Online scammers target older internet users



Edinburgh Silver Surfers Subjected to Online Scams

Edinburgh's growing legions of 'silver surfers' are being warned to be vigilant as cyber criminals look to prey on unsuspecting victims with increasingly cunning online scams. With the numbers of older people using the web and discovering social media channels growing daily, fears are being raised they are becoming the prime targets for internet scammers.

The tricksters are continually concocting scams to fool unsuspecting web users with many of the cons taking place without the victim being aware, ranging from social networking and financial scams to those relating to online employment or auctions. One smartphone/web-based App set up to highlight the explosion of online scams lists more than 600 different online cons.

The latest warning comes from the Scottish Business Crime Centre (SBCC), as part of a new campaign it is fronting to raise awareness of various issues that can place older people at risk of financial harm.

Gary Ritchie, Assistant Director of SBCC, said: "These con men will stop at nothing to shamelessly deceive and swindle internet users out of personal details and money. While many of us have been using the internet for some time and have grown to recognise these types of scam emails, anyone can be caught out as new scams are constantly being designed to trick unwary web surfers into parting with money or personal

information.

"The increase in 'silver surfers' using the internet as a way of communicating now means that older people are increasingly exposed to these crimes. Older people in particular are prone to falling for emails that appear legitimate because they look like official emails which appear to be from a well known bank or unsolicited mails where the scammer tells of recent disastrous events which have left them stranded, usually in a foreign country with no money and no passport.

"Sadly these people are frequently conned out of huge sums of money. Crimes against people who perhaps don't have the same capabilities or support to protect themselves as others is appalling and has no place in Scotland."

One of the most prominent online scams is ransomware. This is a category of malicious software which, when run, disables the functionality of a computer in some way. The ransomware program displays a pop-up message demanding payment to restore functionality. The malware, in effect, holds the computer ransom, the pop-up advises law enforcement has locked the computer and suggests that this is a result of the user viewing indecent images or terrorist sites.

These pop-ups use the logos of recognised UK forces, including Action Fraud so victims are easily fooled by this con. Unfortunately, there is no way to avoid this pop-up and given the number of different gangs operating ransomware scams, a conservative estimate is that over £3 million a year is being extorted from victims, however, the real figure is likely to be much higher.

Chief Inspector Ronnie Megaughin at Police Scotland, also chair of the Adults at Risk from Financial Harm Group, said: "There are a number of factors which require to be present for frauds or scams to be successful and the vulnerability of the victim is at the heart of that equation. While anyone can be

duped, those who are most vulnerable within our communities are faced with the greatest risk."

He added the Keeping People Safe campaign being managed by the Adults at Risk from Financial Harm Group aims to put in place a range of prevention measures necessary to safeguard individuals and reduce criminal opportunity.

As victims are often too embarrassed to report these various internet crimes, authoritative statistics are hard to establish. However, a recent study by Age UK found almost half of the over 60's questioned said that they had been targeted by a scam last year.

Lindsay Scott, spokesperson for Age Scotland said: "Although today's pensioners may be mentally sharper than ever, they still make a prime target for con artists because they generally have more disposable income and because they're usually more trusting, having grown up at a time when things were taken at face value. It's also true that longer life expectancy has resulted in a growing generation of people in later life who perhaps live alone, are maybe a bit forgetful or simply become confused or frightened by smooth-talking scammers.

"This combination of not remembering correctly and in many cases, particularly involving men, being unwilling to admit there's a problem, can make older adults especially vulnerable to this sort of crime."

The SBCC, which aims to work in partnership with various bodies to create a safer Scotland, recently held a conference to establish a blueprint for Scotland's private and public sectors and voluntary organisations to collaborate consistently and effectively to protect those who may be subjected to financial abuse by others.

The organisation is currently forming a strategic multi agency steering group to provide further advice, guidance and protection around those who are seen as vulnerable in this way through information exchange and early intervention including the development of a Scotland against Scams initiative. The group will also consider how to tackle e-related scams and postal scams as part of their ongoing work.

This steering group will consist of representatives from the Scottish Government, Social Work Department, Trading Standards, police, banks, energy and utility companies as well as a variety of other interested organisations.

South Morningside Primary School make a difference



Every child at South Morningside Primary School paid £1 to watch a talent show earlier this year. The money raised was

then allocated between all the classes or year groups so that they all had £25 to £30 to spend. Each term SMPS have a 'theme' which they focus on, and this term it is Community.

As part of Curriculum for Excellence using money, maths, finance education, community enterprise outcomes each class was tasked with using their money to 'make a difference' to their local community.

Some of the ideas which resulted from this project include ways of improving the school grounds — they have bought bulbs to be planted. Others want to buy a bee box! There has been a lot of publicity about the declining bee population so they will buy one and perhaps put it somewhere in the school grounds or in nearby Braidburn Park. Some children want to build a recycled green house using 1,000 plastic bottles. Others thought they would donate funds to local charities some of whom do not accept toys as gifts but take Amazon vouchers instead, so the children have been shown how those are ordered online.

SMPS have a link with Redhall Special School and they are fundraising for a playground project. At least one class is going to donate their money to RSS.

Edinburgh MSP says Taxi fare increases may put some at risk

A TAXI fare price hike could put women at risk as they would have to walk home late at night, an MSP has argued.

Kezia Dugdale, a Labour MSP and Shadow Youth Employment Minister, has spoken out against the price hike in Edinburgh, saying that it could lead to more women opting to walk home alone when they are "at their most vulnerable".

The current baseline fee for night-time taxis in Edinburgh is £3, but the new fares will result in the base fee jump up to £4.60 between midnight and 5 am throughout the week.

