Edinburgh Festival Fringe — New Art Club: Feel About Your Body

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New Art Club: Feel About Your Body, Assembly George Square, 31 July to 25 August (except 13 and 20), £14/12 (£13/11 concessions)

The boys are back in town! New Art Club (aka Tom Roden and Pete Shenton) return to Edinburgh after a two-year gap and this time they're serious. Well, not exactly serious but they will be tackling a serious subject with their satisfying mix of puerile, emotional and intellectual chatter ... along with some moving about.

Feel About Your Body strips down to the basics, laying bare how we all feel about the one thing that's with us all the way from the cradle to the grave. Worshipped, revered, adorned, abused, laughed at, pampered, pierced, poked and occasionally rubbed lovingly with oil, the human body is truly an object of wonder. Of course, the show's title has a double meaning — it's sexy AND intellectual and very very silly.

During the course of this pulsating, visceral and flesh-filled hour, a man will talk to his bottom, bits will bounce and bellies will be bared. There will also be some invaluable advice on what not to do during a heart attack — Pete should know, he had one in his early thirties when his partner was eight months pregnant. All this comes with a warning — in tests eight out of ten audience members were left feeling "a little bit dirty". There will be some brief nudity (long enough to see 'the works'), some brief dancing (silly and emotional) and some puerile songs (there's a good one about a shed).

Edinburgh Festival Fringe — The Seer

The Seer is the first play created by a brand-new, all-star, international group of artists calling themselves Penn Dixie Productions. This devised comic-melodrama about the infamous life and artistic suicide of Arthur Rimbaud will be playing at Underbelly, Cowgate (Belly Button) at 22:30 from August 1-25th.

Though Penn Dixie's ensemble were born in disparate nations (Brazil, Argentina, France, UK, Sweden, Norway, and the USA), these collaborators were destined to grow up and meet at the London International School of Performing Arts (LISPA) in 2008, where they were commanded to begin devising and got the hell down to it.

Two years later, led by Philadelphia-based writer-director Anisa George, they emerged with their first full-length work — The Seer. "We were attracted to work with Rimbaud's story, because of his famous renunciation of art." Considered by many to be the founder of modern European poetry, Arthur Rimbaud wrote all of his poems before the age of twenty, then quit writing and ran away to Yemen to make his fortune as a coffee trader. George discovered Rimbaud's story during her own period of renunciation in Yemen, where she studied Arabic. "We've all felt the temptation to quit art-making," says George, who sold all her hair for \$1,000 to raise money for

Penn Dixie's run at the Fringe. "Theatre can be a very sacrificial art form, and we've all asked ourselves at one time or another in our careers why we persevere. The show is an absurd and hilarious interrogation of those questions."

The Seer made ripples after a limited run at the The Philadelphia Fringe in 2011, where the newcomer's show was dubbed "pick of the Fringe" (Live Arts Blog). Quinn Bauriedel, co-artistic director of Pig Iron Theatre Company, called it "a rare achievement" and continued: "This group has a distinct and powerful voice." David Brick, coartistic director of Headlong Dance Theatre, said "The Seer created a bonfire of a play that does what only live performance can do."

If you love to laugh, and you long for a theatre which is arresting, inventive, and bold — then trip into this 'dark heaven' of hysterical and surreal tragedy. Babies dance, camels fly — all is abracadabrasque.

Come on a fun, hilarious and crazy journey as our characters discover what it feels like to go in as the underdog and come out the champions... of life. The characters of This is My Box stumble, stutter and salsa their way through each day, backed by a funky soundscape created live by two performers and their boxes.

This is My Box is a fun and funky sound, comedy and character experiment. Sydney performers and writers Karena Thomas and Karli Evans and their faithful 'boxes' or vocal loopers will take the audience on an hour of power; through wicked comedy, live vocal looping and a little bit of bump and grind.

This is My Box, a Sydney Fringe Festival hit, punches out a cast of lonely characters in their search for happiness, all before the full time bell at 52 minutes. This is soulsearching, but not as you know it; it delivers darkly humorous sparing, politically incorrect sidekicks and sometimes surreal scenes that will sneak up on you when you're taking a moments breath.

Head Hand Head is a moving, imaginative and haunting portrait of mental distress, where the doubts of the universe find the shape of a person.

Drawing on her own experiences of living with obsessive compulsive disorder and anxiety, this intimate new solo show by Laura Jane Dean has been developed with the help of theatre-maker Chris Goode and explores the truths we tell, the fears we cling on to and what happens when we reveal our darkest thoughts.

In the back seat of a car an unassuming conversation takes dark and vicious root in the psyche of Laura Jane Dean. What we tell ourselves about the world, its simple probabilities and routine certainties, mortal dangers and not-so mortal dangers, melt away leaving Laura practicing head-hand-head coordination just to stay in the game. This complex, lyrical story journeys between interior dystopia and cool normality, exploring the things we need to stay sane.

Laura Jane Dean is a performer and theatre-maker. Graduating from the University of Kent in 2006, having developed a strong stage persona, and a passion for testing the relationship between audience and performer, Laura became a member of Accidental Collective. Over four years she collaborated with the company to create a diverse portfolio of performances, encompassing stage, site specific and community work and performed nationally. Laura is now based in London and since 2011 has been making solo performances for small audiences.

