RSNO launch their new season

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The Royal Scottish National Orchestra (RSNO) has announced its second Season with Music Director Peter Oundjian, following a critically-acclaimed start to the British-Canadian's tenure at the helm. The RSNO will this year perform works ranging from The Planets to pairing up with Phil Cunningham and Aly Bain to celebrate St Andrew's Day, and combining with Dougie McLean to perform Caledonia (both of these in Glasgow). This Christmas will be feted with The Snowman and there will be Sunday afternoon chamber music in Edinburgh at the Dovecot.

There are tickets ranging from Under 16 freebies to under 26 £5 tickets, as well as £5 seats for the unemployed and discounts for groups.

The Edinburgh Reporter was delighted to meet with Peter Oundjian in Glasgow for a quick word before he scooted back to the afternoon rehearsal, and to have the opportunity to interview him about the 2013-14 programme.

The RSNO are performing at the Usher Hall tonight.

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But what about the rest of the year? Well, if you want to learn more about the masterpieces of Vaughan Williams and Beethoven then Naked Classics might be a good start. Projections and on-stage interviews will be used to explain the stories behind the pieces, and of course the second half allows you to enjoy the music itself.

In the coming orchestral year, the RSNO team will build on the successes of 2012/13 by showcasing the continuing development of Scotland's national orchestra and further widening access to live orchestral music, including increasing the total number of Season programmes from 17 to 20 in Edinburgh and Glasgow, and upping its commitment to providing orchestral music to Scotland's medium-sized venues. The RSNO will also expand its popular and crossover programmes in Glasgow, and continue its much-loved Naked Classics and Chamber Concert Series.

RSNO audiences have shown their appreciation for the new guard, with Peter's first three concerts as Music Director virtually sold out in Edinburgh and Glasgow. The RSNO concerts at Kelvingrove Museum and Art Gallery were also sell-out occasions in 2012, the RSNO Christmas Concerts in Aberdeen and Dundee sold out and were close to sell-out in Edinburgh and Glasgow. Even the more adventurous presentations have been met with consistently large attendances.

RSNO Music Director Peter Oundjian said: "I have been overwhelmed by the warmth with which both my and Thomas' arrival has been received. Speaking personally, in the short time I have been in post we have achieved a great deal; some fantastic performances in the concert halls across Scotland, exciting recording projects and a memorable tour of China. Going forward, I am proud to announce our ambitious new Season, which I hope will appeal to our supportive and growing audiences."

RSNO Chief Executive Michael Elliott:- "We have been blessed with a tremendous start to Peter and Thomas' first RSNO seasons as part of the team. The last 12 months marked the start of a new era for this organisation, symbolised by the start of the construction of our new home in the centre of Glasgow. In the coming orchestral year we have a strong season, with more concerts in Edinburgh and Glasgow, a greater commitment to bringing live orchestral music at medium-sized venues across Scotland, increasing our presentation of crossgenre programmes to attract new audiences, and the continued forging of musical partnerships."

RSNO Leader Maya Iwabuchi:-"In my short time with the RSNO, I have already witnessed massive changes within the orchestra and its management. I am truly heartened to be surrounded by colleagues who are working constantly to expand and maintain the artistic trajectory of the organisation in order to enhance the culture of Scotland and beyond."

Peter Oundjian's opening programme of his second RSNO Season features former Scottish Orchestra Trombonist Gustav Holst's *The Planets* paired with the UK première of James MacMillan's Piano Concerto No3 with soloist Jean-Yves Thibaudet. Peter appears with the Orchestra the following week, with a programme including Dvorak's Symphony No7 and Shostakovich's Cello Concerto No1 with soloist Sol Gabetta. The first two programmes of the Season commence with works by Benjamin Britten (*Simple Symphony, Young Person's Guide to the*

Orchestra), celebrating the 100th anniversary of the British composer's birth, and Peter returns to Scotland in November to conduct the epic *War Requiem*, in the week of the anniversary and in the 120thanniversary year of the birth of poet Wilfred Owen, nine of whose poems are referenced in this major work. Peter's further programme highlights include Rachmaninov's *Symphonic Dances*, Walton's Symphony No1, Richard Strauss' *Ein Heldenleben*, Beethoven's Symphony No7 and concluding the Season with Mahler's vast Symphony No8, one of the largest-scale choral works in the classical concert repertoire involving huge orchestra, RSNO Chorus and Junior

Chorus, guest chorus and a line-up of talented soloists from across the Commonwealth.

