After beating The Netherlands in their opening match, Scotland's Women were looking forward to the Italy match in Madrid with a view to securing qualification for the next World Cup, but too many errors in the heat lead to a 27-3 defeat. Down 17-3 at half time, the Scots could not get their game plan to fire on all cylinders and, in spite of some good defence, could not hold the Italians out for long.

Needing to win, the Scottish girls went in to battle against Sweden in their final match on Saturday. Performing with great grit and determination, they ran in eleven tries to Sweden's one. Although the teams were even at 5-5 after less than ten minutes, the Scots soon powered away to lead 27-8 at half

time. They went on to score seven unanswered tries in the second half to put themselves into the mix for the two available places. The outcome depended on the results from other matches. However, with Samoa just beating The Netherlands and Spain winning over Italy, Scotland were unable to qualify and will sit out the 2014 Tournament. At least they now know what our football players feel like!

Earlier in the week there was a bit of news on the team front from Edinburgh. Allan 'Chunk' Jacobsen announced that he would be retiring from Professional rugby at the end of the current season after 16 years in the game playing for Edinburgh and Scotland (pictured above against the All Blacks).

Players leaving the team at the end of the season for pastures new were also named during the week as James King, Andy Titterell, Sep Visser and Mike Penn.

An inbound player was also announced as Tongan front-row, Aleki Lutui. He's been signed on a two-year contract from Worcester Warriors.

Football

Congratulations go to former Hibs captain Ian Murray for guiding Dumbarton to safety in the SFL Division One. When Edinburgh-born Ian took over as manager in November, the team looked a certainty for relegation, however a string of good results has seen the 'Sons of the Rock' climb the table to seventh place, nine points clear of second bottom Cowdenbeath.

In the SPL, Hibs took the lead in the 30th minute from a stunning Leigh Griffiths' strike, but St Mirren equalised through Goncalves after Steven Thompson's effort had been blocked by James McPake.

Substitute Ross Caldwell added a second for Hibs with his first senior goal, before Marc McAusland equalised with a header, then scored a third to give the Buddies the lead with

eight minutes remaining. Three minutes later, Leigh Griffiths scored his 27^{th} goal of the season to grab a share of the points.

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Great play by man of the match Alex Harris almost set up Tom Taiwo for a late winner, but the midfielder's effort went inches past the post.

Hearts travelled to Dundee but returned empty handed after a late 30 yard free-kick from Ryan Conroy secured the points. The Tynecastle men played the majority of the game with 10~men after Andy Webster was sent off in the 28^{th} minute.

The results leave Hibs in 9^{th} place on 42 points with Hearts 10^{th} on 40.

MEP Alyn wants to help thirsty travellers!

■ MEP IN MOVE TO ADDRESS FLYING THIRST

SNP MEP Alyn Smith is calling for a change in European law to ensure that all EU airports provide safe and free drinking water to passengers.

Continuing security restrictions mean passengers can't carry liquids through security and have limited options for keeping themselves hydrated airside.

Research conducted by Smith's office has revealed that even in Scotland there is only patchy availability of water fountains and often passengers are left with no alternative but to purchase the over-priced bottled water from the airport shops or expensive food outlets.

Although in Scotland, thanks to the licensing laws, passengers can get tap water from bars in airports; this is not a workable solution for all, especially parents with young children.

In an attempt to rectify this situation, Smith has written to the European Commissioner for Transport, Siim Kallas, and the European Commissioner for Health and Consumer Policy, Tonio Borg, urging them to introduce a law forcing all European airports to provide facilities for good quality drinking water.

Alyn said:-"EU rules, which I support, have meant that passengers can no longer bring water through security, so it strikes me as only fair that the EU should give people rights to alternative sources of drinking water at airports other than having to use pricey shops.

"Many airlines and airports advise passengers to drink plenty of water throughout their journey but it's difficult to follow that advice with no regulation for compulsory drinking water in place.

"The price of bottled water at airports is disproportionately high and while licensed premises in Scotland must provide free water, this is not a solution for everyone. Parents may understandably be reluctant to take their children into bars and this legislation covers only Scotland.

"Some Scottish airports are providing a great example for others to follow but it shouldn't matter where you're flying from. Standards should be the same across the board and a supply of drinking water shouldn't be too much to ask in a 21st century European airport.

"Not only does this make sense for the health of passengers, there is also an important environmental aspect; we all know the problems associated with plastic waste including water bottles. Water fountains offer an environmentally-friendly way to help reduce plastic waste.

"This is a good, straightforward way to address a couple of problems at once and it's certainly a sensible move for the health of passengers. I'm pressing for a small, common-sense change."

Edinburgh Airport already offers water from a drinking fountain just after security.

