### Response to criticism of Tram project costs

Bob McCafferty, the Tram Project Director, has hit back at recent criticism of the apparently escalating costs of the project.

He has written:-

"The Scotsman newspaper yesterday ran a front page article: -'Tram costs hit £600m with two years to go', with accompanying double page and leader comment. This was followed up today by The Scottish Daily Mail and Daily Record, both of which featured broadly similar content.

The Scotsman headline itself is accurate but the article is speculative, suggesting that the project is expected to run over the £776m budget. This is not the case. The project continues to run to schedule and remains on budget [] and there is no new information to suggest otherwise. The only new piece of information in the article relates to the current spend as being £592m [] the remainder consisting of existing programme details (published late last year) and various comments from individuals relating to fears over rising costs.

Costs are not linear

The claim that the 'final bill heads for £900m' has no substance and is based solely on the simplistic assumption that costs will be spread evenly over the remaining two years of the project. This is not the case, nor would it be for any construction project of this scale.

The project is currently going through its busiest and most constructive period to date. The spend profile remains entirely in line with expectations  $\Box$  as does the progress of works along the length of the route from the Airport to St Andrew Square. Less than £1m has been drawn down against the risk allowance (of £34m) so far  $\Box$  with no requirement in the last quarter.

The target programme of works was published at the end of last year to give businesses, the public and other interested parties a better understanding of the nature of the ongoing works and the timescales involved and we continue to share as much information as we can with these groups. Positive progress

Contrary to the Scotsman's portrayal of the current position, there are number of positives:

the project has gained fresh momentum due to the new close working relationship being enjoyed between the Council, contractors and Transport Scotland

the first major milestone was reached with the handover of the Gogar depot in December 2011 [] the same month that dynamic testing began

the Mound reopened to buses, taxis, bikes and emergency vehicles on March 3 [] four months early

remaining utility works were completed three weeks early on Shandwick Place and on schedule in St Andrew Square, allowing main infrastructure works to commence

Princes Street works (west of Waverley Bridge) are ahead of schedule and likely to be complete in June

works between South Charlotte St and Waverley Bridge will

also be complete by summer while work in St Andrew Square should be clear by Christmas.

The Chief Executive has today written a short letter to the Scotsman clarifying these points and reaffirming our view that we expect the project to continue as scheduled."

### Restaurant Review: Pop Up at The Hub

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On Saturday 31st March we were lucky enough to be asked to rendez-vous with the great and the good of Edinburgh at the newly decorated Hub at the top of the Royal Mile for the one night only pop-up restaurant run by the students of Lycée Hôtelier in Dinard with the support of Institut francais and Frédéric Berkmiller .

11 budding chefs were given 4 days to explore the Scottish Larder and work in some of the best restaurants in Edinburgh; <u>Restaurant Martin Wishart</u>, Roy Brett's <u>Ondine Restaurant</u>, <u>Wedgwood the Restaurant</u>, Craig Wood's <u>The Wee Restaurant</u>, Frédéric Berkmiller's <u>Escargot Restaurants</u>.

The 11 students rolled up their sleeves to run their onenight-only restaurant under the guidance of their teachers and a couple of local chefs. They produced a unique menu of French cuisine with the best of the Scottish produce for around 300ppl which as we all know is no small task.

We arrived and were politely greeted and signed in before being met with a glass of kir (a popular French cocktail made with a measure of crème de cassis (blackcurrant liqueur) topped up with white wine) and a wine list to pre-order what we would like to drink with the meal. The wine list was selected by Eric Boschman, named World's best sommelier in 2010. The food menu was revealed at this stage but not much was given away, which kept the guests guessing. We selected a bottle from the fantastic wine menu and then set about finding our table. We were on a table with 5 other couples who were a mix of ages and professions, all eager to try the cuisine and most of them sent along by L'Escargot Bleu.

The evening started with a <u>video</u> showing where and what the students had been up to. It gave a wonderful overview of what had been going on behind the scenes in the build-up to the pop up restaurant. The students had visited many places including <u>Sunnyside Farm</u> and <u>Welch Fishmongers</u> where they learnt how to gut a fish and the craft of butchery. As the small talk started around the table the Mise en bouche arrived- Veal tartar. The table were a little hesitant to try the mise en bouche, but were pleasantly surprised by the texture and the flavours. Our French feast had begun.

