deeply concerning that the Parliament has so far been unable to send Walker packing. Should Walker not resign voluntarily, the same MSPs from across the political spectrum who have rightly condemned Bill Walker's decades-long violence against women should take immediate action to remove him from

office.”

Jenny Kemp, Coordinator for Zero Tolerance, said:

“Bill Walker must resign as an MSP. Making laws and policies for Scotland is a privilege, and one that a man who’s been convicted of 23 crimes against women does not deserve.

“Perpetrators of domestic abuse are not fit to hold public office, especially in a Parliament that has been so progressive on violence against women.”

Lily Greenan, Manager of Scottish Women’s Aid, said:

“Bill Walker MSP is a serial offender against women, with 23 convictions for assault over a 30 year period. Scottish Women’s Aid believes he is therefore not suitable to hold public office, and calls on the Scottish Parliament to use any means at its disposal to remove him.

“There are also questions to be answered as to why this case was heard at summary trial. We will continue to press for these answers to ensure that all women who experience domestic abuse receive appropriate and meaningful justice from the courts.”

Bronte letter to be auctioned in Edinburgh

A rare autographed letter signed, from Charlotte Brontë to a David Waldie, [L.R.C.S.] (1813-1889), thanking him for his appreciative comments regarding Jane Eyre and the gift of some “...little books”, addressed from Gloucester Terrace, London, dated January 19th, 1853 will be sold at Lyon & Turnbull tomorrow and is estimated to reach £10,000-12,000.

Cathy Marsden Book Specialist at Lyon & Turnbull said:- “Brontë’s letter is addressed to a David Waldie Esq., a well-respected pharmacist who, it is commonly accepted, first suggested the use of chloroform in midwifery. Indeed, Professor James Y. Simpson of the Department of Midwifery at Edinburgh University, acknowledged Waldie’s suggestion in a footnote in his account of discovery. Although the letter was addressed to Waldie in Liverpool, where he first encountered chloroform, he is still remembered in his home town of Linlithgow, where the Annet House Museum currently has an exhibition relating to his life and work.”

The letter tells us that Waldie was impressed by Jane Eyre, published in 1847 under the pseudonym ‘Currer Bell’, and was inspired to write to Brontë of his appreciation of the book. Brontë replies:

“The sincere affection of a reader’s gratification is – I scarcely need to say – one of the much acceptable favours in which an author can be repaid for his labours. I shall be glad if any future work of mine gives you equal pleasure to that you speak of having found in “Jane Eyre”.”

In 1848, following the publication of *Jane Eyre*, Charlotte and Ann Brontë had revealed their true identities to their publishers. In a bibliographical note of her sisters in an edition of Emily Brontë's *Wuthering Heights*, Charlotte explains the reasons for the rather masculine-sounding pseudonyms used by the three siblings:


Averse to personal publicity, we veiled our own names under those of Currer, Ellis, and Acton Bell; the ambiguous choice being dictated by a sort of conscientious scruple at assuming Christian names, positively masculine, while we did not like to declare ourselves women, because without at the time suspecting that our mode of writing and thinking was not what is called 'feminine,' we had a vague impression that authoresses are liable to be looked on with prejudice.

Charlotte's rejection of, "personal publicity" seems to have extended beyond the gradual outing of her sex. Even in 1849, when Charlotte, "...paid her first visit to London in her own proper person as a woman of distinction and literary fame," (in the words of Auguste Birrell), she did not rush to be the centre of attention amongst her fellow writers. She declined to meet with Charles Dickens, for example, although she did visit William Makepeace Thackeray, of whom she was a great admirer.

However, it was between this point and Charlotte Brontë's untimely death in 1855, whilst pregnant with her first child, that the author writes this very appreciative and gracious note to Waldie.

Momentous Day for Foundation of Hearts

A little over two months ago, Heart of Midlothian Football Club went into administration. Players and staff were made redundant, the club suffered a 15 point deduction at the start of this season and the very future of an Edinburgh, indeed Scottish football institution was under serious threat. Today, the seriously ill patient saw the first signs of recovery with the first direct debits made from more than 7,500 Hearts supporters who have pledged contributions to the Foundation of Hearts, the supporters led group aiming to take control of Edinburgh's oldest football club. The Foundation, the preferred bidder for the club, allows Edinburgh business to provide the up-front capital, through BIDCO, and then enter a binding contract with FANCO to sell the club, at no personal gain, in a controlled manner.

The long journey towards supporter ownership has begun in earnest, and today the Hearts manager Gary Locke, a life-long Hearts fan himself, recognised the enormous role fans will have to play in creating a long-term, sustainable Hearts.

At a press conference at the club's training centre at Riccarton, Locke thanked the thousands of supporters who participated in the first direct debit draw down to the Foundation of Hearts. 'It's fantastic, the support we've had the last couple of years has been unbelievable. To get 7,500 people pledging money to the club is nothing short of phenomenal. We can't thank the supporters enough. It just shows you what this clubs means to people. It's not a normal football club, it's a club with unbelievable tradition and history and the amount of people who are trying to save it is incredible. Everyone wants this club to survive, everyone wants us to do well and if you've got that you've got a chance.'

Locke also had a message for those supporters who were perhaps wary about pledging their financial support. 'Everyone knows where the money is going, it's to save the football club and the more people who can get involved the better. For those who are undecided, I'm just willing them to come on board.' The chairman of the Foundation of Hearts, Ian Murray, added :- 'Today is a momentous day, but it's still just the start. The supporters have played their own, massively significant part, in creating the first step towards the greatest supporter movement in Scottish football history. To everyone involved I extend our warmest thanks. It will take many years to get Hearts together, but with the ongoing commitment of thousands of supporters we can get there, and create a legacy for future generations of supporters that is every bit as special as our past.' For that reason, and as we prepare for next month's second direct debit draw down I want to stress that it is not too late to be part of this great Foundation of Hearts moment in time. Every pound genuinely counts.

