The good thing about Starbucks is that it is always the same. The problem with Starbucks is that it is always the same.

But this morning there is a bunch of Spanish schoolchildren in one corner (too many of them even for three tables....) a happy, squealy baby in another and then they are belting out the latest CD which you can buy, just to add to the atmosphere. So don't come here for a quiet coffee experience. The mix is always eclectic — business people, kids, mummies and children.

The coffee of choice this morning is a grande Americano in a takeaway cup — although I am sitting in.



Today was a little different from normal in that there was a maintenance man here. I show you this photo as it was alarming — not only was he on a working platform without another employee in attendance but he was simply cleaning the air conditioning fan onto the floor — or in one case on top of a child's high chair....without cleaning any of the debris up.

#### Good points

- 1. Good coffee whether you opt for the Americano or the Latte and they will do it for you in exactly the way you choose. So you can ask for the Grande skinny latte, to go, wet and extra hot! Also good for the teadrinkers among you they offer a good selection of teas.
- 2. Array of seats available from comfortable squishy ones to tables with wooden chairs for working at.
- 3. The familiar layout is good. You know there is internet. (Except this morning when the BT Openzone is simply not playing ball. The internet is free if you have a Starbucks prepay card. Which is another way of making it very convenient to go there. You know what to order before you get there and the quality is consistently good.



#### Bad points

- 1. Noisy environment not exactly conducive to work or rest....relatively cheap so it does entice teenagers and parents with children. So if you have become child-phobic in your old age then you should avoid! Also a little hot so whatever the maintenance man did he did not help!
- 2. The food in Starbucks has never been great. The choice is universal worldwide. Muffins, granola bars which are pretty tasteless. Sandwiches which are simply expensive. No soup. The mugs in Starbucks are just too thick and clumsy. They are probably very robust for the purposes of the dishwasher. But in the Reporter's view they need to change them. Too heavy. Too thick.
- 3. Staff. Everything depends on the staff. They are reasonably well trained in Starbucks but occasionally you get the odd rogue employee who is downright rude or slow.... And they are

#### Adelaide Sosseh

Adelaide Sosseh, Co-Chair of the largest anti-poverty campaign in the world will be the keynote speaker at this year's Big Tent Festival.



Adelaide a renowned campaigner from The Gambia, who co-chairs the Global Call to Action Against Poverty (GCAP) will be at the launch of Big Tent on Friday 23rd July and will address festival go-ers at a joint presentation with Malcolm Fleming, 0xfam Scotland's Campaigns Manager.

The Big Tent's theme is Moving with Africa and their discussion will focus on the need for global solidarity and climate justice, focusing on the impact on the world's poorest people.

Climate justice is the key link between the environmental movement in this country and aid and poverty in the global south. There is an inherent injustice in the fact that the North caused climate change, but people who have had none of the benefits of industrialisation are suffering the impact.

It is five years since the G8 Summit in Gleneagles, the catalyst for the creation of the Big Tent as Scotland's leading green festival. Oxfam Scotland's recent 'Auchterarder Audit' looked at the progress made since the G8 in 2005 and Big Tent will provide a further forum to ask which promises were delivered — and which weren't.

In 2005, leaders at the G8 responded to growing public pressure to fight poverty and pledged to increase overseas aid by \$50 billion by 2010, with \$25 billion of this going to Africa. But five years on, they are \$20 billion short.

Mike Small, Festival Programme Director said: "We are delighted to welcome Adelaide to Scotland and make these connections between ecology and international aid and solidarity. The globalised world exploits people and planet and GCAP's work represents a future for environmental justice and a world based on equity not exploitation."

Adelaide Sosseh, Co-Chair of GCAP commented: "I am so looking forward to speaking at Big Tent. My work in Gambia is about giving people a voice, to empower them to have a say in the issues that affect them. Big Tent puts this philosophy into action here in Scotland.

The people of Scotland have a reputation for having a keen sense of justice… and enjoying a good party. I hope that Big Tent will offer both."

