Edinburgh Contemporary Crafts raise money for new workshop and gallery

Edinburgh Contemporary Crafts has raised £8,000 towards the £20,000 needed to refurbish Scotland's first multidisciplinary craft workshop, gallery and shop.

The total raised so far is a combination of public donations, business sponsorship and support in kind and the landlord James Hay Pension Trustees has also generously agreed an eight month rent-free period to give the community facility a head start.

The concept is the vision of Louise Smith who established ECC in 2011, providing workshop space on Home Street for nine resident makers who have taught more than 200 would-be crafters over the last 18 months. Having outgrown its current home, new premises have been found on Blair Street in the heart of Edinburgh's Old Town.

The crowd-funding campaign is now looking to raise a further f12,000 to enable the refit of the new premises. Individuals can pledge anything from f15, with a donation of f55 and above giving you a full day of workshops and demos, live music and a slap-up lunch in return. Businesses can sponsor up to f1000, with benefits including promotion of their brand, private staff workshop days or team building events, and invitations to private events. The crowd-funding campaign will be live until Sunday 28th April.

The new multi-disciplinary craft workshop — offering courses in screen printing, illustration, crafted textiles, book binding, dressmaking and upholstery — will open to the public on Monday 6th May with pottery and jewellery courses starting soon afterwards. The permanent gallery and shop are due to open in July.

To date ECC has been funded by the makers themselves however to move the project forward the new premises need to be significantly refurbished. Money will be spent on knocking down walls, stripping everything back to the original stonework and features, installing gallery lighting and glass partitions, and creating specialist workshop facilities including a heat proofed kiln room, individual studio spaces and custom built storage. They already have many of the tools and equipment, and are hopeful of future funding to expand the workshop facilities.

Louise Smith said:- "This has been such an amazing process and what has surprised and delighted me more than anything is how many people have offered their help. We have received specialist knowledge and services — such as architectural planning and website development — that could otherwise cost a fortune, and so many people have offered to wield a sledgehammer or a paint brush in order to get the bulk of the building work done for free.

"This together with the crowd-funding campaign, which will pay for the building materials, has turned it into a real community project. It's empowering to help create a thriving craft community and it means there are so many people involved from the start, taking joint ownership of the project."

All those involved in running Edinburgh Contemporary Crafts are practicing makers who are passionate about their craft, enjoy teaching, and believe that craft can be a catalyst for social and personal change. The move to Blair Street will help to support new and established makers and encourage public appreciation and enjoyment of quality Scottish craft.

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Giant Chess Arrives in the Meadows

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The appearance of a Giant Chess set on the Meadows in Edinburgh this summer should enable children to enjoy the ancient game in the fresh air, while also promoting essential life skills, according to those behind the project.

It has been organised by Jason Kouchak, an acclaimed classical musician and contributor to public projects, whose vision is to set up giant chess sets in major capital cities. The children involved in the Holland Park giant chess in London which Kouchak organised two years ago, have so far participated in national competitions with local English schools, and Kouchak wants to take it further hoping that Edinburgh will play against London. The idea is to organise international competitions, with a giant game being launched in Paris in October.

Kouchak believes the importance of chess is that it teaches skills which are increasingly needed in an age of computer games. He said: "The value is to inspire, inform, educate and entertain them. Focus, concentration etiquette and issues of respect all improve as the players work together to teach each other and set up the pieces. The game of chess has great interactive value, and there is no interaction when they're on the computer."

Sciennes Primary, which is close to The Meadows has been involved in the project as a result of their chess club, and pupils were present at the launch, although the ceremony was cut short due to the sudden bad weather.

Kouchak, himself a chess player, and friends with Viswanathan Anand, the Indian chess Grandmaster and the current World Chess Champion, received permission from The Scottish Government and the council to set up the project in The Meadows.

He provided the giant chess pieces himself, with the City Council supplying the paved squares. The huge chessboard will be painted twice a year, and park rangers will set up the pieces and put them away at the end of the day.Tuition is also being arranged arranged with the involvement of Scottish grand masters, but is yet to be finalised.