Supporters who are able, are encouraged to set up their direct debit and help create history at www.foundationofhearts.org ahead of the next drawdown in October'.

If the loyalty, spirit and incredible generosity of the Hearts

support is anything to by then, after a dark summer, the future of the club 'away up in Gorgie' is surely in safe hands.

£20,000 of drugs seized in Edinburgh

Drugs seized, Edinburgh

Police in Edinburgh have seized £20,000 worth of drugs in an operation that happened in the capital on Friday 30 August 2013.

Officers raided a property in the west of the city, where they recovered drugs and associated material used in the production of so-called 'legal highs'.

The drugs seized included NBOMe, which was recently prohibited under the Misuse of Drugs Act along with Benzofury.

A 36-year-old man has been detained in connection with the seizure.

Detective Chief Inspector Colin Boyle, from Police Scotland's

Specialist Crime Division, said: "Acting in conjunction with partners from Border Force, officers from Police Scotland have seized £20,000 worth of NBOMe, a so-called 'legal high'.

"The drug is subject to a temporary order under the Misuse of Drugs Act, making it an offence to make, supply or import the substance. Anyone caught doing so is liable to a maximum prison sentence of 14 years, and an unlimited fine under the Misuse of Drugs Act.

"Police Scotland is committed to keeping people safe, and we will continue to take robust action against those who illegally make and deal drugs in our local communities.

"I would urge anyone who has any information on drug dealers and other serious and organised criminals to contact Police Scotland, either by contacting 101, or by making an anonymous report through Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111.

"Rest assured that any information received will be acted upon, and treated in the strictest confidence."

John McGowan, from Border Force investigations, said: "Border Force works hard to stop a number of harmful substances entering the country and this also applies to 'legal highs', which shouldn't be assumed to be either safe or legal.

"We are pleased that by working with Police Scotland we have been able to keep a substantial amount of these drugs off the

streets.”

Hibs' star Kevin Thomson recalled to Scotland Squad



Hibs' midfielder Kevin Thomson is back in the Scotland squad for this week's World Cup qualifiers double header against on form Belgium at Hampden Park on Friday night then Macedonia in Skopje four days later.

On Saturday, Kevin lent his considerable experience to the youngsters and helped the team to a 9-0 win over Hawick Royal Albert at Hibs Training Centre in front of a handful of fans, whilst serving a suspension from first team duties, but six days later he could be playing in front of a full house at the national stadium against one of the top sides in Europe.

His performances for Hibs this season have persuaded Scotland boss Gordon Strachan to hand him the opportunity to kick-start his international career after injuries forced Graham Dorrans and James Morrison out of the squad.

Speaking to the official Hibernian website, Thomson said: "I'm delighted with the call-up – it's been three years since I was last involved with Scotland, but a return has always been a big personal goal for me. Obviously I've squeezed in through other boys' hard luck and injury, although I've experienced that side of it before too.

"Hopefully this will be start of what will be a good season

for me. To be back involved is great and even if I don't get to play in either of the qualifiers it's a special feeling to be part of the Scotland squad again."

His inclusion in the Under 20s team came as a surprise to those watching, but Thomson decided that it would be more beneficial to work on his fitness rather than support his team-mates against Ross County at Easter Road.

He added: "I really enjoyed the experience and I think really highly of James (McDonough, Head of Academy Coaching).

"He has got the team playing the right way and, even though we won 9-0, the team still had to perform well to achieve that. You can only beat whatever is put in front of you.

"I really wanted to be involved in the game and I felt I got a lot out of it in terms of my match sharpness and fitness levels. There were only 30 or 40 supporters there, so if I do get the opportunity to play at Hampden it will be on the other end of the scale."

The 28-year-old midfielder, who was three caps, last featured for the national side in August 2010 against Sweden.

He will team up with former Hibs' team-mate Leigh Griffiths, Steven Whittaker and Scott Brown.

Fireworks display ends the 2013 Edinburgh International Festival



Magical Virgin Money Fireworks Concert enthralled audiences across Edinburgh

The *Virgin Money Fireworks Concert* drew to a stunning close, the sky filled with giant walls of silver and golden crackle effect fireworks, bursting 225 metres above Edinburgh Castle. As the closing bars of Musorgsky's *Pictures at an Exhibition* rang out to the applause of families and friends, visitors to the Scottish capital joined its residents to fill

Princes Street Gardens and streets across the city to enjoy the grand finale of the Edinburgh International Festival. Approximately 250,000 people gathered across Edinburgh and beyond to watch the popular annual event.

More than 400,000 fireworks were launched during the 45 minute sell-out concert in a display designed by fireworks wizard Keith Webb of Pyrovision, synchronised perfectly to music performed live by the Scottish Chamber Orchestra.

The Scottish Chamber Orchestra conducted by Garry Walker, gave a wonderful performance, opening the concert with Smetana's *Dance of the Comedians* from comic opera *The Bartered Bride*, before performing the evening's central work, Musorgsky's *Pictures at an Exhibition*. Written in 1874 as a tribute to the composer's great friend, the artist Viktor Hartmann, the suite comprises 10 musical 'pictures' in a walk around a gallery, each one re-visualised during the Concert by the fireworks.

The 'Waterfall' drew gasps of amazement from the audience as it descended over 130 feet down the Castle Rock 30 minutes into the concert. The Waterfall lasted around 1 minute, the end marking a short pause before the Scottish Chamber Orchestra resumed the performance.