Malcolm Fleming, Oxfam Scotland Campaigns Manager, concluded: "We're really proud to be a partner in Big Tent, as it's unique among festivals in giving people a chance not only to have a good time, but to engage in world issues and make a difference. At Oxfam Scotland, we know that it is the world's poorest people who are suffering the effects of climate change right now. That's not fair. Big Tent began after the G8 summit at Gleneagles. Five years later, Oxfam Scotland is here, harnessing people power to hold leaders to account and make a fairer world."

#### **Crown Estates**

Net income of The Crown Estate fell by 7% last year to £210.7 million according to their financial results announced yesterday.

The Crown Estate earned a net income surplus (profit) of £210.7 million in the year ending 31 March 2010. This is paid to the Treasury and helps reduce the fiscal deficit. Primarily because of the exceptionally low level of interest rates which we earned on our capital reserves (see footnote), this represents a fall of 7 per cent compared to the previous year.

Sir Stuart Hampson, Chairman of The Crown Estate, said, "As we anticipated, 2009/10 was an extremely challenging year. It has been a period when we have drawn on all the expertise and experience of our people to record a set of results which stand up well in the context of the economic downturn. Our

urban, rural, marine and Windsor estates all recorded pleasing financial results."

Roger Bright, Chief Executive of The Crown Estate, added, "Despite the worst recession that most of us have experienced, thanks to the diversity and quality of our portfolio and the efforts of our staff we have delivered a good set of financial results.

"Looking ahead, our overall strategy is to concentrate on our core holdings and our areas of expertise. The Marine Estate will play an increasing part in this as it continues to facilitate the development of offshore renewable energy.

"Our results should be read in the context of our obligation not to chase short term income returns, and our statutory restrictions on borrowing, which increases our exposure to low interest rates."

On the marine estate, progress in the renewable energy sector dominated, as they took significant strides towards enabling developers to realise the huge potential of the energy-rich coastal waters around the UK.

Revenue fell by 6.2 per cent to £46.6 million, reflecting conditions in the wider economy and a fall in demand for dredged aggregates from the construction industry. Total property value increased to £443.7 million, up 8.4 per cent on the previous year.

The coastal estate, which includes marinas, ports, harbours and other coastal activity, contributed £13.6 million to our turnover, an increase of 6.2 per cent.

The key highlight of the year on the marine estate was the Round 3 offshore wind programme which culminated towards the end of the financial year in the announcement of the successful bidders for each of the nine wind zones around the UK coastline. Coming on top of Rounds 1 and 2 and a Scottish Territorial Waters round, all of which are still in

development, Round 3 aims to deliver a quarter of the UK's total electricity needs by 2020. The UK is already a world leader in generating electricity from offshore wind, and over 1GW of electricity is in production from leasing Rounds 1 and 2.

In March 2010, they passed another milestone with the announcement of the successful bidders for the world's first commercial wave and tidal leasing round, for 10 sites in Scotland's Pentland Firth and Orkney waters.

The rural estate achieved what they called a 'pleasing performance' during the year, with capital value rising by 5.7 per cent to £971.7 million. Revenue was £25.1 million, down by 6 per cent on the previous year.

The Crown Estate invested over £9.2 million in new works and improvements on the estate. In Scotland alone, the task of restoring and repairing property damaged by the harsh winter conditions will require over £1 million of investment.

There will be special corrals set up at the end of the street to allow the residents to walk along the street with their rubbish, according to the paper. This story has one glaring omission from it. The residents of Edinburgh's

New Town are very fortunate in that the city council has arranged daily (that is every single day 7 days a week) rubbish collections. Oh actually one other omission — has the council actually decided to do this — if so where is the evidence?

The Broughton Spurtle has now entered the fray decrying the piece in The Herald and in The Edinburgh Evening News by pointing out that they had both perhaps lifted their information from a piece by The Spurtle!

Well in search of the answers we have spoken to LibDem Councillor for the City Centre Charles Dundas and this is what he told us:- "No-one can ignore the massive change in funding which we face on the Council, so radical changes in how we provide services are called for if we are to avoid cutting what we do back to the bare minimum. This whole thing is triggered by the need to continue delivering top quality services, but with less money to do it.