Adults are welcome to take part. The game is suitable for ages of 7 and upwards, and aimed at all levels of skill. Adults are welcome to take part, and also encouraged to supervise the children, and it is aimed at all levels of skill. There is no charge for participation.

Edinburgh employment lawyer to give evident to Holyrood on women in the legal profession today

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Ahead of giving evidence to the Scottish Parliament's Equal Opportunities Committee as part of its Women and Work Inquiry, Joyce Cullen, Convener of the Law Society of Scotland's Employment Law Committee has today commented on women working within the legal profession.

Mrs. Cullen said:-"The proportion of practising solicitors who are women has been continually increasing, particularly over the past decade, and women now make up around 48% of the solicitors' branch of the legal profession."

"Although women outnumber men as newly admitted solicitors each year, and there are two and a half times as many women as men in the 25 to 30 age group, they continue to be remain relatively under-represented in senior positions, for example as partners in private practice.

"A study of Women in the Legal Profession, undertaken by The Law Society of Scotland and the Equal Opportunities Commission in 2005, found that a large majority of women believed that it was very likely or at least possible that being female was a barrier to partnership, though in contrast, a clear majority of men stated that this was not at all likely to be the case.

"The study also indicated that having childcare responsibilities was a major factor, with 52% of female

respondents (though only 11% of male respondents) considering motherhood was very likely to be a barrier to partnership. In contrast, over 90% of all respondents felt that fatherhood was not at all likely to be a barrier to partnership.

"The study found that within the category of equity partners, 74% of men had dependants, compared to only 53% of women. However, this is not an up to date study and it seems likely that changing attitudes in the intervening years, particularly towards childcare responsibilities, will have had an impact on these perceptions."

The Law Society of Scotland is to launch a major research project in May 2013 examining current working patterns across the profession, in addition to solicitor employment, diversity and discrimination. The project, which will be carried out by independent research company MVA Consultancy, will build on studies of the legal profession carried out in 2005 and 2006.

Mrs. Cullen added:-"It will be interesting to find out if there have been significant changes since 2005, given the substantial increase in the proportion of women solicitors within the legal profession in Scotland, when the research project reports back later this year."

Shortlist for Walter Scott Prize announced today

The shortlist for the fourth £25,000 Walter Scott Prize for historical fiction is announced today by the judging panel. The six novels, with settings ranging from Tudor and Restoration England to the slums of Victorian London, and from the bloody battlefields of the Western Front in World War One to the highlands of Malaysia during the 'Malayan Emergency', encompass a giddying diversity of setting in both time and place, echoing the oeuvre of the writer after whom the prize is named, Sir Walter Scott.

The judges commented:

"This year's shortlist is rich and complex, contains breathtaking writing, and gloriously unexpected stories which refresh understandings of history in a way in which Sir Walter Scott would have approved. The shortlist exemplifies the extraordinary quality of newly-published writing that is set in the past: from ancient to recent history."

The shortlisted books are by authors from Australia and

Malaysia, as well as from England, strengthening the international dimension brought to the prize by last year's opening up of the rules to include writers from the Commonwealth. Books must have been written in English, with the majority of their setting being at least 60 years ago, in keeping with the prize's definition of 'historical' borrowed from Walter Scott himself in the subtitle of his Waverley novels: 'Tis Sixty Years Since.'

The Walter Scott Prize, founded in 2009 by the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch and awarded at the Brewin Dolphin Borders Book Festival in June, is the largest annual UK prize to be judged outside London, and honours the legacy and achievements of Sir Walter Scott, founder of the historical novel. Scott's influence has been further revived this year, with several new books and documentaries on his life, a new radio adaptation of his work read by David Tennant, and the re-opening of his Borders home Abbotsford after substantial restoration.

The judging panel for the Walter Scott Prize for historical fiction comprises Kirsty Wark, Louise Richardson, Jonathan Tweedie, Elizabeth Laird, Elizabeth Buccleuch, and chair Alistair Moffat. The judges' criteria include originality and innovation, quality of writing, a strong narrative, and the ability of a book to shed light on the present as well as the past. Books can be by writers living in the UK, Ireland or the Commonwealth as long as they are writing in English and the book is first published in these countries.

