Experimental theatre about real-life stories and universal impulses, good and bad, Exposed is about the many impulses that drive human behaviour. Through an exciting mix of verbatim, physical theatre, projection, comedy and autobiography, it looks at how we restrict these impulses according to internal or external factors.

From a man who wants to scream in restaurants to a woman who wants to shake her baby to death, we see just some of the many impulses that people experience every day.

Exposed was born out of the company's love of doing impulsive things, but it has been a long time in the making. Through a process involving workshopping, facilitating and durational improvisations, the company has woven real people's stories, thoughts and feelings into one of their trademark physical ensemble movement pieces. The final product promises to deliver maximum impact, through a sensitive performance that is precise, energetic and thought-provoking.

Impulse Collective is a professional theatre company made up of five performers from different parts of the UK: Scotland, Yorkshire, Leicester, Nuneaton and London. They come together out of a shared love of devised theatre, technology, clowning and physical theatre.

Ten per cent rise in ticket sales at Edinburgh's Film Festival

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The 67th edition of the Edinburgh International Film Festival enjoyed a healthy increase in admissions at the 2013 Festival. More than 44,000 tickets were issued across the 12 day event which is a ten per cent increase on last year's figure.

The Festival sold tickets for its multiple venues across the city, which included the EIFF's home at Filmhouse, Cineworld at Fountain Park, Festival Theatre Edinburgh, delegate centre venue, The Traverse, and new venues for 2013, The Dominion and

Odeon Wester Hailes.

Ken Hay, CEO Edinburgh International Film Festival, commented:- "We are delighted with how audiences have engaged with this year's Festival. As well as the increase in the number of admissions, there have been unprecedented levels of online interaction across multiple digital platforms. Our planning for the 68th EIFF in 2014 is well underway: Chris Fujiwara and his team have already started to construct another programme that will offer hidden gems, discoveries and films to challenge and dare our growing audience."

The Festival closed with the Scottish romantic comedy NOT ANOTHER HAPPY ENDING at Festival Theatre Edinburgh, having screened 146 features including 14 World premieres, 6 international premieres and 9 European premieres.

Lucien Castaing-Taylor and Véréna Paravel's LEVIATHAN won the coveted Michael Powell Award, and the Award for Best Film in the International Competition went to Mahdi Fleifel's A WORLD NOT OURS.

Edinburgh MP condemns

privatisation of Royal Mail

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Mark Lazarowicz strongly condemned the Government's decision announced today to privatise Royal Mail in the coming year. It will be one of the largest privatisations to take place and follows the Government's decision earlier this year to reprivatise the East Coast Main Line.

Mark said:-"The Government has nationalised Royal Mail's liabilities in the form of the pension fund in which there was a large shortfall and is now intent on privatising the profits.

"It argues that it is necessary to subject Royal Mail to commercial discipline and give it access to private sector capital but Royal Mail's overall operating profits more than doubled over the last year from £152m in 2011-12 to £403m in 2013-13. A privatised Royal Mail might continue to operate the universal service provision of delivering 6 days a week to anywhere in the UK for the same price but for how long if its commercial rivals don't have to? As with the East Coast Main Line, ideology seems to have won out over common sense — it will be private investors who benefit from its commercial success not the taxpayer or customers."

Mark continued:-"In the 1980s the then Conservative Government under Margaret Thatcher decided against privatisation of the Post Office (Royal Mail and the Post Office were at that time still part of the same public company)."

"The universal service provision is particularly important in Scotland as it has more remote areas than other parts of the UK and a report by Citizens Advice Scotland published in December found that people living in the Highlands and Islands

already faced higher charges from online retailers — on average an extra £15 in the case of those in the Highlands and nearly £19 for people in Island communities where retailers were prepared to deliver at all."

The SNP have also issued a statement which says that privatisation poses a huge threat to all customers in Scotland.

Commenting on Business Secretary Vince Cable's announcement that the government will sell Royal Mail through a flotation on the London Stock Exchange, SNP MP and spokesperson for postal services Mike Weir said:-"The UK government's decision to privatise the Royal Mail poses real danger to the postal service, and in particular, the universal service obligation which is of huge importance to Scotland. A privatised postal service in a competitive market will undoubtedly put pressure on government to reduce the terms of the USO, as its competitors "cherry pick" the profitable urban routes leading to a reduced service in rural and less affluent areas.