"However, the most important thing to stress is that this is only an exploration of alternatives — which we felt it necessary to make, so as to enable an informed decision in the future — the Council is in no way committed to any of the Alternative Models; such as shared services with other Coucils, Charitable Trusts (like Glasgow's Arts and Culture one), LLPs, or Joint Ventures like the Council's existing partnership with BT for internal IT provision.

"The current status of the investigation is that initial expressions of interest have been sought and a shortlist of companies drawn up for further negotiations on what they can offer. I can assure you that no big steps like this will be taken without considerable discussion from all councillors across the Council Chamber."

We are currently researching the other evidence and will bring you the full story as soon as we can.

The group holds four meetings every year, and runs additional events and meetings throughout the country for members to have their say about the care services they use and the standard of care they receive.

The IPG is part of the Care Commission's wider Involving People Plan, which aims to gather the views and opinions of all care users and their families in order to drive up the standards at all care services in Scotland.

Karen Anderson, communications and involvement manager for the Care Commission, said: "It's so important for the Care Commission to involve people who use care services and carers in the work they do.

"The Involving People Group is vital for people across Scotland to voice what they think about care in our country — whether it's praise for a service or suggestions for improvement, the views come from those who know best.

"Our development days are held four times a year and they are

really beneficial to everyone involved. I would encourage anyone who would like to express their views to join the group and help us improve care across the country."

The IPG is comprised of people who use care services and their families, as well as informal carers who voice opinions and give advice on policies and procedures to help influence the scrutiny of care services.

The Care Commission is committed to using the feedback from the IPG in its regulatory work, in order to target failing services and improve standards for care users and their families.

The list of group successes over the past four months range from offering advice to the Care Commission regarding inspection reports and grading, to representing the IPG at the Royal Garden Party at Holyrood Palace.

Jacquie Roberts OBE, Chief Executive of the Care Commission, said: "People want to know they can have a say in the care they receive and have a voice which will be heard to help bring about improvement. They also want to know who can help when things are going wrong.

"There is absolutely no doubt that better quality care will come from better involving the people who receive it."

### No port in Portobello

The Local Government Scotland Act 1973 gave councils powers to pass bye-laws about drinking outside.

Lothian and Borders Police and their partner agencies have announced that a byelaw prohibiting the antisocial consumption of alcohol will be enforced on Portobello beach this summer. Officers from Portobello's Safer Neighbourhood Team and representatives from The City of Edinburgh Council have been working closely together to identify and tackle drink related behaviour through Operation Drifter. antisocial implementation of the byelaw, as part of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, gives police the power to stop the public consuming alcohol within an enforcement area and arrest anyone who refuses. Chief Inspector Tony Beveridge said: " During a recent bank holiday weekend we estimated that several thousand people had made their way to Portobello Beach and it was apparent to our officers that some were drinking very heavily. "During that weekend we dealt with many complaints of antisocial and threatening behaviour most of which were drinkrelated. "Whilst we are delighted to welcome people to Edinburgh who wish to enjoy themselves, it is important that they respect the rights of others to do the same. "We are keen to assure the public that those who obey the law while enjoying an alcoholic drink will not be targeted. However the implementation of the byelaw should send a clear message that criminal behaviour linked to alcohol will not be tolerated." Jim Hunter, East Neighbourhood Manager said: "The ongoing improvements we are making in Portobello are to give residents and visitors a clean, welcoming and attractive place and we support efforts to ensure a minority of people do not spoil it for others."

#### Plea for next of kin

Lothian and Borders Police are renewing an appeal for help in tracing the relatives of a man who died in Edinburgh at the end of June.

John Stevenson was found dead at his home in Gracemount Drive on Wednesday 30th June. There are no suspicious circumstances, and a report has been sent to the Procurator Fiscal. The 77-year-old lived alone in Gracemount Drive for the past year and a half. Mr Stevenson was born in Glasgow in 1933, to William Stevenson and Janey Mcgregor Stevenson. His parents married in 1929 in Partick, Glasgow.

A police spokesperson said: 'We are asking anyone who might know, or know of, Mr Stevenson and his family, to contact us as soon as possible.'

#### No Knives Better Lives

Fife Police had their launch of this initiative last week....So now The No Knives Better Lives campaign has been launched in Edinburgh.

