Bank of Scotland Fireworks Concert

The Bank of Scotland Fireworks Concert will ignite the skyline

on Sunday 5 September with the traditional send-off to three weeks of cultural celebration that is the Edinburgh International Festival. The spectacular finale this year features the music of American film, performed live by the Scottish Chamber Orchestra, with an impressive sky-show from pyrotechnic wizards Pyrovision. One of the largest fireworks displays in the world, the Bank of Scotland Fireworks Concert was last year enjoyed by over 220,000 people in parks and vantage points across Edinburgh.

The Bank of Scotland Fireworks Concert is the largest annual live music pyrotechnic display in the world with four tones of explosives, 12 tonnes of kit and over 100,000 fireworks to be ignited. International firework artist, Keith Webb and his team of 15 experts will take eight days to set up the display including the famous waterfall illuminating Edinburgh Castle.

Designed one month before the grand finale, the display is in constant development with the sourcing of new fireworks up to two years in advance of the performance. Pyrovision continually seek for excellence and invest in fireworks with new technologies and capabilities to integrate into the concert.

For Keith, celebrating 26 years with the Fireworks Concert, his highlight of the night is the relief of a successful show timed to perfection. He must anticipate the orchestra to precisely 2.5 seconds of their 'trigger notes' to execute the launch of the fireworks. This is the time it takes to communicate the signal, interpret it and press the right buttons to ensure a seamless routine.

Celebrated conductor Clark Rundell leads the Scottish Chamber Orchestra through a program of cinematic song from the bright lights of Hollywood.

The evening opens with extracts from Kings Row, the 1942 drama that launched the film career of Ronald Reagan. Composed by

the "Father of Film Music", Erich Korngold, the score was fittingly used at Reagan's inauguration to the White House in 1981.

Leonard Bernstein's score for On the Waterfront offers the inspiration for the second movement of the night. The film starred Marlon Brando in his first Academy Award winning performance.

The evening continues with Bernard Herrmann's score to the film Marnie. Alfred Hitchcock's 1964 thriller starred Sir Sean Connery and is considered by some to be one of Hitchcock's masterpieces.

Another of Hitchcock's regular collaborators, Franz Waxman's music for Taras Bulba provides the rousing finale to the 2010 concert. Waxman is one of the greats of Hollywood composition and was nominated for 12 Oscars over his career. Taras Bulba starred Yul Brynner and Tony Curtis.

Clark Rundell is Director of Contemporary Music and Head of Conducting at the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester, and Artistic Director of the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic's award winning new music group, Ensemble 10/10. He studied at Northwestern University, Chicago, USA. In addition to his frequent appearances with the Royal Liverpool Philharmonic, Clark appeared this season with the London Symphony Orchestra at the Barbican, the English Chamber Orchestra in London and on tour as well as the BBC Philharmonic, BBC Scottish Symphony Orchestra and the Schoenberg/ASKO ensemble at the Muziekgebouw, Amsterdam, amongst others.

In 2009 the Bank of Scotland Fireworks Concert was enjoyed by over 220,000 people viewing from vantage points across the Scottish capital and remains one of the biggest annual displays in the world.

Bank of Scotland has sponsored the Fireworks Concert since 1995 and their support includes the Bank of Scotland Family

Viewing Area at Inverleith Park. For non-ticket holders Inverleith Park provides an ideal viewing area, particularly suited to families with younger children. ➤ The National Theatre of Scotland returns to the Edinburgh International Festival, following previous appearances with Realism, The Bacchae and 365.

CALEDONIA, written by Alistair Beaton and directed by Anthony Neilson, will receive its world premiere at the Edinburgh International Festival on 21 August at the King's Theatre, Edinburgh, following preview performances at Eden Court, Inverness.

CALEDONIA is a story of greed, euphoria and mass delusion. It is the story of a small, poor country mistaking itself for a big, rich country. William Paterson was a financial adventurer who in the late 1600's planned to found a Scottish colony in Darien on the isthmus of Panama in Central America and turn Scotland, one of the poorest nations in Europe, into a prosperous colonial power. He invited the public to invest and within weeks a vast proportion of the nation's wealth had been subscribed. Distance, disease and a naive optimism all played their part in this ruinous episode. Within a few years, the Scots — demoralised and impoverished — gave up their nation's independent status and signed the 1707 Treaty of Union with England.