Hibs unveil new summer signing Owain Tudor-Jones

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Hibs yesterday unveiled summer signing Owain Tudor-Jones ahead of their friendly against Ian Murray's Dumbarton at the Bet Butler Stadium which is closely followed by a pre-season trip to Portugal where they will play a Gibraltar XI and also Nottingham Forest.

The Easter Road side are still waiting to hear whether they will face League of Ireland side Drogheda United or former European Cup Finalists Malmo in the second qualifying round of this year's Europa League, and Tudor-Jones hopes to use the experience he gained as a youngster with Bangor to help them progress to the group stages.

He said: "My first European game was a EUFA Cup qualifier with Bangor I made about five appearances in my four years with Bangor, so playing in Europe and having that taste between the ages of 17 and 20 when they happened so it was definitely an eye opener. It doesn't matter if the opponents are well known or not. It's a different way of playing the game, certainly different from the Welsh League and I certainly learned a lot from playing against some good players

"The first team we played was in the old Yugoslavia — Sartid Smederevo — and then we faced Gloria 1922 Bistrita from Romania and we also went to Latvia. When you play a team from another country it's great, something really different to what you are used to.

"We thought that we had done well, but what we didn't realise is that these teams tend to send out their reserve teams over to Wales so their star players don't get injured, then their top boys come back for the return game. That was an eye opener for sure and I remember getting bamboozled a couple of times by different players.

"When you look back now you are glad for the experience and hopefully that will help me along the way for the next few weeks."

The Welsh international is keen to get to know his new teammates after a brief break which included a trip across the Atlantic.

"It's been a short summer for myself and even shorter for the boys who were here already. It's good to get down to business and get to know the lads, as when you sign for a new club it's just like being a new boy in school for a few days.

"I got married over the summer, so it's been quite hectic with the stag doo and honeymoon and now all focus gets back to football. We had a week in Los Angeles which was nice but hectic, so perhaps I should have chosen somewhere a bit more relaxing."

With Rangers playing in the third tier of Scottish football, the Edinburgh derby is seen as the biggest in the country, and with Hearts currently in administration, this year's fixtures take on an added significance, and once again, Tudor Jones' experience in Wales should hopefully stand him in good stead.

"I've played in a couple of derbies. Last season was obviously the first highland derby in the SPL and Swansea Cardiff as well. They are exciting games to play in, but there's no point in us beating Hearts three or four times a season but being inconsistent against the other sides.

"There was only one Swansea Cardiff game that I played in which was a 2-2 draw so it wasn't too bad. This season the derby is the second game so I we don't have to wait too long and there should be a bit of extra bite in that one."

Airport looking forward to a busy weekend — Best of the Film Festival — New at the National Library of Scotland

Edinburgh is gearing up for a packed day of events today in West Princes Street Gardens as Armed Forces Day celebrations kick-off around the country.

Celebrations will start from 1pm as the annual parade of veterans and cadets will move off from the Grassmarket along to the Ross Theatre in Princes Street Gardens.

A variety of different events will then be hosted in the gardens until 5pm. Highlights include a flypast by two Royal Air Force Typhoons, entertainment from acts such as the <u>Porkpie Band</u> and the Pipe Band of the Royal Highland Fusiliers of Canada, as well as military vehicles and bouncy castles.

Music, events and displays will last throughout the day and round off at 5:00pm with the Ceremony of Beating Retreat.

Deputy Lord Provost, Councillor Deidre Brock, said: "Here in Edinburgh we're looking forward to welcoming hundreds of veterans, their families and many others to Princes Street Gardens for an event that will celebrate these men and women's dedication to duty.

"This city has a long and proud tradition of supporting the Armed Forces. Our military service personnel and veterans deserve recognition and respect for the sacrifices they make day in and day out . Holding a day of celebration in their honour is just one of the ways the people of Edinburgh can thank them."

<u>Armed Forces Day</u> is the annual, UK wide campaign that allows everyone to show their support for the men and women of the Armed Forces past and present, including currently serving troops, Service families, Reservists, veterans and cadets.

Similar events have been taking place across the UK, enabling people to come out and show their support, and giving a much-valued morale boost for Armed Forces personnel and their families. This year's main UK event took place in Nottingham.

The UK Armed Forces defend the UK and its interests. Every day of the year they are busy working around the world, promoting peace, delivering aid, tackling drug smugglers, providing security and fighting terrorism.

The Scottish Government have taken a step forward in the quest to rid our rubbish bins and our seas of the plastic bag.

By 2014 Scottish retailers will charge a minimum of 5p per bag in a bid to reduce carrier bag use.

Environment Secretary Richard Lochhead announced the move yesterday which follows a consultation that was held last year to gauge public opinion. He said shoppers would be encouraged to reuse carrier bags to cut down on the 750 million bags used in Scotland each year.

Regulations will be introduced in the Scottish Parliament in time for businesses to start charging by October 2014.

Other countries have already implemented a similar charge.

Environment Secretary Richard Lochhead said:- "Discarded carrier bags highlight our throwaway society. We use more carrier bags per head in Scotland than any other part of the UK and this is unsustainable.

"Carrier bags are a highly visible aspect of litter and we are taking decisive action to decrease their number. By reducing the amount being carelessly discarded we can cut litter and its impact on our environment and economy. A small charge should also encourage us all to stop and think about what we discard and what can be re-used.