Lothian and Borders Police and the City of Edinburgh Council are taking part in the Scottish Government drive to make young people aware of the dangers of using and carrying knives. The campaign, which is being rolled out across the country, will run in the north of the city and will involve a number of youth projects throughout the summer. Recent analysis suggests

the number of incidents involving knives in the north of Edinburgh make up almost a third of knife crimes across the whole of the city. The study also shows in nearly half of all incidents, the victim knew the offender, and that drugs and alcohol are major contributory factors in knife crime. At the Edinburgh launch at a five-a-side football event at Montgomery Park , Justice Secretary Kenny MacAskill, said: "We are working in partnership with the council, police, schools and young people in Edinburgh to create very local No Knives Better Lives campaign that is tailored to the community and supporting the good work they are already doing. "Far too many lives are lost and people injured though mindless acts of violence — often because of the knife culture that blights some communities. That is why we are working to change the culture around violence in Scotland." Superintendent David Carradice said: "Tackling knife crime is a priority for the Force. The recent reduction in violent crime, particularly involving a knife or other weapons, is testament to our ongoing proactive engagement with communities. "Using a knife, or even carrying one, is extremely dangerous, and has serious consequences for everyone involved — it is essential youngsters understand this. "The most effective way of delivering this message is through education, and events like No Knives Better Lives will undoubtedly prove useful for engaging with the younger members of our community. Councillor Paul Edie, Community Safety Leader for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "This is an important project for the city as it sends out a simple, yet hard-hitting message, that this type of crime is not acceptable within our society. "It is also important to reassure the wider community that the partnership is doing everything it can to educate young people, so that knife crime can be reduced and that these crimes can become a problem of the past. "I am sure this new and exciting initiative will teach young people, that carrying a knife can have a devastating affect on their future." Gavin Crosby, Youth Work Strategy Manager for the City of Edinburgh Council, said: "Over the summer, young people have the opportunity to be involved in fun activities, provided by the Council and partner agencies. "The No Knives Better Lives resources enable youth workers to talk about the serious dangers that come from carrying a knife, even if you don't intend to use it or were carrying it for somebody else."

### **Trotting horses**

The Reporter has a bit of a passion for horses generally, and trotting horses in particular just because they are so strong and beautiful...

The UK's top harness racers head to Musselburgh this weekend (17 and 18 July) for the country's most important fixture which culminates in a Champion's Day on Sunday.



The East Lothian racecourse is working hand in hand with the harness racing authorities to build up this weekend fixture and has succeeded in securing television coverage by TurfTV which will feed live in to selected betting shops.

With heats taking place on Saturday, the jewel in the crown is Sunday's Champion's Day which features the finals of the Famous Musselburgh Pace Cup, the Hurricane Pace and the Red Mills International Free For All Pace.

A full card of 180 entries from Scotland, England, Ireland and Wales will compete for just under £40,000 prize money and has attracted high calibre contenders, including horses from top Dublin stud Meadowbranch.

Former Irish champion drivers Geoff Dunne and John Richardson will face strong competition from leading British driver William 'Rocker' Laider and Scottish champion John Gilvear.

Recognised as probably the hardest race to win under any code,

the Famous Musselburgh Pace it is the ultimate test in harness racing and only one horse in modern times has won it twice — the legendary Direct Dream. This year young pretenders Impartial and Stoneriggs Mystery will be taking on the Irish contingent of For A Few Dollars More and Earned Income for the title.

In the Free For All event every horse has the credentials to win but worth watching is Conner's Dragon, the 2008 Horse of The Year is just returned from Canada and cannot be ignored.

New British Champion Crown Manhattan will make a strong challenge while Ireland is represented by diminutive millionaire pacer Doonbeg who is really on form following a big win at Aberystwyth. Laneside Lexus was 2009 Horse of the Year and a past Famous Musselburgh Pace winner, but needs to reproduce her 2009 form to be in with a chance.

Ireland's Porterstown Jack is a tough campaigner and a course specialist but the most popular winner would be Welsh-bred Scoot Around. Owned and trained in the Yorkshire Dales he is a former multiple British Champion, the first horse to win over £50,000 in Britain and although 11 years old is running really well.

