Even if you decide to only make changes to one area, or room, always take the rest of the house into consideration, to ensure your décor is consistent.



Fraser Mullen insists that fans' banter won't bother him

Hibs new boy Fraser Mullen believes that his Glasgow background made it easier to cross the great divide of Edinburgh football and claims that he expects some 'banter' should me make the Hibs' team for the first derby of the season at Tynecastle.

The teenage full back who started his Hibs career with a

sensational 30 yard free kick against Gibraltar insists that he was delighted to move to Easter Road and vows that he won't be bothered with by any taunts from the supporters of the side who released him at the termination of his contract.

Speaking at the weekly press conference, Mullen said: "There was a bit of a wait because when I was told, I was still injured. I didn't know what to think at the time and then a few weeks later my agent told me about Hibs.

"At first I never really expected any of it and then it became apparent that I could sign for them and I was delighted I would get the chance to come to a club like this. It was a brilliant chance for me so I couldn't say no to it".

"I was shocked at the time, but when I first heard I was taken aback because I would never have expected that. I couldn't turn the chance down. I didn't have a clue they would come in for me. I had a think about the offers I had and Hibs were the best one.

"I'm not from Edinburgh, so I'm not a Hibs or a Hearts supporter. That made things a bit easier for me. I just thought about it as a football player and a job. It was the best offer I had so I signed."

Mullen's last game for Hearts was at Easter Road where he suffered a serious injury following a tackle on Matt Done, and he received little sympathy from the Hibs fans in the East Stand and he limped his way around the pitch.

"I got a bit of abuse that day walking around the park," he recalled. "That's football. You've got to expect that.

If I do get the chance to play (at Tynecastle) I'll try to look on it as just another game and not let it get to me. I'm sure I'll be a fine. As a full-back you're right up against the fans, especially at Tynecastle where the fans are close to the pitch.

"You expect a wee bit of banter about crossing the city. I'm not really too bothered about it.

"The Hearts boys are having a wee bit of banter but they're all wishing me the best of luck. They're a good bunch of boys and I've known them since I was young."

Hibs travel to Kirkcaldy tonight to take on Raith Rovers in a friendly as they prepare for next week's European trip to Malmo in Sweden.

Anyone for tennis in Edinburgh?



The gift of Andy Murray keeps on giving as Edinburgh targeted as area of growth

sportscotland's announcement earlier this week that they will
invest £5.8 million in tennis in Scotland over the next four
years might be viewed as a knee jerk reaction to Andy Murray's
weekend success. But what will it mean for Edinburgh?

The Edinburgh Reporter spoke to former professional tennis umpire, John Frame, who believes that Edinburgh can reap the benefits of Andy Murray's historic Wimbledon success in a very real way.

Speaking at the ITF AEGON Junior International Edinburgh,

taking place at Craiglockhart Tennis Centre this week, Frame, like millions across the nation, was still rejoicing in Murray's ascension to the throne at SW19 and couldn't hide his excitement about its potential impact upon the sport.

Even before Sunday's heroics, since bursting onto the scene of the professional game as an 18-year-old, Murray's rise to the top has provided invaluable inspiration for tennis in Scotland.

Frame claimed: "Murray's influence has been vitally important over the last six or seven year. In terms of the number of kids playing, and the percentage of Scots doing well it has been very, very good.

"However, what has happened this weekend is potentially something completely different in the sense that we are talking about a completely different dimension — winning Wimbledon.

"The test for <u>Tennis Scotland</u> will be how to harness that enthusiasm and desire of kids all over the country to play tennis and then give them the facilities and the chance to play.

"Like any sport, the more you've got in your base, the more chance you've got of bringing stars through"

Membership of Tennis Scotland has increased by almost 50% in the last five years, but the organisation will be hoping for an even greater influx of new players in the coming four years following the heavy investment, and the strongest case yet of 'Murray mania'.

Asked about the local Edinburgh contingent playing in the AEGON Junior International event where he is tournament director, Frame conceded:- "We don't have many Edinburgh people at all playing in these tournaments, which is a bit of a worry.

"It is very interesting that most of the Scots who are playing are from Stirling and the Dunblane area, which I don't think is a coincidence. Obviously Glasgow, which has probably got much better facilities and a lot more indoor courts than we have here is important in that.

"Edinburgh is an area where I think there is still a lot more growth to be done and I know it has been targeted by the LTA as a particular area for growth in the next two or three years, so hopefully we'll get a few more tournaments and a few more kids playing."

Last summer he was repeatedly threatened with arrest for his Fake Olympic Torch tour. He was also awarded the London 2012 Inspire Mark; however this was almost definitely done erroneously.

In 2013 Popaganda completed a 20-date tour of the UK, and will tour internationally in 2014. He has performed in 22 countries, and this spring made new work in Bangkok, Yokohama, Reykjavik and Brussels. Richard once sold Kylie Minogue a pair of cowboy boots.