Assault and robbery in Granton on Sunday morning

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses following an assault and robbery that happened in the Granton area of the Capital yesterday morning.

The 52-year-old victim was walking in Crewe Path, which links Crewe Road West to Crewe Road North, around 11.15am when he was approached by four male youths.

As he passed the group he was struck in the face, which caused him to fall to the ground, and he was kicked in the head and body.

Following the incident the suspects fled along Crewe Path to Crewe Road North. It was only afterwards that the victim discovered that his wallet was missing.

The suspects are all described as white, and between 15 and 18 years-old. One of them is described as being around 5ft 11ins tall, with a slim build, and wearing a grey top. The remaining three are only described as being around 5ft 8ins tall.

Detective Constable Rachel Robertson said: -"While the victim did not suffer any serious injury, he was left extremely shaken as a result of his ordeal, and we are appealing for any information that can assist us in tracing those responsible.

"Anyone who witnessed the assault, or who was in the area at the time and may have noticed four male youths together, should contact police.

"Anyone else who has any information that can assist our enquiries should also get in touch."

This week Hearts leapfrog Hibs in the SPL, Spartans Under 17s won the Scottish Cup, whilst Spartans and Edinburgh City reach the League Cup Final. There were good wins for Spartans and Hibs Ladies and we send our congratulations to Lynsey Sharp whose European Championship 800m silver medal has been upgraded to gold.

Rugby by John Preece

On Friday night Edinburgh played the final game of their's and the Dragon's season. With the teams languishing in 10th and 11th places in the RaboDirect table there was nothing but the win to play for and Edinburgh snatched that with a 31-24 points victory. Scoring three tries apiece it was the greater penalty tally against the Dragons that told in the end. Going into the second half 25 points to 10 ahead, it was all looking good for the hosts. But a second half scare from the Dragons with two converted tries, brought Edinburgh back to Earth with a bump, but they managed to hold on to take the win in the end. The last but one round of the 2012-13 World Sevens Series was being held over the weekend at Scotstoun in Glasgow, and Scotland had to finish ahead of USA to guarantee core team status — i.e. automatic entry — to the 2103-14 series. However, this ambition went belly-up on Day 1 as, although

beating Portugal 26-5 in the opening match, the team lost 29-7 to England and 28-0 to New Zealand to only qualify for the Bowl QF. With USA winning two of their matches and going ahead into the Cup QF's, this means that, before a ball had been kicked, passed or rucked on Day 2, Scotland were required to go into an eight-team play-off tournament at Twickenham next week, and have to finish in the top three in order to retain their place. Scotland's Day 2 started well with a 31-5 win against Spain, but they went down 24-19 in the Semi-final to a quick Kenyan side. 17-0 adrift at the break, too many errors cost the Scots team in the end and they went out of the tournament in spite of three second half tries.

The Cup final was contested between a rampant South Africa who disposed of England and a tired looking and depleted New Zealand who kept Wales at bay, but only just, with a couple of last minute scores. An epic contest saw South Africa lift the tournament Cup 28-21, but New Zealand took the overall title with one round left to play at Twickenham.

And finally, other news this week saw Scott Johnson stand down as Scotland head coach and take up the role as Director of Rugby, with the news also being announced that a successor had been chosen, but who has the job will not be revealed until a later date.

Football

Hearts ended a traumatic week in style beating St Mirren 3-0 at Tynecastle thanks to goals from Jamie Walker, Kevin McHattie and Jamie Hamill. The game was played in front of a crowd of 16,312 thanks to the club's offer of a £5 entrance fee.

Earlier in the week rumours of administration swept the city following the news that Ukio Bankas, the Lithuanian Bank who are believed to hold the security of Tynecastle Stadium were declared bankrupt. At this time it is not clear how this news will affect the club in the long term. Hearts also reported a loss of £1.65 million last season, which was almost entirely due to a historic tax liability, but they did increase their

turnover by almost £2m

Some good news for the fans however is that club captain Marius Zaliukas could make an unexpected return from ankle ligament injury in time to play in Hearts' final SPL match of the season against Aberdeen at Pittodrie.

The Lithuanian is hopeful of resuming full training next week, and is hopeful of pulling on the maroon jersey at least one more time as his contract is up in the summer and no new deal has been agreed so far.



The result means that Hearts leapfrogged Hibs who dropped into 10^{th} place after their away match at Rugby Park was abandoned in the 51^{st} minute when a supporter had a suspected heart attack. Hibs had taken the lead through Alex Harris, but Kris Boyd equalised and the fixture was all square when the referee took the decision to call the game off.

Hearts now sit 8^{th} on 42 points with Hibs one point behind having played a game less. The pair meet next weekend at Tynecastle.

East of Scotland Football

Edinburgh City will meet Spartans in the final of the East of Scotland League Cup on Saturday 25th May.

City beat Leith Athletic 4-0 in the semi-final thanks to a Robbie Ross hat-trick after Dougie Gair had given them the lead with well struck free-kick.

Spartans secured the other place in the final with a 2-0 victory away to Stirling University.

The Ainslie Park team took the lead in the 21st minute thanks

to an own goal from defender Jason Atkins following a Kevin Motion free-kick.

Spartans wrapped the game up with 19 minutes remaining when another Motion free-kick was headed into the net by defender Ally MacKinnon.

They then followed up their cup success with a vital 2-1 victory at home to Preston Athletic on Saturday, despite dreadful weather conditions.

