Coronation Meadows is a project to mark the 60th anniversary of HM The Queen's coronation in 1953. It is the brainchild of HRH The Prince of Wales.

In Scotland we have a few meadows, but none in Edinburgh itself. The nearest is at St Abb's Head and this is what the [Coronation Meadows website](#) says about it:- "Cradled in in a rugged landscape – formed by volcanoes 400 million years ago – lies one of the best examples of a maritime grassland in Scotland. In early summer the meadow is full of flowers: rock-rose mixes with wild thyme, attracting the rare Northern Brown Argus butterfly, who eats the former as caterpillars and drinks the latter for nectar. St Abb's Head is also a major stop-off site for migrant seabirds and thousands can be seen nesting on the cliffs hereabouts. The site is named after St. Ebba, who in 6th century, established a chapel in area."

Hearts Football Club are in a bad financial position. This is not surprising at all given the state of many clubs across Scotland and England. The board issued a statement earlier in the week, and the club has appealed to all supporters to buy a season ticket to help assure the club's future.

Due to recent unexpected circumstances away from Tynecastle, the club is now experiencing a shortfall in funding. This shortfall, due to recent uncertainty, has created a significant noticeable blockage in projected revenue streams for the club.

While this hesitation is understandable it is unwittingly damaging the club's current efforts to improve its financial situation including current payments to HMRC and raising

doubts over future payments to players and staff.

It is now crucial to the football club that we find a solution to bring in enough finance to allow us to trade into the new season when normal trading can resume with the benefit of SPL and game-related income streams. The payments to HMRC and players/staff salaries are the most important issues in our focus these days where very limited time remains available to the club.

However given that the revenues for season tickets has dried up and no other realistic income is available quickly enough, the club will consider offers for the players of the current squad, including the most promising talent in order for the most necessary and important payments to be made. The board had planned to bring income in through the sale of players while considering the financial forecast for next season but now this will need to happen much earlier in order to preserve the business. We understand that this will lead to significant on-field pressure but at all times we must consider the health of the club and preserve it for future generations.

We will adjust our expectations for the new season accordingly but will still be focused on the playing side of the business. Our financial deficit can, in part, be attributed to our worst league finish in over 30 years last season. This had a significant direct impact on the business. Other factors that hit revenues include the absence of Rangers Football Club from the SPL and significantly increased stadium costs particularly in relation to the Main Stand.

The biggest threat to the club at present however is hesitation and inaction. We hope that those supporters who have purposely held off will reconsider and make the decision to back the club in the best way possible in order that we can meet our targets.

Provided we can achieve security for the club, it is the view of the board that there is a viable strategy for the change of ownership to a willing buyer or investor.

The most difficult part in this is finding an agreement with the creditors, however we know that there is goodwill with Ukio Bankas, as demonstrated by the statement from the Ukio Bankas administrator yesterday. We also believe that UBIG remains supportive of Hearts.

We will be regularly updating you as the situation develops.

Craig Gowans Memorial Football Match on Sunday



The annual Craig Gowans Memorial football match will take place this Sunday between Hutchison Vale FC and a Celtic/Rangers Select, kick off 2:00pm.

The Memorial Fund was set up in the memory Craig, the young Falkirk footballer who was died on 8 July 2005, when a net catcher he was instructed to move during a training session

struck an overhead cable. The seventeen year old was only two weeks into his professional contract with the Bairns when the tragedy occurred.

As well as being a talented footballer, Craig was a straight A pupil and talented artist at Stewart's Melville College, where he won the School's Athletic Championship. He also had an unconditional offer to study Architecture at Edinburgh College of Art, but chose a career in football.

This is the fifth such game, with all money raised going to the fund in Craig's name, which to date has raised thousands of pounds for good causes.



Former Celtic stars, Darren Jackson, Simon Donnelley, David Elliot, Jackie McNamara, John Hughes and Mark Burchill will team up with former rivals from Rangers, Ronnie Yule, Scott Nisbet, Bob Malcolm, Charlie Miller, Dougie Bell, and John MacDonald. Former Hibs defender Steven Tweed and midfielder David Farrell will make up the numbers.

Gordon Parks Daily Record Sports Journalist, Mark Martin Forth One Presenter, Ian Maxwell General Manager Partick Thistle, David Bailey Forth One Presenter, will also make an appearance, along with Craig's brothers Dean and Darren who will play for Craig's old team Hutchison Vale.



Last year's game, which involved a Hibs / Hearts select, along with runners in the Edinburgh marathon raised £6317.77 for the Sick Kids Friends Foundation.

Last November, The Edinburgh Reporter highlighted the generosity of the charity when members of Craig's family handed over the keys to a specially adapted minibus to be used by the children of Calareidh, a community-based house situated

in Bingham which provides long term care and respite breaks to children and young people with complex disabilities across Edinburgh and the Lothians.

Craig's father John told The Edinburgh Reporter: "The day starts with a kids tournament about 10-10.30am which finishes about 1pm. The Stewarts Melville Pipe Band will then make an appearance, and Chaplin's Disco Bus will also be there. This is the fifth year and we are hoping for a big turn-out. We are always a bit apprehensive in advance but hopefully the weather will be fine. All money raised will go to the Friends of the Sick Kids Foundation and last year we helped buy a minibus for Calareidh. It keeps Craig's name to the fore, and he is always at the front of our thoughts."

The first Edinburgh Festival of Cycling starts in earnest today. Running from 15- 23 June, the Edinburgh Festival of Cycling boasts a packed calendar of events from exhibitions,

films and talks, to rides and races, workshops and the world's first cycling poetry slam, [Bike Slam](#).

[Heels on Wheels](#), a 'Ladies day' of cycling, will be held at The Meadows on Saturday 22 June from 11am to 3pm and aims to be a fun and educational event for the whole family. This event is free and all are welcome.

Copenhagen's bicycle ambassador, [Mikael Colville-Andersen](#), will give a talk on "[Bicycle Culture by Design](#)" on Saturday 15 June in the Assembly Hall, Mound Place at 7.30pm. Tickets are £15 (£13 concessions).

In 'The Fastest Woman to Cycle Around the World', [Juliana Buhring](#) will give a talk about setting the first women's world record for fastest circumnavigation of the world by bicycle, which she achieved in just 152 days, finishing in December 2012. This talk will be at 7.30pm on Saturday 22 June at George Square Lecture Theatre – tickets are £12 (£10 concessions).