Inspired by documents, journals, letters, songs and poems of the period, celebrated playwright and satirist Alistair Beaton has created a work that is both a tribute to heroic ambition and a darkly witty take on the deceptions and self-deceptions of rich and poor alike. CALEDONIA is directed by Anthony Neilson, the writer and director whose award-winning work for the Edinburgh International Festival has included the National Theatre of Scotland's Realism and The Wonderful World of Dissocia.

Alistair Beaton's recent plays include Follow My Leader (Birmingham Rep and Hampstead Theatre) and King of Hearts (Hampstead Theatre). His political comedy Feelgood (Garrick Theatre) won the Evening Standard Award for Best Comedy as well as an Olivier Award nomination.

Recent television films include A Very Social Secretary and The Trial of Tony Blair for Channel 4. He is also author of a number of best-selling books.

The play is directed by Anthony Neilson whose previous work as a director includes The Big Lie; God In Ruins and The Drunks for the Royal Shakespeare Company and The Death of Klinghoffer for Scottish Opera and the Edinburgh International Festival in 2005. Anthony is also an Artistic Associate of the National Theatre of Scotland for whom he directed Home: Edinburgh and wrote and directed Realism. The National Theatre of Scotland toured The Wonderful World of Dissocia, written and directed by Anthony Neilson in 2007, which won the 2007 TMA Award for Best Touring Production. Anthony's film and television credits include The Debt Collecto; Spilsbury; Deeper Still and Spooks which Anthony is the Serial Story Consultant for. Further projects for 2010 include directing a Christmas show for The Royal Court Theatre which Anthony will write and direct.

The National Theatre of Scotland recently copresented Higgins' debut play Nobody Will Ever Forgive Us (Traverse Theatre) and he is currently the Company's Pearson Playwright. Other recent film appearances include Andrea Arnold's Red Road.

Assault & Robbery in Granton

Police in Edinburgh are appealing for witnesses after a 47-year-old woman was assaulted and robbed by two men in the Granton area of the Capital on Sunday, August 8th.

The incident happened in the early hours of the morning, at around 1.10am, at the junction of Boswall Square and Boswall

Ouadrant.

The victim had been walking along Boswall Quadrant from Boswall Drive, and on reaching the junction she was grabbed by one of the men, while the other man grabbed her handbag and wrenched it from her shoulder.

They then made off with the handbag down Boswall Quadrant, towards Boswall Terrace. Both suspects are described as being aged between 20 and 25-years-old, and between 5ft 4ins to 5ft 6ins tall

The first suspect is described as wearing a black hooded top with the hood up, and a white motif on the front. Then second suspect was also wearing a black hooded top, again with the hood up.

A police spokesman said: "Although she wasn't seriously injured, the victim was understandably distressed as a result of her ordeal, and we are appealing for any information that can help us identify the suspects.

"Anyone who witnessed the assault, or who was in the area at the time and noticed the suspects there, should contact police immediately.

"Similarly, anyone who recognises their descriptions, or who has any other information that can help our inquiries, should also get in touch."

New Fire Chief - Merger

inevitable

The new Chief Fire Officer for Lothian and Borders Fire and Rescue Service has said he believes that a merger of the eight fire and rescue services across Scotland is 'inevitable' in the face of swingeing financial cuts facing the public sector.

In his first interview since he took up his post on the 12 July, Jimmy Campbell has laid out his vision for the future and the potential shake up that will be required if public finance efficiencies over the next four years are to achieved.

Speaking about the unchartered waters that lie ahead he said: "We don't know at this stage what cuts will be expected in services like ours but with commentators speculating on cuts from 12% to as much as 25% we know these cuts will be significant and there is no way that cannot affect how we currently do business.

"I am seeking a national approach from the fire and rescue services' Chief Fire Officers to establish a realistic direction and course of action that fundamentally protects our frontline firefighters and maintains the quality standard of services that the people of Scotland have come to expect.

"At present we do things eight times over, eight Chief Fire Officers, eight sets of senior management, eight sets of back office support across a range of jobs, Personnel, Pays, IT to name but a few.