"77 per cent of Scots are totally opposed to the privatisation of Royal Mail- more than any other part of the UK. Vince Cable has spouted nonsense about independence being a threat to post offices yet Scotland could be losing their post offices due to a UK government they did not elect. Only with independence can Scotland be assured of a mail service that meets the needs of Scotland and our communities rather than the money men of London.

"It is a nonsense that a public flotation on the stock exchange will make any difference to the eventual outcome. In previous Tory privatisations they trumpeted the idea of mass shareholding but the truth is that many were soon sold, the numbers of people holding shares peaked in 1997 and has steadily declined since.

"Most of the privatised companies, such as the energy

companies, were soon taken over and most have now ended up as divisions of overseas companies. It is highly likely that Royal Mail will soon end up losing its independence and becoming part of one of the larger European mail companies, or worse still, fall into the hands of those seeking to asset strip the organisation.

"The only protection to the consumer is Ofcom, who have already lifted the price cap on most products, allowed competitors to establish delivery services on profitable routes and confirmed that they have no power to stop the introduction of different prices for different areas of the country."

Last month in response to suggestions that the No campaign would seek to use the future of post offices in their campaign, Willie Marshall, Secretary of Communications Union (CWU) Scotland, Number 2 Branch, said:

"Privatising Royal Mail will be the biggest threat to customers and employees all over Scotland but particularly in remote and rural areas if the universal service obligation is ditched. People know perfectly well that an independent Scottish government would protect those services in a way that Westminster simply won't."

14 year old charged with setting fire to police cars

A 14-year-old male has been charged with alleged wilful fire-raising after two police cars were set alight in Edinburgh. Both vehicles were completely destroyed as a result of the fires, which happened in Niddrie House Park on Monday evening (July 8th). The youth will now be reported to the Children's Reporter.

Police Scotland are committed to protecting the public, tackling anti-social behaviour and keeping people safe; as such local officers continue to provide high-visibility police patrols in the area to engage with the community and offer reassurance.

Police Scotland has worked closely with partner agencies,

including The R&A and East Lothian Council, in order to prepare for the many thousands of visitors set to visit Muirfield.

A transport management plan has been put in place in order to accommodate those travelling to the course, and police and partner agencies will be providing live traffic updates to those travelling to Muirfield via Twitter, #OpenTravel.

Superintendent Phil O'Kane, from Police Scotland, is in charge of the policing operation.

He said: "The Open is a major international sporting event that people come to enjoy, and we want to play a positive part in that experience. The focus of the policing operation is on keeping people safe, and we have worked closely with The R&A, East Lothian Council, and other partner agencies to prepare for the many thousands of visitors who will visit Muirfield over the course of the Championship.

"As part of our planning, we have in place a multi-agency transport management plan that aims to minimise disruption, allowing for the smooth passage of travel to and from the course.

"We will be working with partners to provide traffic and travel information to the public over the course of the Championship, and I would urge people to visit the Police Scotland website for further details on this, and the policing operation in general."

East Lothian Council's Economic Development and Tourism spokesman, Cllr John McMillan, said: "The county is delighted to host this major sporting event which will attract thousands of visitors to the area.

"The logistics of preparing and running such an event requires considerable organisation. The council is supporting Police Scotland and other partners to ensure an enjoyable and safe event which aims to balance the needs of visitors whilst minimising disruption to local residents."

Johnnie Cole-Hamilton, Executive Director — Championships at The R&A, said: "The Open Championship will draw thousands of visitors to East Lothian over the course of the week.

"We appreciate the support we are receiving from a number of bodies, including Police Scotland, and we will be working closely together with them to ensure that all aspects of the Championships run smoothly."

This is a show for adults about taking charge of your own destiny, picking your battles, fighting the global corporate machine and the legacies we pass down through our families; Bryony and Taylor are onstage together exploring their David v Goliath struggle against the pop-media cacophony. With David Curtis Ring's trademark costumes and sound scores by Tom Parkinson.

Bryony and Taylor were inspired by the increasing evidence of damage caused by the sexualisation of kids, the endless objectification of the female body in the media, large growths in youth narcissistic personality disorders, increasingly violent video games and the concerns of parents all over the world. This 2-year long project is made up of the Catherine Bennett fame experiment, a theatre show, a documentary and an education project. It does not seek to censor but to inspire debate and personal action amongst kids and adults.