'Leith in Black and Red' in Gallery anniversary



'Brunswick Street Stairs" by Tommy Perman

Often the strange and quirky parts of shops or buildings can be over-looked in a busy street, but Leith artist Tommy Perman has focused on these designs and is challenging you to notice them. From the iconic 'Brunswick Street Stairs' known as a treacherous path to the local post office depot, to humorous signs such as 'Bacon Rolls etc' the strong urban identity of the area is represented in abstract black and red. Tommy is also interested in using strong urban themes such as faded glories, how heavily guarded dis-used buildings might have a 'Welcome' sign, and when listed buildings become protected but lose their original beauty in the process.

Edinburgh's Colin Chisholm through to next stage of 'The Voice.'

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International superstar Sir Tom Jones has chosen Edinburgh singer Colin Chisholm to be part of 'Team Tom' on BBC's Saturday night hit show 'The Voice.'

The 60 year old father of two from Chesser beat 35,000 hopefuls to appear on the 'blind audition' of the popular talent show in front Sir Tom, Jessie J, Danny O'Donoghue of The Script and Will.I.Am.

Colin, who was nominated by daughter Chloe without his knowledge, gave an outstanding performance of the old Roy Orbison / Cindi Lauper hit 'I Drove All Night,' and as his excited family, including wife Gillian, son David and daughter Chloe watched nervously from back stage, Sir Tom quickly eased their worries when he turned his chair round and make Colin the eleventh member of his roster.

It was obvious that Colin's performance had impressed the other judges as well; however they all felt that his style was best suited to 72 year old legend and left him to it.

Afterwards, Jessie J described Colin and Sir Tom as a 'Perfect Match' which Will.I.Am called their partnership "Danger in the midst," suggesting that he was a strong contender to win the first prize of a recording contract.

Colin thanked Sir Tom for selecting him, and the Welshman replied: "You're welcome, I thought you sounded great. Your tone and pitch was right on. You got into the song and you sang it the way you felt it"

Colin was delighted to have Sir Tom as his coach as he believes that he can learn the most from him due to his "constantly reinventing himself" and said; "He's been the best singer for the decades. In my opinion, he's got a phenomenal voice."

The last round of 'Blind Auditions' take place next week which will leave all four coaches with 12 contestants each. After that, the coaches pit two of their own team members against each other to sing the same song together in front of a studio audience, then after the vocal face-off, the coach must choose only one to advance to the next stage.

At the end of the knockout rounds, the strongest members of each coach' team proceed to the live stage shows, where the television audience vote to save one contestant on each team, leaving the coach to decide on live television who they want

to save.

Finally, each coach will have his/her best contestant left standing to compete in the finals, singing an original song. From these four, one will be named "The Voice"—and will receive the grand cash prize of a recording contract.

Colin has tasted the big time before, as a singer with Edinburgh band Bilbo Baggins in the early seventies, sharing manager Tam Paton with the Bay City Rollers.

The group consisted of Colin, Clermiston trio Brian Spence, Gordon McIntosh and James Devlin along with Gordon Liddle from Glasgow. In a seven year spell, 'BB' as they were known to fans played over 100 gigs throughout the country, supporting top bands such as Mud.

Although the group did not have the same success at The Rollers, many considered them to be the more talented band.

Their distinctive style involved long, faded denim coats with high-waist baggy white trousers, although later they all wore school-style blazers with a pocket badge embroidered with the BB initials.

They soon gathered a large following and appeared on Top of the Pops with 'She's Gonna Win' which reached number 42 in the charts, but other songs like the Sha-Na-Na-Na Song, I Can Feel Mad and Back Home failed to reach the top 40. They also appeared with a young Toyah Wilcox in 1978 in a television drama called Glitter, in which they played her favourite band.

The arrival of punk rock at the end of the decade spelt an end to the band, although since then Colin has had a successful solo career on the music circuit, and even joined his beloved Jambos in the studio when they recorded an updated version of The Hearts Song which is still played at Tynecastle.

Less well known however, is that he crossed the great divide

to release 'Hibs Heroes' which is also a regular track on match-days at Easter Road.

Five things you need to know today



Water of Leith Flood Prevention Scheme — Leith Walk Programme

— Cramond Island tide catches walkers out — Postcode Challenge

— Cougars get grant monies

Phase 1 of the works to improve flood defenses along the Water of Leith will be completed by the end of this summer, but the cost of the work has gone up by over £12m, for a variety of reasons. It would be good to be able to explain these reasons to you in succinct form, but even the council report has had a little difficulty in doing this.

There is a budget of £63.486m for the whole scheme. Just over £14m was spent on advance works, £29m on Phase 1, leaving just under £20m for Phase 2 of the works still needed further upstream. So far, the work has concentrated on areas

downstream from Stockbridge, following initial rearrangements at the reservoirs to ensure increased storage space for floodwater.