And this year for the very first time there was not one, but two spectacular 'Waterfalls'. The iconic effect was used both in its traditional form – spilling down the centre of the Castle Rock – and also again in a surprise addition a few minutes before the end of the concert, highlighting the full outline of the Castle in a shimmering fairy-tale effect.

The most spectacular of all was saved for last, with the music for the last picture, *The Great Gate of Kiev*, punctuated by huge silver crackle fireworks blasting to the beat of the music.

In total four tonnes of explosives were used, and the display,

which took months to plan and 15 pyrotechnicians seven days to set the fireworks out, was over for another year.

On the ramparts of Edinburgh Castle Keith Webb said, 'We're over the moon at another hugely successful concert. All the hard work and dedication the team has put in was well worth it.'

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Five things you need to know today



MELA to refund cost of tickets – Announcement due on National Performance Centre – Community council nominations open today – 80% of tickets sold for the Festival – Funding from Hearts fans

Edinburgh's biggest world music event was forced to close its doors yesterday afternoon and cancel the appearance of their headline act The Orb due to safety issues when the wind speed whipped up to dangerous levels. The organisers have decided to refund the cost of tickets to those who bought tickets after 3:00pm on Sunday afternoon.

They have issued the following statement:-

“Public safety is our number one priority when organising the Mela. Given the weather forecast for this weekend and the nature of the venues used in our festival, we monitored wind speed very closely all day.

Due to extremely high winds and circumstances completely beyond our control, the Edinburgh Mela was forced to close the site at around 4.45pm today. It was thought at first that this would be a temporary closure and our team worked very hard to reopen the site; however at just after 7pm we were forced to completely close the site and cancel our remaining shows.

At just after 4pm we had to close the Main Stage due to a structural issue caused by high winds. At this point we thought it would be possible to re-stage our Main Stage programme on the Mix Stage, and informed the public of this. At around 4.45pm, wind speeds exceeded the safety rating of

some of our smaller stalls and we were left with no alternative but to temporarily close the site while we dealt with that issue. We proceeded in the full expectation that we would still be able to put on a reduced programme on the Mix Stage, and tried to keep the public as informed as possible about updates. We were still working hard to try and resolve the issue and return to a reduced programme of events as quickly as possible. However, at just after 7pm the wind-related structural issue with the Main Stage became much worse, leaving the site unsafe for the public to re-enter, and all personnel on site had to be completely evacuated.

Full refunds will be available to anyone who entered the site after 3pm on Sunday or was unable to pick up a pre-paid wristband before site closure. We will also refund any members of the public with pre-bought unused wristbands. Wristbands need to be returned to the box office by post to:

Customers who pre-booked wristbands are asked to include a print-out of their confirmation email. Our staff will then confirm serial numbers and refund tickets accordingly. Postage will also be refunded.

The Edinburgh Mela organisers would like to thank our audiences and performers for their understanding. The overflowing of support we've received has been wonderful and has meant a huge amount to us. We're obviously hugely disappointed that this has happened, and we'll begin planning an even bigger and better event for 2014 (almost) straight away."

The council has been spending a lot of time and effort in putting together the bid to be able to site the new National Performance Centre for Sport here in Edinburgh. The decision will be made this week but ahead of that this weekend, some of the country's top sports coaches and club leaders got together at Heriot-Watt – one of the proposed locations for Scotland's National Performance Centre for Sport.



The two day conference, part of Edinburgh's Festival of Sport, attracted some of the country's leading coaches and sports figures who looked at ways of building stronger clubs and developing quality coaches in Edinburgh and the East of Scotland.

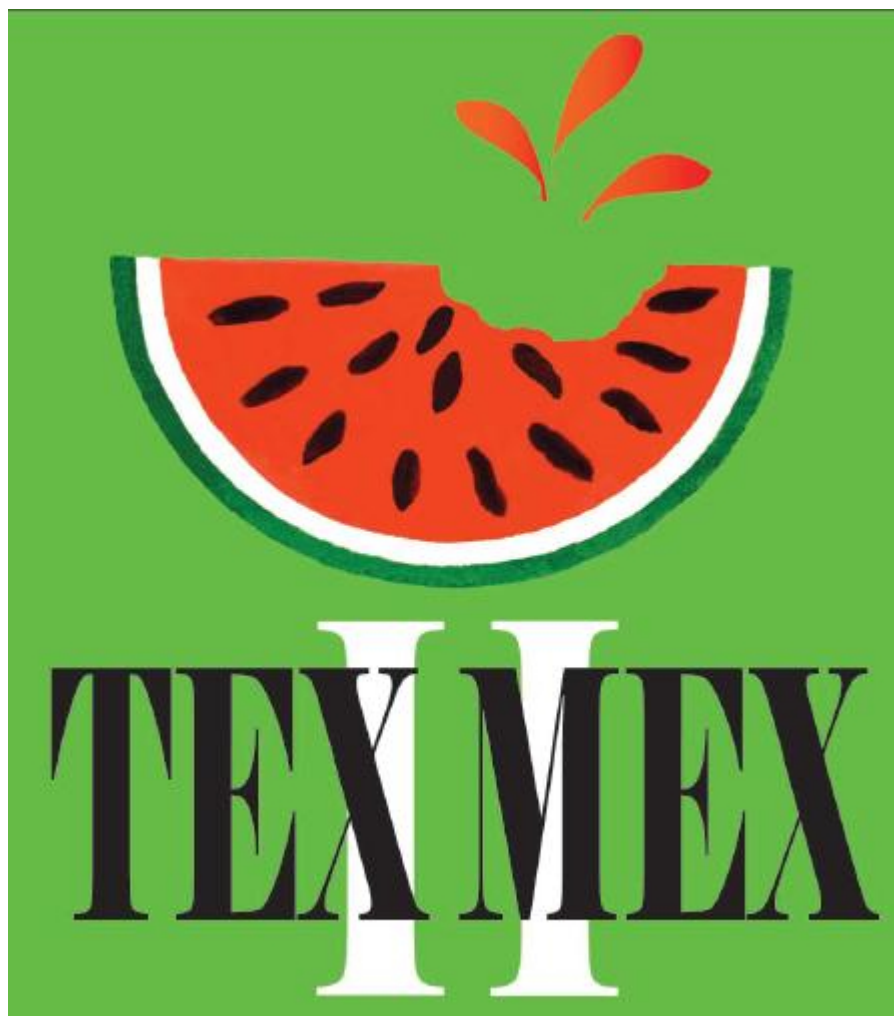
Edinburgh is up against Stirling and Dundee in the bid to be chosen as the location for the £30m sports development centre.