The Council has provided £8,000 in funding, as well as advice and support to the organisers of the Edinburgh Festival of Cycling.

✘ Councillor Jim Orr, Vice Convener of Transport and Environment, said: "There is so much to do, see and hear in this exciting festival programme – I would encourage anyone with an interest in bikes to check it out, you never know what you'll discover. It's not just for cycling enthusiasts, either – there are plenty of events for families and for people who don't already cycle but are keen to take it up.

"Having just been on an inspirational visit to Amsterdam, where cycling is such an intrinsic part of urban life (half of all journeys in the city centre are by bike), I'm very keen to build on Edinburgh's already-established reputation as [a cycling city](#). Events like this terrific Festival of Cycling are exactly the kind of collaborative, forward-looking

initiatives which will help us do just that.”

Kim Harding, Festival Director, said: “We set out with the aim of creating a real Edinburgh-style festival, something that would act as a showcase for all aspects of bicycle culture and the host city. From rides (sporty and otherwise) to family activities to a range of cultural events, we hope that the Edinburgh Festival of Cycling will truly have something for everyone. Let the fun begin!”

The Council has committed 6% of its Transport budget to cycling, with current projects including the A90 cycle route from Haymarket to Forth Bridge and the resurfacing and widening of North Meadow Walk.

The Queen’s Birthday Honours List is published today, and includes honours for Adele and Claire Balding along with others involved in last year’s Olympics and Paralympics.

Among the notable Scottish recipients is Stephen House the Chief Constable of Police Scotland who has been knighted for services to Law and Order and Sir Menzies Campbell MP for North East Fife, who is made a member of the Order of the Companions of Honour. Major Nicholas Abram of the Royal Regiment of Scotland has been awarded an MBE. Richard Findlay chairman of STV Group has been awarded a CBE along with Professor Alison McLeod of Aberdeen University, journalist Allan Massie and Professor Hugh Pennington of Aberdeen University.

In Edinburgh, Jonathan Mills the outgoing Director of the Edinburgh International Festival has been knighted.

Christopher Gay the Senior Porter at Holyroodhouse and former Daily Cleaner, Mrs Alexandra MacMillan have both been awarded Silver Royal Victorian Medals. Professor John Dixon a surgeon at the Western General has been awarded an OBE for services to the treatment of breast cancer and also for charitable


services. Mrs Maureen Garvie lately the Principal Estates Surveyor for the Scottish Government is also to receive an OBE. Irene Hogg manager of the Loanhead After School Club gets an MBE for services to children and families in the Midlothian community.

David McLetchie Conservative MSP for Lothian has been awarded an MBE.

Christie Smith who headed up the reform of the emergency services in Scotland, and John Smith who was Chief Constable in Central Scotland Police have been awarded an MBE.

 [Councillor Cameron Rose has alerted us to the news that the Royal Blind School in Craigmillar has been put on the market for sale.](#)

The Royal Blind School's Craigmillar Park Campus is being sold as part of a move to merge two campuses into one. By Autumn 2014 all pupils at the Royal Blind School will be relocating to the campus at Canaan Lane in Morningside, which is being refurbished to accommodate the changes over the coming year.

Two of the school's campuses are being merged as part of a longer term strategy to become even more specialised in educating and supporting children with a visual impairment, including those who also have social, emotional and behavioural difficulties, autistic spectrum disorders, motor or learning disabilities. The School is also establishing a national education resource centre for visual impairment,

which will provide support to visually impaired pupils in schools across Scotland through pupil assessment, advice and training for the education sector.

Today's photo is from the gallery of photos provided by the council to show the work done in laying new Caithness paving slabs on Constitution Street recently. Work there is ongoing and will follow this schedule:-

Section 12 (Coatfield Lane to Bernard Street)

Work is due to commence on Monday 17 June in the final section of Constitution Street (Coatfield Lane to Bernard Street) and is scheduled for completion on 16 August. The first part of the work will be concentrated in the Coatfield Lane to Queen Charlotte Street section. The works will include:

the complete resurfacing of the road

completely new pavements (Caithness natural stone slabs will be installed on both sides of the street from Bernard Street to Queen Charlotte Street)

the partial widening of the pavement on the western side of the street from Maritime Lane northwards

new build outs at Mitchell Street

evaluation of four sites to determine their feasibility for accommodating new trees

Section 11 (Foot of the Walk to Coatfield Lane) site completion

This section has undergone a complete road and pavement resurface and improvements to the cycle Advanced Stop Lines (ASLs) and lead in lane at the Foot of the Walk junction. Work commenced here on 29 April and will be completed by Monday 17

June and fully re-opened to all traffic.

Section 12 (Old Dock Gates to Bernard Street) site completion

This section has undergone a complete pavement resurface including the installation of Caithness slabs at the junction with Bernard Street. Partial re-setting of the carriageway is also being carried out in preparation for the installation of new trees in planters on the locations of the former tree pits. Work on this section is due for completion during week commencing 17 June.

International Women's Hockey – Scotland v South Africa



Scotland stun visiting South Africans

With the South African women's hockey team some eight places above Scotland in the World' Ranking, it looked again as if they would be playing catch-up to the visitors. The match did not go by the script, however, and the home side took the first of four encounters at Peffermill three goals to two.

They had to be on the ball from the start as the visitors went on the offensive from the off, and some desperate defending by the Scots in the first 10 minutes of the match. However, the first proper chance of the match fell to Scotland, but the break away upfield left Nikki Lloyd surrounded by defenders and unable to get her shot on target. Another period

of attacking from the South African's had a bouncing ball, from a shot by (World Record holder in almost every hockey statistic) Pietie Coetzee, cleared off the line.

Five minutes later and another break from Scotland, this time up the left, saw an inside ball from Heather Elder find Ali Howie on the 25 and she took the ball up into the 'D' where her deflected shot spun up past the goalkeeper and into the net. 1-0 to the Scots girls.

The rest of the half – or nearly so – was dominated by the visitors, getting into the shooting area on four or five occasions and only some inspired saves by 'keeper Amy Gibson kept them at bay.