The first ten minutes of the second half was a bit of a kicking fest as both teams tried to gain the upper hand. The period ended with a penalty award to Edinburgh which Laidlaw

duly saw over, followed by another two minutes later to give the hosts a fine 31-10 lead. A lead which the Dragon's took on as a target rather than a game-ender. For the next 15 minutes, the visitors dominated the match. Firstly, following a series of rucks in the Edinburgh five metre area, Dan Lydiate dived through a gap in the defence for their second try and a rare incursion by Edinburgh saw Nic de Luca throw a 'pass' to Tom Prydie in the Dragon's 22 and, with nobody in the way, the young Welshman galloped the length of the field to score under the posts. Both kicks went over and the score was, a much more worrying, 31-24.

However, with 15 minutes left, Edinburgh managed to keep the Dragon's out using some creative kicking and pressure from the forwards and ended the season on a high with the win and retaining 10th place in the table.

So, what's next for the Capital's rugby team? With seven departures due to injury, retirement or pastures new, the interim management team have made a few decent signings, the most noteable capture being Nikki Walker from Worcester. It can only be hoped that another season like the one just past can be avoided and Edinburgh can return to winning ways and bring a bit of pride — and bigger crowds — back to Murrayfield.

Recipe — Vanilla Cheesecake from Calistoga Restaurant

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Gordon Minnis, owner of Calistoga restaurant suggests a delicious summer dessert

Summer is on its way and it is time to leave behind the winter puddings and enjoy the lighter desserts of the season.

There are lots to choose from, but as a Californian restaurant, one of our favourites is that great American classic, vanilla cheesecake. It is particularly delicious combined with summer berries, such as strawberries, raspberries, or other soft fruit of your choice.

Vanilla cheesecake is also easy to make. But for best results, you need to leave it in the fridge for a day to chill, before eating. In our experience, you may well be tempted to taste it before then ...

We like to pair food with wine and would recommend a Californian pink Moscato to accompany the cheesecake.

Lightly sparkling, crisp and refreshing, Pink Moscatos often have a hint of vanilla, which enhances the flavour of the cheesecake. Summery strawberry and rose-petal notes tend to be a feature of this wine too.

If you enjoy pairing great wine with great food, you might like to know that Calistoga runs regular wine tasting dinners. The next one is on 29 May, featuring wines from the Gnarly

Baked Vanilla Cheesecake with Mixed Berries

For the base

70g plain flour

70g caster sugar

70g ground almonds

70g melted butter

Pinch of salt

Combine all the ingredients and rub together with your hands to produce a breadcrumb-like texture.

Line a 10 \times 6 inch deep pie tin, or a 12 inch round deep tin with baking paper and lightly grease with a little butter. Place the mixture into the tin and pack down with your fingers so the base is level.

Bake for 12-15 minutes at 160 degrees centigrade, until just brown. Set aside to cool.

For the Cheesecake

350g of soft cream cheese

75g of Mascarpone cheese

1 whole medium egg

4 medium egg yolks

100g caster sugar

Seeds of one vanilla pod

Combine all the ingredients in a bowl and mix together — electric beaters are best or use a food processor. Pour the mixture over the now-cold base and level out.

Bake for 60 minutes at 120 degrees centigrade in a bain marie — i.e put hot water in a bigger tray and gently place the tray containing the cheesecake into this tray. The water should reach up to about half-way on the cheesecake tray. Be careful not to slosh the hot water around. The cheesecake is ready when the mixture has just set in the centre.

Remove and allow to cool before refrigerating. When cold, carefully remove and cut into slices. Serve with your choice of berries or other fresh fruit

Tradfest: The Story of Scotland's Creation

The audience at this Tradfest event learned how Scotland came to be formed in the new telling of the 3,000 year old myth of the Cailleach, or old hag, who, it is believed, created Scotland. The storytellers brought the tale to life through wonderful narration, bright costumes and traditional

music.

Taking place at the Storytelling Centre, the myth was narrated by Janis McKay and David Campbell. The hour-long performance was accompanied by renowned traditional Scottish musician Allan MacDonald. The performers aim is for the story to become part of the 'yes' campaign on Scottish Independence, getting their inspiration from the Finnish Creation Myth, Kalevala, which helped Finland's independence from Russia.

Janis McKay took centre stage looking dramatic in a flowing floor length turquoise gown, embroidered with Celtic designs. After an introduction to the evening, she explained how the story was put together through research and with guidance from Campbell. He was fittingly resplendent in traditional highland costume, complete with a bright yellow shirt and red necktie, costumes which set the atmosphere for the night's theme. Campbell narrated the story alongside Mackay, also taking the part of the male role of the young prince.

She then introduced MacDonald, describing him as a "wonderful musician", to which he replied "And she's an awful woman!" to roars of laughter from the audience made up of people of all ages and cultures, and with the theatre full to capacity.

The stage was now set for a light-hearted and entertaining evening, as the audience settled down in expectation, and the lights dimmed. In fact, MacDonald, from his place at the side of the stage, did indeed transpire to be a wonderful musician, evoking a sense of Scotland's natural beauty, the mist over the mountains and scenic lochs through several traditional instruments. These included the smallpipes, Jew's harp and malodoan, with Campbell weaving music into the storytelling with an obvious talent and skill.

MacKay began the narration of the tale by explaining how the story of Cailleach, the ancient hag who created the nation, unfolded. We learned how she had been living and working in Finland, when she came across the work of Elias Lonnrot, who had gathered and wrote a creation myth for the country in the 19^{th} Century. She said:-"While I was there I asked what is the Scottish original myth?" She then started to do research into this, and explained:- "I was guided by David Campbell, and we found this Earth Cailleach figure. What you will hear has been rescued from many tales, but the words are our own."

She also completed the story's setting for us, about a place called Glen Lyon in Perthshire, and which is very isolated from anywhere. Here , she said: — "The Crailleach's little house, about four feet tall, still stands". Campbell explained that this was where the shrine to the Crillieach (meaning old woman in Gaelic) is maintained. This has been taken outside the house and left to stand in the air for the summer until the arrival of winter, or Samhain.