Richard has made TV shows for the BBC and Channel 4, including 2006's notorious Fame Asylum. His recent zero-budget remake of Cloud Atlas at Buzzcut Festival 2013 in Glasgow received more stars in The Scotsman than the film on which it was based. Foundation of Hearts Submit Bid to Administrators

The Foundation of Hearts fans' group yesterday formally submitted a takeover bid to the club's administrator BDO.

Independent Chair Ian Murray said: "The bid is strong, credible and low risk. It provides a real opportunity for financial stability and a platform to grow the club we love again.

"At this point, we must respectfully be a little quieter than we have been to allow the Hearts administrators BDO to not only reflect on our bid but any other bids that come in from anyone else.

"Today may be the start of the next chapter in the remarkable history of Heart of Midlothian Football Club, but, whatever happens, this club's supporters will ensure it is a future as special as its past.

"Should this bid be accepted by BDO, it will allow the Foundation of Hearts to secure majority ownership over the club in a controlled fashion with support of the necessary capital to make today's bid strong and credible."



Around 5000 supporters have set up direct debits of between £10 and £500 to fund the takeover.

The Gorgie club entered administration last month with reported debts of £25m and as a consequence they will start

next season with a 15-point deduction. In addition they are unable to strengthen an already weekend squad due to a player registration ban.

A rival bid from HMFC Limited, backed by American group Club 9 Sports, is anticipated although the Scottish-registered company have so far not been in touch with BDO. This group have indicated that a move from Tynecastle to a purpose built stadium may be necessary.

Hibs to face Malmo in Europa League Qualifying Round

Hibs will travel to Sweden next week to face Malmo after they beat Drogheda United 2-0 last night in the second leg of the first qualifying round of the Europa League.

The League of Ireland team put up a brave performance and as the game went into time added on, they were still in contention and one goal would have sent them through, but it was not to be.

Malmo's Emil Forsberg broke the deadlock just on the stroke of half-time, and when the fourth official indicated five minutes of injury time to be played it looked like the Drogs would have a small life-line, but in the 92nd minute Simon Kroon weaved his way through the visitors' defence and powered his shot past Sava to secure the win.

Pat Fenlon was amongst the spectators, and the Hibs' manager will now prepare or the first leg which will be played in

Malmo next Thursday.

The return leg will be played at Easter Road on Thursday 25 July, and an announcement on tickets will be made on the club website this morning.

Hibs have played Malmo before in the Inter Cities Fairs Cup and emerged triumphant. In September 1970, a Joe McBride hattrick along with a double from Arthur Duncan and one from Jim Blair ensured that Hibs travelled to Sweden with a 6-0 lead.

The return leg was closer, but goals from Willie McEwan, his first for the club, Bobby Duncan and a certain Patrick Gordon Stanton gave Hibs a 3-2 win to claim the tie 9-3 on aggregate.

On the next round, Hibs beat Portuguese side Vitoria Guimaraes 3-2 on aggregate after a 2-0 win at Easter Road in the next round; however the campaign ended with a 3-0 aggregate defeat to Bill Shankly's Liverpool.

Men Jailed Following Drugs Operation, West Lothian

×

A man who attempted to transport large quantities of drugs into West Lothian and another male who stored drugs in his home in Bathgate have both been jailed.

Colin Flannigan and Graeme Stear (Pictured above) have been sentenced to three years and three years four months respectively after being arrested in July and September last year.

Flannigan was stopped on the on the northbound carriageway of the M74, near Glasgow, and found with nearly 100 kilos of cannabis in his car. The drugs were bound for communities across West Lothian. A further search of the 45-year-old's home address in Bathgate resulted in a kilogramme of cocaine being recovered from under his bed.

In addition, Stear's house in Bathgate was searched on 15th September and the officers seized 93 kilos of cannabis and 10 kilos of amphetamine. The value of the drugs recovered was approximately £500,000.

The sentencing of 37-year-old Stear comes after Colin Flannigan was jailed earlier this month.

Recently, John Gorrian, 49, and Steven Gibb, 20, were also given prison sentences at the High Court in Edinburgh for similar offences.

Gorrian was sentenced to five years in prison, while Gibb was given four years after both were stopped on the M8 at Harthill and found to be in possession of Class B and D drugs.

In total, officers seized around 200 kilos of cannabis and 10 kilos of amphetamine worth £750,000 during the stop, which took place on 4th May 2012.

The men were targeted as part of an intelligence-led operation to keep West Lothian communities safe and bring those responsible for drug supply within the area to justice.

Detective Superintendent Gordon said: "This operation was designed to target those who were blighting our communities with their actions.

"The arrests of these men and their subsequent sentencing, has shown that Police Scotland and the Crown Office and Procurator Fiscal Service will not tolerate a minority of people bringing misery to the lives of others and that through partnership working, that minority will be brought to justice.

"We are committed to keeping people safe and will look to remove those involved in criminal activity from our

communities.

"Operations like this can only be successful through the continued support of the public and anyone with information relating to on-going criminal activity is asked to contact police immediately, or report the matter anonymously via the charity Crimestoppers."