Shortlisted authors are invited to attend the award ceremony and announcement on Friday 14th June, which is a public event as part of the Brewin Dolphin Borders Book Festival in Melrose, near Scott's home Abbotsford. As well as enjoying the hospitality of the Duke and Duchess of Buccleuch at their home Bowhill, shortlisted authors this year will also exclusively be offered a private preview tour of Abbotsford following its restoration.

He is likely to explain the Council is already setting up an independent hotline. But there will be one crucial difference. The petitioner's one would only be accessible to the leader of each political grouping at the Council. The HR one will be accessed by the Chief Executive for the Corporate Management team.

"The case they will make is why their proposal is safer. They will explain that the last two whistleblowers who were disciplined would not have been protected under the HR plan. They forked out thousands of pounds in lawyers fees at Employment Tribunals to get justice. Their crime? Reporting Council mismanagement.

The nub of the Petitioners bid is for a truly effective check and balance on Council malpractise, no matter which Party is in power."

Fiona Hyslop MSP, Cabinet Secretary for Culture and External Affairs

Fiona Hyslop was appointed Minister for Culture and External Affairs in December 2009. She established the cultural development body, Creative Scotland, in July 2010, as part of the Public Services Reform Act. She also secured funding towards the Dundee V&A project, the new Bannockburn visitor centre, and the creation of the Robert Burns Birthplace Museum in Ayrshire. As part of the Scottish Government's programme of international development, Fiona Hyslop launched strategic plans for engaging with India and Pakistan in 2010. Her Ministerial portfolio covers External Affairs, Europe, Culture and the Arts, Broadcasting, Architecture, Built Heritage, Lottery Funding, Historic Scotland, National Records of Scotland and Major Events Strategy.

Prof. Dr. Jacek Purchla, Kracow International Cultural Centre Professor Purchla is the founder and director of the International Cultural Centre in Krakow, established in 1991. He is a full professor of humanities and a member of the Polish Academy of Arts and Sciences, head of the Department of Economic and Social History, UNESCO Chair for Heritage and Urban Studies at the Krakow University of Economics, and the head of the Centre of European Heritage, Institute of European Studies at the Jagiellonian University.

His research areas are urban development, social history and art history of the 19th and 20th centuries, as well as the theory and protection of cultural heritage. He is the author of over four hundred academic works, including a number of books. From 1990 to 1991 he was a vice-mayor of the city of Krakow. 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VIDEO – Paolozzi Prize for Art

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Four young people in Edinburgh were celebrated for their artistic achievements at a ceremony at the National Gallery of Scotland last night when the Paolozzi Prize for Art was awarded.

The overall winner of this year's prestigious Paolozzi Prize for Art was Lorna Searl, an S6 pupil at Boroughmuir High School, who was presented with a £500 prize, with the three other winners each receiving a £250 prize.

Peyton Murdoch, from James Gillespie's High School won the 'New Directions' category, Siobhan Anderson, Edinburgh Secure Services came out on top in the 'Overcoming Barriers' category, and Kit Andrew, St. Thomas of Aquin's High School, won the 'Talent and Creativity' award.

Nominations, which were open to pupils in S4, S5 and S6 Art, were judged by a panel of art experts: Scottish artist Richard Demarco, Dundee academic Michael Spens who commissioned the Paolozzi ceilings at Cleish Castle, Duncan Robertson, freelancer with National Gallery's Education team, who trained in Paolozzi's class in Munich, and Councillor Paul Edie who had the original idea to set up the prize.

Education Convener, Councillor Paul Godzik said:- "This prize is all about recognising and rewarding the next generation of creative talent, and I've been very impressed by the calibre of the work submitted. I'd like to congratulate our four worthy prizewinners, and everyone who took the time to submit their work. I hope that for some of our participants, this is the first step in a successful artistic career".

Artist and judge Duncan Robertson said:-"Eduardo Paolozzi was a great encourager of young talent, and would have been very supportive of this award in his name. I was extremely impressed with the standard of the entries, and while it was difficult to decide between the candidates in many of the categories, Lorna really stood out as the overall winner."