✖ With less than two minutes to go in the half, following a fluffed penalty corner attempt by Coetzee, Scotland were off again, this time up the right hand side. Nikki Lloyd took the ball half the length of the pitch and into the 'D' where she found a gap in the defence to strike. The 'keeper half saved, but Morag McLellan was on hand to tap the ball into the goal to leave the home side 2-0 ahead at the hooter.

Again, from the off, South Africa went on the offensive and took the game to the home side, but the Scots weren't long in taking it back. Four minutes in and a penalty corner, awarded when Vikki Bunce was tripped in the area, had the strike from Kidd blocked. The game flowed to-and-fro with both sides having chances but failing to convert, before the visitors were awarded a penalty corner for obstruction 13 minutes in. This time there was no mistake and the shot from Coetzee was blasted past the flailing stick of Emily Maguire and into the bottom corner of the goal. 2-1 to Scotland.

The next ten minutes were all South Africa – apart from a brief foray by the Scots – as they tried to pull level, Gibson pulling another two fine saves out of the bag to keep them in second place.

Then it looked as if the home side had another goal on the board, but the cross-goal shot by Kidd rattled off the post with the 'keeper rooted to the spot.

It only took another two minutes for Kidd to finally get on the scoresheet with a fine reverse stick shot which had the South African 'keeper well beaten. 3-1 up against the team who were 10th in the 2012 Olympics was a tremendous boost to the the Scots girls who, only this year, went full time for a trial period. Was it working? It seemed to be up to now...

✖ For the last ten minutes, South Africa piled on the pressure, with Scotland barely seeing the ball. And it was to be Coetzee who scored again. Another penalty corner award saw the South African drag flick the ball past the 'keeper to notch up her gazillionth goal on the World scene and her second in this match. 3-2 with minutes to go... The last few minutes were a bit frantic with Scotland trying to hold the ball and South Africa trying to prevent them, so it was a tremendous relief all round when the final hooter went to give the Scots a historic win against their Southern Hemisphere opponents.

With the first of a four match series in the bag, the Scotland team can now look forward to the other three games with a high level of confidence, but, the cynics might be tempted to say the South Africa were not long off the grueling flight, so maybe weren't quite in the groove just yet. We'll see...

Racing on Saturday at Musselburgh aiming high

The dream of building the William Hill Scottish Sprint Cup in to a £100,000 race may seem fanciful but no one can accuse the team at Musselburgh Racecourse of lacking ambition.

Boss Bill Farnsworth takes the first step towards that goal today by giving the five furlong contest its own berth, moving from its traditional slot in the course's annual sell-out Stobo Castle Ladies Day fixture.

With a £75,000 prize in the feature race and total prize money of £155,000 there is no lack of interest in the meeting and having recovered from yesterday's fashion extravaganza, the East Lothian track welcomes some cracking entries from the leading stables.

Bill Farnsworth said: "The Scottish Sprint Cup has always had a good following and it seemed the natural thing to do to take it out of Ladies Day and give it its own berth. There is a bit of a buzz about the race and while it won't happen overnight, we aim to build on that popularity in the next few years, to firmly establish the race as the UK's richest five furlong sprint."

A maximum field of 20 go to post for William Hill Scottish Sprint (3.35) and popular Musselburgh course specialist Hamish McGonagall is sure to give his many supporters another exciting run but Tim Easterby's brave sprinter has it all to do under his welter burden.

Ledbury trainer Ed de Giles sends Kingsgate Choice on the long journey north from Herefordshire and his recent victory over York Glory at York arguably brings the best form to the race. Kingsgate Choice makes plenty of appeal but the northern duo of David Barron's Bosun Breese and the Jim Goldie trained Rothesay Chancer should not be ignored.

The pair fought out a photo-finish to a competitive 5f dash at the last Musselburgh meeting with the Goldie hotpot snatching the verdict in the final stride. Rothesay Chancer will be bidding for a fifth course win and Graham Lee will again be in the saddle.

The William Hill sponsored programme gets underway at 1.55 with the William Hill Download the App 5f Handicap in which Paul Midgley's course winner Oldjoesaid is set to carry top-weight.

In what is sure to be a fast run race, his task is not impossible but the front running Lost In Paris, himself a previous course and distance winner, remains on a favourable mark. Tim Easterby's charge recently made all to score a shade cosily at Catterick and his positive style of racing could provide the answer to a competitive handicap.

The £20,000 Class 2 William Hill – New iPad Handicap over 7f (4.10) could see Graham Lee complete a quick double, this time on the Mark Johnston trained Es Que Love whose forcing tactics will be well suited to the tight Musselburgh terrain.

The horse to follow here though could be Set The Trend and although David O' Meara's classy handicapper disappointed at York in May, this is a slight drop in grade and he is fancied to come with a strong late run to pinch the spoils.

Police appeal for help in tracing missing student



Police Scotland is appealing for information in tracing a Russian student who has been missing from her address in the capital for a week.

Twenty – two year old Yulia Solodyankina, who has been studying physics at Edinburgh University, was last seen at the Wee Red Bar in Lady Lawson Street on June 7.

Yulia, who speaks fluent English, albeit it with a strong Russian accent, is of medium build with long dark brown hair. She is about 5ft 6ins in height and has a small mole on her left cheek. Her ears are pierced and she wears a number of rings on her fingers, in particular a distinctive thumb ring which is shaped like a small spoon.

When last seen Yulia was wearing a dark jacket, dark trousers, white trainers and carrying a large dark coloured rucksack which appeared to be full.

Inspector Barry Darling, of Police Scotland Edinburgh Division, said:- “We know that Yulia enjoys music and dance

and it may be the case that she is at one of the many festivals which take place across the country at this time of year. We appeal to Yulia or anyone who has seen her in the past week to make contact with the Police to let us know she is safe and well.”

Corstorphine Hill murder – police update



Detectives investigating the murder of a middle-aged woman whose remains were found in an Edinburgh nature reserve are still looking for help to identify her.

Detective Chief Inspector Keith Hardie, who is leading the enquiry, said:- “I am really pleased with the response from the public and we have received a lot of useful information.

“However I am still awaiting that one elusive phone call which will provide the vital clue which will assist us to put a name to this woman.

“We are receiving calls and information from across the UK and it is all being assessed and followed up, however, as yet, we have not been given the crucial piece of information which will tell us who she is.”