On to the 'buffet' style starter which included beef pies, pork pâté, sea bream tartar, smoked salmon with citrus fruits sauce… and many other things, but unfortunately, I don't have the full list. Has to be said that a buffet for 300 was not the most speedy process, and the lack of signage was certainly noted when loading our plates, as we had no idea of what was what. By means of trial and error, the table sat about sampling the selection. A particular favourite of my companions was the beef pork pie, and I loved the salmon pâté. The sea bream tartar with passion fruit marinade was certainly

something worth trying.

After the array of starters we waited with anticipation for

the main course. A selection of slowly cooked veal, pork and beef with mash potatoes and swede (rutabaga). This was cooked beautifully and the presentation wasn't bad considering the quantity of guests. The dessert was a variation of the Paris-Brest, a choux pastry filled with whipped cream. To recognise Dinard in Edinburgh, the chefs added a whisky sauce on the side. A deliciously sweet end to the meal.

The food was varied and exciting, and it has to be said that some I loved and would certainly try again, other things I was glad I had tried! Overall the evening was a great success and we are already looking forward to next year.

## Restaurant Review: The Reverie

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The Ultimate in Bespoke Burgers!

Living the other side of town I had not heard of The Reverie before so I did a little bit of pre-review research and was pleased to find it was a location known for live music and the ultimate in 'Build your own burger'. We arrived a wee bit later than planned but the owner, Edwin van der Ven, couldn't have been more friendly, welcoming or polite — even after our tardiness! So once seated we took in our surroundings and the menus.

The Reverie is very much a pub, and a lively one at that. Due to its location you could be forgiven for assuming it was a 'studenty' hang-out but it really wasn't. As we sat in the restaurant area looking out the window or overlooking the bar, it felt like a proper vibrant local little pub.

After ordering a great glass of red we examined the menu. Main courses were a no-brainer, how could we come here and NOT order the infamous 'build your own burger'. It was great to see that it wasn't just the normal burgeresque accompaniments like cheese bacon and lettuce! The Reverie offered halloumi, sliced beetroot, tomato chutney and a mass of other choices – the thought of some grilled halloumi had my mouth watering already! But let's not get ahead of ourselves....

For starters Celia opted for her trusty favourite of Cullen Skink and I went for a pot of mussels with white wine and garlic cream. The Mussels were really tasty and much better than other moules on the menu around the capital. The sauce was good enough to drink, and I happily drained the pot. (Be surprised if you didn't! Ed.) Now Celia is a bit of a Cullen Skink connoisseur and although she enjoyed the dish it lacked the thick chowder like substance of her preferred style of the recipe.

And now for the burger...a delight. A beautifully bespoke burger with hand cut chips (or shoestring fries as I opted for). It was just how we had imagined and wasn't it a treat! Celia built hers with cheddar and bacon (terribly traditional) but mine was a bit more 'far out' with halloumi and yummy tomato chutney.

It's not often I can say this, but we were well and truly

beaten! As the live band started Celia and I were offered pudding but after our big burgers we just couldn't find room for another morsel. We did have a quick browse of the puddings and I must say they looked delicious (I had been eyeing the sticky toffee pudding on another diner's table earlier in the evening). So instead of a pudding the lovely Edwin offered us a fresh mint tea – a firm favourite of ours and it was the perfect way to end an evening at this vibrant little spot.

As well as great food The Reverie offers so much in the way of live music and diverse malts and ales too. Every other Sunday the pub plays host to live jazz – the perfect way to unwind after a busy weekend.

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Portobello High School – New jobs in the capital – Selfportrait at the Portrait Gallery – Local Elections – Police seek witnesses to assault

The campaign group PPAG are continuing with their appeal against the recent Court of Session decision that they were out of time to oppose the building of the new Portobello High School in Portobello Park.

The appeal will be heard on 23 & 24 May. If the appeal is unsuccessful then the contract for building the new school might proceed reasonably quickly. The council have already shortlisted Balfour Beatty for the school, but have been reluctant to go ahead and formally award the contract to the firm. It appears that an early date for the appeal may have been requested by the council, but not opposed by PPAG.

Meanwhile the supporters of the new High School, <u>Portobello</u> <u>High School in the Park</u>, have begun discussions as to the way they will show their strength by attending the appeal, or at the very least, gathering outside the court.

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About 30 new jobs will be created in Edinburgh following the announcement that cloud computing firm enStratus will open an office here later in the year according to <u>the BBC</u>.

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One of Scotland's most distinguished contemporary artists, Alison Watt, has unveiled a striking self-portrait, which has been acquired for the recently refurbished Scottish National Portrait Gallery (SNPG). The painting, which was made while the artist was still a student, has been presented by the Art Fund, the national fundraising charity for art, to celebrate the re-opening of the Gallery in December 2011.