"If we look at the number of fire and rescue services in Scotland there must be a better way of doing things. In Wales they have already reduced the number of services they have without apparent detriment to the core services they are required to provide by law.

"I believe that it's inevitable that at the end of this four

year period of budget cuts we will not have eight Fire and Rescue Services across Scotland, they will have been merged perhaps to three, covering the West of Scotland, South East and the North.

"At present our services match the set up at local authority level and that is also reflected by the number of police forces and health boards in Scotland. Perhaps at Government level there is a need to look at a total reorganisation to find a more effective way for agencies to work together and in particular how back office services are supplied.

"There has been much good work done by the fire and rescue service in the past few years to reduce fire deaths across the country by around 25%. It is critical that any changes we make do not affect frontline services and undo this excellent record that has contributed to making Scotland a safer place to live.

"We need to start the discussion now if we are to have the time necessary to effect fundamental changes in how we continue to deliver services and deliver efficiencies at the same time.

"In Lothian and Borders 84% of our gross expenditure is in staff costs, this will be replicated in other fire services. If we are to deliver savings of some 20-25% as some suggest, sharing back room services alone will not give us the required savings.

"We need to be in a position to fulfil our duties under the Fire Scotland Act which includes a firefighting capability, response to road traffic collisions and a fire prevention role. For fire crews to carry out this work they need back office support, people to pay them, ensure they have IT support, take the calls for emergency assistance to name but a few.

"At present we don't have the answers because we don't know

what level of budget cuts to expect and we await the outcome of the spending review on October 20. The sooner we can confirm what will be taken out of our budgets the better. At present the uncertainty hangs over us all in Service. We must continue to provide the best public service we can, but remain very uncertain about the future. All we do know is that we face an unprecedented level of change.

"I still think we provide a fantastic service. In the past four years we have worked hard to continuously improve on what we do, but this good work could be undone if cuts harm our frontline service. It is very likely to have knock-on effects on some of the work we do in areas like youth engagement and the likelihood is that the youngsters that currently benefit from these type of very successful schemes will miss out. That in turn could have an effect on anti-social behaviour and more generally the relationship that exists between the service and various section of the community.

"I will be looking to work closely with other Fire and Rescue Service chief officers and with our trade unions as it is they who will play a key part in helping us to achieve a solution."

Chimps at Edinburgh Zoo

☑ In March, staff welcomed 11 new chimps to Budongo Trail to join the existing 11 resident chimps to create a 'super group' in the world's largest chimpanzee enclosure at Edinburgh Zoo. Now nearly six months on, and after a series of staged introductions, the complex process of integrating the two groups has been successfully completed much to the excitement of keepers.

Chimps live in complex communities led by a dominant male. Due to hierarchical groupings, keepers closely observed the status level of every chimp in the new group and correlated this to the nearest in status in the existing one. As Jo Richardson, Head Keeper at Budongo Trail reveals, individual characters and compatibility as well as hierarchal status is considered when introducing chimps:- "It is important for the success of the integration to know individuals well as chimps have a lot of group politics and social dynamics, and are an extremely intelligent and volatile species. This has been the biggest challenge and achievement for all the team at Budongo Trail so

far, as this is the largest integration of chimps we have ever undertaken.

"At Edinburgh Zoo our resident chimps have distinct characteristics and we completely understand their status in the group. But when you bring in a new group this has to be handled in the right way to ensure that no ones' status is challenged initially as the two groups come together. So you start with those with the lowest status then gradually progress up the status ladder until you get to the highest level and those being the alpha males. This is done at the chimps' pace to ensure all group members have a chance to settle and integrate well with hopefully minimal aggression, as chimps will sort out hierarchy and dynamics through both affiliative behavior and sometimes fighting."

Chimp hierarchies do not have a strict "pecking order", but are complex, fluid, flexible, and change often. Rank depends on personality as much as strength. Chimps spend hours grooming friends and family and reinforcing social bonds and allegiances. Highly intelligent, chimpanzees are the closets living primate to humans, sharing 98% of their DNA and are known to live up 60 years in captivity. Today, there are estimated to be 170,000 – 300,000 chimpanzees left in Africa, and their population is decreasing rapidly.