The woman was believed to have been aged between 32 and 60 and

had had extensive cosmetic work, in the form of veneers, carried out on her teeth. She was white, slim and of medium build and about 5ft 2ins tall.

Forensic examination of four rings belonging to the woman continues. Two of the rings stand out – one in the shape of a daisy and one in the shape of a love heart. Both are made of gold and are set with precious stones.

DCI Hardie added:- “I hope that a combination of the description of the woman, her rings and an appeal for any woman who has not been seen any time in the past six months will strike a chord with people.”

The enquiry team has also received a lot of useful information about people seen on Corstorphine Hill with big rucksacks and carriers in which the dismembered remains may have been transported and implements which could be used for digging.

Chief Inspector Murray Dykes, of Police Scotland Edinburgh Division, said: “High visibility patrols continue on Corstorphine Hill and the surrounding area and members of the public are encouraged to approach these officers if they have any information they want to bring to our attention.”

Forth Road Bridge Unicycle Challenge

Some ambassadors decide to plant trees, some visit other schools and spread the word. Brianna decided she would like to unicycle across the Forth Road Bridge as a fundraising activity.

The Plant-for-the-Planet Children's Initiative began in January 2007, originating from a school report on the climate crisis by Felix Finkbeiner, then 9 years old. At the end of his presentation, Felix put forward the vision that children could plant one million trees in every country in the world to balance carbon emissions. In the years since, Plant-for-the-Planet has evolved into a global movement with thousands of committed children across the world – world citizens committed to climate justice by achieving an overall reduction of greenhouse gas emissions and a unified distribution of these emissions among all of humankind.

Plant-for-the-Planet has had a democratic structure since March 2011. It has two elected Global Boards, one for children aged 8-14, and one for youth aged 15-21; each consists of 14 children with representatives from eight world regions.

Since taking over responsibility for the Billion Tree Campaign from UNEP in 2011, the children have set themselves a new goal of planting 1,000 billion trees worldwide by 2020. With such a giant CO2 storage facility, 10 billion tons of CO2 could be offset, buying us valuable time to permanently reduce our CO2 emission. We will meet our goal if every global citizen plants 150 trees. So far, over 12 billion trees have been planted across 193 countries. In the United Kingdom Plant-for-the-Planet collaborates closely with the Woodland Trust.

Mull



The Mendelssohn on Mull Festival will be celebrating 25 years of musical performance this year. This free festival of chamber music takes place between 1-6 July 2013 on the island of Mull and offers an opportunity for the young musicians taking part and music lovers alike.

The musicians are invited by artistic director Levon Chilingiran, a professor at the Royal College of Music, in London. They perform in various venues, such as the tiny Creich Church seating 50 or the grandeur of Duart Castle's Great Hall. For the young professionals, who this year will include some from Edinburgh, it is an important way to gain performance experience and hone skills with the mentorship of experienced chamber musicians, in a beautiful setting.

Participant and freelance musician, Jessica Hall, 23, from Edinburgh who plays violin, viola, clarinet and piano said: – "Living in Edinburgh was a fantastic place to enter the music profession. I was lucky enough to attend St Mary's Music School. The city was inspiring for me musically due to its festivals. Edinburgh also hosts an international festival of the arts every Easter where people will come from all over to compete. This was a very motivating thing to look forward to and work towards." She added:-“We did get a fair amount of younger audience last year and I think the fact that the musicians are made up of young people who are obviously passionate about music and having a fantastic time performing shows them a different side to classical music that they wouldn’t have previously experienced.”

As to who might enjoy attending the festival, Jessica said: – “I couldn’t recommend this festival enough. There is something for everyone. I strongly believe that even if you are not passionate about classical music witnessing such enjoyable concerts from such young players is an experience in itself. The location of the festival is incredible. The festival grows in size every year as people come and love it and recommend it to everyone they know.”

In conclusion she said: – “If you want a fantastic introduction to the world of classical music it’s perfect, and if you are somebody who already loves classical music then it’s the ideal venue to come and enjoy some performances of the highest quality.”

The festival is based on the island because the young composer Felix Mendelssohn made a life changing trip through Scotland to Mull, which inspired him to write ‘The Hebrides Overture,

Fingal's Cave' - one of his most famous pieces.

The young professionals are divided into three groups which workshop repertoire with experienced mentors. Jessica is in group 2.

This year's mentors are Levon Chilingirian, Gaby Lester, Susie Mészáros, Marcia Crayford, and Stephen Orton.

Police Appeal for witnesses after Taxi Driver Injured



Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses after a black cab taxi window was smashed as it was driven along Henderson Street on Thursday night.

The driver was injured when a stone was thrown at his vehicle just before 9pm on Thursday, causing a window to smash and showering the driver in shards of glass. It is believed that the stone was from within a group of young people in the Henderson Street park area and police are appealing for more

information.

A Police Scotland spokesperson said:- “This was an incredibly reckless act which resulted in a man being injured and his taxi being forced off the road. It is only luck that prevented this incident having even more serious consequences.

“We are keen to trace a group of young people, around the ages of 13-15, who were seen throwing stones at vehicles in the area. Anyone who remembers witnessing this behaviour or who saw the taxi being struck is asked to contact police immediately.

“Similarly, anyone with more information that can help officers with their enquiries is also asked to come forward. Although an isolated incident, it is vital that we find those responsible.”

Heated Exchanges on Question Time from Edinburgh



BBC One's political flagship debate show Question Time was broadcast from Edinburgh's Corn Exchange last night, in front of an audience of 16-17 year olds who will be able to vote for the first time on 18 September 2014.

The panellists included SNPs Angus Robertson, Labour's Anas Sarwar, Conservative leader Ruth Davidson and journalist Lesley Riddoch.

Controversially, UKIP leader Nigel Farage and Respect MP George Galloway who represents Bradford West, were also invited to appear despite having no apparent political mandate in Scotland. Thier appearance led to pro-independence campaigners protesting outside the Corn Exchange prior to the show.

First question fell to Kieren Fitzgerald who asked whether surveillance is an acceptable price for national security.

George Galloway argued strongly against it and called for a Nobel Prize for the whistle-blower whilst Anas Sarwar praised the work of the intelligence agencies but questioned William Hague's response to Parliament.