Alison Watt was born in Greenock in 1965 and studied at Glasgow School of Art from 1983 to 1988. She first came to public attention in 1987, when she won the annual portrait award organised by the National Portrait Gallery in London, and was commissioned to paint H M Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother. In 2000, Watt became the youngest artist to be given a solo exhibition at the Scottish National Gallery of Modern Art, and from 2006 to 2008 was Associate Artist at the National Gallery in London. She was awarded an OBE in 2008.

Although she has rarely engaged with formal portraiture since her early career, Alison Watt has said that there is an element of self-portraiture in all of her work – from the very beginning, when she would stand in front of a mirror and paint herself obsessively, to the more subtle representations of self implied in the complex and enigmatic paintings of folded drapery for which she is best known today.

Watt's Self-portrait of 1986-7 has been acquired for the SNPG from the artist's collection and has been exhibited only once before, at Kelvingrove Museum and Art Gallery in Glasgow in 1990. Painted whilst she was ill, it shows Watt with her right hand across her forehead.

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Lothian and Borders Police have released CCTV images of two men they wish to trace in connection with inquiries into a serious assault that happened last year.

A 24-year-old man was walking with friends at Waverley Bridge around 12.20am on Sunday 27th November 2011 when two men approached and began verbally abusing him.

The men then began punching the victim to the face, causing him to fall against a wall and fracture his jaw.

Both suspects made off towards St Andrew Square via Multrees Walk before being lost to sight.

The first man the police would like to speak to is described as white, 21-years-old, tall with a slim build, dark blond hair and young features. He was wearing a red jacket with white sleeves.

The second man the police would like to speak to is described as white, early twenties, average height and build with dark eyebrows. He was wearing a dark hooded top with the hood up.

Detectives continue to investigate this incident and would urge anyone who recognises the men in this CCTV footage to come forward.

A police spokesman said: "The CCTV image shows two men making their way along Multrees Walk and we are appealing to anyone who recognises them to contact police immediately.

"Similarly, anyone with any other information that can assist with our inquiries should also get in touch."

#### David Gilroy sentencing to be televised – Hustings – Pandas – New Hotel opens – Easter Holiday suggestion

Last month David Gilroy was convicted of murdering Suzanne Pilley who went missing from her office in Thistle Street, and whose body has not ever been found. Now STV have been granted permission to televise the judge, Lord Bracadale, who will sentence Gilroy in the High Court next week. But the proceedings will not be shown live, and the camera will only show the judge .

The Judicial Office for Scotland said:-"The camera will focus on the judge and no other person will feature in the footage except the Macer and the Clerk. The accused will not be filmed.

Filming will commence when the plea in mitigation has concluded.

The footage will be made available immediately afterwards via satellite feed.

This is the first time that permission has been granted to film during a sentencing diet in the High Court."

An <u>STV spokesperson</u> said: "This is the first time in the UK that TV news cameras have been allowed to film a sentencing in a criminal court, and we're pleased that STV has been instrumental in making that happen.

"This development will allow viewers a rare insight into the closing stages of what has been a very controversial murder case."

Now <u>The Daily Record</u> reports that the actual trial of Nat Fraser due to start on 23 April may be shown on TV. ### Free Fringe looking for purveyors of the spoken word

Peter Buckley Hill's Free Fringe is back in 2012 with a new venue and needs more shows to fill it

Scots poets are being invited to reconquer the city of R.L. Stevenson, J.K. Rowling and Norman MacCaig by taking part in the largest arts festival in the world, but without having to pay for venue hire or indeed their inclusion in the brochure.

Free Fringe, where performers charge nothing for entry, rattle a bucket at the end and ask for nothing towards the costs of running the organisation, have secured a whole new venue in Edinburgh's New Town. They are now looking for storytellers, spoken worders, poets and Makars to fill it, from 12 noon till 10pm, from the 4-25 August 2012 (or at least hour-long parts thereof!) Now they have secured a new space at the Fiddler's Elbow to add to their 2011 collection of 34 stages in 30 venues, but they need acts to perform there.

The Free Fringe has now been going for seventeen years, and it has become a Fringe within a Fringe. Last year approximately 20% of the shows at the Fringe were at the Free Fringe. Unsurprising, when performers need not pay the £295-£395 to go in the official brochure, but are included in Free Fringe's own brochure (with a circulation of 100,000) for free.