As Jo continues: "Over the last few weeks the alpha male from the original group, Qafzeh, and his challenger, Kindia, have now been introduced to alpha male Claus from the new group. So far they have given each other a wide berth but over the next few weeks as the groups start to settle into one, it will be interesting to see how the dominance struggle between these males plays out once the group dynamics stabilise. Already we are seeing allegiances change and strengthen as chimps from both groups start to integrate."

Originally from Beekse Bergen Safari Park in Holland, it is hoped that the 11 new chimps will be an important part of Edinburgh Zoo's contribution to the captive breeding programme which is now concentrating on the endangered sub-species, the Western chimpanzee (Pan troglodytes verus).

Councils allowed to profit from renewables

RenewableUK, the country's leading renewable energy trade association has welcomed the Government's decision to overturn a ban on local authorities selling renewable electricity back to the Grid. The ban will end on 18th August 2010.

Monday's announcement from energy secretary, Chris Huhne is seen by the industry as an important step in encouraging support for local renewable energy projects across the country that will help us meet our carbon reduction targets.

Gordon Edge, Director of Policy at RenewableUK said:

"This decision is very good news for councils, the environment and local communities alike. Councils have a vital role to play in the switch to a new low carbon economy and today's announcement means they can now take full advantage of the feed-in-tariff and the Renewables Obligation to deliver long-term benefit to their communities by way of additional income. In doing so we hope to see local authorities becoming champions of renewable energy and encouraging wider support."

Cairn Energy's Malcolm Thoms joins SEP

It's also interesting to know what the director himself thinks about it. So here's what Darren Thornton has to say:-"At the beginning of the process Yasmine [Akram] and I talked about movies more than theatre, about our shared interest in 'old school' romantic comedies. The kind of movies Billy Wilder made, we spoke about how romantic comedies had become romcoms, these awfully dull and lifeless consumer fantasies that are churned out by major Hollywood studios every other week. We decided that we wanted to do a theatre show for the female audience that go to these kind of movies and end up being as disappointed as we do. A theatre show that had kind of a cinematic quality — like an old-fashioned romance, but with a modern urban hero at the centre of the story - a female lead who was the antithesis to the usual 'Bridget Jones' types and so we created Mary - a foul-mouthed, temperamental, small town rebel. A girl who's just been released from prison and is coming home to a town she no longer recognizes, where all her friends have grown up and she's been left behind.

The writing process was very intense, I think we began rehearsals with half a draft and then the rest of the play was

written in the three week rehearsal block, sometimes this can be really dangerous, but for this production, it seemed to work in our favour, it gave the show a frenetic raw energy and made for a visceral performance. All of the crew got behind the process, creative decisions were made in the moment, and all of the elements came together for our first opening in Drogheda in December of 2009. Since then the show has played successfully in Project, Dublin in January and February of this year, and Edinburgh will be the first time it plays to an international audience, which we're keen to see, because the show is filled with 'small town' colour, our small town — Drogheda — and we're eager to see how an audience outside of Ireland will respond to it.. if Mary will endear the audience in the same way she did in Ireland.. we're confident that she will."

Crown Estate awards Four Demo Sites for Wind Farms

The Crown Estate has announced that four companies have been awarded offshore wind demonstration sites — and one of these is in the Forth estuary.

The awards follow an application process conducted in response

to the UK offshore wind industry's need to demonstrate new offshore wind turbines and other technologies in the marine environment. These demonstration projects will play a key part in addressing both technical and cost challenges, to facilitate construction further from shore and in increasing water depths.

An agreement for lease has been awarded for each of two sites in England to:

- * Gunfleet Sands extension DONG Energy Gunfleet Sands Demo (UK) Ltd, whole owned subsidiary of DONG Energy, for testing up to two next generation offshore wind turbines
- * Blyth Offshore Wind Demonstration site National renewable energy centre Ltd (Narec) for a 100 MW grid connected site to test and demonstrate up to 20 next generation offshore wind turbines and associated infrastructure.

