Four Lions

Hosted by Charlie Brooker, the interview took place at Brixton's Ritzy Picturehouse and was shown live at the Cameo and fifteen other cinemas across the UK. Members of the London audience asked questions directly, whilst those viewing from afar had the option to email from their phone or pass questions to ushers who emailed them to London. Very social media friendly!

For those who have not come across it, Four Lions is a comedy about jihadism from the controversial writer of Brass Eye and Jam. It has had mixed reviews, with some fans of Morris's visceral comedy style feeling that it was too much of a 'straight' comedy.

Asked why this was, Morris responded,

"Form creates a ceiling. The point here was not to make fun of a mechanism [eg the overly long credits to Brass Eye poked fun at over the top graphics being used by television news stations at the time] — that isn't any good, it limits what you can do."

He went on to explain that with this project he wanted to create believable characters, which is why he enlisted Peep Show writers Jesse Armstrong and Simon Bain to help write the script. He also conducted four years of research into the Muslim world.

Oddly he found that people he approached were happier to talk to him when they found out who he was.

"They seemed comforted by the idea that I would be mocking them, rather than making a very serious piece that would end up missing the point."

When asked, 'do you ever feel you've crossed the line?' he

said,

"The line is like, 100 miles thick. If you cross the line, you run out of material, that's boring. What makes an interesting project is something that will go off in lots of different directions."

The film does this admirably, following the five central characters through the minutiae of daily life, watching them bicker and getting glimpses into their hopes and fears. By the end it is impossible not to be completely on the side of the bombers, even though they are idiots and what they are planning to do is morally reprehensible.

The final audience question came from Anne in Edinburgh, who asked 'what do you hope to achieve with this film?'

Morris, feeling he had already explained this pretty well via the film itself, handed this over to the cast.

Kayvan Novak (Waj, the daft one) replied "adoration," Riz Ahmed (Omar, the leader) responded, "laughs," and Adeel Akhtar (Fessel, the one who blows up a crow) said simply, "a date. Just to be held."

Of Otaku and Nintendo

Less than a week after sending the Wii back to Nintendo it has been returned, with no charge required! Sadly I wasn't able to plug it in straight away as I had taken my video cable to work as the one for the Wii there had broken.

Nonetheless I eagerly opened the parcel to find what I initially thought was a replacement console as the hinge for the cover to the controller ports was different (read:

damaged), but I noticed there was a tell-tale mark on the system that identified it as my own. I was a little saddened by the cover that would fall open now, but hey, hopefully this meant there was the possibility of some (all?) of my save games being intact. Something was troubling me though, and that was the speed of return. All that was enclosed was the letter I sent accompanying the console that explained how to repeat the fault if the console booted up, this had no indication that it had been acknowledged. I wondered if any repair work had actually been done, especially as I hadn't been contacted for payment details.

As I wouldn't be able to get my video cable back until the next day, this continued to bother me, so I decided to phone up Nintendo and see if they had any more information. The guy who answered my call assured me that all repairs will have been done unless I had specifically stated that I didn't want them to. This allayed my concern a little, but I was still not convinced, so I did what any other impatient geek would have done; I went and picked up a replacement cable!

Upon my return I plugged the Wii back in, booted it up and held my breath. It lived! However I had seen this reawakening before, hence why I included a note with how to reproduce the error. So, my next mission was to do just that. I booted up one of the games that causes the console to not want to reboot (Wii Fit Plus), hit the 'return to menu' option and...

It still crashed.

Disappointed that my concerns had not been misplaced I once again called Nintendo's helpline. This time I was told that no repair had been needed to my console (not sure why this wasn't said during my previous conversation) and what I should do is restore my system from the option screen, after all "that's probably all they would have done anyway" (again, why this hadn't been mentioned in my very first phone call I do not know).

Hanging up, I went to follow the guidance I had been given only to be thwarted at the first hurdle. A message popped up stating it was recommended that I close my Wii Shop Channel Account. So, loading up said channel I went to do just that, however the documentation implied that I would lose all the games I had purchased in doing this. Not wanting to lose all those titles, I decided against this course of action and threw in the towel. Perhaps Nintendo of Europe feel that only otaku would want a console that works, access to all their saves AND still be able to play games that have been purchased online.