Ahead of delegates from across the country arriving at the Heriot-Watt University campus, Professor Steve Chapman, Principal of Heriot-Watt University, said: "This is a tremendous opportunity to support the spread of professional best-practice and performance excellence in sports clubs, which are vital springboards for future top Scottish sports men and women.

"We're always delighted when the University attracts top class sporting professionals, and this event clearly underpins our bid to host the National Performance Centre for Sport. The development of athletes who can compete successfully on the world stage will not be achieved by facilities alone and it is vital that the NPCSC is central to the development of world class support personnel and services required to support our athletes in the pursuit of excellence."

The 67th Edinburgh International Festival was brought to an official end last night with the Virgin Money Fireworks Concert gathering approximately 250,000 Edinburgh residents and visitors across the city to share in the annual spectacular performed live by The Scottish Chamber Orchestra and Pyrovision.

Over **2,200 artists from 36 nations**, almost 800 of them from Scotland, have filled Edinburgh's stages over the last 24 days in 220 performances and events.

Overall, the Edinburgh International Festival has **sold over 80%** of all available seats for performances, with **nearly half (48%) sold out**.

Festival Director, Jonathan Mills said:- 'I would like to

thank all those audiences who have joined us over these three heady weeks who have helped to create such a fantastic atmosphere in theatres and concert halls, and around the City. Edinburgh International Festival 2013 has been enjoyable, exciting and thought provoking. Artists have joined us from around the world, bringing fresh perspectives on ideas and technologies familiar or strange, old and new.

‘Audiences have flocked to an epic Chinese version of Coriolanus and to intimate late night rare live performances of Stockhausen and Stroppa. We’ve been proud to present numerous world premieres including Leaving Planet Earth and the wonderful showcase of new choreographers in Dance Odysseys. The International Festival has once again brought a mix of large scale, high profile events and artists unfamiliar in the UK, with world premieres, commissions and partnerships which continue to reinforce the Festival’s uniqueness and provide Festival-goers with a magical summer experience. A special thanks must go to all the funders, sponsors and supporters who made this Festival possible.’

It is estimated that overall attendance at this year’s Festival will be **over 400,000** with Scottish ticket buyers joined by those travelling to Edinburgh from 66 nations. Approximately **158,500** tickets have been issued and the total box office income reached over **£2.43million**.

China’s Beijing People’s Art Theatre gave an epic, heavy metal laden performance of Coriolanus to over 4,000 people over two nights and attracted media interest from around the world including MTV, China Central Television (CCTV) and BBC China.

Incredible performances from Valery Gergiev, Daniil Trifonov, Michael Gambon and Barry McGovern, Patti Smith reading the poetry of Robert Louis Stevenson, Frankfurt Opera and Scottish Ballet's intimate yet vast undertaking in Dance Odysseys, as well as visual arts exhibitions based on the work of Leonardo da Vinci and Nam June Paik have all excited critics and audiences alike.

Young people signed up in their hundreds to access concerts and music events at the Festival for free. In the pilot year of this partnership with The City of Edinburgh Council over 670 young musicians became Young Musicians Passport holders. The most popular events among passport holders were City Noir, La Belle et la Bête and Chamber Orchestra of Europe.

In the virtual world the Festival was visited by people from 154 countries with 63% being new visitors to the website, eif.co.uk. Thousands of users interacted with the Festival's three new mobile and social media apps.

48,772 minutes of Festival footage were watched on the Festival's YouTube channel, on Facebook 4.9m brand impressions were seen by 2.3m users and 60,740 people actively engaged with the Festival.

The Festival's social media followers doubled last year's numbers and reached 54,905.

Over the **autumn** the Festival will release a series of audio and video podcasts online showcasing highlights of this year's

programme, and particularly the talks and conversations which explored the ideas and the artists that underpinned it. The Festival will also continue its year round work in Edinburgh's schools.

Concerts still to be broadcast on BBC Radio 3 include those of the Chamber Orchestra of Europe and the closing concert from the Usher Hall, Verdi's Requiem.

The Edinburgh International Festival in 2014 will run from 8 to 31 August.

Currie proved to be the only Edinburgh side in the upper divisions to lose in the second week of the league season, going down 42-28 to Stirling County at Malleny Park. However, both of the other local sides in the Premiership won by a

single point. Edinburgh Accies took the laurels 18-17 away at Aberdeen and Heriots beat Gala 28-27 at home. This puts Edinburgh Accies one point clear of Gala at the top of the table with Heriots and Currie trailing in 8th and 10th places respectively. If it were football, the pundits would have the relegation battle up for discussion, but after only the 2nd week of the rugby season, how can there be anything to discuss?