Its spoken word section has been going for three years under its head, the red-headed Richard Tyrone Jones, of 'Utter!' spoken word, who said: "I wouldn't be able to afford to go to Edinburgh and appear in a paid venue. Instead it makes me proud to have programmed poets from around the world to do their shows with us, often debuts, including Tim Turnbull, Helen Mort, Aisle 16, Baba Brinkman and Peterborough's Dead Poets, who got five four star reviews. But many awesome Scottish performers such as the Chemical Poets won't be performing this year, and it meks me sair dulesome."

"But with this new venue, the 40-capacity Fiddler's Elbow on Picardy Place, we can give probably another 24 poets their own one-week run. You have to be prepared to chip in with helping keep the venue happy, and to give out Free Fringe programmes with your flyers, but you'll get to meet other writers from around the world – and audiences are bigger than for paid shows. The disadvantage is you are less likely to be reviewed but it is more about the sense of camaraderie, and the other shows you get to share. All you have to lose is your flyerphotocopying and accommodation costs – which is nothing if you live here already! And if you do, can I rent your sofa please? I've still not got my accommodation sorted."

Those interested are invited to read the Terms & conditions on the Free Fringe website to decide if it is for them, then to contact <u>schedules@freefringe.org.uk</u> with a show title, proposal, a few samples of work in video, audio or documents, how long a run they would like to do, when during the festival and at what time of day and they will try to meet your preferences.

And if you're not Scottish, they insist you're almost just as welcome.

### Chip pan fire in Leith

A 47-year-old man was rescued by firefighters from a flat on Elliot Street in Edinburgh during a fire yesterday afternoon.

Three fire engines and a height appliance attended the blaze at the first floor flat after a call came in at 2.34pm. Six firefighters wearing breathing apparatus extinguished the fire using a hose reel.

A Lothian and Borders Fire and Rescue Service spokeswoman said:- "This fire started with an unattended chip pan, and

quickly got out of control. The gentleman attempted to extinguish the fire himself and suffered burns to his hands.

"We urge people to throw out their chip pans and use thermostat controlled deep fat fryers, as chip pans can easily over-heat and catch fire. If a fire does start, turn off the heat if it is safe to do so, get everyone out – closing doors behind you and call the fire and rescue service out immediately on 999."

Firefighters treated the casualty at the scene until paramedics arrived. He was taken to hospital by ambulance suffering from burns and smoke inhalation.

## Investment for green buses very welcome

SNP AND GREENS WELCOME £1.8M FOR GREEN BUSES

A £1.8million investment that will see a further 26 low carbon vehicles added to the Scottish bus fleet including Lothian Buses has been welcomed by an Edinburgh MSP.

Other firms include Henderson Travel, National Express Dundee,

MacEwen's Coach Services and Deveron Coaches Ltd who will all benefit from the cash as successful bidders from the second round of the Scottish Government's Green Bus Fund.

Gordon MacDonald, SNP MSP for Edinburgh Pentlands and member of the Scottish Parliament's Infrastructure and Investment Committee, said:

"This is fantastic news that underlines the SNP's commitment to green travel. This latest round of funding, which comes in the backdrop of huge cuts to our budget from Westminster, shows the Scottish Government's dedication to ensuring our bus industry gets the support it needs. This will also help us reach our target of reducing carbon emissions by 42 per cent by 2020 and cuts fuel costs for the bus industry.

These vehicles are saving companies huge amounts of money on fuel prices, with Lothian Buses saying they increase fuel efficiency by over 50%. Last year the Scottish Government funded 48 new low carbon buses and today we have backed a further 26. I'm also pleased to see many of the buses will be manufactured at Alexander Dennis in Falkirk, supporting Scottish business. Low-carbon buses produce 30% fewer greenhouse gas emissions than a current diesel bus of the same capacity. This latest round is building on the good work already made in helping bus companies, passengers and the environment."

Edinburgh Greens have also welcomed the news of further hybrid vehicles for Lothian Buses, but say that The Scottish Government money must be seen in the context of their significant cuts to bus funding overall.

The Greens estimate that after this second round of funding from the Green Bus Fund, around 74 of Scotland's 5400 buses will be hybrids.

Steve Burgess, Green councillor for Southside/Newington ward said:- "The number 10 hybrids have been very popular and I congratulate Lothian Buses on securing another ten green buses for the city. This is good news for cutting climate-changing pollution and good news for air quality on our busy streets.

"Buses have been a very low priority for the SNP Government and this money needs to be seen in the context of cuts to their funding of bus services. We need a far more ambitious approach if we are going to make our public transport system both greener and more affordable."