Ruth Davidson backed the work of GCHQ and insisted that the framework does not allow them to get round existing law then Lesley Riddoch questioned the role of Google in the USA. Angus Robertson was concerned about the storage of intelligence data and Nigel Farage urged people to be cautious on social media sites.

The subject then changed to independence and Fiona Murray asked what benefits would independence bring to young people in Scotland.

This sparked an angry exchange between Angus Robertson who protested about the make-up of the panel, with four anti-independence and only one pro-independence, while host David Dimbleby insisted that there was no BBC bias.

Angus Robertson then explained that in an independent Scotland, we would always have the government that we elect, there would be job creation and we could get rid of nuclear weapons.

Anas Sarwar countered that we need social and economic change and all should have equality of education throughout the UK, while Lesley Riddoch said that she wanted to live in a country

with no Trident, has equality of education and embraces renewables, so she will vote yes.

George Galloway then turned on Angus Robertson for his narrow-minded attitude regarding who should have been allowed on the panel and also criticised Alex Salmond's behaviour as unstatesmanlike after the recent incident involving the UKIP leader who was 'run out of town.' He demanded that everyone should have the right to speak.

Angus Robertson supported Alex Salmond and said that he defended the people's right to protest, but Nigel Farage also criticised the First Minister who supported the protestors who acted like 'yobs' when he came to have a debate in Edinburgh.

Ruth Davidson said that the people deserved answers, and pointed out that one in five jobs in the private sector were in companies with headquarters in England, Wales or Northern Ireland.

When David Dimbleby asked for the opinion of the audience, one teenager stated that he thought that Scottish independence would bring people one step closer to discovering aliens!!!

Nigel Farage said that independence would be like swapping masters from Westminster to Brussels. Lesley Riddoch stated that the UK was the most regionally imbalanced country in Europe and quoted figures which suggested that one in 29 people from London were dollar millionaires, a fact which George Galloway disputed as false as there is 'mass poverty and unemployment throughout the UK'.

Anas Sarwar demanded a debate based on fact and accused the SNP of not being straight with the people of Scotland.

Scott Mann then said that he felt that 16/17 year olds did not have enough experience to vote, but George Galloway, Angus Robertson, Lesley Riddoch and Anas Sarwar disagreed.

Ruth Davidson suggested that the current voting age of 18 should remain in place, and Nigel Farage said that lowering the age for one election was 'silly and cheap.'

Cameron Gilchrist then asked the panel whether the UK should intervene in Syria, which started an argument between Angus Robertson and George Galloway,

Angus Robertson blamed the President of Syria, but George Galloway pointed out that President Assad was prepared to negotiate and had been since the beginning then warned of the dangers of arming the opposition. He stated that the opposition should be forced to sit round the table.

Nigel Farage stated that since Blair's time, there appears to have been 'glee' about going to war and our history of interventions in the Middle East have not been successful so we should not get involved.

Lesley Riddoch pointed out that the population the size of Wales had been displaced and that the priority was dialogue. Meanwhile, Angus Robertson pointed out that the UK had armed the Taliban to fight the Soviet Union and said that we should not arm one side, although Russia was arming President Assad.

Last word went to Lesley Riddoch who stated that of the 93,000 killed so far, a high proportion were children.

The East Lothian track has recorded its ninth consecutive Ladies Day sell out and has even caught the eye of Grand National winning jockey Ryan Mania, who will help judge the day's Best Dressed Lady in the £3000 Queen of Style event.

Racing highlight at Musselburgh's most glamorous meeting of the summer is the £20,000 Stobo Castle Ladies Day Cup (4.00) and the weights are headed by the classy Mutual Regard, a welcome raider from the Newmarket stable of Sir Mark Prescott and a promising second to Johnnie Delta on his recent reappearance at Ayr.

Long distance traveller Street Entertainer is the likely favourite and David Pipe's versatile dual purpose stayer was an effortless winner back on the turf at Nottingham last Sunday and will make a bold bid to defy his 6lb penalty .

Street Entertainer though could be hard pressed by northern rivals Platinum from the in-form yard of Philip Kirby and the Jim Goldie trained Merchant Of Dubai. When the pair met at Musselburgh recently Platinum prevailed by one and three quarter lengths but he has to give away an extra 7lbs to Merchant Of Dubai this time round and Graham Lee's mount can reverse the placings.

Ladies Day sponsors Stobo Castle also support the Madeleine Cup Handicap (2.20) in which Mark Johnston's Mushaakis will be well fancied to boost the Middleham trainer's already healthy strike rate at the East Lothian venue.

A successful performer on the polytrack, Mushaakis returned to the turf to run an encouraging second behind Clock On Tower at Beverley. The going was on the soft side of good on that occasion and Joe Fanning's mount will be better suited to the faster conditions underfoot at Musselburgh.

M and F Funeral Services return to Musselburgh to sponsor the £8,000 5f sprint handicap at 3.25. Eric Alston's ultra-consistent Red Baron, runner up on his last four outings, will be fancied to finally go one better but course winner Mercers Row is narrowly preferred.

Trained in North Yorkshire by Karen Tutty and partnered by her daughter Gemma, only recently back riding after injury, Mercers Row regained form at Catterick last time with a creditable second behind the well handicapped Lost In Paris. Karen Tutty has saddled three winners over the past month and Mercers Row has the best draw in the number 11 slot.

As soon as the designer hats and frocks are packed away for another year, Musselburgh gets ready to do it all again

tomorrow (Saturday June 15) when it stages its richest meeting of the season, the £155,000 William Hill Scottish Sprint Cup.

The feature race, with an increased £70,000 prize, was traditionally part of Ladies Day but Musselburgh boss Bill Farnsworth is banking that a switch to a Saturday slot will create a crowd pleasing fixture which can evolve to be the UK's richest five furlong sprint.

He said: "Ladies Day is fun, fashion and furlongs and it's a formula which has worked very well for us and created a fixture which has a huge following. With the Scottish Sprint Cup our long term ambition is to develop it in to a £100,000 race which would make it the UK's premier five furlong event. It will take time but we are used to playing the long game at Musselburgh and I am confident we will succeed."

Police Investigate Bogus

Caller in Belgrave Gardens



Police in Edinburgh are appealing for information following a bogus caller incident that happened in the Belgrave area of the city on Monday 10 June 2013.