"We have seen elsewhere that carrier bag charging has been effective in encouraging people to reuse bags. This charge is not a tax but will see retailers donating the proceeds to charity — this could be up to £5 million per year after retailers have covered their costs.

"Thousands of Scottish people already use bags for life and some retailers already charge. It is now time, however, for a national effort."

Iain Gulland, Director, Zero Waste Scotland, said:

"Zero Waste Scotland supports initiatives that tackle litter and help achieve a zero waste society, so we welcome the Scottish Government's decision to implement a levy on single use bags.

"We can all reduce the impact of carrier bags by making sure that when we must take one, we re-use it over and over again as many times as possible and then recycle it at the end of its life.

"Encouraging the reuse of carrier bags will complement wider action to tackle litter, which will be published later this summer. Moves to cut litter on land, in the sea and river systems will be set out as strategies for consultation."

The scheme is subject to Scottish Parliament approval of regulations. It is intended to take effect from October 2014.

- Retailers will be required to charge at least 5p for single-use bags.
- This is not a tax retailers would be expected to donate net proceeds to good causes.
- The charge will apply to single use bags of any material, not just plastic.
- •All retailers will be required to charge, not just

supermarkets, however smaller businesses will be exempt from the requirement to report centrally the numbers of bags sold and how much they have given to charity to minimise administrative burdens. These businesses will be expected to make some form of public statement of this information on their premises such as a poster for customers to see.

• Some types of bags will be exempt, mainly for health and safety reasons and privacy such as bags for prescriptions, certain fresh foods (including fruit, unpackaged meat of or fish) and unpackaged blades. The details of which bags should be exempted will be worked out finalised in discussion with stakeholders to ensure the system is effective.

The Marine Conservation Society (MCS) says the Scottish Government should be congratulated for taking a major step in tackling a problem that blights our towns and countryside alike, and which causes so much harm to our marine wildlife.

A 5p charge for single-use carrier bags in Scotland will begin in October 2014. Scotland follows in the footsteps of Wales and Northern Ireland. Westminster had indicated it was waiting to see the outcome of the Scottish consultation which was held earlier this year — up until now the coalition government has rejected calls for a levy saying cost on all sides was an issue.

Anne Saunders, MCS Projects Officer, based in Edinburgh says the charity is delighted: "We look forward to seeing the results in Scotland following the great example that has been set in Wales and in Northern Ireland and a 5p charge on all single-use carrier bags, regardless of the material they are made from is a really encouraging step forward. In just one year the Welsh levy has reduced the consumption of single-use carrier bags by up to 80%."

Anne Saunders says the implementation of the charge next year

will reduce harmful litter on our beaches and in our seas, and will prevent many wildlife entanglements and choking deaths.

"We have strong evidence that turtles and other sea creatures mistake plastic bags for food like jellyfish. They eat them and then die a painful death from choking or stomach blockages. Gulls are regularly seen eating bags looking for the food they once carried, and many other animals are known to consume plastic bags accidentally."

Solpadeine Is My Boyfriend is about a new Irish generation. They were promised everything; a life of financial stability and job security but they now find themselves queuing either at the airport to emigrate or the social welfare office to sign on. It's a generation that feel entitled not to experience depression, economic or personal, and whose availability to over-the-counter medication allows them to numb both.

Stefanie's high-octane performance is broken up by moments of near stand-up comedy. The piece resonates with all Irish audiences regardless of where they are from due to the mass exodus of young people leaving for Australia, Canada and America.

Swept Up make their debut at the Edinburgh Fringe with Yellow Pears, devised by actors India Crawford and Rose McPhilemy and director Debbie Hannan. In 2012 Yellow Pears was awarded The Bruce Millar Drama Award, which is given once a year to a graduate project from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland by the Bruce Millar Memorial Trust.

Raz and Itsy run a market stall unlike any other. They have bad taste, no flair for business but some seriously good dance moves. Swept Up Theatre began life after actors Rose McPhilemy and India Crawford travelled to Dublin to work with Philippe Gaulier and discovered their inner idiots. After graduating from the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland in 2011 they realised that these idiots had a story to tell, and went on to form Swept Up.

Their first show, Yellow Pears has been devised with fellow Royal Conservatoire of Scotland graduate, director Debbie Hannan. Debbie's assisting credits include Enquirer (National Theatre of Scotland) A Doll's House (Royal Lyceum, Edinburgh) The Maids (Citizens Theatre, Glasgow) Sleeping Beauty

(Citizens) and directing credits include Pamela Carter's liberty, equality, fraternity (Tron Theatre, Traverse). Debbie will be co-directing for The Royal Court's Soap Opera this July and will be directing Notes from the Underground in the Circle Studio at the Citizens this September.

A Tyrannosaurus Rex has been on the rampage through Edinburgh – despite being extinct for the last 65 million years.

The aftermath of the mischievous carnivore's car-crushing antics caused bemusement among shoppers on Princes Street and Lothian Road earlier in the week until they realised it was, in fact, an advertising stunt promoting an IMAX 3D screening of Jurassic Park as part of the Edinburgh International Film Festival.

People were stopping and staring, wondering where these cars had come from. It's all about demonstrating the creativity of the Festival and capturing the public's imagination."

In 2007, Ross was behind a multi award-winning idea to transform the columns of the National Gallery in Princes Street into giant soup cans to mark the opening of an Andy Warhol exhibition.