RSNO Principal Guest Conductor **Thomas Søndergård** also commences his second year as a member of the Artistic Team. Thomas' first programme presents Haydn's Symphony No99 and Brahms' Symphony No4, Beethoven Five in Dundee and also as part of the Usher Hall's Centenary celebrations in March 2014. Messaien's *Turangalîla-Symphonie* features later in the Season and Thomas concludes his second year with the Orchestra with a programme including Brett Dean's *Dispersal* and Dvořák's Symphony No9 *From the New World*.

The RSNO welcomes new faces to the podium: Alexander Shelley, Jonathan Cohen, Richard Kaufman, Susanna Mälkki, Santtu-Matias Rouvali and Baldur *Brönnimann*, and heralds the return of Lawrence Renes, Yan Pascal Tortelier, Kristjan Järvi, Rumon Gamba, Hannu Lintu, John Logan and Christopher Bell.

Guest Soloists

Fans of the classical repertoire featuring piano are well catered for in the coming year. French pianist Jean-Yves Thibaudet plays the UK première of James MacMillan's Third Piano Concerto; *Diapason D'Or* winner, Croatian musical polymath Dejan *Lazić returns for performances of Mendelssohn's Piano Concerto No1*; Lise de la Salle makes her RSNO début, playing Rachmaninov Piano Concerto No1; British institution John Lill celebrates his 70thbirthday with the Orchestra, performing Brahms' First Piano Concerto, a work he last played with the RSNO in 1995; increasingly frequent RSNO collaborator Nikolai Lugansky rejoins for Beethoven's Emperor Concerto; Grammy Award-winning US pianist Richard Goode plays Mozart's Piano Concerto No17 K453, 2009 London International Piano Competition winner Behzod Abduraimov performs Tchaikovsky's First Piano Concerto; Terrence Wilson returns to Scotland for Gershwin's Rhapsody In Blue; Jean-Frédéric Neuburger (piano) and Jacques Tchamkerten (ondes martenot) join the Orchestra for Messiaen's Turangalîla-Symphonie; and Ingrid Fliter returns to Scotland to play Beethoven's Fourth Piano Concerto.

For aficionados of string soloists, the RSNO invites Argentinian cellist Sol Gabetta to perform Shostakovich's Cello Concerto Nol; another RSNO favourite, home-grown sensation Nicola Benedetti, takes to the front of the stage, joined by her partner, cellist Leonard Elschenbroich, for Brahms' Double Concerto; Royal Academy of Music professor Jack Liebeck plays Prokofiev's Violin Concerto Nol; Norwegian virtuoso Vilde Frang takes to the platform to perform Britten's Violin Concerto Nol; enigmatic German soloist Augustin Hadelich presents Adés' Violin Concerto Concentric Paths; and Anoushka Shankar plays her father Ravi Shankar's Raga-Mala (Sitar Concerto No2).

RSNO Principal Clarinet John Cushing emerges from the ranks to perform a work dedicated to him by Scotland's greatest living composer, James MacMillan's *Ninian*. RSNO Principal Flute Katherine Bryan also assumes the role of soloist in the coming orchestral year, for Nielsen's Flute Concerto. *A wealth of vocal talent appears with the Orchestra in 2013:14, guest artists including* Susan Gritton, Jeffrey Francis, Russell Braun, Tim Mead, Benjamin Hulett, Neal Davies, Kishani Jayasinghe, Jesús León, Erin Wall, Elizabeth Llewellyn, Sarah Tynan, Caitlin Hulcup, Susan Platts, Simon O'Neill, Luthando Qave and Jonathan Lemalu.

The RSNO Chamber Series

The RSNO Chamber Series builds on its success for its fourth year at St Mary's Cathedral, Glasgow and Dovecot, Edinburgh. Two chamber events will also be hosted at Glasgow's Cottier's Theatre, as part of the city's West End Festival and the Cottier Chamber Project. Concerts vary from chamber strings performances with Italian theme to an intimate evening of music for viola, harp and flute.

Scottish International Piano Competition

From 2014 the RSNO will be the official orchestra for the final concert of the Scottish International Piano Competition. Details of the biannual event, the next to be held at the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall in June 2014, will be announced shortly.

Under 16s Go Free!/Under 26 Ticket

Last year the RSNO simplified its youth access programmes – already one of the most ambitious initiatives to attract younger audiences to live orchestral music – making it easier to attend RSNO-promoted performances, which has seen a peak in young attenders to RSNO concerts. On average concert-goers under the age of 26 now account for 13% of the audience, a 2% increase on the previous Season.