This is Bryony's third Fringe show. Since debuting in 2010 with the Total Theatre Award-winning Sex Idiot and 2011's 7 Day Drunk, performance art princess Kimmings has taken her shows to venues all over the UK, Europe and the US. She is inspired by the taboos and anomalies of British culture, airing her own dirty laundry to oil conversations on seemingly difficult subjects through real-life social experiments embarked upon with genuine genius intrigue and wholehearted,

How an unlikely pair of underdogs became a beauty queen and championship show dog. Artist Victoria Melody is the reigning Mrs Brighton and an unlikely beauty queen. Her unruly basset hound, Major Tom, has become a championship show dog.

When Major Tom accidentally won an amateur dog show his unexpected success prompted Victoria to examine her own prize winning potential. She decided to put herself through the same scrutinising process by competing for the title of Mrs Galaxy UK — the 'married' version of Miss UK.

After winning her regional round, Victoria has spent the past year as 'Mrs Brighton' in a wide range of public appearances. She has used this opportunity to access the subculture of this exclusive, members-only, club and has quite literally metamorphosised herself into a beauty queen, unrecognisable to friends and family.

The show, in which Victoria and Major Tom appear together onstage, follows their journey through the obsessive and confusing realm of personal scrutiny using film and

photography to document their adventures.

Major Tom questions how even the most self-assured amongst us (even if they are a feminist) can become intoxicated with the allure of beautification, celebrity and competition. The initial artistic experiment blurs into Victoria's real life leading her husband to ask when they can go back to their old lives. But Victoria had never won anything before so she has become competitive and really wants to win Crufts and Mrs UK — and she thinks they are in with a chance.

Victoria's eccentric, ethnographic approach to making performances finds her immersing herself in other people's worlds. Victoria examines national characteristics, focusing on the extraordinary in the everyday.

To create her one-woman theatrical shows about England's pastimes, passions and tribes she immerses herself into communities and becomes a participant. Before becoming a championship dog handler and beauty queen she has been a pigeon racer and a northern soul dancer. Her show Northern Soul, directed by Ursula Martinez, toured extensively.

Major Tom has been selected for Escalator East To Edinburgh. Each year Escalator East to Edinburgh helps artists and arts organisations to raise their profile and perform to new audiences as part of the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. It was developed at BAC, Nightingale Theatre, The Showroom Chichester and MAKE, Ireland, is supported by Harlow Playhouse and produced by Farnham Maltings.

He was cursed, or so he thought. But like any good expert in miscommunication, Nikhil Tilwalli, took the word "cursed" to mean "gifted" and so he decided to embrace what he called his "talent". What he discovered (much to his confusion, like a Zen koan) is that actively trying to misunderstand what others said and responding in kind with statements that made no sense mysteriously caused people to find him more relatable.

In his Edinburgh Fringe debut show, stand-up comedian Nikhil Tilwalli uses winding narrative (including a reverent discussion of Dr. Dre, an irreverent discussion of the dating lives of Plato and Pythagoras, jokes that relate sex with mathematics and a section devoted to puns) to deconstruct his personal experience while exploring the philosophical foundations of jokes and communication.

Travel woes in the summer heat — Broadband rollout — Summerhall for children — Fringe reviewers — Gordon Macdonald MSP

Yesterday was not a good day to be a train passenger to or from Edinburgh Waverley. It was simply too hot for the rails.

One of our readers Lindsay told us that she got on the 5:00pm Glasgow to Edinburgh which arrived late at Waverley at 18.10 although the train to North Berwick was then delayed by about 20 minutes and she eventually arrived in North Berwick at 19.15. So two hours to get from Glasgow to North Berwick....

Another reader had tried to get a train from around 3.30 in the afternoon but eventually took a bus and yet one more got on a train from Edinburgh Waverley to Falkirk High which took 90 minutes rather than the usual 30.

The responsibility for the tracks lies with Network Rail. We asked them for a quote today but have had nothing yet. If they get back to us we shall let you know! However the temperature is a little lower today so perhaps things will run on time. If they don't perhaps you will let us know?

Classical review: John Luther Adams at the East Neuk

Festival (****)

It could have all gone so horribly wrong. Planning a large-scale outdoor performance of contemporary classical music by a little-known composer, in Fife, even at the height of summer, brings a burdensome barrage of risks. Will anyone turn up? What will they make of it? Most importantly — will the weather hold?