The work has taken longer than first thought, partly due to weather since the contract started in 2011, but also partly due to what is described as 'unforeseen ground conditions', uncharted public utilities and steps required to allow residents continued access while the works progressed.

But it appears that a large part of the delay has also resulted from disputes over the interpretation of contract documents, and the council says that it is taking steps to ensure that this is not repeated in Phase 2. These 'lessons learned' will be reported and discussed at the Transport and Environment Committee on 4 June 2013. But this has meant the council entering into dispute resolution or mediation with the contractors, and agreement on a secret agreement between the council and the contractors signed off on 9 April under the direction of the Lord Provost and several other councillors, rather than waiting for the council meeting. The terms of the agreement are apparently 'commercially sensitive' which term only reminds us of the tram project. Whether or not the £19m or so which is left for Phase 2 is enough is not quite clear, but the council leader Andrew Burns is anxious to confirm that this draws a line under Phase 1 at least.

A steering group has now been set up to oversee the project towards its completion with representatives from Finance, Corporate Programme Office and Transport, as well as a project manager employed by the council who will run weekly meetings.

There is information about the extent of the works and updates on its progress on the council's website, although the last update before the current report was posted last August. The report will be discussed by the council at their full meeting this coming Thursday.

There is an open letter published on the <u>Leith Central</u>

<u>Community Council website</u> written by the community council to

Transport Convener, Councillor Lesley Hinds, about the ongoing

issues with reinstatement works to Leith Walk stemming from

the tram works carried out there some years ago now, and the

terms of a report to the March Transport Committee.

The letter calls for action and clarity both as to the timing of the works and the extent of what will be done.

Councillor Hinds attended the Leith Business Association meeting at the beginning of April and spoke to that group to allay their concerns over the same report from the March Transport committee meeting. She explained then that the council wants to get as much funding as possible for the street, and that the budget is now £5.5m plus all the other costs which are being met elsewhere, but explained that all of the work cannot be done at once.

Instead the utilities works are due to be completed by the end of April, and then the council will carry on with the next stage. The next phase of works due to be carried out in Constitution Street and Bernard Street was due to begin at the end of April/beginning of May and it will take until August for that phase to be complete.

Councillor Hinds also outlined that some parts of the works which had been consulted upon were not quite finalised, but that once they were (and after further consultation with Leith Business Association) then under powers delegated to councillors it will be possible to agree the plans without going back to a full Transport Committee. Councillor Hinds also told the meeting that the council is speaking to Transport Scotland who are keen to get involved in a scheme to enhance cycling and walking, suggesting that there might be dedicated cycle lanes coming up Leith Walk but with bikes

sharing the bus lane on the way down.

There are also regular updates by the council officers, the most recent of which explained

"as part of the completion of utilities work on Constitution Street, the contractor will need to do some work in the pavement area out the front of 88 — 90 Constitution Street this weekend. This work can now happen following the removal of scaffolding at that point.

"The work will take place on Saturday 27th April after 1.00pm and possibly into the evening if required, and on Sunday 28th April from 10.00am until the early evening if required.

"As a reminder, the first phase of the main Constitution Street works are due to start on Monday 29th April, with the pavement and road resurfacing commencing in the sections between the Foot of the Walk and Coatfield Lane and the Old Dock Gates to Bernard Street.

Two drop-in sessions will be held next week for local businesses and residents to raise any questions or issues they may have about the works:

Monday 29 April - 3:00pm to 5:00pm in Printworks Coffee, 42
Constitution Street

Another set of walkers were rescued from Cramond Island yesterday afternoon.

Queensferry RNLI volunteer lifeboat crew were called out to rescue four people including a female who was seven months pregnant, who had attempted to cross the flooding causeway from Cramond Island back to the shore.

Aberdeen Coastguard requested an immediate launch of Queensferry RNLI lifeboat after receiving a 999 call from the group who were up to their knees in water on the flooding causeway with the tide continuing to rise around them.

Queensferry RNLI lifeboat *Jimmie Cairncross* was launched at 1.45pm and arrived at Cramond causeway within 10 minutes. The four people, who were almost waist deep in water by now, and a dog were assisted on to the lifeboat and found to be uninjured, just cold.

A further four people were spotted on Cramond Island so they were uplifted by the lifeboat crew also. All eight people and the dog were taken to Granton harbour where an ambulance had been requested to check the pregnant lady. As a precaution she was taken to Edinburgh Royal Infirmary to be checked over.

A Queensferry RNLI spokesman Mike Garfitt said:- 'If anyone finds themselves trapped on Cramond Island by the incoming tide, dial 999 and ask for the Coastguard. The Coastguard will alert the lifeboat. Never attempt to cross the causeway when the tide has started to cover it. We also advise to check the

tide tables at the start of the causeway for safe crossing times before attempting to cross to Cramond Island."

