Five things you need to know today

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GO Edinburgh – Royal Salute – Edinburgh International Magic Festival – Big Fun Run – Community Cafés need you

Only three days left to pledge your support in Edinburgh's bid to build the new National Performance for Sport at Heriot-Watt campus at Riccarton. There were other cities vying for the opportunity and Edinburgh has launched a high profile campaign to bring the centre to the capital, enlisting the help of sports stars like Sir Chris Hoy and Gavin Hastings.

The facility will contain a multi-sport performance centre and house the National Football Academy. The Scottish Government has committed £25 million of funding and in December 2012 organisations were invited to bid to host and operate the NPCS. Dundee City, Stirling University and Council and Heriot-Watt University and City of Edinburgh Council were shortlisted following successful completion of stage one. Stage two bids have to be submitted by 5 July 2013.

The capital is now left on the Stage 2 shortlist alongside Stirling and Dundee for the £25m centre, with a decision expected in late summer. The facility is intended to provide Scotland's top sports men and women with the facilities, programmes and services that will enable them to excel on the international stage.

The council says that Heriot-Watt University's bid provides an easily accessible site situated in the capital city of Scotland with good transport links to the rest of the country and the UK. The University already has a strong sports science programme and close links to community clubs, as well as a number of national organisations including Scottish Squash and Racketball.

The cost to the council is estimated at £5m. The Go Edinburgh website is here.

Her Majesty the Queen arrives in Edinburgh today to take up residence at Holyrood Palace and so at 2.35pm there will be a Royal Salute from the Mills Mount Battery at Edinburgh Castle.

The 105th Regiment Royal Artillery will do the honours. More details on the <u>Historic Scotland website</u>.

"It is my hope that there are people with similar passions all over the globe and who equally would love to have a print of their favourite place adorning their walls. So My Place in Print has the very grand goal to try and provide for this.

"The new website is designed to provide the jumping off platform get the ball rolling. Prints can be viewed online, purchased in a range of sizes, paid for securely and dispatched pretty much anywhere on the planet. They can also be full framed if delivered within the UK.

"So whether you're an expat missing home, you want to treat yourself to a new picture, need a gift for any multitude of occasions, or even want your business space to make a statement, surely a great landscape print might be an option!

"Edinburgh has been the perfect starting point for my dreams. It must be one of the most photogenic cities as far as landscape photography is concerned, as it is blessed with an abundance of stunning subjects and focal points. There are other avenues for expansion too and I have a few tricks in mind. So watch this space as the future beckons."

Edinburgh Reporter's Weekly Sports Roundup

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The Edinburgh Reporter's Weekly Sports Roundup starts with boxing this week, and the news that one of Scotland's finest

fighters has hung up his gloves on his 35th birthday. 'Amazing' Alex Arthur, who is the capital's most successful boxer since the great Ken Buchanan made the announcement on Twitter, and The Edinburgh Reporter sends our best wishes to Alex in his future career.

Elsewhere, the Monarchs continue their strong start to the season and there is plenty of news from both Hearts and Hibs ahead of the forthcoming campaign.

We would also like to congratulate the Scotland hockey team for their fifth win in a row.

Boxing

Former WBO World Super-Featherweight Champion 'Amazing' Alex Arthur, the most successful Edinburgh fighter since Ken Buchanan, has announced his retirement from professional boxing, with a career record of 31 wins and three defeats from 34 fights.

Announcing the news on Twitter, he said: "Well… woke up today 35. Time goes so fast. "I haven't fought for over a year now, so just want to say I officially retire from boxing."

Alex's rise through the amateur ranks culminated in securing gold in the 1998 Commonwealth Games in Kuala Lumpur. Two years later, he turned professional and in October 2000 he won the British title at Braehead Arena in Glasgow when he beat Dewsbury's Steve Conway.

He followed up that victory with two defences against Carl Greaves and fellow Scot Willie Limond; however he was denied the Lonsdale belt for keeps when he lost to Michael Gomez in front of a sold out Meadowbank Stadium, the first professional boxing card in the city for almost 20 years. Boxing promoter Frank Warren called the fight "the greatest contest seen on these shores since Nigel Benn beat Gerald McClellan in 1995" Alex made his comeback the next year on 27 March 2004 by stopping Michael Kizza in the first round for the IBF Inter-Continental super featherweight title. He made two defences of that title before fighting Craig Docherty for the British and Commonwealth Super-Featherweight titles. The fight also took place at the Meadowbank, and ended with Alex knocking Docherty out in the 9th round.