Edinburgh Festival Fringe — Who wants to kill Yulia Tymoshenko

Twice prime minister of Ukraine, heroine of the Orange Revolution, Yulia Tymoshenko was sentenced to seven years in prison in October 2011 on a charge of abuse in office relating to gas deals with Russia. In April this year The European Court of Human Rights declared her imprisonment "politically motivated". Tymoshenko has always claimed that her detention was intended to keep her out of politics and that her rights have been violated The court agreed unanimously that she had

been jailed "for other reasons" than those permissible by law. Yulia Tymoshenko remains in a Ukrainian prison.

Directed by Jakov Sedlar who directed the 2012 documentary of the same name, Who Wants To Kill Yulia Tymoshenko is a searing account of the woman who has spent her life fighting for democracy and whose political opponents have taken extreme measures to silence her. Set in the prison cell she shares with a young woman who was framed for murder, the play paints a portrait of a freedom fighter who has been imprisoned by a corrupt regime, it reveals the steely determination that motivates her as well an understanding and closeness that develops with the cellmate who becomes her saviour as well as her enemy.

Instantly recognisable by her yellow braids, Tymoshenko was a practicing economist and academic. Prior to her political career, Yulia Tymoshenko was a successful but controversial businesswoman in the gas industry, becoming by some estimates one of the richest people in the country.

Police appeal for witnesses after man disturbed in Gilmerton Road house

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Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses following a theft from a property in the south of the city. The incident happened around 5.15pm on Wednesday 26th June at an address in Gilmerton Road.

A 67-year-old man returned home and found a male inside who was in possession of a knife.

Following a brief struggle the victim was able to eject the suspect, who made off towards Moredunvale Road before turning into Moredun Park Gardens where he was lost to sight.

A number of items of jewellery were stolen from the property and anyone who can assist police with their enquiries is asked to come forward.

The suspect is describes as white, around 30-years-old with a large heavy build, pale complexion and dark curly hair. He was wearing dark baggy clothing, white trainers, dark rimmed glasses and was in possession of a black bag.

A Police Scotland spokesman said: "This was a terrifying experience for the homeowner, who was robbed of his possessions after finding a male intruder within his home.

"The stolen items are of great sentimental value to the victim and we are conducting local enquiries to identify the individual responsible for this theft.

"Anyone who was in Gilmerton Road on Wednesday evening and saw anything suspicious, or who can help identify the suspect is asked to contact police immediately.

"Similarly, we would also urge anyone with other information relevant to this investigation to get in touch."

Video Footage of Southern Cassowary Laying an Egg

Using surveillance cameras, keepers at Edinburgh Zoo have managed to capture rare footage of their female southern cassowary Sydney laying an egg. The cameras were placed in the birds' nesting site when they started to show promising breeding behaviour. Edinburgh Zoo was the first collection in the UK to successfully breed southern cassowaries in 1986.

Listed as Vulnerable on the IUCN Red List, successful breeding would be an important achievement for Edinburgh Zoo as it has been twenty-seven years since the Zoo had cassowary chicks. In 1986, Edinburgh Zoo was the first collection in the UK to successfully breed southern cassowaries.

This year is the first time ten-year-old Sydney has allowed her male companion Billy to share her enclosure since he arrived at the Zoo in 2005. The cassowaries started to show promising breeding signs after being placed together in April. Despite their terrifying reputation, Billy and Sydney showed their tender side and were often spotted eating from the same bunch of grapes. A nest site was constructed for the lovebirds and they both showed interest in the area before the first egg was laid last month.

There are currently 6 eggs in the nest, which are incubated, not by mum, but by potential father Billy. While keepers are uncertain if successful mating did occur and if the eggs are fertile, this is an enormous step forward in the breeding programme for this pair.

Any potential chicks will hatch around August and Billy will

continue to take sole responsibility of them.

Breeding this species is particularly difficult due to their highly aggressive nature. Keepers are very rarely in the enclosure at the same time as the birds and only then with large boards as protection, as cassowaries are renowned for their large, dagger-like claws and powerful high-kicks that can prove fatal.

Colin Oulton, Team Leader for Birds at Edinburgh Zoo, comments: "Cassowary eggs are amongst the largest of all bird eggs, measuring around 15cm long by 10cm wide. Usually egg fertility is checked through candling; however cassowary eggs are unable to be candled as the light cannot penetrate the thick green eggshell. Their incubation period is around 56 days, so we will just have to wait and see if any hatch out. As this is Billy's first clutch we want to assess his natural parenting skills, so plan to let him incubate naturally, rather than remove the eggs to an incubator."

Southern cassowaries are the third-largest bird, behind the ostrich and the emu and are easily recognised by their jet black plumage, azure blue neck and impressive horn-like helmet on the crown of their head. Also known as double-wattled cassowaries, they are distinguishable from the north cassowary and dwarf cassowary by the two wattles of bright red skin that hang down from the throat. They are native to New Guinea and Queensland, Australia with between 10,000 and 20,000 birds remaining in the wild. Habitat loss, hunting and predation by dogs are the biggest threats the species faces.

EIFF Awards ceremony held today

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The winners of this year's prestigious Edinburgh International Film Festival awards were announced at the Festival's awards ceremony, held at Filmhouse today and hosted by Grant Lauchlan, producer and presenter of stv's Moviejuice. The ceremony took place ahead of Sunday's Closing Night Gala, NOT ANOTHER HAPPY ENDING, which will conclude the 12-day Festival.