For now, I quit. When I have time I'll contact Nintendo once more and find out how best to proceed, but at the moment I don't have time. At least the Wii has returned to life, until my girlfriend or I want to play Wii Fit or Raving Rabbids that is.

Nintendo, I'm disappointed. But credit where it's due, there is no sign of the Xbox 360 at work that got sent off for repair at the same time, so at least the return was speedier, and it didn't cost me anything.

UPDATE: 4 days after this the Xbox was returned, repaired at no cost and a free months pass to Xbox Live. I didn't think Microsoft had the ability to better any company, especially when it comes to customer support, but I have been proven wrong.

iPad

I'm typing this on a shiny, new iPad and despite what you might think or have heard to the contrary, it is a rather pleasing experience.

It certainly beats hauling about my rapidly disintegrating laptop and might even allow me to send e-mail unlike that old work horse. However even that will probably be best done at one of Edinburgh's free WiFi hotspots due to my current appalling internet speed at home (I love paying for broadband and receiving poorer speeds than I did on dial-up during the 90's), but I digress.

It seems fitting to make a review of the iPad the first thing

I type on its screen, so let's do just that.

One sentence review: it's a big iPod Touch. And I mean that in the best possible way. If you have used the Touch or an iPhone, then you're going to be right at home with this little machine. The user interface is similar, but not identical allowing for added features such as landscape and portrait orientation, even on the home screen, something I must confess to yearning for ever since picking up the first iPhone. Icons have more room to breath thanks to the larger display and make it far less likely to 'fat finger' the wrong app than on a handset. Some commentators have criticised the amount of bezel surrounding the iPad (the border around the screen) but I for one welcome it. Being a person who had to move the phone icon on my iPhone because my thumb kept hitting it, I appreciate the room this affords me in resting my hands whilst typing this very article.

Something I've been very impressed with, especially after some initial comments is how well apps that aren't specifically optimised for the iPad perform. There are some that don't translate as well as others, but most that I've tried out have worked great. Being a games blog though, let's stick with the game side of this.

If there is one genre that could really make a comeback on the iPad, it is that guilty pleasure of mine that is the interactive movie. Games such as Dragon's Lair and Space Ace look beautiful on the larger screen, and the touch controls feel better than even an old arcade stick. It even makes the largest control scheme make much more sense than it did on the smaller iDevices, feeling like a game of Simon especially in easy mode; hitting the right button as it lights up. Other laserdisc classics such as Cobra Command feel just as at home on the iPad, again the controls feeling much more responsive. However, some titles that are more reliant on tilt controls don't translate as successfully. When I loaded up the Atari classic, Adventure it was barely playable with the square you

control reacting way too sensitively to be playable.

Games that rely on pixel art look particularly nice when doubled up to be full screen on the iPad. Vay, one of the first RPGs released in the app store looks beautiful. Its pixel art looking very sharp. I would also argue that Flashback plays far better than the iPad optimised version of Prince of Persia.

Due to the aforementioned internet service provider at home, I haven't had a chance to download many iPad exclusive games, but expect some individual reviews coming in the not too distant future (ISP depending).

It has been a source of speculation since the announcement of the iPad, however I truly believe it is a valid gaming platform. There are already some great looking and playing titles out there, and some of them are playable on the smaller devices too. Does it make the iPod Touch et al. irrelevant? Not in the least. Going back to my iPhone after using the iPad makes me look at my 3G in a way I haven't since I first laid eyes on the original iPhone. The fact that so much can be done on such a small screen is astounding to me once more and with the iPhone 4 on the horizon, things are looking very bright for Apple's touch device market. However for anyone that found these smaller machines a little cluttered or too small to use easily, the iPad is certainly worth your consideration.

Success of solar water heating project

RESIDENTS of Central Edinburgh's World Heritage Site are 'getting into hot water' with the help of the ScottishPower

Energy People Trust and Lister Housing Co-operative.