His next fight was a 12 round points decision against the reigning European champion Boris Sinitsin, which meant that he held the British, Commonwealth and European title belts at the same time.

Alex put all three titles on the line against fellow Scot Ricky Burns whom he also beat on points.

On 21 July 2007 Alex stopped Koba Gogoladze in the tenth round to win the interim WBO super-featherweight title recognised as one of the 4 main 'World' belts.

He made his first defence five months later against fellow Brit Steve Foster Jr, and again won on points after a close fight.

Following that win Alex was due to fight Joan Guzmán who held the full version of the title, however the Dominican decided that he wanted to move up a weight division which meant that Alex was recognized as the organization's world champion.

On 9 September 2008, Alex lost the title in controversial circumstances against Nicky Cook, with claims that he had been 'robbed' by three English judges in Manchester.

Since then Alex has beaten Mohamed Benbiou via TKO in Round 1 at the Bellahouston Sports Centre in Glasgow, and lost on points to Nigel Wright at the Metro Radio Arena, Newcastle, before with two back to back wins against Peter McDonagh in September 2010 and Jay Morris in December 2010 both in Glasgow. His last two fights were both at Meadowbank, beating Aleksander Vakhtangashvili on a TKO in the 4th round in August 2011 then Michael Frontin on points on 14 April 2012.

A born-again Christian, Alex has been a regular speaker in local schools in recent years and a tireless charity fundraiser. He was awarded an MBE in the 2012 Birthday Honours for services to boxing.

Mark "Too Strong" Armstrong (SK Boxing Promotions) beat Awais "Kiss My" Butt (Wigan) on TKO in round two.

"Razor" Ronnie Stephen (SK Boxing Promotions) beat Vasos "Ares" Makris (Holyrood Boxing Club, Edinburgh) on points.

John "Cruel Intentions" Stevens (SK Boxing Promotions) triumphed over Paul "The Destroyer" Davis (Blackpool) with TKO in round one.

Rugby by John Preece

The draw for the British and Irish Cup was made on Thursday and Edinburgh club, Edinburgh Academicals, featured as one of the four Scottish clubs in the draw (the others are Ayr, Gala and Stirling County). London Scottish are also included, but hardly pass as a 'Scottish' club these days with very few 'exiles' in the squad.

Accies were drawn in Pool 2 where they will face 'Wales 2' (Welsh teams have not yet been identified), London Welsh and, the aforementioned, London Scottish. Matches will be played both home and away over three pairs of weekends in October, December and January.

In looking forward to the challenge, Bob Easson, director of rugby at Edinburgh Accies said: "It's an exciting draw. We are working really hard to continue to professionalise the set-up at Accies and this (competition) gives us the opportunity to challenge the players and ourselves. It also gives the players the chance to benchmark themselves and experience rugby at a higher level."

Which indeed it will, as the Scottish club scene is almost wholly amateur, with a few professionals from Edinburgh and Glasgow playing to keep in condition or on the way back from injury. The English Championship teams, on the other hand, are largely professional set-ups, but tend to use the B+I Cup to 'blood' their younger or more inexperienced players. Whether that trend will continue as the competition gains status will remain to be seen.

The Scotland Seven's squad are currently playing in the Rugby World Cup 7's in Moscow and on Day I, defeated Japan in a closely fought 19-17 win, which nearly all went wrong as Japan came back in the second half from 19-0 down with five minutes left on the clock.

Day two started well with a 21-5 points victory over the hosts, Russia, but a 41-0 defeat to South Africa, the Group B winners, consigned the Scots to the Plate competition.

Here they won against Portugal, taking the match 17-0 and, as we 'went to press', will go on to play Canada in the semifinal.

And finally: News of Scotland's Women's sevens team from Marbella makes grim reading. After going down fighting, but not unexpectedly, 31-7 to England, the Scots went on to lose 43-0 – that's forty three to zero! – to the Netherlands of all teams (33-0 win for the 15-a-side Scots) and 31-5 to Germany to finish in twelfth and last place in the table and, therefore, to also lose their FIRA Grand Prix status for next season. Drawing boards at the ready...

Football

BDO, the administrators of Hearts have issued a deadline of 12 July for formal offers for the club. A sales memorandum has been sent to all parties who have already expressed an interest in buying the club, which indicates that negotiations are on-going with the relevant parties in Lithuania.