A man called at an address in Belgrave Gardens at around 12.30 and offered to clean the steps outside of the house. The male obtained money but, despite remaining in the area, failed to carry out any work.

The man is described as white, around 5ft 7ins – 5ft 8ins tall, medium build, Scottish accent, wearing yellow gloves with black dimples and possibly a yellow jacket.

Detective Constable Ben Leathes from Police Scotland said: “This was a callous deception of an elderly woman who reluctantly paid for work which wasn’t actually done. We are appealing for any information that can help us trace the man concerned.

“Anyone who recognises his description or who has received a similar approach at their own home in the last few days should contact police. It is likely that the man is using a vehicle between calls so anyone who has had suspicions around a vehicle in this area should also contact us.

“At this time we would advise anyone who receives an unsolicited call at their property by anyone offering to carry out maintenance work to refuse, unless they are absolutely certain of their credentials.

“Anyone with suspicions over the intentions of any cold caller should notify police immediately, by contacting Police Scotland on 101.”

Police happy with response from public



Detectives trying to identify the remains of a woman which were found on an Edinburgh nature reserve have thanked the public for their response to an appeal for information.

Part of the dismembered body of the middle-aged woman was uncovered on Corstorphine Hill in the capital a week ago and since then extensive forensic investigation has been undertaken.

The current main priority of the murder inquiry team, which is being led by Detective Chief Inspector Hardie, is to identify the woman who was white, middle aged, slim and of medium build and short in height.

The woman had also had a lot of cosmetic work carried out on her teeth.

DCI Hardie said: "Following an appeal for the assistance of the public in helping us identify this lady, we have received a lot of information. I am very pleased with the response we had had with a number of lines of inquiry now being looked into.

"People from across the UK have made contact with us and I appreciate the support we are getting from the public."

Detectives also recovered a number of rings belonging to the woman, two of which are distinctive. They are both gold in appearance and set with precious stones – one in the design of a daisy, the other heart shaped.

DCI Hardie added: “Until we identify her, I repeat my appeal for people to consider if there is a woman who fits this description whom they have not seen for a number of months – perhaps not this year. If you have concerns about such a woman, please come forward and let us know.”

In addition he is keen to hear from anyone who used Corstorphine Hill in the past six months to contact the Police if they may have seen anyone who could have been involved in depositing the body in popular recreational area – an individual or individuals carrying large rucksacks/backpacks and tools which could be used to dig a grave.

DCI Hardie also thanked the many people who use Corstorphine Hill for walking, cycling and leisure pursuits for their understanding and patience while the detailed forensic inquiries have been undertaken at the site.

“Our work on Corstorphine Hill is likely to be finished later today and the cordon will be removed at that time.”

Chief Inspector Murray Dykes, of Police Scotland Edinburgh Division, said:- “Although inquiries on the hill will soon be finished, my officers will still be carrying out high visibility patrols to reassure local residents and other members of the public. This is a highly unusual incident and Corstorphine, and Edinburgh, are safe places to live and work.

Here is some news about my new novel – The Hanging of Margaret Dickson – published by Thames River Press on 1 June 2013. I first came across this amazing story over ten years ago and made it a personal quest of mine to write a novel about her incredible life – and death!

I researched for this novel many, many years (travelling to Musselburgh, Edinburgh, Duddingston, National Archives etc.)

The novel tells the true tale of the Musselburgh fishwife, Maggie Dickson, who was hanged at the Grassmarket, Edinburgh, 1724.

In an age when women are expected to know their place, be submissive, dutiful and chaste, Maggie Dickson, a Musselburgh fishwife, is often in trouble. She's outspoken, promiscuous and vituperative. While her husband's at sea, she sells her fish, sleeps with men for pleasure or money and looks after her two children. In time, her husband abandons her. Maggie quits Musselburgh and heads for Newcastle to stay with relatives.

During the winter of 1723, a fisherman finds the dead, naked body of a baby boy. Fingers are soon pointing in the direction of a stranger working in a local tavern, a woman recently estranged from her mariner husband. It is rumoured that she's been having a passionate affair with the innkeeper's young son, William Bell, and that he is the father of the dead child.

Maggie is arrested and taken to Edinburgh tollbooth to await trial, is found guilty and is sentenced to death. The news spreads like wildfire and, as Maggie languishes in jail, the whole city speculates whether or not she killed her child. Will she take her secret to her grave?

Street Football Festival in Princes Street Gardens this weekend



The capital's football fans, looking for a quick 'fix' during the close season, have a feast of football to look forward to from Friday to Sunday.

The Edinburgh Street Football Festival will take place in the shadow of the castle, within the Ross Bandstand in Princes Street Gardens from 14-16 June 2013.

Eight Edinburgh primary schools, five U13 girls teams, six Edinburgh businesses and five Edinburgh youth projects will compete in four different tournaments coming together on finals day to play and celebrate together in their city.

Teams can be all male, all female or mixed consisting of a maximum of eight players in total. Maximum of four players per team on the court: Two halves of six minutes each plus one minute interval in between each half.

At least one player must remain in the opposition half of play. A foul will be awarded against a team where the whole team is in its own half and the referee can award a penalty against a team which is persistently time-wasting.

The winning team receives three points. The losing team zero. If a match ends in a draw, it is decided by a sudden-death penalty shoot-out until one team has a one goal advantage after both teams have taken the same number of penalty kicks.

In matches decided by a penalty shoot-out the winning team gets two points and the losing team gets one point.



Organiser Scott Moncrieff told The Edinburgh Reporter:- “This is the first of hopefully many such events throughout the country. Fans are advised to go to the grandstand which holds 230, plus there are blue seats to the side, taking the attendance up to around four hundred.

“We received funding from the Scottish Football Partnership and the National Lottery ‘Young Start’ Programme and our objective is to get youngsters involved in sport and healthier.

“We have received sponsorship from Sykes Global for this event, and receive money from the businesses taking part, with all funds raised going to the Homeless World Cup.

“On Sunday, a Hibs / Hearts select team, featuring Keith Wright, Michael Weir and Gordon Hunter from Hibs, and Henry Smith, Scott Crabbe and Jimmy Sandison from Hearts will play against local teams and hopefully boost the crowds.