The Award for Best Film in the International Competition was presented to Mahdi Fleifel's A WORLD NOT OURS (Lebanon/UAE/Denmark/UK), which received its UK premiere

here at EIFF. The award is given to filmmakers from outside of the UK in recognition of their imagination and innovation. Acclaimed South Korean director Bong Joon-ho chaired the International Feature Film Competition Jury, which also included actress Natalie Dormer and film critic Siobhan Synnot.

The jury citation read: "The International Jury loved this film's warm regard for the people at the heart of the film. A difficult subject was handled with confidence and humour. We hope that many more people get the opportunity to see A WORLD NOT OURS."

Mahdi Fleifel said: "I am immensely grateful to the programmers at the EIFF for inviting my film. I have lived, studied and worked in the UK for 13 years, but I've never managed to screen any of my work at a single British film event — not even my short films which were pretty successful internationally. Winning the prize in Britain's No. 1 Film Festival is too good to be true. I hope this will help bring our film to a wider audience in the UK and I would like to thank the jury for this wonderful honour."

The jury also gave a special mention to Elias Giannakakis' JOY (Greece). The citation read: "The Jury would like to make special mention of Elias Giannakakis' unique character study in JOY and an outstanding performance by Amalia Moutousi."

The Michael Powell Award for Best British Feature Film went to Lucien Castaing-Taylor and Véréna Paravel's LEVIATHAN (UK/USA/France), which received its UK Premiere at the Festival. A visually stunning documentary, LEVIATHAN wins one of the longest-running film awards in the UK, honouring imagination and creativity in British filmmaking.

The winner was chosen by the Michael Powell Jury, chaired by Iranian director Samira Makhmalbaf and including actor and director Kevin McKidd and film critic Derek Malcolm. The jury described the film "as an original and imaginative documentary which observes the brutal routine of deep sea fishing in a way which completely immerses the watcher in its story."

Lucien Castaing-Taylor and Véréna Paravel said: "We are totally bowled over by the news of this award. All our films have been rejected by every British film festival to date, so it is all the more moving for us! We also admire in so many ways the work of this jury, which makes this award especially meaningful to us both. It also gives us the courage and conviction to continue to keep pushing at the envelope — of cinema, of documentary, of art."

The jury awarded a special commendation to Paul Wright's FOR THOSE IN PERIL "for its passionate portrait of a young Scots survivor of a tragedy at sea."

The Award for Best Performance in a British Feature Film was shared by Jamie Blackley and Toby Regbo for their performances as the dysfunctional schoolboys in uwantme2killhim? The performance awards were voted for by the Michael Powell Award Competition Jury.

Jamie Blackley said: "I felt lucky enough to hear that two films I was in had been selected for the EIFF, so to then win this award is a wonderful shock that I wasn't expecting and I am proud to share it with Toby. I'd like to thank Andrew Douglas and the cast and crew for making the experience so special for me and to EIFF for making me feel so welcome."

Co-star Toby Regbo added: "I'm absolutely over the moon. Making this film was so positive: a really interesting story, a great director and a superb actor to work opposite, what more could you want really? I'd like to say thank you to the EIFF for supporting British independent film and young actors."

Reinstated in 2013 after a two-year absence, **The Audience Award**, supported by Sainsbury's Bank, went to **FIRE IN THE NIGHT** (UK) directed by**Anthony Wonke** for his deeply moving documentary detailing the 1988 Piper Alpha disaster in the North Sea. The film, which received its World Premiere at the Festival, skilfully combines archival footage, audio recordings and interviews with some of the 61 survivors of the disaster, some of whom are interviewed for the very first time.

Voted for by cinema-goers attending public screenings, films were eligible from across the Festival programme at the discretion of the Artistic Director.

Anthony Wonke said: "It's 25 years ago this July that Piper Alpha exploded and sunk into the North Sea and we hope that with this film the memory of that fateful night that affected so many lives will act as a suitable remembrance. I'd like to thank everyone who voted for FIRE IN THE NIGHT, it really does

mean an awful lot to everyone involved especially all the men who took part in the film. I know that they will be incredibly touched and thankful that the public engaged with this film and their story in such a positive way."

EIFF Artistic Director Chris Fujiwara said: "The Audience Award, which we reinstated this year after a two-year hiatus, is not only one of the most significant of EIFF's initiatives designed to engage audiences with cinema, it's also one of the most fun. We're delighted by the enthusiasm shown by our audience members who took part in choosing this award, and we're grateful for the support and commitment of Sainsbury's Bank."

GHL by Lotte Schreiber won The Award for Best Short Film in the shorts category. The prize was one of three awards bestowed by the Short Film Competition Jury, which included International Film Festival Rotterdam programmer Inge de Leeuw (chair), film critic Christoph Huber and independent film programmer Ricardo Matos Cabo.

The jury citation read: "The jury unanimously gives this prize for Best Short Film to a visually and rhythmically precise architectural study that doubles as a portrait of current social changes with the ghost of capitalism haunting the space of a popular landmark of communal recreation erected as a socialist utopia in Vienna.