Supporters have bought an additional 1500 season tickets following the plea by BDO that 3000 were required to raise sufficient funds to see the club continue to trade throughout

the close season.

The Scottish Premier League has already handed the Tynecastle side a 15-point deduction for next season, as well as a ban on signing players.

Some good news however, Danny Wilson will remain at Hearts after the club received confirmation that signing the defender would not breach their registration embargo. The 21-year-old former Rangers and Liverpool defender agreed a three-year deal at Tynecastle following a loan move last season.

It is believed Wilson, who has five Scotland caps, has taken a 50% wage cut on the contract he had previously agreed with the club, with Jamie Hamill, Jamie MacDonald and Ryan Stevenson having already agreed to reduced wages.

Meanwhile striker John Sutton has left the club after refusing to accept a pay cut, and has re-joined former club Motherwell.

Hibs will face a trip to Ireland or Sweden after being drawn against the winners of Drogheda United and Malmo FF, in the second qualifying round of the Europa League.

The Easter Road side started the season with a 1-1 draw in the friendly against Ian Murray's Dumbarton at the Bet Butler Stadium.

Pat Fenlon handed three players their first start in the green and white jersey, teenage defender Bradley Donaldson took the right back spot, whilst summer singings Owain Tudor-Jones who joined the club from Inverness Caledonian Thistle and Liam Craig who joined from St Johnstone started in midfield.

After a goal-less first half, Hibs took the lead five minutes after the break through Alex Harris, when the teenage winger was put through and his shot deflected off Dumbarton keeper Ewings before ending up in the back of the unguarded net. The Sons of the Rock equalised immediately through Ally McKerracher after the defence failed to deal with a low cross.

Hibs then created several good chances through Handling, Robertson, Craig, McPake and substitute Sam Stanton whose late shot clipped the crossbar, but the game ended all square.

Edinburgh trams company predict profitability

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The tram service is predicted to run at a surplus over fifteen years following recent news coverage that suggests otherwise, according to the council.

The BBC ran an article earlier this week which suggested that the trams will run at a loss over the fifteen years, but this is now disputed. The Council has set out a fifteen year business model which integrates the finances of Lothian buses and the tram service as part of a new transport company for Edinburgh.When revenue and operating expenditure is taken into consideration, Council would draw a surplus of £5m over 15 years. The tram on its own is forecast to run with a £48m operating surplus. Maintenance and refurbishment costs for the tram system (totalling £87m and which aren't part of operating costs) would be covered by surplus income from the tram (£48M), through the dividend paid to the council by Lothian Buses (£30m), a dividend from tram operation (£3m) and through other funding which totals £11m. Other funding may be achieved through tax savings and through additional income generation such as advertising.

Transport Convener Lesley Hinds said:

"These figures are provisional but they stack up and, all things considered, Edinburgh's new transport company is predicted to deliver a surplus. Even on its own, the tram is predicted to deliver an operating surplus. The tram and bus service will be fully integrated, with tickets, timetabling and everything else being delivered through one system — this is the same for the finances. Under one company both services need to operate together.

"We've already committed that tram will have no negative financial impact on the bus service and, although the arrangements are still in draft form, we'll ensure that any dividend drawn from income will go back into Edinburgh's transport system.

"Whilst this business model and all predictions have been and continue to be verified externally, it's important to remember that they are still predictions. The Council will bear the financial risk so I'm determined that numbers are closely and continuously scrutinised as we move towards service."

The full council <u>report</u> can be found on the Council's web

pages. It was considered only briefly at a meeting of the Full Council on Thursday 27 June 2013. A further report will be presented to Council on 22 August to confirm arrangements once further financial due diligence has been carried out. We ran a report on the trams earlier in the week.

Four years ago Bob Golding was the talk of the Fringe with his stunning performance of the late great Eric Morecambe in Morecambe by Tim Whitnall. After winning a Fringe First and unanimous critical praise, the play was whisked off to run in the West End where it won the Olivier Award for Best Entertainment and an Olivier nomination for Best Actor. It was the dream Edinburgh Fringe success.

Returning to the festival for the first time since, Bob

Golding makes his directorial debut with the world premiere of No Direction by Albert Welling.

Two men embark on a task together. They need direction but neither is taking control and, as is inevitable when a pair of followers occupy the same space, they are going round in circles. However one of them seems to be running out of steam while the other has grand dreams to pursue and there is a fair chance they could both get horribly lost unless they sort themselves out quickly. Waiting for Godot meets Sleuth with twists and turns at every junction. No Direction is a switchback ride comedy about friendship, loyalty and two headless men in a muddle.