Broughton Street

- Works to install overhead cables at the junction of Broughton Street and Picardy Place were carried out on the night of Monday 10 June, between the hours of 22:00 and 05:00.
- In order to carry out these works, the road junction will be closed during the hours of 22:00 and 05:00.
- Local traffic management arrangements will be installed, including a local traffic diversion route.

Princes Street

- Princes Street will be closed between the hours of 20:00 and 06:00 between South Charlotte Street and South St David Street during these cabling works:
- Tuesday 11 June to Friday 14 June: four nights, to install overhead cables
- Monday 17 June to Saturday 13 July: This is a four-week programme, with the contractors working four nights each week to install underground cables
- During the road closure times, services buses will be diverted along George Street.
- Every effort will be made to minimise any disruption to the local area.

In addition to the information about the above cabling works, a letter has also been sent to residents and businesses in **Morrison Street**, concerning essential works there to build a new signalised junction.

The Board of Directors of the Royal Bank of Scotland Group plc (RBS) has announced that Stephen Hester will be stepping down as the Group's Chief Executive later this year. The Board believes that an orderly succession process will give a new CEO time to prepare the privatisation process and to lead the bank in the years that follow. Stephen was unable to make that open-ended commitment following five years in the job already.

The search for a successor will commence immediately, led by Philip Hampton on behalf of the Board, and will consider both internal and external candidates. Stephen will continue to lead the business until December 2013 to ensure a smooth handover, unless a successor is in post before then.

Stephen was appointed to the Board in October 2008 and to the position of Group Chief Executive in November 2008. Since then he has led the rescue of RBS, its recovery plan and one of the largest and most complex company restructurings ever seen. Nearly five years into the strategic plan, RBS claims it has made huge progress in becoming a strong bank, with balance sheet and funding transformed and the business fundamentally re-shaped. It is now beginning to prepare for possible share sales by the UK Government. Accordingly, both the Board and Stephen agreed this provided a window to begin a transition of leadership.

Stephen Hester, CEO of RBS said: "It has been nearly five years since I joined RBS after the bank was rescued by the Government. In that time we have reduced the bank's balance sheet by nearly a trillion pounds, repaid hundreds of billions of taxpayer support, and removed the imminent threat that this bank's size and complexity posed to the UK economy. All the while we supported 30 million customers every day to help them manage their finances.

"We are now in a position where the Government can begin to prepare for privatising RBS. While leading that process would be the end of an incredible chapter for me, ideally for the company it should be led by someone at the beginning of their journey. I will therefore step down at the end of this year to allow a new CEO to lead the Group in this next stage. Over the coming months I will put all my effort into completing the final recovery and continuing to build a strong customer focused culture. I thank all of the people of RBS for their support and wish them all the best for the future."

Stephen Hester will receive remuneration on departure in accordance with his contract of £1.6m as payment in lieu of notice.

Councillor Jim Orr – Last day in Amsterdam



Councillor Jim Orr is the SNP councillor for Southside and Newington and is the Vice-Convenor of Transport and Environment. He has been blogging for us from Amsterdam this

week where he has been on a fact-finding trip. As a keen cyclist, he has been most interested in the way that the Dutch government has accommodated pedestrians and cyclists often to the exclusion of cars and vehicles. This is his final blog in the series.

Wednesday was the last day of our trip and I want to report up front that not only has our study tour been fascinating for all those of us interested in increasing cycling rates, but the quality of the organisation and hospitality by the “NL Agency” of the Ministry of Economic Affairs has been superb.

On behalf of the whole UK delegation I would like to thank our hosts Bregje and Marianna, not forgetting Tessel from the Dutch Embassy in London who turned my suggestion of a study trip into reality. Since arriving here all of our expenses have been met by the NL Agency which is also incredibly generous of them.



4 euros per hour to park your car near the inner ring road. The city centre is even more expensive.

Over the last few days I have tried to communicate through this blog the wonderful world of Dutch cycling culture and the benefits that it brings. But for UK politicians and decision-makers there really is no substitute for seeing this in person, and I would urge everyone: -Alex Salmond, David Cameron and Barack Obama, to contact the NL Agency and arrange a visit. The Dutch people we have met believe that “cycling has a higher return on investment than any other transport form” and that the “marginal commuter cost” is lowest for the cyclist. This theory is at least worth checking out since we as a society continue to encounter massive challenges around obesity and many forms of sustainability to name only two.

Today was based in and focused on Amsterdam. We had a “Google hangout” (i.e. a video conference) with the 2013 Parliamentary Bike Ride participants at Westminster and spoke to them about what we have learned. St Luke’s School in London were represented during this conference and asked questions.



We also learned about the (fairly punitive) car parking regulations in Amsterdam, a policy which is driven as much by lack of space in a small city as the policy of increasing cycling. The biggest current challenge is cycle parking and one solution is that barges are now used. Contrary to the impression I gave in my first blog post, I now know that theft remains a problem and estimates were provided that around 10% of all bikes are stolen each year.

Another excellent addition to active travel infrastructure is a 900m bridge which has been constructed for pedestrians and cyclists to an island in east Amsterdam. It is the largest such bridge in the country, and yet, even with all of this investment the figures still show that cycling and walking are the cheapest transport modes to support.

We had a further lecture on safety (including some great school safety videos such as “Between school and home”). This focuses on areas familiar to the children where accidents are most likely. HGVs are generally only permitted at certain times and cannot (as I understand) enter the “Environment zone” in the centre.

We had an excellent talk from the very wise and entertaining Mr Eric Wiebes the Alderman for Traffic, Transport and Infrastructure in Amsterdam. He told us that public transport subsidy is still 2.5 times the cycling investment. He also explained the “marginal commuter cost” as mentioned above. I understand this is the calculated estimate of extra cost for each additional cyclist as opposed to someone taking another

transport option. He said that a car is “always the first choice for the public” but that the city is “full up.” Wiebes also commented that there is an “endless struggle of parking spaces versus cycle lanes” in Amsterdam, a situation which for once felt familiar to the UK delegates.

For interest, modal shares of transport in Amsterdam are as follows (with city centre figures in brackets): Public transport 16% (10%), car 22% (14%), bicycle 32% (a staggering 48%!!), walking 27% (25%) and other 3% (3%).



Busy junction

We then had a long and interesting bike tour of cycling infrastructure and cycle parking facilities around Amsterdam. This illustrated the ease of bike riding here and the tranquility and safety of many streets and public spaces. The photo above shows one busy junction which was remodelled to enable cyclists and pedestrians to cross in stages.