## Nominations for Walter Scott Prize announced

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The shortlist for the £25,000 Walter Scott Prize for historical fiction has been announced recently by the Duke of Buccleuch, at the launch of the Borders Book Festival programme in Melrose. Our photo shows last year's winner, Andrea Levy.

With settings ranging from pre-revolutionary France to the Wild West of the 1850s, via two World Wars, the shortlist of six books was chosen by a new panel of judges from novels published during 2011.

The shortlist is:

On Canaan's Side by Sebastian Barry

The Sisters Brothers by Patrick de Witt

Half Blood Blues by Esi Edugyan

The Stranger's Child by Alan Hollinghurst

Pure by Andrew Miller

The Quality of Mercy by Barry Unsworth

The books are by authors from Ireland, Canada and England, and cover such diverse subjects as the jazz age in Nazi-occupied Europe, slavery in the English coalmines, and the closure of a cemetery in 18<sup>th</sup>-century Paris. The Walter Scott Prize, founded in 2009, is the largest annual UK prize to be judged outside London, and honours the legacy and achievements of Sir Walter Scott, founder of the historical novel.

The judging panel for the Walter Scott Prize this year included new judges Kirsty Wark, Professor Louise Richardson, and Jonathan Tweedie, who joined existing judges Elizabeth Laird and Elizabeth Buccleuch, and chair Alistair Moffat. The judges' criteria include originality and innovation, quality of writing, and the ability of a book to shed light on the present as well as the past. The judging panel described making a very difficult choice from 'the strongest longlist for the Prize so far'.

Also announced today, a new sponsorship deal with Jura Single Malt Whisky means that each of the shortlisted authors, as part of their prize, will have the opportunity to stay for a week in the exclusive Writer's Retreat on the Hebridean Isle of Jura, sample the award-winning whisky and write a short story inspired by their stay. This will be the first time writers of historical fiction have made use of the retreat. Rob Bruce Head of PR for Jura Single Malt Whisky said:

'Jura has a long literary history, and the shortlisted writers will follow in the footsteps of George Orwell who wrote his famous novel 1984 whilst saying on the island. We have welcomed a number of other talented writers to Jura over the last few years including Alexander McCall Smith, Will Self and Stuart MacBride, however we have not yet had a writer who specialises in historical fiction, so we are very much looking forward to reading their short story that is inspired by their time on the island.'

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## Police still searching for Armed Robbers

Lothian and Borders Police are making a fresh appeal for information following an armed robbery in Barnton Avenue West, Edinburgh, on Friday 9 March 2012.

A number of designer handbags and a quantity of very distinctive jewellery were among the £15,000 worth of property and £5,000 of cash that was taken by the three suspects, who tied the homeowners up while they ransacked the property.

The 58-year-old man and his 48-year-old wife were restrained and threatened with a knife when the men targeted the house about 9.30pm a month ago. Fortunately neither of them were seriously injured.

Detectives on the inquiry team are now appealing to traders all over the country to be aware that people may be trying to sell on these items.

In addition officers are appealing for information about two vehicles that were seen travelling together in the area of Barnton Avenue West on the day of the robbery. One is described as being a dark-coloured saloon, the other is a silver-coloured people carrier with blacked out windows.

The suspects, three men, were all wearing dark clothing. Two of them are described as being around 6ft tall, and spoke with foreign accents, the other with a Scottish accent. One of the men was wearing white trainers.

Detective Inspector Gordon McCreadie said: "In the past four weeks there has been extensive work done in terms of CCTV

viewing and house to house inquiries, and as a result we are now keen to trace the drivers of the two vehicles that were seen in the area on the day of the robbery. The dark-coloured saloon and silver-coloured people carrier with blacked out windows seem to have been travelling together, so may have caught the attention of passers-by.

"We also now have a detailed list of the property that was stolen, and as such we are asking people – in particular traders – to take a look at the images of some of these items, and consider whether someone has tried to sell this on to you recently.

"We have had a good response from the public to our earlier appeals, but once again I would appeal for anyone who may have some information regarding this incident, and who has not already spoken to us, to contact us on 0131 311 3131."

## Dr James Hansen is Edinburgh Medal Winner

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Edinburgh Medal to be awarded later today.

The recipient of the 24th Edinburgh Medal, Dr James Hansen, the American climate scientist who is a member of the National Academy of Sciences, an adjunct professor in the Department of Earth and Environmental Sciences at Columbia University and at Columbia's Earth Institute will speak in Edinburgh tonight.