No Direction stars Ronnie Toms, who was last seen in Edinburgh in Tim Whitnall's The Sociable Plover in 2009, and the play's writer Albert Welling, who recently played The Fuhrer himself in the Doctor Who episode Let's Kill Hitler.

Albert started his career in repertory theatre with seasons at the Royal Shakespeare Company and the Young Vic. He has since worked in theatre, film and TV for nearly 40 years. More recently he played Adolf Hitler in Doctor Who (episode, Let's Kill Hitler). He was Mr Waring in Ricky Gervais and Stephen Merchant's critically acclaimed feature film Cemetery Junction. The boys are back in town! New Art Club (aka Tom Roden and Pete Shenton) return to Edinburgh after a two-year gap and this time they're serious. Well, not exactly serious but they will be tackling a serious subject with their satisfying mix of puerile, emotional and intellectual chatter ... along with some moving about.

Feel About Your Body strips down to the basics, laying bare how we all feel about the one thing that's with us all the way from the cradle to the grave. Worshipped, revered, adorned, abused, laughed at, pampered, pierced, poked and occasionally rubbed lovingly with oil, the human body is truly an object of wonder. Of course, the show's title has a double meaning – it's sexy AND intellectual and very very silly.

During the course of this pulsating, visceral and flesh-filled hour, a man will talk to his bottom, bits will bounce and

bellies will be bared. There will also be some invaluable advice on what not to do during a heart attack – Pete should know, he had one in his early thirties when his partner was eight months pregnant. All this comes with a warning – in tests eight out of ten audience members were left feeling "a little bit dirty". There will be some brief nudity (long enough to see 'the works'), some brief dancing (silly and emotional) and some puerile songs (there's a good one about a shed).

The Seer is the first play created by a brand-new, all-star, international group of artists calling themselves Penn Dixie Productions. This devised comic-melodrama about the infamous life and artistic suicide of Arthur Rimbaud will be playing at Underbelly, Cowgate (Belly Button) at 22:30 from August 1-25th.

Though Penn Dixie's ensemble were born in disparate nations (Brazil, Argentina, France, UK, Sweden, Norway, and the USA), these collaborators were destined to grow up and meet at the London International School of Performing Arts (LISPA) in 2008, where they were commanded to begin devising and got the hell down to it.

Two years later, led by Philadelphia-based writer-director Anisa George, they emerged with their first full-length work — The Seer. "We were attracted to work with Rimbaud's story, because of his famous renunciation of art." Considered by many to be the founder of modern European poetry, Arthur Rimbaud wrote all of his poems before the age of twenty, then quit writing and ran away to Yemen to make his fortune as a coffee trader. George discovered Rimbaud's story during her own period of renunciation in Yemen, where she studied Arabic. "We've all felt the temptation to quit art-making," says George, who sold all her hair for \$1,000 to raise money for Penn Dixie's run at the Fringe. "Theatre can be a very sacrificial art form, and we've all asked ourselves at one time or another in our careers why we persevere. The show is an absurd and hilarious interrogation of those questions."

The Seer made ripples after a limited run at the The Philadelphia Fringe in 2011, where the newcomer's show was dubbed "pick of the Fringe" (Live Arts Blog). Quinn Bauriedel, co-artistic director of Pig Iron Theatre Company, called it "a rare achievement" and continued: "This group has a distinct and powerful voice." David Brick, coartistic director of Headlong Dance Theatre, said "The Seer created a bonfire of a play that does what only live performance can do."

If you love to laugh, and you long for a theatre which is arresting, inventive, and bold — then trip into this 'dark heaven' of hysterical and surreal tragedy. Babies dance, camels fly — all is abracadabrasque.

breath.

Drawing on her own experiences of living with obsessive compulsive disorder and anxiety, this intimate new solo show by Laura Jane Dean has been developed with the help of theatre-maker Chris Goode and explores the truths we tell, the fears we cling on to and what happens when we reveal our darkest thoughts.

In the back seat of a car an unassuming conversation takes dark and vicious root in the psyche of Laura Jane Dean. What we tell ourselves about the world, its simple probabilities and routine certainties, mortal dangers and not-so mortal dangers, melt away leaving Laura practicing head-hand-head coordination just to stay in the game. This complex, lyrical story journeys between interior dystopia and cool normality, exploring the things we need to stay sane.