She said this is a "tribute to the goddess," and the "longest continuing ritual in Europe", since ancient times. Until very recently, it was carried out by a shepherd, and is now carried out by the local historical society.

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We were then transported into another world as the story progressed over the next forty- five minutes, with a genuinely infectious sincerity and passion. This enabled the suspension of disbelief and a childlike entry into the magical world of gods and goddesses, princes, hags and strange creatures and beautiful beings.

The theme, as in the billed title, was creation. The tale of how Scotland emerged from a wasteland where there was once nothing, when the Callieach, described as "the mother goddess and creation of this land" came into being. She made "the first and ancient rock of her beloved Caledonia" which was claimed to be Iona. The story documents how she created each aspect of the country, the islands when "she gathered peats

and carried them on a creel on her back. She fell, and the clods scattered, creating the islands". mountains, the lakes and streams, were made.

Described as "the hag of winter", she was not ready to lose her grip on the land, when one night her alter ego, Bride, the goddess of spring, came into existence, through a dreamlike vision. Bride threatened to uproot the Cailleach's cold supremacy her with her youthful beauty.

For Bride, flowers and grass grow everywhere she walks. The Calleach becomes inflamed, and therefore dresses her in rags, enslaves, then imprisons her, "but her beauty never faded". Angus Og, the prince of the eternally youthful and green land of Tir Na Nog, sees what is happening in a dream and sets off towards her.

The Cailleach then washed her plaid, and to dry it out, threw it over the mountaintops, coating the land in ice and darkness. She sees a beautiful young face in her well, perhaps a younger version of herself. The prince soon arrives, and a battle ensues. He tells her:- "Begone, begone, your time has come", portraying the eternal struggle between life and death.

The Cailleach had no intention of growing old gracefully, but is finally defeated and driven away to her isle in the west. She eventually comes to realise what she has become, when she speaks to the tide about "how she is no longer mighty."

The story ends when Bride then "took the outstretched hand of Angus and walked into the living Earth", and flowers grew behind their footsteps.

With regard to the 'yes' campaign, Campbell spoke to The Edinburgh Reporter explaining the nationalist aim for the story. He explained: The Finnish story was part of the thing which galvanised the sense of belonging, that traditional independence lives in the heart and spirit of the people."

He continued:-We aim to support the 'yes' campaign where we can through performances for example at the Edinburgh Fringe. The tale spreads a sense of the legend and story of people, and if people get that strong feeling, then that belongs to our destiny."

"You can gather people's support in elections or "win by poetry" as its beautiful sense speaks to the heart, spirit and imagination, but once the support is there, you rule by prose."

Fun Run — Drugs arrests — 5K at Cramond — Scottish Bird Fair — At the galleries this weekend

You are probably too late to enter, and you are certainly too late to start training, but you could always go along and cheer on the ladies who are taking part in the Fun Run at Hopetoun House today starting from 11:00am.

Around 1000 women will be taking part in Cancer Research UK's Race for Life there this morning.

This is the first Race for Life event of the year in Scotland — there are 11 in total — and courageous skin cancer survivor Dawn Hunter, of Dunfermline, will be at the start line with an airhorn as she prepares to start the participants on their way along the 5K course. Ahead of the event, Dawn, a personal assistant, said:- "Taking part in Race for Life is my way of celebrating being cancer free for five years and fighting back against cancer. It's important to do all we can to help fund research and I want to help others by supporting Cancer Research UK's work."

Cancer Research UK's Race for Life, in partnership with Tesco, is an inspiring women-only series of events which raises millions of pounds every year to help defeat cancer by funding life-saving research.

Hamish Moir, event manager for Race for Life in the Lothians and Fife, said:- "The support we have received in South Queensferry is absolutely tremendous and we are thrilled that so many women have entered Race for Life."

In 2012, 750 women took part in Race for Life in South Queensferry and helped raise £71,000 for Cancer Research UK's life-saving work. With even more ladies attending this year's event, the charity hopes even more money will be raised. By raising money through Race for Life, people in the Lothians and Fife are helping Cancer Research UK's doctors, nurses and scientists make advances in research which will help more men, women and children survive.

At this year's event, before they head to the start line, runners will be learning the Cancer Slam, a dance especially choreographed for Cancer Research UK to the classic song Connection by Elastica. The warm up exercise routine in South Queensferry will be lead by Sarah Munro of Fitness Chicks

Police in Edinburgh have hailed the success of an operation targeting drug dealers and serious and organised criminals in the Capital. Operation Amend resulted in 25 arrests, along with the seizure of around £300,000 worth of drugs and almost

£250,000 in cash.

The drugs seized included quantities of cocaine, crack cocaine and heroin, as well as a cannabis cultivation. Over £200,000 in cash was recovered from one address in Musselburgh alone.

Detective Superintendent Gareth Blair, from Police Scotland, said:- "There is no doubt that Operation Amend has struck a serious blow against drug dealers and serious and organised criminals operating in Edinburgh.

"We have arrested and charged a number of individuals with alleged drugs offences, and removed a significant quantity of drugs from the streets of the Capital. Police Scotland is committed to keeping people safe, and we will relentlessly pursue all those who we suspect of involvement in drug dealing and serious and organised crime.

"At the same time we will continue to work closely with our community partners in order to make our communities safer and secure. We would ask the public to play their part by providing us with information on drug dealers and serious and organised criminals operating in their community.

"Anyone with any information should contact Police Scotland on 101, or make an anonymous report though Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

Justice Secretary Kenny MacAskill said: - "While honest, hard-working members of the public struggle in these challenging financial times, it is galling and distressing to see drug dealers and those involved in serious organised crime flouting their ill-gotten wealth.