Exclusivity agreements have been awarded for two sites in Scotland to:

- * Methil Offshore Wind Farm 2-B Energy to demonstrate 2B-Energy's two offshore wind turbines
- * European Offshore Wind Deployment Centre Aberdeen Offshore Wind Ltd, a company owned 75 per cent by Vattenfall and 25 per cent by Aberdeen Renewable Energy Group (AREG) to test and demonstrate up to 11 next generation offshore wind turbines and other technology in Aberdeen Bay.

The agreements for lease or exclusivity agreements enable the companies to take their proposals through the planning and consenting phases. Exclusivity agreements have been used in Scotland to allow the companies to begin initial survey and consultation processes for their sites while the Scottish Government conducts a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) for offshore wind within Scottish territorial waters.

Rob Hastings, director of marine estate at The Crown Estate said: "Technical innovation is essential to cutting offshore wind costs. Awarding the four demonstration sites supports the growing UK offshore wind industry's efforts to demonstrate new offshore wind turbines and other technologies in the marine environment. We are pleased that this is another positive step to help further grow the UK's capacity for secure offshore wind energy."

In May 2009 The Crown Estate launched a process of engagement with industry on offshore wind technology demonstration site needs. Applications for sites were received in early December 2009. Due to the demonstration nature of the projects they are each limited to less than 100 MW.

Titian on tour

More than 140,000 people have seen Titian's Diana and Actaeon since the painting's tour of Scotland commenced in May this year.

The 16th century masterpiece is currently on display at the recently refurbished The McManus: Dundee's Art Gallery and Museum, where it was viewed by almost 2,500 people during the exhibition's opening weekend. The painting has already been on show in Glasgow and Aberdeen in celebration of the first anniversary of its acquisition for the nation.

Culture Minister Fiona Hyslop visited the McManus Galleries today, during a visit to Dundee as part of her summer tour.

She said:

"Having been acquired for the nation, it is absolutely right that Titian's Diana and Actaeon is made available to as wide an audience as possible. I am delighted the tour is proving such a success. Diana and Actaeon is an exceptional and powerful work of art and it is fantastic to see it being enjoyed by so many people across Scotland.

"Dundee is renowned as a city of many discoveries and the refurbished McManus Galleries is a fitting venue for visitors to experience first-hand the delights of this world-class masterpiece."

Dundee City Council Leisure, Arts and Communities Convener Councillor Bob Duncan said:

"We are delighted to be hosting this prestigious national acquisition within the newly restored McManus. It is important that we bring the very best to the city to complement the nationally recognised collections we hold on behalf of the citizens of Dundee and indeed the nation. The National Galleries are to be congratulated on this initiative of bringing this work to the people of Scotland."

While in Dundee as part of her summer tour programme, the Minister also visited the D'Arcy Thompson Zoology Museum at the University of Dundee, which is marking the 150th anniversary of the birth of Dundee's pioneer of life sciences, Professor Sir D'Arcy Wentworth Thompson.

Ms Hyslop said:

"Professor Sir D'Arcy Thompson was one of the intellectual giants of the modern age and his scientific discoveries made a valuable contribution to our understanding of the world. It is important that we remember and celebrate Scotland's great minds and innovations. So, I am glad to see Dundee marking this anniversary and telling the story of this great man."

Titian's Diana and Actaeon was acquired for the nation by the National Galleries of Scotland and the National Gallery in London in February 2009 for £50 million with contributions from the Scottish Government, The National Heritage Memorial Fund, The Monument Trust, The Art Fund (with a contribution from the Wolfson Foundation) and through public appeal.

Diana and Actaeon is on display at The McManus: Dundee's Art Gallery and Museum until 5 September 2010. Admission to the exhibition is free. The painting has also been on display in Aberdeen and Glasgow.

A series of exhibitions and events are being held in 2010 to mark the 150th anniversary of Professor Sir D'Arcy Thompson's birth, in a collaborative project between the University of Dundee and the University of St Andrews.

Holyrood saves money on publishing costs

The Scottish Government has reduced its spend on publishing services by half, it was announced today.

The savings — a total of £5 million over three years — represent a 50 per cent reduction in spending on the Design, Print, Publishing and Associated Services (DPPAS) contract since 2006-07, exceeding the Scottish Government's own savings target.