Next week Currie will be making the long trip to Ayr for their match, while Heriots travel up the M9 to Stirling and Accies welcome Hawick to Raeburn Place.

In the National League, there was only ever going to be an Edinburgh win at Inverleith. And so it proved, funnily enough, as Boroughmuir beat Stewarts-Melville 18-13, outscoring the home side three tries to one on the way. Watsonians put in another high scoring performance for the second week in row, this time away from home, but against another Borders club as they put Selkirk away 51-23. 'Sonians now head the National League table, one point clear of Dundee. Boroughmuir and Stew-Mel are fairing better than their Premiership counterparts, lying in 3rd and 5th places respectively.

The 3rd week of the season has Boroughmuir playing at home against Dundee, while Watsonians play yet another Borders team, as they take on Biggar at Myreside and Stew-Mel play at home for the second week in a row against Peebles.

The big boys get their RaboDirect PRO12 league season underway on Saturday as Edinburgh open their account against Munster at Thomond Park in Limerick. It has also been announced that RaboDirect would not be renewing their sponsorship of the 'Celtic League' after this season, having "achieved their key business objectives" over the past three seasons. Hopefully, the hunt is on for a replacement title sponsor to fill the gap. You would imagine it's in hand....

Rugby Union

Edinburgh Rugby recorded their first win under new head coach Alan Solomons on Friday, as they beat Newcastle Falcons 15-5 in their final warm up game before this season's RaboDirect PRO12 campaign gets underway next week.

The Gunners produced a solid, composed performance and despite failing to score a try, a flawless kicking display was enough to secure a comfortable victory in the end.

Greig Laidlaw scored the only points of the first half, kicking 3 penalties to put Edinburgh ahead 9-0 at the break, but Newcastle came out strongly in the second half and scored the only try of the game through ex-Scotland and Edinburgh fly-half, Phil Godman.

The comeback however, was shortlived, and Edinburgh soon regained control of proceedings with Scotland International, David Denton providing inspiration in defense and attack.

Piers Francis who had taken over the kicking duties from Laidlaw then seized the opportunity to close out the game with two penalties late on.

Speaking after the game, head coach Solomons said, "It was important for the guys to put the effort in tonight to start building confidence.

"I believe that they did that with a lot of hard work and so I am very pleased with that"

Man of the match, Denton added, "There's real reason for optimism. We want to be physical and I think we showed that tonight.

"We're building a game plan and, at the moment, we're at the bare bones of that. Simple game plans are often the best way

to go and hopefully when the season starts we'll begin to fire."

Off the field for Edinburgh Rugby, it's another week, another new signing.

The capital club followed last week's recruitment of Wicus Blaauw with the arrival of another front row forward, James Hilterbrand from Super Rugby side Western Force.

24-year-old Hilterbrand who has senior experience across hooker and both prop positions, joins the club just months after starting against the British & Irish Lions in June.

When asked about the latest recruit, Edinburgh Rugby head coach Alan Solomons, said "James's versatility will be very useful for us, especially when you consider the attritional nature of the front-row and immense physicality they must endure over the course of the season.

"We now have more depth and better competition for places in our front-row, with our young Scottish props learning from experienced campaigners"

Despite representing all of South Australia's age-grade sides as well as the national under-18 team, Hilterbrand is thus far uncapped at senior international level and due to his extensive Scottish roots, could well be seen donning the Saltire in years to come.

Not only was his grandmother, Doris from Aberdeen, but Hilterbrand's grandfather, William Bain hailed from Falkirk and in fact played football for Aberdeen FC either side of the Second World War.

After the move was announced, Hilterbrand said. "I'm really excited about joining Edinburgh Rugby.

"I hope to bring a different rugby perspective because of my different pathway into professional rugby. I'll definitely

bring a lot of energy and heaps of passion.”

He added, “Unfortunately my grandparents have passed away now, but I know they’d both be very proud to see one of the grandsons living in Scotland and playing for one of the top club sides.”

Rugby – Stewarts-Melville v Boroughmuir



A blustery Inverleith welcomed Boroughmuir to play Stewarts-Melville in the second round of the RBS National League. With both teams recording substantial wins the previous week, this match might have provided an indicator of their early season form.

Boroughmuir, having dropped down from the Premier Division – and keen to go straight back up – were the probable favourites to take the win. However, Stew-Mel had made some shrewd additions to their line-up during the close season, so were equally confident of their chances. Confidence that, in the first ten minutes of the match, seemed to be a bit misplaced as they weathered a storm of attacking play from the visitors. Storm duly weathered, once they got their hands on the ball, they looked the much stronger team. After some fine penetrating play, they were awarded a close in penalty by referee Mhairi Hay. Kicker, Nick McCashin needed a bit of assistance to prevent the ball blowing off the tee, but over the it went and the first points were on the board for the home side. Playing with the wind, Stew-Mel went on to dominate the next ten or so minutes of play, using their backs to break through the Boroughmuir line and only a fair bit of desperate tackling saw them held out. They succeeded in getting over the line, but the ref deemed the ball ‘held-up’ and awarded a scrum five metres out to Stew-Mel. The new scrum laws saw the ball out the back quickly and across the pitch to winger, Alan Whittington – no relation – who saw off the ‘Muir full-back to score the opening try. McCashin put the ball through the posts for the conversion and Stewarts-Melville were 10-0 ahead, with Boroughmuir looking decidedly on the back foot. 