"It is thanks to vital information supplied by the public and the hard work of police that serious and organised criminals across Scotland are being identified and brought to justice. Ultimately, it shows that the combined efforts of communities, police, and enforcement agencies all contributes to making Scotland a safer and stronger place to live."

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Vice-Convener of Health, Social Care & Housing — Cammy Day

Councillor Cammy Day, Community Safety Leader, said:- "I am very pleased that Operation Amend has been such a success and believe this demonstrates how strengthening community links with the police can make our neighbourhoods safer. It sends a clear signal that drug-related crime will not be tolerated and I would like to thank all members of the community for their support of this very worthwhile initiative."

Professor Alison McCallum, Director of Public Health and Health Policy, NHS Lothian, said:-"We continue to work closely with Police Scotland, health services and other agencies throughout Lothian by providing a broad range of services to help and support individuals to address the causes and consequences of problematic drug use."

▼ This weekend at the National Galleries of Scotland there are many things to see. Have you seen the lovely Annie Lennox exhibition at the Portrait Gallery yet? And then for the lovers among you there is the romantic Rodin's Kiss at the Scottish National Gallery at the Mound...

Rodin's world-famous celebration of erotic love *The Kiss*, arrived in February for a year-long display. The magnificent, larger-than-life marble sculpture of two naked lovers, entwined in a passionate embrace is on loan from Tate in London.

Having first shown *The Kiss* to huge popular acclaim in 1898, Rodin was commissioned to make this second version, which was completed in 1904. It depicts the adulterous lovers Paolo Malatesta and Francesca da Rimini, who appear as characters in Dante's *The Divine Comedy*. Dante relates how the couple's passion grew as they read together the story of Lancelot and Guinevere (the book can just be seen in Paolo's hand), but they were discovered and murdered by Francesca's outraged husband, Paolo's older brother Giancotto.

The story inspired many playwrights, composers and artists in the nineteenth century, and is the subject of a much-loved painting in the Gallery's collection, *Francesca da Rimini* (1837) by Sir William Dyce.

Three full-scale marble versions of *The Kiss* were made in Rodin's lifetime, and the sculptor also made smaller versions in plaster, terracotta and bronze. Such was allure of *The Kiss* that hundreds of bronze copies were produced by the

Barbedienne foundry. As a result, this spectacular sculpture has become one of the most instantly recognised and best-loved works of art in the world.

Speaking of the loan, Michael Clarke, Director of the Scottish National Gallery, said: 'We are delighted that Rodin's great hymn to love is coming to Scotland. Rodin was a wonderfully gifted sculptor — technically brilliant, with an astonishing ability to model the human form with sensuous realism. *The Kiss* is rightly acknowledged as one of the greatest artistic evocations of desire ever created.'

Five things you need to know today

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Gary McCourt sentenced — Police action day — Portobello Open Door — Spa in the City — Gorgie City Farm for breakfast

There has been an outcry among many cycling groups in Edinburgh about the sentence handed down to Gary McCourt who had been charged with causing death by careless driving. McCourt was convicted of causing the death of pensioner Mrs Audrey Fyfe, 75, when his car clipped the rear wheel of Mrs Fyfe's bicycle in Portobello. She then 'somersaulted' off her bike and was injured when she landed heavily on the road. She died from her injuries two days afterwards.

McCourt was disqualified from driving for five years and was sentenced to 300 hours community service. After his conviction last month, it was revealed that McCourt had caused the death of another cyclist, 22 yearOold student George Dalgity, in 1986.

Dr David Brennan one of the campaigners behind Pedal on Parliament which will stage a cycle through Edinburgh to Holyrood on 19 May 2013, wrote on their website:-"Whatever the legal questions behind the sentence itself, the fact that a driver can, through *carelessness*, kill two people in separate incidents and not permanently lose their driving licence tells us something about the priorities we have in Scotland today."

The family of the first victim spoke to <u>The Edinburgh Evening</u> <u>News</u> suggesting that McCourt's conviction should result in imprisonment.

There is an amount of discussion regarding the comments by the Sheriff about the fact that Mrs Fyfe was not wearing a cycling helmet on the <u>Cycling Edinburgh Forum</u>, and there are comments there which suggest that the Crown Office may review the decision.



Police in Edinburgh carried out another day of action across the city on Friday as part of Police Scotland's commitment to tackling violence.

Over 100 officers were out in patrol throughout the Capital to engage with the public, and deter criminal activity.

As a result, three men were arrested for alleged warrant offences, including two men who were wanted in connection with domestic assaults, one in the Craigmillar area the other in the Dalry area.

Two more men will be reported to the Procurator Fiscal after police recovered personal quantities of cannabis during searches.

One man and a woman were arrested in connection with an alleged violent disturbance that took place in the Clermiston area on 16 April.

Officers also utilised the mobile metal detector to identify anyone in possession of a weapon and a woman has been detained for carrying a lock-knife.

Furthermore, a number of vehicle stops were carried out and 11 people were issued with fixed penalty notices for a range of motoring offences. During these stops, a vehicle was seized for having no insurance and the driver will be reported to the Procurator Fiscal.

The public response to the activity was extremely positive and further Campaign Against Violence days will take place throughout the year.

Superintendent David Carradice said: - "Local officers were once again supported by colleagues from other departments to detect and deter a range of crimes in Edinburgh.

"We will continue to carry out days of action to tackle violent crime within the city and will actively target those believed to be responsible.