Queensferry RNLI lifeboat crew were also called out on Friday 26 April at 8.55pm to rescue a yacht with three persons on board which had run aground on the Drum Sands to the west of Cramond. The 23ft yacht was towed to Port Edgar Marina.

Solar Meadow opens at Edinburgh College



A five acre site at Edinburgh College's Midlothian Campus has been transformed into Scotland's first Solar Meadow. Designed and installed by energy company SSE, the innovative £1.2m construction project has around 2,560 solar panels installed on the site, which will be planted with biodiversity grasses and wildflowers.

The site will generate the equivalent of the energy the campus requires to meet its electricity needs from renewable sources and reduce its carbon emissions by 300,000 kg per annum.

Importantly the solar meadow site will act as a research centre, focusing on the interaction between biodiversity and solar technology and analysing the effect of environmental conditions such as weather, pollen and dust on the output of the panels. The data will be of particular interest as these panels are situated on one of the most northerly sites for solar power in Europe. Edinburgh Napier University is supporting the project with a research assistant, who will work with staff and students at Edinburgh College to collect and analyse data.

Engineering students at Edinburgh College will be able to enhance their studies, using the site as an outdoor classroom. Interacting with the panels allows students to develop key skills which are increasingly sought after for Scotland's growing renewable energy sector.

Professor Steve Tinsley, Vice Principal, Corporate Development at Edinburgh College, is leading the Solar Meadow project. He said:-"It's great to witness the culmination of such an exciting project which has created this unique solar power site at Edinburgh College. In creating the Solar Meadow we are able to show that Scotland is making a strong commitment to advancing engineering innovation and developing clean technologies for a low carbon economy.

"The Solar Meadow is the first teaching facility of its kind in Scotland that will help not only to provide the next generation of engineers with essential skills, but also allow the college to become less reliant on fossil fuel energy.

"We believe the Solar Meadow also looks great and will become a significant attraction for local people as well as visitors to the Capital. It is also fantastic that the project has enabled the College to engage with schools and local community groups to develop their own renewable energy projects; it really is giving something back to the local community in more ways than one."

Richard Chandler, SSE's Head of Green Deal and Energy Solutions, added:- "As the UK's largest generator of electricity from renewable sources, it made perfect sense for us to be involved in this project which is the first of its kind in Scotland.

"The Solar Meadow will not only generate around 560,000 kW hrs every year — enough energy to power 170 homes — but is also a fine example of how industry and education can work well together. This project will bring benefits to the college, its students and the wider community as well as further strengthening Scotland's renewable energy resources."

Twenty three year old Alana Beaton, who is an NC Intermediate Electrical Engineering student from Inverness, said:-"I'm really interested in renewable energy and I'm excited that Edinburgh College is leading the way with the solar meadow.

"We have studied renewable and green technology within the Electrical Engineering course at College, and a great importance is placed on sustainable engineering, so the fact that the College has taken this on board and is using this technology is definitely a step in the right direction. I'm really looking forward to using the solar meadow as part of my course. I think it will further my interests within solar energy technologies and modern engineering in Scotland."

The launch of the solar meadow is the culmination of Edinburgh College's Engineering Week, which started with an open day aimed at increasing interest in engineering among school pupils in Edinburgh and the Lothians.

The MacTaggart Scott Hydraulics, Pneumatics and PLC

Laboratory, also situated at Edinburgh College's Midlothian Campus was also opened this week. The result of a long standing partnership between Edinburgh College and MacTaggart Scott, the laboratory represents an investment of £100,000 over 5 years. College engineering staff will use the facility to train MacTaggart Scott apprentices and staff, while engineering students at the college will use the laboratory to build their hydraulic and pneumatic skills.

The next phase of equipment to be installed in the laboratory will include wave and tidal simulators, which will recreate North Sea conditions, suitable for testing wave and tidal technology in the confines of a laboratory. Access to this technology will allow our students to develop crucial skills in wave and tidal energy. Many of them will then go on to be employed in Scotland's renewable industries with companies such as MacTaggart Scott.

Opinion — Waste of money in Dumbryden Grove?

UPDATE:- A City of Edinburgh Council spokesperson said:- "We have listened to the views of the residents of Dumbryden Grove and will respect their wishes. The proposal, which was only at the consultation stage, will now not be going ahead."

Edinburgh Council wastes £75,000 of public funds and makes Edinburgh an uglier city at the same time!

People who live in Dumbryden Grove don't want their currently green grove to be turned into a 'concrete/tarmac' quarter as a result of financially unsound investment.

One may argue that the look is not important and that the people who live here don't need the green around their houses. One may even argue that costs must be the first consideration. The council is investing £75,000 in order to save £100-150 of annual maintenance. Everybody will surely agree that this is extravagant and wasteful spending of public money.