Irish raider Lyons Stephen looks a certainty in the Scottish Four Year Old Championship but the 'Midlands Maestro' Peter Addis has different ideas with Rhyds Destiny.

On Saturday the first of 10 heats gets underway at 12.30pm while Champion's Day on Sunday begins at 1.30pm with the final of the Hurricane Pace and concludes at 4.25pm with the Famous Musselburgh Pace.

Harness racing has been run at Musselburgh since 1893 under the auspices of the Musselburgh Fair Day Association. ## Climate Change During the Last 10,000 Years: Reconstructions and Uncertainties

### Breakthrough Breast Cancer

An important new treatment has been announced by scientists working in Edinburgh.

The team are the first to identify a gene's key role in causing the spread of HER2 positive breast cancer to other

parts of the body. The gene is called C35 and becomes overactive in this type of tumour.

What makes the discovery even more exciting is that there are drugs in development which could potentially kill cancer cells which rely on this gene. They do this by disabling a protein associated with the gene, which stops it from working. It is thought this type of drug would therefore be a new treatment for HER2 positive breast cancer and save the lives of women with this type of the disease. The research is published today online in the British Journal of Cancer.

HER2 positive breast cancer affects around 9,000 women in the UK each year and 800 women in Scotland — making up about 20% of all breast cancer cases. While it can be treated with the targeted treatment, Herceptin (trastuzumab), that drug does not work for all patients, and can stop working for others after time. This means new treatments are vitally needed to save lives of women with this type of the disease.

Research leader Dr Elad Katz, from the Breakthrough Breast Cancer Research Unit, said: "With all cancers, the key is working out how they form and spread. Identifying this gene's key role in the spread of this type of breast cancer is a significant finding.

"We are at an early stage, but there is now a real possibility there could be a new treatment for women with HER2 positive breast cancer."

Professor David Harrison, Director of the Breakthrough Breast Cancer Research Unit at the University of Edinburgh, said: "This is an important development because we now know one of the key triggers to the spread this type of cancer. It is exciting to know there is a drug out there which could potentially stop this process happening and save the lives of women with breast cancer.

"We now need to do more work in the lab to prove this concept before we can start patient trials."

## **Employment in Scotland**

The Scottish Government is right to prioritise action to nurture Scotland's economy and protect recovery, Finance Secretary John Swinney said in response to employment figures published today.

New statistics show that claimant count levels in Scotland fell by 600 over the month to June — the fifth consecutive monthly fall in those claiming jobseekers allowance in Scotland. The claimant count rate for Scotland is 4.8 per cent. During the three months to May 2010, Scotland's unemployment rate was 8.1 per cent.

The Finance Secretary said that the figures demonstrated both the legacy of the previous UK Government's handling of the public finances and the dangers of the new coalition's cuts which are "too deep, too quick."

Ahead of a visit to Scottish and Southern Energy's new £5 million training centre in Perth, Mr Swinney said:

"Scotland is continuing to see fragile signs of recovery. Today's figures highlight a fifth consecutive monthly fall in the number of people claiming jobseekers allowance, and our unemployment rate remains below many other parts of the UK such as London, Wales, the North East of England, North West, and Yorkshire and the Humber.

"Both the Purchasing Managers Index survey for June and Scottish Engineering review for the second quarter of the year showed rises in the number of firms reporting increases in employment. And the Lloyds TSB Business Monitor Report highlighted a rise in the number of businesses that reported an increase in exports during the second quarter.

"But today's figures again demonstrate that recovery is in its early stages — which is why the UK Government is wrong to risk jobs and recovery through spending cuts that are too quick and too deep, and come on top of those already imposed on Scotland by the previous Westminster administration.

"These figures show the Scottish Government was right to defer further Westminster cuts to next year in order to support recovery and maintain employment now. The statistics also demonstrate the importance of the comprehensive action we are taking to support recovery, prioritise frontline services and creating and protecting jobs through the implementation of our Economic Recovery Plan, which is directly supporting up to 15,000 jobs.