Spending on print alone was down by £2.8 million as the Scottish Government increased the number of web-only publications — up by 34 per cent in 2009-10. There were further savings on design, distribution, reprints and

promotional items.

Cabinet Secretary for Finance and Sustainable Growth John Swinney said:

"The work of Government should always aim to secure the best value for the taxpayer, while delivering the highest standards. The Scottish Government has taken a lead in securing greater value for the public purse and I would encourage the wider public sector to do the same.

"These significant savings exceed substantially our target savings under the previous contract. And in the current economic climate, when budgets are being squeezed by Westminster cuts, there is even greater urgency to achieve efficiencies wherever possible. Our challenge is to continue to build on this achievement under our new Framework contract."

The total reduction in spend by the core Scottish Government since 2006-07 was 51 per cent — reduced from £9.8 million to £4.9 million.

The DPPAS contract ended in April 2010, when a new Framework contract came into effect.

However, with an audience of creative people there was always plenty of intelligent banter. This year we have a better idea of the issues people want to hear about and we'll try to tailor the presentations accordingly".

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Building sites are dangerous

■ Building sites are not adventure playgrounds...That is the Health and Safety Executive's (HSE) message to parents and children as school holidays get well underway in Britain.

HSE is encouraging parents to warn their children of the dangers of playing on them, after one child died and 25 were injured on construction sites in 2008/09. Dozens more children are seriously injured on sites every year.

Companies are being reminded that sites should be secure, with good fencing to prevent public access and with regular checks carried out.

Philip White, HSE's Chief Inspector of Construction, said:

"Without proper precautions, construction sites are dangerous places for those who work on them day in day out, never mind the risks to children who simply see them as exciting playgrounds and don't understand the dangers.

"Of course we want children to make the most of their summer holidays by enjoying the outdoors, but building sites are not the place to do it. We need parents to help this message hit home.

"Construction managers should check their sites are secure, and in areas where children live and play they should ensure that risks to children are properly controlled."

Tortoises on the loose

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The Scottish SPCA has been caring for two runaway tortoises at the charity's Edinburgh and Lothians Animal Rescue and Rehoming Centre and staff are hoping to reunite the stray pets with their owners.

We think the tortoises have escaped as a result of recent warm weather, where owners may have been leaving them out in gardens to enjoy the sunshine and some exercise.

One is a small male Horsefield tortoise, nicknamed Clover, which was found straying in Woodlee Park in Alloa on 18 June and the other is a large male Hermann's tortoise, who has been called Dandy. He was found wandering along Hillview Road in Edinburgh on 23 June.

Senior Animal Care Assistant Lora Booth said, "We are seeing a lot of stray pet birds and tortoises coming into our care at the moment and we think it's due to their owners letting them out for some exercise during the warm weather.

"Pet birds are often let out of their cages to fly around indoors, but if a window or door has been left open then they'll easily escape.

"Likewise, with tortoises, owners may be letting them out into the garden to enjoy the sunshine and some exercise, but they are surprisingly agile and can easily dig their way under a fence or find a gap in a hedge.

"These tortoises are in good health and condition so we're pretty sure their owners are missing them.

"We're inviting anyone whose pet tortoise has recently gone missing to give our animal helpline a call on 03000 999 999. If no-one comes forward to claim these guys then we'll be seeking good homes for them."

Forward Prize nominees appearing at Book Festival

Four of the six poets on the shortlist for The Forward Prize for Best Collection, announced this week, will be appearing at the Edinburgh International Book Festival this summer. Although tickets for Nobel Laureate Seamus Heaney have sold out, tickets to hear Robin Robertson, Jo Shapcott and Sinéad Morrissey are all still available.

Don Paterson, the internationally renowned Scottish poet, has worked with the Scottish Poetry Library to select some world renowned poets for the programme, including Simon Armitage and Pulitzer winner Paul Muldoon, plus, of course, the four Forward prize nominees.

Ruth Padel, who chairs the judging panel for The Forward Prize, will also be appearing at the Book Festival and has selected a series of events looking at family relationships. She will be in conversation with Lyndall Gordon exploring the tensions within Emily Dickinson's family, and with Fatima Bhutto and Fay Weldon who share the way in which a parent's loss affected their understanding of the world. John Burnside and David Vann discuss sons' relationships with their troubled fathers.