Lotte Schreiber said: "I am very proud to receive this amazing award from this fantastic film festival, which is the most exciting one I've ever received! I'm proud of my little team

and I want to thank them all for their precious contribution to this little movie: especially Johannes Hammel, who did the breathtaking camerawork and Michael Krassnitzer for his perfect low-key acting. This award makes me sure to keep on filmmaking, even under extremely tough economic circumstances, which will probably become even tougher for all of us independent filmmakers in the next years. But it's worth carrying on! I want to express my sincere gratitude to the Festival Programme Committee who has selected the Film to be part of the International Competition at EIFF and likewise to the Short Film jury members, who have put their whole confidence into this little Viennese movie."

The Award for Creative Innovation in a Short Film, given for the first time this year, was awarded to DOLL PARTS by Muzi Quawson, as voted for by the Shorts Jury. The jury citation read: "The prize for creative innovation goes to a short that takes an unusual approach to documenting subculture and its protagonists, utilising paradoxical means. The film achieves a sense of drift by focusing on moments of stasis and capturing the energy of touring musicians through surprising ellipses and attention to incidental details."

Another newly introduced award within the shorts category, The Award for Outstanding Individual Contribution to a Short Film, which celebrates imaginative and innovative work in short cinema, was awarded to Josh Gibson as Director of Photography of LIGHT PLATE, which he also directed.

The jury citation read: "The prize for outstanding contribution to a short film goes to the camerawork of a magical landscape study, capturing a day in the Tuscan countryside with a series of subtle, imaginative and

mesmerizingly textured images forged with careful attention to the possibilities and beauty of 35mm films."

Josh Gibson said: "I am honoured and humbled to receive this award and to be recognized along with this small, personal film at such a prestigious international film festival, brimming with work by talented people that I have admired for a long time. Unlike feature films, short films are delicate creatures that owe much to the programming. In shorts programmes the individual films reverberate against one another, sometimes changing fundamentally depending upon the other pieces in the programme. I especially want to thank the EIFF programmers for finding a place for LIGHT PLATE where its particular point of view and visual preoccupations could be acknowledged and admired."

The jury also gave a special mention to three filmmakers whose work holds great promise for the future: Charlotte Rabate for LUCILLE IN THE SKY; Ivan Castineiras for THE BORDER; and Anna Frances Ewert for ENDLESS DAY.

As voted for by the audience, The McLaren Award for Best New British Animation, supported by the British Council, went to MARILYN MYLLERby director Mikey Please and co-animator Dan Ojari. Named after Scottish-born filmmaker Norman McLaren, the McLaren Award is the longest running award celebrating creativity amongst UK animation talent. The award was presented at the awards ceremony by Richard Williams, widely regarded as one of the world's greatest animators.

Mikey Please said: "The team and I are absolutely thrilled to

receive the prestigious McLaren Award. We hope that our gonzo, the-rules-are-there-to-break-them approach to filmmaking was very much in a spirit that would have made Norman proud. This was Marilyn's World premiere, so naturally we were very nervous about how she'd be received. To have the warm welcome of an audience vote is wonderful, the best result we could have possibly hoped for."

The Student Critics Jury Award, supported by Morag and James Anderson, was awarded to CELESTIAL WIVES OF THE MEADOW MARI byAlexey Fedorchenko. The award was determined by a jury of seven aspiring film critics, Lewis Camley, Ruth Swift-Wood, Kathryn Craigmyle, Phil Kennedy, Catarina Mourao, Rebecca Lily Bowen and Vivek Santayana, who took part in a workshop on film criticism at EIFF under the guidance of Kate Taylor (Independent Cinema Office), Gabe Klinger (independent film critic and programmer) and Nick James (editor, Sight & Sound).

The jury citation read: "Bearing in mind what the Artistic Director said, film is reality and also something more. A witty, perceptive and beautiful celebration of folk mythologies".

ScotRail is harnessing Scotland's damp climate to help reduce costs and its carbon footprint — by collecting rainwater for use in washing trains.

The train operator has installed an innovative system which allows it to collect rainwater from over two thousand squared metres of roof area at Corkerhill depot in Glasgow to clean the underside of its trains.

The company believes it is the first rail operator in the UK to introduce the 'rainwater harvesting' system at a depot.

The facility was installed at Corkerhill depot earlier this month and can collect 72,000 litres of rainwater, which is more than half of the water required to clean the underside of three trains every day for a year.

Steve Montgomery, ScotRail's managing director, said: "The new facility removes the need for us to use more than 3.5 million litres of fresh water every year — helping improve the environmental performance of Scotland's railways.

"If the pilot project is successful, we may consider introducing rainwater harvesting at other depots in the future."

Rainwater harvesting technology is already used on Indian railways, where fresh water is at a premium.

Transport Minister Keith Brown said: "I am delighted ScotRail has introduced the rainwater harvesting system as a pilot project at its Corkerhill depot. This innovative system will help to deliver further reductions in its carbon footprint and maintenance costs.

"This will be another milestone as we work towards improving Scotland's railways' environmental performance, and I look forward to seeing this system rolled out at other locations in

the future."

Scargill is set to carry top weight but his burden is reduced by the booking of the talented 7lbs claimer Connor Beasley.

Jim Goldie would appear to dominate the Download the Free Racing Plus App. Handicap (3.10). The Uplawmoor trainer saddles course winners Titus Bolt and Grand Diamond and the pair are closely matched on their recent running at Musselburgh, but Graham Lee rides Titus Bolt who is narrowly preferred.