"Today I am in Perth to support Scottish and Southern Energy's £5 million investment in skills development and training — which reflects the Scottish Government's own priority in supporting jobs and skills, particularly in the energy sector, where there is massive potential for sustainable economic growth.

"The challenges of cuts imposed by Westminster underline the case for financial responsibility for Scotland, so that we can make our own decisions and use our own powers over taxation, spending and other key economic levers in order to grow the Scottish economy and support jobs."

The International Labour Organisation (ILO) measure of unemployment is a survey based estimate of the number of people out of work who are actively seeking a job and are available to start work. It provides the most comprehensive measure for changes in the overall Scottish labour market and is reported on a rolling three-month basis, with the latest data available for the period March-May 2010.

The Scottish ILO unemployment rate of 8.1 per cent for the three month period March-May 2010 was the sixth lowest of the 12 UK nations and regions. The following UK regions and

nations had a higher unemployment rate than Scotland: North East (9.4 per cent); North West (8.3 per cent); Yorkshire and the Humber (9.1 per cent); West Midlands (8.6 per cent); London (9.3 per cent) and Wales (9.1 per cent).

Claimant count data is based on Jobseeker's Allowance records and is reported on a monthly basis, with the latest data available for June. While more timely and disaggregated than the ILO measure, it is less comprehensive as it excludes those in the labour force who are not entitled to claim benefit and those who choose not to claim benefit.

The claimant count rate of 4.8 per cent in Scotland for June 2010 was the sixth lowest of the 12 UK nations and regions. The following UK regions and nations had a higher claimant count rate than Scotland: North East (6.6 per cent); North West (5.1 per cent); Yorkshire and the Humber (5.4 per cent); West Midlands (5.8 per cent); Wales (5.0 per cent) and Northern Ireland (6.3 per cent).

Analysis by the International Monetary Fund shows that among the G7, the UK is providing the lowest level of discretionary fiscal stimulus in 2010 — equivalent to 0.2 per cent of GDP in 2010. Across the advanced G20 countries, the discretionary fiscal stimulus packages represent, on average, 2.0 per cent of GDP in 2010.

A comparison of fiscal stimulus packages was produced by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) in the May 2010 Fiscal Monitor publication.

## National Library of Scotland

A selection of Scottish treasures from the National Library of Scotland's archives will form part of a new worldwide online catalogue of cultural merit.

The United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) have selected four pieces from the library to help launch the new UK version of its Memory of the World Register. The register is a global catalogue of heritage, focusing on artefacts of outstanding universal value, with a remit to preserve and promote them.

A film depicting the last days of human habitation on a remote island, a selection of maps from a 16th Century cartographer, the earliest surviving book printed in Scotland and documents highlighting the demise of Scotland's capitalist aspirations of empire, will form part of the register, the first part of which goes live today.

Martyn Wade, CEO of the National Library of Scotland, said: 'To have one artefact included in the UNESCO Memory of the World Programme would have been very exciting, to have four is beyond our greatest expectations and truly endorses the quality of our archives here in Edinburgh. I am confident that this endorsement from UNESCO will both strengthen our appeal here in Scotland and establish us internationally.'

One of the selected artefacts is a film, offering an insight into one of Scotland's most remote communities in the years immediately preceding its demise. The 17-minute 'St Kilda, Britain's Loneliest Isle 1923-1928' captures scenes of a community that was soon to disappear. The tiny Gaelic speaking population was forced to migrate in August 1930 bringing an end to 2,000 years of human habitation on the island.

UNESCO also selected more traditional artefacts with the

drawings of pioneer cartographer Timothy Pont and works from Scotland's first printers Walter Chepman and Andrew Myllar impressing.

Pont's maps include more than 9,500 named locations, incorporating drawings of castles and tower houses, and often naming the land owners offering a uniquely important insight into this time period. His maps form the first comprehensive survey of Scotland and were instrumental in the production of the first Atlas of Scotland.

The 11 pieces of printing in the 'Chepman and Myllar Prints', are all known only from these copies, including the earliest surviving dated book printed in Scotland: John Lydgate's 'The Complaint of the Black Knight', 4 April 1508.