"Targeted action against violence is based on the information we receive from the public and anyone who has information relating to crime in their area can contact Police Scotland on 101 or alternatively, the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

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Tonight in Portobello, Portobello Open Door (POD) in collaboration with the Wash House Community Centre are going to start screening Films in Porty. Police investigating youth related antisocial behaviour

➤ Police in Edinburgh are investigating following reports of youth-related antisocial behaviour in the west of the city this week.

On Monday 29 April, police received two separate complaints of vehicles having been vandalised with spray paint in

Harvester's Way and Wester Hailes Park. Later that day, a report was received with regard to racist graffiti in Wester Hailes Park. A number of young people were seen in the area with spray canisters and enquiries are ongoing to trace them.

Investigations are also ongoing after stones thrown at a Polish man and women and at their house.

About 1.20pm yesterday two Muslim women were racially abused and an attempt was made to remove their headscarves by a couple of young boys who were playing in the area.

Officers are investigating all of these incidents and anyone who can assist with their enquiries is asked to come forward.

Inspector Stevie Dolan said: "A number of residents in the Wester Hailes area have recently reported anti social behaviour by local youths and we are working with the local community to identify those responsible. Several of these have been racially-motivated".

"Police Scotland is committed to keeping people safe and crime in any form will not be tolerated. We are investigating each of these reports thoroughly and anyone found to be involved will be robustly dealt with. Increased patrols will be out across the coming holiday weekend to offer reassurance to the community, engage with local youths and deter further criminal activity. Anyone wishing to report a crime can visit their local policing team, contact Police Scotland on 101 or alternatively, the charity Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111."

Construction traffic causes concern for children's safety

Residents in a North Edinburgh community have this week hit out at the local Housing Association who is building new homes in the area. Residents from Muirhouse claim that the safety of their children is being put at risk as heavy goods lorries are reversing without banksmen, while over two hundred schoolchildren make their way to Craigroyston Primary School.

Prior to the building work starting residents were reassured that construction traffic would not use certain parts of Muirhouse and would come from Ferry Road into the site. At a meeting in December 2012 Springfield, the company building the homes, told the meeting that they would always use banksmen when vehicles were reversing. There have now been two incidents when large lorries have reversed along Muirhouse Avenue and directly past the entrance gate to Craigroyston primary School at 08:40, the busiest time for children arriving at school.

Springfield issued an apology on 26 April 2013 to the residents association and yet the company's vehicles (as pictured) were in the same street on Wednesday of this week. Eileen Carr from Tenants & Residents in Muirhouse said:- "We have now lost confidence in the organisation concerned, and will be taking this further. We don't want any more empty promises, pointless assurances or insincere apologies — we want the large vehicles to stop using Muirhouse Avenue as they agreed and to stop treating the community of Muirhouse with flippant disregard."

Brenda Tonner, Director at Muirhouse Housing Association said: - "We do apologise for these two incidents and we have been in touch with the contractor to ensure this is resolved.

We will now begin discussions with the council to seek permission to put up more signage."

Local councillor Cammy Day said:- "I have today taken this up with MHA. It's totally unacceptable. I have asked to meet the developers as a matter of urgency."

Some residents will still remember the horror in August 1999 when two local children died following an accident with a lorry that was delivering materials to a shopping centre building site. It is believed the children hid under the lorry when it was stationary with its engine running. They were then trapped under the wheels when it reversed.

And they're off at Musselburgh Races today!

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Musselburgh Racecourse heads in to its busiest period of the year with today's meeting the first of three May fixtures, followed by four high profile race days in June.

The card kicks off with two evenly contested heats over the minimum trip of five furlongs and Cracking Choice, trained by Michael Dods near Darlington, would be a deserved winner of the Brewin Dolphin Handicap (2.00). Runner up in his last three outings, Paul Mulrennan's mount was headed in the final strides by the strong finishing Bogsnog at Newcastle eight days ago, and he has the early speed to overcome an outside

draw.

The combination of trainer David Brown and jockey Robert Winston has rewarded Musselburgh racegoers with a regular flow of winners and Captain Midnight will be hard to beat in the Baillie Gifford EBF Maiden Stakes at 2.30. Bred for speed, the two year old started a well backed 7/4 favourite on his debut at Ripon and was only run down in the last 50 yards, and he will appreciate this sharp five furlongs.

Top weights dominate the £10,000 Weatherbys Bank Handicap over 9f (3.00). The in-form David O'Meara relies on the penalised Frontier Fighter, a dual winner on the polytrack at Wolverhampton earlier in the year and again successful on the turf at Pontefract on his most recent appearance.

Stable jockey Danny Tudhope is likely to ride a waiting race on Frontier Fighter and these patient tactics could prove decisive in a protracted duel with the front running Gala Casino Star, who weakened inside the final furlong when a promising third behind St Moritz at Ripon.

The £12,000 Weatherbys Private Banking Handicap at 3.30 provides London Citizen the ideal opportunity to get off the mark at the second attempt for the North Yorkshire trainer Karl Burke. Previously raced in America, London Citizen was noted staying on strongly in third place behind Country Western and Lightning Launch on his debut for the Burke stable at Ripon. That race was over 7f and London Citizen will relish the extra quarter of a mile round Musselburgh.

The £12,000 Core (0il and Gas) Ltd 7f Handicap at 4.00 looks at the mercy of the David O'Meara trained Gandalak. After two encouraging placed efforts over the minimum distance, Gandalak stepped up to 6f at Newcastle last week and in the hands of Danny Tudhope made every yard of the running to rout a competitive field of handicappers. Gandalak won easing down and he should have little problem building on that victory over the extra furlong at Musselburgh.