Philip Kirby has a profitable strike rate with his Musselburgh runners and his Dr Irv commands respect in the 2m Boogie In The Morning Handicap (4.55). Though only successful once in 18 races, Dr Irv has been consistent all summer and the last occasion when he tackled two miles in a competitive handicap at Ripon, Dr Irv was the moral winner being squeezed for room in the final strides and going down by the narrowest of margins in a three way photo. He deserves compensation here.

Today's meeting is the East Lothian courses fourth in June and follows the totepool Edinburgh Cup, Stobo Castle Ladies Day and William Hill Scottish Sprint Cup, which attracted more than 17,000 race goers and offered total prize money of £360,000

Musselburgh Racecourse general manager, Bill Farnsworth, said: "It's been an exciting month for us and we are delighted our three key meetings went off without a hitch.

"The Edinburgh Cup and Scottish Sprint Cup, both very different fixtures, are continuing to develop a strong following and we have an excellent foundation to build on in the coming years.

"Ladies Day was our ninth consecutive sell-out and we really feel this was our best yet. With another nine flat meetings over the summer months, we hope we can mirror the success we enjoyed in June and make it a Flat season to remember."

Edinburgh council agree to Greens motion backing Robin Hood tax

The Green group lodged a motion at today's full council meeting which looked like something else that would be cast aside by the overwhelming majority of the Coalition administration. That was until the speeches started, and it became clear that the administration were actually minded to agree that the council should tell the UK government that they would like the so-called Robin Hood tax looked into at the earliest opportunity.

The idea behind this tax on financial transactions is that if central government can raise some extra cash then it would not be left to local authorities to either raise funds themselves by whatever means they can, which naturally would involve cuts to services.

The original motion was as follows:-

"This Council:

Recognises the impact of the UK Coalition Government's public sector and welfare cuts on this City and its residents;

Believes that the levy of a Financial Transaction Tax on speculative financial transactions could provide a way of raising revenue and mitigating cuts to public services;

Therefore agrees that the Council Leader should make representation to HM Government calling for the Financial Transaction Tax to be introduced at the earliest opportunity."

The motion was amended by changing the word 'introduced' to 'explored' and was passed by a majority of councillors.

☑ Green councillor Steve Burgess said:-"Pressure is mounting on the Government with over 100,000 people in the UK actively supporting a campaign to introduce a Robin Hood tax. Councils across the country are making official representations and I'm pleased to say they have today been joined by Edinburgh Council.

"The Robin Hood tax or Financial Transaction tax would place a very small levy, 0.01 to 0.1%, on financial transactions such as the sale of stocks and bonds. Because the total value of financial transactions is so massive, the tax could raise as much as £20billion. This amount could go some way to offsetting the UK Government's swingeing budget cuts that are impacting on everyone, as services are cut and welfare is slashed.

"Eleven other European countries, including France and Germany, have already agreed to implement a Robin Hood tax but prompted by the banks and the US government, the UK Government has lodged a legal challenge against it in the European Court. They say it's unworkable, despite the fact the UK already has a similar tax called 'stamp duty' on share dealing that raises £3billion a year.

"Despite the opposition of the current UK Government hopefully a Robin Hood tax will go ahead across Europe and there will be an opportunity for a future Government, be it UK or Scottish, to implement this very fair measure in the not too distant future."

Katharine Hepburn Returns To Edinburgh in Tea At Five

It started with her triumphant British theatrical debut at the Edinburgh International Festival in 1952, and she would later call it the biggest disappointment of her career.

At the 1952 Oscars, Katharine Hepburn receives her fifth Oscar nomination for The African Queen and is on the cover of TIME magazine. At the height of her fame she walks away from movies for three years, that summer coming to Edinburgh to make her British stage debut performing Bernard Shaw's The Millionairess, which then transfers to the West End. The Millionairess was acutely personal to Hepburn — her parents read Shaw to her when she was a child, and she was overjoyed when it transferred to Broadway that winter.

Yet lukewarm reviews from Broadway damaged then play's prospects. Hepburn struggled for years to get it adapted into a film: she employed Preston Sturges to write the screenplay, offered to work for free and to pay the director herself, but no studio picked up the project. In a rollercoaster career of highs and lows, Hepburn called this the biggest disappointment of her career.

Now Birmingham's Old Joint Stock Theatre Company are bringing Katharine Hepburn back to Edinburgh in an acclaimed revival of Tea At Five, Matthew Lombardo's one-woman play recounting the life and final days of Katharine Hepburn which debuted in 2002 with Kate Mulgrew (Captain Janeway, StTrek: Voyager) in the lead role.

Old Joint Stock revived the piece in 2012 with Meghan Lloyd in the lead role and the production swept the Stratford-Upon-Avon Fringe last summer, winning Best Solo Performance and Lloyd taking home the Best Actress award. Now the company are bringing Katharine back to Edinburgh for performances at Surgeon's Hall throughout August 2013.

Edinburgh Festival Fringe — I (Honestly) Love You

From award-winning Western Australian playwright, Damon Lockwood, comes a tale of love gained, love lost, and love thrown around a bit.

Lloyd Rees and Belle Ashton are the two reluctant protagonists who are burdened with the truth telling disease Vitiositas Veritas, which only allows them to tell the truth at all times. Like most relationships, everything seems to be going (sort of) well enough to start with: there's a hesitant first date, a disappointing initial sexual encounter and an unfortunate meeting with Belle's parents.