On our return we returned the bikes and thanked our hosts before going our separate ways. A few of us took off to the Rijksmuseum.

Recently renovated, this is a wonderful museum focussing on Dutch artefacts from paintings (including Van Gogh, Rembrandt and Vermeer) to arms and model ships and is unmissable for anyone visiting Amsterdam.

Through and under the museum is, of all things, a two way segregated cycleway(!), defended by cycling groups for decades and a powerful statement of the unique transport priorities of Dutch society.

Police Appeal for Witnesses following Collision in Redford Road



Police have appealed for witnesses to a collision between two vehicles on Redford Road earlier today (Wednesday, June 12).

The incident occurred around 8.30am and involved a minibus colliding with an unoccupied stationary van. Redford Road was closed in both directions at Dreghorn Link for around an hour following the collision.

The minibus was carrying five children between 9-13 years of age and two adults. The children, from Kaimes School, were taken to the Royal Hospital for Sick Kids as a precaution and the adults were taken to the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh as a precaution.

A Police Scotland spokesperson said: "This collision, although not serious, would have caused distress to the young people involved. We would appeal to anyone who might have witnessed the collision to contact Police Scotland on 101."

Police Confirm Corstorphine Hill Victim was Murdered



Police Scotland detectives investigating the discovery of

human remains on Corstorphine Hill in Edinburgh are appealing for help from the public in identifying the female victim.

A member of the public reported finding part of the body last Thursday when cycling on Corstorphine Hill in the capital.

Since then a detailed and careful excavation of the site has been undertaken by forensic experts and a post mortem was carried out yesterday (Tuesday, June 11, 2013).

Detective Chief Inspector Keith Hardie of the Specialist Crime Division's Major Investigation Team said: "The victim's body had been dismembered before it was buried on Corstorphine Hill. We believed this may have been within a time frame of a matter of a few weeks but possibly as much as six months. This is a murder investigation and our immediate focus is on identifying this woman, and establishing the circumstances around her death. We need the public's support to achieve this.

"This is someone's daughter, it may be someone's mother and I am appealing today to the public to consider if there is a mother, a daughter or a friend you have not seen or heard from for the past few weeks or months, and the person fits the following description I would urge you to contact us now.

"We know the lady was white, middle aged, slim and of medium build and short in height. She has had significant cosmetic work on her teeth. We have also recovered a number of rings and two of these are distinctive, both are gold in appearance with one in the design of a daisy and the other is heart shaped.

"I feel confident that someone will recognise the description of the lady's teeth and the rings, together with the general description of a slim middle aged lady who has disappeared."

Mr Hardie is also convinced that the body was dismembered elsewhere and later taken to Corstorphine Hill. He is asking

people who use this popular nature reserve to consider if they may have seen anyone who, on reflection, could have been involved in depositing the body in this area.

“Can you recall, anytime since the end of last year, seeing a person or individuals on the hill with particularly large rucksacks/backpacks or carrying tools, if so, please get in touch with us.”

Chief Inspector Murray Dykes, of Police Scotland Edinburgh Division, said: “This is a distressing case but I want to reassure people that it is also a very unusual one. Corstorphine Hill is very popular, well used and a safe place to walk, cycle and enjoy some leisure time. While there are very few reports of crime relating to that area, I have had high visibility patrols in place since Thursday to provide reassurance and these will continue for the time being.

“These officers will be engaging with members of the public and people can pass on information through them if they wish or at the Police Command vehicle which is currently situated on Balgreen Road.”

The council is likely to grant planning permission this morning for a 24 flat development at West Bowling Green Street in Edinburgh. The proposal attracted 27 representations some of which were about wildlife, cycle parking and the loss of scarce green space.

This development will have cycle parking integrated into the design, and it will also mean that the Water of Leith Walkway will be realigned. 10 affordable housing units will be incorporated into the project.

Edinburgh Airport experienced its busiest May ever as it welcomed over 906,000 passengers through its doors last month. This was a rise of 7.4% compared to the same time last year.

International traffic was up 11.8%, driven by new services from easyJet and Ryanair with domestic traffic also up by 2.7% with strong performances from British Airways and Virgin Atlantic Little Red to Heathrow.

Gordon Dewar, Chief Executive of Edinburgh Airport, said: "When we bought Edinburgh Airport in June last year, we were very clear about the issues we faced and how we were going to tackle them. The team here has put in a tremendous amount of work and in May we saw all of that work bear fruit.

"The increase in domestic traffic is particularly pleasing in what is an incredibly competitive marketplace.

"We understand that this is a team game and through this team work we can all contribute to making Edinburgh Airport a success. So we'll continue to work in partnership with our airlines and our City and Scottish Government colleagues to help the airlines make a success of their routes to and from

Edinburgh. That drives the passenger numbers we see here and gives me confidence that we can maintain this performance through what promises to be a very busy summer indeed.”

Edinburgh Airport has added 18 new destinations since its change of ownership and taking the total to over 130. A new service to Toronto with Air Canada Rouge commences in early July.

Just over a week to go before this year's Royal Highland Show takes place at Ingliston.

A top summer attraction, the show has enjoyed record-breaking attendances in recent years with the three-year average now standing at over 177,000.

In 2012, visitor numbers were 161,242. In 2010, a new high of 187,644 was recorded, which in turn beat a figure that had stood for over 50 years, the Dundee show attendance of 163,917 in 1949.

A visit to the "Highland" – marketed as "The Greatest Show On Earth" – offers a multitude of features to enjoy with prize-winning livestock, the latest farm machinery, fine food and

drink, outdoor living and countryside, traditional rural skills, renewable energy, music, cookery demonstrations, forestry events, handcrafts, children's discovery centre, heavy horses, show-jumping, motor zone and shopping arcades just a few of the attractions.

All of these are contained within well-signposted designated areas making it easy for visitors to find their way around the showground.

Dates: The 2013 Royal Highland Show will take place from 20-23 June 2013. The organisers, the Royal Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland (RHASS) held their first show in 1822 in Edinburgh's Canongate on a site now occupied by the Scottish Parliament. The 2013 show is the 173rd and the 53rd to be held at the permanent showground at Ingliston.