The ScottishPower Energy People Trust donated £90,000 to the housing co-operative towards the cost of installing solar water heating renewable energy systems for it's tenants. The funding provided Lister's low income tenants with hot water at a reduced cost, helping to alleviate them from fuel poverty.

The Lister Housing Co-operative provides affordable housing for a range of vulnerable individuals who are on low incomes and suffer from fuel poverty. The housing organisation planned and implemented the renewable fuel initiative. Work on the project, which installed solar water heating to 49 households, started in February 2009 and is now fully complete allowing tenants to save on their fuel bills.

Solar panels on the roofs provide energy to heat the water and are completely hidden from street view which ensured the aesthetics of the World Heritage Site were not disturbed in any way.

The project won the Energy Action Scotland Energy Savers Award 2009 for its good work and guidance and is also establishing itself as a Best Practice guide for similar projects in the future. The best practice guide was written by project partner and Edinburgh-based sustainable development charity, Changeworks.

Ann Loughrey, ScottishPower's Head of Corporate Social Responsibility and the ScottishPower Energy People Trust's Company Secretary, said:

"ScottishPower Energy People Trust is delighted to have helped in such a worthwhile and interesting initiative. The project has helped a great deal in tackling fuel poverty by generating renewable energy to benefit those in need.

"Lister Housing Co-operative has completed an excellent job with the solar water heating panels and has shown that our funding can be used in innovative ways — even to help install solar powered energy in hard-to-treat historic Listed Georgian tenements!"

Alistair Cant, Director of Lister Housing Cooperative, said: "We were thrilled that ScottishPower Energy People Trust donated such a substantial amount of money to our project. This funding helped us immensely and without the generosity of the Trust the project would not be started, let alone complete.

"Already we have seen a number of tenants achieving over 1000 kWh output from their solar panels. One tenant has been in to see us with a gas bill showing a reduction of 51% compared to the same period in the previous year. As she had not had her heating on much if at all in that period, she attributes the difference to the solar panels."



Tiree to Tuscany

Beginning with Ian Fleming's breezy watercolour Balemartin, Tiree through to Louis Rosenberg's wonderfully detailed, sundrenched drypoint San Gimignano, this exhibition features a wide range of twentieth century watercolours, drawings and original prints in various media in between. Approximately forty framed works are exhibited and a large number of unframed prints and drawings by British, French, American and Australian draughtsmen and printmakers.

Works depicting Venice in contrasting styles by artists including David Robertson and William Walcot are of particular interest, including a particularly fine and rare Walcot

etching entitled Palazzo Pesaro now housed in Venice's Gallery of Modern Art. An impression of Sir D. Y. Cameron's masterprint Ben Lomond recently featured in the National Galleries of Scotland's exhibition The Printmaker's Art is also shown.

Other highlights include a group of watercolours, drawings and drypoints by Sir Muirhead Bone, in particular a large drawing The Village of Guadalupe from the Royal Monastery reproduced in his publication Days in Old Spain. Sir Muirhead Bone's work was recently the subject of a major exhibition at the Fleming Collection in London coinciding with the publication of a biography by the artist's grandson Sylvester Bone. Watercolours of Spain and Venice by James Miller add colour, and a particularly strong Parisian street scene by Willie Wilson completes the journey from Tiree to Tuscany.

35 New Schools for Scotland

The first tranche of the £1.25 billion Scotland's Schools for the Future programme will see every local authority benefit. Funding will be made available for 14 secondary schools, 20 primary schools and one special school, with the Scottish Futures Trust working in partnership with the councils to deliver the new projects.

Keith Brown, Minister for Skills and Lifelong Learning, said: "Scotland's Schools for the Future represents much needed Government investment — over £300m through this first tranche — which will benefit pupils, teachers, families and communities the length and breadth of Scotland.

"We have already lifted over 110,000 pupils from schools in poor condition, reversing the trend of under-investment and neglect in Scotland's school estate. Today's announcement will see a further 18,000 pupils and over 1,300 teachers move to fit-for-purpose, modern learning facilities that meets the needs of education in the 21st Century.