The poorest quarters of the city were selected for further foliage removal in order to minimise ongoing maintenance costs. On closer inspection however this initiative is in our view a clear mismanagement of public money. All the idea is based on removal of public greenery e.g. grass within council housing estate and replacing it with tarmac and concrete. The tarmac is supposed to require minimum maintenance and thus save council money. But does it?

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It was confirmed to us that the council agreed to invest £70,000 to concrete and tarmac these green areas and to deploy "Phase 2" of the project. This is estimated to cost up to £5,000 for new trees and bushes around the small grove in small rootpots. We understand the accurate cost for Dumbryden Grove has not been calculated.

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We do not believe savings from the projects were calculated.. The people of Dumbryden Grove therefore approached a qualified accountant to help them to estimate it. Dumbryden Grove area is made of three houses, eight doors with approximately 64 flats. The maintenance of this small square cannot require more than 10 hours of maintenance a year. Given the standard gardener charge, this should represent approx. £100-150/year. The pay back from the investment project is therefore more

than 500 years. The accountant we consulted confirmed that no economically thinking person would invest in such a project.

We were advised to survey the areas where the project has been completed. We did look at the neighbouring areas. We believe that the Edinburgh council has given the word "hideous" completely new meaning. It is also apparent that the selfmaintenance of those places failed. Trash and debris which would naturally decompose in the former greenery now lay on the tarmac. This gives Wester Hailes a deprived look of dirty concrete and tarmac with a minimum of foliage.

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This waste of public money is executed against the background of disapproval from local residents. The people of Dumbryden Grove are united in their disapproval of this project. This is evidenced by the petition that was signed by 35 people in just four hours. It was also established that approximately 20% of these people have not been officially informed of the investment plan.

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Will the council follow the will of the people who elected them? Will the Council consider the cost versus benefits analysis of the investment and start behave rationally as any other subject in this current economic environment? It certainly does not appear so. The building permission has already been granted and the council is now on track to waste your (=taxpayer's) money and make Edinburgh an uglier city at the same time!

Scottish Fire and Rescue Service test emergency plans for firefighting at sea

Firefighters from the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service (SFRS) took part in a marine firefighting multi-agency exercise yesterday morning at BP Hound Point Terminal at South Queensferry .

The exercise involved a pretend explosion being heard on board a tanker and a report of a possible fire along with reports of

people missing on board the vessel.

Senior SFRS officers from the city of Edinburgh and crews from Crewe Toll, McDonald Road and Liberton fire stations joined forces with representatives from BP Dalmeny/Hound Point, Forth Ports PLC, Targe Towing Ltd and Smit International Ltd to test their emergency plans for dealing with such a scenario.

Group Manager Andrew Girrity from the Scottish Fire and Rescue Service said: - "The main objective for us is to test how robust our emergency plans are and how we would work with partner agencies in the event of a fire on a ship."

"Our primary concerns were that to happen, would be to protect and minimise the risk to the public, personnel on site at Hound Point, responding emergency crews from all blue light services and to ensure the safety and security of the site whilst ensuring any risks to the environment and plant are managed safely."

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"Each of the agencies involved has detailed emergency plans which are regularly exercised to ensure that if an incident did occur we would be in the best position to respond and work together in challenging circumstances for a safe outcome."

"These types of training events allow us to test our command and control systems as well as the role of the incident commander and firefighting crews, equipment and procedures for dealing with a stricken vessel. It will involve practising the manoeuvring of tugs for the master of the vessel and testing communication links and coordination between the SFRS, Forth Ports, BP Dalmeny Control Room, Hound Point Marine Terminal and the Hound Point tugs."

Film Review — Flying Blind Flies Back Into Town — TONIGHT ONLY

Flying Blind is showing tonight at The Filmhouse — for one night only.

In **Flying Blind**, a woman who has dedicated her life to her career, as a designer of military drones, finds her carefully constructed world falling apart when she falls in love with a man who might be more than he appears.

The first thing to note about Flying Blind is something that in an ideal world would not be in the slightest bit noteworthy: here is a feature film where the central character is a single woman in her forties, who is neither depressed by her singledom nor embarrassed by her sexuality.

As Frankie, Helen McCrory is a captivating presence. She has the intelligent eyes of an aerospace engineer, the beaming smile of someone in the first flush of a new relationship, and the potty mouth of a woman in a traditionally male-dominated profession. It is absolutely no surprise that a man twenty years her junior would fall for her. That man is Kahil, a French-Algerian refugee on a student visa, whose interests in Frankie may or may not extend beyond the romantic. The exoticness of Kahil's Muslim background soon gives way to suspicion when Frankie is told that he is a person of interest to the Security Services.