Laura Jane Dean is a performer and theatre-maker. Graduating from the University of Kent in 2006, having developed a strong

stage persona, and a passion for testing the relationship between audience and performer, Laura became a member of Accidental Collective. Over four years she collaborated with the company to create a diverse portfolio of performances, encompassing stage, site specific and community work and performed nationally. Laura is now based in London and since 2011 has been making solo performances for small audiences.

Hibs unveil new summer signing Owain Tudor-Jones

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Hibs yesterday unveiled summer signing Owain Tudor-Jones ahead of their friendly against Ian Murray's Dumbarton at the Bet Butler Stadium which is closely followed by a pre-season trip to Portugal where they will play a Gibraltar XI and also Nottingham Forest.

The Easter Road side are still waiting to hear whether they will face League of Ireland side Drogheda United or former European Cup Finalists Malmo in the second qualifying round of this year's Europa League, and Tudor-Jones hopes to use the experience he gained as a youngster with Bangor to help them progress to the group stages.

He said: "My first European game was a EUFA Cup qualifier with Bangor I made about five appearances in my four years with Bangor, so playing in Europe and having that taste between the ages of 17 and 20 when they happened so it was definitely an eye opener. It doesn't matter if the opponents are well known or not. It's a different way of playing the game, certainly different from the Welsh League and I certainly learned a lot from playing against some good players

"The first team we played was in the old Yugoslavia – Sartid Smederevo – and then we faced Gloria 1922 Bistrita from Romania and we also went to Latvia. When you play a team from another country it's great, something really different to what you are used to.

"We thought that we had done well, but what we didn't realise is that these teams tend to send out their reserve teams over to Wales so their star players don't get injured, then their top boys come back for the return game. That was an eye opener for sure and I remember getting bamboozled a couple of times by different players.

"When you look back now you are glad for the experience and hopefully that will help me along the way for the next few weeks."

The Welsh international is keen to get to know his new teammates after a brief break which included a trip across the Atlantic.

"It's been a short summer for myself and even shorter for the boys who were here already. It's good to get down to business and get to know the lads, as when you sign for a new club it's just like being a new boy in school for a few days.

"I got married over the summer, so it's been quite hectic with the stag doo and honeymoon and now all focus gets back to football. We had a week in Los Angeles which was nice but hectic, so perhaps I should have chosen somewhere a bit more relaxing."

With Rangers playing in the third tier of Scottish football, the Edinburgh derby is seen as the biggest in the country, and with Hearts currently in administration, this year's fixtures take on an added significance, and once again, Tudor Jones' experience in Wales should hopefully stand him in good stead. "I've played in a couple of derbies. Last season was obviously the first highland derby in the SPL and Swansea Cardiff as well. They are exciting games to play in, but there's no point in us beating Hearts three or four times a season but being inconsistent against the other sides.

"There was only one Swansea Cardiff game that I played in which was a 2-2 draw so it wasn't too bad. This season the derby is the second game so I we don't have to wait too long and there should be a bit of extra bite in that one."

Five things you need to know today

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Armed Forces Day – Throw away your plastic bags! – Edinburgh Airport looking forward to a busy weekend – Best of the Film Festival – New at the National Library of Scotland

Edinburgh is gearing up for a packed day of events today in West Princes Street Gardens as Armed Forces Day celebrations kick-off around the country.

Celebrations will start from 1pm as the annual parade of veterans and cadets will move off from the Grassmarket along to the Ross Theatre in Princes Street Gardens.

A variety of different events will then be hosted in the gardens until 5pm. Highlights include a flypast by two Royal Air Force Typhoons, entertainment from acts such as the <u>Porkpie Band</u> and the Pipe Band of the Royal Highland Fusiliers of Canada, as well as military vehicles and bouncy castles.

Music, events and displays will last throughout the day and round off at 5:00pm with the Ceremony of Beating Retreat.

Deputy Lord Provost, Councillor Deidre Brock, said: "Here in Edinburgh we're looking forward to welcoming hundreds of veterans, their families and many others to Princes Street Gardens for an event that will celebrate these men and women's dedication to duty.

"This city has a long and proud tradition of supporting the Armed Forces. Our military service personnel and veterans deserve recognition and respect for the sacrifices they make day in and day out . Holding a day of celebration in their honour is just one of the ways the people of Edinburgh can thank them."