This annual prize was organised by the City of Edinburgh Council's Arts and Learning and Children and Families teams, in partnership with the National Gallery of Scotland.

Sir Eduardo Paolozzi (1924-2005) was a ground-breaking, Edinburgh-born artist renowned for his sculptures, prints, paintings and tapestries. His most famous works include the coloured mosaic in London's Tottenham Court Road underground station and the iconic foot sculpture located at the top of Edinburgh's Leith Walk.

Thoughts on the funeral of Margaret Thatcher

As the coffin was carried through the doors at St Paul's and the bells sounded 11am with military timing, my thoughts were of paying personal respects rather than the world impact of Margaret Thatcher.

It was not so much the historic occasion, though that did weigh significantly. Nor was it simply setting an example to my children and grandchildren. I was also representing my fellow Conservative Councillors. All of these were reasons for joining the crowds lining the route, but some years ago, having seen her courage, clarity of vision and conviction, I resolved that her example and inspiration merited a personal pilgrimage to the funeral to mark her passing with respect.

The crowd around me was relaxed and respectful with a tone of appreciation, affection and even awe. Of course the procession was spectacular – with the ceremony, its precision and colour making an huge impact – and despite the security risks, we were within five yards of the cortège.

The coffin, carried on a gun carriage and movingly draped in

the union flag, was a reminder of the Great Leveller who comes for us all.

It is not for us all to achieve in life the far reaching and positive influence on world events that Margaret Thatcher did. But her passing from life is a reminder of the imperative to use the peace which we enjoy, and to which she contributed so significantly.

A frequent refrain in recent days has been that she was divisive. More accurately, her clear-sighted analysis exposed fault lines which were already there. It takes two sides for there to be divisions.

The world is a more peaceable place for her clarity, convictions and, yes, her exposing of divisions.

'Still Life, Roses and Chinese Blue', made £349, 250, 'Blue & White Vase, Roses, Melon and Orange sold for £277,250 and 'Stlll Life' was bought for £181,250. The first two works display the meticulous sense of composition and subtle palette characteristic of Peploe in the 1920s. The earlier, 'Still Life', shows more fluid painterly brushwork and pure colour.

Also by Peploe, 'Crawford' sold for £73,250 and 'A Summer Afternoon' for £61,250.

Bonhams Head of Scottish Art, Chris Brickley, said:- "The results for Peploe and the very good prices for the other Colourist painters in the sale show the continuing appeal of these artists whose work has made such an important contribution to the standing of Scottish painting both at home and round the world."

Other highlights of the sale include Joseph Farquharson's 'The Shortening Winter's Day is near a Close' which made £157,250 against an estimate of £60,000-80,000 and a view of Iona by Francis Cadell which sold for £91,000.

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses following the theft of a high-value mountain bike.

The incident happened around 4.30am on Monday 16th April at an address in Newhaven Road.

Five things you need to know today

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Campaign against Violence Day — Works on McDonald Road — Pandas — Paolozzi Prize — A plea from the Moderator

Police in Edinburgh were taking part in the National Campaign against Violence day last Friday and our photograph shows a group of officers on their way to arrest a man in West Edinburgh who was suspected of football hooliganism at the Hibs v Hearts match on 3 January 2013. That match started just before 8:00pm in the evening, and evidence from CCTV and witnesses had allowed the police to identify those involved.

The man was eventually arrested and removed to a police van after the officers knocked at his front door and kept a watchful eye on any other possible escape routes. At the same time however, his wife who objected first of all to the police knocking on her door unexpectedly at around lunchtime. We heard shouts of "You need a warrant to come in here, where's your warrant?" and we were a little distance away from the ground floor flat.

A small group of onlookers had gathered by the time she raised her voice even more, by then objecting to the press presence outside her house, and she was vocal enough to be charged with a breach of the peace. She was removed from her house in a separate car. All of those arrested on Friday were taken initially to St Leonard's Police Station where there are around 50 cells.

It will have taken till today for all of those arrested in Friday's police action day to be brought to the Sheriff Court in Edinburgh. It was seen as a positive advantage that some of those arrested who might have been involved in football violence were taken into custody the day before another big match involving Hibs.