Accompanied under 16s can attend the Orchestra's concerts for free (Christmas concerts 50% off) and receive free programmes and those under 26 can purchase tickets for just £5.00.

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Taxi Driver victim of assault and robbery in Gorgie

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses after a taxi driver was assaulted and robbed in the Gorgie area of the Capital last night. The incident happened around midnight, after the private hire driver had accepted a fare to pick up the three suspects in Harvesters Way.

He drove them to McLeod Street and parked up close to the Tynecastle Arms, where he was assaulted within his vehicle.

The three men stole his takings and ran off across Gorgie Road, where they were seen to gesticulate, possibly to the driver of a foreign-registered Mercedes that passed as they crossed the road. Two females were also seen walking along Gorgie Road at this time.

After crossing the road the trio were seen heading in the direction of Newton Street, after which the victim could not see them.

The suspects are all in their early 20s, with Scottish accents. The first suspect is described as 5ft tall, average build, brown hair, and wearing a light coloured hooded jumper.

The second man is also around 5ft tall, skinny build, and wearing a black hooded jumper with the hood up. The third and final suspect is described as 5ft 10ins, well built, with brown hair, and wearing a black hooded waist-length jacket.

Detective Constable Joyce Gunderson said:- "While the victim did not suffer any serious injury, he was left understandably shaken as a result of his ordeal, and we are appealing for any information that can help us trace those responsible.

"In particular, we want to trace the driver of the foreignregistered Mercedes seen driving in Gorgie Road as the suspects made their escape, and the two females who were seen walking along the road and would have seen the trio as they crossed the road into Newton Street.

"Anyone else who witnessed the assault, who recognises the descriptions of the suspects, or who has any other information that can assist our enquiries, should contact police immediately."

Solicitors AGM in Edinburgh votes to change rules

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Solicitors have voted in favour of the principle of changing the current practice whereby a solicitor can act for both buyer and mortgage lender in property transactions.

At the Law Society's annual general meeting today, Friday, 22 March 2013, 58 solicitors voted to remove the current exception to Law Society conflict of interest rules, which permits a single solicitor to carry out work for a client wishing to buy a property and their mortgage lender. There were 27 against and three abstentions. Proxy votes were not cast. Acting for both the borrower and the lender has been the norm since 1986.

The Law Society will now bring forward new practice rules for its members to vote on at a special general meeting (SGM) in September. If voted through at the SGM and subject to approval by the Lord President, solicitors will no longer be able to act for both buyer and lender.

Austin Lafferty, president of the Law Society, said: "This was a highly important debate to have and I thank everyone for their contributions. We can view today's vote as just the start of a move towards reforming and improving conveyancing practice and we intend to hold further discussions with the Council of Mortgage Lenders and others. The exception to the rules was introduced in 1986 to help ensure a smooth transaction but the world is a very different place now. The severe economic downturn, increasingly complex transactions, increasing risk of mortgage fraud and the additional pressures from lenders mean that it is no longer appropriate, and indeed is arguably not in the public interest to continue.

"Solicitors provide conveyancing services for communities the length and breadth of Scotland and we are fully aware of the potential for increased costs for buyers and increased paperwork for solicitors. However these costs are not the borrowers, they are costs associated with lenders satisfying themselves on their own lending risk – and it will be for the lenders to decide on whether they are prepared to pass on these costs to their customers.

"The recession meant a greatly reduced the property market, however the risk on a loan has been largely borne by solicitors as banks and building societies have increased the number of claims on the legal profession's indemnity insurance where things have gone wrong – for example if a client has defaulted on payment or in a repossession case, negative equity means there is a loss to the lender.

"Additionally, we know there have been situations where conflict of interest arises and the protection of borrower client interests as well as the lender simply do not align."

Recent changes introduced by lenders have also meant that solicitors are no longer automatically permitted to act for clients who have chosen a particular mortgage product.

Lafferty added: "It's now the case that if a solicitor no longer on the lender's solicitor panel, they are not entitled to do the work for both parties which means the client can choose to retain their own solicitor of choice and pay an additional fee, or use the lender's solicitor.