Perhaps best known for bringing global warming to the world's attention in the 1980's when he first testified before Congress, Dr Hansen's background in both space and earth sciences gives him a broad perspective on the status and prospects of our home planet.

Hansen admits that if it hadn't been for his grandchildren, and the knowledge of what they would face, he would have concentrated on the pure science, and not persisted in taking a public position pointing out the challenges that humanity faces. It is this message that he brings to Edinburgh when he presents climate change as a moral issue of unprecedented scale. Described by Al Gore as 'the scientist with the most powerful and consistent voice calling for intelligent action to preserve our planet's environment.' Hansen believes that while today's adults obtain benefits from fossil fuel use, the consequences will be felt mainly by young people and future generations as well as the fellow species with which we share our planet.

More than 30 years ago Hansen, who is 70, and his team created

one of the first global climate models and used it to predict much of what has happened in the climate since. Hansen has now concluded, on the basis of analyses of Earth's climate history and global observations made by other scientists, that the threats posed by global warming have increased markedly because of the absence of effective policies. Unless prompt action is taken to place a rising price on carbon emissions – by collecting a fee from fossil fuel companies and distributing the funds to the public – the planet will be committed to devastating consequences borne upon today's young people.

Dr Hansen say:- "I am honoured to receive the Edinburgh Medal and I hope that I can use the occasion to draw attention to the urgency of addressing climate change, with a different approach, one that would be effective. Our parents did not know that their actions could harm future generations. We will only be able to pretend that we did not know."

Dr Simon Gage, Director of the Edinburgh International Science Festival, said "We are truly delighted to award the 2012 Edinburgh Medal to a scientist whose tireless and principled voice has had such an impact on the climate debate. His advocacy around the most pressing issue of our time and his insistence that he has a duty to society as well as to science makes him an outstanding recipient. "

The Edinburgh Medal is a prestigious award given each year to men and women of science and technology whose professional achievements are judged to have made a significant contribution to the understanding and well-being of humanity. The Medal is supported by the City of Edinburgh Council and SEPA and will be awarded at a ceremony later today.

The Rt. Hon. George Grubb, Lord Lieutenant and Lord Provost of the City of Edinburgh, said: "Dr Hansen is an extremely worthy recipient of the Edinburgh Medal. An internationally lauded scientist, he has worked tirelessly to highlight the grave risks posed to our planet by the effects of climate change. Indeed, through his efforts, Dr Hansen has been instrumental in bringing climate change to the forefront of the global political agenda."

The Vote of Thanks, following the Edinburgh Medal Address: The Case for Young People and Nature, will be given by Professor James Curran, MBE, Chief Executive of SEPA, who has worked in environmental science and regulation for 30 years.

Professor James Curran, MBE, Chief Executive of SEPA said "Climate change is arguably the most severe threat facing our planet today. It is already affecting us all and seems destined to worsen for generations to come. James Hansen can take the credit for having brought the issue of climate change to the world's attention, often in the face of personal attack. All of us have a responsibility to take action to adapt to its implications and, even more urgently, to do all that we can to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and support international action. For his foresight, commitment and courage, James is a very worthy recipient of the Edinburgh Medal, and I am delighted that SEPA has been able to support the award."

## Football – Spartans WFC lose some points

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This was not such a good weekend for Spartans WFC.

In the Scottish Women's Premier League game at Ainslie Park, the match between Spartans and Inverness ended 2-2 with the away side coming from two goals down to take a share of the spoils.

Spartans managed to take a two goal lead into half-time through a brace by striker Sarah Ewens, but Inverness produced a determined response , fighting back through a strike by Natalie Bodiam and a last minute awarded penalty which was calmly converted by Captain Karen Mason ending the game all square. Spartans started the game with great confidence and within the first minute almost took the lead through a Louise Mason shot. Diana Barry started the move, flicking the ball back to Sarah Ewens whose first time pass found Louise Mason wide on the right however her shot went inches wide of the post.

With the wind picking up the pressure on Inverness continued and after just five minutes Chloe Fitzpatrick sent a sizzling shot wide of the near post after some precise build-up play by Molly McKean. And it was McKean who was next to test the Inverness goal however her shot from 22 yards sailed well over the bar.

Even though the game was turning into a midfield battle with very few clear cut chances, Spartans were continuing to test the visitor's goal and 20 minutes gone Lana Clelland sent a shot that went just wide of the far post. Louise Magilton picked the ball up on the half way line and the fullback charged into space before playing a delightful pass over the oncoming defender into the path of Clelland who, in one swift move, cut infield and fired in a right foot shot that failed to trouble the keeper.