One essential aspect of the policing being carried out on Friday was that senior officers were involved in front line policing. The Reporter was accompanying Chief Inspector Mark Patterson who admitted he was not usually out walking the street, although he is present at large demos etc. But Patterson said:-"This is what I joined the police for. It gives me a good chance to find out what the normal job entails and allows us to increase our public presence all at the same time.

"Having this first national Campaign against Violence day on a Friday poses some challenges, but we have additional custody staff on duty to process all of those who will be arrested today, and of course there are additional custody centres we can use right across Scotland."

The police were using a mix of marked and unmarked police cars. There were four teams out across the city, each one with

a female officer and a local officer. Patterson continued:-"It is useful to split the officers up. Other CAV days may have a mix of plain clothes officers too depending on what is required. There was a lot of violence, including assaults and disorders in Dalry Road before the Derby match on 3 January and we are targetting seven addresses today. There are an additional 63 officers out in Edinburgh today. There are 24 officers from the national alcohol and violence reduction unit. Out of the balance 17 are usually back office staff in Edinburgh – superintendents, chief inspectors and the like. They will supplement our normal front line officers.

There are other teams out in Drylaw and St Leonard's areas today too. The intention is that all 7 addresses are targetted at the same time. The focus for us today is very much those who have already committed violent crimes or those who might. It is all to do with the Police Scotland Keeping People Safe."

Earlier the officers had been briefed at Wester Hailes Police Station and shown photographs of those they were out to apprehend. The location was chosen as that station has responsibility for Tynecastle Stadium where the offences had been committed.

As we sat in the car waiting for the other officers to arrive news came through of someone in East Lothian who had undertaken to show up at St Leonard's. Whether they did or not, the police knew who they were after across Edinburgh on Friday and had made four arrests by Friday evening.

The work required to be carried out at the McDonald Road junction with Leith Walk will involve the temporary closure to through traffic to McDonald Road along with a partial northbound bus lane closure around the location of the junction itself. The temporary closure will be from Wednesday 17 April for up to two weeks. Traffic diversions will be in operation and the alternative access routes to the street will be via Pilrig Street, Annandale Street and/or Broughton Road.

It was at the beginning of this month that police in Edinburgh first put out an appeal for help in finding jewellery owned by the Church of Scotland which had gone missing, along with the bag that they were in, from a luggage trolley early in the morning at Edinburgh Airport on 5 April 2013.

Now, a couple of weeks later, there is still no trace of the ring and the cross and The Edinburgh Reporter met with The Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland who is appealing for any help in finding the missing items.

The Rt Rev Albert Bogle is the current Moderator and he said:-"There is a reward of about a four figure sum if the jewellery is returned in good condition. There will be no questions asked if the person who has these items just hands them in to a police station or here in George Street. Perhaps the person who has them has just not realised what they have picked up.

"The cross is a very nice piece of jewellery and is unique. Its value is not in the metal, but in the item itself. It has a nice little chain on it and there are fishes on it, as well as the St Andrew's Cross. There is a Scottish theme with that item. We really do want to get it back."

These are two unique items – a gold ring and a cross pendant – related to the office of the Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland. The bag itself is notable as it has Peruvian style embroidery on it, and the ring with an amethyst stone has the St Andrew's Cross, a burning bush and the motto 'Nec Tamen Consumebatur'.

The Moderator had been on a trip supporting Christian Aid in their mission to highlight the conditions of miners in South Africa.

Government to look at rules for allotments

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Plans to simplify and overhaul Scotland's allotment rules were announced today by The Scottish Government.

Rural Affairs Secretary Richard Lochhead has launched a consultation to consider the shape of future allotment legislation.

Among the questions being asked are:

Should councils be required to provide people in their area within a specified timeframe

Should councils have a duty to provide a specific number of allotments in their area per head of population

Mr Lochhead said:-"Growing your own food is continuing to grow in popularity in Scotland and this goes hand in hand with an increasing desire to know where our food comes from.

"Allotments provide a range of benefits including better health, an opportunity to learn new skills, and an understanding of where food comes from – not forgetting the chance to eat the fruits of your labour. We're committed to helping people to grow their own food and this consultation will consider what changes should be made to the existing legislation to make it simpler and fit for today's community needs.