"It's in everyone's interests, particularly the prospective housebuyer, to provide efficient and cost effective services. Technology has improved things enormously and it's worth remembering that conveyancing fees in Scotland are moderate compared to elsewhere – it can be up to three times as much in Ireland. Market forces will also play a role and undoubtedly determine a new fee structure so, while the borrower and lender will each pay for the work of their own solicitor, I do not foresee any astronomical price rises."

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New RSE Royal Medallists and Prize Winners Announced

The Royal Society of Edinburgh (RSE) has announced its Royal Medallists and Prize Winners for 2013, and there are several Edinburgh academics among them including Dr Chris Speed from Edinburgh College of Art who has won the Innovator's Prize "for his creative use of digital technology to enable members of the broader society to better understand their surroundings and history. Through the use of digital technology members of the public expand their ideas about time, space, history and objects, whilst increasing their knowledge of the technology. He was awarded the Principal's Medal at the University of Edinburgh in 2011 for his work in community engagement." This is in fact a prize connected with the digital totem pole in Wester Hailes. You can see the raising of the totem pole here in our earlier article.

The RSE President, Sir John Arbuthnott, in announcing the awards said:- "One of the greatest privileges of the role of being President of the Society is the opportunity to meet many of the most talented people working in Scotland today.

Through these awards we are recognising outstanding individuals at points in their lives from those showing great potential at early stages of their career to those who have reached the pinnacle of their discipline and are regarded as such on an international basis. The process of deciding upon these awards provides an opportunity for the RSE and hopefully the research community at home and internationally to learn more about the outstanding and innovative work that is being undertaken in Scotland."

He continued, "Since the inception of the RSE our core founding principle has been the "Advancement of Learning and Useful Knowledge". This programme of awards remains absolutely true to this principle.

The pinnacle of the RSE awards is our Royal Medals and I am delighted to be able to announce that the recipients this year will be, Sir John Cadogan, Professor Michael Ferguson and Sir Ian Wood. All three have made outstanding contributions, Sir John and Professor Ferguson in scientific excellence and Sir Ian for his role in building the Wood Group to be a multibillion pound international enterprise, as well as his work in broader public life. We are also delighted to award the James Clerk Maxwell Award in conjunction with the IEEE. This year's winners are, Professors Richard Muller and Richard White of the University of California, for pioneering innovation in micro-electromechanical systems technology

Major RSE prizes will also be awarded as follows: the Lord Kelvin Medal to Professor Peter Davies for his work in Fluid Mechanics; the Sir James Black Medal to both, Professor Christopher Haslett for his research into inflammation and for establishing the Queen's Medical Research Institute, and to Professor Andrew Whiten for his research into primates and animal behaviour; and the Sir Walter Scott Medal to Professor David Hewitt for his work on The Edinburgh Edition of the Waverley Novels."

Sir John concluded, "I wish to extend my congratulations to all of the 2013 Award Winners. Each of them is an inspiration."

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EDINBURGH SWITCHES OFF TO SUPPORT EARTH HOUR

Lights will go out at iconic sites across Edinburgh this Saturday night in support of the <u>Earth Hour 2013</u> global call

Speaking about the team's support for the nationwide campaign, Edinburgh Rugby managing director, Craig Docherty, said: "As a club we pride ourselves in being at the centre of the community and we want to do more to help increase the number of people in Edinburgh on the NHS Organ Donor Register.

"Hundreds of people across the country are waiting on a transplant and they could be helped if more people registered as organ donors. The whole club is very proud to support the organ donation campaign. It really can save lives."

NHS Lothian has recently reached an organ donation high with almost half the community now signed up to the NHS Organ Donor Register.The health board now boasts the highest percentage of sign-ups in the country, with 48 percent of big-hearted Scots from the region registering their wish to become an organ donor.

Dr Richard Williams, chair of NHS Lothian's organ donation committee, said: -"We are thrilled to see that NHS Lothian continues to have the highest percentage of our population on the NHS Organ Donor Register in Scotland.We strive to increase the number of people signing up to the Register, and were overwhelmed to have more than 29,000 Lothian residents join the register in the past year.

"It's great to see that 48% of Lothian's population are now signed up, however we want to further increase that figure. We know that people in Lothian are caring and generous, and these figures prove just that."

Professor John Forsythe, Scotland's lead clinician for organ donation and transplantation and consultant transplant surgeon at Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh, said:- "Boosting the numbers on the NHS Organ Donor Register is vital to prevent three people dying every day while waiting on a transplant. These latest sign up figures give more hope to those waiting that they will get the transplant they desperately need.