There were contingency plans in case of rain, of course, but thankfully the gloriously hot, sunny day meant they weren't needed. And in the event, the organisers needn't have worried about the audience either: a large and enthusiastic crowd from toddlers to senior citizens flocked to the event, creating a joyful atmosphere of excitement and expectation.

The music being performed, part of Fife's eclectic five-day East Neuk Festival, was the hour-long *Inuksuit* by Alaskan-based composer John Luther Adams, known for the environmental and ecological themes of his music that evokes nature in all its raw beauty. 'Music is not what I do. It's how I understand the world,' Adams has explained. 'When I was younger, I painted musical landscapes. But I'm no longer interested in painting pictures or telling stories in music. I no longer want my music to be about nature. I want my music to become nature.'

Music and nature mingled to brilliant and memorable effect in *Inuksuit*, as 30 percussionists nestled in among the shrubs and trees of the walled garden of the Cambo Estate, near Crail, or solemnly paced through its pathways, inviting listeners to follow them and hear Adams's evocative music from different perspectives.

East Neuk artistic director Svend Brown described the piece as 'a single breath', and indeed, it grew from the faintest whisperings of the performers' exhalations, amplified through

home-made cardboard cones, to a dense cacophony of clashing cymbals and gongs, hammered drums and wailing sirens, with the haunting cries of conch shells issuing enigmatic signals. The piece slowly subsided to a bewitching conclusion of birdsong fragments played on tinkling glockenspiels and crotales, while the sounds of the gorgeous Cambo garden — the burbling river, wind in the trees, and the voices of the birds themselves — gradually took over again.

In his programme note, Adams explained that the piece's Inuit title means 'to act in the capacity of the human', and his grand arc of music seemed to portray the impact of man's activity on the natural environment, as well as reminding us of the brevity of our presence in the context of the immensity of natural processes. As the piece gradually headed towards silence, listeners slowly gravitated towards the last remaining players, keen to hold on to the final vestiges of this enchanting experience.

Inuksuit was followed by more music by Adams, this time in the sweltering indoor space of Cambo's converted potato barn. Songbirdsongs again had grand ambitions — to convey the freedom and expressivity of birdsong using human musical instruments — but it was for the more modest forces of two piccolo players and three percussionists. As the piece's lyrical birdsong fragments whizzed back and forth between players, across the heads of the (again) wandering audience members, what was most impressive was the subtle yet dramatic playing of the Red Note Ensemble's musicians, and the highly evocative soundscapes they managed to conjure.

As the East Neuk Festival's brochure admits, although John Luther Adams is held in high regard in his native USA, his music is relatively little known this side of the Atlantic. In staging these two ambitious works, the festival made major moves towards remedying that — and provided what must surely count as two of this summer's most magical and memorable musical experiences.

Jody Kamali delivers an animated guide to backpacking through his eight years of solo travelling around the globe. Bringing to life his experiences through characterisation and acute observation, he explores why people go travelling; the types of travellers you would meet; hostel etiquette; the pains of bus, train and airplane journeys; the highs and lows and much, much more.

So passionate about the backpack way of life, he recently took his wife on a three-month backpacking Honeymoon to South East Asia, instead of the run-of-the-mill Sandals Resort.

A — Z of Backpacking is Jody's 7th Edinburgh Festival Fringe appearance alongside his physical comedy clown show 'Livewire'. Jody had previously performed 'Backpacker' in 2007 and 2008. The sell-out shows were character led shows, Inspired by the response of the shows, Jody has always been

always wanted to recreate the shows into a more honest, personal account of his travels, rather than told through 'characters'.

And her biggest tip to those who want to emulate the pros on show at Muirfield? "I think it's really important to learn the basics and get them right," she said, "get your grip, stance and posture correct and the rest will come with practice."

Heather Gaunt, Coach Education and Development Manager for The PGA in Scotland said: "Our coaches will deliver high quality and professional golf sessions to in excess of 3,000 participants.

"We hope the sessions will inspire them to increase the amount they play and their progression in the sport, as well as showcase the value and expertise of the PGA Professional." Other PGA Professionals from Scotland coaching at the Open include; Martin Goldie (Kames Country Club), Andy Marshall (Houston Golf Range), Allan Martin (Buchanan Castle Golf Club), John Murray (Deer Park Golf and Country Club), Scott Robertson (Broadlees Golf), Margot Smith (Glenisla Golf Club) and Andrew Wylie (Ardeer Golf Club).