Prize money at Musselburgh this month tops £125,000 and other race meeting are on May 13 and 24. Next month will get off to a flying start with the Totepool Edinburgh Cup on June 1, followed by a glamour weekend with Stobo Castle Ladies Day on Friday June 14, which is expected to attract a 9000 crowd, the William Hill Scottish Sprint Cup on June 15 and the Investec Wealth & Investment race day on June 28.

Musselburgh Racecourse commercial manager, Sarah Montgomery, said: "The summer months offer something for ever type of racing follower at Musselburgh and it's all hands on deck as we stage seven meetings in an eight week period.

Police appeal for witnesses to Portobello assaults last weekend

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses after three men were assaulted in Portobello over the weekend.

The incident happened around 10.45pm on Saturday 27 April 2013 within the Three Monkeys pub. Three men entered the bar and after a short time became involved in a disturbance with patrons and staff inside.

As a result, a 25-year-old member of bar staff sustained minor injuries, while another man aged 39 suffered serious facial injuries and was taken to the RIE for treatment.

A further male, who was assaulted during the incident left before police arrival. The suspects then made off from the premises onto Portobello High Street before being lost to sight.

Detectives are now urging anyone who can assist with their enquiries to come forward.

The first suspect is described as white, late twenties to late thirties, 5ft 10ins tall with a stocky build, short brown hair and round features. He was wearing khaki-coloured trousers and a beige crew-necked top.

The second suspect is described as being white, between 35 and 45-years-old, 5ft 7ins tall with a stocky build and bulging eyes.

The third suspect is described as white, late twenties, average height with a thin build. He was wearing a light-coloured top that possibly had leather patches on the sleeves.

Detective Constable John McShane said:- "All three suspects are believed to have visited the pub, having attended a local boxing event at the nearby town hall, and almost immediately became involved in a dispute with those inside the premises.

"During the disturbance three men suffered various injuries and we are keen to trace the third victim, who was not present when officers arrived.

"Similarly, anyone who can help us identify the men responsible, or who has any other information relevant to this investigation should contact police immediately."

David Batchelor Flatlands

David Batchelor (born 1955, Dundee) is perhaps best known for his vividly coloured sculptural installations of illuminated lightboxes, industrial dollies, and other found objects. These three-dimensional works perhaps belie the fact that the root of his interest is and always has been in drawing, painting, abstraction and the monochrome — preoccupations that are best charted in his immensely varied 2D oeuvre. This exhibition will be the first in-depth survey of David Batchelor's drawings, paintings and photographic work.

Trained originally as a painter, Batchelor has, over the last twenty years, made colour his leitmotif — not the colour found in nature, but the synthetic colour of the illuminated street sign and lurid glare of the nocturnal metropolis. Whether using conventional materials such as pencil, ink, pastel, gouache and acrylic, or highlighter pen, spray or gloss paint and industrial tape, Batchelor's drawings on paper or card show how formal rigour and modernist aesthetic can be subverted by the deployment of intense, exuberant colour.

This exhibition represents a first considered attempt to analyse Batchelor's graphic register by critically reflecting on his use of surface, painting, drawing, and colour. It will present work created over the last two decades, including drawings, paintings, photographs, slide projections and preparatory drawings for sculpture. It will also include sculptures in which a sense of line and plane take precedence over mass and volume.

The exhibition is curated by Andrea Schlieker, who worked with Batchelor as Director of the Folkestone Triennial in 2008, and

will be accompanied by a catalogue with an interview of the artist by Schlieker as well as a new essay by Rudi Fuchs.

Former Hibs Great Dave Gibson back in Edinburgh



Football fans from the capital are in for a treat tonight as former Hibs and Scotland star Dave Gibson will be reminiscing about his time at Easter Road as well as signing copies of his book 'Gibbo — The Dave Gibson Story' at the Hibs Supporters Club in Sunnyside Place from 7.30pm.

The skilful midfielder returned to the country of his birth on Wednesday to launch his biography, and the Edinburgh Reporter caught up with Dave at the SFA Hall of Fame inside Hampden Park where he was joined by former Scotland team-mates Davie Holt, Bertie Auld, Ian Ure and Davie Wilson. In addition, a number of pals from his national service days turned up, and the stories flew thick and fast.

Dave told the Edinburgh Reporter: "I grew up in the mining village of Winchburgh, not far from the great Willie Thornton who played for Rangers. He was an inspiration, but there have been a few good players to come from the village, such as John Gorman who played for Celtic and a promising youngster with long hair who played for Exeter City called Alan Devlin.

I was a Hearts fan, and idolised Willie Bauld, and actually played with him in a game for Edinburgh Select against Burnley which ended 7-4 for them. Three players including myself scored a hat-trick that night. I almost signed for Hearts, but

the manager at the time Tommy Walker heard that I was Hearts daft and they tried to get me on the cheap. I was offered £4.00 per week, and Hibs offered me £9.00 so I signed for them, and made my debut a couple of months later playing alongside players who I had been shouting for the past few years such as Gordon Smith, Lawrie Reilly, Eddie Turnbull and Willie Ormond. That team was called the 'Famous Four and a half.' I can't remember much about the game apart from I ran about a lot. I then played alongside the great Joe Baker who was the fastest player I have ever seen He was a born goal scorer and when you passed the ball to him you never got it back. He had a special talent."

■ Dave was capped seven times for Scotland, and his first came in an infamous game against Austria in 1963 at Hampden Park which was abandoned with Scotland winning 4-1 after three visitors were sent off, one for spitting at the referee.

He also played (and scored) in an impressive 6-2 win against Spain in the Bernabeau Stadium, a result which would be unthinkable in today's climate. In all he scored three international goals, the other two coming against Wales and Finland.

Dave first made his name with Livingston United before joining Hibs in 1956 as a 17 year old. The slightly built youngster with the distinctive blond hair soon began to make a name for himself scoring an impressive ten goals in 23 reserve team outings.