Spartans vice-captain Barry, who was wearing the Captain's armband due to Louise Young being out injured, was starting to orchestrate moves from the front and it was through her creative passing that allowed Spartans to test the Inverness keeper on the half hour mark. Barry found Mason on the right who played a first time ball in to Ewens but as she went to shoot Karen Mason slid in to flick the ball out for a corner.

Eight minutes before half time Spartans finally took the lead with Ewens firing a right foot shot into the bottom corner of the net. Ewens herself picked the ball up on the edge of the area and, after stepping past one challenge charged into the area sending a low right foot drive into the bottom corner, giving the home side the lead. Within three minutes of that opening goal Ewens got her second of the game, from 30 yards out, the striker sent a fierce lobbing drive past the outstretched hand of the Inverness keeper doubling both her goal tally and her team's half time lead.

The second half started in similar fashion to the first with Spartans pressurising the Inverness goal. Bobbi Beveridge, who had come on just before half-time for the injured McKean, picked the ball up on the halfway line and after a mazy run through a field of players smashed a fierce right foot shot that flew well wide of the mark.

However, Inverness, moments later had their first clear-cut opportunity and after some exquisite build-up play saw Finella Annand play the ball through to Becky Dingwall who, in using her pace to get past the Spartans defence, was just unable to beat the alert Rachel Harrison who was quick off the mark to clear the danger outside her area.

This opportunity was just a warning of what was to come and moments later Inverness reduced the deficit with Natalie Bodiam firing the ball home. After latching onto a Karen Mason clearance, the striker used her strength to hold off Victoria Farquhar before burying the ball past the diving Harrison.

Inverness continued to press the Spartans goal and again a clever ball over the Spartans defence was only just cleared by Keeper Harrison who managed to head clear with Bodiam bearing down on her.

Bodiam was starting to cause the Spartans defence some serious problems due to her pace and movement and moments after her last opportunity the number 11 latched onto a Kirsty Deans pass and in one swift movement turned and fired a shot that whistled past the post.

With only 20 minutes remaining Spartans came close to regaining their two goal advantage with substitute Ann Taylor

firing in a right foot shot that went just wide of the top corner. Fitzpatrick picked the ball up on the half-way line and flicked the ball over to Claire Crosbie who found the run of Barry who quickly played in Taylor who was clear on the right wing. The striker, with the Inverness defence charging down on her, fired in a first time shot which sailed just past the post.

However this was a momentary lapse in the Inverness pressure with Dingwall and Bodium causing the Spartans defence serious problems. Dingwall, after managing to get clear of the chasing defence, fired in a shot that Harrison tipped onto the bar, and collected at the second opportunity.

With five minutes to go, the game started to open up and this allowed Spartans to come close to sealing the victory. Ewens, who was on a hat-trick, latched onto a Fitzpatrick through ball and, after taking the ball past two defenders, flicked it past the advancing keeper only to see it hit off the post and away for a goal kick.

It was however Inverness who left the ground the happier as, with a minute to go, the away side were awarded a penalty with Victoria Farquhar, who had been solid in defence, was adjudged to have pushed Inverness striker Bodium just inside the area. Up stepped Inverness Captain Mason to fire the ball home and ending the game all square with a cuptie between the same two teams taking place next week.

Spartans coach Mike Ross was disappointed with losing a two goal lead and felt his team should have played better. He said: "I am very disappointed with the result, after looking comfortable at half time our standards dropped and this allowed Inverness to get back into the game. However next week we play them again and I am looking for a strong and spirited response from everyone in the team."

### PORTOBELLO PARK – Dreams -VOCAL manifesto – Encouragement to vote – SPOKES manifesto

Yesterday we carried the story that the campaigners for the building of the new Portobello High School PFANS were cheered by the fact that land campaigner, Andy Wightman was supporting their cause. Now the group campaigning against the siting of the new school in Portobello Park, PPAG, have made their replies on their Facebook page. They have said this:-

"The issues involved in the appropriation of common good land are complex and what Andy Wightman is saying is not consistent with advice from elsewhere. In particular he fails to distinguish between common good land where there is a right to alienate, and common good land where there is no right to alienate. Both Andrew Ferguson, a very experienced local authority solicitor who specialises in this area and Professor Robert Rennie, also a specialist in this area, have expressed views with which PPAG's senior counsel, Roy Martin QC, agrees. These views do not support those expressed by Mr Wightman."