"It is important to get people talking about this topic as the more people who add their name to the register, the better chance we have of saving lives."

Edinburgh West MSP condemns APD rise

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OSBORNE'S QUIET AIR PASSENGER DUTY HIKE LAST THING SCOTLAND NEEDS

The revelation that the fine print of Westminster's budget includes a planned rise on Air Passenger Duty (APD) has been condemned as the last thing Scotland needs.

Despite George Osborne failing to mention his plans for the tax on flights during his budget speech, the accompanying documents make clear that the Westminster Government will press ahead with a hike in APD from 1 April 2013.

Commenting, SNP MSP Colin Keir who convenes the CPG on Aviation and whose constituency is home to Edinburgh Airport said:-"This hike in Air Passenger Duty is extremely bad news for Scotland's airports and the wider economy.

"We should be doing everything we can to attract airlines to Scottish airports so that we can secure the full economic benefits that good air connections bring with them.

"Increasing the cost for airlines to fly to Scottish airports is the last thing that Scotland's economy needs.

"George Osborne's failure to change course on this tax hike is symptomatic of a Westminster system that simply treats the needs of Scotland as an afterthought if it considers them at all.

"We need decisions over Scotland's taxes to be made by people in Scotland, who are by definition the best placed to put our interests first. Only a Yes vote in next year's referendum will secure us those powers and ensure that the taxation system in Scotland is used to build a fairer, more prosperous country."

Video – Discover Scotland plane launched at Edinburgh airport

Council tax changes approved for empty homes

COUNCIL TAKES FIRST STEP IN TACKLING ISSUE OF EMPTY HOMES

The City of Edinburgh Council is set to introduce changes to council tax that will aim to tackle the issue of empty homes in the Capital.

<u>A report</u> to the Council's Finance and Budget Committee approved today outlines the plans, which includes reducing the council tax discount rate for empty and unfurnished homes from 50% to 10% after 6 months and increasing council tax by 100% after 12 months.

The planned changes come following new Scottish Government arrangements enabling councils, in certain circumstances, to use council tax as an incentive for encouraging owners of empty homes to bring them back into use and increase the available property stock. This is specifically to tackle empty and unfurnished homes that have been lying unused for extended periods of time. Council tax would continue to be waived for the first six months of a property being empty and generous discounts would be applied if the property is actively being marketed.

Councillor Alasdair Rankin, the city's Finance and Budget Convener, said: "Even though Edinburgh has a relatively low level of empty homes in both the social and private sectors, the Council has a duty to look at all the options open to us to deliver more homes.

"It is of utmost importance that we bring more empty homes back into use and council tax is just one of the avenues that the Council is looking to use. This report is undoubtedly a major step forward in tackling this pressing issue."

The work forms part of the city's Empty Homes Task Force, which was established by the Council with the objective of bringing empty homes back into use. The Task Force has representatives from all political groups, Shelter/Scottish Empty Homes Partnership, Orchard and Shipman and Link Housing Association.

Councillor Cammy Day, the city's Housing Leader, said: "The Capital Coalition has set up an Empty Homes Task Force to examine ways of bringing empty homes back into use. Link Housing Association – one of the task force members – has secured funding from the Scottish Government's Empty Homes Fund. The Council also support a number of letting schemes to help owners of empty homes bring them back into use."

Council records indicate that there are over 1700 properties classed as long term empty and approximately 5800 properties attracting second home discounts. The Council will review all classification to ensure accuracy on an ongoing basis.

It is planned that the policy will be implemented in the second half of 2013/14 supported by an information campaign to raise awareness.

Date set for Independence referendum

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Scotland's referendum will be held on 18 September 2014, First Minister Alex Salmond announced in the Scottish Parliament this afternoon.

The date is contained in the Scottish Independence Referendum Bill, introduced to the Parliament and published today, which also confirms that voters will be asked the question: "Should Scotland be an independent country?".

The Scottish Independence Referendum Bill

The legislation provides that the referendum will be:

• preceded by a 16-week formal campaign period, during

which limits will apply to the amount of money any registered participant may spend on campaigning, aimed at ensuring a level playing field for both sides of the debate

- overseen by the independent Electoral Commission, responsible for regulating the campaign rules, informing the public about the referendum and reporting to the Scottish Parliament on the conduct and administration of the referendum
- conducted under the direction of a Chief Counting Officer responsible for appointing local Counting Officers to run the poll in local areas

Mr Salmond said:

"On 18th September 2014 people across Scotland will vote to determine their country's future. It will be a historic day, and one on which this ancient nation decides its place in the world.