Somehow the two lovers navigate these intimate difficulties enough to look each other in the eyes and say 'I love you' which, unbeknown to either of them, precipitates the next stage of the vitiositas veritas disease. Having honestly uttered those three words they are now able to lie to each other but every time they do so a week is knocked off their lives. The choice is simple: vicious truth and life, or honest lies and death.

I (Honestly) Love You has performed two sold-out seasons in Australia and departs Edinburgh to perform at the New York City Fringe. The show was nominated for two awards in the Equity Guild Awards 2012 and was nominated for four Blue Room awards including Judge's Choice and Member's Choice.

Actor Jennifer Lusk wants to know why she can't play the Doctor in the BBC science fiction series, Doctor Who.

"The Doctor is an alien with two hearts. Why can't she be an alien with two hearts and two breasts, " she said. Lusk will star in a rom com set at a science fiction convention called Who Are You Supposed To Be?

Co-star Cameron K McEwan, better known in Doctor Who fan circles as the owner of "Blogtor Who" agrees. "Don't we all want to be the Doctor? Maybe it's time for a woman to take the mantle. That's part of what the play addresses."

Originally conceived as a tribute to fans in the 50th Anniversary year of Doctor Who, the play's themes became more relevant on the announcement of Matt Smith's departure earlier in the month.

"Once Matt Smith and the BBC had made their official announcement, the first thing declared by the tabloids is that he would be replaced by a woman," said Who Are You Supposed To Be? writer, Keith Gow. "And the online discussions quickly mirrored the conflict in the play. Jen's character likes to dress up as the Doctor. Cameron's character doesn't want a woman, because of tradition."

The show isn't just about a woman playing the Doctor, though. It is, at its core, a love story where the characters initially bond over pop culture references. As well as love, the show also tackles the issue of anxiety — and how we cope outside our comfort zones.

"It was important to us that the show wasn't just about Doctor Who jokes or Batman references. We've all got different sides and I wanted to make sure the show captured that," said Gow. "It would be easy to make a show that relies on in-jokes, but we definitely want to appeal to everyone. So it's for people who fall in love, people who have awkward moments. All of us."

Lusk and McEwan are about to begin rehearsals on the play, which they hope to tour after the thirteen-show run at Edinburgh Fringe. Two months out from the premiere, they are also trying to raise a little bit more money for costumes and publicity.

"My character, Ash, is dressed up as Peter Davison's Doctor

throughout the show. We need money to get that costume right. That's her character — she likes to dress up! She spends hours making these costumes. The show needs to get that right," Lusk explains.

"I get to dress up late in the show as well," said McEwan.
"But I can't tell you who I dress as. As River Song is so fond of saying, 'Spoilers!'"

With a decision on who will replace Matt Smith still pending, are the creators of this World Premiere romantic comedy about fans and fandom worried that the BBC might be bold and actually cast a woman in the role? Would that change the show?

"Writing is re-writing," joked Lusk. "If we have to make a change, we'll be fine. But I think the argument might go on well after an announcement is made. Besides, if the BBC is so bold as to cast a woman as the Doctor, the most important thing is that little girls watching the show can look up and start to believe they could be the Doctor, too."

Compagnie Les Labyrinthes presents Adam Smith, Le Grand Tour, an original creation for the Fringe mixing theatre and video for a journey back in time to the origins of the thought of the key figure of Scottish Enlightenment.

In Adam Smith, Le Grand Tour, Compagnie Les Labyrinthes takes us on a journey through Adam Smith's thought and work. Incorporating economics, philosophy and theatre, this original creation is an invitation to go back to the founding principles of liberalism, the context of the Scottish Enlightenment and the influence of Adam Smith's thought on our modern society.

Through the eyes of the two protagonists Marie (Vanessa Oltra) and Fred (Fréderic Kneip) who have embarked on a journey through Scotland to complete their own 'Grand Tour', Adam Smith, Le Grand Tour is a sharply written, humorous and caustic homage to the legacy of the philosopher. Neither an economic nor a philosophical treaty, it makes us wonder: what remains of Adam Smith today? And what have we done with his thought?

Coming to Scotland in summer 2012, Compagnie Les Labyrinthes followed in the footsteps of Adam Smith and visited the places in Edinburgh and around related to his life and work. They brought back from this trip the videos that would become fully part of their multimedia production. World premiering at this year's Fringe in its English version, Adam Smith, Le Grand Tour will then be touring in France in a French version.

Based in Aquitaine, in south-western France, Compagnie Les Labyrinthes was founded in 1995 by Gérard David, teacher at the Merignac Conservatory. Compagnie Les Labyrinthes has so far produced about thirty classic and contemporary theatre projects. In addition to the creation of theatre shows, the company is actively working on programmes of artistic education intended to schools.

Author of the show and performer Vanessa Oltra holds a PhD in Economics and is a senior lecturer at the University of Bordeaux IV. Former student at the Merignac Conservatory, she has been working with Gérard David for several years. Adam Smith, Le Grand Tour is her first theatre project involving

both her researcher and author skills.

Frédéric Kneip is a performer and director. Former student at the Rennes Conservatory for Dramatic Arts and and the Merignac Conservatory, he regularly plays with different companies, including Compagnie Les Labyrinthes. In parallel, he is working on artistic education in prison.