Joining the St Kilda film, Pont's maps and the literary products of Chepman and Myllar is the archive of the Company of Scotland. The letters and documents it contains chart the history of the Company of Scotland's plan to establish trading a colony on the Isthmus of Darien in Central America in the 1690s, a bold attempt at establishing a Scottish empire.

Subscriptions came in from the aristocracy, tradespeople, farmers, professionals and the burghs, and totalled £400,000. Despite the financial strength of the venture it turned to failure and can be viewed as a component in Scotland's move toward the 1707 Union with England.

The UK Memory of the World register was established this year with the aim of highlighting some of the UK's lesser-known items of historical interest by awarding them with the globally-recognised 'Memory of the World' status.

'We were incredibly impressed by the diversity and richness of the first nominations to the register,' said David Dawson, Chair of the UK Memory of the World Committee. 'Given the UK's rich documentary history, I'm sure these winners are just the tip of the iceberg. We hope this will encourage more people to get involved with their local archives and museums.'

## Edinburgh Innovation Lab

#### **Festivals**

Festivals Edinburgh, the strategic umbrella organisation that represents and works on behalf of Edinburgh's twelve major festivals, has been awarded £300,000 from Creative Scotland's National Lottery Fund to set up the Edinburgh Festivals Innovation Lab, a two year initiative to lead the digital development of Edinburgh's Festivals.

The Edinburgh Festivals Innovation Lab, believed to be the first of its kind in the UK, will enable Festivals to work with leading thinkers, technologists, artists, audiences and digital communities to develop and prototype ideas that improve and inspire the audience experience. It will tackle themes such as helping festival go-ers make the most of their experiences, new ways of distributing festival content and making the festivals greener.

Everything from special developer tech events and webtools that transparently "crowdsource" ideas from the public, to a brand-new "geek-in-residence" position working across the Edinburgh Festivals, will be developed. The Lab will also support improvements to core infrastructure, enable the digital distribution of content and support the exploration of digital programming.

The Edinburgh Festivals Innovation Lab will run alongside Creative Scotland's Amb:IT:ion Scotland programme, which currently supports Scottish arts organisations to build their digital capacity and enhance their effectiveness using new technologies. In line with the aims of Amb:IT:ion Scotland, the Innovation Lab will provide organisational capacity,

resources and access to expertise, to take advantage of opportunities in digital innovation, technology and culture in order to provide public benefit.

The Innovation Lab is a natural development for the Edinburgh Festivals, who in the past twelve months have supported, delivered or piloted a number of digital projects including: the Festivals' first iPhone application; the creation of the Festivals' first official online TV channel edinburghfestivals.tv; "Festbuzz"\* and the crowd-sourcing via Twitter of the Fringe 2010 programme artwork.

Andrew Dixon, Chief Executive, Creative Scotland said: "The Edinburgh Festivals already reach a live and TV audience in the millions. Creative Scotland's investment will enable the festivals to interact with a global audience and to engage with the public through online digital programming."

Faith Liddell, Director of Festivals Edinburgh said:

"Collaboration and innovation are at the heart of our plans to sustain and boost the ongoing success and development of Edinburgh's Festivals. Over the next two years, our world-renowned Festivals will be a stage and a showcase, a playground and a platform for a number of innovative pilot projects and initiatives. And through our developer events programme, crowdsourcing initiatives and geek-in-residence programme, the way we invite, select and deliver the projects will be an innovation in itself too. We are delighted that Creative Scotland has chosen to invest in our ambition, as we focus on digital technology and innovative practice to maintain our global competitive edge."

## Scottish Ambulances to have defibrillators on board

The new Laerdal HeartStart MRX machines were chosen after an extensive procurement process, which included weeks of field trails with ambulance crews around the country. They include 12 lead ECG diagnostic and interpretive capabilities, which provide greater detail on patients' cardiac rhythm and diagnosis. This allows better quality information to be transmitted to specialist receiving cardiac centres while the ambulance is en route.

Pauline Howie, Chief Executive, Scottish Ambulance Service, said: "In most instances of heart attacks, ambulance staff are the first response. It is important that our paramedics and technicians have the most advanced technology available to help them deliver the highest standards of care to patients. The new defibrillators will be introduced into all of our 526 emergency ambulances by the end of the year and will make a significant contribution to saving lives in Scotland on a daily basis.