"Many communities have expressed a desire to get back to nature and more involved with growing their own food and that's exactly what we're working to make possible."

Allotment consultation

Here in Edinburgh the council is currently working in terms of the <u>allotment strategy</u> which was agreed upon and published in 2010. New allotments have been opened at India Place, in response to the finding that there were at least twice as many people on the waiting list as there were plots. However now there is a four year waiting list for the 22 raised beds which were formed there. One of the main presumptions in the new council strategy was to presume against allotment holders using vehicles to get to their allotment site, so this gets rid of any need to provide car parking.

There are other initiatives to provide more space in the city for gardeners who do not have their own land. The Edinburgh Garden Share Scheme is an arrangement for a gardener to take over a garden where perhaps the owner is older and is not able to keep the garden any longer. This promotes gardening and also some social interaction. The prospective gardeners are subject to a Disclosure Scotland check.

There are also community gardens projects across the city funded by the Climate Challenge Fund, who have also recently announced substantial funding for a new scheme in Wester Hailes called Edible Estates.

In September last year the council's Transport and Environment Committee agreed:- "That land already in the ownership of the Council be used to establish new allotment sites before additional land on the outskirts of the city was purchased and that regular progress reports be presented to Committee."

There have been no further reports on this matter since last September.

There is information for prospective allotment holders <u>here on</u> <u>the council website</u>, but don't get out your spade just yet there is still a long waiting list.

The Edinburgh Reporter's Weekly Sports Round-up

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Normally the Edinburgh Reporter's Weekly Sports Round-up starts with rugby, but not this week as we send out congratulations to Pat Fenlon and his players for reaching the William Hill Scottish Cup Final after a sensational comeback from 3-0 down to beat Falkirk after extra time at Hampden Park on Saturday. This result means that Hibs will play in back to back Scottish Cup Finals for the first time since 1923/24.

Also a big 'well done' to everyone who braved the inclement weather to take part in the Rock and Roll Half Marathon.

Football

Over 17,000 Hibs fans made the trip to the national stadium, but they were stunned to be three goals down after 30 minutes, however a spirited second half performance with goals from teenage winger Alex Harris, Leigh Griffiths and Eoin Doyle levelled the score-line, before man of the match Griffiths sealed a famous victory with a stunning 30 yard strike near the end.

After the game, an emotionally drained Pat Fenlon said:- "It was a horrendous first half, but we showed tremendous character and played really well after that. It wasn't much of a team talk and more of a rant, but it worked. But, in fairness to the players, they knew they'd let themselves down and the fans. I felt like leaving myself at half-time. It was difficult to watch and difficult to take and I apologise to the supporters for that first half – and that's down to me."

"We put everybody through the wringer today but have shown tremendous character. The players themselves had plenty to say at half-time, but it was a tremendous comeback."

"But what they have shown is that there's massive, massive character within the group and they've shown that in spades – and that end of the game was different class."

"Young Danny (Handling) and Alex (Harris) were different class for us and it was difficult for them to come on when we were chasing the game. Leigh Griffiths doesn't miss too many penalties, but we just got back to passing the ball after that. Today wasn't Leigh's best game for us, but the finish for the goal, that's him. He doesn't let things like that bother him and he's got a great attitude. I'm delighted for him too because he's Hibs-daft and wanted to be in the final; we're there now.

"We've got five big league games to show that desire again too. We've had some tremendous games this year: Hearts in the first round and Aberdeen, Kilmarnock and now Falkirk; we'll worry about the final and see what happens then."

Hibs will face Celtic in the Final after another epic semi at the national stadium on Sunday. Kris Commons gave the Hoops an early lead, but Dundee United fought back and took the lead through goals from Gary Mackay-Stevens and Jon Daly. Celtic equalised through Victor Wanyama, before Commons added his second and Celtic's third, but a late Jon Daly header sent the tie into extra time.

Former Hibs striker Anthony Stokes scored Celtic's fourth with a bullet header in the 11th minute, and Celtic held on to make the final an all green affair.