A penalty awarded to Boroughmuir was missed into the strong breeze, but they were in the Stew-Mel half. The play came straight back from the restart, and it was the visitors turn to do a bit of hammering at the try line. Loose ball from a ruck was pounced on by Boroughmuir’s Sam Johnson just on the line, but Hampton was there for the defence and both players

had hands on the grounded ball. Referee Hay gave the benefit of the doubt to the visitors and awarded them put-in at the scrum. A mighty heave by the 'Muir pack left the ball free for Johnson to gather up and dive over in the corner, just avoiding the flailing Whittington in the process to score the try. With the wind still making the kicking difficult the score remained at 13-5. Boroughmuir chose to run, rather than kick, a late penalty award but the play fizzled out and the whistle brought the half to a close, still 13-5 in favour of Stew-Mel.

The second half started well for the home side, putting the 'Muir line under a sustained bit of pressure, but once they appeared to run out of steam, Boroughmuir went on some up field forays of their own. After a few failed attempts, mainly due to their own mistakes, they finally crossed the line. However, the referee decided that the ball carrier had been 'shepherded' through the gap and she took play back for a 'Muir penalty, which Dave Reekie popped over the bring the score line to 13-8.

Stewarts-Melville then spent the next five minutes being stopped short of the visitors line as the match was played deep in the Boroughmuir 22. A huge overlap on the left came to nought as the ball was dropped, but a penalty had been awarded on the other side of the pitch. It didn't end as 'required' as an infringement at the resultant line out was viewed as sufficiently serious by the officials to get Stew-Mel's No. 9, Ross Sampson, sent to the bin for ten minutes. He was followed off the pitch a few minutes later by 'Muir's Alex Cox for another card-able offence, but, this time, in Stew-Mel's half. 14 aside and all to play for – as they say.

Stewarts-Melville lost another player to the sin-bin as captain McCashin was 'parked' for ten minutes and almost immediately from the restart, Boroughmuir's Malcolm Clapperton crashed through for a try, followed in a few minutes later by No. 15 Ed Farquharson from a long run up the touch line,

receiving the ball from a pass which which took advantage of the extra man to outflank the defence. Both kicks were missed so the score, which was to prove the final score, was 18-13 to Boroughmuir.

So, a close match played under trying conditions – for the kickers, anyway – bodes well for the rest of the season. Some visiting supporters reckoned that Stewarts-Melville possibly had the better of the play, but the final points tally is the measure that counts and that belonged to Boroughmuir. They will have to stop dropping the ball when in scoring positions, though.

Inverness Caledonian Thistle 2 Heart of Midlothian 0

SPFL Saturday 31 August 2013 – Caledonian Stadium

Much has been made of the youthful nature of Hearts squad this season but the factor that may prove crucial to the Maroons chances of staying in the SPFL this season isn't the age of the players but size and depth of the squad.

After their heroics last week against Aberdeen, Hearts manager Gary Locke made three changes from the team that beat the Dons against the odds. Two were enforced – the suspended Kevin McHattie and Danny Wilson who were replaced by last week's match winner Jordan McGhee and Callum Tapping – while a tactical change saw Billy King drop to the bench to allow David Smith to start the game.

Hearts began the game in the Highlands brightly and Jamie Walker had their first chance in the opening minutes but his effort was inches wide. After nine minutes, the home side took the lead when Doran's cross was volleyed home by McKay and the Hearts youngsters, having taken the game their table-topping opponents in the early stages , must have felt aggrieved at this turn of events.

Great play by Calum Paterson after 25 minutes set up Walker again but once more his effort on goal went wide. The forward, having scored against Partick Thistle and Aberdeen in successive games, seemed to be out of luck this time around, a feeling the entire Hearts team felt just after half an hour

when Caley Thistle went two goals ahead. After Doran and then Foran – try saying that after a couple of pints – saw their efforts on goal thwarted, the ball broke to McKay who scored from six yard out to double his goals and his team's lead for the afternoon. It seemed Lady Fortune had smiled on the Highlanders before turning her back on the men – or should I say boys – from Scotland's capital city when the unfortunate Walker then saw his effort on goal bounce off a post.

Hearts could consider themselves rather unfortunate to be two goals down at the interval although there was no doubt the home side deserved to be in front. However, it was a different story after the break.

The second half was dominated by the home team who missed several chances to extend their lead. Hearts looked a tired team, their extra time efforts in Kirkcaldy on Tuesday night perhaps taking their toll. Locke replaced Smith with King but still it was one-way traffic towards the Hearts goal with Maroons keeper Jamie Macdonald almost single-handedly keeping Thistle at bay. There was nothing the Hearts custodian could do ten minutes from time, however, when his defensive colleague Jamie Hamill was sent off by referee John Beaton for deliberate hand ball. It seemed a harsh decision as was the subsequent penalty kick awarded to Caley Thistle. Some justice was done when Macdonald saved McKay's penalty kick.

The game ended at 2-0 for Caley Thistle and there was no doubt the league leaders fully deserved their win. Their manager, the ebullient Terry Butcher, has done a fine job and his team has self-belief aplenty. His opposite number, Gary Locke, gave a refreshingly honest assessment after the game when he said Caley Thistle were the stronger team and deserved their win. For Hearts, the only consolation was that 11th placed St. Mirren also lost and so the gap between the pair remains at nine points. Their forthcoming clash at Tynecastle on 5 October looks to be taking on an increasingly crucial significance.

Hibs 0-0 Ross County – Stalemate at Easter Road



Hibs poor run of results against Ross County continued today at Easter Road as the clubs fought out a goalless draw. Amazingly the Easter Road side have yet to record a competitive victory over the County, losing all three league games last term, adding to the cup defeat in 2010 in Dingwall after a home draw.

Whilst Hibs dominated possession today, in the end they were fortunate to keep a point as Ross County missed several good chances.

Manager Pat Fenlon kept faith with the same starting XI that won last weekend at Kilmarnock which meant new signing Paul Heffernan had to be content with a place on the substitutes' bench.