This is the point where Polish director Katarzyna Klimkiewicz gives us the central questions of the film, which are whether anyone can really be trusted and, in this world of heightened security and vigilance we now inhabit, are our preconceptions of someone a help or a hindrance. As Frankie begins to question the motives and intentions of her new man, the story turns from a character piece to a detective yarn with racially-charged overtones. This third act shift could have been dangerously approaching the type of ham-fisted "is he or isn't he a terrorist" plot we have seen in a thousand oh-so-serious dramas over the last decade and a half (such as Homeland, starring McCrory's husband Damien Lewis). Luckily for Flying Blind, the classy cast combined with the director's restraint and belief in her characters manage to keep things on an even keel.

Speaking of a classy cast, our leading lady is ably supported by Kenneth Cranham as Frankie's father, and Najib Oudghiri as Kahil, with Robbie Coltrane's former Cracker nemesis Lorcan Cranitch as Morehouse, the MI6 man trying to keep tabs on all concerned.

After having its World Premiere here at last summer's Film Festival, Flying Blind returns to Edinburgh for a screening at the <u>Filmhouse TODAY at 6:10</u>, followed by a filmmakers' Q&A. The movie then heads out west to play at the Glasgow Film Theatre on Sunday April 28th at 5pm, with Kenneth Cranham in attendance.

St Andrew Square cleared of

tram works



Tram progress in the city as St Andrew Square opens

All road and track works are now complete around St. Andrew Square which was returned to public use today. The completion of these works around the famous square follows the full reopening of Princes Street at the end of 2012. Road and track works between Shandwick Place and Haymarket Junction are scheduled for completion during the summer with York Place scheduled to complete by the end of the year.

Once road and track construction work is finished, further works to install overhead and underground cabling will be carried out. Details of this programme with be made available soon.

Transport Convener Lesley Hinds said: - "Good progress is now clearly visible across the city centre and the removal of barriers and fences at St Andrew Square will be a welcome sight to traders, residents and visitors to the area.

"This is the first of four major city centre work sites to be completed in 2013, all of which are on course to be finished in line with the revised schedule by the end of the year.

"We want to remind people that a programme of overhead and underground cable installation will be carried out in the coming months. This will be planned in a way that limits disruption as much as possible and we'll make details available once they are confirmed.

"I'm confident that all on-street works and cable installation will be completed by the end of the year, meaning that we can start full line tram testing and driver training along the whole route soon after. 2013 has been a very productive year

so far for the project and I expect that to continue."

Transport Minister Keith Brown said: "Following the recent Council report which showed that the project is making good progress in relation to the revised timetable, I hope that local businesses, residents, commuters and visitors can take further heart from the fact that another key milestone has been reached today.

"I congratulate everyone involved, however no-one is getting carried away and it's important to build on this momentum as we enter a crucial period for the city. Work continues apace at several other key sites and we know that some further disruption is inevitable as the programme of cable installation approaches.

"We remain committed to ensuring that there are no further delays, that any opportunity to increase progress is exploited, and that costs are contained within the revised target."

The access arrangements to St. Andrew Square will revert back to the former layout which means that a clockwise circulation route will be re-established with access into the Square being taken from the North side via North St. David Street and an exit via the South side of the Square.

The contract completion date for the project remains summer 2014. Once on-street works and overhead cabling work has been completed by the end of the year, a programme of rigorous testing and commissioning will take place in early 2014 to prepare the system and the service for operation. The tram project team will report to Council in September 2013 with an update on project timescales.

The project remains in line with the revised budget (£776m) approved by the Council in September 2011, with work either ahead of schedule or in line with the revised timescale reported in December 2011.

Cycling star to lead Pedal on Parliament next month

Graeme Obree to Attend Pedal on Parliament

Grass roots cycle campaign Pedal on Parliament are delighted to announce that Graeme Obree — otherwise known as 'The Flying Scotsman' — will be attending the second Pedal on Parliament (PoP2) on Sunday the 19th May. Graeme, two-time individual pursuit world champion (1993, 1995), and two-time world 'hour record' holder (1993, 1994) will be joining thousands of others in Edinburgh at 3pm at the Meadows to ride to the Scottish Parliament to present politicians with an eight point manifesto for safer cycling in Scotland. At last year's demonstration 3000 cyclists, young and old, filled the streets of Edinburgh on everything from expensive road bikes to tiny balance bikes, sending a message that they wanted to see real investment in cycling, making it accessible for everyone from the smallest child to a world champion.