"Our staff were heavily involved in the process of choosing the preferred solution and the combination of portability, functionality and reliability were key factors in the final decision. Ambulance crews work closely with cardiologists at centres around the country and the increased diagnostic functionality of the new machines will enhance the quality of information available to specialists, improving the likelihood of a positive outcome for patients."

Health Secretary Nicola Sturgeon said: "Getting the best possible treatment, at the earliest possible opportunity, is vital when it comes to saving people's lives.

"That's why the Scottish Ambulance Service has fitted defibrillators in all their accident and emergency ambulances to ensure that when people need this potentially lifesaving treatment it is available — wherever they are.

"The rollout of the latest technology will help the ambulance service deliver an even better service to patients throughout Scotland."

The SAS responds to over 33,000 cardiac related emergencies in Scotland every year and currently reaches more than 80% of them in under 8 minutes, against a standard of 75%.

#### Court news

The sad tale is of Edinburgh pensioner John Millar, 67, who held a pillow over his wife's face for about five minutes in an attempt to end her suffering. His wife now lives in a nursing home. More details on the new look <u>BBC website</u>.

The High Court recently heard an appeal against sentence by one of the eight men convicted in a trial which went on for some 10 weeks in Edinburgh last year. Ross Webber, a North Berwick bank worker was originally sentenced to 3 years 9 months on one of the charges against him. This has now been reduced to 2 years 8 months on appeal according to the written decision delivered by Lord Osborne and uploaded to the High Court website this week.

Part of the original conviction related to possessing and distributing child pornography.

# Newspapers....possible demise of a local paper

A community newspaper which has been published for more than 30 years could face closure unless it secures new sources of funding.

The North Edinburgh News is given funding through the Fairer Scotland Fund but this will end next year — leaving the newspaper desperately searching for ways to keep it going.

The monthly free newspaper was set up by volunteers more than 30 years ago to serve the local community and highlight the positive achievements of the area.

But editor Mary Burnside, who has been involved with the NEN since 1989, said it needed funds of at least £45,000 to keep it going for another year.

She said: "It is looking quite grim. Being a newspaper, there's not that many options open to us in terms of securing funding.

"I have been here 20 years and we are all really committed to the project so we don't want to see it fail.

"It is very much local. It is an area where there's quite a few problems and it is quite a strong campaigning community and, over the years, having its own newspaper has meant these campaigns have received quite a good profile.

"It has helped to change things for the better — I think having the newspaper there has definitely helped.

"We are doing ok for advertising but we don't want to lose the ethos of what the paper is about by just becoming another freesheet with lots of ads."

Staff and the voluntary board of directors will be stepping up their campaign to save the paper over the next few months.

The newspaper previously received council funding through the

Edinburgh Community Newspapers Trust but this stopped three years ago.

Staff who work for the NEN have already had a cut in their hours and salaries because of a reduction in funding.

The newspaper has an estimated readership of 35,000 — with 14,500 copies being printed each month and distributed to homes and buildings such as community centres and schools.

### Recipe of the week

#### Grilled Chicken with Mustard

Enough for 4
Takes about 40 minutes

Get the BBO out. Make sure it is clean.

Put 4 teaspoons of mustard seeds in a frying pan and toast them till they crackle. Put them in a large bowl. Add 8oz of green beans either fresh or frozen, similar amount of thinly sliced green cabbage, 1 small thinly sliced onion and 1 tablespoon of fresh tarragon.

Whisk 2 tablespoons of olive oil with same amount of balsamic vinegar and 2 teaspoons of Dijon mustard in a bowl. Mix in with the cabbage and beans to make a very green coleslaw.

Whisk an egg white and a good 2 tablespoons of mustard in a small bowl. Season the skin of 4 chicken breasts with salt and pepper. Brush them with the mustard and the mustard seeds.

Put the chicken on the BBQ skin side down. Grill for about 5 minutes each side or until cooked through....check with a skewer that it is!

Serve both together — preferably with some fat fries too unless you are on a diet....