French winger Abdellah Zoubir watched the game from the West Stand, alongside injured team-mates Paul Cairney and Tim Clancy.

A minute's applause took place ahead of the game in memory of former striker Gerry Barker whose goal scoring performances lit up the stadium 50 years ago.

The Staggies should have taken the lead in the 11th minute when Luckasse's shot struck Ben Williams's legs before Kovacevic's shot from the edge of the box crashed off the post.

Eight minutes later Luckassen, picked out the run of Rocco Quinn who somehow managed to miss the target from point-blank range to the relief of the Hibs fans in the crowd.

Graham Carey then forced a save from Williams before Hibs started to dominate possession without troubling Brown.

With half time approaching, a powerful drive from Liam Craig was deflected wide by Brian McLean then a Ryan McGivern cross was met by James Collins who glanced a superb header off the base of Mark Brown's post.

In the second half Ben Gordon was booked for a rash tackle on Danny Handling just outside the box, and Brown did well to hold Liam Craig's powerful free kick,

On 65 minutes Handling's cut-back found Collins who volleyed over eight yards, then a few minutes later Carey should have

opened the scoring after evading a number of tackles inside the box, but the Irishman shot wide with the goal gaping when it looked easier to score.

Pat Fenlon made three substitutions, starting with Ross Caldwell replacing Rowan Vine, then Danny Handling and James Collins, made way for new signing Paul Heffernan and Sammy Stanton as Hibs presses for the winner.

In the end however, the highlanders were happy to settle for a point, although the home fans made their feelings known at the final whistle.

After the final whistle, Pat Fenlon said: "We've got to be more positive and enjoy playing here. The game didn't really get going. There was no real tempo to the game, lots of stops for fouls and free kicks. I suppose it's up to us to do that but they made it difficult for us.

"We probably only had one good chance when James hit the post. Some of the build-up play was good but when we get into the top end of the pitch we've got to be more positive and a little quicker with our movement and passing.

"Paul Heffernan will give us something different His link-up play is decent. You saw that in the small time he was on. He put some decent balls in and got it wide. He'll be a good addition; he has a good record of goal-scoring in this league."

Former Hibs assistant manager Derek Adam who is now in charge of Ross County said: "We had better opportunities and should have won the match. Over the 90 minutes we were the better side and no-one could argue with that. Overall it was a good performance going into the international break."

James Collins accepted that he had found goals hard to come by since his move to Easter Road from Swindon, but insists that he will continue to work hard; "At the moment it's not going

for me or the lads in front of goals, but we need to keep plugging away next week back in training ahead of the St Johnstone game. I try not to beat myself up but I would be lying if I said I didn't think about it."

Brunstane Burn Path upgraded

An upgrade to an overgrown path in the east of Edinburgh, as part of the work on the new John Muir Way, is making a real difference for local residents.

A major project has upgraded the Brunstane Burn path in eastern Edinburgh and the work has just been completed in preparation for the official opening of Scotland's newest long distance route on John Muir's birthday on 21st April 2014.

The John Muir Way will link Muir's birthplace in Dunbar to Helensburgh via Scotland's first National Park – Loch Lomond and the Trossachs. The Brunstane Burn Path will be an important section of the route, running alongside a quiet burn, and linking Holyrood Park and Musselburgh. It also

improves the path connecting to Newhailes – an important National Trust for Scotland property.

Local people are the first to benefit from the substantial improvements to the mile-long stretch, which was jointly funded by Scottish Natural Heritage and Edinburgh City Council's East Neighbourhood Environment team.

Rob Garner, Policy and Advice Officer with Scottish Natural Heritage, explained the need for the work.

He said: "The path had become very overgrown and muddy and, over time, had become more difficult to pass, with walkers and cyclists opting to use alternative routes.

"These improvements are welcome for both for local residents and visitors, providing a more pleasant, all-weather path for all users. The path is now easily used not only by walkers and cyclists, but also, by people in wheelchairs or pushing buggies.

"It also gives room for people to pass easily, which is important as we expect that the number of people using the path will continue to grow when the full route opens in 2014."

Councillor Lesley Hinds, Transport and Environment Convener, City of Edinburgh Council said: "Brunstane Burn is a local beauty spot in the east of the city and is also popular with cyclists and walkers who will be following the John Muir Way, so ensuring that the path is safe and accessible is very important.

"The Council's Active Travel Action Plan seeks to encourage

more residents to walk and cycle, more safely and more often. Projects like this one help to do just that.”

The John Muir Way has been designed to celebrate John Muir’s life. The 134 mile (215km) trail will allow walkers, cyclists (and horse riders on many sections) to enjoy some of the most beautiful coastal scenery, sweeping landscapes, wildlife sites and historic visitor attractions across Scotland’s heartland.

The concept of the John Muir Way was developed by the Central Scotland Green Network and Keith Geddes, Chair of the CSGN Partnership Board, welcomed the progress on the route.

He said: “It is great to see our vision for the John Muir Way becoming a reality and hopefully this will give a taste of what people can enjoy when the full route opens in April 2014.”

A recruitment drive to attract more foster carers from black and minority ethnic (BME) backgrounds is taking place in Edinburgh this weekend.

There are very few BME carers in the capital and the aim is to try and increase numbers so that children from different cultural, religious and ethnic groups can live with foster carers who share similar backgrounds.

Matching children with carers from the same background isn't always essential but, in some cases, it can help a child develop a positive sense of identity and culture.

Information events will take place at McDonald Road Library on Thursday 29th August (10am to 1pm) and at the [Edinburgh MELA](#) today from 12pm to 8pm and tomorrow Sunday 1st September (12pm to 5pm).