From the start, Pedal on Parliament has been supported by high-profile Scottish cyclists, including Mark Beaumont who attended the last event, and Sir Chris Hoy. After the numbers who turned out last year, far exceeding the organisers' expectations, politicians have responded with kind words but only a small increase in cycle funding — just £6m, split over

two years. These actions fall way short of the sort of investment required if the Scottish Government is to reach its own target of 10% of journeys by bike by 2020. Unless there is a significant step change in funding very soon there is little chance of this target being met — as the recent Get Britain Cycling report has found, investment of at least £20 per head would be needed to achieve those levels of cycling across the UK. PoP asks for at least 5% of the transport budget to be spent on cycling and 10% on all active travel, which in Scotland would amount to about £25 per head.

Graeme Obree explained his motivation for supporting and attending the event

'I would love to see Scotland develop a culture which supports cycling and encourages cycling as wholeheartedly as possible, be that for pleasure, leisure, transportation or competition. It's one of the best ways to experience a town, city or the countryside, so any steps to improve consideration for the needs of cyclist will ultimately improve our country.'

The event itself will be a light-hearted ride, but with a serious purpose. The most recent road safety figures for Scotland show that the numbers of cyclists and pedestrians killed and seriously injured has actually risen. Experts have warned that the numbers of pedestrians and cyclists killed or seriously injured on Scotland's roads are set to exceed those in cars within a few years.

Olympics and the success of Scottish cyclists Sir Chris Hoy and Paralympians Aileen McGlynn, Karen Darke and Neil Fachie have created a huge interest in cycling, with thousands more Scots taking to two wheels — but they will quickly give up if the conditions they encounter on the roads aren't safe and inviting, and that will require real investment.

One of the organisers of PoP2, Sally Hinchcliffe said, "We're absolutely thrilled to have Graeme on board with PoP, even if it's likely to be the slowest bike ride he's ever been on.

Professional riders like Graeme have to spend many hours training, and they know what the conditions can be like on the roads. There's a whole generation of children growing up whose parents can't risk letting them out to cycle on their own simply because it's not safe. Not only have they lost the freedom we enjoyed on our bikes, but we risk losing the Graeme Obrees of tomorrow which is a tragedy for Scotland and for the whole world."

The organisers of Pedal on Parliament urge anyone who cycles in Scotland, or who would like to cycle in Scotland but doesn't feel safe, to join them and Graeme for PoP2 and maintain the pressure on the Scottish Government to put cycling at the heart of its transport policy.

Fatal road collision

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses following a fatal road collison.

The incident happened just after 7pm last night, Thursday 25 April, on Lasswade Road, between Lasswade and the City Bypass.

A 24-year-old woman was driving her Volkswagen Passat southbound when her vehicle was involved in a collision with a Lothian Bus.

Emergency services responded to the scene. However, the woman died at the scene as a result of her injuries.

The road remained closed last night while Road Policing Officers continued to investigate at the scene.

Anyone who can assist with their enquiries to come forward.

A Police Scotland spokesman said: - "Tragically, this collision resulted in a young woman's death and we are currently trying to establish exactly what happened during this incident.

"Anyone with information relevant to this investigation is asked to contact police immediately."

Portobello High School — Private Bill lodged at Holyrood



A Private Bill to allow the new Portobello High School to be built in Portobello Park was introduced in the Scottish Parliament today.

The City of Edinburgh Council is taking the comparatively rare step of seeking to introduce new legislation as the existing law presents an impediment to the Council building the much-needed school.

The Private Bill, which is being promoted by The City of Edinburgh Council, aims to change the Common Good status of Portobello Park from inalienable to 'alienable', but only for educational purposes. This means although the land would remain in the Common Good, the Council would be able to 'appropriate it', or change its use, to an educational purpose.

The Council recently consulted on its proposals for a Private Bill and received resounding support to take it forward. The consultation produced the highest number of responses for any Council consultation in recent years, with over 12,000 individual responses received. Of the valid responses received from those who live in the city, 70% supported the proposals with the level of support from those in the local Portobello area being higher at 76%.

Councillor Paul Godzik, Convener of Education, Children and Families, said:- "The Council is absolutely determined to deliver a new Portobello High School and today marks an important milestone in the project. The existing school is greatly in need of replacement and it is clear from the response to our recent consultation that the people of Edinburgh support our Private Bill to change the status of Portobello Park to allow the new Portobello High School to be built there.

"We believe we have a strong case to put to Parliament. This by far the best location for the much-needed new school and our open space compensation measures mean that the people of Portobello would not only gain a new park but also see improvements to other green space in the local community."

Details of the bill are on the Scottish Parliament website.

Edinburgh Greens nominate candidate for Liberton and Gilmerton by-election

Edinburgh Greens have chosen Alys Mumford to contest the Liberton-Gilmerton by-election on 20 June. Alys is 24 years old and is currently the director of Jubilee Scotland, a charity which campaigns on third world debt. She lives in the south of the city.