Off to Sunny Spain for your retirement?

But beware: your UK state pension might not rise in the future, unlike your friends back home, who might enjoy double the level of state pension after 20 years

If there isn't a reciprocal agreement in place, then you need to be very careful your retirement income is sufficient to cover your living costs over a long period of time. Over a 20 year retirement, your basic state UK pension could halve³ in real terms if a reciprocal arrangement is not in place."

If you are considering retiring abroad in the future, but are wondering if your retirement savings will be sufficient, Standard Life has launched www.getarealitycheck.co.uk, where you can check if your plans are on track.

Top tips for retiring abroad

- 1. Seek independent financial advice before making plans about future pension provision or transferring your pension overseas.
- 2. Check what reciprocal basic state pension agreements are in place with the destination country, if any (check with the <u>Department for Work and Pensions</u>).
- 3. Inform your social security office, HM Revenue and Customs, and the Department for Work and Pensions when you move and provide your contact details abroad.
- 4. You can get a forecast of your state pension by completing a BR19 form or go to www.thepensionservice.gov.uk. If already overseas, complete form CA3638 or call The International Pensions Centre on 0191 218 7777.
- 5. Check your state pension age (SPA). For women, the SPA is rising from 60-65 between 2010 and 2020, with further rises to 68 currently expected to take place by 2048, although the coalition government may accelerate these changes.
- 6. Find out about welfare rights abroad. Some UK benefits are not payable outside the UK, others apply only in the EU or in countries which have agreements with the UK.
- 7. Tell your bank, building society and any other financial

- institution that you have a policy or agreement with them and are moving abroad.
- 8. Contact your local council to let them know when you are leaving and leave a forwarding address.
- 9. Find out more about healthcare costs in the country you want to move to.
- 10. Inform your GP and dentist you are moving, and consider private healthcare.

Cash for Portobello

Portobello Town Centre has been given a major revamp following £769,015 of investment from the Scottish Government and the City of Edinburgh Council.

Last year the Council put in a bid to the Scottish Government's £60 million Town Centre Regeneration Fund for the regeneration of Portobello High Street. The bid was called 'Building Stronger Town Centres in Edinburgh: Portobello' and was supported by various local partners including Edinburgh Chamber of Commerce, Edinburgh Business Assembly and the Portobello and Craigmillar Neighbourhood Partnership. The bid was successful and Portobello was awarded £582,015. A further £187,000 was contributed by the Council.

Pavements, crossing points, street furniture and lighting along the High Street have all been enhanced and improved. More bike racks have been put in to encourage people to cycle. New 'navigational' signage marks places of historical interest and gives information about Portobello as well as pointing

visitors in the direction of the nearby promenade. Works started in October 2009 and have recently been completed.

Cllr Tom Buchanan, Convener for Economic Development, said:

"These improvements have made an enormous difference to the area. Portobello is a thriving community with many independent traders and small businesses contributing to a bustling atmosphere. The high street is now greatly improved and I'm sure this will attract more visitors and shoppers, while enhancing the area for businesses and residents.

"This is also a great start to the Council's 'Building Stronger Town Centres for Edinburgh' programme and has really shown what a difference investment in Edinburgh's Town Centres can make."

These improvements also tie in with the city-wide Urban Centre Programme, which seeks to improve and promote local shopping centres.

Joyce Heath is a partner in the business Mike's Tackle Shop which is on the High Street. She said: "The pavements look really great now and they are a nice light colour. The work was done in a fast and efficient manner and the workers made sure our customers could always get access to the shop. I'm really pleased with the results and I hope they paving stones remain as clean."

▶ During the 1860s No. 38 Queen Street was the home of George Patton, a senior figure in Edinburgh's legal establishment who was also the focus of a political scandal.

Patton rose through the ranks of the legal profession to become Lord Advocate in 1866, but in the same year he was also elected MP for Bridgewater in Somerset. Allegations of bribery at his election led to calls for an inquest, and faced with mounting pressure he committed suicide. At the time the scandal was described as, "unparalleled in the history of the Scottish judicial bench." They hadn't heard of espenses then....