In addition they offer a full explanation of what one of the foremost conveyancing professors said in support of a case involving Highland Council, and which they feel supports their own:-

"Further to Andy Wightman's remarks about the merits of our case, the following seems to suggest that, if City of Edinburgh had stuck with their original promise - to provide replacement open space - they might not be in their current situation. Professor Rennie's advice to Highland Council (4 August 2010) was that they could not appropriate Bignold Park, Wick for the building of a school because of its use as a public park. Bignold Park is considered to be inalienable common good land and so it cannot be appropriated for an educational purpose. Further, there is no method to obtain court consent for this as a petition under Section 75 would be incompetent. He said that the only possible counter argument would be if it can be shown that new land is being provided by the Council as a replacement park in which case Bignold Park, although originally part of the inalienable common good, would then form part of the alienable common good and could be appropriated for educational purposes. Having considered the case law Professor Rennie concluded that an alternative park would have to be available immediately Bignold Park ceases to be available failing which any objection to the Council's use of Bignold Park for educational purposes would be likely to succeed."

So if what the campaigners are saying is that all that Edinburgh Council have to do is offer some ground in replacement to the part being taken up by a new school, then is this possible and where would it be? \*\*\*

## Further drop in value of Capital's homes

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Latest figures from ESPC – the largest property marketing firm in East Central Scotland – show that the average selling price of a property in Edinburgh between January and March was £195,221. This meant prices were 5.9% lower than at the start of 2011 when the average house price in the Capital stood at £207,497 and actually takes prices back to where they were in the first guarter of 2009, according to the firm.

Recent months have seen an upturn in the number of homes selling and this continued in March according to their records. During the first three months of the year the number of completed sales was 12% higher than that recorded at the start of 2011.

David Marshall, business analyst with ESPC commented:-"Recently we've seen an increased willingness from sellers to accept a slightly lower offer in order to get their sale completed. Over the last three months, over 80% of properties sold have been secured for less than their Home Report valuation, with homes going for an average of about 6% less than the valuation figure. As a result prices have either remained flat or inched down in most areas but the number of homes being sold has risen.

Edinburgh has seen a slightly larger decrease in prices compared to last year but in most cases house values are now back in line with, or slightly above the levels we saw at the start of 2009."

## Land Reform campaigner lends support to Portobello park petition

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Common Good expert describes park protesters claim as 'nonsense'

Andy Wightman, expert on the Common Good land in Scotland and well known campaigner for land reform, has criticised claims by a protest group about the implications of a recent court ruling.

The Portobello Park Action Group (PPAG) has lodged an appeal after losing a legal bid to stop a new Portobello High School being built on what is known as Common Good land. After almost six years in preparation the project was due to start on site last autumn, but the supporters of the new school say there are fears the legal appeal could delay completion of a new school for years.

Lady Dorrian, in the Inner House of the Court of Session, dismissed <u>PPAG</u>'s case because of the 'considerable delay in bringing this petition' but also made clear that the case would have failed on merit.

Since launching their appeal PPAG have made several claims about <u>Lady Dorrian's judgement</u> that have angered local residents who are in favour of the school. A petition has triggered an emergency meeting of Portobello Community Council, (due to be held next week), to demand that PPAG remove misleading claims from their website and ask that they drop their appeal "in the interests of the community in general and the children and young people of Portobello in particular."

Asked to comment on claims about the case, Andy Wightman made several remarks.

On the suggestion that the ruling could lead to Common Good assets being sold across Scotland, Andy Wightman said:- "It is nonsense to suggest that the ruling provides a green light for selling off common good assets. Sales will be governed by existing legal precedent and the Portobello case has no bearing on them."

Regarding PPAG's statement that the ruling meant "no-one will be able to challenge decisions to appropriate or alienate common good land in law" Andy Wightman noted that decisions would still be open to challenge, that the ruling had clarified the legal situation regarding the appropriation (change of use) of Common Good land, and that "the Portobello decision has no bearing whatsoever on alienations."

Andy Wightman also said:-"The appeal would turn on grounds that are extremely narrow and would be unlikely to succeed."

Sean Watters, Chair of Portobello for a New School (PFANS), commented:-

"This confirms what we've been saying; PPAG's statements about the recent court case are simply wrong. They need to stop making these claims.

Most importantly they need to recognise that their appeal has little hope of success. It will only cause more delay and expense, as well as anger within the local community. We desperately need a new High School. It's time to get on and build it."