"The timescales agreed for the first tranche set out a way ahead that is affordable and realistic for both the Scottish Government and the councils, given the current economic climate. Of course, through councils own resources, they may be able to start procurement, design and — in some cases — building prior to Government funding coming on stream.

"Despite the prospect of a reduced budget from Westminster, our £1.25 billion school building programme demonstrates our overwhelming commitment to our young people and to Scotland's communities. This investment will boost the local economy across the country, creating and maintaining employment in the years ahead."

Barry White, Chief Executive, Scottish Futures Trust, said: "Scottish Futures Trust (SFT) is working closely with councils to deliver Scotland's Schools for the Future programme, which will build high quality, well designed and sustainable schools

"Because of the huge scale of Scotland's Schools for the Future programme, SFT will be able to make savings which will bring real benefits to taxpayers for many years to come."

while ensuring best value for the taxpayer.

Building work on the first projects will commence in 2010. We would expect the first primary school to be completed in 2011, with the first secondary school completed in 2013.

The Scottish Government is funding the construction of secondary schools on a 67/33 basis with local authorities, while primary school projects are on a 50/50 basis, on like for like facilities. In total, the Scottish Government will contribute a £800 million share of the £1.25 billion provided through Scotland's Schools for the Future.

The first tranche investment from the Scottish Government will be over £300 million — subject to inflationary increases based on when funding comes on-stream.

Musselburgh Races 5 June 2010

Derby followers can watch the action on the big screens at the East Lothian track during what is easily Musselburgh's richest race day with prize money just a whisker off £200,000.

General manager Bill Farnsworth has set his stall out by aiming to build up the feature race from its current £80,000 prize pot in to a £100,000 fixture and he hasn't been disappointed at the quality of entries for the Edinburgh Cup's first outing.



With a maximum field of 15 in the Class 2 Heritage Handicap, the top Newmarket stables are represented by John Gosden and William Haggas while Barry Hills and Mick Channon will be hoping for a share of the spoils.

Middleham's Mark Johnston is making a determined effort to keep the Edinburgh Cup in the north with the Kingsley House trainer running three of his original entry, headed by Corsica. Joe Fanning rides the top weight who completed his hat-trick with an all the way success in the listed Glasgow Stakes at Hamilton last month.

William Haggas relies on the progressive Harris Tweed, a promising runner-up to the Mark Johnston trained Green Lightning at Newmarket. But the choice is the lightly weighted Zuider Zee, a rare Musselburgh raider from the powerful John Gosden stable and the mount of Nicky Mackay. Last time out Zuider Zee was a cosy winner from Bowdler's Magic at Chester and this improving three year will be suited to Musselburgh's tight bends and quickish ground.

A quality field for the £50,000 totescoop6 Scottish Sprint Cup sees the recent York winner Hamish McGonagall attempt to concede weight to the inform pair of Striking Spirit and Sea Of Leaves. The Dandy Nicholls trained Striking Spirit is the best drawn of the trio and his sound fourth to Rileyskeepingfaith at Newbury suggests that he will be hard to beat over this sharp five furlongs.

Channel 4 cover the first four races and the probable Royal Ascot contender Excel Bolt should be the star of the 2.35, the totepool Edinburgh Castle Conditions Stakes. An impressive winner over the course on his racecourse debut, the Bryan Smart trained juvenile has the Norfolk Stakes as his target at the Royal Meeting and as his name would suggest the son of Exceed And Excel is blessed with more than his fair share of explosive speed.

World Potato Congress 2012 to be held in Edinburgh

At least 600 potato specialists from around the world will attend the event 417 years after Sir Walter Raleigh, the Elizabethan explorer, introduced the vegetable to England. Since then potato harvesting has grown into a major global industry with more than 325 million tonnes a year being produced. The three day World Potato Congress will be staged at the Edinburgh International Conference Centre (EICC) in June 2012 and is one of twenty new events won for the city with the assistance of the Edinburgh Convention Bureau. These events which were confirmed between 20 April and 19 May will be attended by up to 4,557 delegates in total and will inject an anticipated 6.4 million pounds Sterling into the Edinburgh economy. The largest of the news events is the conference of

the National Association of Pension Funds with 800 delegates and an economic value of 1.1 million pounds Sterling. The venue for the three day meeting in March 2011 is the EICC. Sue Stuart, Chief Executive of ECB, commented: "When you realise the contribution the potato makes to the diet of people around the world it's not so humble after all. We will be delighted to welcome the delegates and let them sample some of Scotland's best potato produce." She added: "It is important to see the return of the National Association of Pension Funds conference as it recognises the continued importance of Edinburgh as a financial centre particularly in these difficult economic times."