Alys said:-"This by-election takes place a year after the election of an expanded group of Green councillors in the City Chambers and a year of considerable campaigning success — from bedroom tax to better cycling and from school and swimming pool closures to challenging a "we know best" culture . It is also a year where our national messages of a radically different kind of Scotland have made a real impact, of social justice both here and across the world.

"I want to take those and other messages to people in Liberton-Gilmerton and I am confident of that they will strike a chord." She also paid tribute to former councillor Tom Buchanan whose untimely death has led to the by-election, saying: - "Tom was a popular and well-regarded local councillor and will be a hard act to follow. I cannot promise to be the same councillor as Tom was but I share his passion for making the local economy work in the interests of people and I am committed to working just as hard and listening intently to what local people want me to do."

Pennywell residents hit out at bin store mess

Residents at a block of flats have hit out at the council for allowing their communal bin store to be full of rubbish. Residents have been complaining for the past six months about the smell coming from the bin area, an area that they don't have access to, and they were shocked when they got in today to see the mess that has built up.

The area has been closed off to tenants for some time, so the mess should have been discovered by council bin men when they emptied the refuse, but residents now believe it has been like this for months.

One resident who asked not be named, said:- "There has been a smell in the stair for months. None of us who live here knew what it was as the area is locked and only accessed by the bin men. I have reported this several times over the past few months. On Tuesday a girl from the Council was here talking about new kitchens and bathrooms and I made her aware of it and she was going to report it.

"The bucket chutes here are often blocked and the tenants have had no access to the bucket area for over two years following a fire. I have spotted mice in the stair on several occasions, and some of the neighbours have also reported issues with mice elsewhere in the block. As well as this horrible mess and smell there are also bars missing from the railings inside the stair and a child could easily fall through it."

Councillor Lesley Hinds, the Council's Environment Convener, said:- "This bin store is in an unacceptable condition. I have asked for it to be cleaned out as quickly as possible and for an explanation on why we have not responded to residents.

A spokesperson for local residents group, Tenants and Residents in Muirhouse said:- "We are aware of it and have been down for a look, we will support the tenants in the stair in way we can."

Governance Risk and Best Value Committee — Domestic abuse seminar, Edinburgh — The Friends of Water of Leith Basin —

The council's Governance, Risk and Best Value committee meets this morning at the City Chambers at 10. All papers are online here and deal with the slightly boring but important matters of the council's anticipated borrowing and capital position over coming years, and what the council will do to manage it.

The committee last met at the beginning of March when they agreed to pay £10,000 to the charity SANDS. This was recompense for the extra work it has had to undertake in supporting bereaved parents in Edinburgh affected by the confusion over disposal of babies' ashes at Mortonhall Crematorium.

If you can't make it along today then the committee's meeting on 15 August will be webcast on the council website and you will be able to follow the proceedings live.

A multi-agency seminar aimed at tackling domestic abuse in the west of Edinburgh is taking place today.

The south west neighbourhood Domestic Abuse Seminar, which is being held at the Woods Centre in Wester Hailes, will bring together professionals from a range of agencies, including Police Scotland, City of Edinburgh Council, NHS Lothian, and Scottish Women's Aid.

A series of workshops will take place at the event, all with the theme of keeping women and children safe.

Keynote speakers include Heather Coady, Scottish Women's Aid National Children's Policy Manager, who will speak about how abuse impacts upon children and how best services respond to families affected.

In addition, a Police Scotland officer from the newly formed Domestic Abuse Investigation Unit in Edinburgh will provide

delegates with an update on the role of the new unit.

Inspector Stephen Dolan, from Police Scotland, said: "Police Scotland is committed to keeping people safe, and today's seminar demonstrates our commitment to working with local partners in the west of Edinburgh to enhance our approach to domestic abuse.

"The seminar will allow professionals from various agencies to discuss and develop our collective approach to this issue.

"Domestic abuse is a priority for Police Scotland, the NHS and the City of Edinburgh Council and we are committed to challenging attitudes and bringing offenders to justice. We will continue to work with partners in the west of Edinburgh to develop solutions that help us to tackle this problem, which causes so much harm in local communities."

Melanie Hornett, Director of Nursing, NHS Lothian, said:
"Domestic abuse and other forms of gender based violence can have an extremely negative effect upon the health and well being of a large number of people across all communities, and we support local events and seminars which help raise awareness and result in improving the quality of care for those affected as well as increasing their safety and access to help and support."

Michelle Miller, Chief Social Work Officer at the City of Edinburgh Council, said:

"We need to make sure that tackling domestic abuse is high on the agenda of our day to day business. Our workforce, whether in children's services, community care or criminal justice, all come across issues of domestic abuse and we need to coordinate workforce training across all agencies to establish a clear understanding of domestic abuse and of our responsibility to keep our communities in Edinburgh safe from harm, neglect and exploitation."