"People will be able to choose if they want a Scotland that is independent and able to make her own decisions — with a Scottish Parliament that is responsible for making the most of Scotland's rich resources to benefit its communities and safeguard the welfare of our most vulnerable citizens and accountable for how we engage other nations around the world.

"Devolution has shown how we can use Holyrood's powers to improve lives in the policy areas where we are already effectively independent.

"Scotland has made great strides since our national Parliament was reconvened in 1999 after almost 300 years. We are a more confident country, secure in the knowledge that when we take decisions for ourselves we can help make this a better place to live for all our citizens.

"Landmark policies introduced since devolution have made Scotland a safer, healthier and fairer country. Throughout the Parliament's history, we have used our powers for progressive purposes — such as free personal care, pioneering homelessness legislation, an end to tuition fees, and protecting the National Health Service.

"But we can and must do more – and only the powers of an independent Parliament with control of the economy, of international representation and of security will allow us to make the most of our huge national potential.

"Scotland now faces two futures: continuing with an outdated political entity that ill-serves the interests of the people of Scotland – a system that will continue to give us governments we didn't vote for. Or independence, where Scotland will get a Parliament that is both fully-empowered and fully-accountable to those whose lives are affected by its actions.

"With full economic levers and access to our huge natural resources, we can not only defend the progress made with devolution but we can become a fairer, more prosperous society. And one where a new, 21st Century relationship is forged between the nations of these islands and with the wider community of nations.

"18 September 2014 can be a date which becomes etched in our nation's story as the day Scotland took a decisive step forward to a better, fairer future."

<u>The Scottish Independence Referendum Bill (and supporting</u> <u>documents)</u>

The Chief Counting Officer will be the convener of Electoral Management Board for Scotland.

The Bill sets out the details of how the referendum will be organised and regulated.

Details of who can vote in the referendum, are included in the <u>Scottish Independence Referendum (Franchise)</u> <u>Bill</u> published on March 12 this year

The costs of running and regulating the referendum, funding a mailshot for each of the designated organisations and running public awareness campaigns is broken down as follows:

- £8.6 million for running the referendum
- £2.4 million to pay for a free mailshot for the two campaign organisations (which was included as part of the Edinburgh Agreement (paragraphs 22 and 23) at the request of the UK Government)
- £2.4 million for the Electoral Commission providing regulation and oversight of the referendum. Scottish Government has accepted the Commission's recommendation that £1.8 million should be used for public awareness campaigns)

Minister unveils new Discover Scotland plane and new routes from Edinburgh

Theatre review: Takin' Over the Asylum, Lyceum Theatre (****)

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Comedy and tragedy make unsettlingly close bedfellows in Donna Franceschild's big, popular drama about the precarious revival of a radio station in a Glasgow psychiatric hospital. And although Mark Thomson's slick, pacey staging — a co-production between the Lyceum and Glasgow's Citizens Theatre — brings plenty of laughs, there's an undercurrent of threat and unpredictability, even violence, that raises darker questions about patients' freedoms, and about the sanity of the mental health system itself.

But make no mistake — it's a hugely enjoyable evening, full of thought-provoking fun and often rowdy laughter. Based on scripts from Franceschild's successful 1990s BBC TV series of the same name — but substantially rethought for this 21stcentury theatrical reincarnation — it follows failed DJ and double-glazing salesman Steady Eddie McKenna (a quietly strong performance from Iain Robertson) as he brings his cherished collection of Marvin Gaye, Otis Redding and Sam Cooke LPs to entertain the patients in the St Jude's mental institution on its almost-defunct hospital radio system.

It's not long before the new arrival starts to transform the lives of patients — from hyperactive young Campbell (a brilliantly volatile Brian Vernel) to cleanliness-obsessed Rosaline (in a touchingly warm performance from Caroline Paterson). But as their confidence, creativity and involvement increase, so does conflict with the institution's subtly repressive management.

Franceschild is good at pointing up blurred lines between sanity and insanity — in the alcoholism of the supposed levelheaded Eddie, for example, or the barely suppressed violence of nurse Stuart. And she's keen to show the role that circumstance has played in the patients' conditions, for instance in the understandable reaction to abuse exhibited by the fragile Francine, played with tenderness by Helen Mallon.