The Third Policeman at The Traverse 3-5 June 2010

Adapted for the stage by Jocelyn Clarke The Third Policeman is a murder mystery, an hilarious comedy, a fable of eternal grief and — most importantly — the story of romantic love between one man and his bicycle.

Walk for Water

The Soila Maasai Girls Rescue Centre situated in Kenya's Rift Valley, provides support and education to 100 Maasai girls between the ages of 8 to16 years old. With the co-operation of

the local Chiefs, the Centre provides them with an alternative childhood, free from arranged marriages and female mutilation.

But the cost of providing water for the Centre has soared because of the prolonged drought in Kenya and so Walk for Water has been organised on Sunday 1st August 2010.

The challenge is to climb Glas Tualaichean one of Scotland's 283 Munros, which is 1051m high and raise a minimum of £21 — the cost of water for one girl for half a year. Owners of the Dalmunzie Estate where the Munro is situated, Alex and Simon Winton, have kindly given their permission and help for the organised trek.

The aim is to raise enough money to provide water for all the girls and staff for the next 12 months, with any additional donations going towards finding a long-term solution for the provision of water at the Centre.

The options are;

To walk $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles to Glenlochsie Lodge via the old railway line, on the relative flat, and then return.

To climb to the summit via Glenlochsie Lodge (as marked on the map), $4\frac{1}{2}$ miles.

To race to the top, via Glenlochsie Lodge, the winner will receive a bottle of Famous Grouse kindly donated by the company.

The race will start at 11:30; you will need to carry a waterproof jacket and trousers in a bum bag. Please make sure you arrive by 11am with a bag of warm clothes that will be taken by vehicle to the top for your arrival.

The entry fees are £21 per adult and £10 per child, this being the minimum amount required. If possible everyone should try to raise £42 to cover the cost of water for each girl for a year.

There is parking available, 200 metres past the Dalmunzie

Hotel on the left — follow signs. For anyone coming from Perth, a free coach will leave Broxden Park and Ride at 08.30 returning at 16.30. There are only 50 places available on the bus and booking is required. The walk will start at 10.30am, so please arrive by 10.00am in time to register.

The walk will be lead by a competent mountaineer and a doctor will be present. Please bring walking boots or sturdy shoes plus waterproofs and warm clothing as it can be very cold, even in summer at the top of a mountain. Those climbing Glas Tualaichean are advised to carry plenty of water, a flask with a warm drink and a picnic. Dogs are welcome provided they are kept under control or on leads, please note, dogs will not be allowed on the bus. All participants will receive a certificate signed by Ann Gloag, handed out on finishing.

Great support has been offered for the event and the sponsors include Highland Spring who are providing the bottled water, Famous Grouse for the winner's whisky and Bookers cash and carry for the children's sweets. Stratstone Garage and Mr Douglas Parks are also providing support.

The Dalmunzie Hotel, owned by Mr and Mrs Scott Poole, has very kindly agreed to donate ten per cent of takings for anyone staying at the Hotel or buying refreshments. They will be serving Afternoon Tea with sandwiches and cakes at the hotel on the day at a cost of £5.50 per head, booking advised.

Edinburgh company shortlisted for Observer ethical awards

Edinburgh renewable energy company <u>Aquamarine Power Limited</u> has been short-listed for the 2010 Observer Ethical Awards, organised by The Observer and Ecover.

The awards seek to recognise those who are busy thinking up practical solutions to ethical issues. The awards do not target environmental or energy issues alone, but have a wide scope for recognition of work in all significant areas where an issue of some importance is at stake.