During his six year tenure at Easter Road, Dave played 60 games, including two Inter City Fairs Cup semi-finals against Roma, and scored 10 goals.

His form with Hibs attracted the attention of Leicester City manager Matt Gillies, who had actually spotted Dave when he was in the army doing his national service.

A massive £40,000 cheque secured Dave's signature, and he went

on to become a fans' favourite at Filbert Street, where he was the playmaker and creative force behind the great Leicester City team of the early sixties, which is still revered in the city.

As he was still doing national service when he signed, his appearances were restricted, and he eventually made his debut on 2 March 1962. The following season, Dave began to form a deadly partnership down the left-flank of Leicester's attack with Mike Stringfellow, and became a key fixture in the Foxes' side as they chased the league and cup double. With five games remaining, Leicester sat top of the table and were in the FA Cup Final against Manchester United, but they eventually fell short in both competitions, finishing fourth in the league whilst Manchester United won 3-1 at Wembley, thanks to goals from Denis Law and David Herd for Matt Busby's first trophy since the Munich air disaster.

Dave then helped Leicester to victory in the 1964 League Cup final scoring a goal in both legs of the final against Stoke City. The first leg ended in a 1-1 draw thanks mainly to Leicester's keeper Gordon Banks, and City won the second leg 3-2. Dave's goal was a near post bullet header from a Howard Reilly corner.

He also helped Leicester to the 1965 League Cup final against Chelsea. The London team won the first leg 3-2 at Filbert Street and held on for a 0-0 draw at Stamford Bridge to win the trophy.

In 1969, Dave helped Leicester City to the FA Cup Final at Wembley, but a Neil Young goal midway through the first half gave Manchester City the victory.

Dave joined Aston Villa in 1970 where he played 19 times over two seasons, scoring one goal. He then ended his career at Exeter City for whom he played 71 times, scoring three goals, before hanging his boots up and becoming a postman. He later ran a care home in Leicestershire, and now lives in Dorset.

Co-writer Chris Westcott told the Edinburgh Reporter: "I have written five other books about football players and I knew Dave through Derek Dougan. Dave is a legend at Leicester City, and many of their fans believe that he was the best ever player to play for the club. This year is the 50th anniversary of Leicester's FA Cup Final against Manchester United and also of the infamous Scotland v Austria 'friendly' which was abandoned with Scotland leading 4-1 after three Austria players were sent off. Dave made his international debut that night so we were keen to get the book out to commemorate both games. Dave is a great character with a host of great memories about the game that modern day players wouldn't believe."

Last word goes to Dave who hopes that his book will be an inspiration for youngsters to make their own mark in the game that he still loves: "The book is really about a wee boy from a miners row who made it to the top as a professional footballer. There were no TVs, Computers or ipads when I was growing up so we spent all out time practicing out football skills with a 'tanner ba.' This has been a special day for me to be united with my team-mates and army pals at Hampden Park, 50 years after making my Scotland debut. I remember it was a proud day for me and my family as 90,000 Scotland fans cheered us onto the pitch and the pipe band played 'Scotland the Brave' and I remember thinking that it doesn't get any better than this."

ART FOR GLASGOW 2014 ATHLETES' BEDROOMS — Competition kick starts 2014 Commonwealth Games Schools Programme

Edinburgh pupils are being urged to showcase their artistic talents to the world by creating Games-inspired artwork for the Athletes' Village at the Glasgow 2014 Commonwealth Games.

This unique opportunity was announced today at the launch of Game On Scotland, the official education programme for the Games.

Using the Games and its 17 sports as creative inspiration, primary and secondary pupils will be challenged to come up with 6,500 pieces of artwork to decorate bedrooms in the

Athletes' Village where the athletes and officials from across the Commonwealth will be staying.

The winning designs will be gifted to the visitors as a memento of their time in Scotland, and athletes will be encouraged to send a note expressing their personal thanks back to the young artists.

Game On Scotland, which is a partnership between Education Scotland, the Scottish Government, Glasgow 2014 and Glasgow City Council, will use the Commonwealth Games as an inspiring and fun context for learning across the curriculum.

With the website now live, teachers and educators across Scotland and throughout the Commonwealth can access a range of educational resources for learners of all stages including film and image banks, Games history, sport profiles and materials on the Commonwealth.

There are also unique opportunities for Scottish schools to engage with the Games, available to all ages, such as the art competition.

Artist Vincent Deighan, who goes by the pen name of Frank Quitely, said:-"I know how satisfying it is to see your work being appreciated and this is a fantastic opportunity for 6,500 school kids across Scotland to see their creative work on the world stage. I've seen first hand some of the artistic talent emerging in Scotland and I'm sure the pupil's artwork will help inspire athletes to go for gold in 2014."

The City of Edinburgh Council's Education Convenor, Councillor Paul Godzik, said:-"This competition is a fantastic opportunity for schoolchildren to share in the excitement of the Games. I hope as many schools as possible will enter, and who knows, perhaps one of the City's pupils will have the

privilege of having their artwork displayed in the Commonwealth Village!"

Shona Robison, Minister for Commonwealth Games and Sport said:-"The Game On Scotland education programme will transport children across Scotland to the heart of the Commonwealth Games, taking them on a global learning journey which will benefit them now and in the future.

"Young people are at the heart of the Games and its legacy, and we're creating opportunities for children to get involved and experience the excitement. We know that major events such as the Commonwealth Games have the power to transform the lives of children and young people and we have the legacy programmes in place to inspire the next generation."

Schools can apply only by registering on the Game On Scotland website at www.gameonscotland.org. Competition packs will be issued in August with winning entries announced in early 2014.