But she also seems keen to cram as much as she can into what feels like quite a long two and a half hours. As more and more of the patients' back stories are revealed, Franceschild's narrative thread seems increasingly to lack focus — by the end, we have so many tales to take on board that a sudden tragedy goes all but unnoticed.

Nevertheless, it's a powerful, thoroughly entertaining evening, and Thomson draws exceptionally fine performances from his extremely strong cast. Without the slightest hint of voyeurism, it's as though we can only truly find order and meaning by staring into the chaos.

Science Festival begins this weekend

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The Edinburgh International Science Festival's flagship City Art Centre venue will open on Saturday with five floors transformed into a giant science playground packed full of exciting circuits, scary skeletons, racing robots and manic monsters. With workshops, hands-on activities, exhibitions and demonstrations galore, the City Art Centre offers a full day out for families and the perfect Easter Holiday adventure.

New activities for 2013 include the **Polyfloss Factory**, where kids can see the transformation of everyday plastic items into recyclable fibres in front of their own eyes, get hands-on with some plastic recycling techniques and explore some of the uses of plastic in everyday life. They will have the chance to use the innovative, artisan recycling Polyfloss machine – a converted candyfloss machine which turns plastic into a flosslike fibre which can then be melted and moulded into shape – and design and create their very own multi-coloured, funky recycled plastic ruler to take home. Funding and support from Zero Waste Scotland has enabled the Science Festival to bring Polyfloss Factory to the City Art Centre.

The Polyfloss team (Nicholas Paget, Emile De Visscher, Audrey Gaulard and Christophe Machet) met at the Design Interactions Course at the Royal College of Art. This innovative course brings artists, designers and engineers together to create novel and interesting new products. They assembled as a team because their skills were diverse, but their desires and passions are quite similar, they love cool machines, they love beautiful things and they hate waste. While Christoph and Emile approached the project from an engineering background, Nicholas explored the design implications and Audrey brought her experience as a fashion designer.

Dr Simon Gage, Director of the Edinburgh International Science Festival, said: "For two weeks we transform Edinburgh into one of the world's greatest playgrounds for the restlessly curious. Come and join us on a one way trip to Mars or look into the future of our food where we ask if we should be eating aliens or insects, help us explore the future of our cities and find out why play keeps us young. We invite you to explore literally hundreds of new ideas across the Festival."

The report claims that consultation with local community groups indicate that this would be a welcome amenity to the area.

Proposals to relocate the arts facility to a purpose-built development on Market Street were shelved earlier in the year due to financial shortfalls.

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Changes proposed for Moredun Community Centre

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Proposals affecting land surrounding Moredun Community Centre and Moredun Park will be discussed at the council's Finance and Budget Committee Meeting due to take place on Thursday 21 MArch 2013 $\stackrel{[\times]}{=}$. City developers Castle Rock Edinvar Housing Association (CRE) are seeking to build houses for older people on the former sites of St Barnabus Court and Craigour Care Home, and land currently attached to Moredun Park is being exchanged to form part of this development.

An area of ground presently forming part of Moredun Park Community Centre, and of the same size, is to be returned to the park, meaning the overall park area will not in fact change.

Consultation between the developers and the Moredun Community Centre Committee has taken place, although there will be further community consultation, including with the local church and primary school, as this project progresses. A planning application is yet to be submitted.

It is hoped that these changes, if made, will improve the way in which the park is used, and make it more accessible to the public. The council believe that security at the community centre will also improve as it is currently isolated following the demolition of the St Barnabus and Craigour Care Home sites.

Edinburgh MP comments on UK Budget – Cargo Networking – Festival on George Street – Johnston Press – Serious assault

Local MP, Mark Lazarowicz is backing a call by Usdaw, the shop workers union, for the Coalition Government to stop squeezing family incomes by continuing to cut the help they get through tax credits and other benefits.

Mark said:-"The Coalition Government's austerity policies have hit ordinary families hard and meant that many are struggling to meet basic bills for heating their home, food or clothing."

"A recent report by the Child Poverty Action Group found that in Forth ward 29% and in Leith 28% of children are growing up in poverty.

"Across the UK as a whole almost two-thirds of children in poverty has at least one person in their home who is employed.With over 5,000 families in Edinburgh set to lose out when the bedroom tax comes into force, household incomes are set to be squeezed even tighter. It's time for the Coalition Government to stop cutting and start listening to hard pressed families."

Most USDAW members work in retail so they may also have been affected by families tightening their belts and cutting back on spending which obviously hits local shops.