Jamie Walker was voted Hearts' Young Player of the Year at the club's □annual awards ceremony at Tynecastle.

The winger, who has broken into the first team this season and earned a call-up to the Scotland Under-21 squad, was presented with his award by Hearts manager Gary Locke, above. The Under-20s prize went to midfielder Callum Tapping, while Angus Beith took the Under-17s player of the year award.

Gary Stoddart received the George Nicolson Recognition Award for his coaching role with the club's Academy despite battling serious illness.

In advance of the expected publication of the proposed code of good governance for Scottish universities this week, National

Union of Students, NUS Scotland, has produced a report showing the worrying levels of high pay among senior staff atScottish universities.

The report collated figures taken from the most recent university financial statements and existing freedom of information requests, and found:

- Average basic pay (before pension contributions and benefits in kind) is over £200,00
- Just two principals have a salary below that of the First Minister
- Across 18 institutions, 88 individuals earn more than the First Minister
- On average, across Scotland the highest university earner receives 16.10 times the lowest (full-time equivalent)

In its submission to the consultants undertaking the development of the governance code, NUS Scotland has called for an explicit maximum ratio between highest and lowest earners, staff and student representation on university remuneration committees, and greater transparency in the setting and reporting of senior level pay.

Robin Parker, President of NUS Scotland said:- "It's unjustifiable for university principals and other senior staff to routinely be paid such large sums. There are 88 senior staff members at Scottish universities who earn more than the First Minister, and across our institutions the gap between the lowest and highest paid is too large, with some receiving almost 20 times that of the lowest paid university employee.

"Universities need academic autonomy, but they should not have the freedom to pay such large salaries and to allow large gaps between those at the top end and the lowest paid. There are hundreds of millions of pounds of public money quite rightly going into universities over the next few years, we must make sure that this money is used on the front line, not on increasing already substantial senior salaries.

"At a time when everyone is feeling the pinch it would be completely out of touch for university principals to think we didn't need to have greater controls on such high levels of pay. Last year's review into university governance was absolutely right to recognise that controversies over high pay undermines the trust we put in our universities. When there are senior managers getting paid far above and beyond what even the First Minister does, while the tens of thousands of staff below them receive a fraction of that, you can see why.

"The forthcoming governance code for Scottish universities provides the opportunity to start addressing the imbalance we see in university pay. A maximum pay ratio between highest and lowest earners and greater staff and student input into pay decisions are just two ways we can tackle inflated pay. These need to be defined in to code to ensure that we have that vital trust in our universities and those who are leading them."

Tomorrow there is a mini-Seed Truck event organised by People's Postcode Lottery on Castle Street. The Seed Truck visits schools and community groups across Scotland, educating visitors in growing their own produce and taking action on climate change.

Their expertise has led to an increase in urban community gardens across the country. The branded van (which we are told looks really cool!) will be on Castle Street from 11am – 2pm and will be open to the public to go along and see / learn how they can create their own urban garden spaces.

Rugby — Edinburgh v Connacht

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Edinburgh v Connacht, RaboDirect PR012, 12 April 2013

Edinburgh were on for three-in-a-row for the first time in, oh... ages, with only once bottom of the league fixtures, Connacht, standing in their way. But no more. The visitors had the majority of the ball in a match in which Edinburgh managed to lose a decent lead and then found themselves playing catchup for the rest of the night.

The first half hour of the match was reduced to a kicking contest between Greg Laidlaw and Dan Parks, Laidlaw coming out 12-3 ahead. It then went a bit wrong for the home side. Carrying the ball upfield a couple of wide passes saw a huge overlap appear from nowhere, which Connacht flanker, Mike Kearney took advantage of to gallop through to score the visitor's first try. Parks scored the conversion and in one fell swoop, the score was a worryingly close 12-10.

Laidlaw pulled Edinburgh another three points clear after Parks was carded for a deliberate knock-down, but a few minutes later Connacht were back to within two from another penalty from 'substitute' kicker Gavin Duffy to end the first half 15-13 to Edinburgh.