Councillor Paul Godzik, Children & Families Convener, said: "We always need people from a variety of backgrounds and different walks of life to become foster carers. It's really important that this crucial service reflects the cultural make-up of our city and that children who need care get the care that best suits them.

"Our foster care team work extremely hard to encourage potential carers and our campaign highlights the impact that their support can have on a child's life. It's a very important role and a foster family can help towards a happy future.

"We can help provide the support and advice needed to make this decision, so please, if you are thinking of fostering get

in touch or come along to one of the events this week to learn more about it.”

The BME recruitment campaign is part of a wider ongoing campaign to promote foster care in Edinburgh called [Foster Me Foster Us](#). There continues to be a severe shortage of foster carers in Edinburgh and more carers are needed to provide children with safe and caring homes while they are unable to live with their own families.

Carers get paid as self-employed people by the Council and receive a fee, allowances, full training and ongoing support. Depending on the type of caring work taken on, the rewards can be around the level of a well paid full-time job. Carers also get funds to provide pocket money and to buy presents for special occasions.

Foster carers must be over 21 years old. They can be single, married or part of a long-term relationship. They can be a tenant or homeowner. Some have children of their own and some don't. Carers don't need to be well-off or in work.

Hibs sign Paul Heffernan on two year deal



Hibs have confirmed that Dublin born striker Paul Heffernan has joined the club from Kilmarnock after agreeing a contract until the end of the 2014/15 season.

The 31-year-old is vastly experienced from spells with Notts County, Bristol City, Doncaster Rovers and Sheffield Wednesday – scoring over 100 goals in both Scotland and England. He will join former Rugby Park team-mates Michael Nelson and Tim Clancy at the club, as well as former assistant manager Jimmy Nicholl.

Heffernan joined Kilmarnock during the summer of 2011 from Sheffield Wednesday and actually opened his account with a double against Hibs. In his first season with Kilmarnock, he scored an impressive 15 times in 36 appearances and ended up joint top goal-scorer with former Hibs favourite Dean Shiels. He also helped the club to a famous League Cup triumph, and was in the team that beat Celtic 1-0 in the final.

Last season, he scored 12 in 30 appearances, including a hat-

trick against Hearts at Tynecastle; however he missed much of the campaign with a shoulder injury.

Heffernan told Hibernian TV: "I'm excited about starting the next chapter of my career at Hibernian; hopefully my time with the club will be successful. I spoke to both Michael (Nelson) and Tim (Clancy) about coming here and they both encouraged me to join.

"It's a good club with big support – I saw that at the Cup tie at Rugby Park last season – and I'm looking forward to playing for Hibs."

"It's strange – I played against Hibs last weekend and this Saturday I could be playing for the club, but that's football – everything can change very quickly and now I'm excited about playing for Hibernian."

Manager Pat Fenlon believes his latest recruit Heffernan – his 10th signing of the summer transfer window – will add further experience to the forward line.

Fenlon said: "We're delighted to be able to get Paul – the situation concerning his arrival developed very late on. He is a good, experienced player and his goal-scoring record is very good. He knows the league inside out and he's different to what we have.

"Paul comes in with a good pedigree and hopefully he will bring both goals and experience to the team."

Hibs agree loan deal with

French winger Abdellah Zoubir



Hibs have announced that 21 year old French winger Abdellah Zoubir has joined the club on loan from FC Istres for the 2013/14 season following a successful trial this week.

Zoubir has Ligue 2 experience in France and manager Pat Fenlon has been impressed with the player since his arrival in Edinburgh.

All the terms have been agreed and documents signed, but Zoubir will only become a registered player for the club once the documents have been accepted by the authorities and an International Transfer Certificate has been issued by the French Football Federation.

As with all cross border transfers, that could take some time, and the club will confirm via the official website and official Twitter when the transfer has been formally completed.

Meanwhile Pat Fenlon has told the players that it is imperative that the team builds on last weekend's win at Kilarnock with an equally positive result at home.

Speaking to Hibernian TV, Fenlon said: "I think it is important that we build on it. I said to the players last week that when you go away from home and pick up a point or you pick up three points the next game at home is vitally important. If you don't then it undoes all the work from the previous week when you have had to work so hard away from home to get something out the game.

"We had to do that last week, we were a goal down and had to come back and win the game in the second half. If we can put another victory on top of that and get back-to-back victories

away from home and at home then it's a good week's work for us.

"We've got to make sure that we start the game positively here; the one thing I've said after the few games we've played so far that we've got to start the games better. We've got to start the games on the front foot and try to take the game to the opposition.

"Ross County had a great win last week – we watched a DVD of their game against St Mirren. Obviously they will be disappointed with their Cup exit during the week, but that can spur them on as well because they will be hurting a little bit from that.

"I think in Ross County's case they have brought a lot of players in as well, so that does take time for them to gel into a system. They've got a good squad of players and they're a good team and have proven that last season as well. So we know that we are going to have to play really well to get something out of the game."

Hibs have been drawn to face League One side Stranraer, who coincidentally knocked out County, in the third round of the Scottish League Cup (24 September, kick off 7.45pm) and the manager admits he is pleased with the draw.

He added: "We're delighted we're at home, I think that is the key in any cup competition – the first thing you want to be is at home, but it is a tough draw for us because obviously they've had a fantastic result to get into this round and they come here under no pressure.

"We've got to go and make sure that we get on a bit of a cup run which would be great. We've had a good Scottish Cup run over the past two seasons, but unfortunately in the League Cup last year there was a poor performance at Queen of the South, so it would be nice to get on a bit of a roll in the League Cup competition and progress through the rounds."