<u>Armed Forces Day</u> is the annual, UK wide campaign that allows everyone to show their support for the men and women of the Armed Forces past and present, including currently serving troops, Service families, Reservists, veterans and cadets.

Similar events have been taking place across the UK, enabling people to come out and show their support, and giving a muchvalued morale boost for Armed Forces personnel and their families. This year's main UK event took place in Nottingham.

The UK Armed Forces defend the UK and its interests. Every day of the year they are busy working around the world, promoting peace, delivering aid, tackling drug smugglers, providing security and fighting terrorism.

The Scottish Government have taken a step forward in the quest to rid our rubbish bins and our seas of the plastic bag.

By 2014 Scottish retailers will charge a minimum of 5p per bag in a bid to reduce carrier bag use.

Environment Secretary Richard Lochhead announced the move yesterday which follows a consultation that was held last year to gauge public opinion. He said shoppers would be encouraged to reuse carrier bags to cut down on the 750 million bags used in Scotland each year.

Regulations will be introduced in the Scottish Parliament in time for businesses to start charging by October 2014.

Other countries have already implemented a similar charge.

Environment Secretary Richard Lochhead said:- "Discarded

carrier bags highlight our throwaway society. We use more carrier bags per head in Scotland than any other part of the UK and this is unsustainable.

"Carrier bags are a highly visible aspect of litter and we are taking decisive action to decrease their number. By reducing the amount being carelessly discarded we can cut litter and its impact on our environment and economy. A small charge should also encourage us all to stop and think about what we discard and what can be re-used.

"We have seen elsewhere that carrier bag charging has been effective in encouraging people to reuse bags. This charge is not a tax but will see retailers donating the proceeds to charity — this could be up to £5 million per year after retailers have covered their costs.

"Thousands of Scottish people already use bags for life and some retailers already charge. It is now time, however, for a national effort."

Iain Gulland, Director, Zero Waste Scotland, said:

"Zero Waste Scotland supports initiatives that tackle litter and help achieve a zero waste society, so we welcome the Scottish Government's decision to implement a levy on single use bags.

"We can all reduce the impact of carrier bags by making sure that when we must take one, we re-use it over and over again as many times as possible and then recycle it at the end of its life.

"Encouraging the reuse of carrier bags will complement wider action to tackle litter, which will be published later this summer. Moves to cut litter on land, in the sea and river systems will be set out as strategies for consultation."

The scheme is subject to Scottish Parliament approval of

regulations. It is intended to take effect from October 2014.

- Retailers will be required to charge at least 5p for single-use bags.
- This is not a tax retailers would be expected to donate net proceeds to good causes.
- The charge will apply to single use bags of any material, not just plastic.
- All retailers will be required to charge, not just supermarkets, however smaller businesses will be exempt from the requirement to report centrally the numbers of bags sold and how much they have given to charity to minimise administrative burdens. These businesses will be expected to make some form of public statement of this information on their premises such as a poster for customers to see.
- Some types of bags will be exempt, mainly for health and safety reasons and privacy such as bags for prescriptions, certain fresh foods (including fruit, unpackaged meat of or fish) and unpackaged blades. The details of which bags should be exempted will be worked out finalised in discussion with stakeholders to ensure the system is effective.

The Marine Conservation Society (MCS) says the Scottish Government should be congratulated for taking a major step in tackling a problem that blights our towns and countryside alike, and which causes so much harm to our marine wildlife.

A 5p charge for single-use carrier bags in Scotland will begin in October 2014. Scotland follows in the footsteps of Wales and Northern Ireland. Westminster had indicated it was waiting to see the outcome of the Scottish consultation which was held earlier this year — up until now the coalition government has rejected calls for a levy saying cost on all sides was an issue.

Anne Saunders, MCS Projects Officer, based in Edinburgh says

the charity is delighted: "We look forward to seeing the results in Scotland following the great example that has been set in Wales and in Northern Ireland and a 5p charge on all single-use carrier bags, regardless of the material they are made from is a really encouraging step forward. In just one year the Welsh levy has reduced the consumption of single-use carrier bags by up to 80%."

Anne Saunders says the implementation of the charge next year will reduce harmful litter on our beaches and in our seas, and will prevent many wildlife entanglements and choking deaths.

"We have strong evidence that turtles and other sea creatures mistake plastic bags for food like jellyfish. They eat them and then die a painful death from choking or stomach blockages. Gulls are regularly seen eating bags looking for the food they once carried, and many other animals are known to consume plastic bags accidentally."