Some of them may also have felt the impact of changes to the rules on working tax credits introduced last April which increased the number of hours that parents must work to qualify for working tax credits at a time that many retailers were cutting back on employees' hours rather than being in a position to increase them.

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At yesterday's Transport Committee meeting, the council agreed to allow the Spiegel Tent and the Spiegel Terrace to be sited outside the Assembly Rooms as they were last year, <u>despite</u> <u>objections</u> from George Street traders and Essential Edinburgh. The objectors led deputations to the meeting to make their views known.

Johnston Press which owns The Edinburgh Evening News and The Scotsman has cut 1300 jobs from its workforce in response to a 12% reduction in turnover according to the <u>Press Gazette</u>. Many of these jobs are of course not in Edinburgh, and the editor of the Whitby Gazette has been made redundant.

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for information following a serious assault in the early hours of Saturday 16 March 2013.

The incident happened at around 1.30am near to the Village Pub on South Fort Street.

A 35-year-old man was walking home with a friend when they noticed a male standing on South Fort Street, shouting at

passers-by.

The victim turned onto Trafalgar Lane and a few seconds later the suspect assaulted him causing him to fall to the ground.

He was taken to the Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh and treated for serious facial injuries.

The suspect is described as white, between 18 and 21-yearsold, around 5ft 6ins tall with a stocky build and short brown hair. He was wearing a grey tracksuit top and grey bottoms.

Detective Constable Mark Seymour said: "This was a violent and unprovoked assault, which has left the victim badly injured.

"We would appeal to anyone who remembers seeing anything suspicious in South Fort Street on Saturday morning to contact police immediately.

"A woman in a pink dressing gown and another man are believed to have witnessed this attack and we would ask both of these individuals to come forward and assist with our enquiries.

"Similarly, anyone recognises the description of the suspect is also asked to get in touch."

Bootleg Film Festival Makes

Debut Edinburgh Appearance

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Do you love movies? Are you looking for somewhere to go this weekend? If you answered yes to both of those questions, then here is the solution: the Bootleg Film Festival at Banshee Labyrinth. Now in its fifth year, the BFF is the maverick alternative to the more famous festivals like Cannes, Sundance and our very own Edinburgh International Film Festival. Bootleg was founded by London-born filmmaker Tom Wilton in the basement of a coffee shop in Glasgow in September 2008 and has since visited the USA, Canada and various cities across Europe, and become a fixture on the calendars of low- and nobudget filmmakers the world over.

The Creative Director here in Edinburgh is Neil Rolland, a screenwriter and teacher who is also behind the <u>Write-Shoot-Cut</u> website and the monthly short film night of the same name which has been packing them in at the Banshee Labyrinth for just over a year. Neil has been working with an international team since August last year to whittle over 200 submissions down to a programme of 67 features and short films from all over Europe and North America, and as far afield as Argentina, Australia and Hong Kong.

Neil was kind enough to take some time out of his very busy schedule to pick some of his personal favourites that are not to be missed:

Red, White, Black and Blue is a film Neil calls "almost too good for Bootleg"; a documentary about youth rugby teams from South Los Angeles travelling to New Zealand to pit their skills against the locals. James Brown's film has already picked up awards at other festivals and is getting its European Premiere on Friday 22nd in the 4pm to 7pm block.

One for all you music fans, **Discoverdale** is a fly-on-the-wall

adventure following the cult comedy rock band (and Edinburgh Fringe stalwarts) Dead Cat Bounce as they try to unite lead singer Jim with the man he believes is his long-lost biological father: Whitesnake frontman David Coverdale. In the words of the guys themselves, "If you like musical, buddy road movies set in Scandinavia soundtracked by ass loads of Whitesnake, then this is the film for you". **Discoverdale** is screening on Saturday 23rd at 7:30.

Neil's picks from the short film selection include the dark Irish drama **Kara** (Sunday 24th in the 1pm to 4pm block) and **Liars**, a comedy about the awkward truth (showing on Saturday 23rd from 3:30).

Around 40 filmmakers will be attending the festival to show off their work, and taking part in various Q&A sessions and panel discussions over the weekend, and Neil and his team have laid on some great side events too, from a host of live bands on Saturday night to the awards ceremony and karaoke to cap the festival off in fine style on Sunday.

Bootleg represents a rare chance to see some great films from emerging talents with an audience of like-minded movie lovers, and all screenings and events are free. I'll be there reporting on the whole weekend as it happens, but you have no excuse for not coming along yourself.