Within 10 or so minutes of the restart, Connacht had pulled a lead out through two Parks penalties. Edinburgh had had a chance but the final pass, as ever, went astray. From the

restart, Edinburgh were awarded yet another penalty at the breakdown, which cost a yellow for the visitors. A successful kick pulled Edinburgh up to within a point at 18-19. Geoff Cross then had a penetrating run up through the defence awarded with a scrum to the home side, the resultant infringement from Connacht giving Laidlaw an easy three points to take the score up to 21-19 to the home side.

Another kick exchange took the score to 24-22 to Edinburgh and then, with 10 minutes to go, a seemingly speculative stab through with the boot saw a comedy of errors enacted in the Edinburgh defence as first Brown, then Laidlaw failed to deal with the randomly bouncing ball. Animals die in Fire at West Lothian Zoo

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Firefighters have controlled the fire at the Five Sisters zoo

which broke out just before 4am this morning. Resources have been scaled back to two fire appliances and crews remain on site dealing with small pockets of fire and assisting zoo and vet staff.

The alarm was raised at 3.50am this morning to reports that the tropical house at the zoo was well alight.

Five fire appliances were mobilised to the scene and a number of specialist appliances including a turntable ladder which was used as a water tower. The water bowser was also requested from Larbert to assist with water provision. Firefighters were able to help them rescue two dwarf crocodiles and an otter, but sadly some animals have perished in the fierce fire.

Full details of the animals affected will not be available for some time until it is safe for zoo staff to access affected areas.

The tropical house were the fire broke out was well alight when crews arrived on scene. High winds made firefighting conditions more difficult but crews successfully battled to prevent the fire from spreading to neighbouring animal enclosures.

Fortunately the fire is now predominantly out and firefighters are checking to ensure no fire spread and help zoo staff on site to assess the damage.

No people were injured as a result of the fire.

An investigation into the cause of the blaze will now take place.

Tourism Minister challenges UK government on new immigration procedures at ports

SNP MSP WELCOMES SCOTTISH GOVERNMENT INTERVENTION

Warnings from the cruise industry of the chaos being caused by the UK Border Force's new procedures — which have so far fallen on deaf ears — are being reinforced by the Scottish Government to in the form a letter to the UK minister of state for immigration.

The agency's new interpretation of the rules is causing significant problems to the industry, with every cruise ship passenger now subject to a face to face interview upon arriving in anywhere in the UK.

Previously cruise ship passengers and crews were cleared in advance with manifests checked via agents.

With large cruise ships potentially carrying thousands of passengers at a time, the delays and increased costs associated with the move are causing fears that operators will become increasingly reluctant to visit Scotland, reversing the rapid growth that the industry has seen in recent years.

Last year visitors to Scotland from cruise ships were estimated to have generated £41 million for Scotland's economy.

Minister for Energy, Enterprise and Tourism Fergus Ewing MSP wrote: -"This is very damaging: it reduces the length of time available on-shore and makes cruise companies less inclined to call at UK ports — both are highly detrimental to local

economies.

"We believe it is also functionally redundant as these checks duplicate the rigorous controls performed at the port of embarkation when passengers initially check-in for cruise embarkation."

Stuart McMillan MSP wrote to the Westminster Government in early December highlighting the problems that the new approach, but received no reply. Mr McMillan, who convenes the Cross Party Group on Recreational Boating and Marine Tourism, also spoke with Cruise Scotland Chairman Richard Alexander who is equally concerned about the changes.

Mr McMillan said:-"The cruise ship sector is increasingly important to Scotland's economy, with passenger numbers growing rapidly as more and more people visit our shores via cruise ship. I am delighted that Fergus Ewing has made contact with the UK government — they can no longer stay silent on this issue which has a profound impact on Scotland's economy.

"We should be doing everything we can to boost and support the tourism sector, not putting ill-considered obstacles in its path as Westminster seems determined to do. It is completely unacceptable for Westminster to simply ignore the repeated warnings that the cruise industry has given them. These latest calls must act as a wakeup call to Westminster that can no longer simply be brushed aside.

"Instead of continuing to put the arbitrary goals of the Tories ahead of the needs of this multi-million pound sector of the tourism industry, Westminster must listen to the evidence and bring an end to this chaotic new approach as a matter of urgency."
